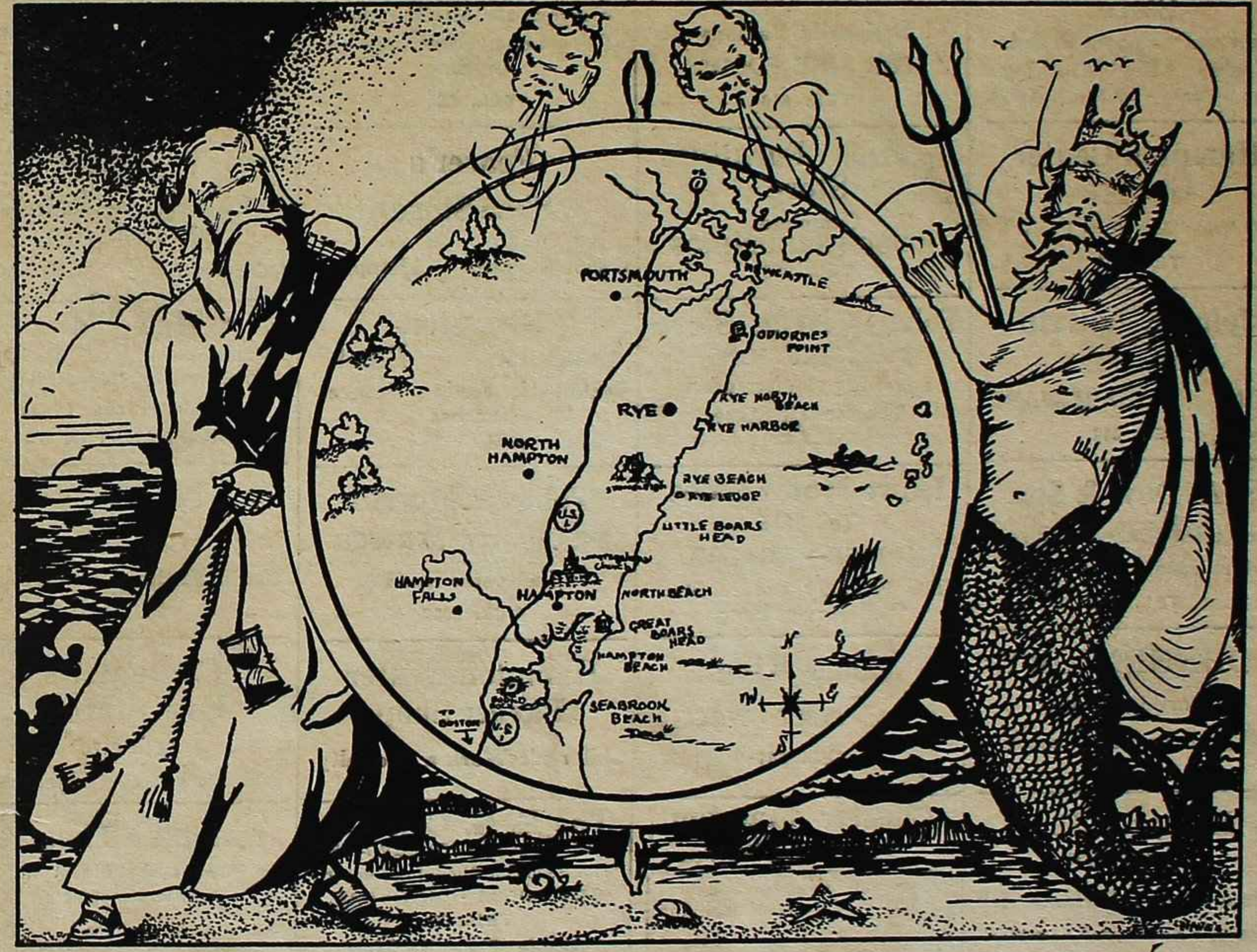

Governor Dale Predicts A Successful Season

New Seawall — Boardwalk Project Nears Completion

Vacationists who are already flocking to Hampton Beach will note with pleasure that the new 3500-foot seawall and board-walk running the entire length of the main beach front is rapidly nearing completion.

