Public Schools To Open September 4

The schools of the towns of Newington, Rye, North Hampton, Hampton, Hampton Falls and Seabrook will open on the Wednesday following Labor Day. The yearly calendar follows:

School year begins Wednesday, September 4, 1940, and ends December 20, 1940, with a vacation from November 9 to 17.

Second term begins December 30, 1940, and ends, February 21, 1941.

Third term begins March 3, 1941, and ends April 18, 1941.

Fourth term begins April 28, 1941, and school year ends June 13, 1941.

The following holidays will be observed: November 28 and 29, January 1, May 30, State Teachers Convention, The County Teachers Institute.

The rules regulating the admission of children to the Hampton schools follow:

1. A child is permitted to enter the first grade in September provided such child will be six years of age before January 1. of the year following.
2. A child who will become six

years of age in January or February following may be admitted in September provided the child shall first take and pass a test given by the Superintendent of Schools.

The examination provided for by the above ruling will be given all children applying therefor on Wednesday, August 28 at 2:30 p. m. and August 31 at 2:30 p. m.

The examination will be given at the office of the superintendent of schools on High Street.

Reports Show Good Hunting In New Hampshire This Fall

Ralph G. Carpenter, 2nd, Director of the New Hampshire Fish and Game department today made the announcement that from all reports received thus far, the hunting conditions in New Hampshire this fall should compare favorably with those that were enjoyed by so many sportsmen last year.

According to the reports being received each day from Conservation Officers in all sections of the state, both the woodcock and the ruffed grouse appear to have had a very good nesting season, despite adverse weather conditions, and sizeable broods of young birds of both species are now being observed.

Pheasants Being Stocked. Maintaining a policy that was inaugurated several years ago, that of stocking pheasants in the late summer and early fall, the department has commenced liberating pheasants throughout southern and central New Hampshire.

Spofford lake in Chesterfield, and Forest lake in Winchester, have recently given up two very fine specimens of bass. Frank Place of Hartford, Connecticut caught an 8-pound large-mouthed bass in Spotford lake and Herbert Narramore of Winchester, N. H. caught an 8 1/2-pounder measured 24 inches in length and had a girth of 18 inches.

Reports indicate that though the enthusiasm of most fishermen has lessened considerably in recent weeks, there are still numerous anglers who are reporting very good luck. Horned pout, pickerel, bass and trout fishing continues to be good in many sections and one's chances of success are considerably better now than they were previously due to the few sportsmen now following the sport.

Again this year, the pheasants are being banded either with a wing band or with a bright red leg band. Sportsmen are requested to look over the birds that they kill very carefully to determine whether or not it is a banded bird and if it is, the band together with information relative to the date it was killed and the locality in which it was shot should be sent to the office of the Fish and Game department.

The purpose of banding the pheasants liberated each year is to study the migrations of these birds over a period of time. The data which was compiled at the time the birds were released is compared with that given by the sportsmen when they return the bands to the department and proves very helpful to the department officials in carrying on the pheasant program.

The Fish and Game department is also carrying forward its work with the Chukar partridge. One hundred of these birds, in flocks of from 10 to 20 birds, have been liberated in Belknap and Carroll counties. The size of the flock in each instance being determined by the cover and food available. There is no open season on the Chukar at the present time, but it is an endeavor on the part of the department to introduce a new species of game bird for the sportsmen. Several reports have been received indicating that some of the birds released in 1939 nested this spring.

