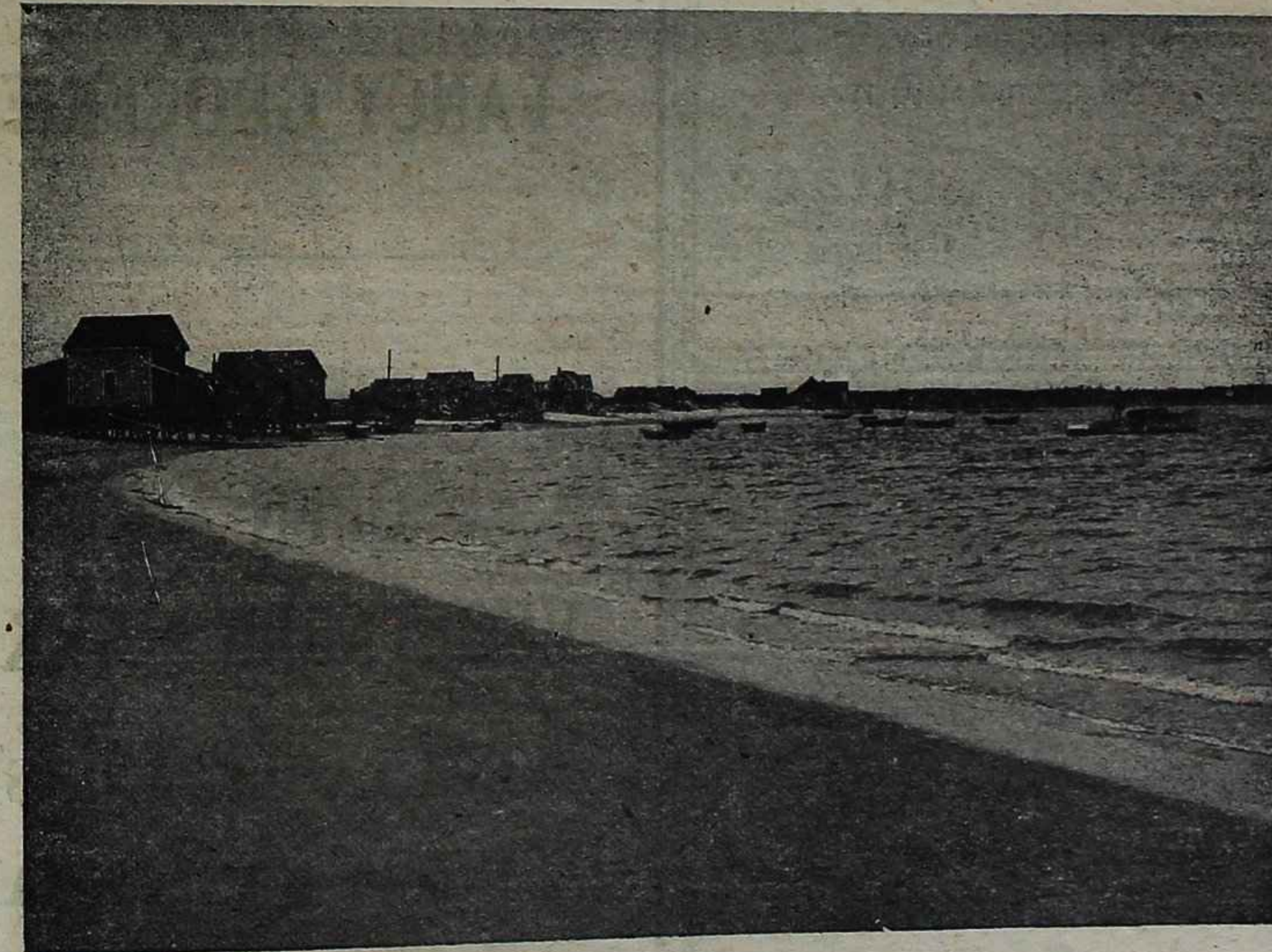

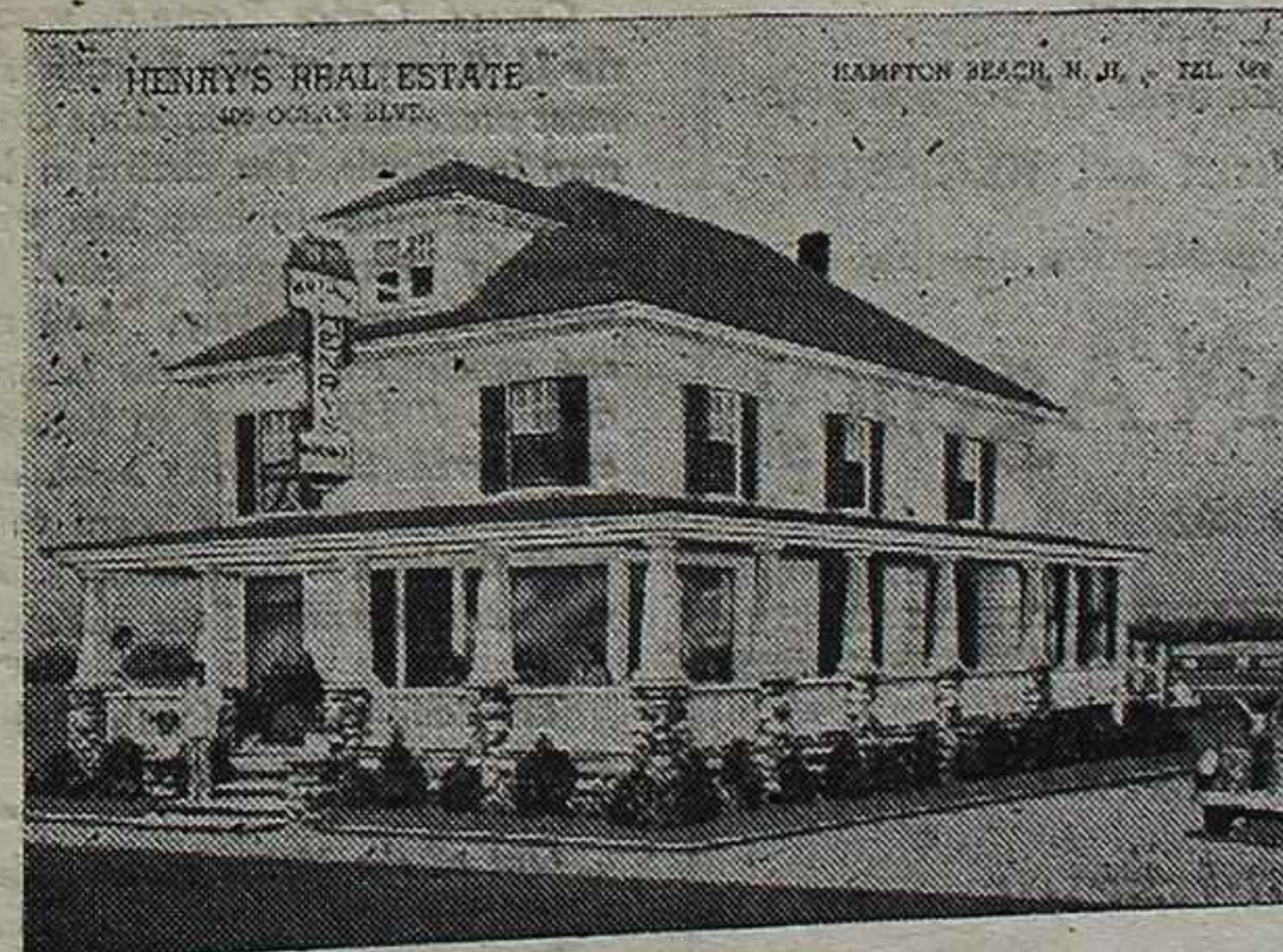

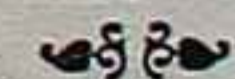

READING & WRITING

TYPEWRITERS were a rarity in the days of Leo Tolstoy; the great master wrote all of his extensive works in longhand. His handwriting was almost indecipherable; his wife was the only person who could make it out. It was her lot to copy in her own neat handwriting everything he did. Usually, he would so revise her copy that it had to be re-done. In the case of his major opus, "War and Peace," Countess Tolstoy made no less than seven copies.

This remarkable example of wifely devotion is described in Tikhon Polner's biography, "Tolstoy and His Wife," a discerning portrait of one of the most important men of his age. Tolstoy was a complicated character, whose moods varied from extreme gaiety to moroseness. In his youth, he gambled away most of his family estate. He was celebrated as a writer before he was twenty-seven. Always he was passionately intense about whatever he undertook, whether it was farming, following the rituals of the Orthodox Church, or devoting himself to a simple life. The Countess once remarked, "I have lived with Leo for forty-eight years but I never really learned what kind of man he was."

