Lumber for the new band stand
which is to be 30 feet by 24 feet
and large enough to hold approxi-
mately 70 persons, arrived on
Thursday. It is to be constructed
by carpenters hired by Colonel
Ashworth in readiness for the work
of professional decorators on Mon-
day. The seats are expected to ar-
rive the morning of the Rocking-
ham County Republican club din-
ner.

The amplifiers to make it pos-
sible for thousands of persons to
hear Colonel Knox will be installed
and tested on Wednesday by the
same Manchester firm that in-
stalled the public address system
for the Chamber of Commerce.
There will be radio connections
with station WHEB in Portsmouth
and the possibility of a larger
hookup is also being considered.
The arrangements include long
press tables for the representatives
of news services and metropolitan
papers directly in front of the
speaking stand.

Colonel Ashworth is considering
retaining the band stand as a per-
manent feature in order that band

concerts can be given there at in-
tervals throughout the season.
When the WPA band of Manches-
ter, and other musical aggregations
gave concerts during special ac-
tivities at the Ashworth, the musi-
cians were obliged to crowd onto
the hotel piazza in the midst of
their listeners.

The preliminary plans called for
the speaking program to be held
inside the dining room with ampli-
fication through a sound car for the
listeners outside. Because of the
many requests for the public ap-
pearance of Colonel Knox, the
plans of the Republican club were
revised to have the entire program
given from the speaking stand.
The dinner guests are to have re-
served seats in front of the band
stand.

Complaints over the location of
the new stand have been made at
the beach because of the probab-
ility of a traffic congestion at Ash-
worth corner. The only entrance to
the business district of the beach
from the north, the Ocean boulevard
is usually congested at this point
on busy days. Since the boulevard
is the only artery, police will be
obliged to allow the continual flow
of traffic throughout the entire
speaking program.

The influx of visitors from Maine
and Massachusetts to hear Colonel
Knox will tax the parking facilities
at the northern end of the beach, it
is expected. With the elimination
of the usual parking across from
the Ashworth it will be necessary
to provide space nearer Boar's
Head. Fields near Cutler's hotel and
the Catholic church may be con-
verted into parking areas for the
occasion.

Attempts were made to have Col.
Knox speak from the bandstand in
the center of the beach where seats
and amplification facilities are al-
ready available. Objection was made
to having the 450 dinner guests
walk down from the Ashworth to
seats reserved on the Casino piazza.

Field Day, Fireworks And Band Concert Feature 'Hurley Day'

Recalling his experiences in upholding the state's credit during the depression with the result that Massachusetts has today the best credit of any state in the union, State Treasurer Charles F. Hurley, Democratic candidate for governor was the concluding speaker on the "Hurley Day" program at the beach Tuesday night.

In following mayors and former mayors of Merrimac Valley cities on the speaking program the Boston state treasurer reminded them how the state treasury had assisted Lawrence, Lowell, Fall River and the Marshfield when those communities had been unable to borrow on their own credit. On his insistence legislation was passed with the result that the state has now loaned \$27,000 on tax titles to cities in towns. Regardless of party affiliations he looked after home owners and bank officials in distress during the depression, he pointed out.

Mayor Walter Griffin of Lawrence, president of the Essex County Democratic club presided as master of ceremonies. As the first speaker former Mayor James J. Bruin of Lowell, chairman of the Hurley activities in Middlesex county spoke on the qualifications of the state treasurer and predicted that Lowell would be united behind Hurley with the largest majority accorded any candidate in the next election.

The issues of the campaign were outlined by former Mayor William H. Henchey of Woburn, a summer resident of the beach who is campaign manager of Hurley. Other speakers included John Dowd of Boston and Mrs. Felix Carr of Peabody.

A miniature State house with a gilded dome on a truck was one of the features of the activities. This was again seen in the fireworks display late in the evening. Thru the afternoon and evening a program of songs and dances was given with the regular band concerts.

OCEAN AVENUE NEAR "B" STREET

Lawrence Editor Dies At Hampton Beach; Has Heart Attack

Stricken with a sudden heart attack while polishing his auto in front of his Ocean boulevard cottage last Sunday afternoon James J. Wrinn, publisher of the Lawrence Sunday News, died before medical aid could be summoned.

Mr. and Mrs. Wrinn were about to entertain guests at dinner in their new cottage built during the past year. While talking to a friend as he dusted off his machine the newspaper publisher collapsed and was dead before the arrival of Dr. Wayne P. Bryer.

A number of beach friends attended the funeral services held from his home, 485 Andover street, Lawrence, Mass., on Wednesday morning with requiem high mass at 9 in St. Patrick's church. Burial was in the Immaculate Conception cemetery.