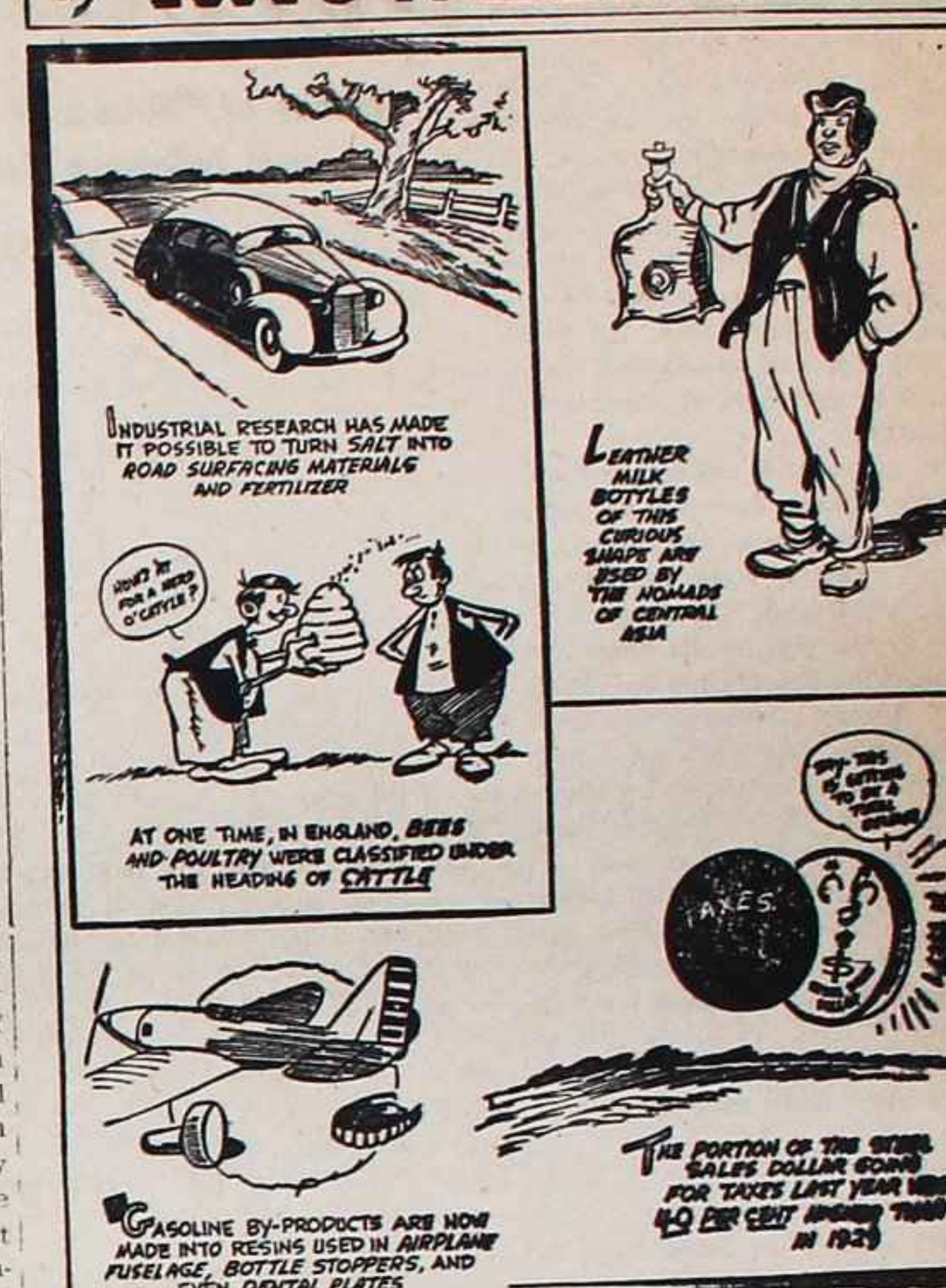

She inquired of Precinct Commissioner Armas Guyon, a familiar figure around Boar's Head, who left his work immediately to aid the victim until the arrival of the doctor.

For over two hours Commissioner Guyon worked over Mr. Fitzgerald until he was completely revived. Now Armas says he's a contractor by trade, but Mr. Fitzgerald calls him "Doc" and told us: "It certainly is a wonderful thing for a man as busy as Mr. Guyon to leave his work and help a man who is a total stranger to him." And we agree.

Commissioners Held Parley At Beach Friday

County commissioners of New Hampshire held a closed parley at the Hotel Ashworth Friday afternoon to discuss a new agreement to be made with the federal government for the distribution of federal commodities throughout the state.

John Gadd of Plymouth, president of the state association was authorized by commissioners from all but Coos and Cheshire counties to execute the new agreement demanded by the government in regard to the cost of distributing surplus commodities. The new agreement will not abrogate the previous agreement made last May in which distribution costs were to be handled through Miss Abbie Wilder, but it will supplement that agreement.

There was considerable discussion among the commissioners over details of the new agreement before the vote was taken. Joseph Hurley of Tilton, chairman of the Hillsborough commission, spoke on the distribution of surplus milk from the three New England centers of Manchester, Boston, Mass., and Hartford, Conn.

Other speakers included Commissioners G. Carroll Cilley of Concord, Howard S. Putnam of Claremont, Alvin E. Foss of East Kingstown, Edward W. Belanger of Rochester, Oliver Barney of Laconia.

Refugee Children Forget Terror Of War At Rye Beach

Just a week ago that life belt was no hummer toy. It was grim guardian against the dangers of submarine monsters and whining bombers, as the convoyed SS Samaria slid swiftly through enemy-infested waters.

For the youngster, Justin Lowinsky and his 15-year-old sister Clare, these are merely incidents in a childhood world that suddenly went topsy-turvy when a man with a funny little mustache in another land started a world conquest.

But to residents of Portsmouth and vicinity, Justin and Clare are significant as the first of the English refugee children to arrive in this section and to Mr. and Mrs. Paul H. Bonner of Rye Center they are significant not only as an addition their family of four boys, but as a friendship of years ago repaid.

In the day and a half since they have been here the youngsters have already crowded memories of air raid shelters, home defense guards, a dark night in Liverpool with the
