He is well known to summer residents at Hampton Beach as one who has been a prime factor in the development of Hampton Beach as one of the most popular summer resorts in New Hampshire.

Colonel Ashworth, native of Haverhill, Mass. came to Hampton Beach in the early 1900s. He built the Hotel Ashworth and although he was burned out twice, he rebuilt the hotel each time. In 1944 after more than 40 years in the hotel business, he sold his hotel to Ralph A. Moulton of Hampton Beach.

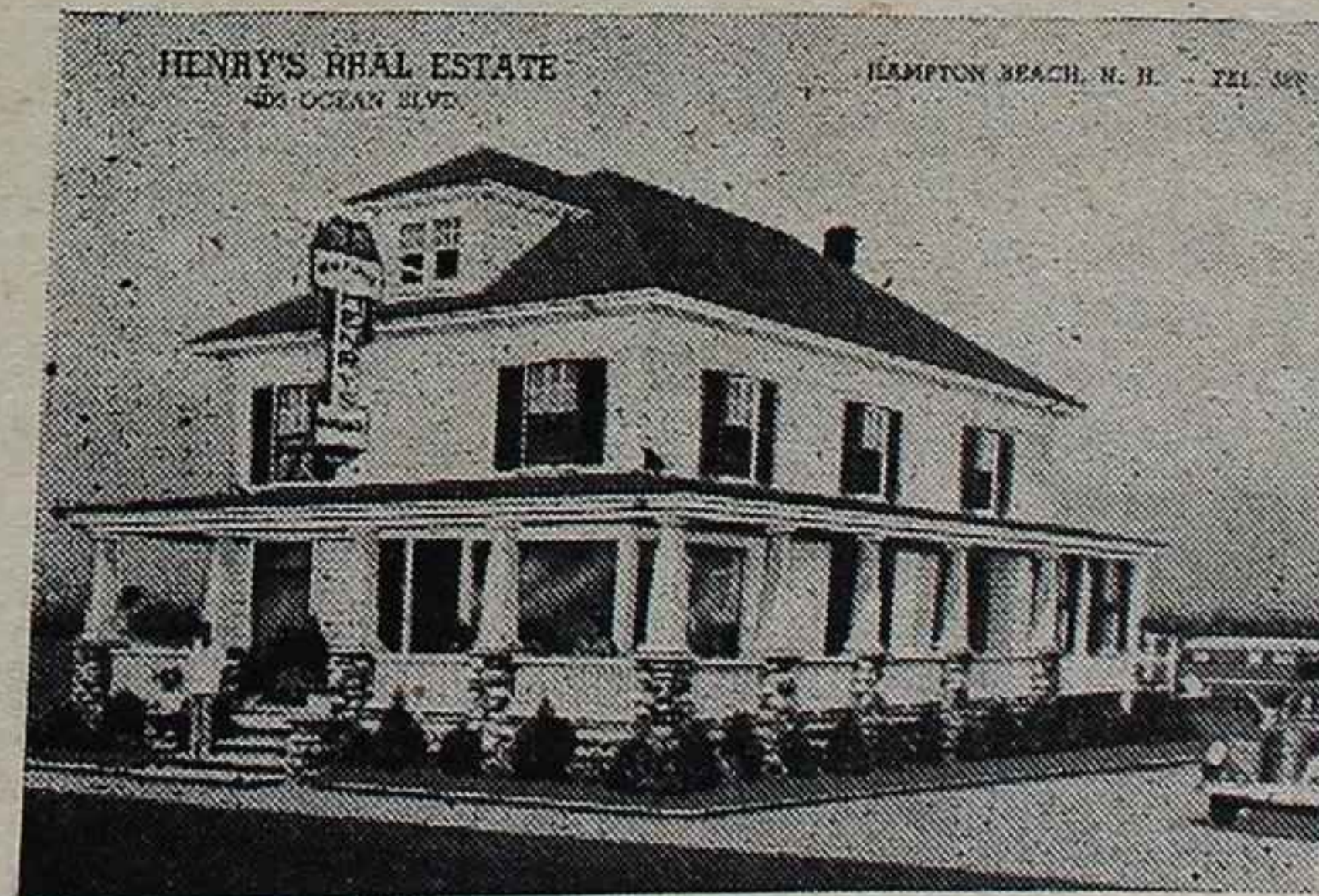

Children's Friend

Tomorrow marks another eventful Children's Day at Hampton Beach—a day as eagerly looked forward to by the thousands of kids who visit the beach as it is fondly remembered by hundreds of thousands of grownups spread the length and breadth of this country.

