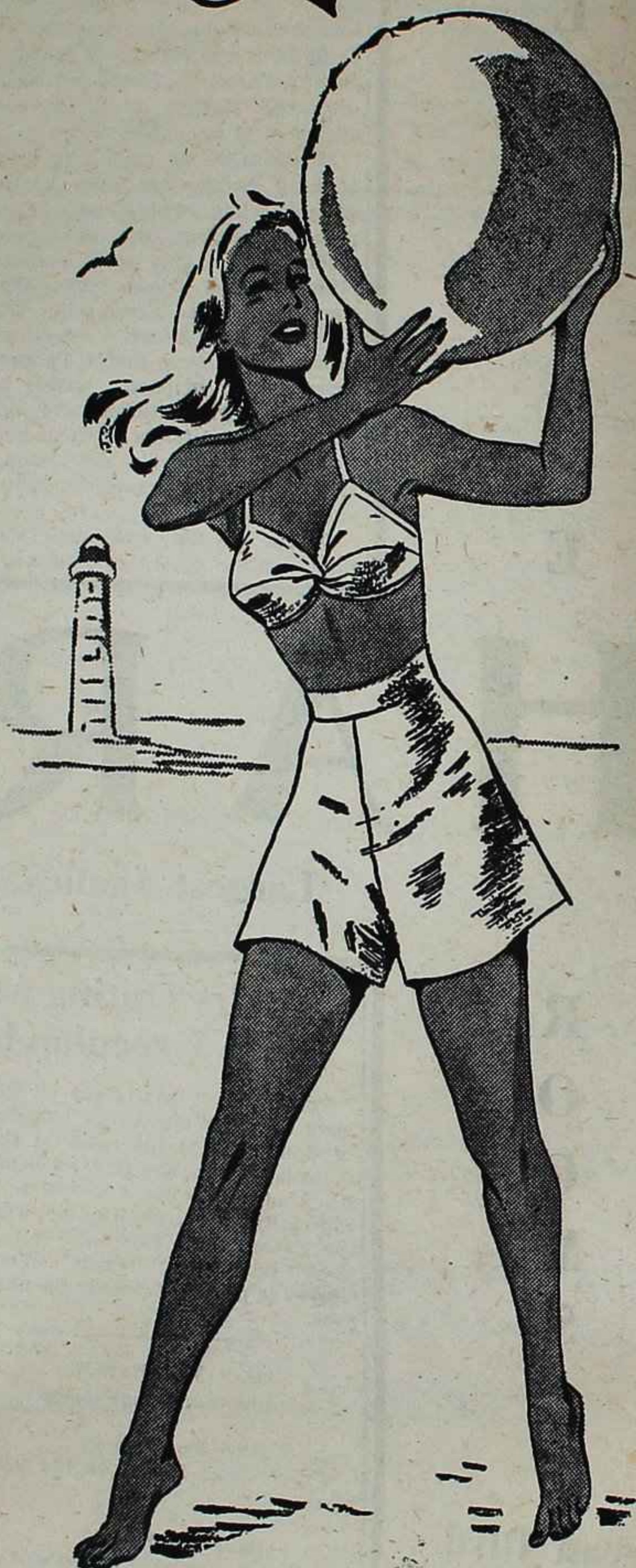

Trains, Buses Crowded, Traffic Heaviest In Beach History

Unofficially estimated as the largest crowd in the history of Hampton Beach, upwards of 100,000 persons jammed the beach and boulevard over the past weekend. Vacationists and weekenders flocked to the beach seeking relief from the hot inland cities and an official check of cars pouring onto the beach Saturday afternoon revealed a rate of two per second.

The closing of many large industrial plants in nearby states for the entire week of the Fourth coupled with ideal summer weather were two principal reasons for the tremendous crowd. Chief of Police Jerome Harkness stated that he had never seen so many cars on the beach before and was backed up in his statement by residents of thirty years and more.

Despite the record throng no accidents were reported and the chilly waters kept bathers on the sands soaking up the sun. Only the normal flow of sunburns, cuts and bruises were attended to at the comfort station by Ruby Patterson, R. N.

The new parking area on Marsh avenue, which was opened Sunday for the first time, was filled to capacity and proved a great asset in

helping to solve the parking problem. Despite this new area, parking places were at a premium and the State Bathhouses reported one of the largest days ever.

Taxi Driver Is Held On Charge Of Bootlegging

In one of the first cases in recent years, Walter Mack of McKay avenue and Lowell, Mass., was arrested at 3:00 a. m. Saturday, June 29 on a charge of bootlegging.

