Waken by the loud ringing of the phone in the early hours, the battalion doctor sleepily picked up the receiver and grunted into it:

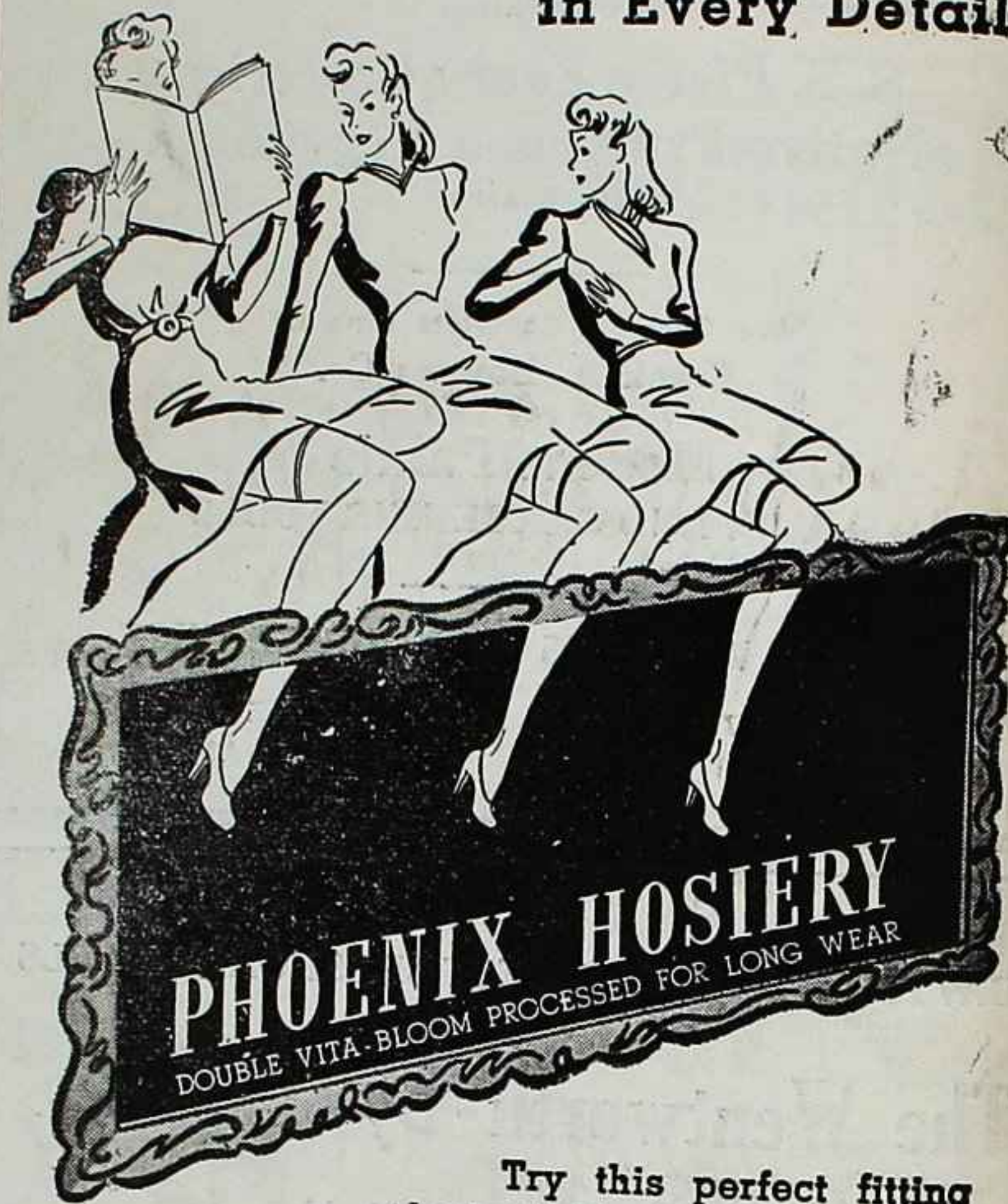
"Yes, what d'you want?"

