

Bass Reported Running Well In Hampton River

With the New Hampshire fishing season open on all species of small-mouth black bass, "the month of roses" this year becomes top fishing month too. There are a number of factors which are bringing this about.

Late spring weather has delayed the trout fishing; travel has been restricted; with the pre-season stocked trout not yet caught out, a second planting of trout has been completed in waters throughout the state. Moreover, trout are just coming to life, particularly in northern Granite State waters; like the anglers, fish have been held back by cold, wet weather.

Pickereel, perch, hornpout and other pan-fish appear to be more abundant than usual while fishermen have been fewer than in normal times. In the service or defense plants, sportsmen have not been able to do a great deal of ice-fishing during the winter months and this reacts favorably for the pond fishermen now.

Sanborn smiled quietly. "Well, Harold," he replied, pulling an 18½-inch rainbow from his creel, "I did not catch many fish in your pond but I'm pleased with this one, anyhow."

What Secord said then, cannot be quoted.

Salt-water species are coming to life, too. Fishing in Hampton river with Roger Moore last week, the writer and Moore each hit one nice striped bass. Returning the following day, the writer took three fish—top weighing eight pounds; the other two, six and four pounds. Moore operated his outboard motor and pulled in a five pounder meanwhile. Another couple took eight strippers farther up-river. School fish probably will have arrived by the time this is published.

