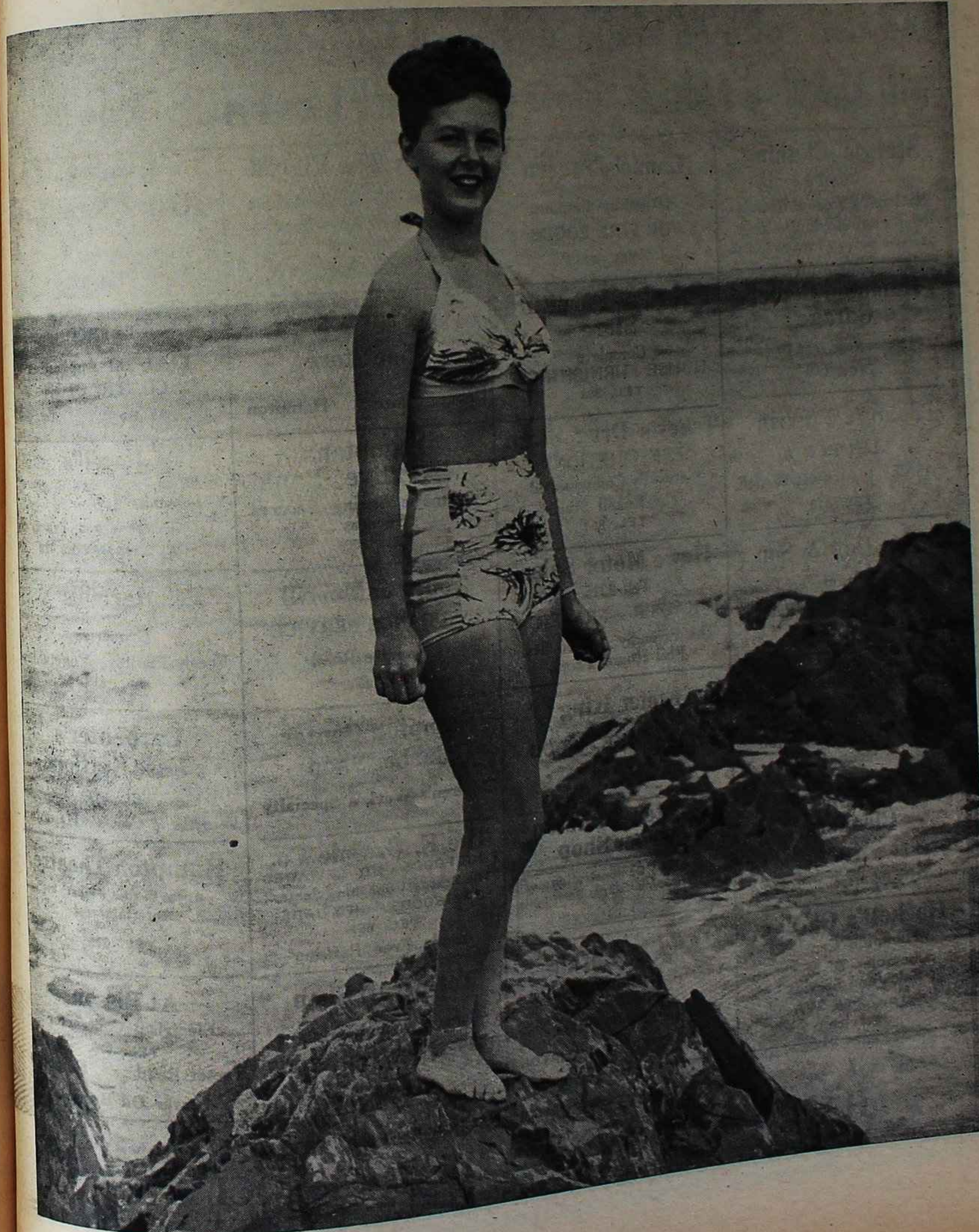

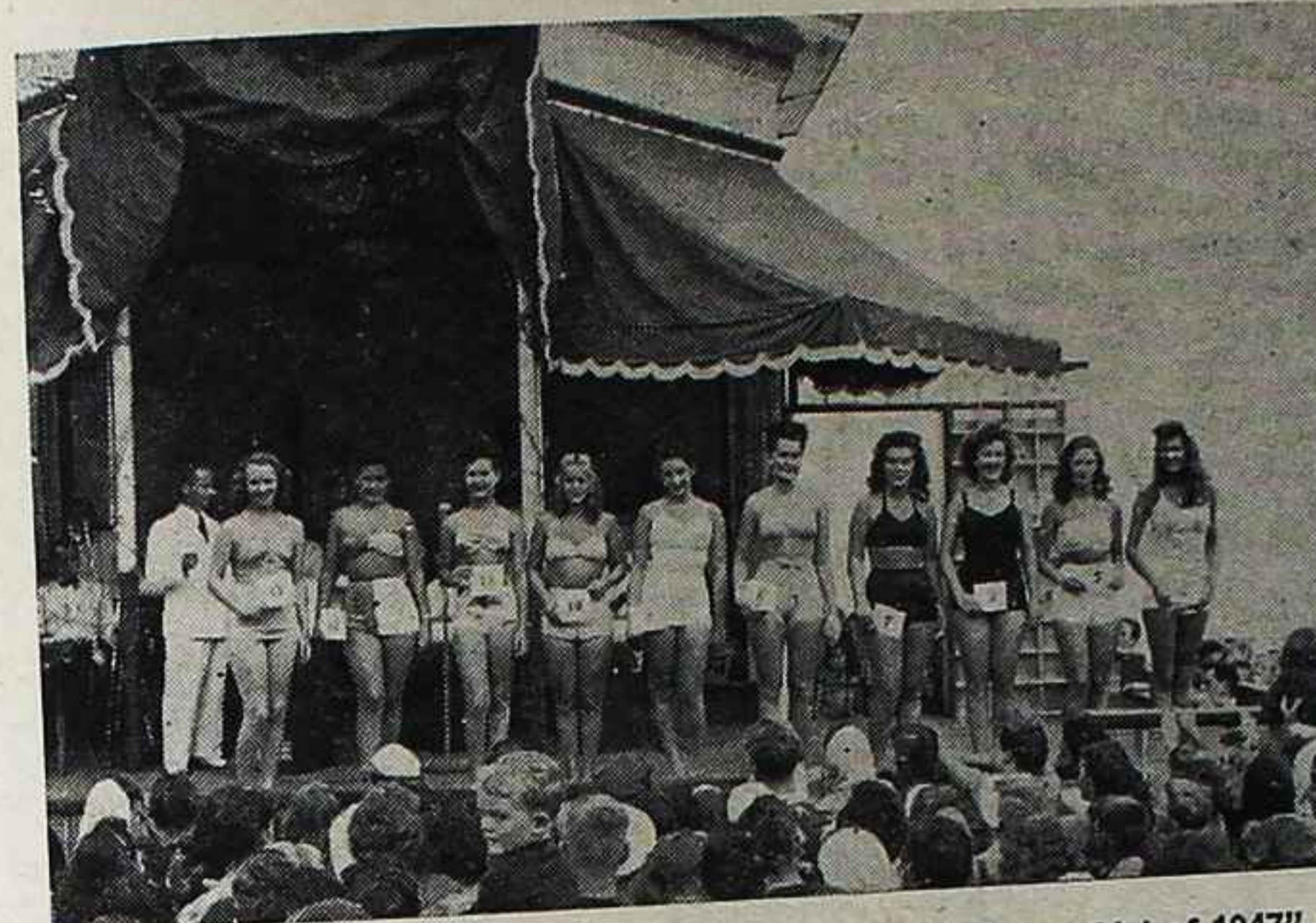

**Randall To Exhibit
Jap Suicide Boat
At Eastern States**

Al Randall, local store proprietor, will exhibit a Japanese Suicide speed boat, called "JISATSU" at the forthcoming Eastern States Exposition at Springfield, Mass., where an expected attendance of over half a million people are expected from Sept. 14th to the 20th. "JISATSU" meaning suicide in Japanese, is 18 feet long with a beam of 6 1/2 feet and weighs nearly two tons. It has a 6 cylinder, 75 horse power motor which speeds it through the water at over 35 knots, faster than any battleship afloat. 1,000 pounds of SHIMOSE, Jap TNT was carried in its bow, designed to explode on impact with its designated target.

These boats were employed by the cunning Japanese War Lords in a vain attempt to cripple or destroy our tremendous amphibious operations in the Pacific, where hundreds upon hundreds of them made fantastically fierce attempts to sink or damage our battle wagons around Lingayen Gulf in the Phillipine Islands, south of Manila and the coastal areas of the Japanese home islands.

The war trophy was captured at OKINAWA with its explosive intact and its dead pilot shackled to the steering wheel, killed by a 50 mm bullet from a United States PT boat. Lieutenant J. J. Walsh of Watertown, Mass., brought it back from Japan aboard a United States Escort destroyer.

"JISATSU" came into Mr. Randall's possession several months ago. He plans to exhibit it at the better show places in America and Canada. It is being shown this week at the Essex Agricultural Societys Fair in Topsfield, Mass.

