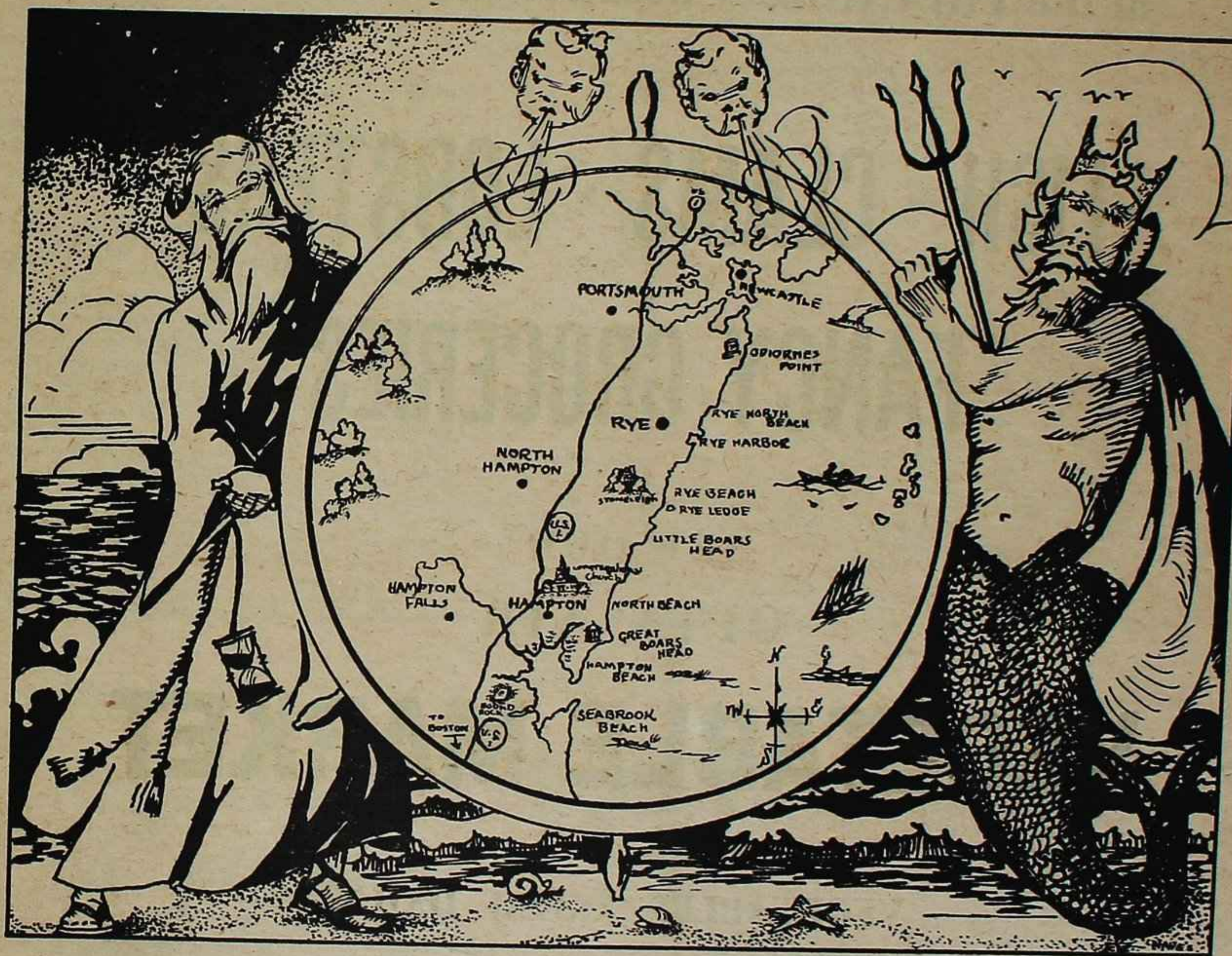

## Governor Dale Predicts Banner Beach Season

### New Telephone Center Will Facilitate Long Distance Calls

### Ideal Weather Brings Throngs For Weekend

With the official beginning of summer last Friday perfect weather arrived hereabouts just in time to draw one of the largest crowds so far this season to Hampton Beach for the weekend.

A bright, hot sun and a cool east breeze combined to give weekenders the relaxation they were seeking—plus many fine cases of sunburn which were definitely not on their schedule.

Despite the heavy flow of traffic on all highways, Chief of Police Jerome Harkness reported only one accident at the beach. Gary Sullivan, 19, of Epping road, Exeter, was reported to have been struck by a car operated by Ralph I. Rowell, also of Exeter, as he was crossing Ocean Boulevard near the Hotel Kentville.