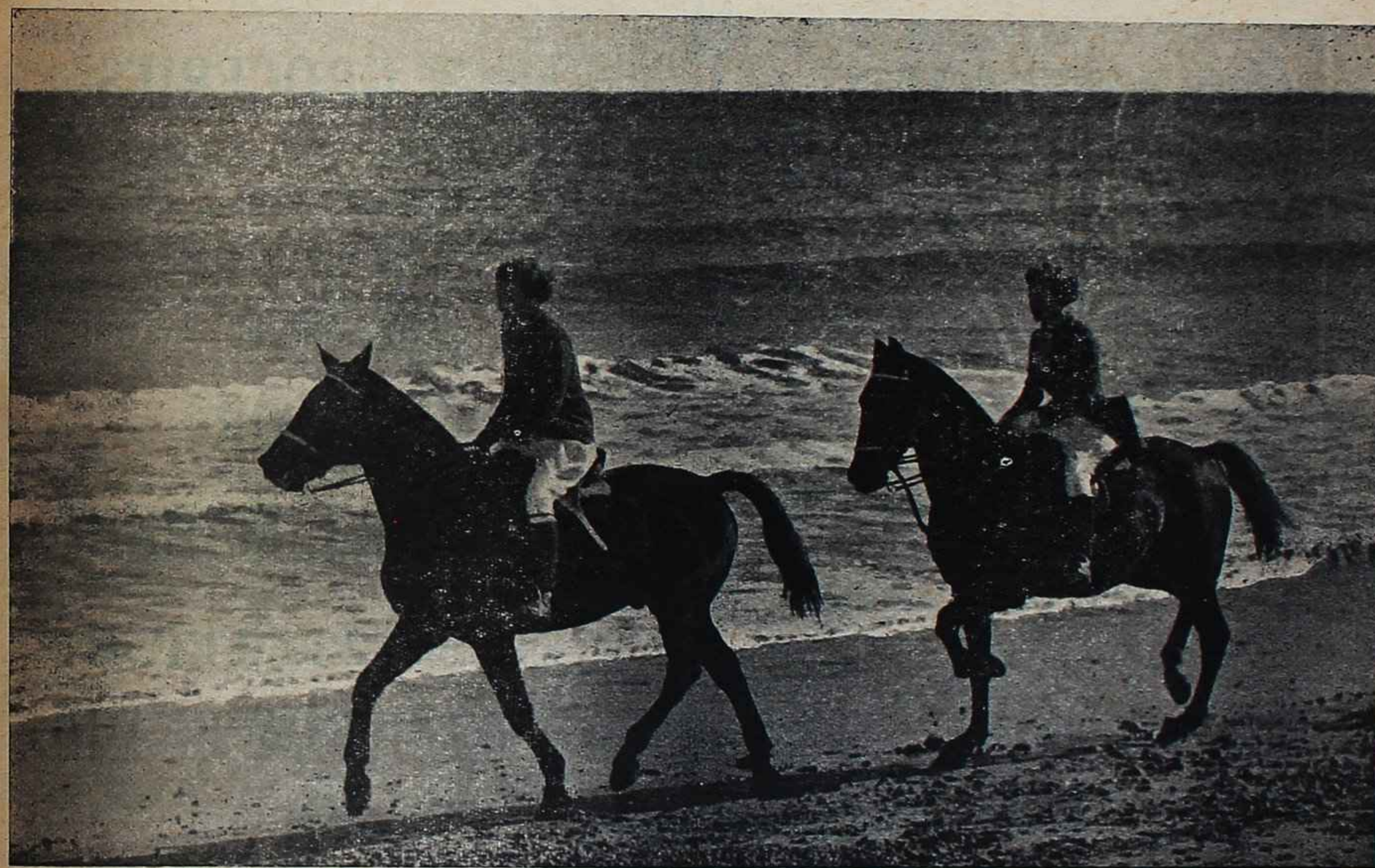

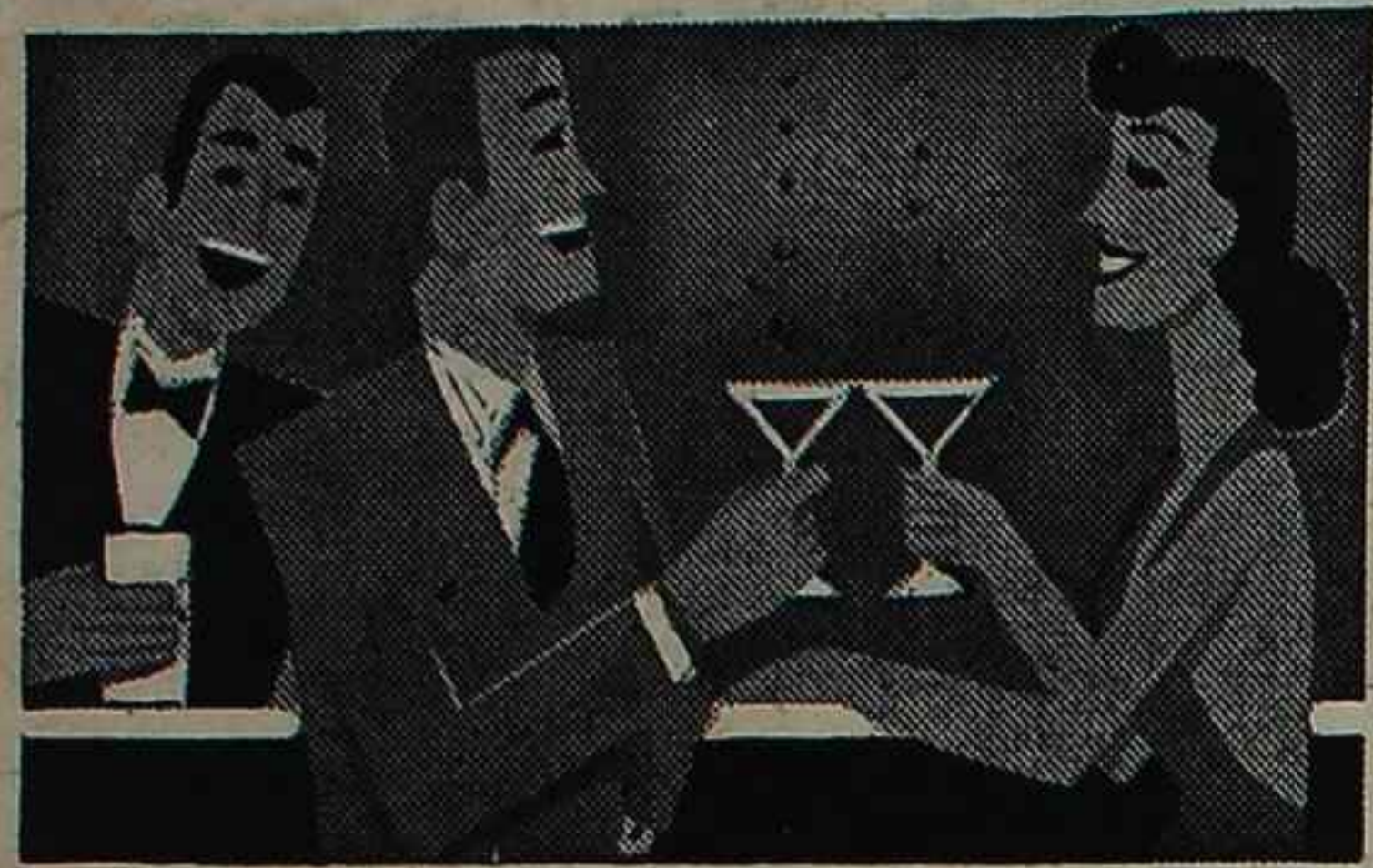

Two Cars Stolen At Beach; One Found Same Day

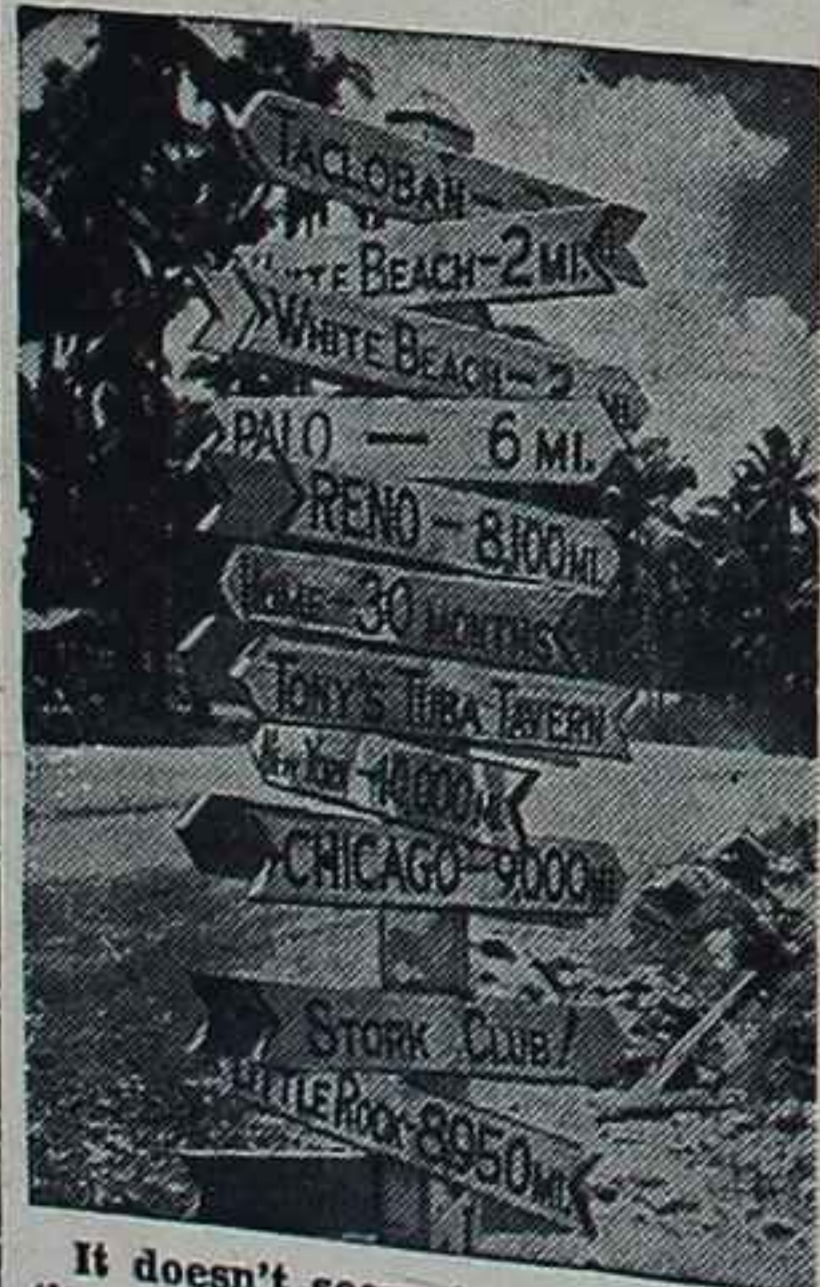

Editorial

Investigation Demanded

As a result of the accidental drowning of an eight-year-old boy at the State Reservation on July 4, 1945, the Hampton Union has asked for full investigation of the facts and circumstances surrounding the case. The following telegram was sent today to Hon. Charles M. Dale, Governor of the State of New Hampshire:

"In the interests of the safety of summer vacationists who visit Hampton Beach and the State Reservation at said Beach, the Hampton Union asks for an investigation of the facts and circumstances surrounding the accidental drowning at the State Reservation on July 4, 1945.

"We charge the State of New Hampshire with gross neglect and failure to operate said State Reservation with proper regard to the safety of the public"

Circumstances surrounding the case at this moment would seem to bear out our charge of neglect on the part of the state. The majority opinion from persons using that part of the beach would indicate that lifeguards were on duty—that at least there were none visible and designated as such. John Fanning, manager of the Bathhouse when questioned as to whether there were any lifeguards on duty stated that "there were two, himself and another man." When asked the name of the other lifeguard Manager Fanning refused to give it out, saying that he had authority to do so and that any information would have to come from Concord.

The investigation we have called for places no blame on Jack Fanning who is a capable gentleman and an outstanding athlete in his own right. Just how one person is expected to manage the bathhouse and be a lifeguard too, is beyond our comprehension. We do charge the State through its Recreation Commission of which Russell Tobey is now the head, with neglect and failure to have proper facilities at hand for the safety of the public.

We also understand that there is no first aid attendant or nurse stationed at the bathhouse and that anyone needing first aid attention must walk or be driven to the Police Station nearly a mile and a half away.

