### NEWSPAPER HONESTY

"Many factors enter into the making of a newspaper, whether it be large or small, and the excellence of the finished product naturally depends to a large extent upon the opportunities which its field offers to the editor and publisher.

"But there is one fundamental quality which is important to every newspaper, regardless of its size, and that is honesty of expression. Commenting on this point some time ago, the Montgomery (Ala.) Advertiser said: 'What counts in judging the character of a newspaper is whether it reasons with intellectual honesty in arriving at its conclusions or makes an appeal to prejudices and emotions in order to influence the reading public to accept its opinions.'

"We may add that every editor frequently faces the necessity of making a decision on this very point. It is easier to tell the reader what he wants to hear, to take the popular side, to run with the pack. But it takes courage sometimes to express an opinion, however sound in opposition to the prevailing sentiment.

"But in such a case, no editor worthy of his responsible calling ever hesitates. He gives his honest opinions, regardless of who agrees or disagrees with them."

Thus speaks the Toccoa, Georgia, Record. The editorial might well have been addressed to many politicians who do not seem to have the high ideals of the average newspaper editor.

### Waterway Hearing Anxiously Awaited By Many Interested

The postponement of the hearing on the Waterway between the Merrimac and Hampton and Hampton rivers had been anticipated by some of the Hampton folks who are interested in the project but are doubtful if the tentative date of Sept. 2nd, sees the meeting. These people are hopeful for the project but say that it will be necessary for the folks of this whole section to show a decided interest if the thing is to be carried through. They believe that the proposed canal would revive small boats on the Merrimac and through the waters adjacent to the canal. In the '90's Haverhill had a large fleet of sail boats which covered many miles of sailing trips. Just Newburyport was host to a fleet of 125 visiting yachts and over 500 yachtsmen. The river was navigable in those days and the harbor easier to enter. If the proposed waterway was put through and the river mouth dredged, it is believed that more than two hundred small boats would be registered with Newburyport or Hampton as home ports and that the 500 or more mark of visiting boatmen would be a frequent thing. Naturally today, the proportion of power boats over sail boats would be large. While from the point of boats carrying commercial cargoes, no one to day would dare prophesy much, the history of the Merrimac river shows continuous cycles of revivals of freight traffic. Whenever the demand is created, a type of shallow draft cargo and passenger boats of considerable speed and low operating cost will be produced to meet it. The tremendous increase in the call for power boats the past two years is an indication that the lure of the water is again active. At Hampton which in years gone by boasted several ship building plants, plans are being made to start boat building the coming winter. It is a poor day that a hundred people do not embark from the Hampton Harbor landings and many days there are 500 or more. It is not unlikely that the New Hampshire representatives will seek to have the waterway prolonged by way of Exeter to Great Bay thus connecting Portsmouth with Newburyport by the inland water route.

## The SNAPSHOT GUILD DO'S AND DON'TS



Give your camera half a chance and you'll get good snapshots.

IT'S really quite surprising the number of amateurs who go merrily along snapping pictures without giving any thought as to why their snapshots appear somewhat smudgy or cloudy.

If your snapshots can be classed with the above the chances are the trouble can be attributed to your own neglect and not to faulty construction of the camera.

A dirty lens, for example, will cause smudgy prints. A lens is the eye of your camera. Can you see clearly if your glasses are smudged by finger prints?

Cleaning a lens is a very simple operation. All you need is a soft, unattached linen handkerchief and perhaps a match or pencil, if the lens is quite small. The rear surface of the lens can easily be reached by removing the back of the camera.

If the camera has a double lens (one behind and one in front of the shutter diaphragm), the front combination may be removed by turning to the left, which will allow you to work through the shutter opening when set for "time," with the handkerchief over the end of the match or lead pencil. If the lens is quite dirty breathe on it and then rub quickly with the handkerchief. Be sure, when replacing the front lens, to screw it back into the shutter as far as it will go.

The suggestion to work through the shutter opening also applies to cleaning the front surface of single lenses fitted to box cameras and certain folding models. Work carefully and don't exert too much pressure.

Amateur snapshotting is really anything but difficult and it is quite safe to say that the majority of picture failures are the result of carelessness or lack of thought on the part of the snapshotter.