Born in Lawrence 56 years ago Mr. Wrinn was identified with several types of business there. Twenty years ago he entered the newspaper business and was connected with the old Sunday American, Times and the Sunday Sun. At one time he was assistant to the late John P. S. Mahoney.

Later Mr. Wrinn established the Pep-O Gas and Oil Co. in Lawrence and developed it into a chain of stations. He was also a real estate dealer. With his wife he spent many winters at their home in Zephyr Hill, Fla.

In 1925 Mr. Wrinn founded the Lawrence Sunday News. The last issue on the day of his death carried many articles on activities at both Hampton and Salisbury beaches.

Besides his wife, Catherine E. (Crilly) Wrinn, he is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Mary O'Connell of Haverhill, Mass., Mrs. Daniel Hagan of Carlos, Minn., and Miss Catherine A. Wrinn of Lawrence; three brothers, John H. Wrinn of Boston, Mass., William F. Wrinn of New York city and Charles A. Wrinn of Lawrence.

After having acted as chief cook, George Kelly, in full chef's regalia, told of his experiences in visiting some of the finer European Kitchens during a trip there two years ago. Grace Riely then rendered one of her famous solos followed by Chester Clark and Arthur Wells relating their experiences while viewing this past winter's Olympic Games in Germany. Harold Wells concluded this portion of the evening with his renowned tap dance.

Adjourning to Salisbury Beach, everyone rolled through two hours of roller coaster rides and all the other entertainment furnished there. The evening was brought to an end back in Hampton at the Enewall Cottage on "F" street.

SURVIVAL OF THE UNFITTEST

Extract from an article by Channing Pollock in the Aug. issue of *The American Mercury*

When you tell the people who have achieved what we tell Babe Ruth that he mustn't go on achieving it—when we tell Babe Ruth that he mustn't bat any harder than the bush leaguers, and Jim Braddock that he mustn't hit any harder than I can, and both of them that they must proceed under rules designed to regulate athletics in a home for cripples, then—whoever does it, however, wherever—the pennant is lost and the count is up.

You can and should tell Jim Braddock not to hit in the clinches. You can and should enact laws to restrain the dishonest and predatory. You can and should urge and educate the backward to effect better ethics and greater efficiency. But when a labor union or a legislature, for whatever reason orders that no more than so many bricks shall be laid in a day, that employers shall choose not the best typesetter but one who has been longest out of a job, that no one shall work more than so many hours a week and all at the same wages, and that no man shall cultivate more than so many acres, or raise more than so many hogs or potatoes, and that you and I shall pay him, not for what he does do but for what he does not do, then that union or legislature is reducing us to our lowest common denominator of laziness, thriftlessness and incompetence.

