he slipped into a hole in the river (at the south end of the State reservation) between the State Bath house and the jetty while walking with a companion Robert Curran 8, of Lowell, Mass.

Young Curran attempted to save his friend, but had to give up and Frank Moyer, 40, of Lawrence, likewise tried without success to pull Keefe from the hole in the strong river current. Moyer, himself became exhausted and Joseph Schrinenti, USNR, a V-12 student at Tufts college brought him from the water where he was taken to the First Aid station in the Police ambulance.

It was not until Moyer was safely out of the water that the Navy man learned that Keefe was also in the water. He returned and brought i the body after it had been in the river for about twenty minutes.

Chief of Police Jerome F. Harkness, Bernard Felch, Chief George H. Lamott of the Fire Department and Dr. Henry Robbins were called to the scene. Jack Fanning, manager of the State Bath house, assisted by Floyd Gale, policeman and Alfred Gossenlin, deputy sheriff of Raymond worked over the child for three hours with the pullmotor and first aid to bring life back.