Many of the older folks can remember the parade of parades along with the memories of the ice cream and lollypops given out free no matter how many times you got back into line.

The one person most responsible for this continued success of these Children's outings is Col. George Ashworth, known to thousands as "Daddy" Ashworth. It is his love for children and especially those who come to Hampton Beach that has inspired his friends and fellow citizens to annually lend a hand in this gala day for the children.

Col. Ashworth celebrated his 77th birthday last Saturday and it must have been a source of joy for him to look back upon the wonderful times that he has had doing for the children of this community—for it goes without saying that he loves every moment of it.

Many of the older folks have taken issue with Col. Ashworth in the past over matters of policy concerning the beach, but none can deny his unselfish love and dogged determination for the success of Hampton Beach.

Children and grownups alike join in wishing Col. Ashworth many happy returns of the day and many more years of continued success serving this community.

Action Wanted

A reply to our telegram of July 5 concerning the accidental drowning at the State Bathhouse has been received from Governor Charles M. Dale containing no information or satisfaction regarding the situation.

The Governor has contented himself with

seeking but one report in response to our request for a full investigation of the facts surrounding the case, and that one from Russell B. Tobey, state Commissioner of Recreation, who has jurisdiction over the Bathhouse and the entire beach front area.

A full investigation which the case fully justified would have revealed the following questionable points on the part of the State's policy in the operation of the bathhouse:

1. Manager of bathhouse instructed to all life guard duties.
2. No life guards on duty at time of accident, at least no visible evidence of such, ie, proper designation on swim suits.
3. Value of signs (two in fact) warning of bathing in river.
4. Lack of First Aid equipment.
5. Lack of trained First Aid personnel.

The above are the most salient points in our contention that the State neglected the safety of the public in opening the Bathhouse over the Fourth of July holiday without adequate equipment or personnel. These five points are called to the attention of the State, since they seem not to have been uncovered in the summary investigation.

We are not trying merely to make a "case" against the State," but sincerely want an investigation of the entire situation, which eventually might awaken State authorities to their duty and responsibility to the number one recreational center in the entire State.

People in this section are well aware of the fact that the Hampton Beach monument to our former Governor Francis P. Murphy has proven a "white elephant" to the State, but we also have in mind that if the State Reservation was properly developed and maintained that it could be made into a self-supporting and perhaps even a revenue-producing project.

An investigation and study of the situation is in order. We await some action on the part of the State.