Mack, a local taxi driver, was apprehended on Marsh avenue by Federal and State police officials who placed him under arrest. At the Saturday morning session of Hampton Municipal court, Mack pleaded not guilty to charges of transporting liquor over the state line from Salisbury and reselling it on Hampton Beach and asked for continuance of the case to this Saturday morning. The plea was granted by Judge John W. Perkins.

Beach Panorama

Across from the Casino stands a little stone building that, for 25 years, has been the center of police activity in winter and summer.

From a small group of three winter officers it starts to expand in the spring, until with the summer season opening there are so many officers, that there's a constant change of faces.

Unfortunately, there was no camera available to catch the surprised expressions at the police station when I went in to "meet the boys," for, as Chief Harkness said, as I

sat (at ease) in his office, "The only time people want to see us is when they're in trouble."

It isn't often that we have a chance to become acquainted with the police force en masse under pleasant circumstances, for the Chief spoke the truth. Since the majority of us don't go out of our way to meet the law, how about holding a reception right here for you who are sitting on the beach, rocking on the porch, waiting for the band concert, or sitting over a sundae.

First—the man who can be in one place fifty times a day — Chief Jerome F. Harkness. With twenty years of local police experience behind him he has been Hampton's fifth chief, for the past ten years. A tall, broad, energetic person, he gives you the immediate impression that he can take care of you AND himself.

Out of the entire force, seven men are regulars for the summer. These men, their homes and length of service here are: Ernest Sargent, Seabrook, 8 years; John Melick, Hampton Beach, 6 months, formerly an F. B. I. agent; Thomas Kehoe, formerly of Manchester, now of Hampton Beach, 1st year; Clifford Eastman, principal of the Hampton Centre School, 10 years, duty in town; John Marston, Hampton Beach, formerly of Manchester force, 1st year; Norman Smiley, Hampton, 1st year; Joseph de Azevedo, Hampton Beach, recently released after three years in Maritime Service, 1st year.

Special occasions call for special attention so shake hands (gently) with the extra men.

For the past 11 years you've seen Albert Jacobs directing traffic at St. Patrick's church Sunday morning while nights have found him directing traffic in the dance hall. With him at the ballroom are Selectman Elroy G. Shaw of Hampton, who has helped out on the force for about ten years; Roy Gordon of Exeter, and James Grey, Selectman and police chief of New-

fields who is starting his first year here.

One of the best known men around the blue light is Laurence Hill of Hampton who has spent 5 years as an officer and in charge of the station. "Larry" plays host to the "guests"—making sure that they have food, blankets, and the general attention given. However, prisoners never stay here long—24 hours at the most—with the shortest staying being the one and only escape of several years ago.

The other men you see around are: Leavitt Magrath, a veteran of 10 years, from Hampton; Lester Brewster from Exeter who has spent five years on the force; Charles Neeks, who does police work in Kingston in the winter and here in the summer; Charles Stevens of Raymond, 3 years; Merrill Smith, Merrimack, 1st year, and William Buker, Hampton Falls, 1st year.

Connected with the station and the two public rest rooms kept spotless for the last 8 years by Mary Van Horne, is the First Aid Room where a nurse is on duty at all times.

It's the first year for nurse, Mrs. Eva Nichols of Marsh avenue, who is on night duty. Most of her excitement comes from the "fainters", who find that sunburns, like delayed-action bombs, take effect quite a while after you get them.

The day nurse, Ruby Patterson of Hampton, has, during her 15 years there, cared for hundreds of accident cases, near-drownings, cuts, bumps, bruises, just about everything—real and imaginary. Probably not many know that anyone can go there for first aid treatment. It isn't necessary to wait until you have to be carried in. On constant watch to see that the laws of Hampton Beach are en-

forced, our police force, which is actually small for the work it has (Continued on Page Thirteen)

Many Oldtimers On Beach Still Doing Business

This July 3 finds many of the "old crowd" doing business as usual.

To the refrain of "Nice to see you back," "Have a nice winter?" and "How long have you been open?" the season is underway with familiar faces greeting one another.

At the beginning of every season, early visitors make the rounds to check up on the business changes. Every year there are a few, but the old stand-bys are still on hand.

These people are part of the beach. They've been here through many years—good and bad—and, consequently, their presence has laid the foundation for the fine resort we have today.

There are still quite a few people who remember when some of these establishments were just starting but the new vacationists and the younger crowd wouldn't know about the two fires—in 1916 and 1921—that forced Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Lamb to start in all over again. Their general merchandise store is still there on the boulevard—open year round.

