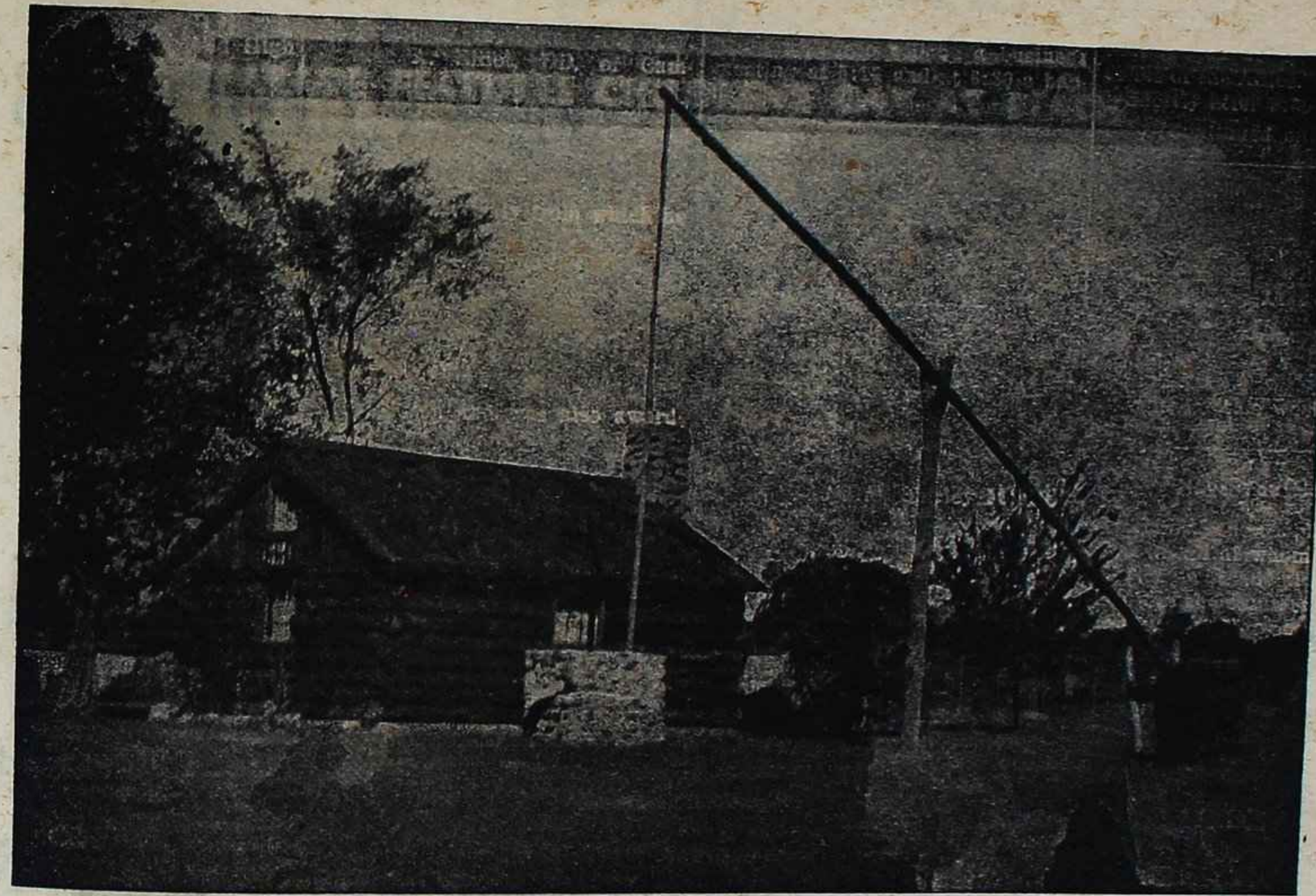

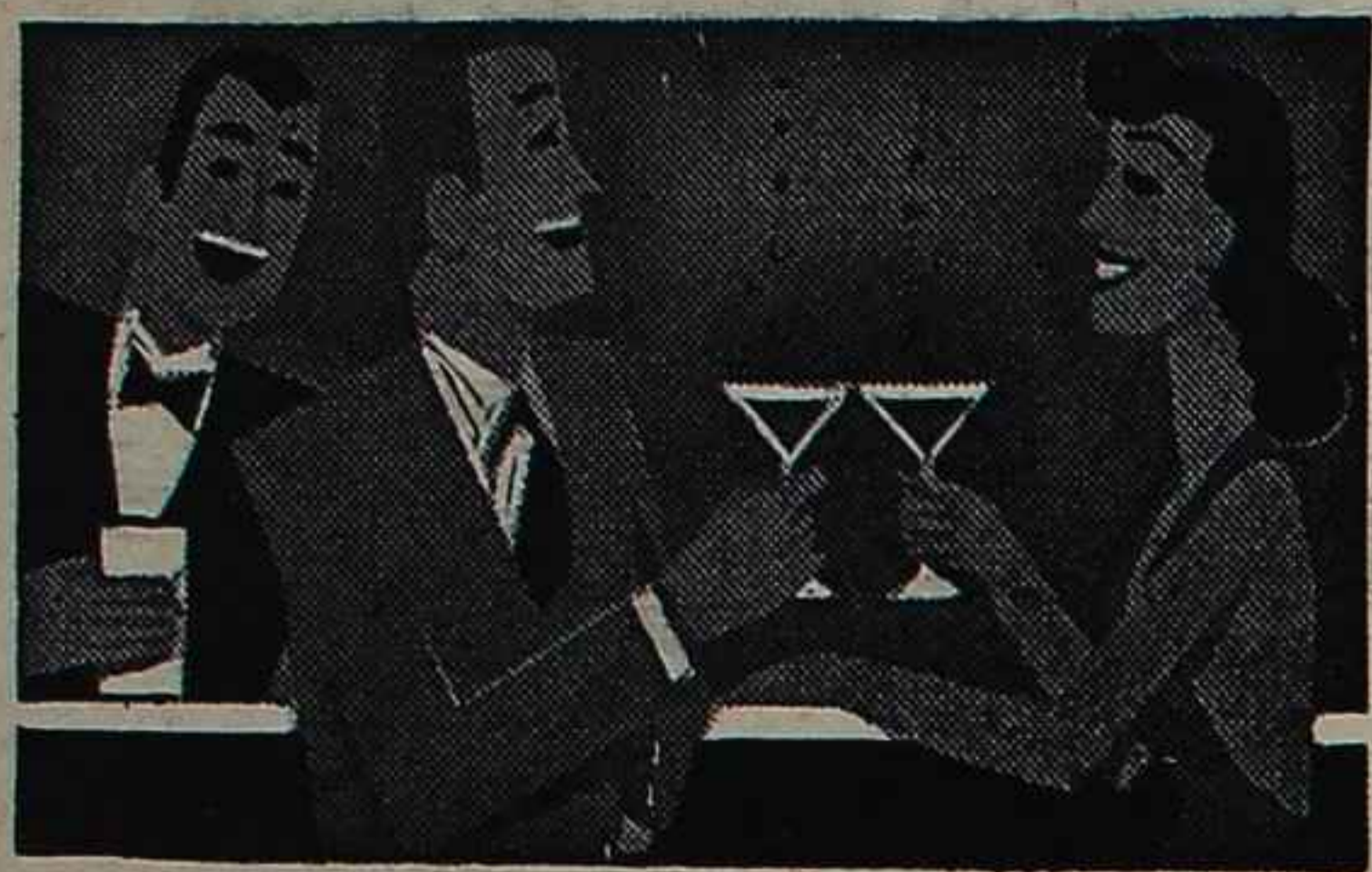

## Authorities Term Seabrook Beach Death An Accident

### Shirley Stickney Completes Cadet Nurse Training

Miss Shirley Winifred Stickney, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Stickney, Highland avenue, Hampton Beach, was graduated from the Elliot hospital in Manchester as a registered nurse on August 10. The graduation ceremony was held in the Grace church in Manchester with a reception following in the vestry.