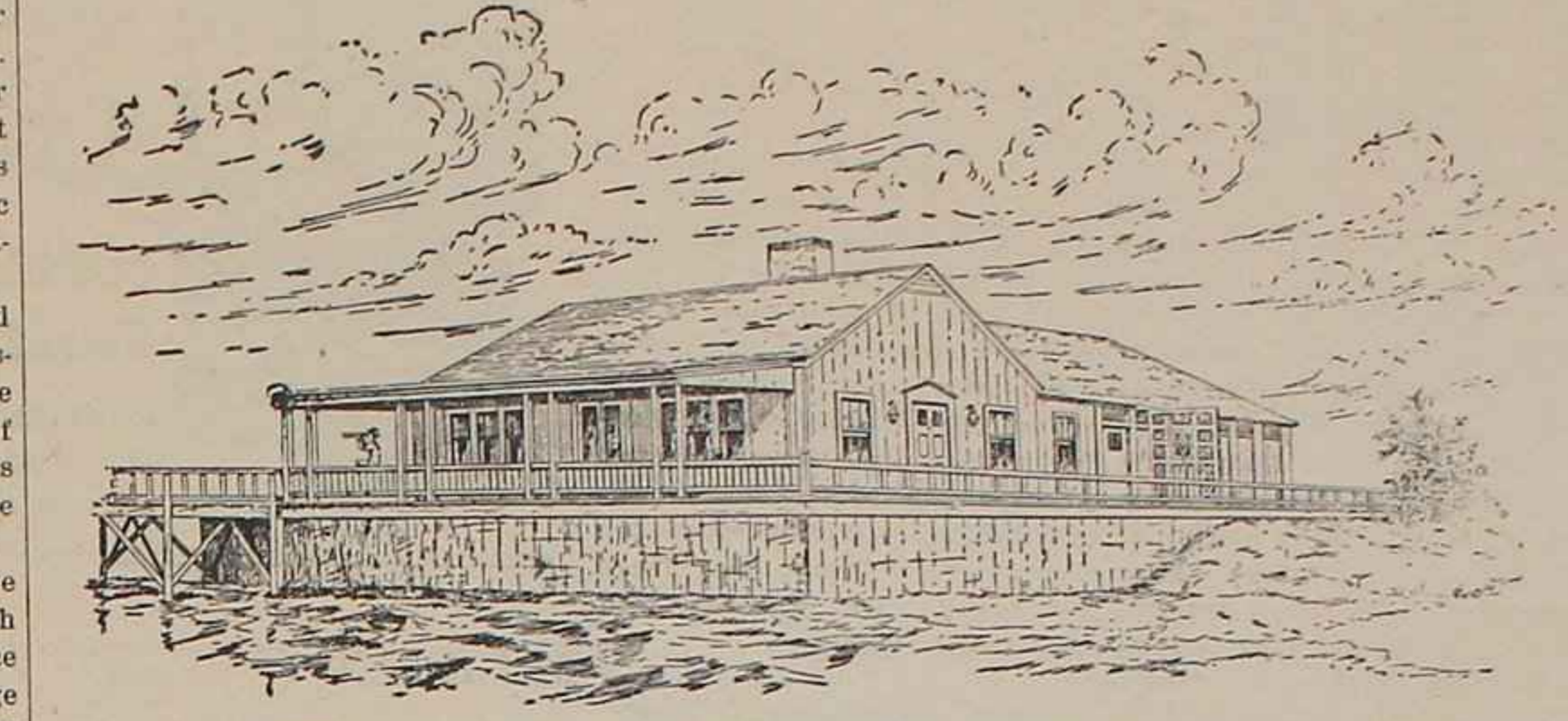

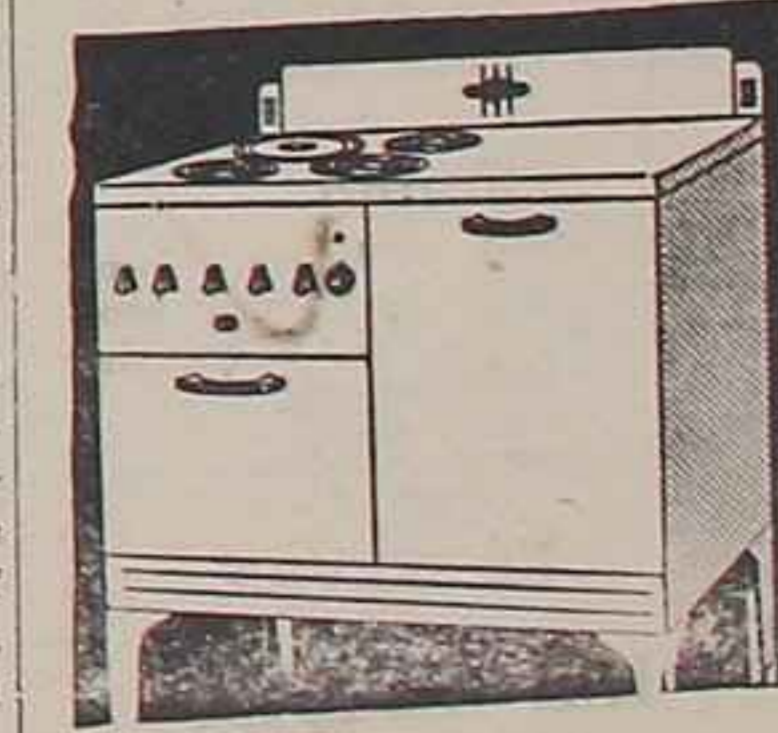

cheon and a speaking engagement
in Laconia made it necessary for
him to depart early.
Two sound cars with amplifiers
made it possible for the thousands
of listeners to hear the disting-

**Boy Of 17 Breaks His
Back Diving From
New Dock At Island**

Little hope is held for the recov-
ery of Martin E. Giggey, 17, 11 Ab-
bott street, Watertown, who was
critically injured Sunday afternoon
when he dove from the railing of
the state pier into two feet of water
in the Hampton harbor.

With a broken back and total
paralysis from the armpits down,
the recent graduate from the Wat-
ertown High school was operated
on Tuesday morning at the Massa-
chusetts General hospital in Boston
Mass. At that time his family did
not expect that he would live more
than 24 hours.

The youth was in swimming with
his 12-year old brother, Frederick
