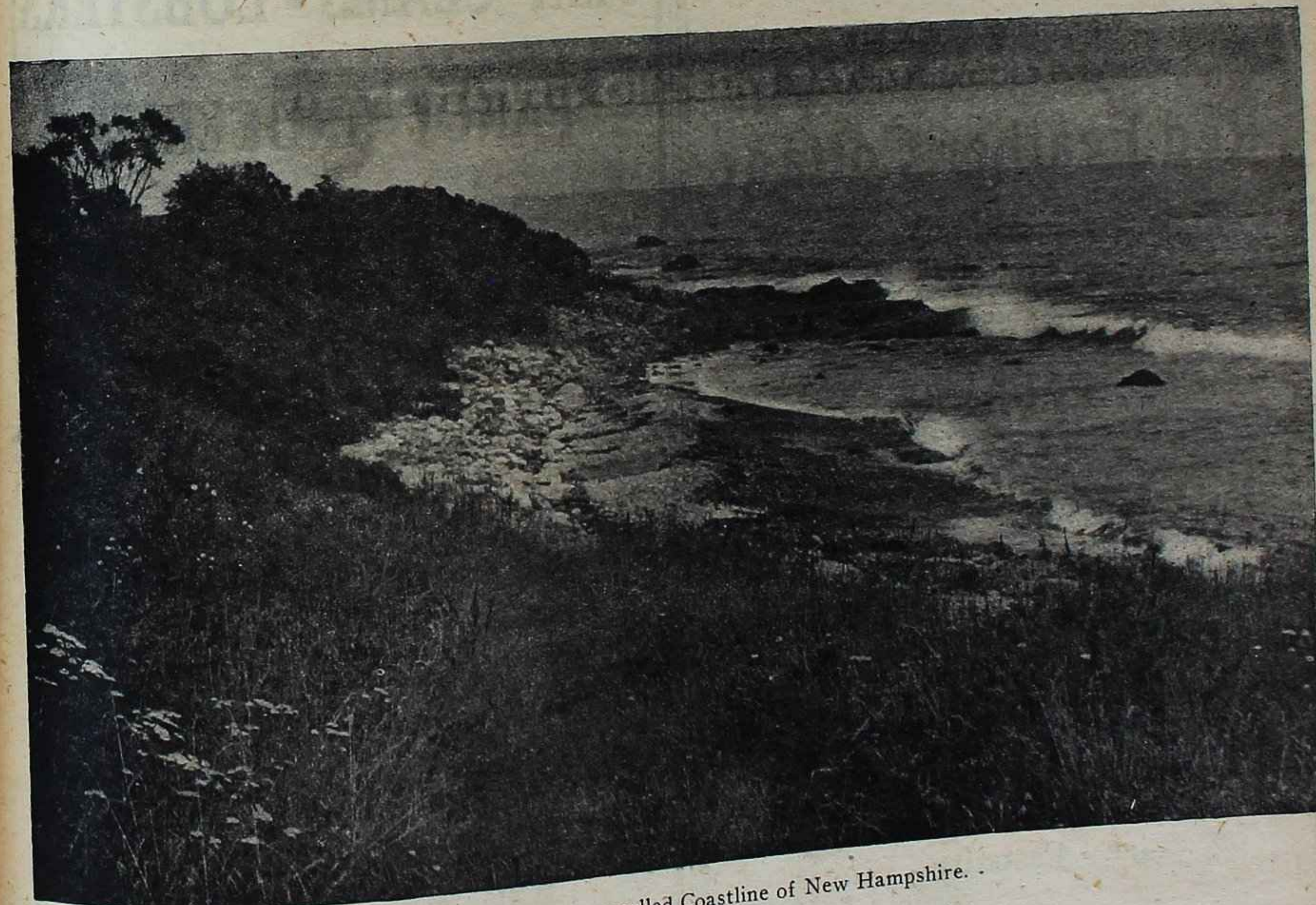

Lt. Meyer was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Cord Meyer of Atlantic avenue, North Hampton. He attended St. Paul's school, Concord, and Yale university from which he was graduated in 1943. He enlisted in the Marine Corps in July 1943 with his twin brother, Cord Meyer, Jr., who was discharged from the Marine Corps June 1, also with the rank of first lieutenant.

