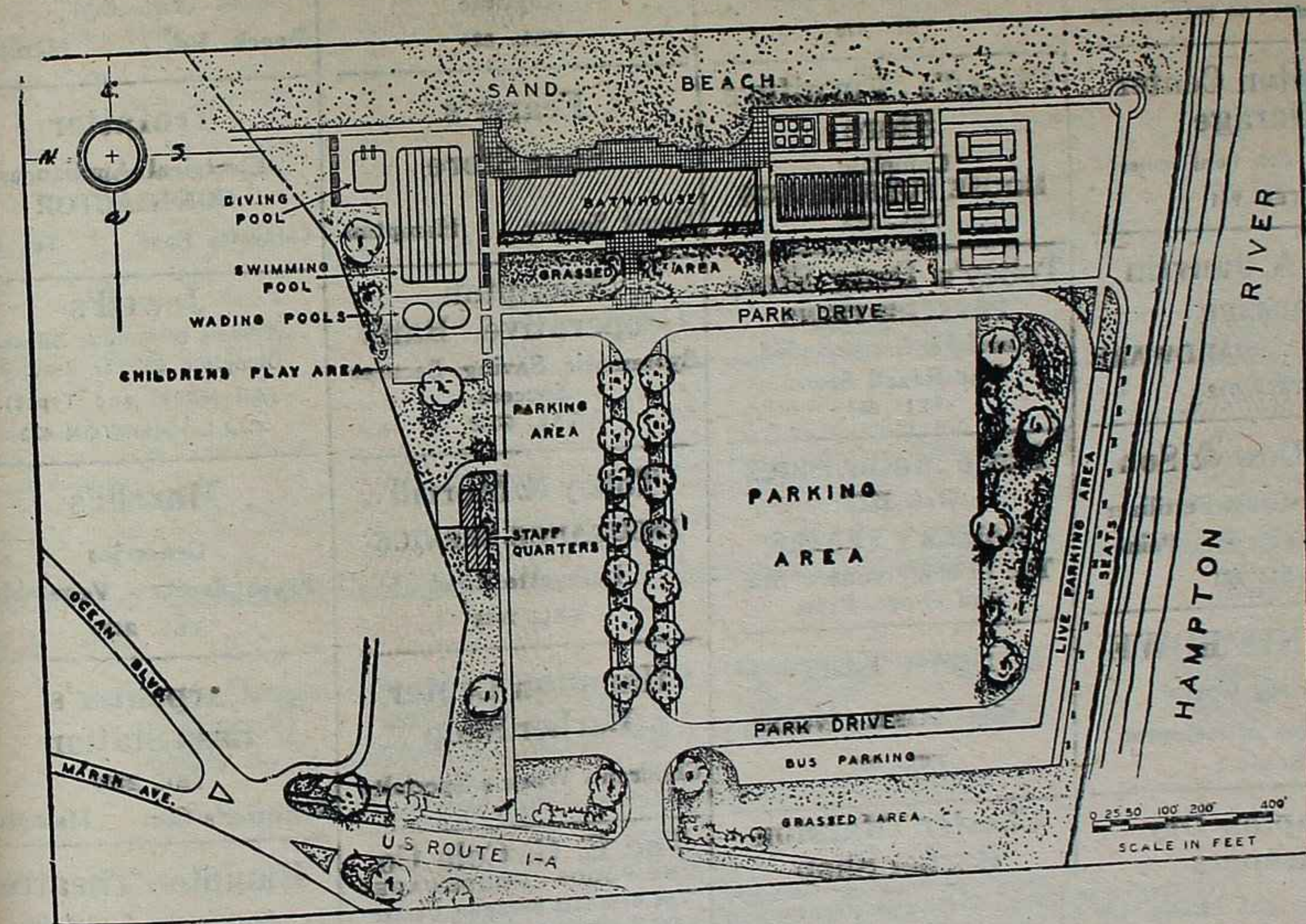

Alleged Robber Apprehended At Beach Sunday

John J. Byrne 32, a Cambridge, Mass., World War II overseas infantry veteran who had been sought for the past two months in connection with a \$12,540 bank robbery May 23 at Rochester, N. Y., was apprehended early Sunday morning by Chief of Police John J. Malek in a cottage at Great Boar's Head.