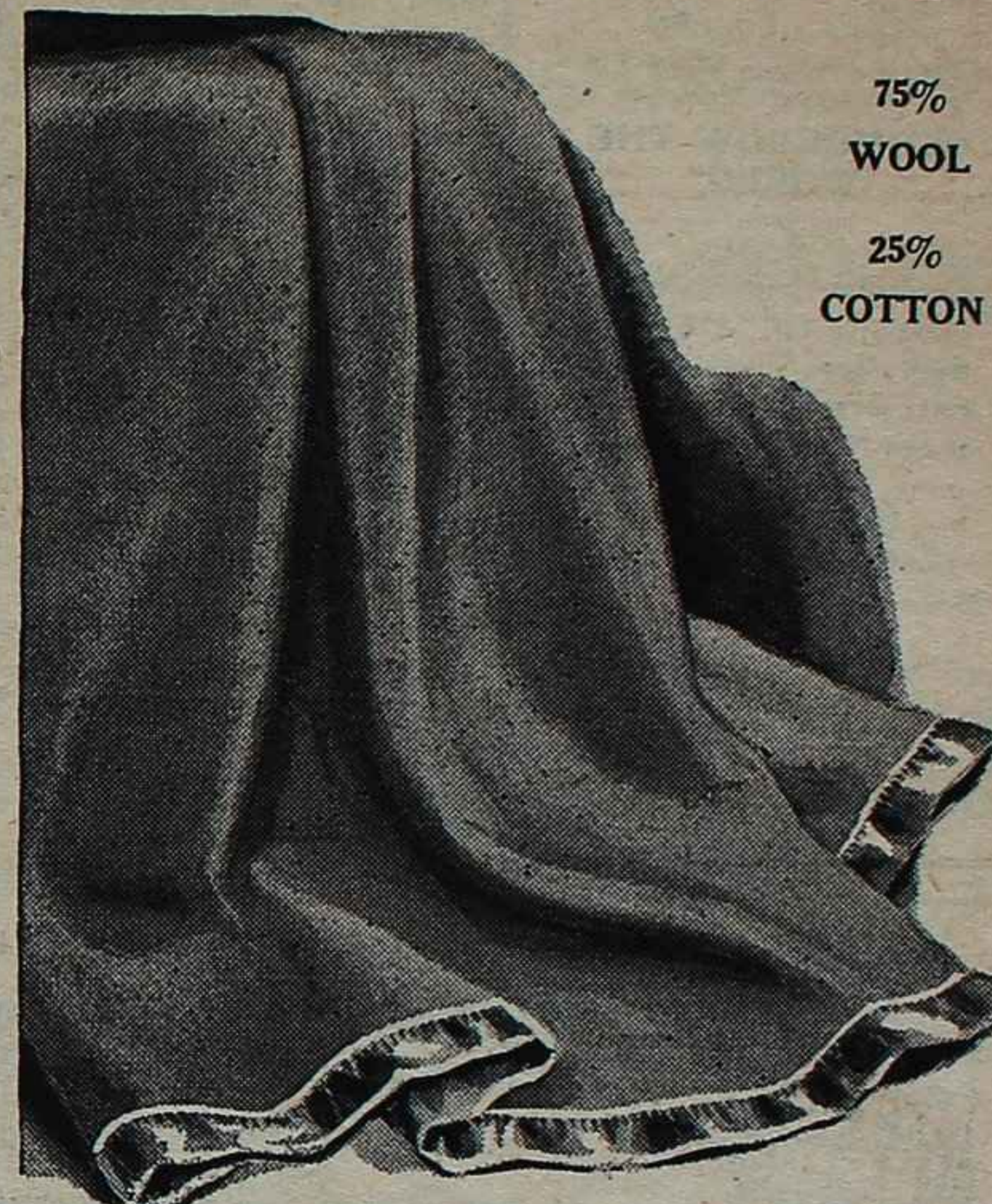

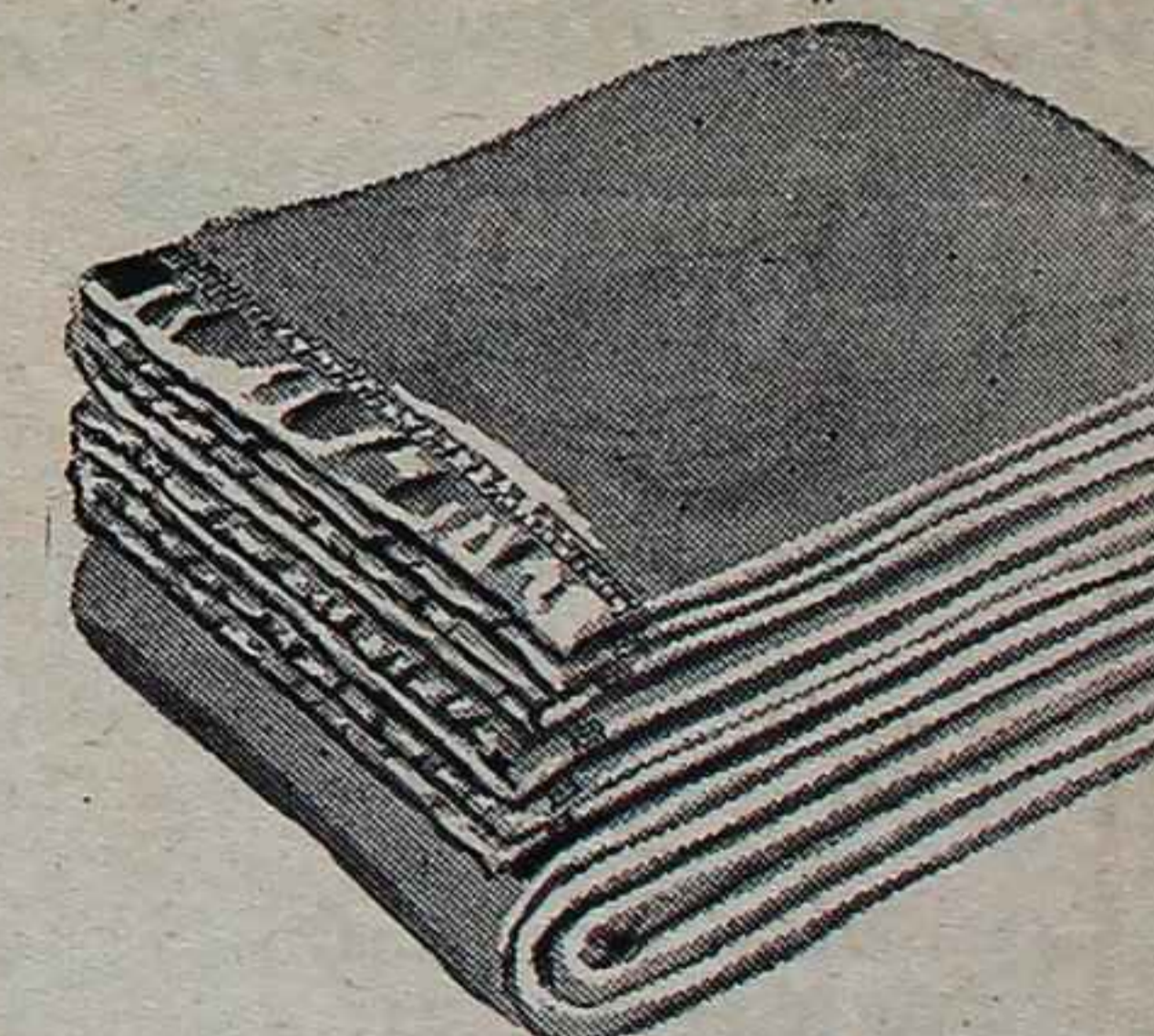

Durham, N. H., July 16—Starring in the first international ski meet held in Europe since before the war were two former members of the University of New Hampshire ski team, according to word received here today from Fifth Army headquarters. They are Sgt. Stephen Knowlton of Durham, who took third place in the meet, and Sgt. Curtis Chase of Newport, who placed fifth. They are both with the 10th Mountain Division which has been stationed in northern Italy since the Fifth Army's final campaign.

The race, organized by the 10th Mountain Division, was held on Austria's highest peak, 12,461-foot high Gossglockner. There were 58 racers in the meet won by former Dartmouth star, 1st Sgt. Walter Prager of Perth Amboy, N. J. Knowlton's time for the combined downhill and slalom race was 2:01-1/5, with Chase not far behind with 2:13 4/5.

Both Chase and Knowlton were members of the '41-'42 team here which won the Dartmouth, Univer-

sity of New Hampshire, Middlebury, and Norwich winter carnival meets. The next year Knowlton enlisted in the US Army Ski Troops. Chase, before enlisting, was a member of the famed '42-'43 UNH team which won every meet of the season including the Lake Placid meet, the Middlebury and Dartmouth carnivals, and the Intercollegiate Ski Union Championship.

