Clam Licenses At Town Hall Friday

Officer Towne urged all those desiring licenses to procure them at this time, as they are available only through him and cannot be purchased of town officials.

Under the new law governing the taking of salt water clams which went into effect July 1, only legal residents of this state may dig clams and a permit obtained from the Fish and Game department allows the owner to dig clams anywhere in the state he can find them.
