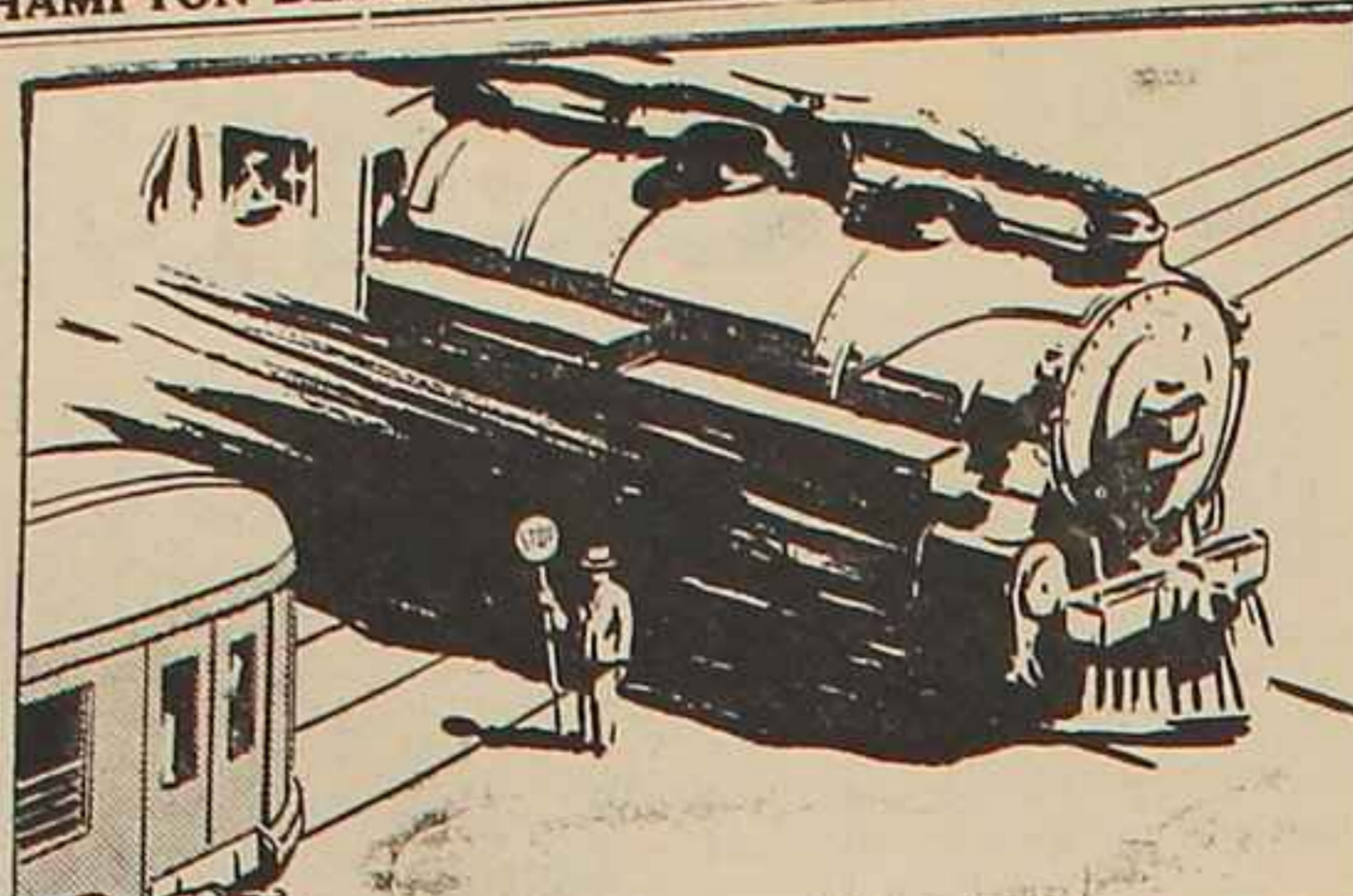

New Eng'd Regional Planning Com. Report Deserves Much Study

The report of the New England Regional Planning Commission to the National Resources Committee which has just been published carries a message that deserves the consideration of every citizen interested in the greatest development of the community, state and region in which he lives.

The object of planning is to provide for the needs of people both present and future. Without an understanding of the number, characteristics, and distribution of the people, present needs cannot be evaluated in terms of highways and transportation, school facilities, recreational areas, industrial development, housing, and other fields of private and public planning. Future needs in these fields obviously cannot be evaluated without some estimate of the same factors. It is therefore important to trace the growth and development of New England's population, and to note the forces behind the various trends. This involves study of the number of people, their distribution, origin, ages, and fields of occupation. With this foundation we can more clearly understand the trends to the present and interpret, within our limitations, trends into the future.

THINK FOR YOURSELF

The coming weeks are important ones for the American people. Many issues of broad political and economic importance to all of us will be discussed from various partisan angles. The newspapers, the magazines, even the very air will be filled with political pronouncements which will increase in volume as election day approaches.

For America faces a close race for the presidency with the result apparently a toss up. Because of this situation it is more important now than at any time in the last four years for every American to understand the issues of the campaign and the position of the candidates on those issues.

What shall we do?

Only when there is an informed electorate—unswayed by sentiment or honeyed words—can we reap the fullest benefits from the Democracy under which we live. Your vote is exactly as important as the vote of anybody else in this country. Treasure that privilege. Do your own thinking.

concerts can be given there at in-
tervals throughout the season.
When the WPA band of Manches-
ter, and other musical aggregations

occasion.

Attempts were made to have Col.
Knox speak from the bandstand in
the center of the beach where seats
and amplification facilities are al-
ready available. Objection was made
to having the 450 dinner guests
walk down from the Ashworth to
seats reserved on the Casino piazza.
