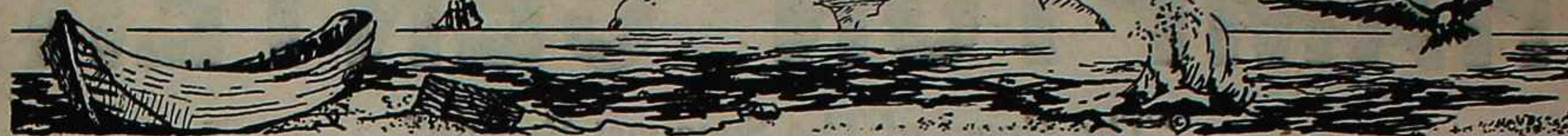

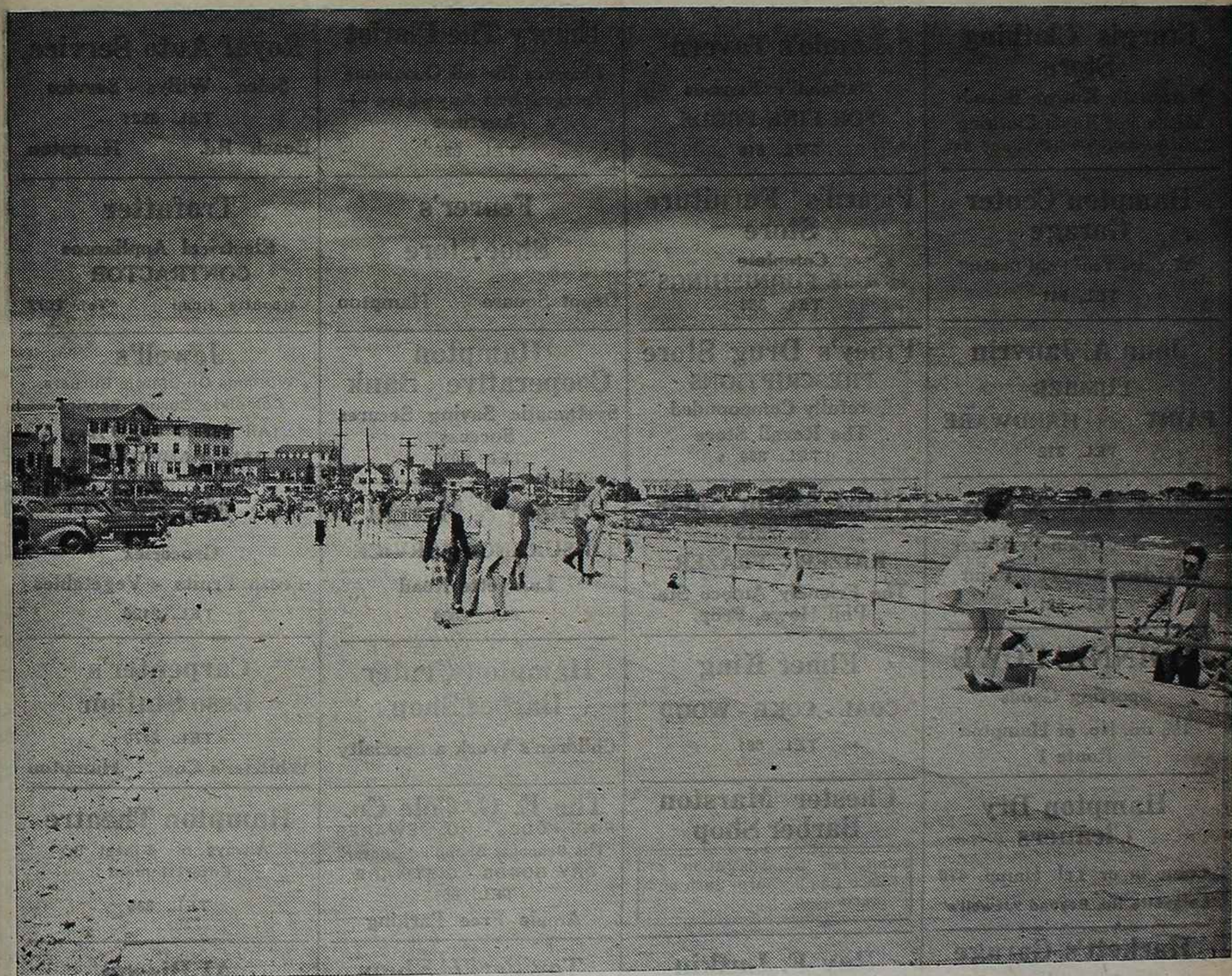

Beach Sprayed To Eliminate Mosquitos, Bugs

Record Crowd Is Expected For Long Holiday Weekend

One of the largest crowds in history is expected to invade Hampton Beach this weekend, taking advantage of the second three-day weekend this summer.

