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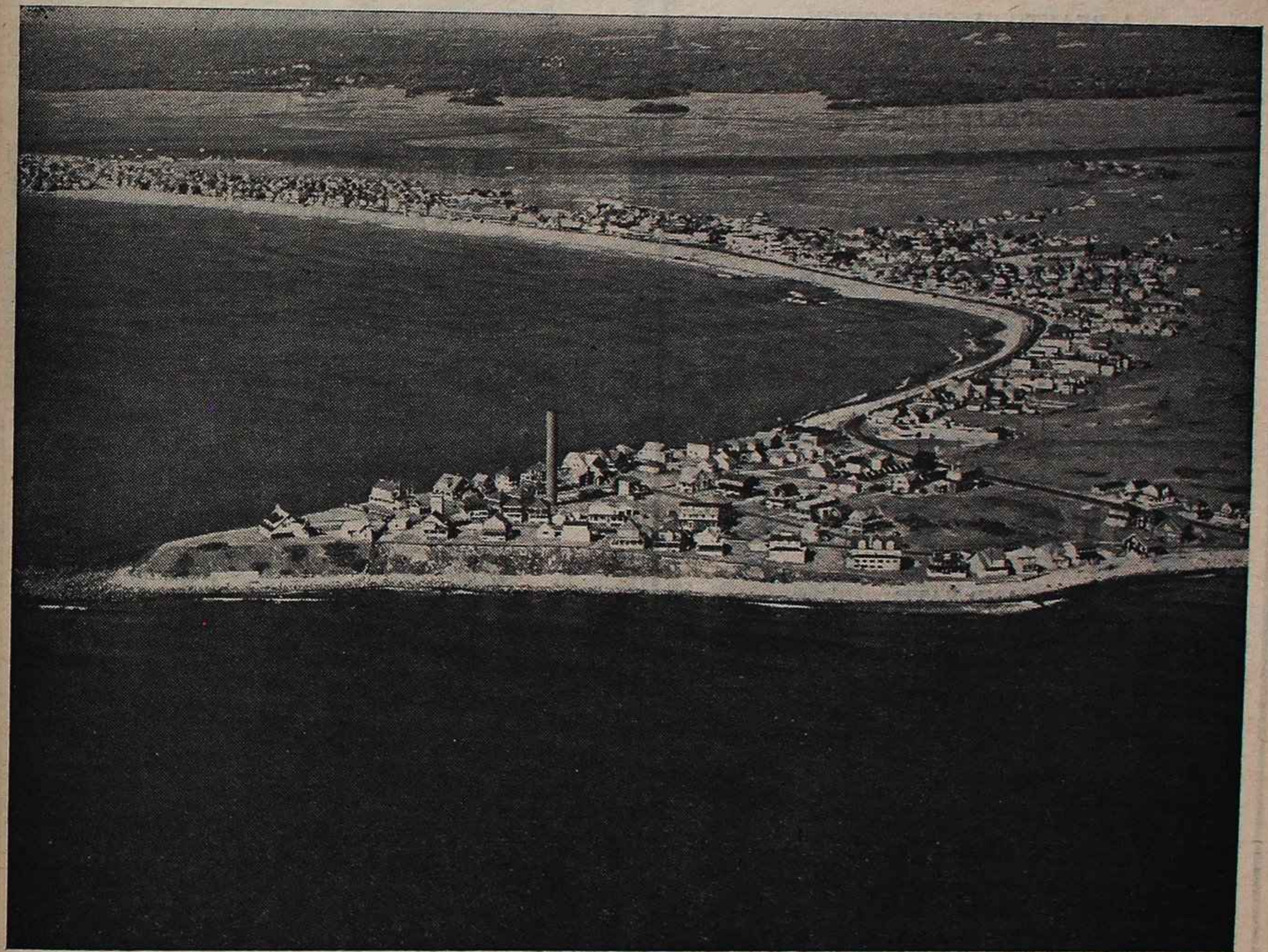

Children Eagerly Await 'Big' Day Of Summer

Merrow Acts To Secure Data On Station Closing

No action is contemplated at the present time on the possible closing of the Coast Guard Lifeboat station at North Beach, Hampton, it was learned from Washington sources this week.