General Carlos Romulo, who made a two-year speaking tour of the U. S., says in "My Brother Americans" that he received one of his most successful introductions from a chairman in Illinois. The chairman took a full fifteen minutes to heap him with embarrassingly extravagant praise. Then he wound up impressively, "And now, ladies and gentlemen, I have the honor to introduce . . ." He turned to Romulo and his eyes glazed. Swallowing hard, he said in a whisper that could be heard to the highest rows in the gallery, "Say, what the heck is your name?" "By the time we got through laughing," comments Romulo, "the audience and I were old friends."

One of the Maine backwoods characters Helen Hamlin describes in "Nine Mile Bridge" is an old timekeeper for a lumbering camp, whose job it was to keep the books and sell company supplies to the men. He could neither read nor write, but he solved his problem most ingeniously. When he sold two plugs of tobacco or a pair of socks, he drew pictures of these articles in the ledger. Then he only had to remember the name of the man who bought them and what he paid for them.

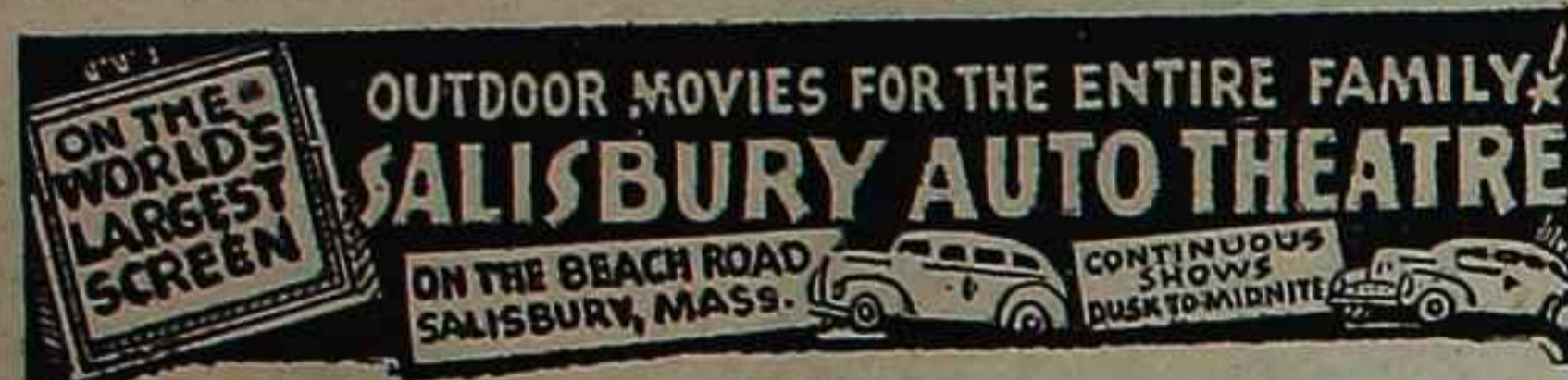

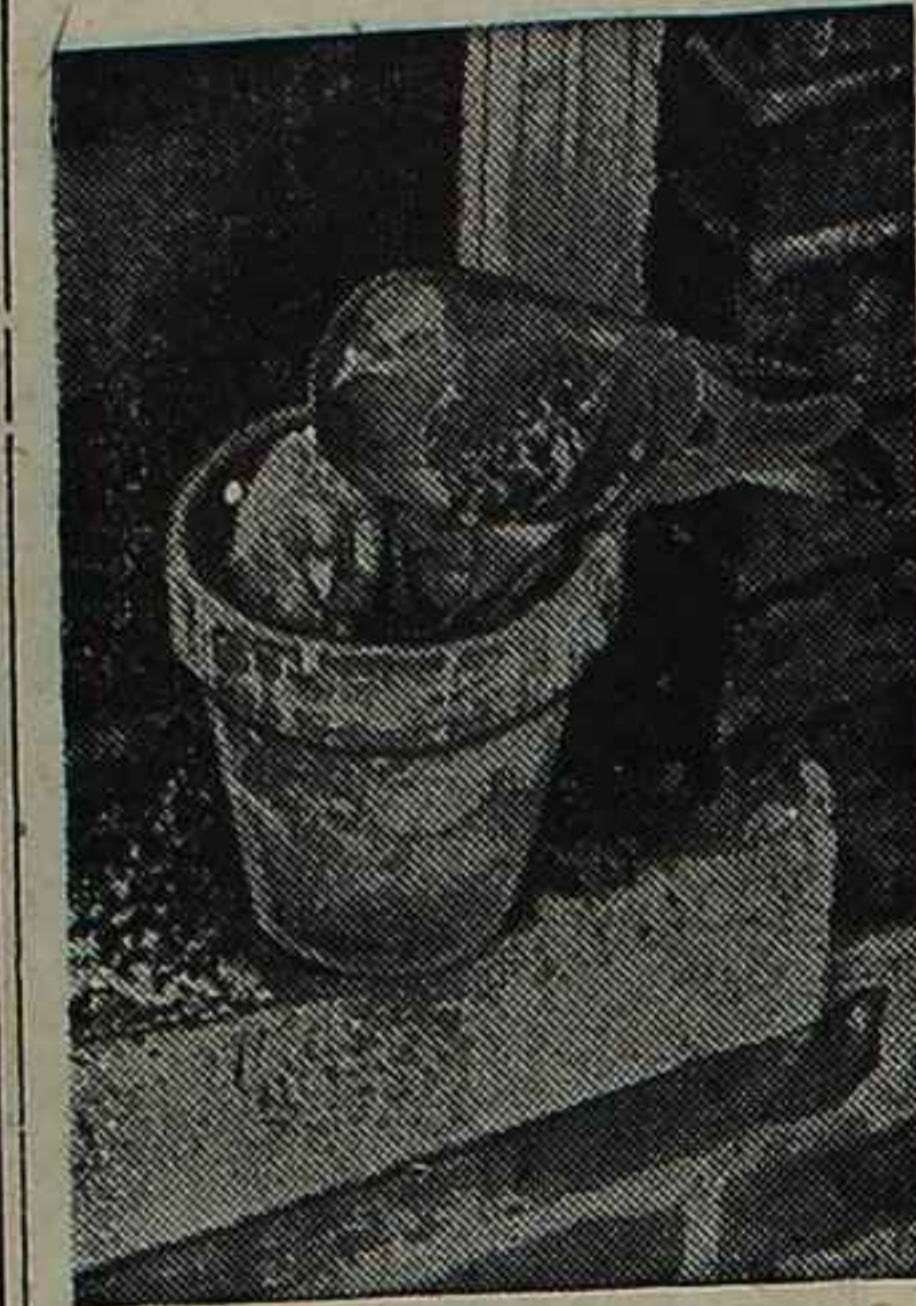

War Fund Drive Unaltered By End Of Jap War

Major John P. Carleton, President of New Hampshire War Chest, Inc., states that the National Headquarters of the National War Fund has announced that there will be no change in the national and state budgets for the coming War Fund Drive. The end of the Japanese war, unfortunately, has not terminated the emergency relief needs for which money is solicited in the National War Fund drive. The various war relief agencies which have been beneficiaries of the fund in the past will mostly continue to have emergency requirements for assistance and the highest value of National War Fund money is that it can be used at once to meet emergency needs.

The relief of the distressed population of the Philippines Islands is a particular obligation on the peo-

ple of this country, and with the opening of China there will be literally millions who will require assistance. Although the Armed Forces are to be drastically curtailed during the period of redeployment and demobilization, the troops will have much idle time on their hands. Both they and the occupation forces will have a greater need than ever for the services of the USO through its clubs and camp shows.

This is the final campaign of the National War Fund. The 115 million dollar quota (of which New Hampshire has \$514,575) will carry all the agencies through the balance of 1945 and all of 1946 with provision for any necessary carry over in 1947.