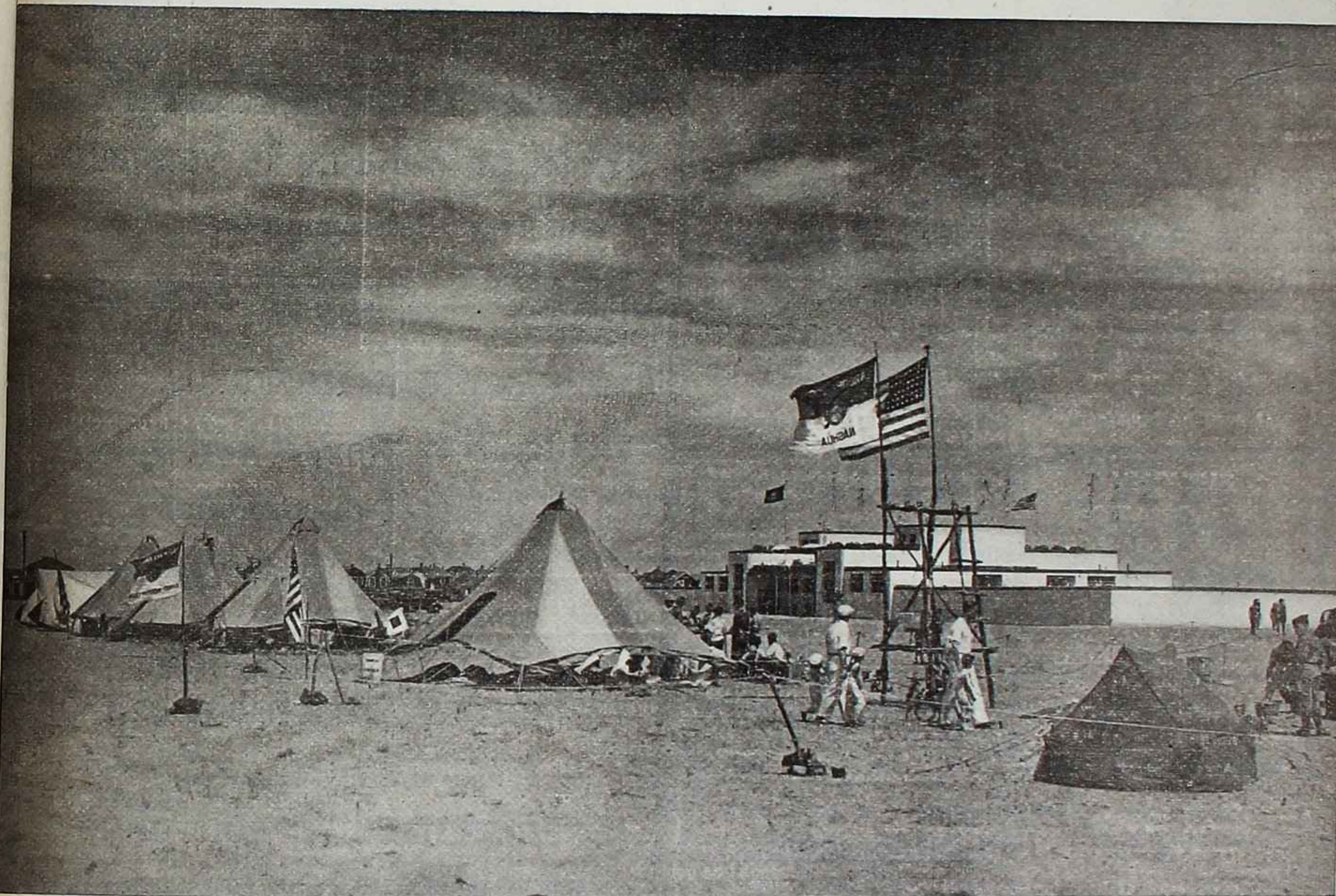

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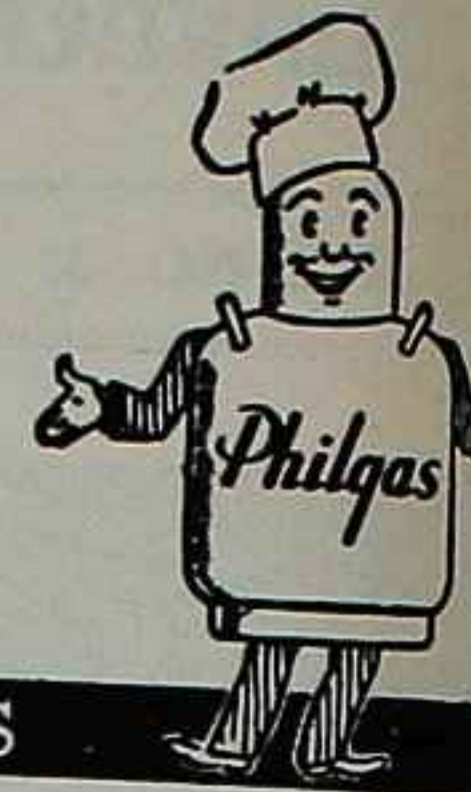