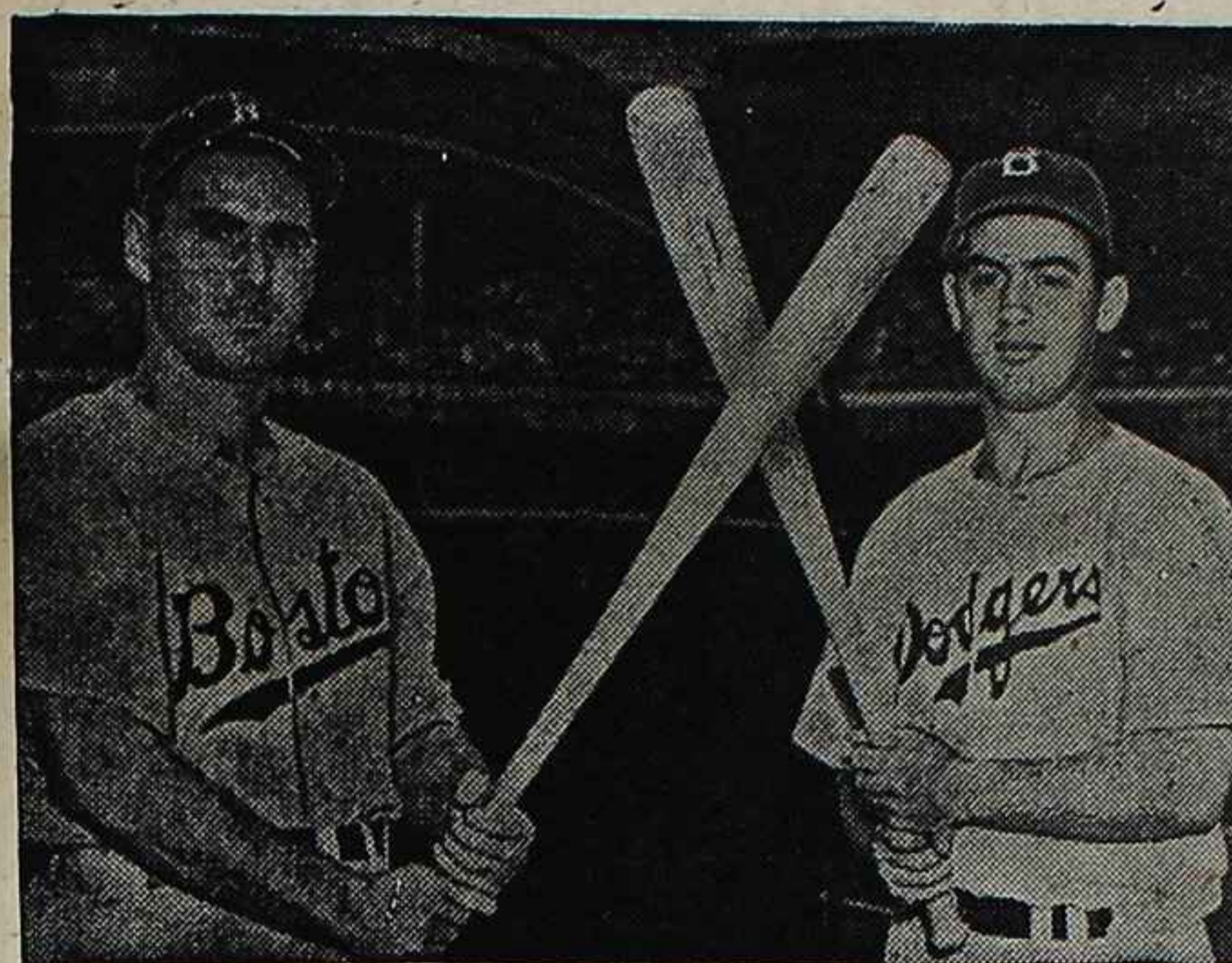

Dear Mr. Tobey:

I want to express my most sincere thanks for the wonderful service rendered to me and my daughter last Friday when my daughter was saved from drowning by a life guard (Victor C. Vigeant) and the Superintendent (John F. Fanning.)

On that day, my daughter swam in the ocean for the first time and was not aware of the strength of the tide and cross-current. She was carried out and if it had not been for the prompt rescue of Mr. Vigeant, my daughter would certainly have lost her life.