Officials believe that the combination of the Friday holiday and the generally approved custom of manufacturing plants closing down the week of the Fourth, will bring about one of the greatest influxes of vacationists Hampton has seen in many years.

Already there is a large crowd on the beach and many hotels and rooming houses are reportedly filled to capacity. The new boardwalk is rapidly becoming one of the most popular attractions on the beach as promenaders stroll up and down its length from early morning to late evening hours.

The weekly display of fireworks will be held Wednesday evening as usual and Bill Elliot will sing at the last band concert on Wednesday and Sunday evenings.

The beach is rapidly taking shape and it is hoped that everything will be in readiness for the holiday visitors. The new seats at the bandstand are expected to be in place

Reopens

After being closed since last November, the shutters on the Hampton Beach Coast Guard station at North Beach, have been removed with a crew of five men on duty.

At present Boatswain's Mate 1/c Oscar L. Munro is temporarily in charge, although still assigned to the Wood Island station in Portsmouth Harbor. Other members of the crew assigned here are Orlin S. Smiley, S 1/c, Charles LaPointe, S 1/c, Grover Byrd S 1/c and James H. Barlow S 1/c. The station was reopened following vigorous protests by the residents of this area with the aid and assistance of U. S. Representative Chester E. Merrow and State Senator Doris Spollett of Hampstead.

Commissioners Launch Program To Control Pests

Local Fishermen To Investigate Warden's Case

With a noticeable bad odor surrounding the suspension of Alfred M. Jenness of Hampton, state Fish and Game Department coastal warden, in connection with the "short" lobster investigation, local lobster fishermen have formed their own group to investigate all the circumstances of what appears to be a large scale racket.

A survey of local fishermen reveals that without exception they believe that Warden Jenness was "framed" in retaliation for his activities this spring in trying to put a stop to the "short lobster industry." One lobster man stated that the "short lobster" business was a large scale "racket" with the lobsters being shipped regularly to Concord and Manchester, and that many could be found on the banquet tables of local political affairs.

It was all bad news for mosquitoes and mites at Hampton Beach last week as the drive to eliminate these summer pests got underway.

To reduce this winged menace to the comfort of vacationists, the Beach Precinct Commissioners have undertaken a program of DDT spraying of the entire beach. Commissioner James W. Tucker, Jr., states that already a noticeable depreciation in the prevalence of mosquitoes and mites has been reported. The entire area will have to be sprayed at least twice more during the season to be effective.

According to Commissioner Tucker the initial application was made last Thursday, covering both sides of all streets and highways in the Village District which extends from Hampton River to the Coast Guard station at North Beach.

A turbine mist blower type of gun mounted on the back of a truck was used in the spraying. The gun shoots a fine mist of DDT in kerosene about 300' in still air and about 1000' with the wind. The DDT solution used is approximately

3% and is said to be completely harmless to pets, animals, plants, vegetables, etc. It is claimed that it may even be sprayed through open windows, and on houses, leaving no unsightly residue.
Although some types of mosquitoes are known to fly upwards of 40 miles, the average "hop" is about 100', and it is hoped that by surrounding the breeding places with DDT and criss-crossing the community with it, the mosquito problem will be reduced. The effect of the spray lasts for from four to six weeks, depending on the weather.

Miss Waters, whose mother was attending the picnic on the beach, was a victim of the strong undertow and, although a good swimmer, could not make shore.

Mrs. Dorothy Root, Miss Carol Jones and Gerard Grenier, all of Hampton, went to Miss Water's assistance, who was exhausted trying to fight her way ashore, and it took the three of them to bring her in.

Steps were immediately taken by members of the Mother's Circle to see that a lifeguard was stationed at North Beach. A delegation of mothers visited the town hall Friday afternoon and requested protection of the Board of Selectmen. The Selectmen granted the request and a lifeguard was placed on

During the war years, Anatolia became a haven for the American

Consulate for bombed out victims of Thessaloniki and finally a Greek military hospital containing 400 beds. Then came the Nazi occupation and wide-spread damage of college property. The college has now about 500 students and the need for new buildings and endowment is imperative.

Introducing New Chief Of Police

Along with the many other changes at Hampton Beach this spring came a new Chief of the Police Department whom some of the vacationists already know, but for the benefit of others the Beachcomber introduces the new chief, John J. Malek.