Built by the State of New Hampshire at a cost of \$200,000, the project was scheduled to have been finished and ready for promenaders by June 15, but a cement strike held up the construction and the Munroe-Langstreth, Inc., company is now making every effort to have the beach front cleaned up for the fourth.

The seawall itself, which caused so much confusion and difficulty last summer to the vacationist, is designed to protect the business area from the ravages of the winter and spring storms.

Because this portion of the beach is in the lee of Great Boar's Head when a northeast storm blows—and that is the kind of storm which always has brought the greatest damage—it was not felt necessary to

Ideal Weather Brings Throngs Over Weekend

With the official opening of the summer season here last Wednesday, perfect weather arrived hereabouts just in time to draw one of the largest crowds so far this season to Hampton Beach for the weekend.

A bright, hot sun and a cool east breeze combined to give weekenders—plus many fine cases of sunburn which were definitely not on their schedule.

Despite a heavy flow of traffic, Chief of Police John J. Malek reported no accidents. A number of persons went in bathing but the waters of the Atlantic were reported cold.

The daily band concerts began Sunday, a full two weeks earlier than usual, with the Hampton Beach Concert band, under the direction of George "Chuck" Hill

Banquet Marks Official Opening Of Summer Season

Reopen Soon

The Coast Guard station at North Beach, Hampton, will be reopened within the next week, Rep. Chester E. Merrow was informed last Thursday.

In a telegram received Friday morning from Rep. Merrow, due to a delay in transmission, the Beachcomber learned that the station would open with a limited personnel due to the existing Coast Guard man power shortage.

"The reopening of the station came as a result of a protest meeting held in Concord early in January, which was largely attended by residents of this area.

Over 250 persons attended the annual banquet of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce and Village Precinct Commission last week at the Ashworth hotel and heard Governor Charles M. Dale predict that Hampton Beach "would enjoy a successful season this year and for many years to come."

The chief executive was high in his praise of the loyal community effort and cooperation of the citizens of Hampton, stating that such effort and cooperation "means a great deal to the success of any community." Gov. Dale briefly reviewed the highlights of the present legislative session in Concord and put a special emphasis on those bills affecting the recreational industry in New Hampshire.

Referring to the passage of the anti-pollution bill, the Governor stated that this measure would be the means of returning to the people of the state, the full use and benefits of all lakes and streams in New Hampshire. He also

Taking And Selling Illegal Lobsters Scored At Meeting

Fishermen Fight To Save Lobster From Extinction

The lobster industry in New Hampshire is facing extinction within a few years if the practice of not returning to the ocean waters under-sized lobsters is continued, was brought out vividly last Thursday at a protest meeting called by lobster fishermen from Seabrook, Hampton Beach and surrounding towns.

The meeting was held in the Hampton Beach Community hall with Ralph G. Carpenter of Wolfeboro, director of the Fish and Game commission and Commissioners Harry M. Bickford of Manchester and Charles E. Smart of Ossipee in attendance.

Carrow Widow of Seabrook called the meeting to order and Herbert

Drake of Rye Beach was chosen as chairman.

Commissioner Carpenter said that the taking and selling of illegal sized lobsters had increased to such an extent that unless this indiscriminate taking of lobsters is halted before the lobsters attain the legal size the industry is likely to become extinct. The commissioner said that Conservation officers have endeavored to enforce the lobster laws as established by the legislature, but that 90 per cent of the appeal cases after a conviction in the lower court, have been thrown out of court in the Superior Court for "lack of evidence."

Herman L. Smith of Exeter, past president of the New Hampshire Federated Sportsmen's clubs, suggested that the fishermen form an organization to develop a program aimed to preserve the lobster industry.

Upon motion of Abbot B. Drake of Rye Beach, hotel proprietor, it was voted to appoint a committee of three, consisting of Carroll W. Dow of Seabrook, Armand Gauron of Hampton Beach and Joseph L. Rawling of Rye to go to Concord and confer with Gov. Charles M. Dale.

shore dinner, which was served at seven o'clock.