I cannot express my sincere appreciation other than by saying that to your men of Hampton Beach belongs the credit for saving my daughter; I shall forever feel in your debt.

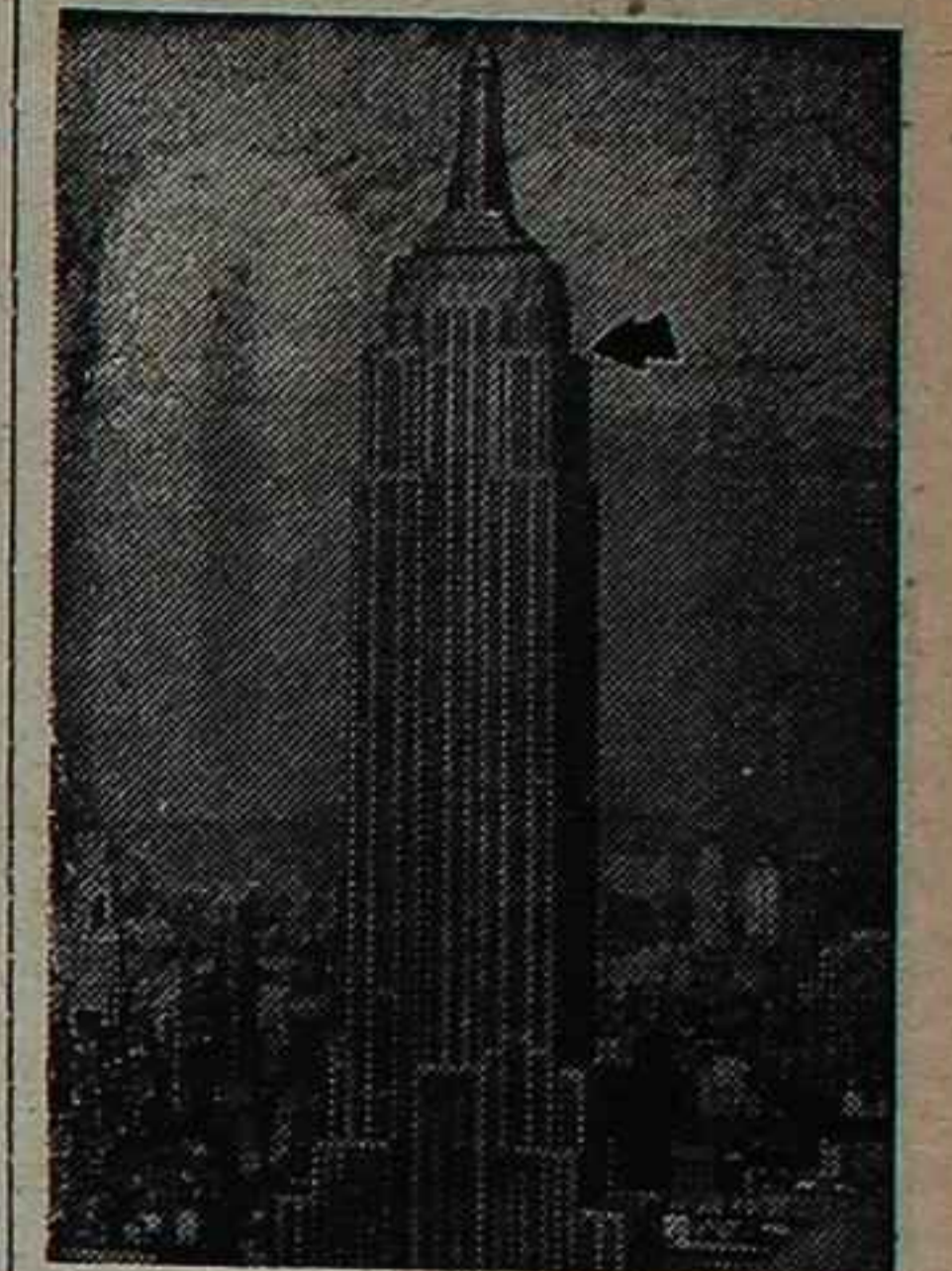

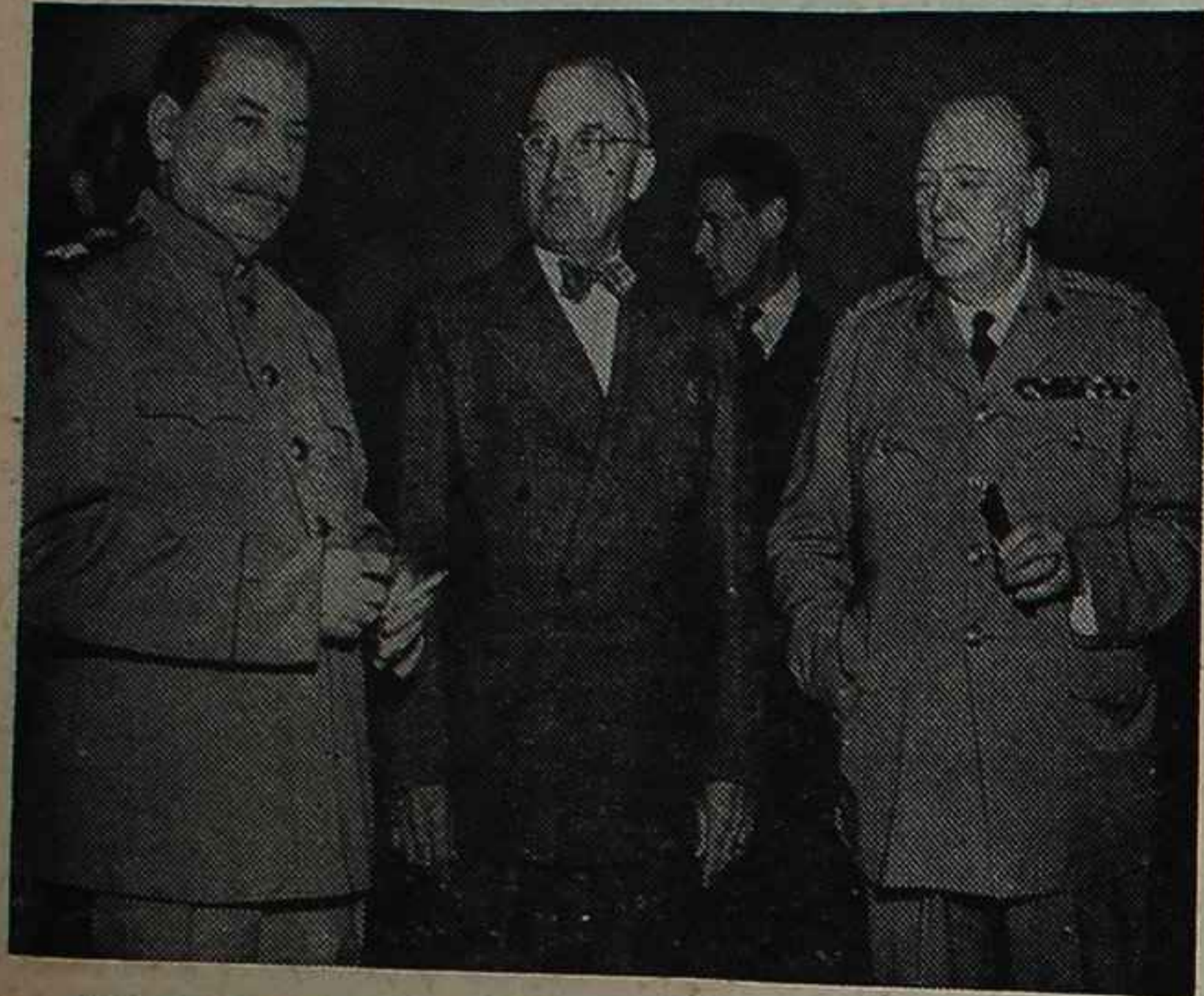

Hold Rites For Andrew H. Nutting

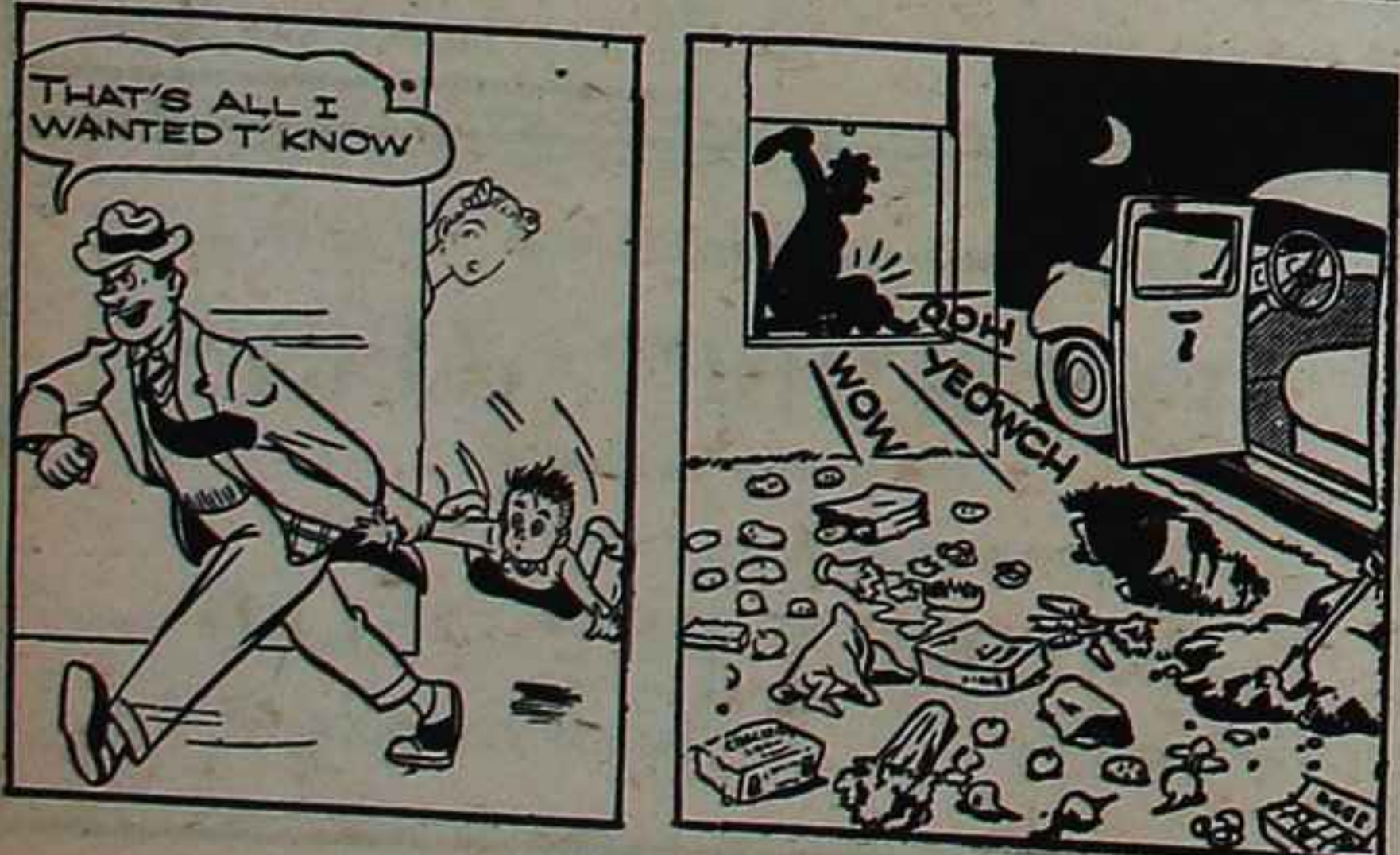

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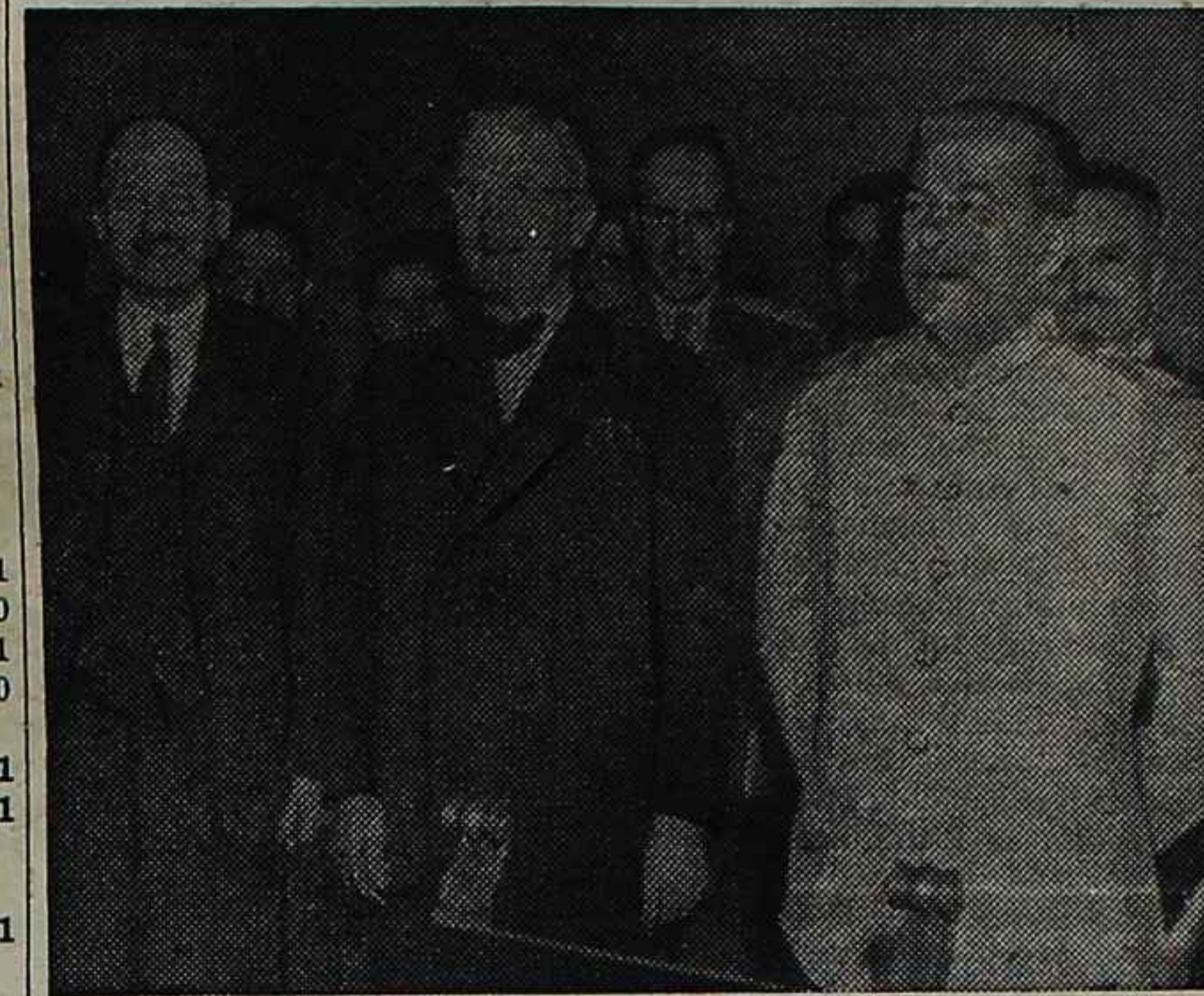

There's talk that Bronko Nagurski, the mighty back of college and professional football, will attempt a comeback this season with the Chicago Bears... he is 37... friends are