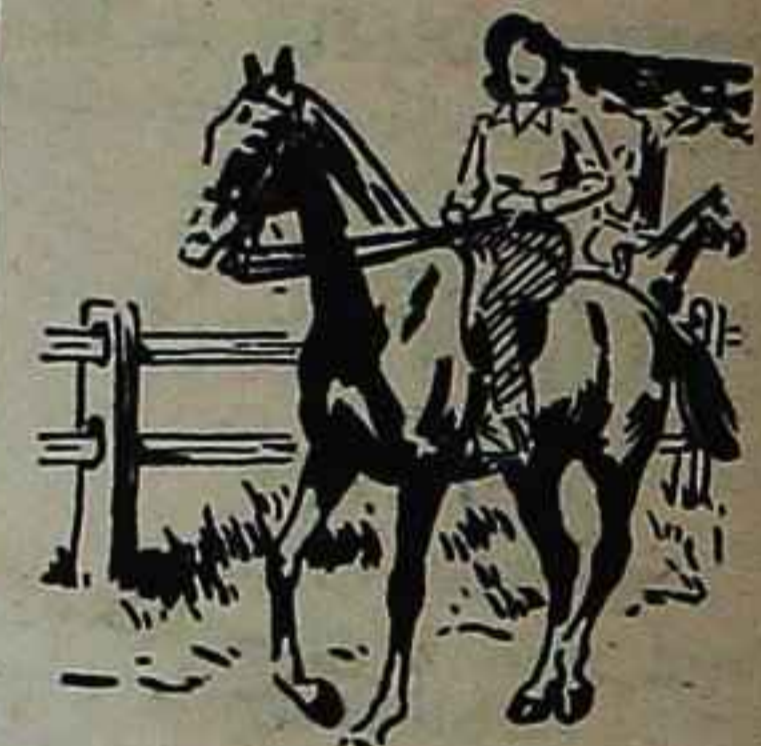

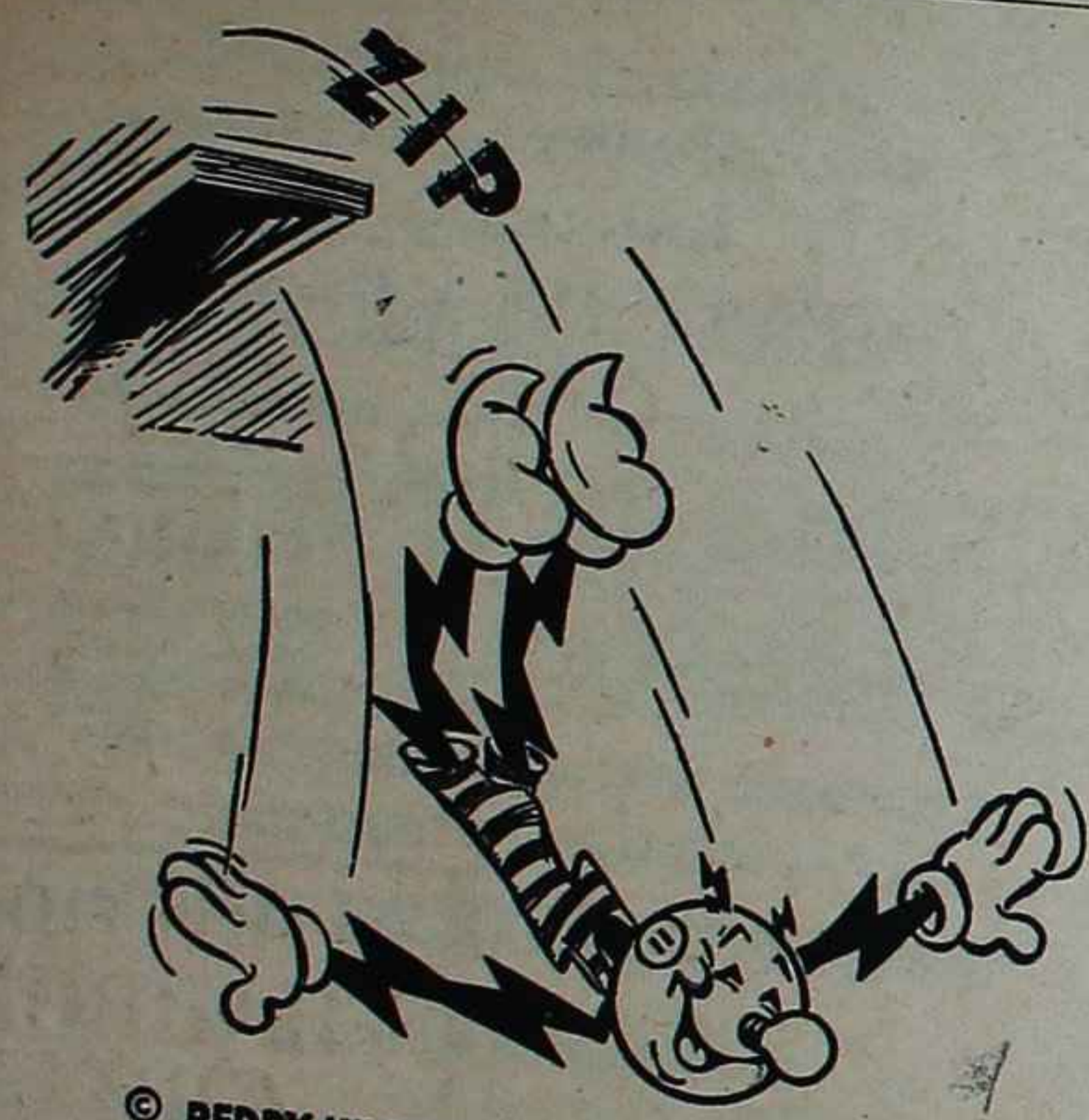

The European campaign cost the United States army 92,000 vehicles destroyed, jeeps leading the list with 25,781. Next biggest loss were the 2½-ton trucks, 19,664.