It is our earnest hope that this plea for an investigation will bring to the attention of the State the fact that here at Hampton we no longer walk put up with their neglect of the frontage at Hampton Beach which they took from the town several years ago.

The largest single recreational center in the entire State demands some attention.

Casino Employee With Small Arms Co. In Germany

With U. S. Forces in Germany—Sgt. Stanley G. Robillard, 47, Plaistow, N. H., who is served with the famous 26th Division in World War I, is a maintenance foreman for the 3210th Ordnance Small Arms Company in Germany.

Sgt. Robillard is the husband of Flora Robillard. In civilian life he was employed by Hampton Casino Associates, at Hampton Beach.

Sgt. Robillard, who is fondly referred to as "Pop" by men of his outfit, supervised a large portion of the 4700 firearms that it repaired during the last seven weeks of the American offensive in Germany. Rifles and pistols, which did not meet firing specifications, were evacuated to the 3210th from the Armies.

The Plaistow sergeant has been with this unit since its activation at Camp Sutton, N. C., in November, 1942. When the 3210th arrived in England in February, 1944, the outfit took over a large ordnance depot, where weapons were repaired which were later used by American forces assaulting Normandy beaches on June 6, 1944.

During World War I, Sgt. Robillard participated in the battles of Belleau Woods and Chateau Thierry. His most pleasant experience during World War II was meeting his stepson, Pfc. Albert Rogers, of the 596th Anti-Aircraft Battalion in England. Sgt. Robillard attended a Christmas party for Orphans at Reading and was told that his stepson's outfit was located nearby. He was unable to arrange transportation until a week later to visit him.

The World War II veteran is at present attempting to locate Albert who is now stationed in Germany.

he slipped into a hole in the river (at the south end of the State reservation) between the State Bath house and the jetty while walking with a companion Robert Curran, 8, of Lowell, Mass.

Young Curran attempted to save his friend, but had to give up and Frank Moyer, 40, of Lawrence, likewise tried without success to pull Keefe from the hole in the strong river current. Moyer, himself became exhausted and Joseph Schirrenti, USNR, a V-12 student at Tufts college brought him from the water where he was taken to the First Aid station in the Police ambulance.