urging him not to try it... it can't be done at his age, they say, and it would be better for fans to remember him in his great days... It's somewhat different in other sports, like baseball. Tony Cuccinello of the White Sox is 38, but he is now enjoying his best season in his 19 years of playing, batting above .300. Golf stars often keep going well in their later 30s, but not football players... or prizefighters.

Francisco Segura, the tennis marvel from Ecuador, wanted to be a bullfighter when a youth. Steve Roser of the Yankees has been accepted for the army... he is a righthand pitcher... the Yanks used him in only four games this season.

Nick Buzolich of Pepperdine college, Los Angeles, who ranks 13th in the nation as a tennis player, is also close to the top as a basketball center... he is 6 feet 7 inches tall... in a basketball game five years ago he scored 84 points. Some kind of record was hung up lately by Wendell ("Bill") Davis, Milwaukee Brewer pitcher... he won five straight games in eight days, four as relief man, and the other as starter. Charles Beaudry, Marquette U. won the national A.A.U. decathlon with 5,886 points. Charles Morgan of New Orleans L.A.S.A. was second with 5,850. The decathlon demands all-round

Diet for Hot Weather

By Dr. J. B. Warren



For hot weather eating starch and fat foods should be cut down as they are great heat producers. Foods to eat are meat or eggs in usual amounts to help build body tissues, and plenty of leafy vegetables — lettuce, cabbage, celery, cauliflower, watercress — which are bulky, "fill" the stomach and give a feeling of "fullness" that prevents over-eating. Also as they contain very little starch, 5 to 10 per cent, they do not heat up the body as do starchy vegetables. Fruits and fruit juices should be taken freely.