Miss Stickney was graduated from Hampton Academy and High school in 1941 and took a post graduate course at that school in 1942. She entered the Elliot hospital as a cadet nurse in 1942.

### Crapo - Beaudette Nuptials August 4

Yvonne Beaudette of Leominster, Mass. and Robert M. Crapo, AMM 3/c, USNR, of Hyde Park, Mass., were married August 4 at a low mass at the church of Immaculate Conception in Westerly, R. I. After the ceremony, a reception was held with parents of both couples and close friends attending.

Mr. Crapo is stationed at the Naval Air Station at Charlestown, R. I. The couple will make their home temporarily in Westerly.

Sheriff Simes Frink stated Monday that the cause of the death of Patrick Cassidy, 63, of Lowell, Mass., found dead in Black Swamp creek, a quarter mile from Seabrook beach August 6 was from cerebral hemorrhage. Upon investigation Rockingham county authorities agree that if the man died from violence, then such an act occurred before Cassidy arrived in New Hampshire. All five persons who saw him on the evening preceding his death say that he appeared to be a very sick man. Sheriff Frink also stated that the case has been closed.

Medical Referee Dr. Wendell P. Clare of Portsmouth said that an autopsy indicated that the 63-year-old unmarried man had died from a brain hemorrhage which may have resulted from a natural cause or from a blow on his head.

The extent of injuries to the man's head indicate that he may have been clubbed to death or that after fainting spell, he fell off the bridge where he was sitting and his body struck the bridge abutment.

Upon investigation, Sheriff Simes Frink of Portsmouth states that he has talked to five people who saw Mr. Cassidy wandering around Seabrook for three hours Sunday in an apparently lazed condition. He was also seen on the Black Swamp creek between 8:40

### Four Fires Keep Firemen Busy Over Weekend

Four small fires, causing little damage, kept Hampton Beach firemen busy over the weekend. A fire on the Mile bridge at midnight on Friday and another on the bridge Saturday were soon extinguished. At noon on Saturday, a small blaze was caused by burning grease in the home of Mrs. Shirley Moulton on M street. Mrs. McCreely of Worcester, who is spending the summer on Q street, called the firemen to extinguish a fire caused by a flooded oil burner, Monday morning.

The crowd of an estimated 150,000 vacationists and weekenders at Hampton Beach calmly accepted the false announcement of the United Press that the war was over, Sunday night. Many of the people doubted the announcement and flocked to telephone booths, the Chamber of Commerce and to the Police station to affirm the rumor that spread like fire over the beach. A few horns were blown and a few people cheered. The concessions at the Casino closed immediately upon hearing the announcement over the radio at 9:34 P. M. that "Japan accepts the surrender terms of the Allies."