A committee of club members assisted in preparing a most delectable New England shore repast which consisted for the most part of steamed clams and plenty of boiled lobsters with all of the incidentals which ordinarily accompany such a meal and ending up with huge slices of watermelon and coffee. Robert T. Kjeloy of Hampton Falls was chairman of the special committee in charge of the outing and acted as master of ceremonies during the presentation of prizes.

The next regular meeting will be held on Monday evening, June 23 at the Goody Cole Room in Lamie's Tavern with the usual speaking program. President Alfred L. For those males who enjoy the avocation of sidewalk superintendents, even on their vacation, there is a bridge building project going on at Hampton river, where the old mile-long wooden bridge is being replaced by a modern structure.

All in all, from the tip end of North Beach to the Hampton River, Hampton Beach is growing and expanding, modernizing and improving — to make more enjoyable your stay at Happy Hampton.

of Portsmouth and Hampton Beach. Fireworks displays held in past years, but absent through World War II years will be resumed this evening at 10 p.m. and will continue each Wednesday evening throughout the entire season, weather permitting. Besides set pieces there will be aerial displays and bombs.

Many of the heavy benches built in the State's wood-working shop at Concord, will have been painted and put in place for the accommodation of those vacationists attending the daily band concerts, and the fireworks programs. These benches will seat 6 or 7 each. As they are painted, they will be placed near the bandstand on Ocean Boulevard opposite the Hampton Beach Casino.

The children's playground will be set up very shortly in a new beach front location, in the vicinity of G and H streets, which will be more easily accessible and at no sacrifice of beach area.

Miss Lorretta White of Worcester, Mass., secretary of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce, is expected to arrive Friday to resume her duties and will be in the Chamber's information booth on Ocean Boulevard. Upon her arrival, Mrs. Catherine Sullivan, who has been substituting there, will be placed in charge of the new car now on display which will be given away

at the close of the beach season. The entire seacoast area opened earlier than usual this year in preparation for the greatest influx of summer visitors in history. The early opening at Hampton Beach was brought about by the fact that more than 3200 high school musicians from all six New England states were quartered here during the two-day New England School Music Festival, May 23, 24.

Police Continue Probe Of \$16,125 Mystery Bonds

Police here are trying to unravel the "mystery of the bonds" after Peter Lindstrom of the Hotel Huntington in Boston walked into police station with duffel bag containing \$16,125 in government bonds which he said he found at midnight Saturday night.

According to Police Chief John J. Malek, Lindstrom was traveling north on US highway No. 1 when he noticed a duffel bag on the road near the Hampton Falls-Seabrook line. He stopped, picked up the bag and investigation revealed the bonds.

The bonds, according to police, are issued to David Allen Bowersock or Mrs. Benet Bowersock. But the catch is that on the different bonds, addresses are listed for the couple in Honolulu, California, Oklahoma and Quonset Point, R. I. In addition to bonds the bag contained a government check for \$275 made out to David A. Bowersock.

Chief of Police Malek has learned from Navy officials that Bowersock is a Chief Motor Machinist Mate and was last stationed at Quonset Point, R. I., where he lived in a government housing development at 4 Shore Acres. Friends and neighbors who were questioned, believe that Bowersock left on a fishing trip to Northern Maine but didn't know whether he was coming

back to Quonset or had been transferred. Chief Malek has notified the FBI and the Bureau of Personnel at Naval headquarters in Washington.

'Beachcomber' To Give Fast Train Travel To Boston

(DST); Old Orchard Beach 6:54; Biddeford 7:03; Kennebunk 7:17; Portsmouth 8:01; Hampton 8:19, arriving Salem 9:01; Lynn 9:12 and Boston 9:30 p. m. (DST).