That same fire in 1921 wiped out Buzzell's Candy Store, first established in 1917, by Mr. Charles Buzzell. After Mr. Buzzell's death, his wife, Grace, and her niece and husband, Mr. and Mrs. Howard Lambert, carried on the business which is there, above Lamb's.

Between the two, Miss Rose Courteney still has her Necessity Shop where she sells size 38s to many she used to outfit in size 1.

Actually, when you stop to count them, you find many of them starting another season with you

—names that you've heard even though you don't know the people.

Kenneth Ross, whose garage is, of course, on Ross avenue; Bessie Cooper, the gypsy princess on Marsh avenue; Jim Garland at the corner of B street; George Ashworth, known to many who are no longer children, as "Daddy" Ashworth; the Downer Brothers, John and Frank, who, with their brother, George, who died in 1939, started their business forty seven years ago; Donovan and Fallon's Drug Store, starting their 21st year, still under the direction of James Fallon; the Playland "Jacks," Hines and Walsh, already going on another season; Dudley's operated by Mr. and Mrs. Arne Autio. Started as Dudley and White in 1895, it was then a restaurant and photography shop. After a few years, it became Dudley's Gift Shop and Real Estate. Since Joseph Dudley's death, his daughter, Mrs. Autio, and her husband have kept the shop going in the same way.

These are only a few of the old crowd. They're here and there all along the beach and with another "night before the 4th" just a few hours away, they are ready to help you enjoy the holiday.

