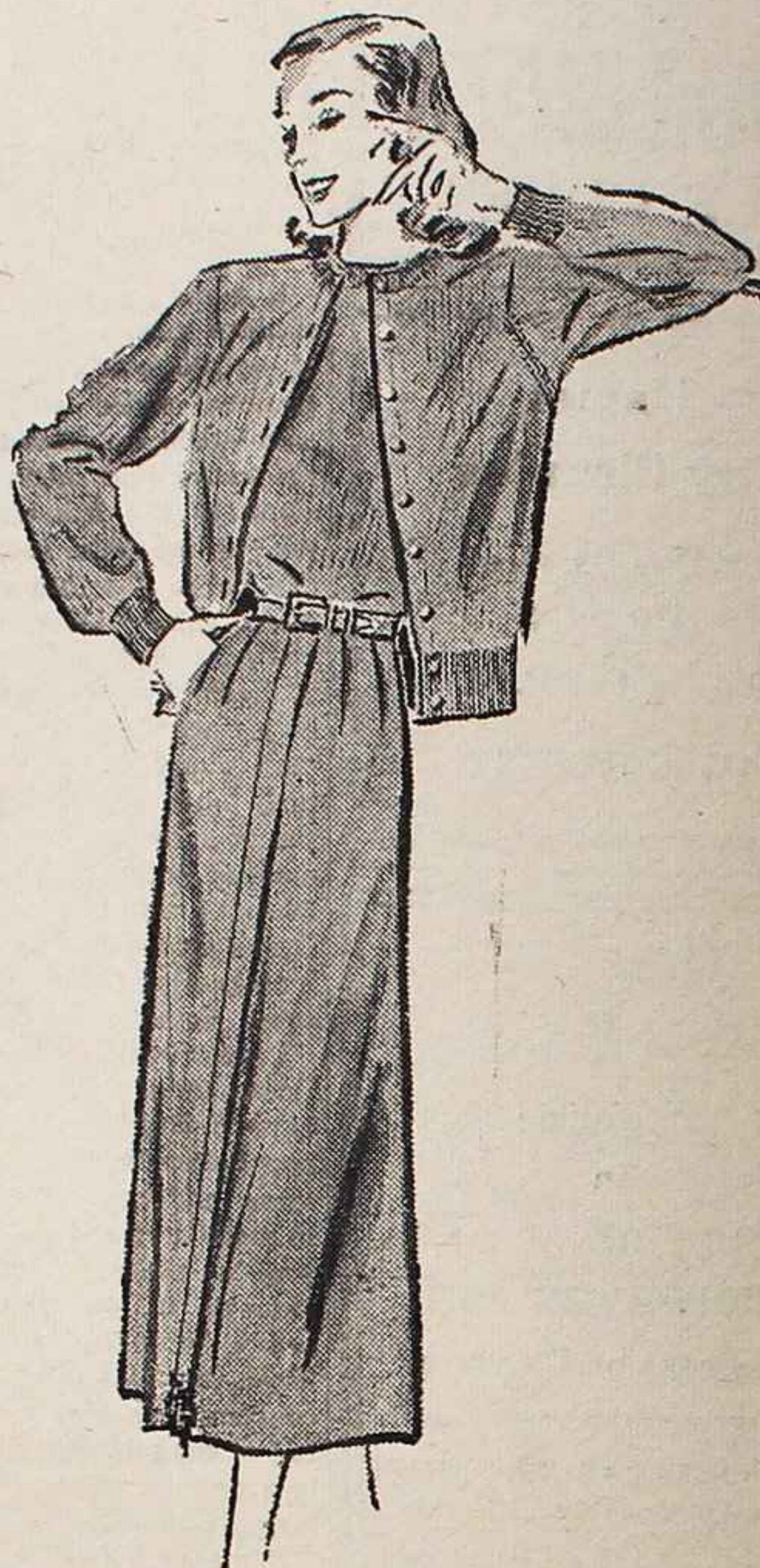

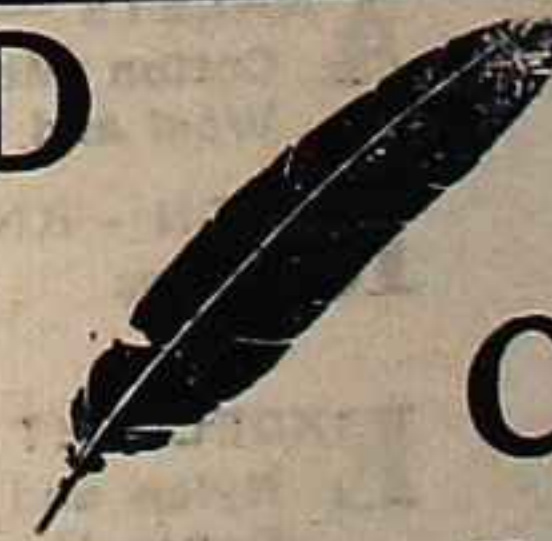

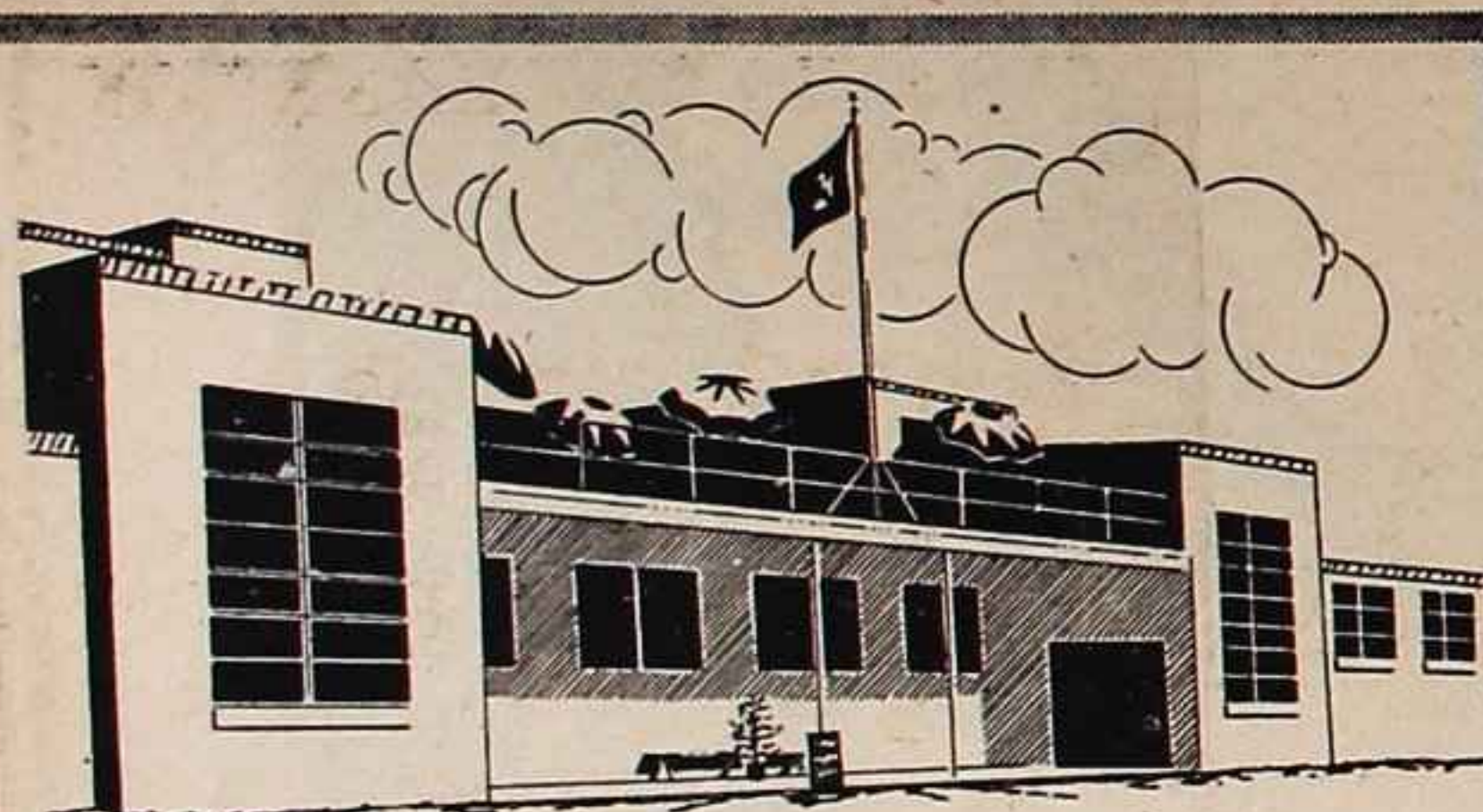

SINGING WIRES

When Dog Days have dragged through their sticky time and September starts down from the Northland, when there's a touch of crispness at dawn and sunset and birds begin gathering for autumn conventions before the southward hehira, there's an interlude of peaceful beauty when the wires along country roads make late-summer melody. That telephone wires strung along the silvered-weathered poles can sing in varied keys is due to scientific facts which learned technologists could explain.

But a 12-year-old lad on the way home from district school is not concerned with scientific phenomena. A fellow expects to use a reasonable amount of time before getting home to start the chores. He has woodchuck dens to check and hornets' nests to reconnoitre. He explores beneath the old plank bridge and climbs a tree to get an empty bird nest. And then, suddenly, he hears the song of the wires. On a bright, sunny day with a moderate air current, there's a steady, musical humming. There are high soprano overtones and lower alto notes as the breeze freshens and then hesitates. There's gaiety, cheer and optimism in the wires' overture to fall as the fragrance of late-cut rowen spreads perfume in the air.