Police said Sullivan was carried almost 25 feet on the hood of the Rowell machine. He was later removed to the Exeter hospital for treatment of multiple cuts and abrasions, but his condition was not considered serious.

Hampton Beach this summer will have an added public convenience in a Telephone Center at 131 Ocean Boulevard, at which persons may have not only the privacy of booths but the assistance of trained attendants in making telephone calls.

The Center, it was announced today by Daniel J. O'Brien, Jr., local manager of the New England Telephone and Telegraph company, will be opened on or about July 1, upon completion of finishing touches to furnishings and equipment. It will be under the immediate supervision of Miss Dorothy S. Hodgdon, assistant chief operator of the Newburyport telephone office.

Patterned after telephone centers for servicemen which the Telephone company operated in cities and training camps during the war, the Hampton Beach center will be equipped with fourteen booth telephones connected to a switchboard on the premises. It will also have a library of telephone directories covering many New England cities and towns and other places elsewhere in the United States. From the switchboard, at which seven attendants may work at one time when necessary, connection can be made to any points persons may wish to call.

### Many Property Changes Bring Many New Faces

With the wild rush of the proverbial colt turned loose, the air started humming months ago, when the barriers of wartime uncertainty were lowered and Hampton Beach was prematurely awakened from its winter slumber.

In this post-war period, with that driving force of making up for lost time, tremendous changes have taken place. Up until a week ago, all through the still days there could be heard the echoes of hammers, saws, trucks, and the general confusion that goes with pre-season preparations. Not only have new buildings and businesses been started but old establishments have changed hands and many new names are on the roster. Here and there you see a name or a face which you had associated with an entirely different spot last year. Perhaps a little get-acquainted outline would help to straighten things out.

One of last year's men, Clarence T. Rocheford of Worcester, Mass., who took over Coleman's on the

Nearly 400 persons attended the annual banquet of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce and Village Precinct last Friday evening at the Ashworth by the Sea and heard Gov. Charles M. Dale predict that "Hampton Beach would enjoy a banner season."

Speaking before one of the largest crowds ever to attend this annual affair, Gov. Dale pointed out that "the results from the state's advertising campaign so far this year have been five to six times greater than the whole of last year." The governor also cited aviation as one of the principal challenges to the state's recreational industry. He stated that with the growth of airports all over the country, New Hampshire will have to compete with distant points for the recreational business.

Gov. Dale also pointed out that this season offers a challenge to every business man. He said that hotels and tourist homes should cooperate in offering their facilities to the vacationists.

Ray L. Goding, president of the Chamber of Commerce extended a welcome to all those present and William Elliot acted as master of ceremonies.

**Beach Panorama**

Perhaps this is a bad time to ask if you're enjoying the sun. Probably you and Sol have had a rather painful beginning together. But, if you're looking for a remedy, here is one of the best methods of taking some of the sting out of that potential tan.

Go down to the Hampton River. Walk, ride, swim, or fly—but get there somehow, for there the sun shines with malice toward none. When that ball of fire is on the job, the river is one of his favorite hangouts. And it will be one of yours, too, once you see the peace-

ful beauty of it and find that there, another world exists. See it at dawn when the sun slowly comes to greet it, and at high noon when it is brilliantly displayed. But, the most wonderful time is at the end of the day when the whole river is covered by every color in creation and you can reach out and touch the sunset!

A sight as old and unchanging as the seagulls on the rocks, and that refreshing wind that can come only from the east, is the river, gently nudging the many boats that catch the white sun rays and throw them off like so many 4th of July sparklers.

In that world of shining boats, occasional slapping of oars, whirring of motors, and flapping of sails—there live a people, who, away from their work, are like ourselves, but, who, at work, seem a little foreign to us because they understand and love what is a mystery to so many.

Looking down from the bridge on the hardy little fleet, one boat will stand out—one, larger than the rest. This is the "Art-Mar," a 40-footer, with passenger capacity of 35.

There have been many "Art-Mars," one succeeding another and all made by the captain, himself, Arthur L. Greene, a resident of 30 years, some of which were spent fishing and lobstering, and since 1935, catering to summer visitors who want to try their skill at getting the record "catch" or who want a fish-eye view of the beaches along our coast.

Next to his N street home, which is kept cozy and immaculate by his wife, Martha, stands a huge building with especially made, removable doors. Through these doors every spring or two, comes a trim new boat, expertly made by Mr. Greene, who, up to the present, has 22 to his credit. Several of the craft you see in the harbor were made by him for other fishermen. The "Art-Mar" (Arthur and Martha, of course) makes two trips of four hours each, daily, and now that the war is over, she is once

again heading for the Isles of Shoals since it is no longer restricted.