**Report New Law  
Will Aid Coastal  
Clam Industry**

That there has been an improvement shown in the New Hampshire clam industry even in the brief time that has elapsed since the state began a more definite supervision was revealed by Herbert E. Warfel, biologist for the state Fish and Game Department.

Although the first clam law in the history of the state, which went into effect on July 1, "has not been meeting with too much favorable reaction in some sections of the seacoast," he said, there are some clambers who are now earning as high as \$20 a day through the opening up to them of new areas in the vicinity of Rye Beach. In five years the results of the new law will be much more apparent in the increased number of diggers working for more adequate wages than at present, he predicted.

The fact that the law excludes all out of state residents, even though they own property at Seabrook, is a disappointment.

**Former Beach Vacationist Writes Of Washington Life**

Washington, D. C. Sat., July 5, 1941.

Greetings to all my friends at Hampton Beach, N. H. Just because I am living down here now is no reason why my mind shouldn't wander up there to Happy Hampton. My folks sent me a recent Advocate, and I just had to write after that. I assure you it did me good just to see it. I could almost smell the salt air. I could visualize so many features that I enjoyed for the two past summers. I can truly boast your resort down here, and I assure you I shall.

I have a recent snapshot of your beach on a hot Sunday, crowded with bathers. Also close by is my 1940 Christmas card from the Bill Eliots, a very appropriate picture, indeed, these hot days; of snow their front walks. I gaze at these pictures when the thermometer reads up in the 90's and my temperature returns to normal.

These are exciting days in the seat of our Government; problems of general interest to the nation are being discussed and solved daily, problems that still will make history for generations to come. **Slight Increase In Beach Tax Rate**

Non-resident property owners in Hampton Beach will be taxed at the rate of \$35, an increase of \$1.70 over last year.

The selectmen prevented a greater increase by settling on the valuation of the property of the Hampton Water Supply company. For four years the company has been taxed on an assessment of \$275,000 after the selectmen increased the valuation from \$200,000 because of the claims of the company in the water rate controversy. The company took appeal to court and, rather than be ordered to reimburse the company taxes collected on the high assessment during the past two years, the selectmen dropped the valuation figure to \$200,000 a year.

This helped to boost the abatements made by the selectmen to about \$90,000, which nearly set the \$130,000 gain made in real estate valuation in the year. The total valuation of the town and beach is above six million mark.

The town rate is \$28.50, an increase of \$1.50, but beach property owners also have to pay an additional precinct tax of \$5.50 which is only an increase of 20¢ over last year.

**NEW CLAM LAW —**

brook and Hampton Beaches, from digging on New Hampshire flats has aroused some criticism among summer visitors.

The following rules and regulations have been adopted by the Fish and Game department under authority granted by the statute:

**Non-residents**—No person may take clams unless he is a resident of the state. A non-resident may buy and sell clams but may not take clams. The fee for such non-resident dealer is five dollars.

**Residents**—A resident under the age of sixteen years may take

clams without a license. A resident of the age of sixteen years or over may take clams, for his own consumption, by obtaining a permit and paying a fee of fifteen cents. Under such permit said resident may not take more than one-half bushel of clams in one day. A resident of the age of sixteen years or over may take clams, other than for his own consumption, by obtaining a license and paying a fee of one dollar. If said resident, however, becomes a dealer and buys and sells to the public he must pay a fee of five dollars for his license, which will cover the taking, buying and selling of clams. The fee for any resident dealer is five dollars.

**Expiration Date of Licenses and Permits**—All permits and licenses issued under the provision of section 60, chapter 201, Public Laws, as inserted by chapter 215, Laws of 1941, relative to clams, expire on January first of the year following the issuance thereof, as provided in section 21, chapter 203, Public Laws, as inserted by section 7, chapter 124, Laws 1935.

Town Hall Friday**

Conservation officer Edwin G. Towne of Seabrook announced today that he would be at the Town Hall, Friday evening from 7-9 P. M. to supply residents of the state with clam licenses.