It was not until Moyer was safely out of the water that the Navy man learned that Keefe was also in the water. He returned and brought in the body after it had been in the river for about twenty minutes.

Chief of Police Jerome F. Harkness, Bernard Felch, Chief, George H. Lamott of the Fire Department and Dr. Henry Robbins were called to the scene. Jack Fanning, manager of the State Bath house, assisted by Floyd Gale, policeman and Alfred Gosselin, deputy sheriff of Raynond worked over the child for three hours with the pullmotor and first aid to bring life back.

At 5 pm, Dr. Wendell P. Clare, Portsmouth, medical referee for southeastern Rockingham county gave a verdict of accidental drowning in sea water.

Charles Keefe was the son of an undertaker, Mr. Raymond Keefe of 133 Salem street, Lawrence, Mass., the only boy among four girls in the family. On the day of the accident he was spending the day at 20 L street, Hampton Beach.

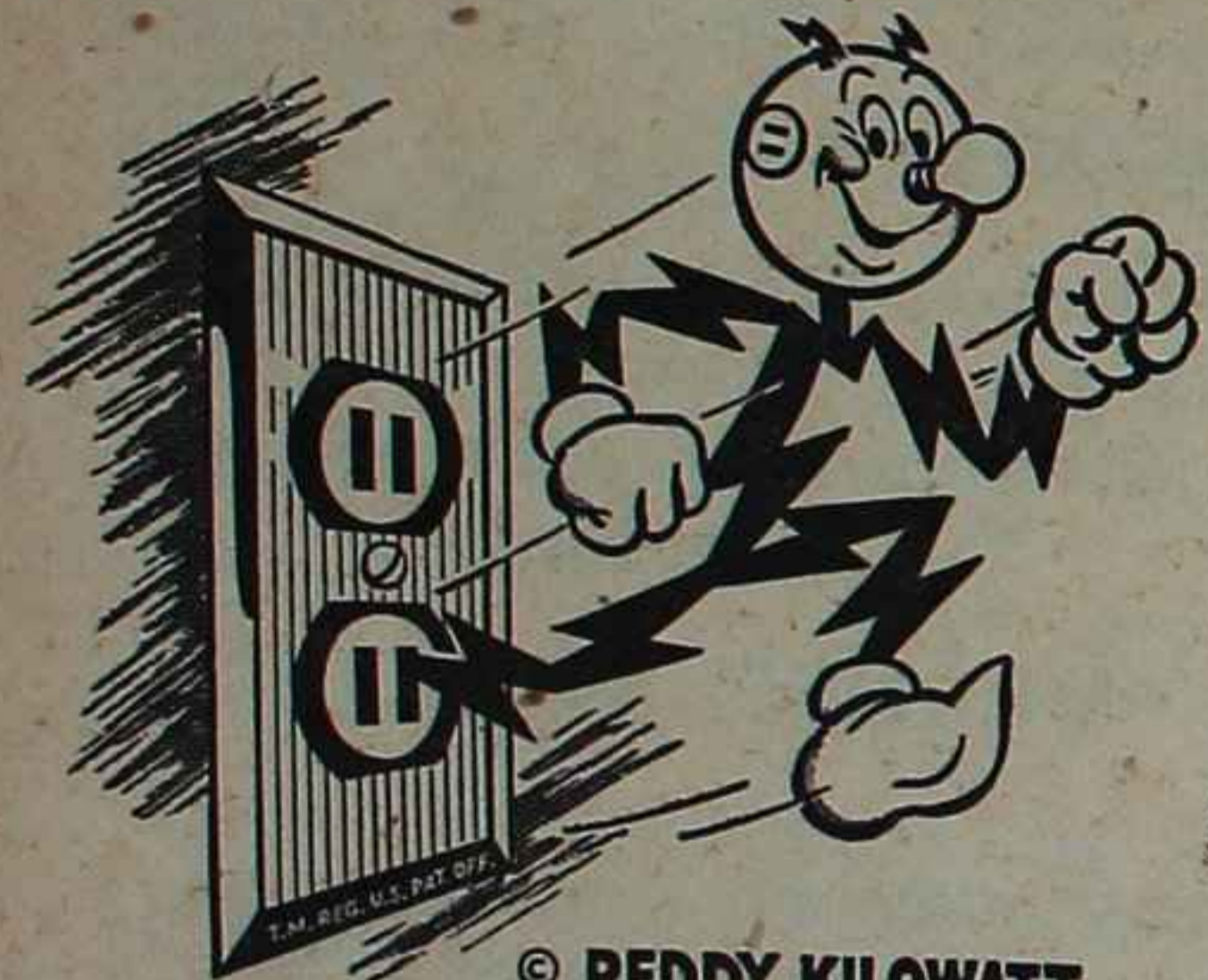

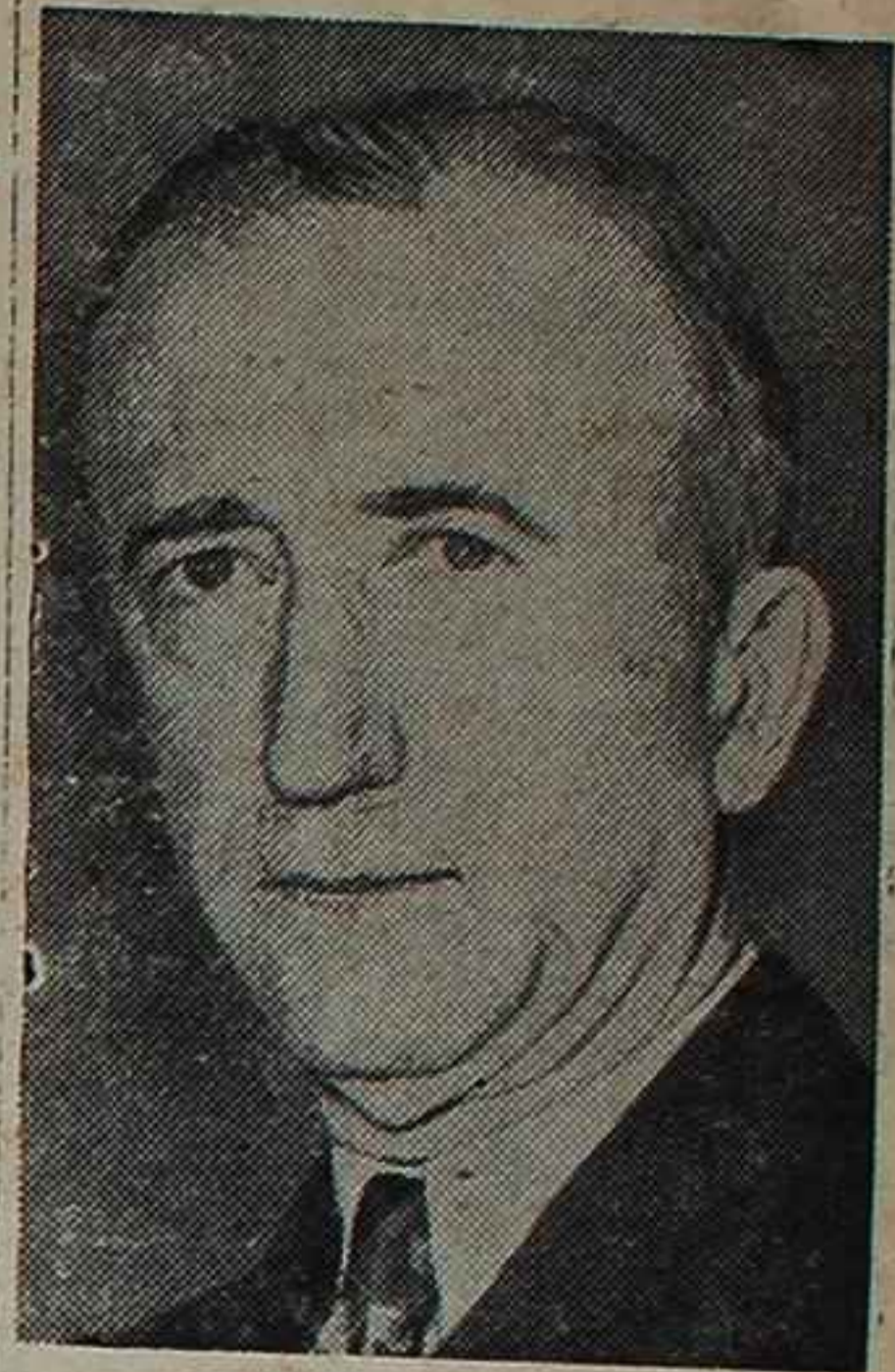

Sgt. Allen Bogrett Member Of Famed Eighth Division

Sgt. Allen Bogrett, USA, oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Victor Bogrett, North Beach, arrived here Monday night for a thirty-day furlough after which he will report to Fort Devens for reassignment.