The man came to Hampton Beach shortly after the robbery was committed, police said, but left afterwards to follow the race tracks in the vicinity of New York and Philadelphia before returning to the Suffolk Downs track. Hampton police had been maintaining a vigil at the cottage for approximately a month. About midnight Saturday a light was noted in his room and Chief Malek was informed. The chief went to the house and as other officers surrounded it, forced

500 Scouts Are Expected To Register For Two Day Outing

Children Eagerly Await Biggest Day Of Summer

Literally thousands of youngsters of all ages will be the guests of Hampton Beach tomorrow when Children's Day, one of the most colorful events of the summer season, will be held under the sponsorship of the Beach Precinct Commission.

Col. George Ashworth, who inaugurated the annual feature more than three decades ago, is the chairman of the day's festivities.

The program will begin at noon with a luncheon at the Hotel Ashworth for the invited guests. At 2 o'clock there will be a parade led by the 60-piece Portsmouth High school band, David Kushious, conductor. Ira A. Brown of Portsmouth will act as chief marshal of the parade which will be headed by an escort of State Police and Hampton police officers.

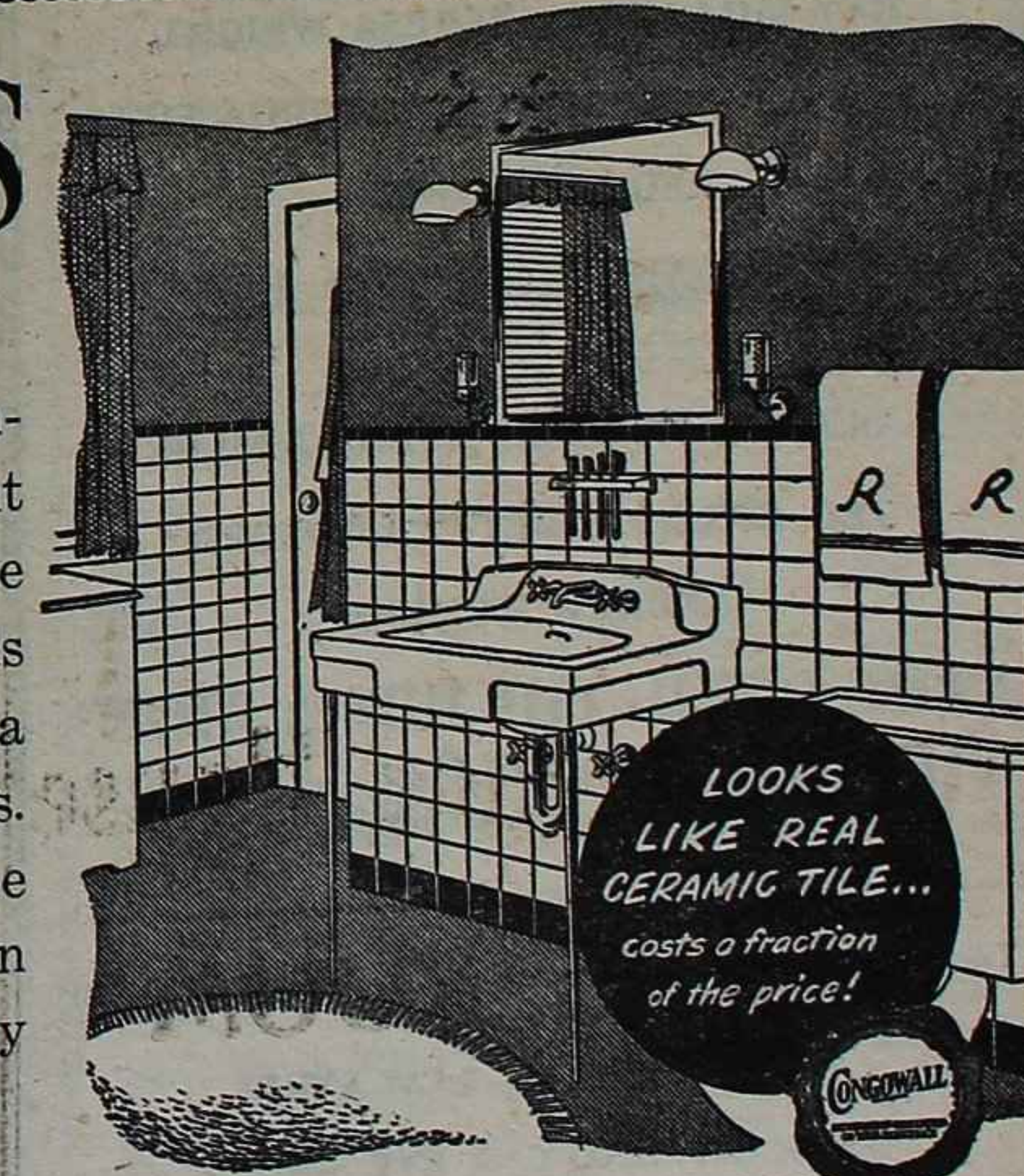

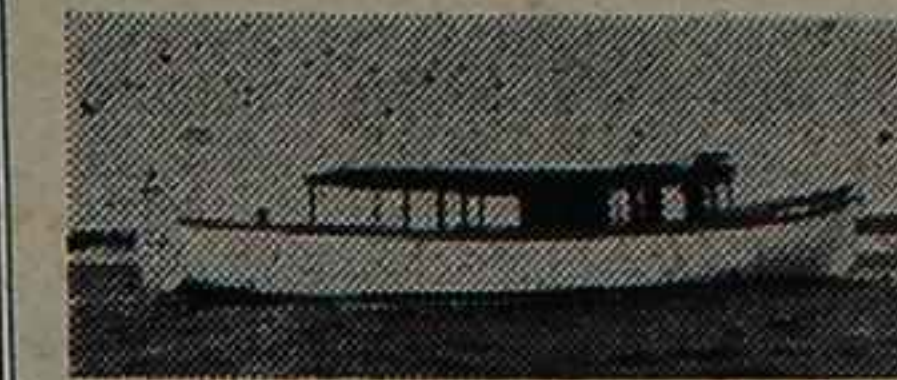

his way into the room where at the point of a gun he took the man in custody on a warrant charging Jarcey in the first degree in New York state.
Admits Identity
Byrne at first denied that he was the man being sought and said that his name was Arthur Burr. He was taken to police headquarters where later he admitted his identity and gave his address as 31 Sacramento street, Cambridge. Inspector James Murphy and Sgt. Joseph Breen of the Cambridge, Mass., police came