On dark days when it's fixing for a storm there's a different song—lower pitched, ominous and wild. The music swells to crescendo as the song of the wires matches the mood of Nature. There is something half-pagan in the way man's handiwork responds to the God of

Storms and throws deep chords from the long, taut, man-made strings in the air. Men and women living far from the farms and peaceful country roads they knew half a century ago can remember the songs of the wires to which they listened. There is something powerful, compelling and dream-making in the music as the song swells to awesome intensity and then diminuendoes to soft faint harmony. It would be well if life-harassed men and women who have half forgotten the dreams of long ago could sit beside a sun-blessed country road and listen once again to the mysterious, stirring songs of the wires.

**Famed Exhibit
'Jail On Wheels'
Visits Beach**

Hampton Beach was fortunate last week in having an unexpected visit from Sheriff J. Edward Slavin and his "Jail On Wheels."

Traveling from Portsmouth, where the jail had been on scheduled exhibition, to Boston where the sheriff is attending a prison convention, he stopped at the beach to visit his friend, Chief of Police John J. Malek, and stayed here Friday and Saturday.

Mr. Slavin, who was sheriff of New Haven County, Conn., for twelve years, retired from public office on his fiftieth birthday and subsequently founded the Boys' Village for Homeless Boys in Milford, Conn.

A lecturer and author, he originated the First Offender program, heard for five years before the war on the Mutual Broadcasting system; he is a member of the Board of Governors of the National Sheriff association; the International association of Police Chiefs, and also belongs to the American Prison association.

Sheriff Slavin's jail includes an exact duplicate of the electric chair at Connecticut State prison; a bucket system jail cell, which is used by 90 per cent of city and county jails; a sound scribe, an instrument used for taking confessions and telephone conversations; a series of police guns; a federal laboratory display, including leg irons, handcuffs, iron claw, tear gas bombs, gas projectiles, a fountain pen gas bomb, sirens, whiting blinker lights; fingerprint equipment, which includes a special Federal light for detecting finger prints on money, firealarm boxes, etc.; a teletype and a two-way police radio.