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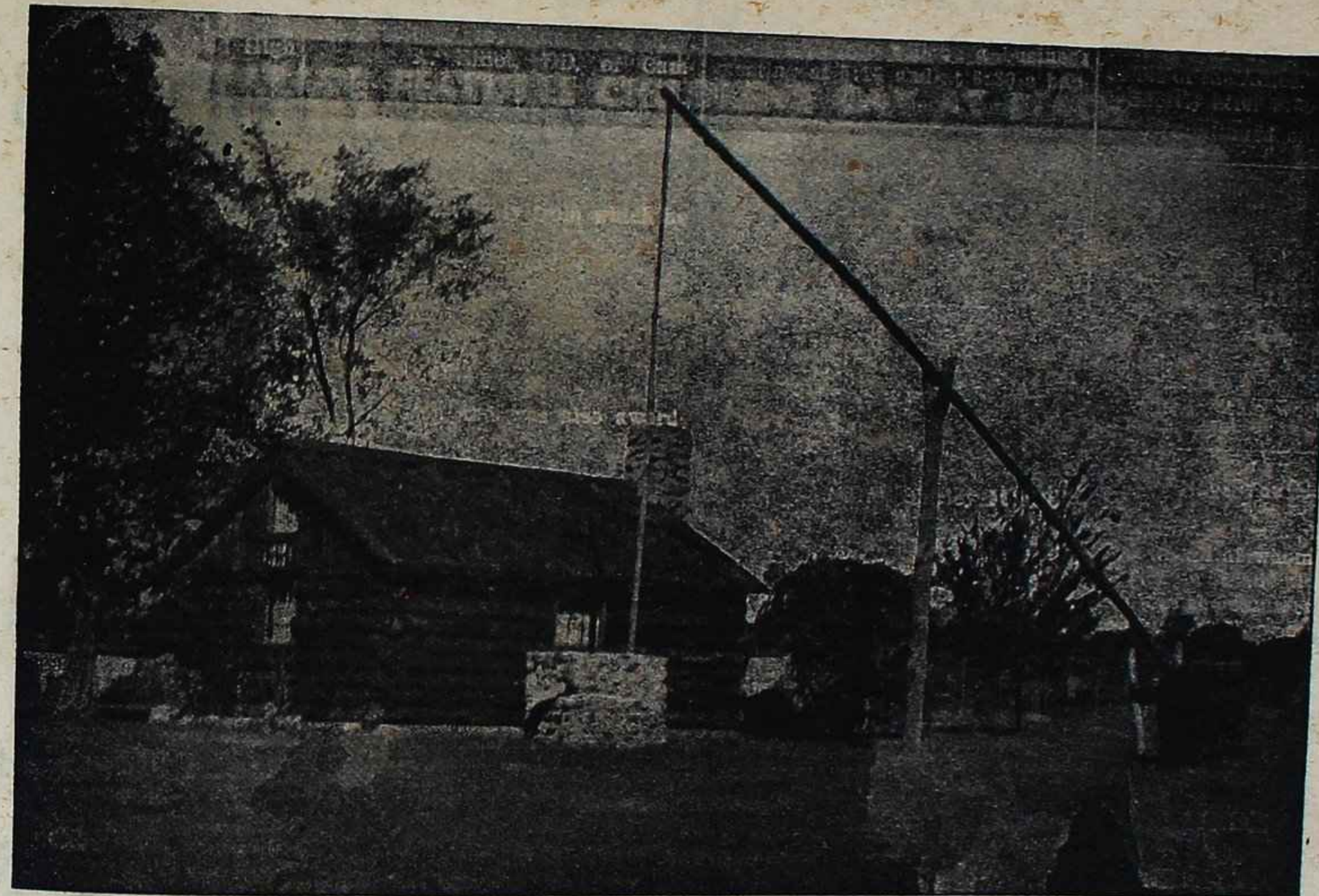
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