### Beach Couple Observe 48th Anniversary

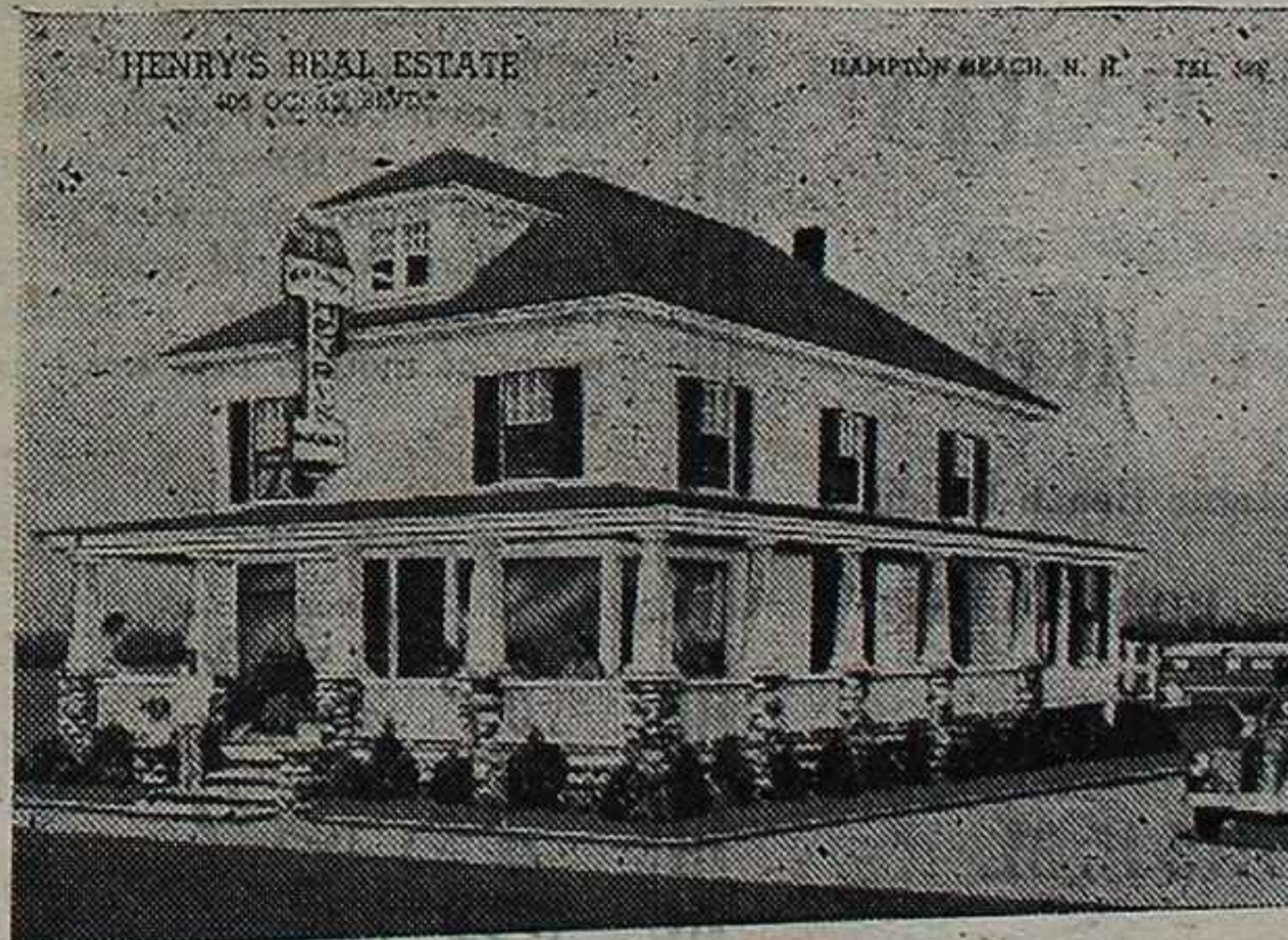

### READING & WRITING

You will not find the town of Barington, Arkansas, on any map, but it will be very real to you if you read Edward Wallace's novel, "Barington." There is no conventional plot in this story, but the superabundance of incident makes up for it, and the short stories hold plenty of intrigue and hilarity.

In the 1900's, the time of this story, Barington had a population of 1200 people. Sooner or later all of them dropped in at Tatum's Hardware Store—sometimes to buy something, just as often to chat with the genial proprietor, Bart MacKenzie.

Bart spurned ordinary salesmanship. When a customer asked his advice on a purchase, he might comment, "Well, if it was me, I'd rather have it and not need it, than need it and not have it." That was as far as he would go. He was a real diplomat, too, as evidenced by the time that the Burrows brothers father. They never knew that Bart was attempting to dissuade them, but nevertheless they left without the rope.

He loved people, but if they wanted to make fools of themselves, Bart wouldn't hinder them. No one enjoyed more than he the wrath of some of the town's more gullible citizens when a petition mysteriously started up advocating that the Panama Canal pass through Barington.

When young men went courting they bought brand-new buggies from Bart. When old women received their Civil War pension money, they might purchase a wonderful nickel-plated cookstove. By one means or another, Bart was kept informed of all the town's tragedies and joys.