Congressman Chester E. Merrow, who has expressed a deep interest in maintaining the operation of the station, wired President Ray L. Goding of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce, that the Board of Survey, which held the public hearing here this week, has not submitted its report and that U. S. Coast Guard officials have promised him that any contemplated action concerning the Hampton Beach station will be discussed with him first.

The telegram received by Mr. Goding reads as follows:
 "I have conferred with Coast Guard Officials in reference to continuing the operation of the Hampton Beach Coast Guard station. They informed me today that the

Three Vocalists Winners Monday In Talent Show

Hampton Beach, July 13 — The New Hampshire Legal Lobster Association, with the cooperation of the New England Fish and Game Department, the Hampton Beach Village District and the local Chamber of Commerce is planning to spend at least \$1,000 in the near future for the propagation of lobsters along the New Hampshire coastline. The project will take the form of the careful planting of spasm lobsters.

Since its inception, several years ago, this group of about one hundred active lobstermen and their friends, has endeavored to revive the sea and shore fishing industry in this state by conservation and propagation methods and by urging upon state, county and local officials the great need of more thorough and more active enforcement of the present fish and game laws covering the taking of lobsters.

New Summer Theatre Offers Varied, Popular Entertainment

Hampton joined the straw-hat circuit this season when the Hampton Beach Playhouse, featuring some of the country's best talent, opened its doors for a ten-week engagement.
The transformation of the old New England barn on Winnacunnnet road into a theatre, involved several weeks of preliminary work by stage manager Bernard O'Rourke and managing director Charles C. Mello before the company arrived on the scene.

When the third act curtain closed on "Dear Ruth" on June 29 — the opening night, the packed house literally made the rafters ring, climaxing the countless months of hard work and headaches that go into a project of this kind. Organized by Mr. Mello, a native of Lowell, Mass., and himself a well-known writer and actor, the eight-member cast came from all over the country to give Hampton its first summer stock company.
All having at one time or another appeared with the Lowell State Theatre Guild Players in Lowell, Mass., their backgrounds well qualify them to be included on the list of the country's summer theatres.

In addition to conducting her own school of elocution in Boston Beverly Artz, the group's leading lady, has found time to work with the American Theatre Wing (appearing in their production of "Nine Girls"), do several radio shows over WMEX, play the leading role in a NEPRO movie and appear with several stock companies. She studied under Wilma Dearborn Carter and is a graduate of the Bishop Lee School of the Theatre.

In addition to teaching dancing in New York, Rita Akerson has appeared on television shows, is a puppeteer and has played with several stock companies throughout New England and in Detroit, the past winter season being spent with the Lowell State Theatre Guild Players.

English and Journalism courses at Northeastern university in Boston have helped actor Arthur Cunningham to add the duties of publicity director to those of acting and being resident manager. He is well known to radio audiences in Boston, Lowell and Nashua and was on tour during the war entertaining the servicemen and has done shows at Veterans and Child-

ren's hospitals. A writer as well as an actor, Mr. Cunningham has written material for Bob Hope and many night club entertainers.

An alumna of the American Academy of Dramatic Arts in New York, Betty MacFarland has a fine reputation for her versatility on the stage and has done shows in New York in addition to seasons

appearance in the Lowell State Theatre Guild production of "John Loves Mary." Last season he spent on tour doing dramatic readings.

Those who saw Muriel Brown as the maid in "Portrait In Black" and then again in the third week's production of "Oliver Oliver", have vouched for her talent as a character actress. Miss Brown came to Hampton directly from radio work in New York and Boston. Starting her radio career as a dramatic actress, she has done free lance work over WEEL, WEZ and Tel-A-Vix studios, among others. Last summer she acted in, as well as being resident manager for, Franklin Trask Productions and has become well known in New England from her appearances with professional theatre groups.

A graduate of Emerson college in Boston, William Morey has been connected with many little theatre groups in Massachusetts and during the war was hailed as a lead-

ing master of ceremonies in several Army shows. His performance contributed a great deal to the success of the recent run of "Portrait In Black."