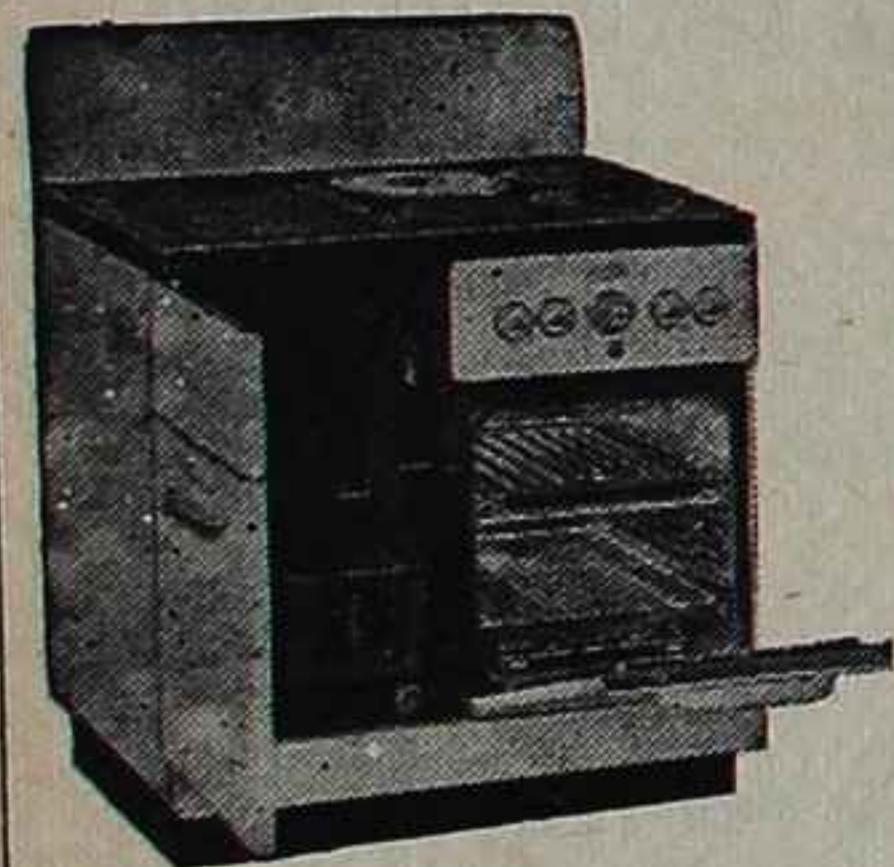

