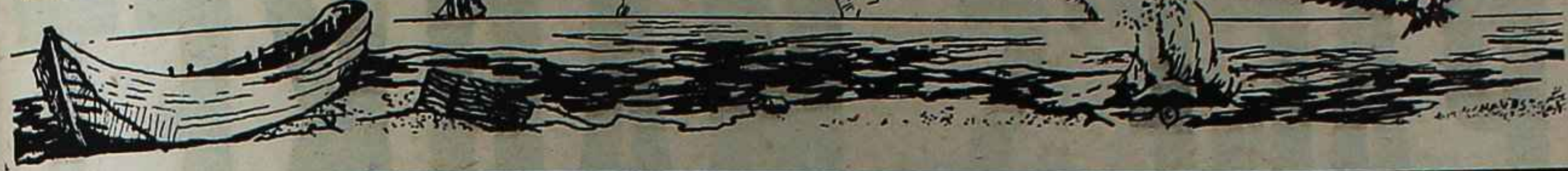

Seek Added Protection For Seacoast Area

Additional Coast Guard protection along the New Hampshire coast is assured as soon as conditions permit, according to a letter received recently from Senator Styles Bridges by Alvin F. Redden, executive secretary of the New Hampshire Seacoast Regional Development Association.

Senator Bridges declared that he had taken up the matter with Admiral J. F. Farley, USCG commander of the Coast Guard, who had advised him that the lack of present protection was due to a cut in personnel and that to remedy the situation the Coast Guard had asked Congress for an appropriation sufficient to add 500 men.

"At present there are no fully active lifeboat stations in the New Hampshire area," said Admiral Farley. Continuing, the admiral said, "The post war plan calls for a light and lookout station at Hampton Beach."

"Hampton Beach now is on a limited status, being only able to partially perform its duties. Portsmouth Harbor is now on a limited status, as is the Merrimack River lifeboat station which is just south of the New Hampshire border. Both of the latter stations are carried as active stations in the postwar plan."

Lobster Pots Ashore In Storm

Approximately 1500 lobster pots were washed up on the New Hampshire coastline during Friday's northeast storm, it was disclosed Saturday by State Conservation Officer Edward G. Towne of Hampton.

Officer Towne warned persons not authorized not to touch the lobster pots, some of which contained lobsters and were not damaged extensively. A fine of \$50 is mandatory on all persons not having a lobster license who touch the traps, said Mr. Towne.

In Hampton municipal court Saturday, one person who had picked up traps washed on the beach, was arraigned on three different charges.