Sergeant Joe McCarthy, editor of Yank, tells this story about the Army cartoonist, Bill Mauldin, author of "Up Front," a Book-of-the-Month Club choice. Mauldin's first cartoons appeared in a slim, paper-bound edition called "Mud, Mules and Mountains." A friend asked him to autograph three copies: "To Ike from Bill," "To Omar from Bill," and "To Harry from Bill." Mauldin obliged and forgot about the incident. A few weeks later, to his surprise and embarrassment, he received a letter from Dwight Eisenhower expressing his thanks for the book. The next mail brought similarly grateful notes from Omar Bradley and General Eisenhower's aide, Captain Harry Burcher.

pm and 9:00 pm Sunday, after that no one has reported seeing him.

Sheriff Frink's theory is that Mr. Cassidy was driving to North Hampton, N. H. to visit Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Monahan as was his weekly custom. He may have received a blow on the head by foul play or had a brain hemorrhage from natural causes or had an accident in his car causing the brain hemorrhage. He became nauseated and dazed by this condition and wandered around Seabrook for awhile and then went to the bridge to relieve himself

when he became nauseated. The fact that the man's upper false teeth set were in a death grip in his hand when he was found seems to bear out the theory that he fainted on the bridge while being sick and fell into the creek.

The body of Cassidy was found Monday afternoon in Black Swamp creek in several feet of water by two 12-year-old boys, Arthur Tyfe and Ronald Donaldson. The two boys who are vacationing at Seabrook and Salisbury beaches were in a boat close to the bridge over the creek leading from Seabrook to Seabrook Beach when they discovered the body fully-clothed in several feet of water.

The boys reported their discovery at a nearby cottage. Police Officer

Gynan Dow was sent to the scene of discovery, accompanied by the two boys. Officer Dow and Edwin Knowles of Water street were able to retrieve the body since it was ebb tide.

Dr. Clare and Sheriff Frink were called and identified the body by the driving license and registration found on the person of the dead man.

The condition of the body indicated that it had not been in the water many hours. There was no water in the man's lungs showing that he was not drowned. Autopsy showed a fracture of the frontal bone of the skull, resulting in a cerebral hemorrhage to cause death. The right jaw was dislocated and the tendon of the right arm was torn from the shoulder socket.

More than \$100 was found on Cassidy's person and his automobile was found only a short distance away smeared with a streak of white paint. The door handle was also broken off, which leads the Rockingham sheriff to believe that it was while Cassidy was driving, that he became ill.

Cassidy was a native of Ireland and had been in this country about 30 years. He was employed for a number of years as fireman and a handy man at Bethany convent in Framingham, Mass.

He is survived by a sister, Mrs. Agnes Blake of East Pepperell, Mass. The body was sent from Portsmouth to Lowell, Mass., for funeral services August 9. A high mass of requiem was sung that morning at St. Peter's church in Lowell and burial was in St. Patrick's cemetery there.

Seriously Hurt From Fall Into Dry Well Friday

After a three hour search, Hampton Fireman Felch discovered Mr. Patterson at the foot of a dry well near his house on Winnacumet road. The elderly man, who has been ill for a long while suffered severe shock and sustained numerous abrasions and bruises about his hands, arms and face. Dr. C. B. Bailey was called to attend and had him sent to the Exeter hospital.

Hampton Army Nurse Completes Course In France

Paris, France—Captain Elizabeth H. Hay of Dearborn avenue, Hampton, Chief Nurse of the 107th Evacuation Hospital, has recently completed a special course of instruction at the newly opened Medical Service School Center at LeMarais. The classes held in the historic LeMarais chateau built in 1770 include courses in technical and military nursing practice which is intended to qualify Captain Hay as a unit instructor for the technical training of Army nurses and Medical Department enlisted men.

The curriculum includes: nursing care of battle casualties, combat exhaustion, nursing in the tropics, military intelligence, epidemiology, military sanitation, nutrition, chemical warfare and its medical aspects, physical education, hospital administration and supervision, nursing reports and records, care and maintenance of equipment and medical supplies, current events and orientation.