Carrying on where his ancestors left off, Bernard O'Rourke, who hails from Detroit, has chalked up a long list of productions, having to his credit appearance with stock companies in Hollywood, Detroit, Indianapolis, Douglas, Michigan and Fort Huron. He spent last season with the Lowell State Theatre Guild and has been associated with the Pasadena Playhouse. Among his accomplishments is his performance with Charlotte Greenwood in "Leading On Letty." He, too, has done much in the radio field and in addition to his musical ability, is a master of dialects.

The members of the Hampton Beach Playhouse are very fortunate in having as their director, Charles Mello, whose fine work has been evident in both past productions and who, as seen in this week's play, is continuing to bring out the best in the entire cast. He has been a director at the Windbrooke Playhouse, the LGM Stock Company, the Lowell Stock Company and several other companies in New England. Associated with Paramount studios in Hollywood for two years, he also wrote and directed for the RKO circuit and received a special letter of commendation from the U. S. government for writing shows for the Army. He directed a movie, "They All Began the Same", for NEPRO, a short subject company.

The efforts of any theatrical group would be wasted if it weren't for the producers. The backers of our own local playhouse are William Dabilis and John Tatsios, assisted by William Andrews, all of Lowell. Their first venture in the theatre, it resulted from many discussions and plans between O'Rourke and Dabilis who were overseas together. Returning to civilian life, Bernard O'Rourke returned to Detroit and Dabilis to Lowell where he found that Charles Mello had not only been thinking of the same thing, but was aiming at Hampton for the summer theatre. Andrews has taken the responsibility of watching the theatre when the Players aren't there. When they move out, he moves in.

Winding up the list of the resident members is Leo Panas as scenic artist. And in addition, some local talent has had the opportunity to appear with professionals this season, the most outstanding to date being Helen Jane LeRoux, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. LeRoux, Lafayette Road. Miss LeRoux, student at Hampton Academy, delighted the audience with her performance in "Dear Ruth". Others well known in this area are Hildegard Wall, noted artist of Rye Beach, whose paintings are displayed in the theatre, and Allan Tracy Bird, III, a popular member of the Rye Players.

This week the Players are offering "Claudia", to be followed by "An Inspector Calls", "Meet the Wife", "Rope", "The Milky Way", "John Loves Mary," and "Separate Rooms."