Officer Towne urged all those desiring licenses to procure them at this time, as they are available only through him and cannot be purchased of town officials.

Under the new law governing the taking of salt water clams which went into effect July 1, only legal residents of this state may dig clams and a permit obtained from the Fish and Game department allows the owner to dig clams anywhere in the state he can find them.

Dear old Hampton, I welcome the sight of your shores again!

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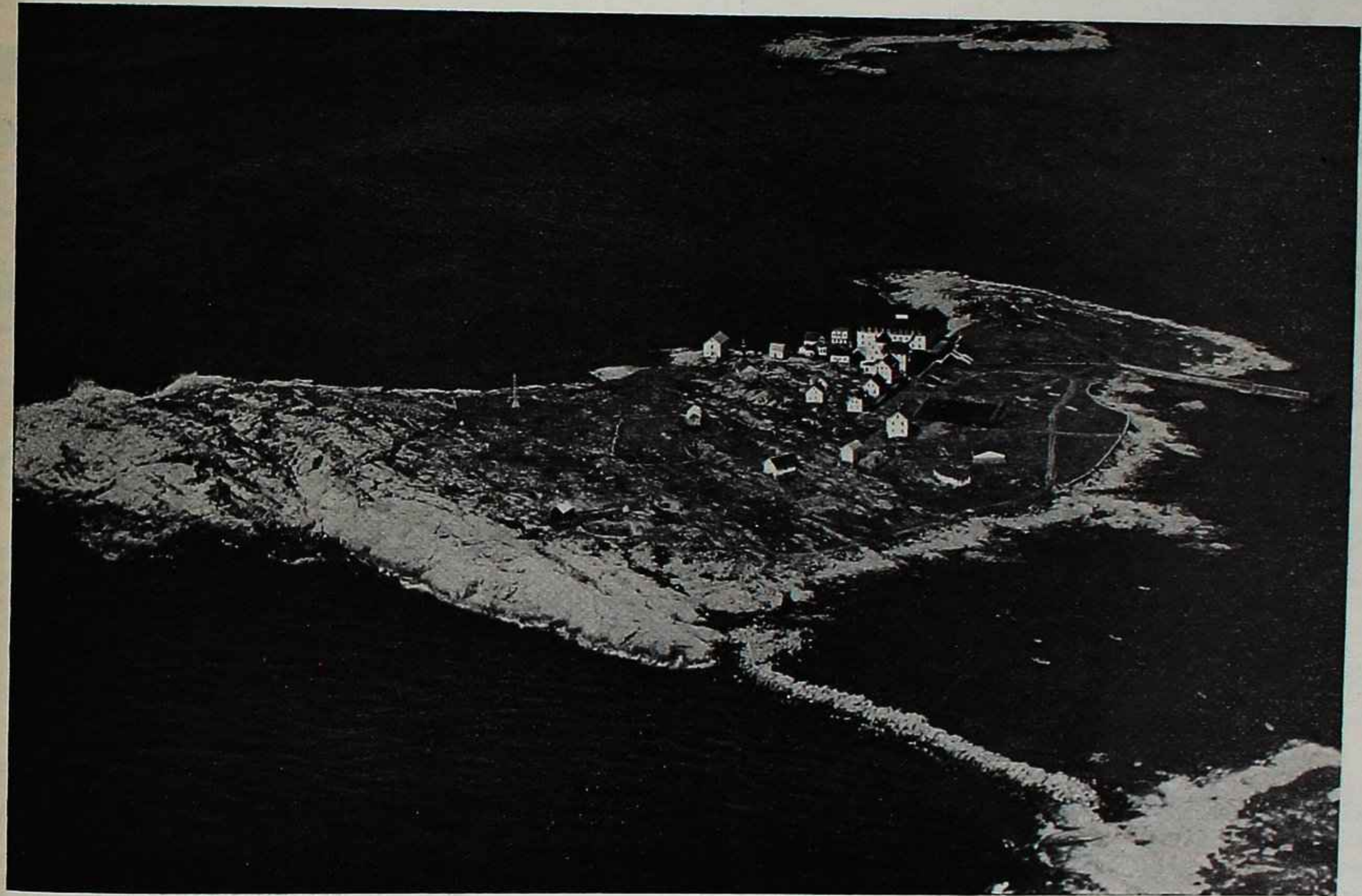
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