Chief Malek, was appointed by the Hampton Board of Selectmen early in May and replaced Jerome F. Harkness on May 26. Only 30 years old, the new chief was serving as Chief of Police at Conway, a position which he resigned to assume his duties here. A veteran of World War II, Malek has had considerable police experience which the Selectmen took under consideration before his appointment.

Malek joined the Hartford, Conn. Police department in 1939 where he served two years before being transferred to the Internal Security

Division of the United Aircraft in that city. He entered the United States Army in 1942 in the Military Police and because of his ability to speak four languages, German, Russian, Polish and Portuguese, was assigned to the Military Intelligence division. He attended the National Police Academy in Washington and was then shipped overseas where he served 29 months in the ETO. At the end of the war he was transferred to the Criminal Investigation Department and received his discharge in February, 1946.

Malek joined the Hampton Police department in the summer of 1946 and was assigned the duties of night officer at the beach station. Last fall he was elected Chief of the Conway Police department, a position which he held until tendering his resignation to accept the chief's job in Hampton.

State Symphony Plans Series Of 'Pop' Concerts

The recent concert in Laconia by the New Hampshire Symphony Orchestra was so successful that a summer series of "Pop" concerts will be given over the state beginning at The Weirs, Sunday evening, July 13.

The objective of these concerts says conductor Paul Bauguss of Concord, will be to bring good summer musical entertainment to a wide coverage of the state. Many communities do not have the opportunity to hear symphony orchestras in concert. For this reason, the orchestra will be flexible in size to suit the requirements of halls and communities. Sponsoring symphony committees will be developed over the state. Where possible, local soloists will be asked to play with the orchestra or choral groups invited to participate under the direction of their own conductor.

There is need for a professional state symphony and it was for this reason that the New Hampshire Symphony Orchestra was organized. The musicians are from New Hampshire and have been selected by audition.

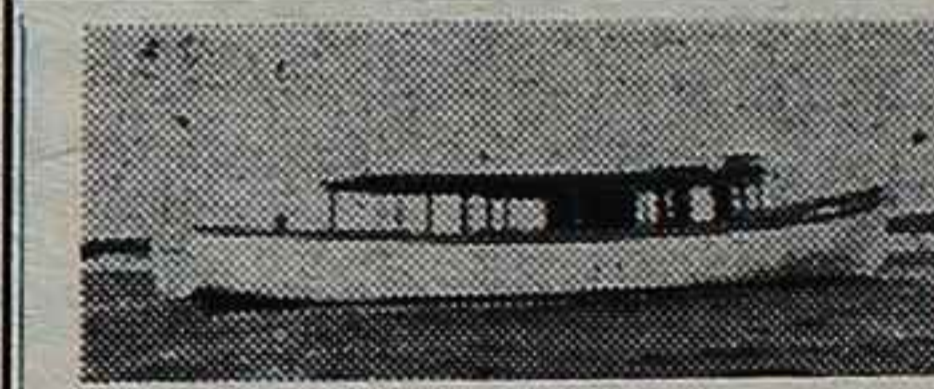

Vote To Create Water Precinct At Wallis Sands

Rye residents last week voted to establish a water precinct for the beach section.

Kenneth Stanley acted as moderator, and these officers were chosen: Benjamin Orcutt, clerk; Robert E. Thomas, treasurer; Harold Marshall, Kenneth Stanley, and W. G. Moulton, commissioners. The meeting voted to name the newly created body the Wallis Sands, Rye North Beach and Foss Beach water precinct. The district of approximately four and a half miles, hopes to obtain water for approximately 250 consumers at an estimated cost of \$25,000 per mile.

It is planned to hire the services of a registered engineer in New Hampshire. The commissioners were authorized to petition the Legislature allowing them to exceed the bonded debt indebtedness of \$80,000 to the amount of \$150,000. Mr. Orcutt, leader in the move, reported that the bonding company has agreed to waive payment on the principal for two years.

Three summer residents of Kennebunkport, Harry A. Hall, Jr., Harry A. Hall, 3rd and Dean Foles, Jr., were rescued by Portsmouth Harbor Coast Guardsmen when their 35-foot schooner developed engine trouble off Wallis Sands, Rye recently.

The plight of the three men in their small boat was seen by Mrs. Benpamin Orcutt from her summer home at Wallis Sands and a call was sent to the Portsmouth Harbor Coast Guard station on Wood Island. When the engine trouble developed, the boat was carried in toward shore and was in danger of going on the rocks when seen from the shore. The men dropped the anchor over but with the choppy sea which was prevailing, the boat continued to drift.