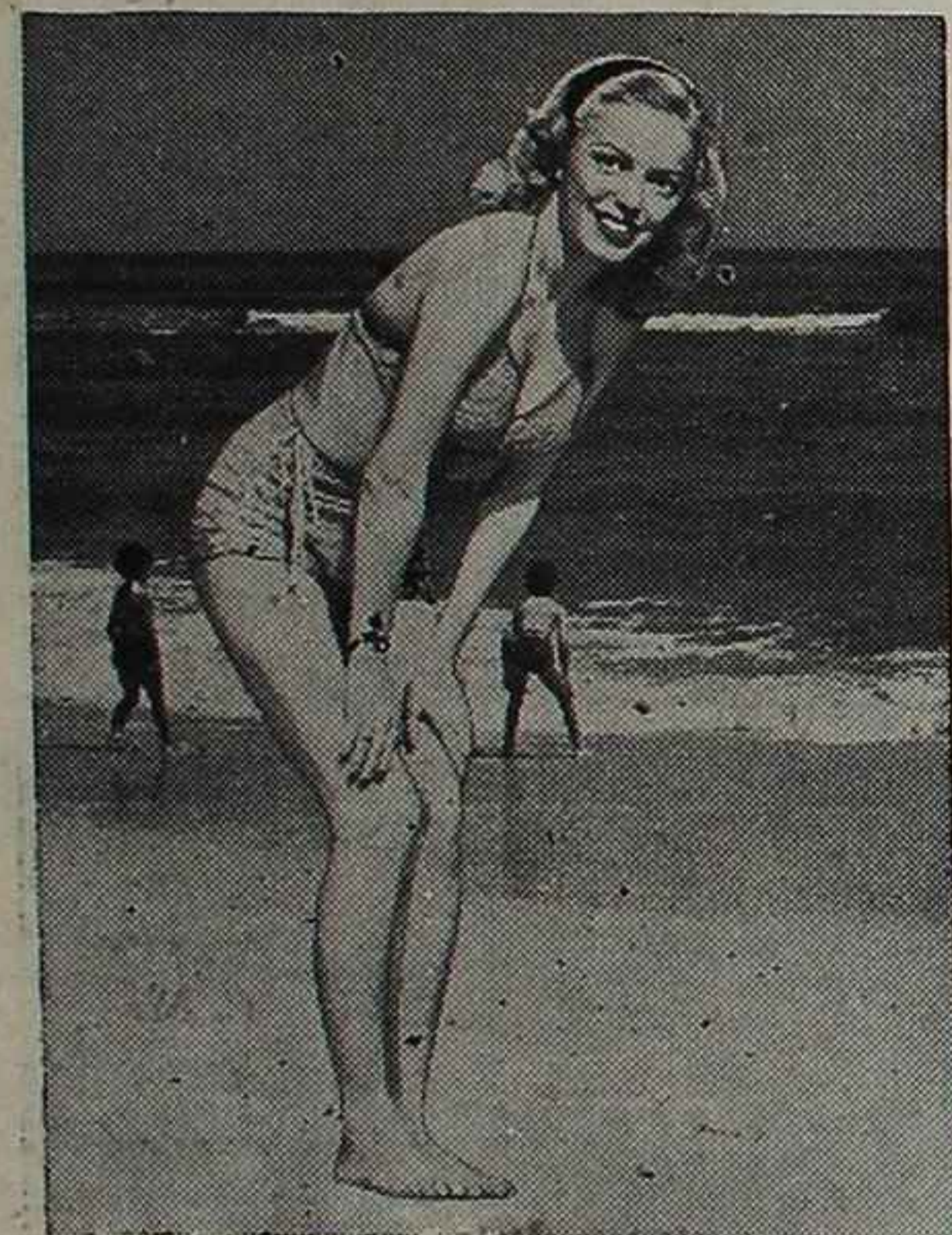

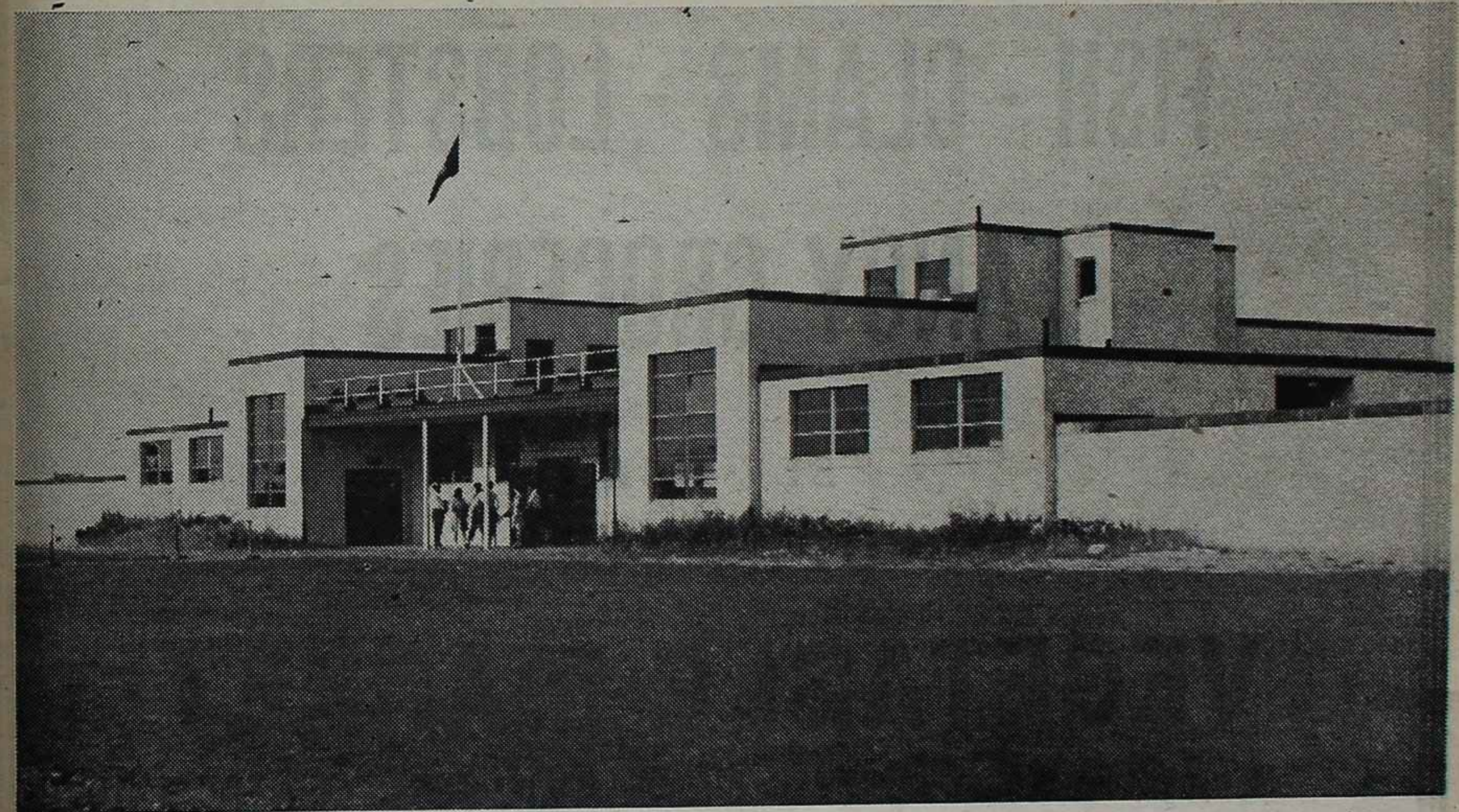
