Seacoast Region Doing Its Share

The seacoast region of New Hampshire is doing its part to aid the federal government's national defense program.

When federal agents get to work in their study of a list of industrial facilities in the country a study now in progress, they will find all available information right at hand as a result of work on the part of the committees of the Seacoast Regional Development association.

These two groups already have published brochures presenting an industrial picture in Portsmouth and Newmarket and a study of the Dover situation is also soon.

These committees are industrial development, Forrest M. Eddy, chairman, and industrial research, Frank W. Randall, chairman.

These will give federal agents a clear picture of available industrial space, condition of factories, potential defense value of existing industries, supply of skilled labor and other information.

The group also is co-operating in the same manner with the defense council formed by Governor Francis P. Murphy. An offer of assistance to Governor Murphy brought a reply in which he expressed his appreciation which he is pressing the matter over to Brigadier General Bowen, head of N. H. defense activity.

Value of the local endeavor is indicated by the fact that when Massachusetts' Defense Council met at the State House in Boston the N. H. Seacoast Regional Defense Council was presented as an example to be followed by organizations in the State.

Stricken Man Dies Entering Hospital

Paul Cote of Seabrook, died of heart failure Sunday night while being hushed to the Exeter hospital. Mrs. Ruby Patterson, R. N., in charge of the Hampton Beach comfort station, noted the weakened condition of the man after he had walked into the Chamber of Commerce office complaining he felt ill.

Mrs. Patterson requested the aid of the Hampton Fire department and Deputy Chief Perley R. George, Bernard Felch, a fireman, and life guard Philip Melody rushed Cote to the hospital, but he died as the automobile entered the hospital yard in Exeter. Mr. Cote and his wife had been spending the day at Hampton Beach.

During the day there were the usual cases of fainting and sunburn treated at the comfort station. About 5:50 firemen were called out to extinguish a fire in the plankings at the Mile Long bridge over Hampton river which was supposed

Jams, jellies and New Hampshire grown herbs will also be on sale. This annual reunion of fellow craftsmen creates a nucleus where new ideas are exchanged and merged into workable plans for sustaining and furthering the use of handicrafts. Each article sold or sponsored by the League of New Hampshire Arts and Crafts must pass examination by a jury retained for the purpose of maintaining the highest quality of workmanship combined with the constant use of finer materials and simplified designs.

Visitors come from all directions not only to see, admire and acquire this handmade merchandise, but also to avail themselves of the yearly opportunity to meet and personally question the artisans. Special features, lectures and musical programs are arranged for each day, luncheon and tea will be available, and for those who prefer, picnic spots are easily accessible. Plenty of parking space will be provided. Mrs. J. Randolph Coolidge, founder and president of the League and her Fair Committee, in cooperation with the Reverend Edric Amory Weld and Mrs. Weld of Holderness School, will be on hand to welcome visitors to what promises to be the finest craftsmen's Fair that the League has yet conducted.