A supply boat from the Portsmouth Harbor station got a line to

the boat and towed the craft into Pepperrell cove, Kittery Point, for the night.

Fish and Game Commission and the Rockingham county sheriff's department were conducting a joint investigation of the activities of a state conservation officer, who was reportedly involved in the taking of illegal sized lobsters.

In a brief prepared statement to the press, which followed a lengthy conference with the commission, Carpenter asserted that "in regard to Coastal Warden Alfred M. Jenness' case, I have taken the following action pending a complete investigation and consideration by the commission: 'Conservation Officer Alfred M. Jenness, Hampton, you are hereby notified that you are suspended from this department from this date, pending a complete investigation of the complaint brought against you at Hampton and consideration by the commission.'"

No other comment was forthcoming from Carpenter.

According to reports from Portsmouth, lobstermen operating off the New Hampshire coast have complained that a conservation officer had taken lobsters of illegal size from some traps and with another individual had consumed them.

It was reported that Rockingham county authorities and state officials are investigating the charges and it was learned from authoritative sources that the sheriff's department is in possession of the empty lobster shells which could be used as evidence in the event criminal action is instituted.

It has been stated that the lobstermen in question have no connection with a recent case in Portsmouth municipal court, the result of the alleged finding of 300 undersized in traps owned by a Rye lobsterman.