The all-coach Beachcomber will leave the North Station every weekday at 4:50 p. m. (DST) and, running express to Hampton will stop there at 5:51 p. m.; Portsmouth

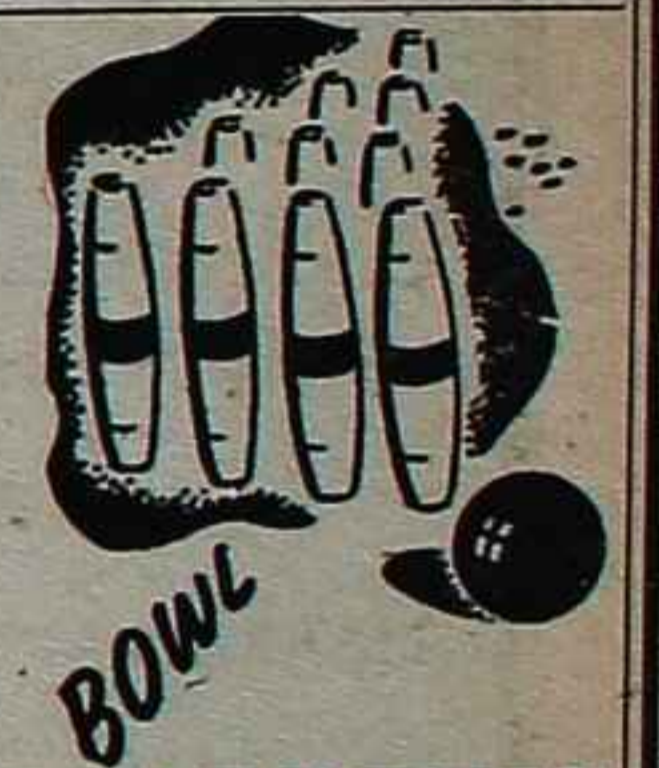

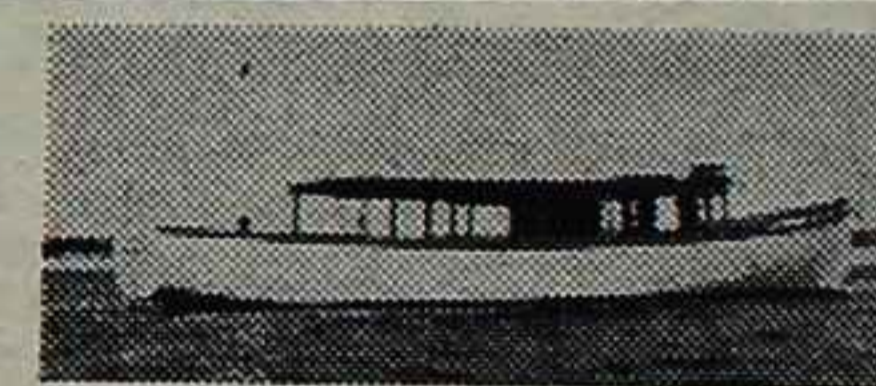

cited the results of the state's advertising program, which was directly responsible for 75,000 additional requests for information in 1946 and brought into the state an estimated \$2,000,000 added recreational revenue.

Sends Regrets

The greetings of the Hampton Beach Precinct Commissioners were extended by Col. George Ashworth who was given an ovation upon his introduction by James W. Tucker, Sr., who acted as toastmaster.

Best wishes for a happy and prosperous season from President George Scott of the Portsmouth Chamber of Commerce were brought by Mr. Tucker who also read a letter from Gov. Robert F. Bradford of Massachusetts regretting his inability to attend this annual affair.

President Raymond L. Goding of the Chamber of Commerce extended the welcome of the chamber and briefly described the progress on the many new projects now underway at the beach. Mr. Goding stated that the popular daily band concerts would start next Sunday, June 22, nearly two weeks earlier than usual with "Chuck" Hill as band leader, replacing Hal McDonnell. Fireworks will be resumed this year after a lapse due to the wartime restrictions and the first display will be next Wednesday, June 25.

