

Hampton Problems These problems he described as

follows: 1-Immediate construction of permanent seawall from Boar's Head to Haverhill Avenue.

2-The adoption of whatever remedies may be presented by the investigating engineers to reverse, if possible, the natural processes of erosion which are now depleting the area * * * of sand, and bring about the process of accretion. 3-The covering of the main

beach with soft sand between the east sidewalk and the highest summer high-tide mark, wherever an over-abundance of rocks make such a covering necessary.

4-Immediate construction of temporary boardwalks to replace the cement sidewalks destroyed by the recent storm.

5- The building of parking areas on marshland west of Marsh Avenue in the rear of the business sec-

6-Improvement of the entire area west of the proposed new seawall, including the proposed 20foot boardwalk adjacent to the wall, the building of commons, playstands and seating areas between the walk and the main travelled section of the boulevard, and the



\$5,500 To Water Consumers Admiral Wainwright

Presenting a final order in a rate controversy that started more than 20 years ago, the Public Service Commission on Friday directed the Hampton Water Works Co., to put into effect reductions that will amount in the course of a year to about \$5,500.

Water must be furnished for all purposes except fire protection

Using a % meter as a basis, the during a year will be \$12, and other rates include the following: .000 cubic feet, 35 cents per cubic feet; next 43,500 feet, cents per 100 cubic feet; over 000 cubic feet, 15 cents per 100 bic feet. For meters exceeding % inches, the rates for 100 cubic feet, a year, will range up to 247,00 for the four-inch size.

Where two or more customers are served through one service pipe and one meter, charges for the first 500 cubic feet will be re duced except for the customer