Mrs. Greene, who could handle the "Art-Mar" as well as her captain can, has her housework all finished and dinner for themselves and their beautiful cat all ready before it's time for the 1:30 trip every day. The morning trips are usually more popular with the men who really want to fish, but the women turn out in the afternoon and that's when the captain's lady is on deck for she believes that the

women enjoy themselves more, if there's a little feminine moral support — and, at times, feminine shoulder support.

By way of variety, and, indeed, along the starting line, Smith and Gilmore have added to their 28 row boats, a flashing speed-boat and a sturdy sea-plane, the latter piloted by two veterans, Bob Melers and Conny DeValk.

For 18 years Mrs. Gilmore has been arranging cruises and deep sea fishing trips and renting boats and fishing tackle to those who like to go out by themselves.

From the first of May to about the first of November, she and her father, Nelson L. Smith, and her brother, Nelson, Jr., are busy every minute and this year there will be more activity added to the list, as they have taken over the Yacht Club. After years of experience with women (and men) "land lubbers," they have fixed up the club for those who want to be comfortable while they wait for the ships to come in.

For one who thinks that all captains have to be at least middle-aged, a surprise is in store for your first meeting with Capt. Bob Ring, as he comes out of the compact cabin of his "Mabo." A young, deeply tanned fellow, his specialty is tuna fishing. Twelve water years have been chalked up to him here, in the Navy, and along the Florida coast.

Captain Ring can tell you where practically every kind of fish lives along the coast and his description of tuna fishing, as he sits at the pier in his swivel chair and outlines the procedure, is realistic enough to make you think that one of the dories tied up at the dock is a 400 pounder waiting to be pulled in. Although from his stories, you realize that even a junior tuna doesn't wait to be pulled in. He can tell you about men and women who have fought longer than the average five or six hours to bring

one in—and of a few who have gone in to meet King Tuna.

He expects to see a lot of tuna tussling this season, and then will head the "Mabo" southward and take her back to Florida.

The call of the ocean was so insistent that Captain Fred Williams gave up being a life guard and now devotes all his time to his 21-year-old business.

boulevard last year, has been replaced there by Roger Lamber of Manchester. The store next to it, Warner's Candies, was known as Rocheford's arcade. Mr. Rocheford is now owner of the former Byron's Garage on Marsh avenue.

Next to the garage is one of the beach's most popular spots, the Ferncroft bowling alleys, which James Eastman of Hampton sold to Harry F. McLane of Exeter. The building also houses six apartments.

On the same block, the attractive Standish Hotel and Gift Shop has been sold by John C. Percival of Lowell and St. Petersburg, to Leo T. Mower, proprietor of the Lobster Pot. Farther up the block, is the William James Restaurant, owned by William Swartzwelder and James Foley and last operated by Russ Cuddy of Lawrence as the Cozy Corner.

Hotels and rooming houses probably underwent the greatest changes, some of them, with their new owners, being: The Langley, B street, Edward Conlon, Lynn, Mass.; The Hillcrest, Ocean boulevard, Mrs. Louis Winkler, Exeter; The Somerset, K street, Mr. and Mrs. Burdette Partin, Manchester, N. H.; Seven Gables, Ocean boulevard, J. W. Hollis, Cropsyville, N. Y.; Holliday House, Highland avenue, Charles Laurent, Troy, N. Y.; Thee U and I, now called "Glamour Manor," North Shore boulevard, Charles Marvin, Boston; Ken and Ken Annex, Ocean avenue, Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Johnson, Exeter; The Penobscot, Ocean boulevard,

Going down to the Casino, many changes are to be found. On top of this, he finds time to gather in a few fish himself—no mean example being the 700 pound tuna and 47 pound cod he landed by hand, not however, both in the same day. He has come unpleasantly close to several romping whales and is very adept at putting a quick distance between the "Ny-

oka" and those 60 or 70 foot moving islands.

Probably one of the most qualified persons to write a book on the life of the lobster, is Ed Brabant who has lived with and learned to really understand them during his years at the N. H. Lobster Co., which is just back of the Yacht Club.

With his son, Robert, to assist him, and three or four others during the summer, Mr. Brabant has a truly marvelous system at work there.

Into six huge tanks, a pump pours a steady flow of water direct from the ocean and, every so often

during the day, the lobstermen dump great baskets of pushing and shoving lobsters into these vats. No two look alike—size varying from the minimum legal length of 3 3/4" to the biggest possible. By means of a brass gage, over 100 questionable ones are measured daily. Recently, the crowd was joined by one weighing 9 lbs., 2 oz. If a "short" should be brought in, it is immediately thrown back to grow up. Actually, a lobster is 5 or 6 years old before it's legal to take it, and many of them live to be 25 years old.