to the beach Sunday forenoon and with Chief Malek questioned the man at length. He admitted having eight different aliases, including the Burr name.

According to police, Byrne stated that he committed the robbery between 9 and 9:30 on the evening of May 23 from a night depository of a Rochester bank and got away with a sack containing \$11,800 in cash and \$740 in checks, which had been deposited by Michael Troisi, a Rochester cigar manufacturer. He was working as a chef in a Rochester restaurant at the time.

Leaving Rochester, Byrne told authorities, he first went to New York City and then came to Hampton Beach where he hired accommodations in the cottage. After staying here but a brief time he returned to New York, where he dropped \$2,500 in a week at the Jamaica race track on Long Island. He next went to Philadelphia for a week where, he told Chief Malek, he lost in the vicinity of \$2,000 playing the horses. He returned to New York for approximately a month and during this period approximately \$6,000 of his loot was lost on the races. While in New York, he told authorities, he lived at the Hotel Jefferson. Finally he came to Hotel Bradford in Boston, where he remained while following the races at Suffolk. Byrne lost another \$1,000 at the Massachusetts track and when taken in custody Sunday morning had only \$51 of the \$11,800. Besides losing almost the total amount which he is alleged to have stolen, Byrne also dropped \$1,500 that he made one day at Suffolk Downs and \$700 he made at Narragausett.

Following the grilling, Byrne was taken back to Cambridge late Sunday afternoon by the Massachusetts officers, who stated that they wished to clear up his movement in the Cambridge area after he came to Boston.

Monday morning he was taken to Rochester, N. Y., by Detectives Charles Logan and Harold Curtis where he was arraigned in municipal court.