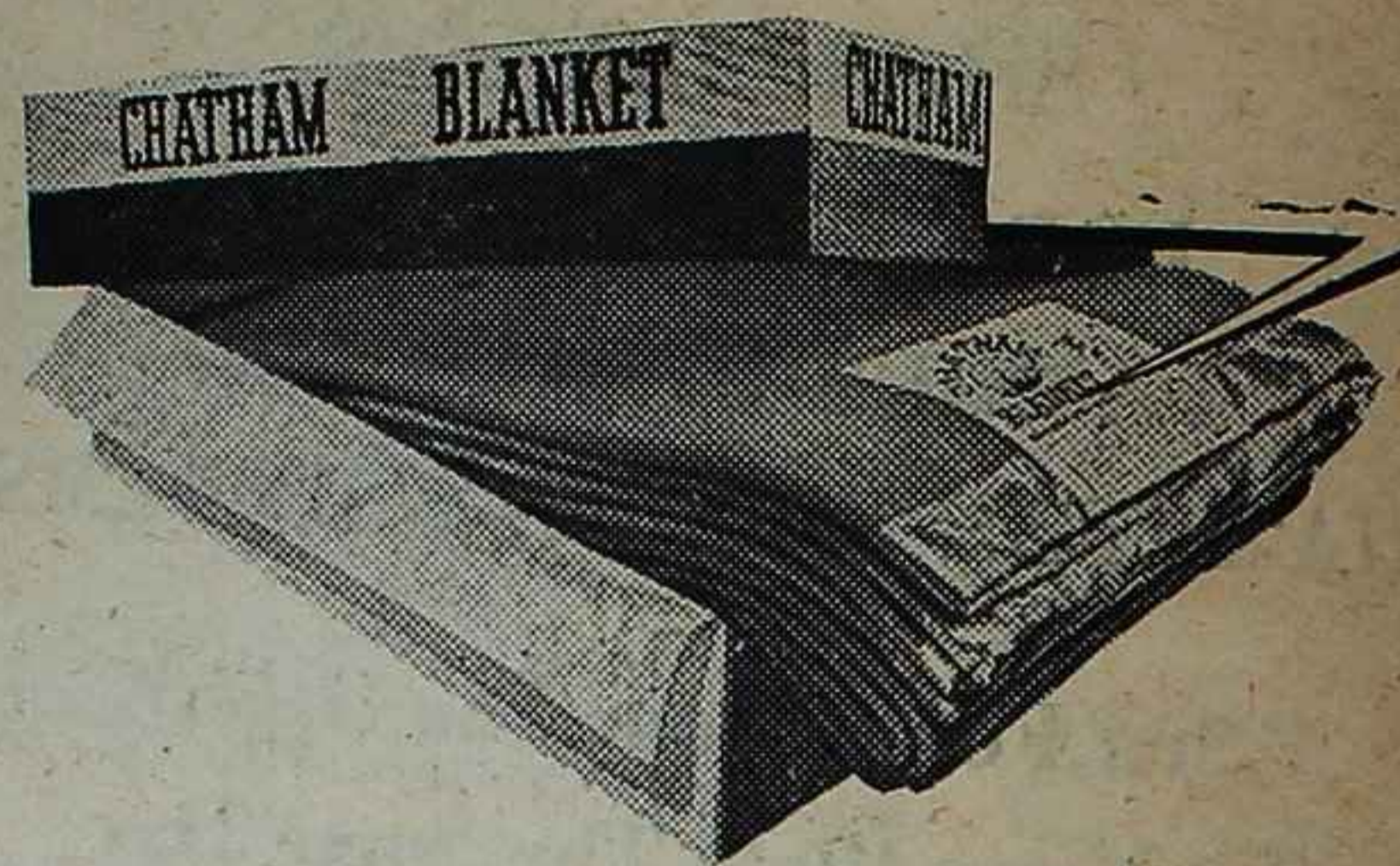