While they're in the tanks, life goes on much the same for them. Large pieces of fish are thrown in for them to eat—which they do without any coaxing. They resent strangers moving in on them. They seem to have just become adjusted to their new surroundings and become acquainted with one another when a new lot comes in and then the fight starts. The old crowd bunch up together and fight until they realize that nothing can be done about the intrusion—or until they're calmed down by the master letting the water out of the tanks for a few minutes. Even though their claws are all pegged, they can still do a great deal of

damage. Very often two rivals have a vicious fight and when one is really down, several others might jump on him, and, if they're particularly hungry, might nibble on him.

It's interesting to see the "infirmary." This is a tank set aside for the cripples. This is for the lobsters that are minus claws, and here they rest up while they're growing new ones.

Although it isn't right to show favoritism, it's probably only natural that Mr. Brabant should have a pet. You wouldn't blame him, either, once you saw the delicately shaded fawn colored lobster that eats clams out of his hand. This little one (that hasn't been named yet) has taken the place of last year's pet, Jeannie, who froze to death last fall.

This current friendship sprang up suddenly one day when Mr. Brabant held a clam over the water and the fair-shelled one shyly reached up, took it, and scurried to a corner to eat it. Before long she was lunching in his hand and was reported to be less crowded tank where she became quite exclusive, always trying to stay by herself. She seems to know she is admired and when picked up, strikes a languorous pose.

Day after day she lolls around, watching her room-mates taken away by customers or being put into the large boiler. From there, many of them, on order, are taken to a small room where the delicious meat is taken out.

It's fun to spend a little time at the Lobster Pound. It's almost like catching your own lobster to be able to pick him out yourself.

It's worth your while to get to know these men and women who live on and near the water. From dawn to dusk they are calmly and with wholehearted enjoyment, making their living. All have one thing in common—a philosophy of life that seems to reflect the water that surrounds them; and understanding that, just as the tide goes out and comes in, so does life go on day after day, with the essentials—the simple things never changing.

The center has been attractively decorated and furnished to provide for the comfort and convenience of patrons. The furnishings include a lounge for those who for any reason have to wait longer than normally for the completion of calls. When connections are ready for persons so waiting they will be notified by the attendants and directed to the proper booth.

The hours that the center will be open each day will depend upon public usage as determined by experience. It is possible that a force of twenty attendants may be required to cover the center at all hours it may be in demand. At such times as the center is not open, a public telephone in a booth accessible from just outside the main entrance will be available.

Twelve of the attendants will be Hampton High school girls from junior and senior classes. With the

cooperation of Roy W. Gillmore, superintendent of schools, and Bruce Russell, high school principal, these girls have been trained at school by experienced telephone operators during the past five weeks.

The local girls were trained on a double unit switchboard set up in the high school, operating two shifts daily under the instruction of two chief operators. The following girls were accepted by the telephone company for the new center at the beach:

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**UNH Writers'  
 Conference To Be  
 Held August 12-23**

Durham, N. H., June 20—For the ninth consecutive summer, the University of New Hampshire Writers' Conference will bring a special staff of distinguished American writers together from August 12 to 23, it was announced here today by Carrol S. Towle, associate professor English at UNH and chairman of the conference.

Members of the staff have been engaged because of their varied experiences in writing and will appear as leaders, not as formal teachers. The 1946 staff includes Millen Brand, whose "The Outward Room" was a best-seller and a Book-of-the-Month selection; Robert P. Tristram Coffin, Pulitzer Prize winner in poetry, author of novels, essays, criticism, and biography, and professor of English at Bowdoin College; and Rolfe Humphries, poet, translator, critic, and anthologist.

Others on the staff are John Gould, author of the current best-

seller "Farmer Takes a Wife" and publisher of the weekly newspaper, "The Lisbon (Maine) Enterprise"; Loyd Haberly, maker of books from text to binding, and author of "Silent Fame", his most recent collection of poems; Barbara Frost, writer of publicity and active editorial reader for J. B. Lippincott's.

Marjorie Fischer, novelist, short-story writer, and editor with Rolfe Humphries of the Anthology "Pause to Wonder" and a forthcoming collection to be entitled "Strange to Tell"; Edmund Cortez, professor of speech and radio at the university; William Harris, head of the Writers' Counsel Service in Cambridge, Mass.; Ella Shannon Bowles, author of fiction and non-fiction, including "Let Me Show You New Hampshire"; Dorothy S. Towle, historian, editor, and writer of articles; J. Donald Batcheller, playwright and dramatic director at the university; and Professor Towle.
