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Speed-The Great Killer

During recent years a number of states have adopted the "basic rule" speed law—a measure whereby no fixed maximum highway speed is prescribed, but drivers are required to operate their vehicles with due care. Today in many of those states motor vehicle officials are coming to the view that the basic rule has failed, and that a fixed speed law, rigidly enforced, is necessary to the prevention of accidents.

So the motorist has failed in his responsibility under a law which gave the individual wide leeway in his driving habits. Speed is still the great highway killer, breeding more violent deaths than any other driving error. It is a harsh commentary on drivers that the bulk of fatal automobile accidents occur on first class, straight highways, under good weather and visibility conditions, and involve cars in passable mechanical condition. Speed—the insane instinct to "open her up"—is the answer.

It is apparent that the automobile death and injury rate will continue to climb until all states cooperate to modernize their traffic codes in the light of modern conditions. Appeals to the motorists' instincts of self-preservation and public responsibility, have produced some results—but much more must be done. Speeds must be reduced. And the offending

It sometimes requires a rather foolish argument to bring into our minds the actual wealth, comfort and security of the American industrial employee. Therefore, if it were not for the man who points to the doughnut and complains: "But look, there is a hole in it," the thought would never occur of many of us that the doughnut, itself, was there.

The industrial employee in America has a doughnut—a large one well seasoned with years of civil progress. Its main ingredients are three things: the highest wage, the shortest working hours and the highest standard of living in the entire world.

And every day industrial research laboratories are experimenting with new means to enhance those standards—to enlarge the doughnut and sweeten it. How foolish, then, is the cry of the labor agitator that the doughnut has a hole. That man has never tasted it and cries in hysterical self pity, envious of those who have.

Typical of the sentiment of those who have, on the other hand was a steel worker recently interviewed by a New York Times writer who sought the workers' view of the labor situation. The man, a steel company worker, declared:

"I don't think you'll find much dissatisfaction here. I've been with the company for 33 years—started when I was 11, and there are plenty more like me. There is not anyone who can't be heard at the front office if he wants to. We're not overworked and we get good pay."

Walker, Dr. Edward J. O'Brien, Jr. of Commonwealth avenue, Boston, was secured who pronounced the man dead.

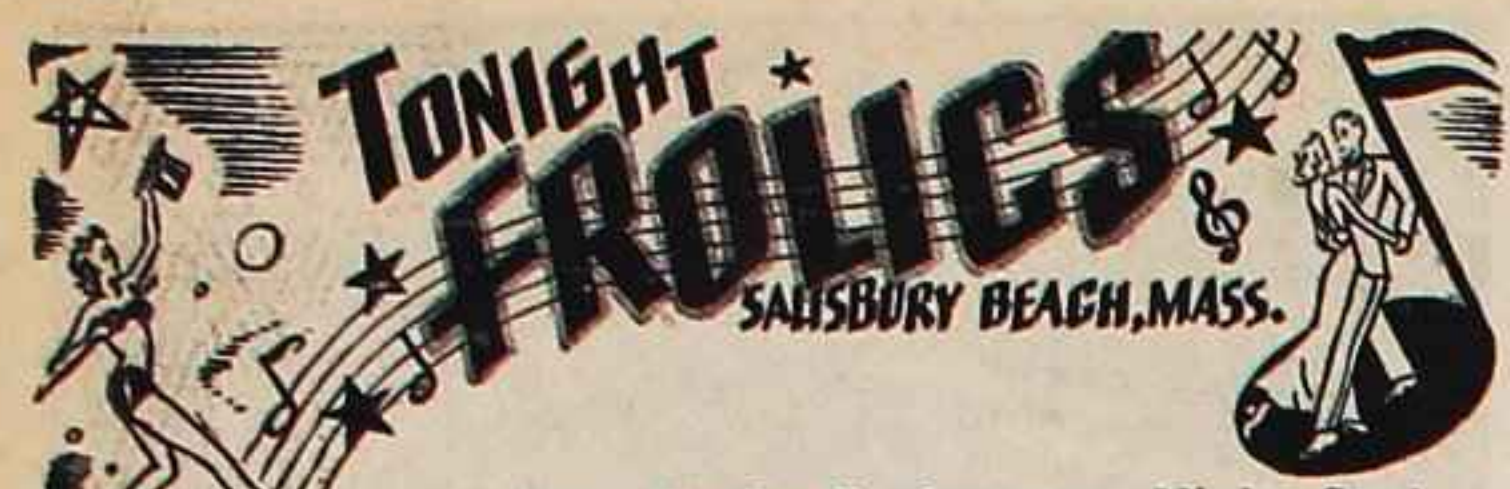