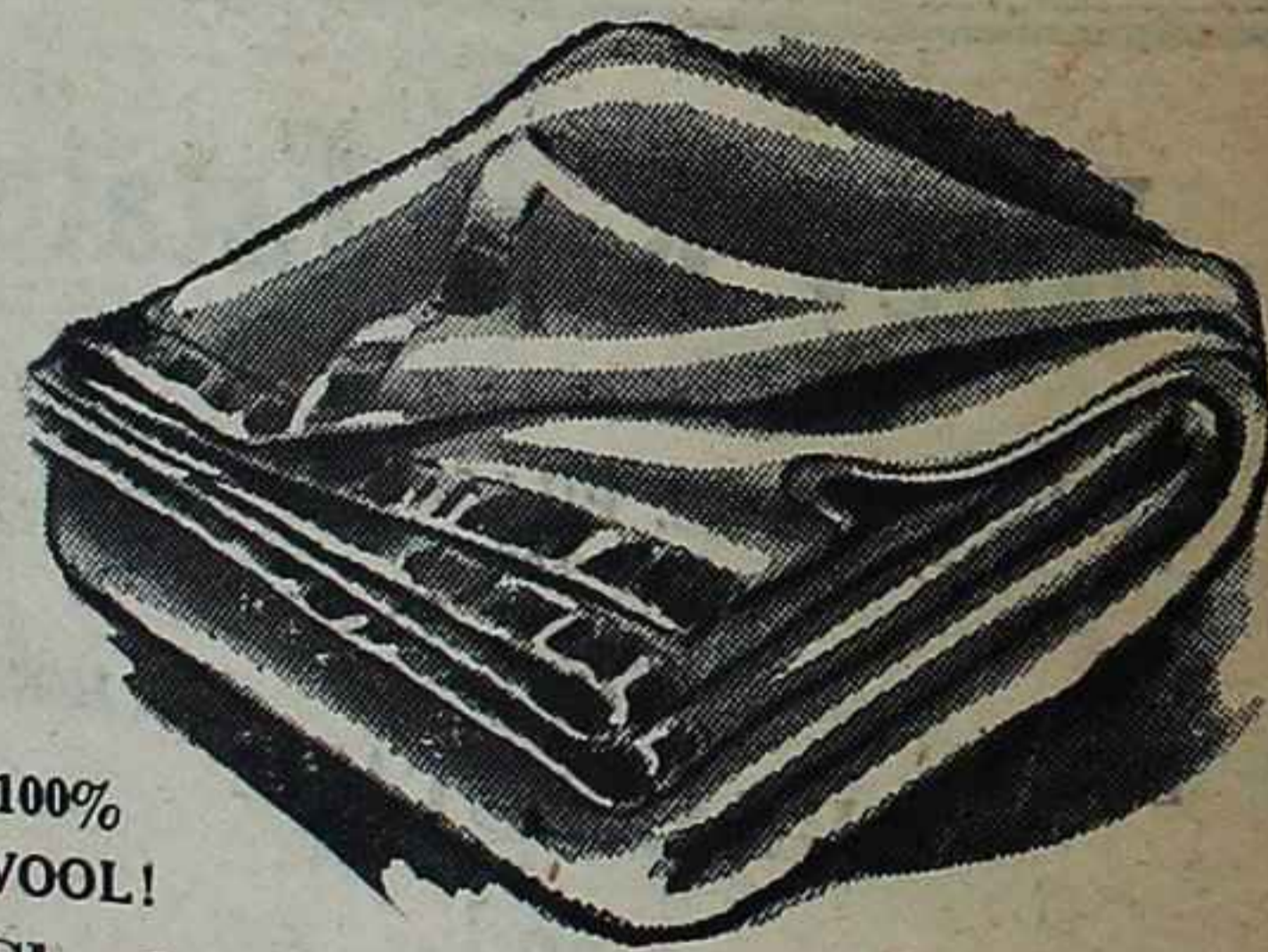