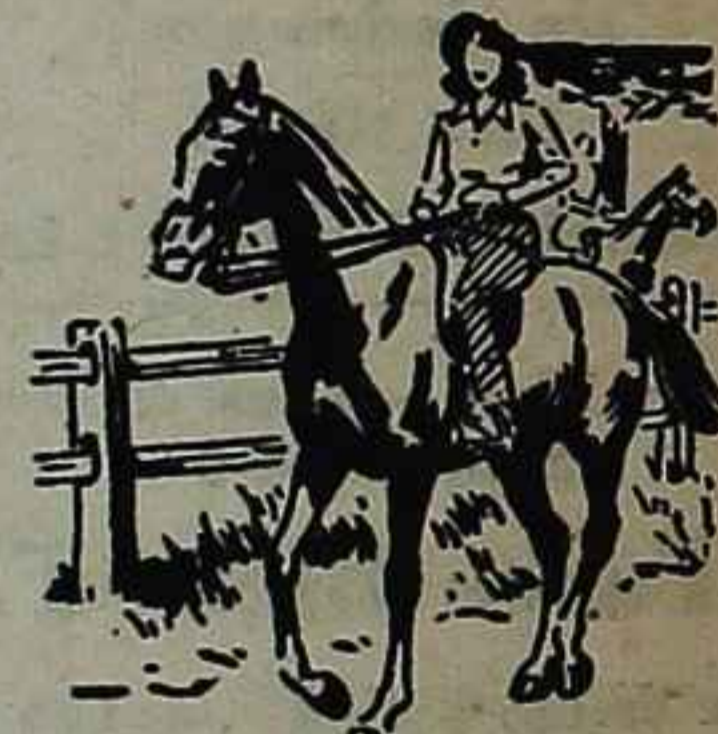

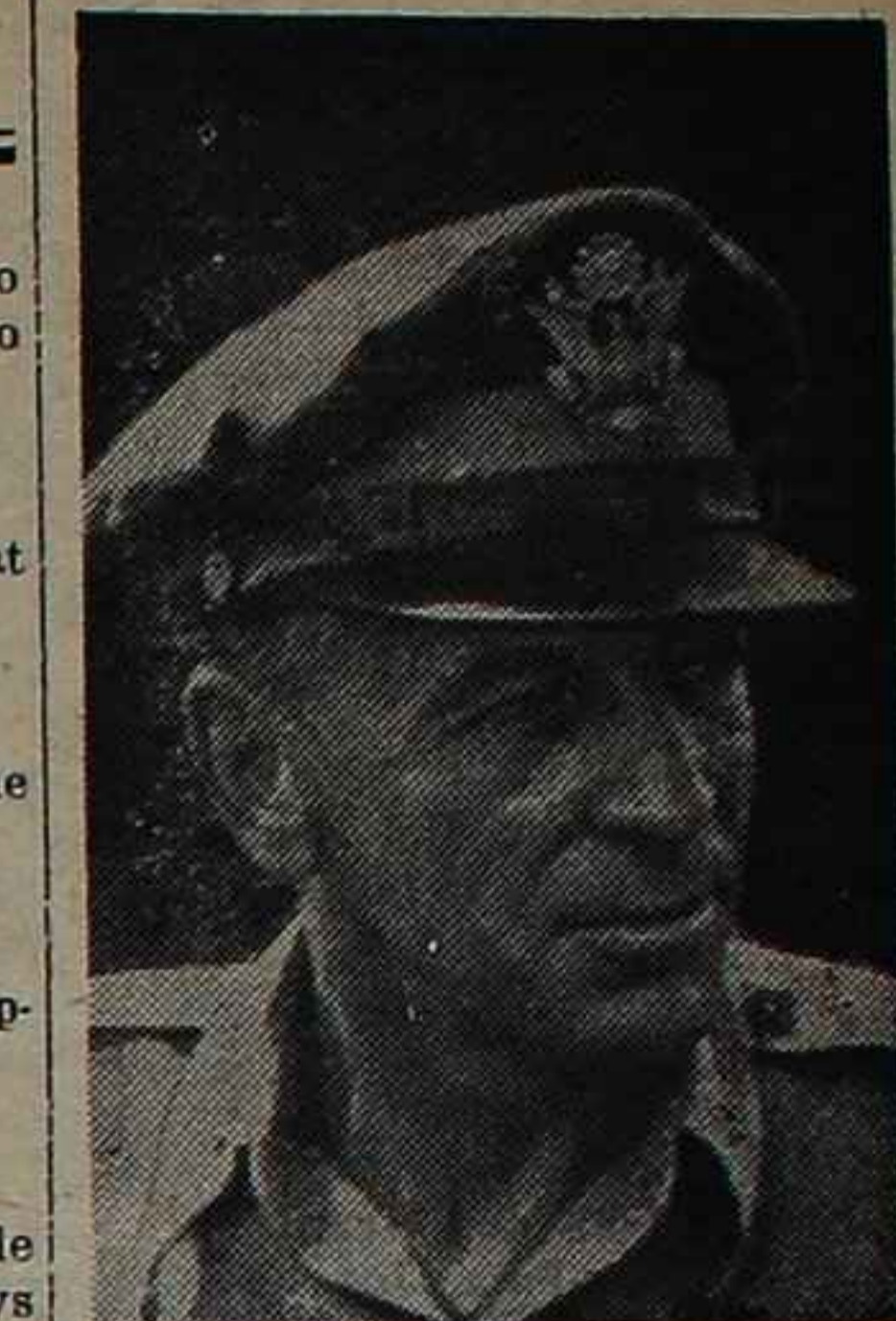

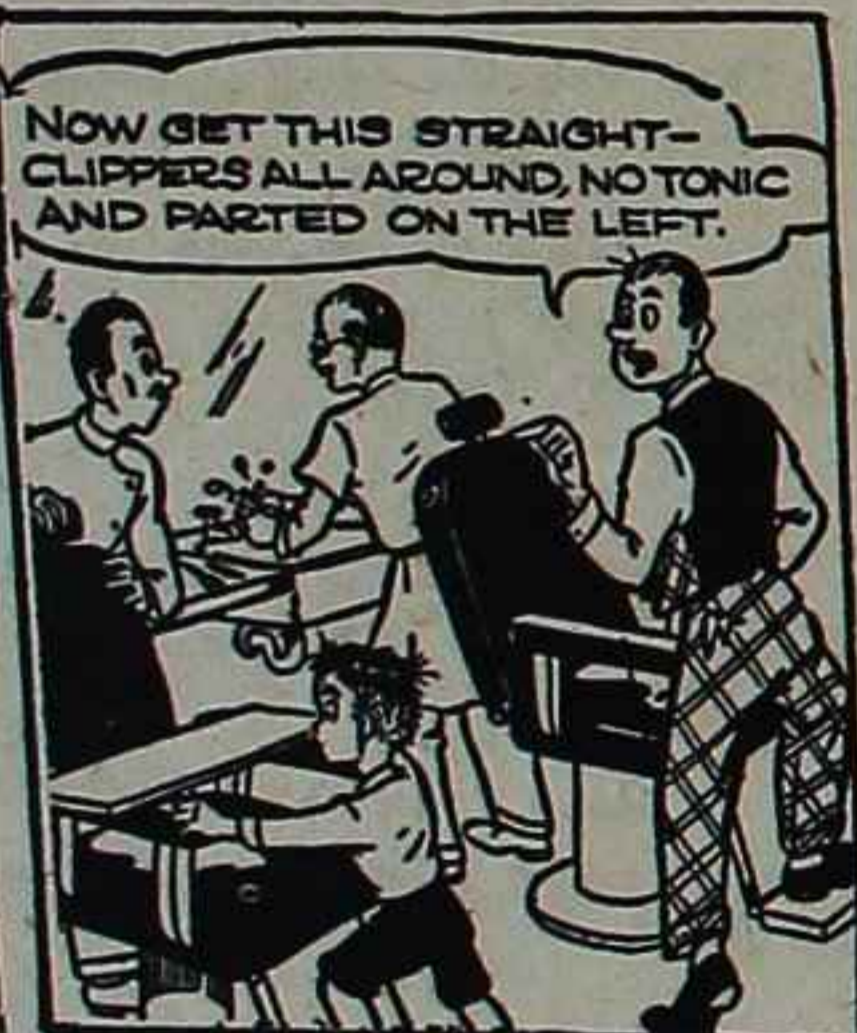

Information and suggestions have been secured and given, he said to the State Commission to assist them in the formulation of an airport and airway pattern for the state which is to be included in a composite New England regional map as well as in the national pattern.

The report also said that the committee on fisheries research has given consideration to marine resources and has endeavored to arouse interest in the proper protection and development of these resources. The committee also supported the measure which now prohibits the netting of striped bass. Dean C. F. Jackson of the University of New Hampshire at the request of the association, prepared a report on the utilization of marine resources of New Hampshire which was published by the Biological Institute of the State University, said Mr. Redden.
