Six Rescued By Coast Guard

Shortly after darkness had set in last Friday evening, residents of Great Boar's Head sighted a flare out to sea about three miles south east of Boar's Head. The flare, which was a distress signal, was reported to Hampton Beach Police Headquarters and the Coast Guard Life Saving Station was contacted immediately. Chief Boat-swain's Mate Everett Marston and Adrien Horter, MoMM 3/c responded to the signal in a 26-foot surf boat and picked up the two men, two women, and two children who had sent up the flare. The motor of the 45-foot power boat, owned by Albert Elton of Hampton Falls, and operated by Randolph Beckford of Seabrook, became disabled when the party was about three miles out to sea. Members of the party wrapped old rags saturated in gasoline around one of the oars and set fire to the rags to attract attention to their boat. The disabled power boat was towed safely to Hampton Harbor by the two Coastguardsmen.

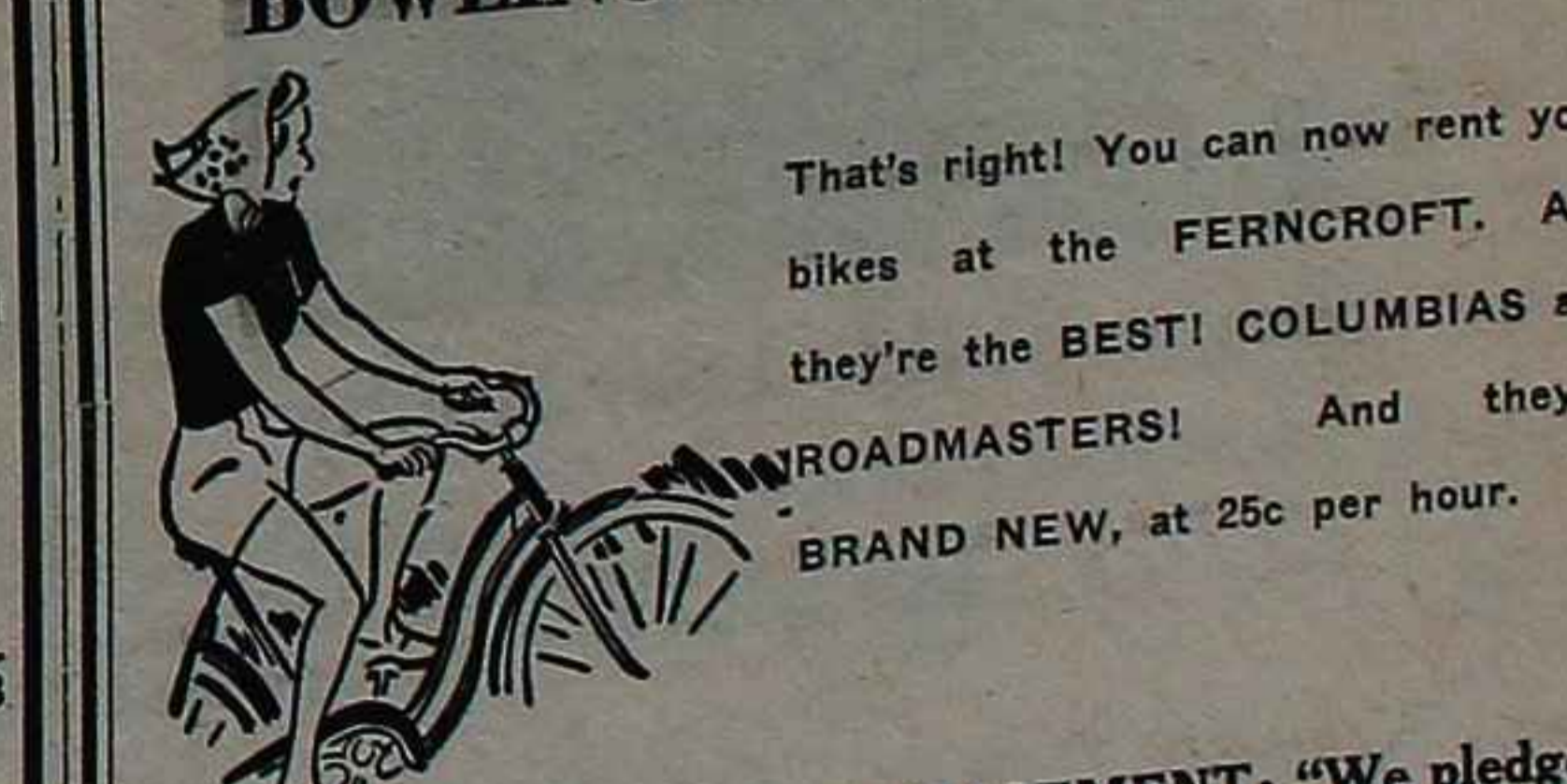

**Board Votes To

Overwhelming opposition to the granting of "any liquor license at Hampton Beach at any time," was voiced Friday night at a special meeting of the Board of Directors of the beach Chamber of Commerce.

President Raymond L. Goding, who called the special meeting to discuss the possibility of a liquor license being granted to a first class hotel on the beach, stated that 27 out of the 30 directors were present at the hearing and that

the vote as recorded was 24-2 in opposition.

On the strength of such overwhelming opposition, President Goding appointed a special committee to appear at any future hearings that might be held to oppose the granting of liquor licenses at the beach. The committee includes Douglass Hunter, Kenneth Ross, George Maythem, John Dineen, J. Walter Hollis, Kenneth Langley and the three Precinct Commissioners, Col. George Ashworth, Ernest Underwood and James W. Tucker, Jr.

Although the Town of Hampton voted "dry" when the local option question last appeared on the ballot, the state Liquor Commission may grant a liquor license to a "first class hotel even though it is situated in a "dry" town. Several efforts have been made to secure a license in Hampton during the past years, but each time the application was not approved due to the strong opposition of citizens and town officials.