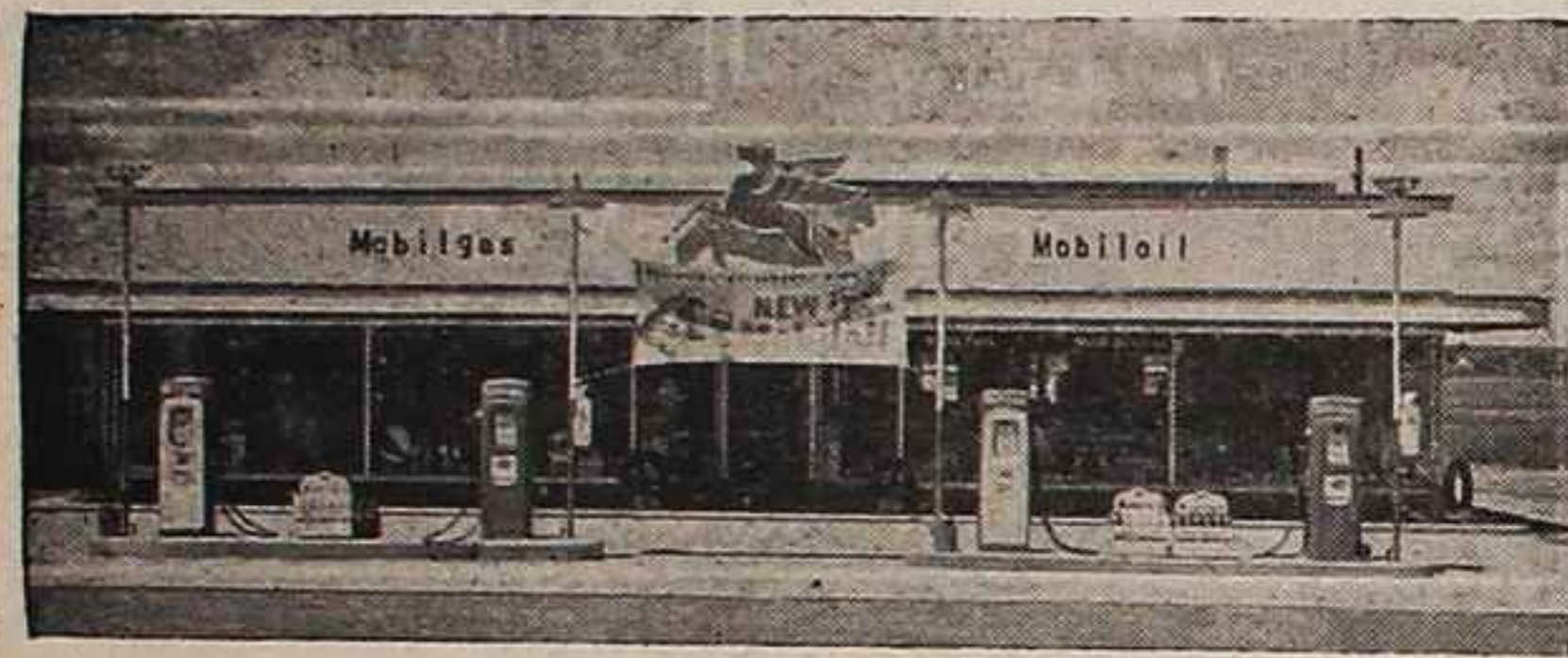

The association sponsored House Bill 413 in the present legislature, a measure setting up a Sea and Shore Fisheries department. Under the bill it was hoped to separate in the eyes of the law, the men who fish commercially from the group which hunts and fishes for sport. The House Committee on Fisheries and Game which heard the bill, was sympathetic to the general aims of the proponents but believed that the state's present financial status is such that it cannot now afford to set up another department which undoubtedly would cause a further drain on the general funds, at least for the first few years. So the committee amended the measure in a manner which, under the circumstances, is perfectly satisfactory to the Association.

The lobstermen volunteered to accept the provisions of the amended bill which just doubles the present license fee, with the understanding that the additional revenue thus made available will be used for more supervision of sea and shore fisheries. With the welcome assistance of Wyman Boynton, Solicitor for Rockingham County, the enforcement provisions relative to the taking of lobsters, have been redrafted and greatly strengthened. All in all, House Bill 413, as amended, tends toward a remarkable improvement in the present laws governing the state's sea and shore fishing industry.

The main point of contention has always been the taking of "short" lobsters. In fact, big-time racketeering in connection with the illegal taking and sale of short lobsters brought about the formation of the N. H. Legal Lobster Association. There has been so much profit involved in this illicit business that those who are engaged in it can well afford to take the chances of fines and jail sentences which they may possibly receive. And while the well organized and seemingly well protected gang continues its profitable operations, in spite of law enforcement agencies and courts and despite occasional convictions, the lobsters along New Hampshire's all too short coastline, due to these depredations, are

slowly but surely being exterminated.

The N. H. Legal Lobster Association points out that while there has been a one hundred per cent increase in the number of lobstermen since the last war, there has been a marked decrease in the number of legal-size lobsters taken. Members of the Association surmise that the number of short lobsters, illegally taken and sold and otherwise disposed of, has constantly been increasing despite enforcement authorities. And they further believe that this is the big reason for the rapid depletion of legal lobsters in the New Hampshire coastal waters. Altogether too few lobsters are given a chance to reach maturity.

The main objective of the Association is to restore to New Hampshire, through rigid enforcement and proper methods of conservation and propagation, a traditional industry which for almost three centuries has been of great importance to the economy of the state. And this commercial industry, closely allied with the state's recreational program, brings nearly a million dollars in new money into the Granite State every year. In order to do its part along these lines the House Committee on Fisheries and Game of the present Legislature intends to address a petition to the members of the New Hampshire Fish and Game commission, asking that special consideration be

given immediately to the crying need for the most careful enforcement that is possible of all laws governing the taking of lobsters in New Hampshire coastal waters and suggesting that the addition of Bill 413, as amended, be used for enue, made available under House this purpose.