Sgt. Bogrett enlisted in the Army early in 1944 and trained at Arberdeen Proving Grounds and Camp Gordon, Georgia. In February 1945 he arrived in Scotland for duty overseas. As an infantry soldier, of the 28th Regiment of the Eighth Infantry Division, sometimes known as the Golden Arrow Division, he took part in the Battle of the Ruhr and the conquest of the Rhine valley. German resistance collapsed before the Eighth Division drove north of the Elbe, and cessation of hostilities occurred May 4.

The Eighth Division was one of the divisions to meet the 35th Russian Guards Division in a formal ceremony in which members of the 32nd Airborne Division and the 6th British Paratrooper Regiment also participated. Sgt. Bogrett was a member of the honor guard present at the ceremony. At the ceremony besides several American and British generals, the third ranking

Russian field marshal was present. After Germany surrendered, the outfit remained in Germany for a while to process some of the 316,000 German prisoners which they had captured in 10 months of combat. Finally after stopping at a few cities in Germany, Sgt. Bogrett was sent to LeHavre and was soon sailing for the states aboard the USS Admiral W. E. Eberley. He arrived in Newport News on July 6th.

Bogrett wears the Combat Infantryman's badge, the Bronze Star Medal for outstanding achievement against the enemy, the Presidential Unit citation, the French Fourragere, representing three campaigns, the Joint British and American Connection ribbon, the European Theater of Operations and the Good Conduct ribbons.


Sgt. Bogrett is a graduate of Hampton Academy and High School, class of 1937 and attended the University of New Hampshire.