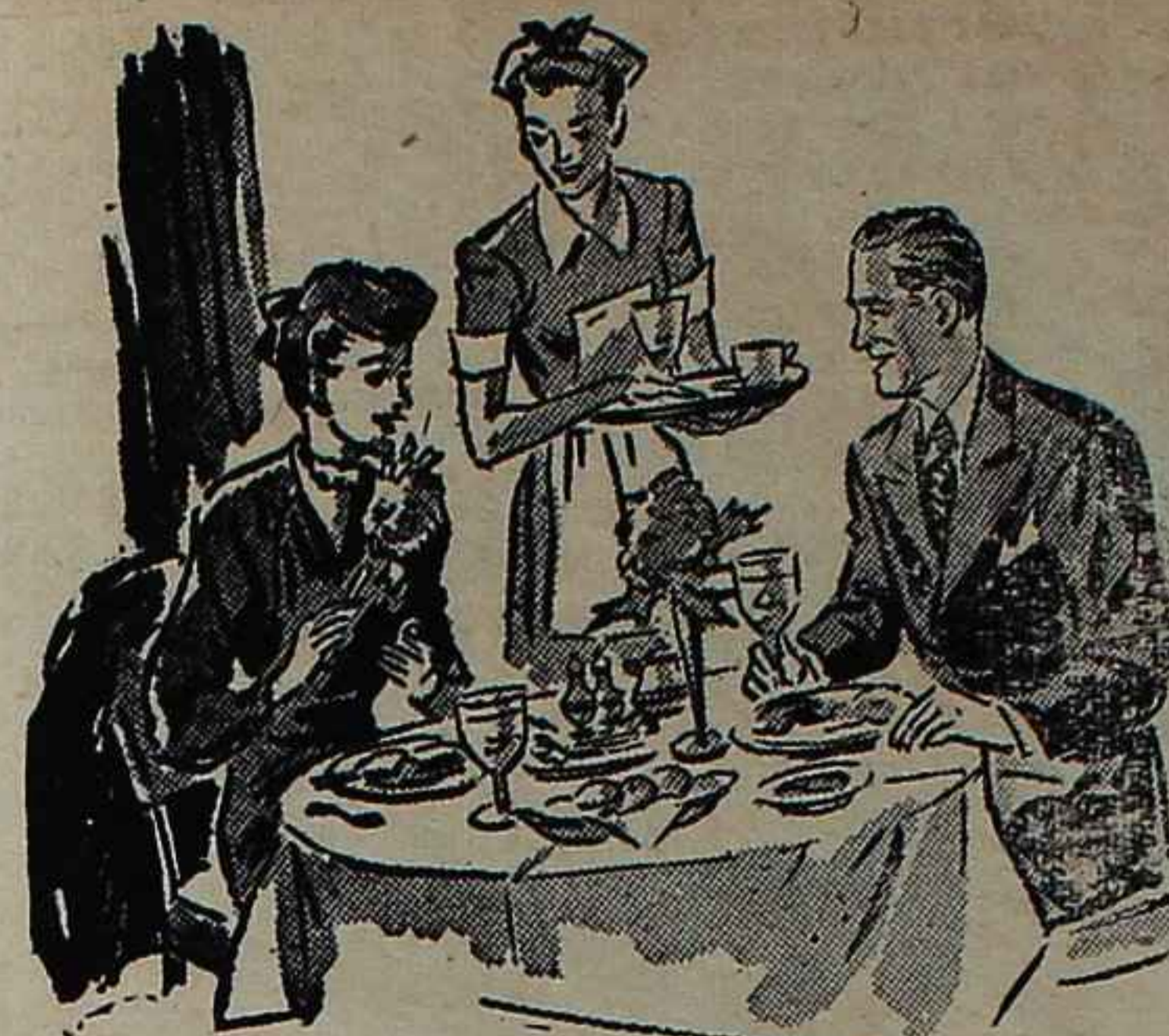