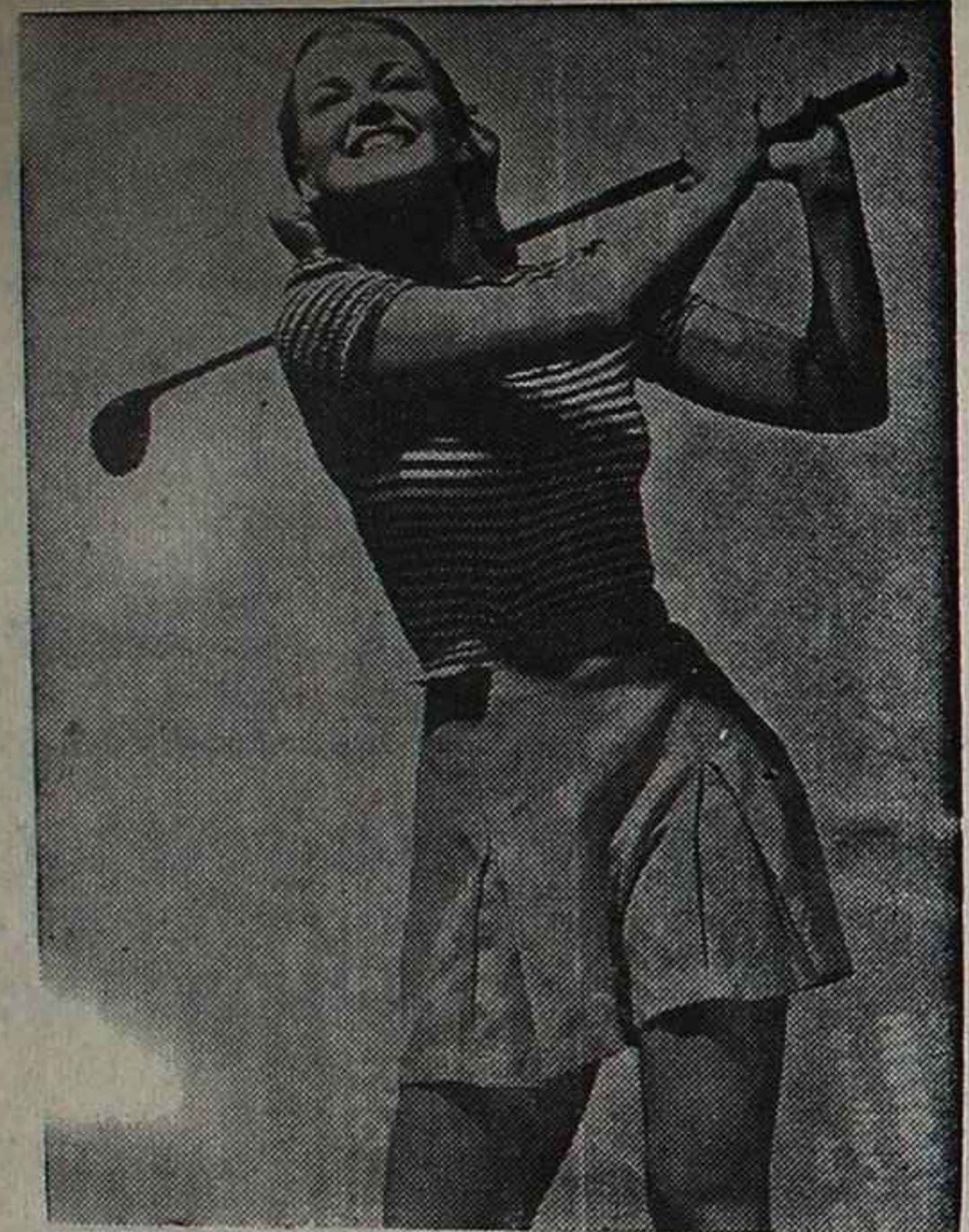

reside with their daughter at 1262 Columbus road, Boston, in a two room apartment, are anticipating the arrival of another heir sometime early next year, after which they hope to find larger living quarters.

"Two years after," the family of this famous yet modest young man, is strictly civilian, enjoying the diversions of any normal American family.

Mrs. Sweeney made a name for herself in the history of the Air Corps in the spring of 1944 when the B 29 bomber was still a military secret and stationed at Elgin Field, she had the distinction of being the first lady to take a ride on a B 29.

The Nagasaki pilot who is the

27-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. John J. Sweeney of North Quincy, Mass., keeps in touch with his former associates of "atomic bomb" fame, one of whom is Colonel Paul N. Tibbets, Jr., of Orlando, Fla., the Hiroshima pilot whose splendid performance was observed by the then Major Sweeney. Major Sweeney's crew flew off the right wing of the Hiroshima bombing plane, in order to obtain the knack of the feat for it's own historic flight. This gave Sweeney's crew the distinction of being the only crew to have the experience of two atomic bomb missions. Shortly after returning from the Pacific, Sweeney was engaged as trainer for personnel for the Bikini tests and also served as technical advisor for the film, "The Beginning of the End."

Questioned in an interview at "Twin Gables," the tall, good looking veteran pilot, expressed his doubt about the possibility of presenting another war, unless there is a tremendous change in human nature whereby the old standard of truth, neighborliness and unselfishness is regained. He believes moral philosophy, never yet demonstrated in world diplomacy, will be the only thing to avert the catastrophe of a third world war, which would be an all out atomic bomb battle. In regards to Russia, he expressed his opinion that until there is more cooperation from that country we should be very watchful and as yet there is much chance for that cooperation in sight.

His cherished possessions include the pictures of the "fire and fury" left behind by his bomber plane. "The Great Artisti," named for his bombardier, which are displayed on the walls of his home.