Describes Projects

Russell P. Tobey, Director of Recreation in the N. H. Forestry and Recreation Commission, was the other principal speaker of the evening and spoke of the plans of his commission for the future development of the state's recreation areas. He called attention to House Bill 432, now in Legislative pro-

ceedings, which would authorize a bond issue amounting to the sum of \$500,000 to be spent on the orderly development of state owned recreational areas in New Hampshire.

Mr. Tobey described the proposed swimming pool for Hampton Beach state park as being "tailor made for the tourists." The pool will be built to accommodate between 300-400 persons and can be operated at night. It will have a separate diving pool with three levels of diving boards and two separate wading pools for youngsters.

Mr. Tobey stated that he felt the pool could be used for exhibitions, contests and instruction for the young people of this section of the state, to allow them to enter competition elsewhere in the country.

provide a curved wall such as that at the North Beach, which gets the full blast of tide and wind.

The bulkhead was constructed with sheet steel with interlocking edges being driven vertically into the beach at about extreme high tide line. The steel goes about 12 feet into the ground. The top portion, including about eight feet

in the ground, was encased in cement.

The result is a strong vertical wall, further strengthened by a series of channel bars tied 20 feet back to piling also driven in about 20 feet.

Just at the back of the wall, some six inches below its top, has been built a six-foot concrete apron, which will serve to run off any water which may be splashed onto it by high waves. In back of that and at the same level will be the boardwalk, to be made of 14-foot fir planking, one and three-quarters inches thick and of widths varying from 6 to 10 inches. The net effect will be a 20-foot promenade the length of the beach.

View Unimpaired

The top of the wall will be surmounted by a two-rail pipe fence. The wall top is just about on a level with the crown of the ocean boulevard, so that the view of the ocean for folks who live or walk on the other side of the street will not be impaired. Every 250 feet—opposite each street—stairs are let into the wall to provide access to the beach. The bulkhead itself starts about opposite the Ashworth and runs clear to Haverhill street.

This new development is only part of a long-range plan for the New Hampshire shoreline given impetus by damage of the mighty storm of 1933. As part of the plan, the state has already fixed the Hampton river estuary and re-

claimed 75 acres of land with a hydraulic fill; it has built two sea-walls with a combined length of 5,000 feet; and Rye harbor has been jettied and dredged.

Future work in this proposal includes: A 4,000-foot seawall extension; reconstruction of two miles of the present ocean highway; a central parking lot for 3,000 cars at Hampton, together with other smaller parking lots along the shore; and a swimming and wading pool and extensive playground at the south end of the beach.

The outline of work was done by the New Hampshire Shore and Beach Preservation and Development Commission, formed after the state had taken over the shore area at Hampton following the '33 storm Bridge Under Way

Another portion of the work at Hampton now under way is building of the new bridge across the Hampton river. This task to cost in the neighborhood of \$1,231,000, is likewise plagued by shortages of steel. T. Stuart and Sons of Watertown, Mass., are now at work on the sub-structure, on a contract for \$577,000. The Phoenix Bridge company of Phoenixville, Pa., will later install the superstructure, including a steel-and-concrete deck, for \$514,000. The approaches, for which no contract has yet been let, will cost some \$140,000.

The new bridge replaces the ancient wooden structure now so badly off that regular weekly inspec-

tions have to be made of its sub-structure. A length of 3,500 feet of the wooden bridge was "retired" several years ago when the state dredged up a vast amount of fill to make solid footing at the Seabrook end.

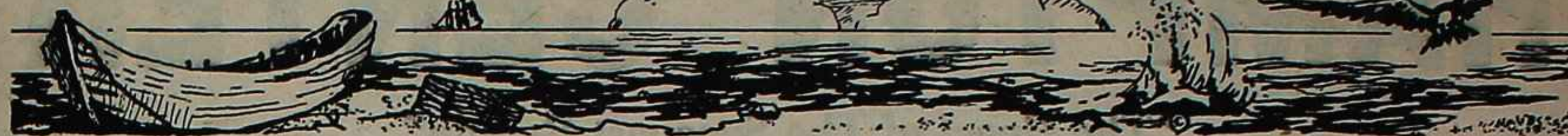