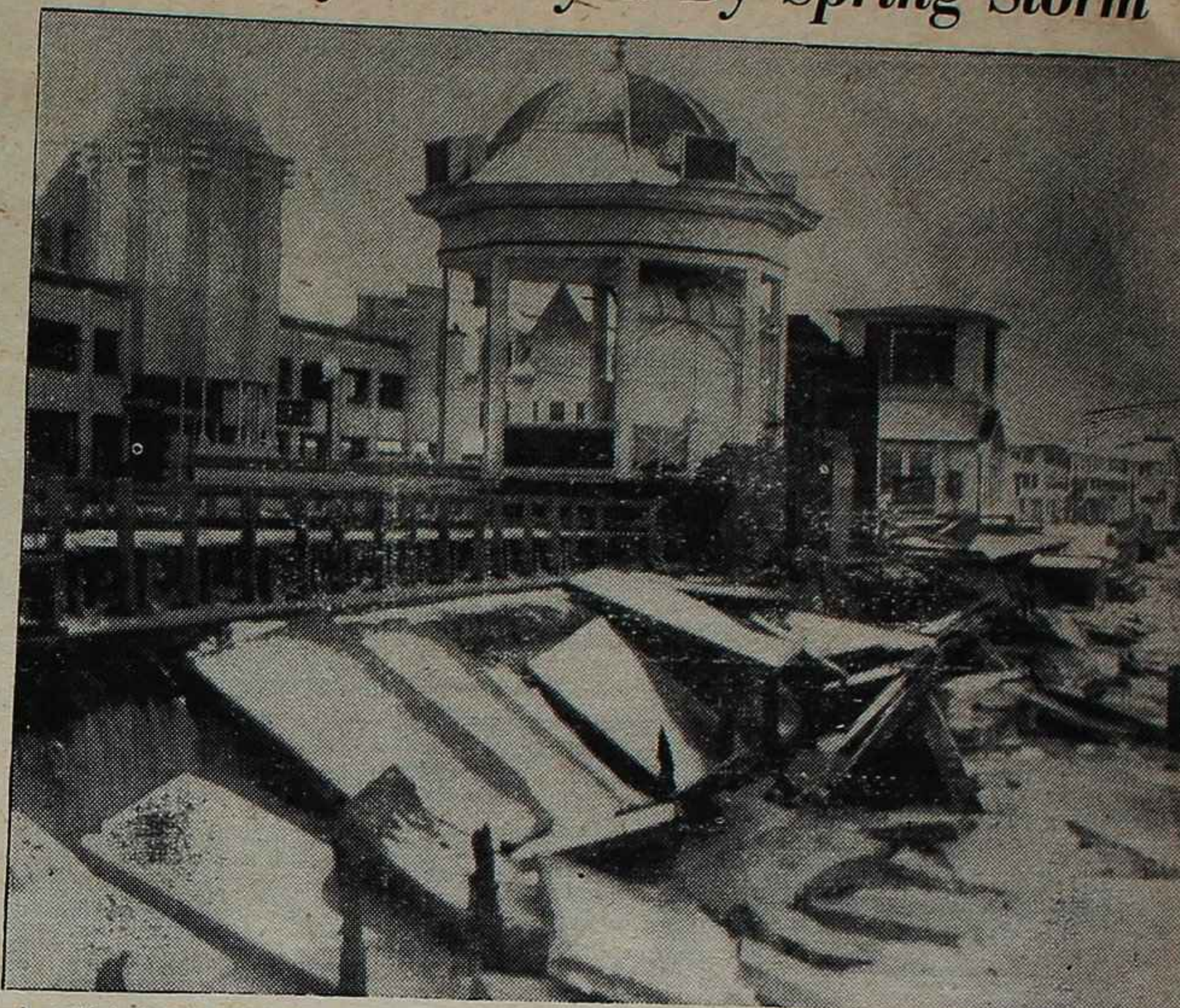

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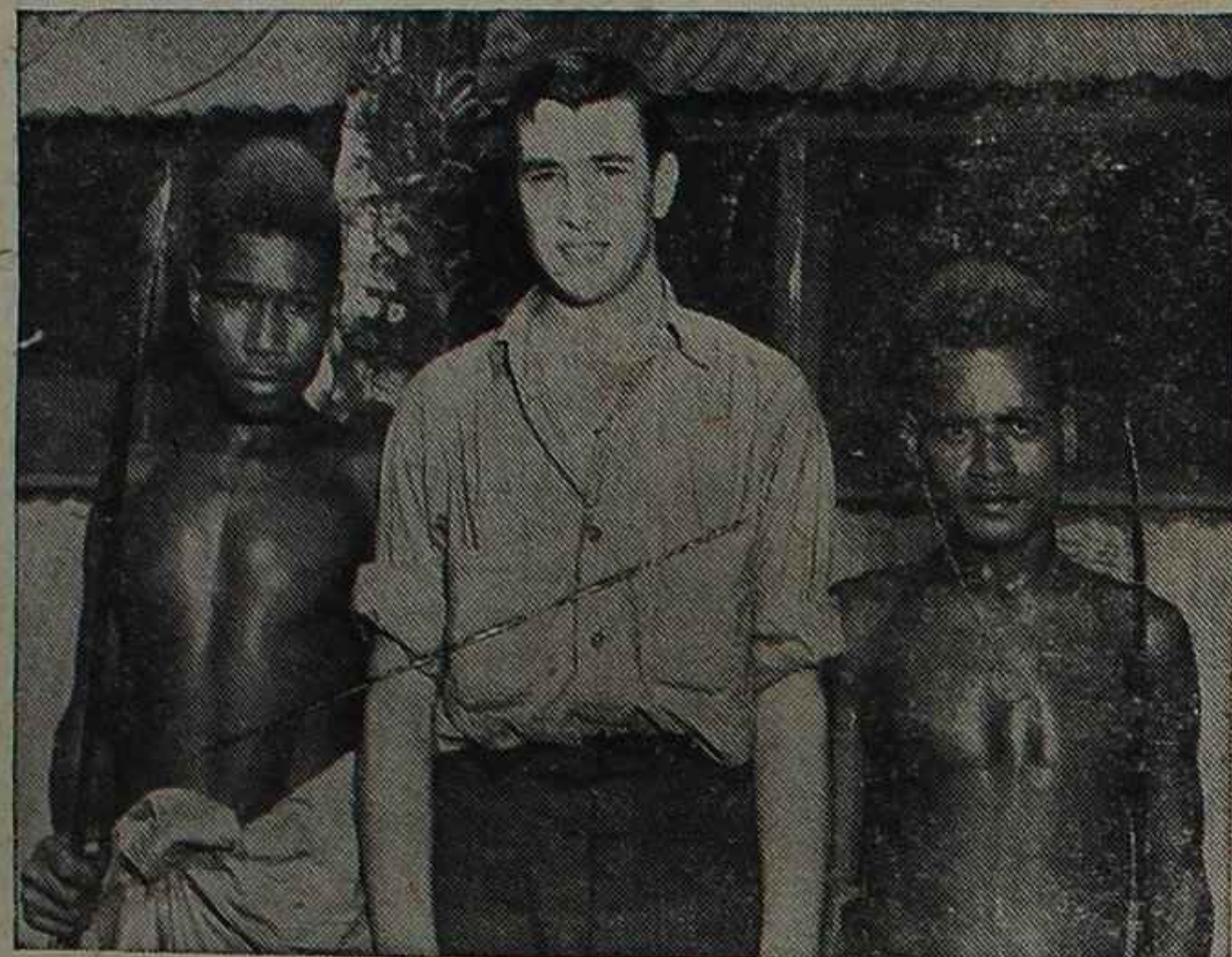

N. H. Sailor In Admiralties Hospital

At a Naval base in the Admiralty Islands—Seabee Edward J. Goss, S 1/c Berlin, N. H. dug his face into the beachhead sand at Zamboang, Philippines—and counted Jap mortar bursts.

The Seabee counted up to seven, and stopped. He finished his tally at a Naval hospital in the Admiralty Islands.

"I guess it was the eighth one hit me," mused the 20-year old seaman. His youthful, square-cut features wrinkled in a shy grin, "about that beachhead we made at Caldera Point on Zamboang. It wasn't very much. You could run around the whole perimeter without breathing too hard."

Goss attached to a Naval construction battalion, was with a torpedo boat base building specialist unit when he was wounded.

The unit was a small one; 55 Seabees. And history will not chronicle its iota of Pacific warfare. The whole action involved perhaps 200 of our men; the Seabees, 50 soldiers and 100 Naval torpedo boat base maintenance men.

The orders were to land on the point, take and hold a beachhead, clear Jap opposition, build and man a torpedo boat base.

"We went into the point on March 13," continued Goss. "Set up

a beachhead about a hundred yards in with no opposition.

"We got plenty that night though. Three Japs infiltrated the lines. They were human torpedos, with land mines strapped to their backs. Before we could knock them off, one Jap blew himself up with one of our machine gun pits.

"Next day, we set out to find water. There were five of us Seabees, two welders, and three ship-fitters. We had tommy guns, and a 30-calibre machine gun mounted on a weapon carrier."

Goss' modesty did not tell of the courage of these five Seabees who penetrated more than a mile into Jap territory beyond their own perimeter to find water for the landing party.