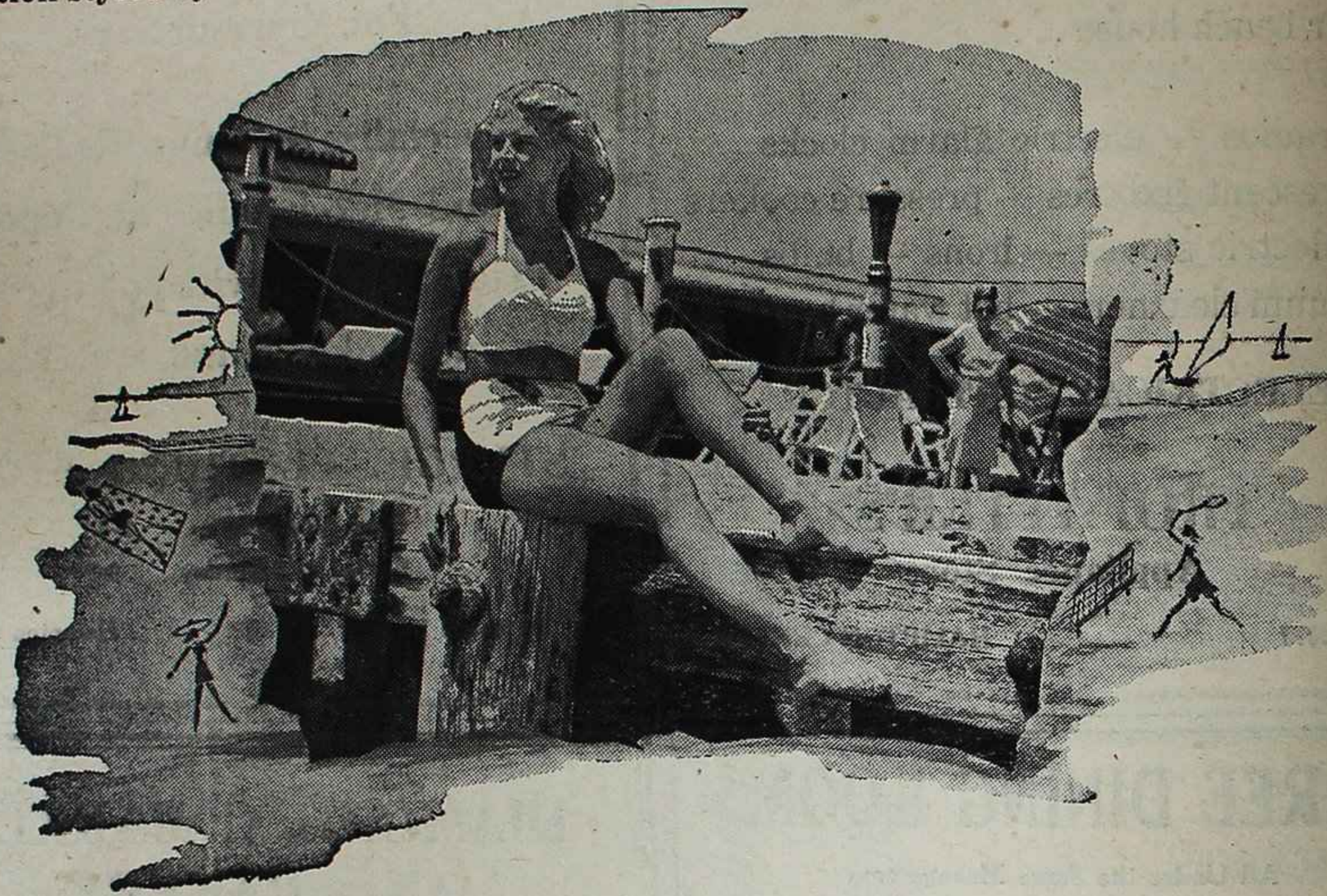

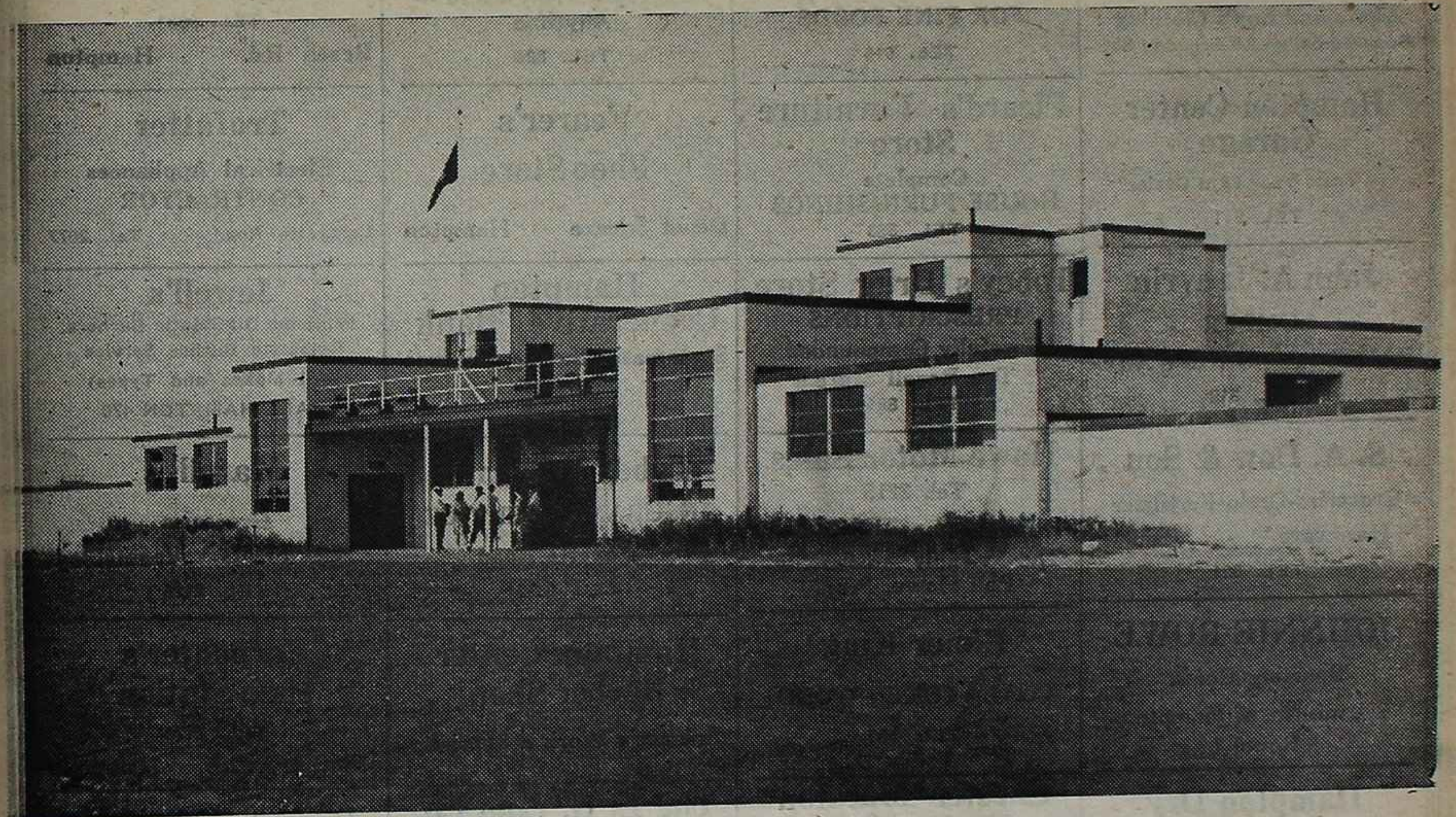