The mobile unit was built for the sheriff at a cost of \$15,000 and except for contributions, has travelled all over the country at his expense.

Finding that lectures and heart-to-heart talks with prisoners usually were in vain, Sheriff Slavin said, "It's easier to help the kids before they get in trouble. That's why I hope, some day, to have more of these "Jails on Wheels" going around the country. It's the best way I know to show youngsters that they can't win in the game of cops and robbers. If we can get that message across to enough boys and girls before they go wrong, we'll need a lot less jails like this—on wheels or off."

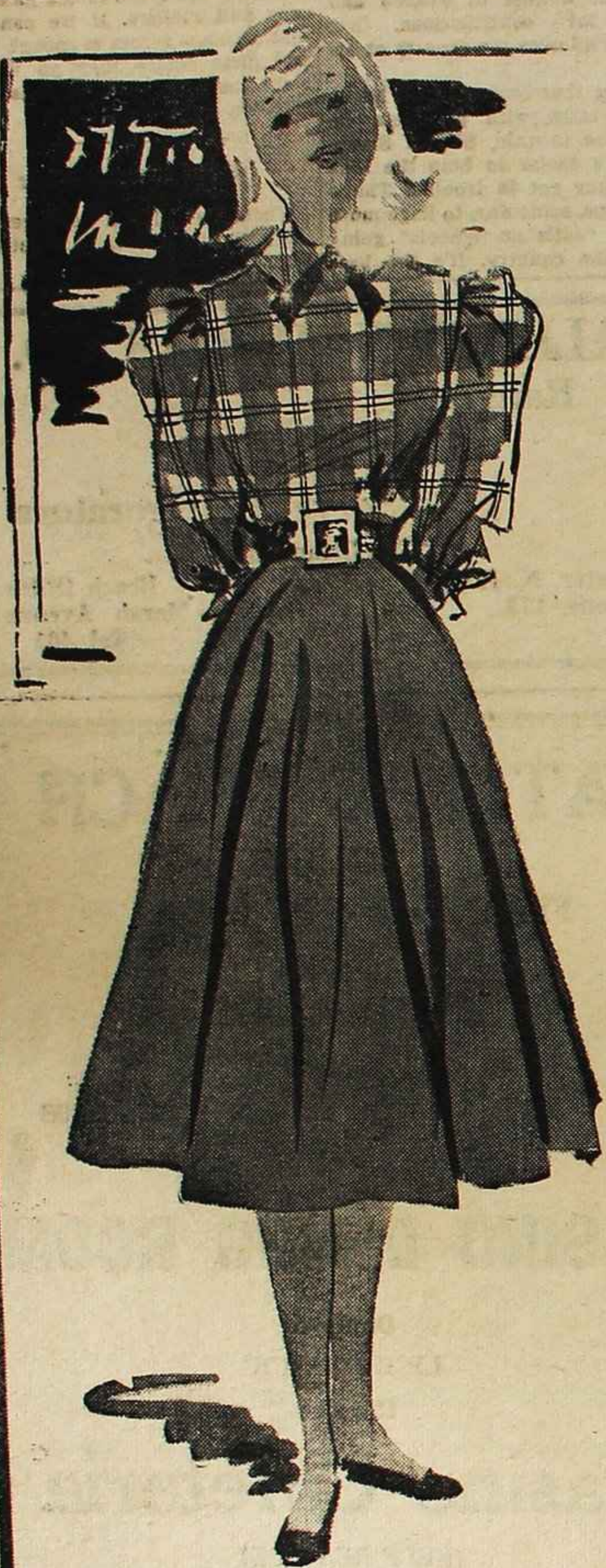