The scout party located a water tank complete with pipeline running almost to the beachhead. It was an abandoned refinery and American shells and Jap sabotage squads had ruptured the tanks and lines. They went to work with their Seabee welding torches and by nightfall, water flowed through the lines to the beachhead.

"We figured that we might get some sleep that night", continued Goss, "but when we came back, we turned to and unloaded supplies and ammunition off an LST (landing

ship,tanks) all night."

In the morning, the Seabees went to work again. During the night the Japs had dynamite sections of the line. Again, weapon carrier and tools and machine guns and Seabees went into the thick of Jap territory to repair the pipe.

"That beachhead was sure getting hot by the time we got the water running again. And the Navy maintenance men were evacuated that afternoon. We stayed with the Army to hang on for reinforcements.

"About 5:00 pm the Japs zeroed in on us with a "77" mountain gun and two 91 mm mortars. The first shot knocked out our command post. The next barrage walked up our right flank. That's where I was dug in."

Goss grimaced. "It was still light and the Japs could look down on us from the hills and spot their shells on our noses. I've been through a lot of bombings but it was nothing like this.

"The 4th barrage was the one. It was too late to drop back so I just hung on and counted the bursts. The eighth one hit five feet from the foxhole and I went up with it. When I came down, I crawled to the medical aid hole and lay there with more mortars kicking up all around."

The Seabee was evacuated to the beach through the fire and is now recuperating at this hospital.

His 22 months of Seabee service is a personalized history of the mounting war in the Pacific. Goss went ashore to work and fight on the invasion beaches of Biak, Windy Island, Sansapor (New Guinea), Moratai, Leyte, Samar, Mindoro, ("That's where we spent 25 nights in a foxhole, getting bombed like clockwork").

