Under the new law governing the taking of salt water clams which went into effect July 1, only legal residents of this state may dig clams and a permit obtained from the Fish and Game department allows the owner to dig clams anywhere in the state he can find them.

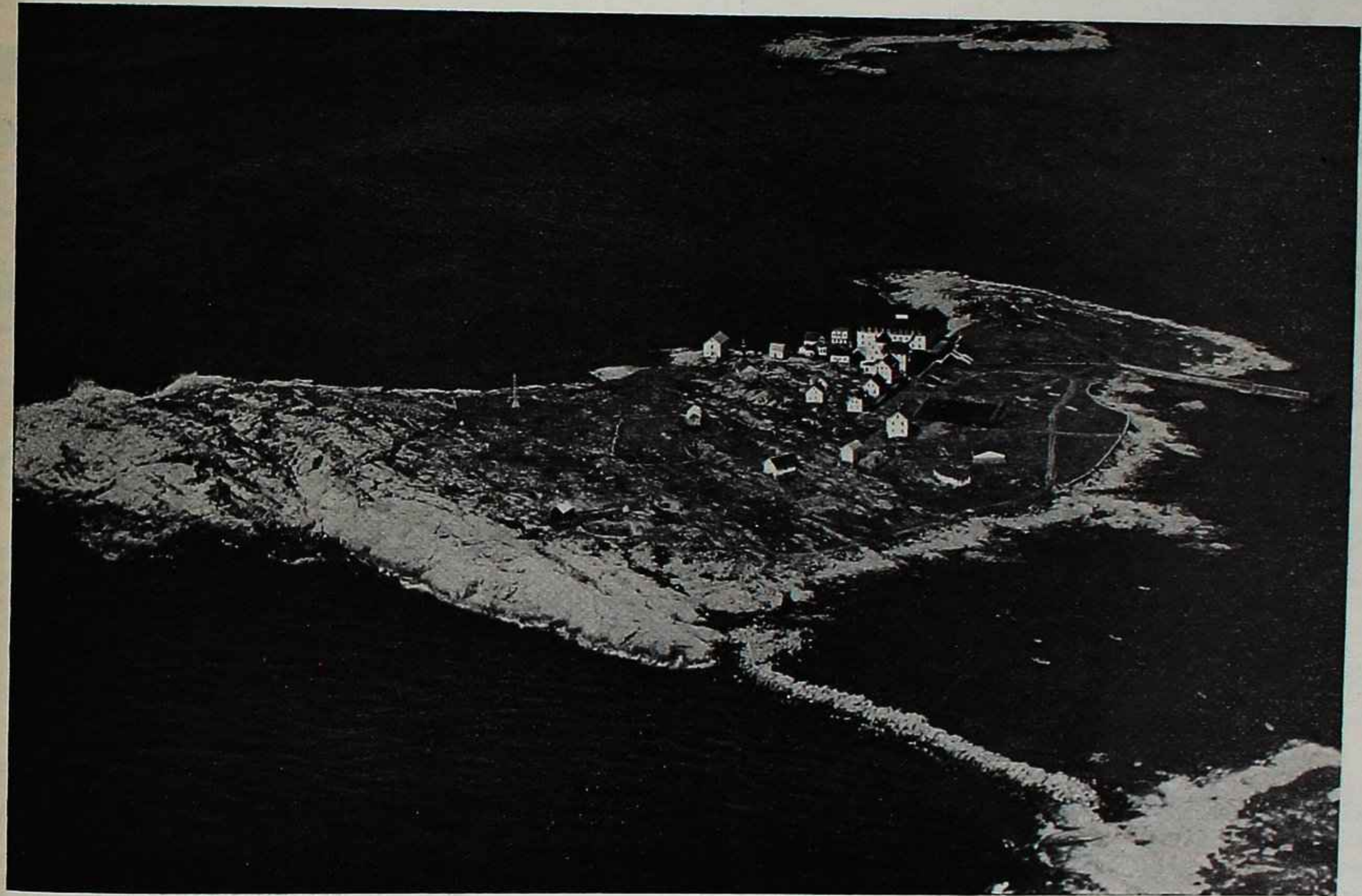

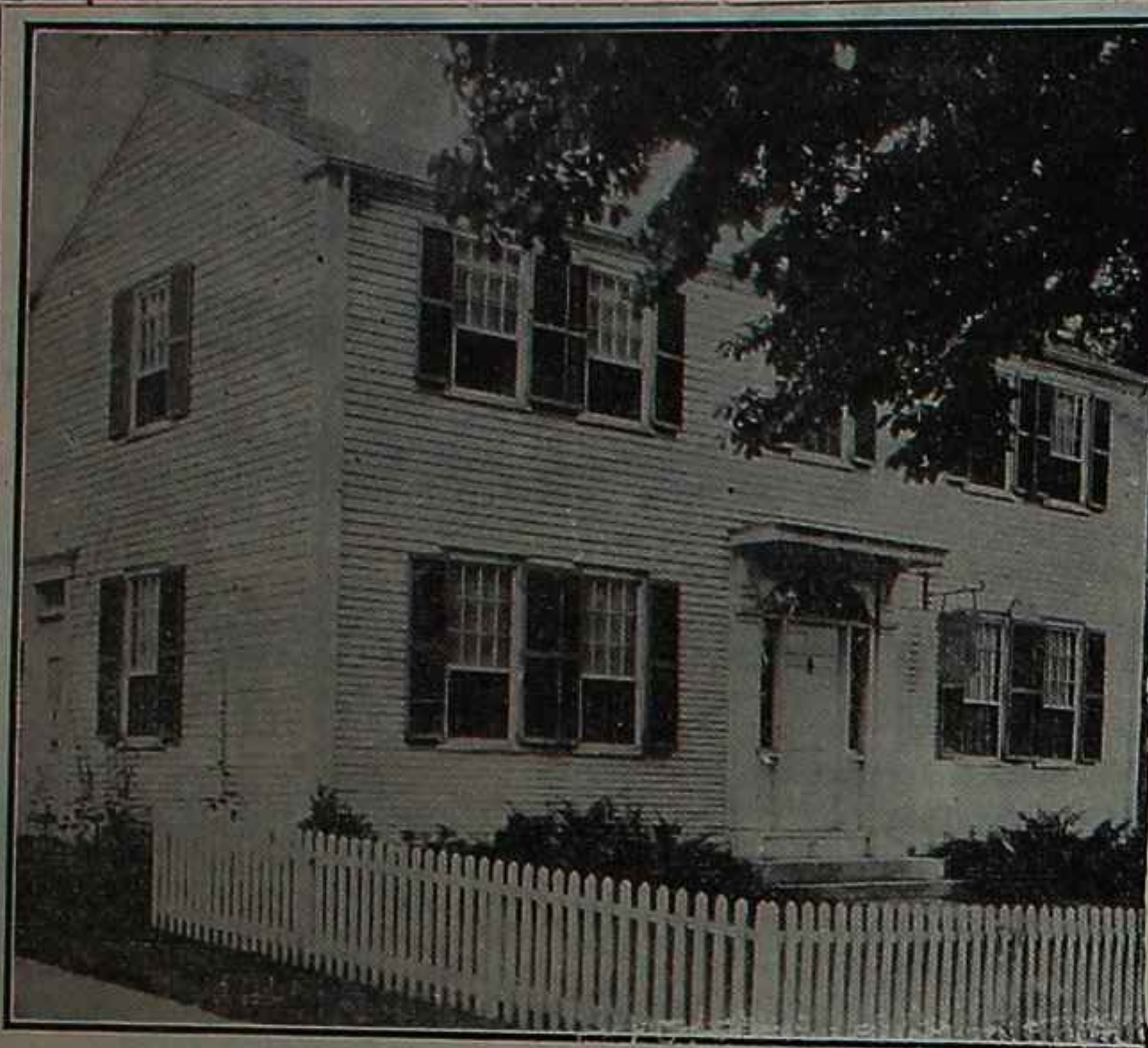

Children's Picnic At Wallis Sands August 14

Annual Parade Circus, Court Of Honor Are Highlights Of Boy Scouts' Ninth 'Funeree'

Scouts from Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Maine climaxed their four-day stay at Camp Ashworth for the ninth annual "Funeree" of the Daniel Webster council with a parade, circus performance, court of honor, campfire ceremony and movies last Friday. Saturday morning the boys broke camp and returned home.