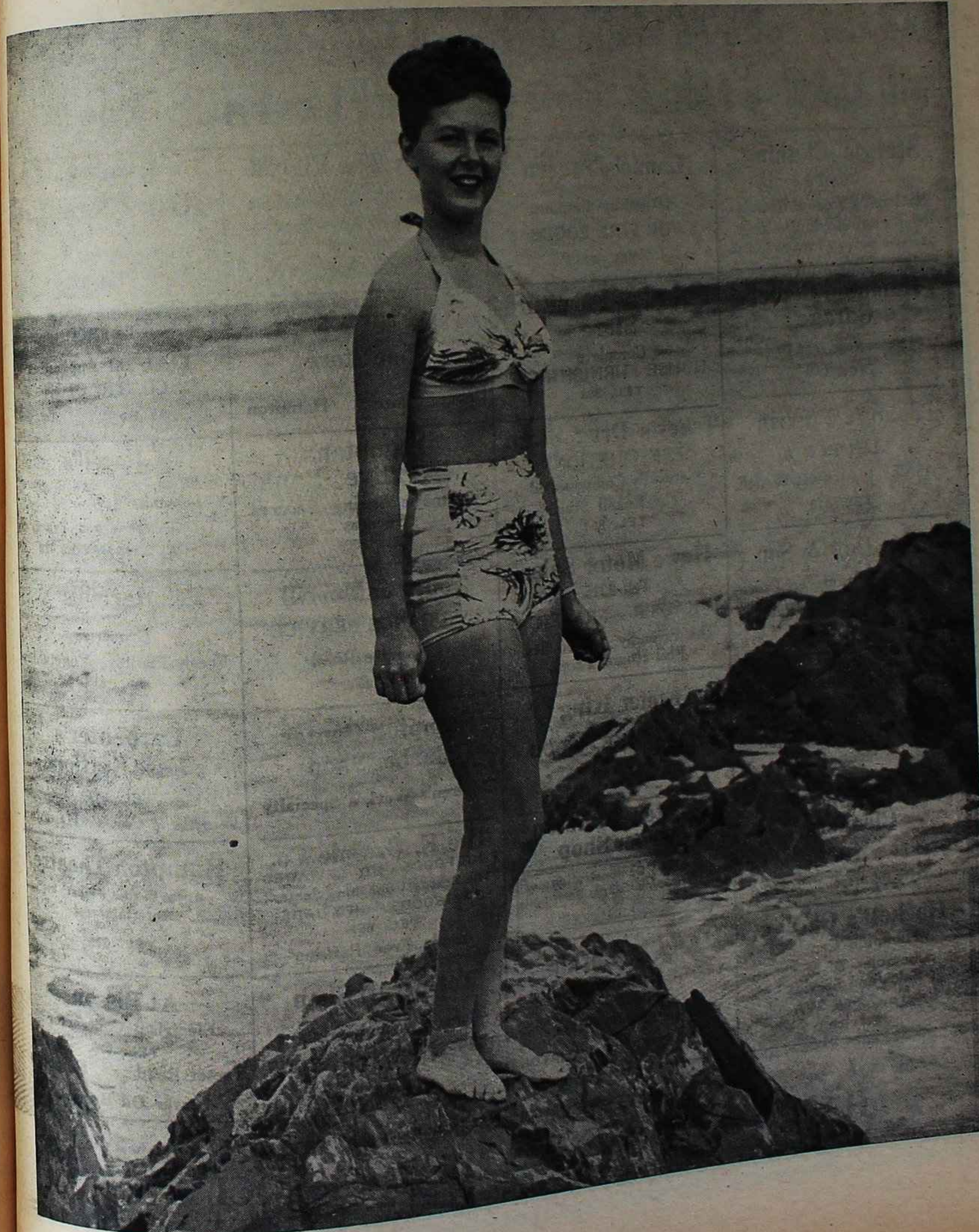