The youth, whose parents, Mr. and Mrs. Philip Goss, live at 572 Rockingham street, Berlin, N. H., expects, "to be back with my outfit in a couple weeks.

Summer Services On World Peace At Rocky Hill

Few people realize that Old Rocky Hill Meeting House in Amesbury, Mass. is considered the masterpiece of all the old meeting houses of New England. The architecture is identically the same as when it was built. This of itself should be sufficient to attract large congregations to the meetings to be held there this summer.

The subject for the four meetings this summer will be Contributions to a Permanent World Peace. On July 15 Dr. David D. Vaughn, former professor at Boston University will speak on the subject Contribution of American Democracy To A World Peace. Miss Eleanor Benedict will be cello soloist playing her old Italian cello made in 1690.

On July 22, Dr. Fredrick M. Elliot, president of the American Unitarian Association will speak on The Contribution of Religion To A Permanent World Peace. At the same meeting Dr. Dieffenbach will speak upon Practical Working of Organized World Peace or the Larger Fellowship in Religion. At this meeting the celebrated Sanford Choir of English singers will furnish the music. This choir is pronounced to be the finest chorus choir outside of the star cities of New England.

On August 5 it is hoped that we shall have Dr. Hastie of Howard University who will speak upon the race problem and its relation to world peace. It is also hoped that we may have one of the great negro singers at this meeting.

Later in August there will be a historical pageant at which there will be represented Anne Hutchinson and John Winthrop, both in the costume of their period. Music for this service will be announced later.

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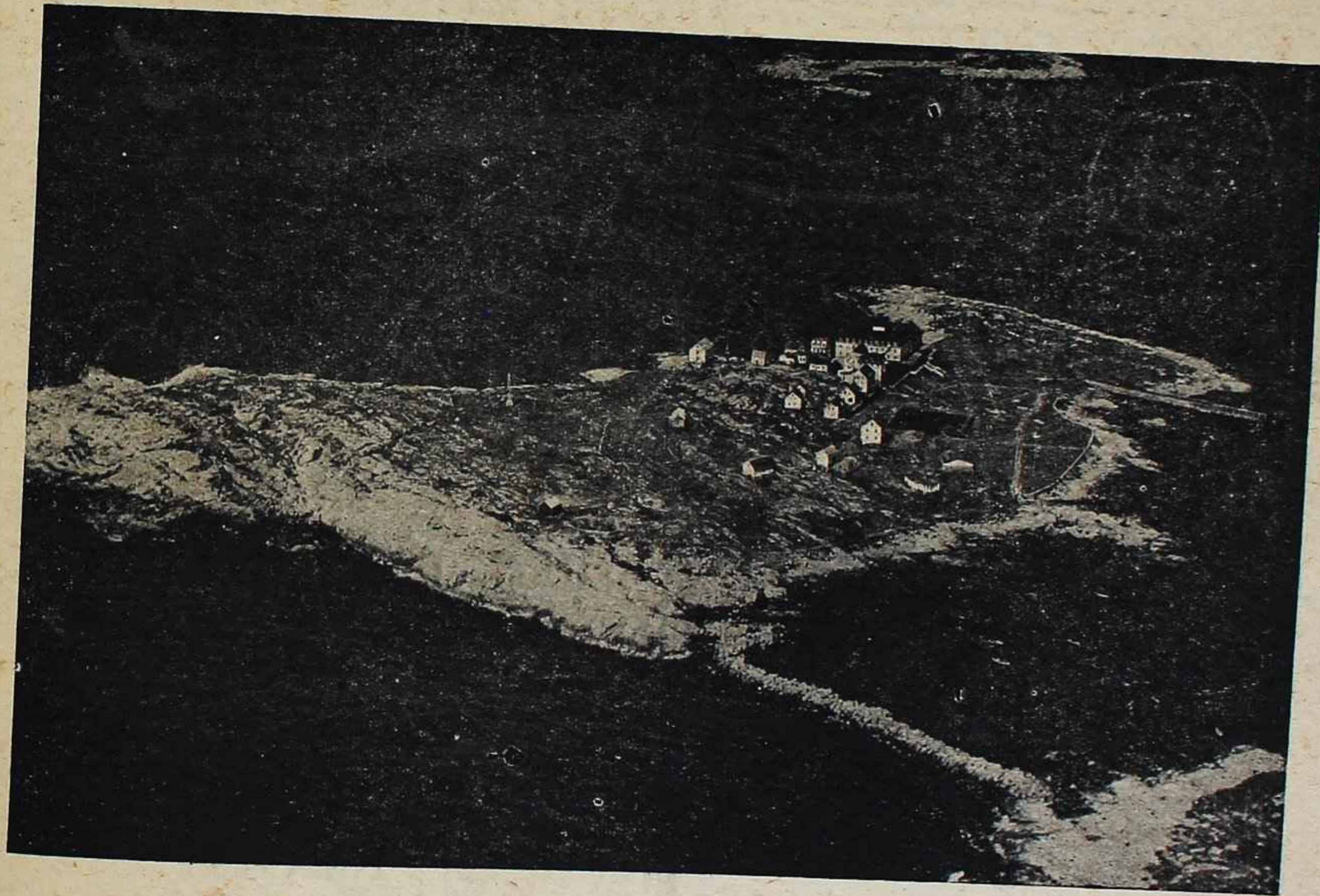
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