In recognition of his efforts and generosity in making the encampment possible, Col. George "Daddy" Ashworth was presented with a desk standard bearing a pair of miniature American and Boy Scout flags. John W. Hopley of Portsmouth, general chairman and master of ceremonies for the parade, made the presentation on the band stand before the massed Scouts and spectators on behalf of the entire council. Dr. Arthur A. Blondin of Manchester, president of the council, also paid high tribute to Colonel Ashworth.

Scouts Aid Defense

The work of the Scouts this week in the collecting of aluminum for defense was outlined by Chairman Hopley. He also told of other defense work undertaken by the Scouts and explained that many of the Scouts over 16 years were unable to participate in the parade because they have become absorbed in defense production.

Carl A. Thunberg of Manchester, acting Scout executive of the council, led the massed Scouts in the Scout law and the oath of allegiance to the flag. The parade was reviewed by William T. Call of Manchester, Scout commissioner, and Fred Clark of Manchester, field Scout executive.

The highest honor of scouting was bestowed upon four Scouts of Troop 176, Dover, at the court of honor in the evening. Robert Hallisey, Lawrence J. Hughes, Francis Chenevert and Robert Booth, all of whom have served as junior leaders in the troop under Scoutmaster Bernard Paul, were made Eagle Scouts.

There are always youngsters standing at the door of the Fire station at 7 o'clock on the morning of the picnic, waiting for 10:30 or 11 to arrive, so they will not be late. Upon arriving at the beach, the program calls for swimming and bathing until lunch time. Following lunch, there are supervised games for all.

North Hampton Lowers Tax Rate

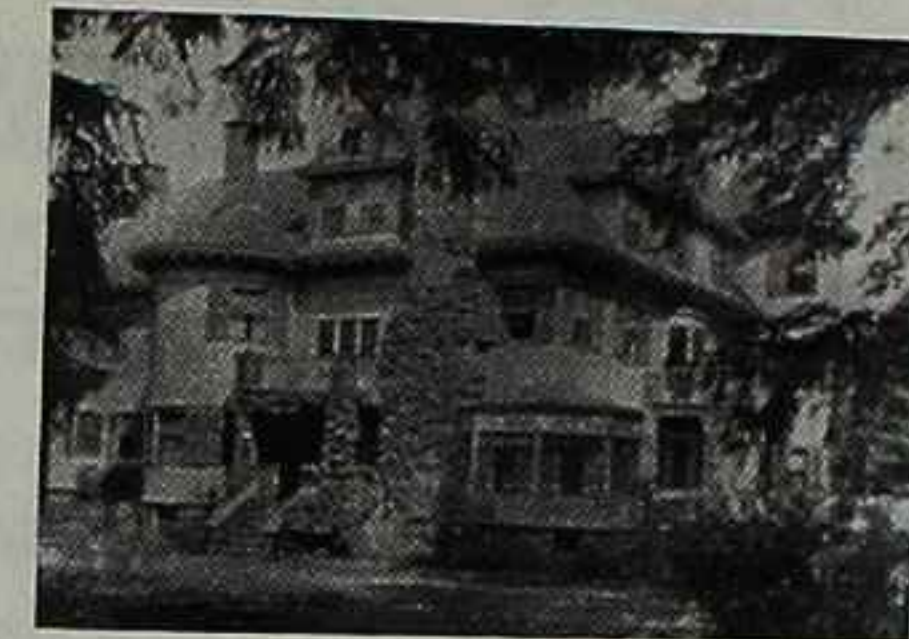