THE DOCTOR Tells the Story

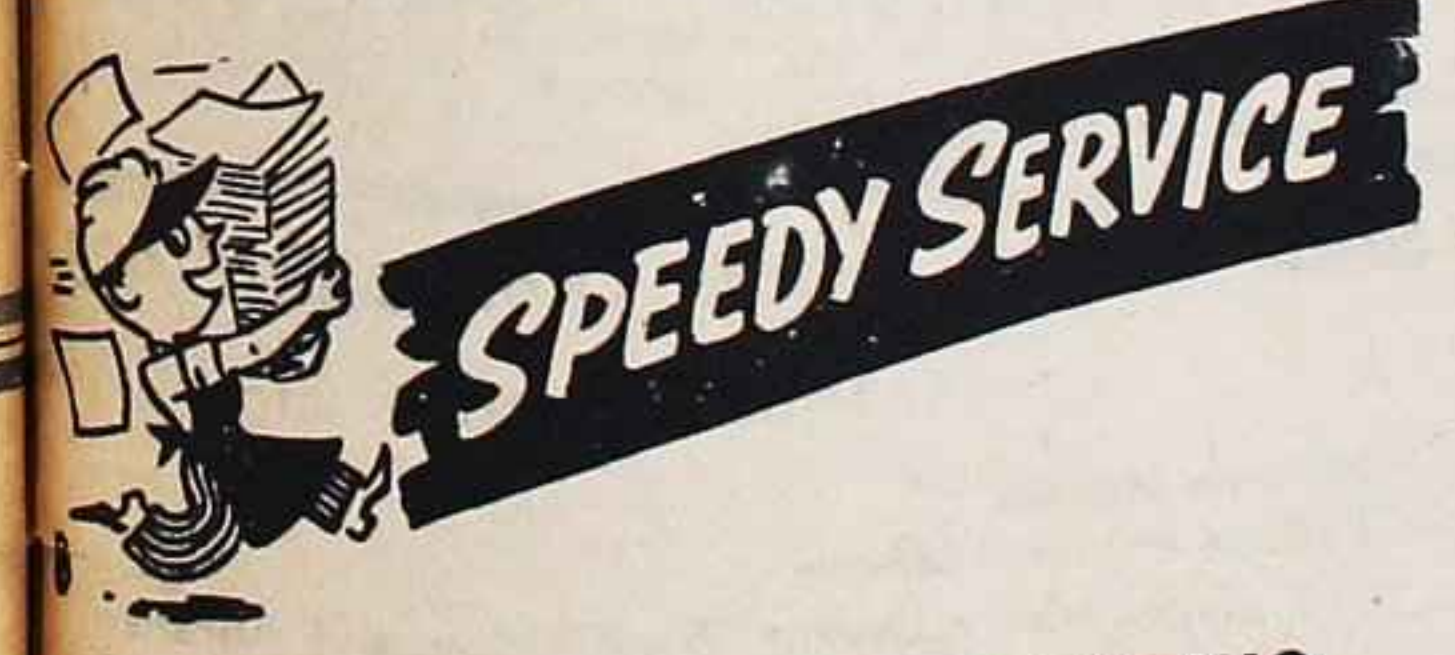

MEDIAEVAL DOCTORS
The ignorance of the men in the Middle Ages who undertook to practice medicine was truly colossal. But they had a sense of showmanship that was supreme. They adopted peculiar dress, carried themselves with an air of deep mystery, had their offices filled with snake skins, stuffed frogs, bats, dried alligators, walrus tusks and other bizarre creatures brought to them by sailors who had the temerity to sail the seven seas and penetrate foreign lands.

In addition to these they also displayed copper retorts, glass test tubes and beakers and laboratory equipment, the uses of which they were ignorant, but these materials gave their offices what we now call "atmosphere." Many of these men had their own gardens in which they cultivated herbs, plants and vines, later to be made into medicines.

Naturally there were those among them who had brains and they stumbled across helpful treatments and useful remedies. They, too, developed some surgical knowledge, but most of them were so saturated with false theories and superstitions handed down from the Dark Ages that they accomplished little of benefit to the human race.
These doctors were entirely too "high-hat" to touch a wounded or sick man with their fingers, but with the magic wand with which they were equipped, indicated the place on the victim's body where the barber—for barbers were the first surgeons—should cut. Of course few recovered because these tonsorial artists had less education

than the doctors. They knew nothing of the circulation of the blood, the action of the heart, had never heard of germs or bacteria, and were far more superstitious than the doctors, who had at least attended some university and possessed degrees.

Armies then had no surgeons. The various Crusades into the Holy Land had no medical attendants in their ranks. The wounded and the sick were left to themselves to get well as best they could and the pathway of these large bodies of soldiers were marked by the lame, the halt and the maimed.

This custom of sucking wounds still exists in many countries. In India, native corn doctors, apply one end of a ham's horn to the corn, and their mouth to the other end and withdraw the offending bit of callous flesh from toes. Today, when no other means are convenient, snake bites are often sucked to remove poison injected into the victim by the reptile and contrary to popular opinion, snake venom thus introduced into the mouth seems never to effect the system of the one withdrawing the poison.

He served his country at the Peace Conference in 1919 as an expert on Arab affairs and as technical adviser to the American section of the International Commission on mandates in Turkey. From 1920 through 1923 he was in the export and import business in Egypt, Alexandria and Port Said, acting also as representative of the Associated Press and as Vice President of the American Chamber of Commerce of Egypt. From 1924 to 1928 he engaged in poultry farming over in Sandown and since 1928 has been a member of the faculty at the University of New Hampshire.
