Breakwater At Shoals

Service and Prof. C. F. Jackson, director of the Marine Laboratory met at the Shoals recently and discussed projected plans.

Commander Steele is attempting to put all the stations in his district in first class condition and the Shoals is the first station off the mainland to be considered.

According to Mr. Fenderson, now in charge of the 10 men at the Coast Guard station, many times in stormy weather it has been impossible to land a boat on the island. This necessitated the crew staying in the boat until the storm subsided, or returning to Portsmouth, 10 miles distant. The service is called upon on an average of twice a week throughout the year and last year 78 boats were towed.

Two weeks ago seven Provincetown fishermen were forced, because of heavy seas, to stay on the island for nine days and during that time one of their boats broke from the Coast Guard mooring during a blinding storm and ran ashore on Smutty Nose island. She was so badly damaged that after being towed back in the night, she sank. Four days later the weather was such that the boat was towed on the bottom to Star Island and beached.

Commander Steele, after studying the harbor possibilities for some time, recommends the building of a long breakwater connecting a point of Appledore island, on which the Coast Guard and Marine laboratory are now stationed, with Rock island, dredging the channel inside the proposed breakwater, thereby forming an artificial harbor, and building a Coast Guard station and boat house at the site of the proposed harbor.

The fire is believed to have started from the outside of a building in the rear. Local help fought the blaze for some time before calling the fire departments allowing the fire to gain great headway.

The fire was checked in the mill of the building, the main structure being saved although the barn and buildings in the rear were lost. The damage was estimated at \$20,000, partly covered by insurance.

Fire Chiefs Arrange For Annual Outing Held Next Wed.
State officials from Massachusetts will be guest speakers at the annual outing of the New Hampshire Fire Chief's association to be held next Wednesday at the Hotel Ashworth. State Fire Marshal Stephen C. Garrity of Lowell, Col. Paul G. Kirk, commissioner of public safety; James M. Hurley, commissioner of civil service, and Francis M. DeCelles, insurance commissioner, have accepted invitations to speak. Chief Frank W. Goodrich of Newfields, president of the association, will preside over the program. Chiefs from Massachusetts, Maine and Vermont have been invited to attend the outing. Arrangements are being made by the committee for nearly 200 chiefs and fire officials at the dinner.

As an additional feature of the outing Chief Homer B. Whiting of the beach station is planning an exhibition of some of his equipment. During this past week two new aluminum ladders arrived for the use of the department. The three-type extension ladder, each one is 34 feet long and weighs only 105 pounds. One of the ladders was used for the first time at the Green Acres fire in Hampton Falls. Men of the department constructed a forest pump which is slightly different from those used by other

departments. It is so arranged that it can be used in three ways. Usually it is drawn as a trailer by an auto but it can be taken off the chassis to be dragged over rough ground or it can be put in a boat to combat a fire on the water. Chief Whiting will also exhibit his trailer type water tower.