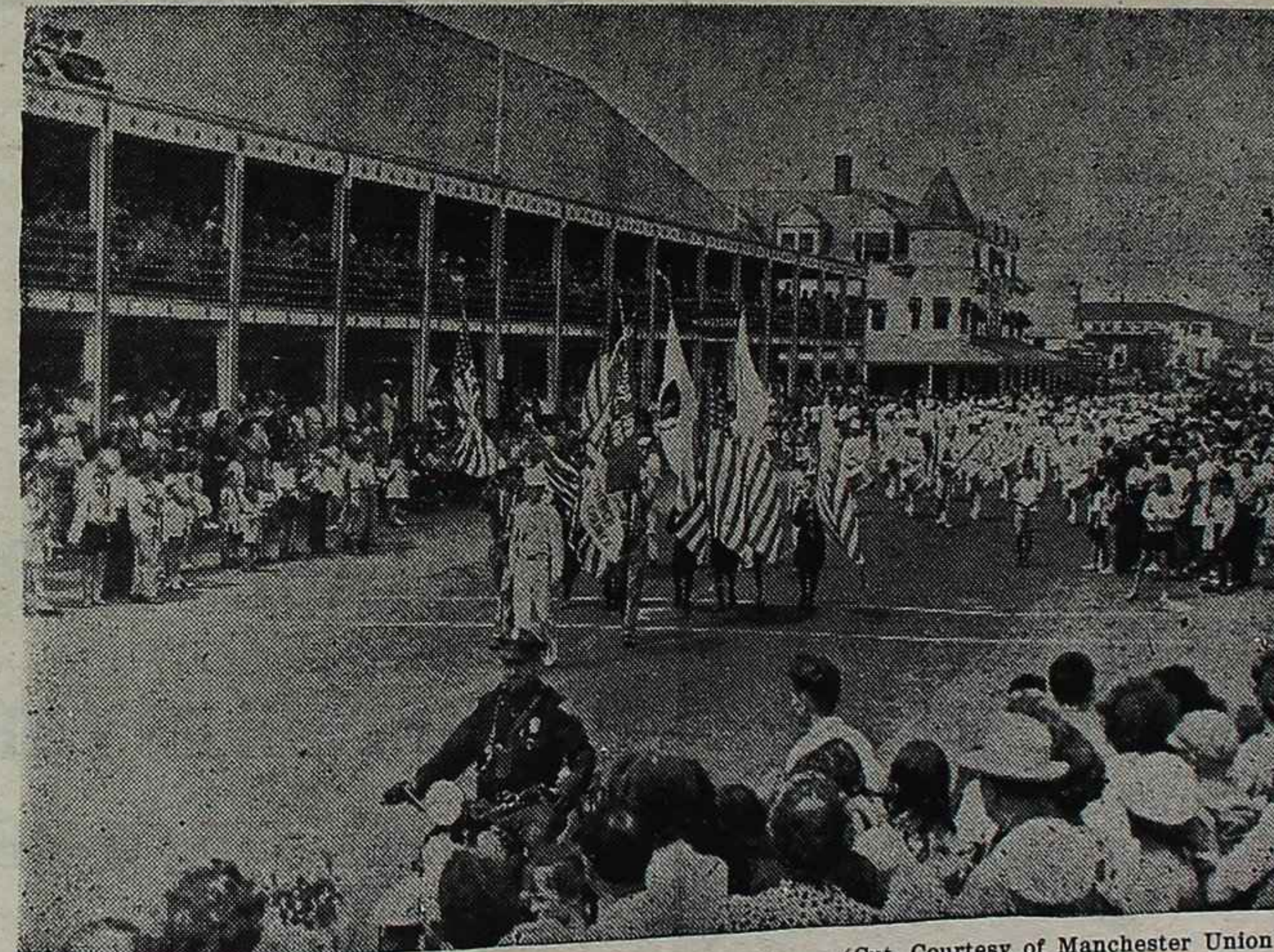