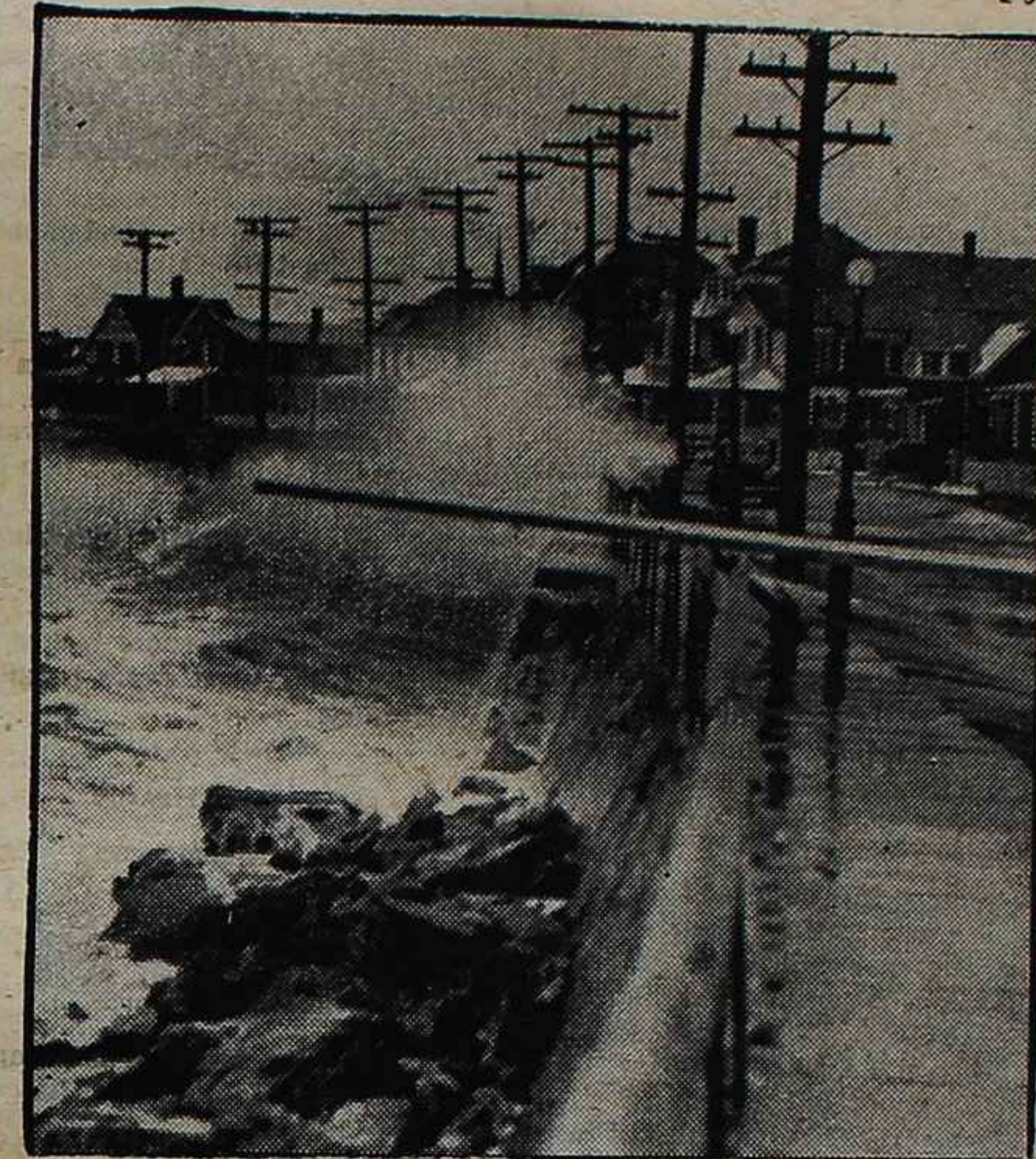
