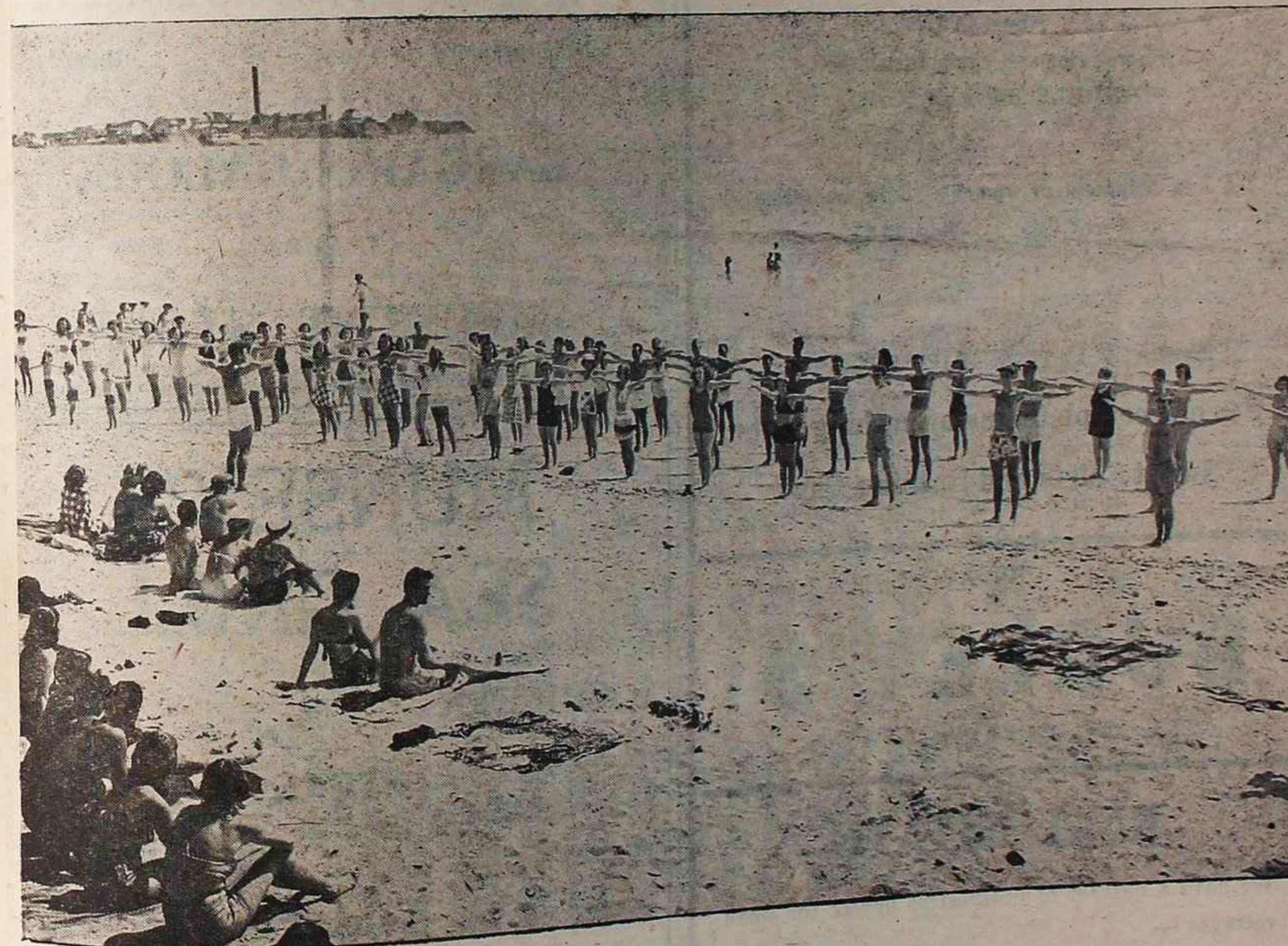

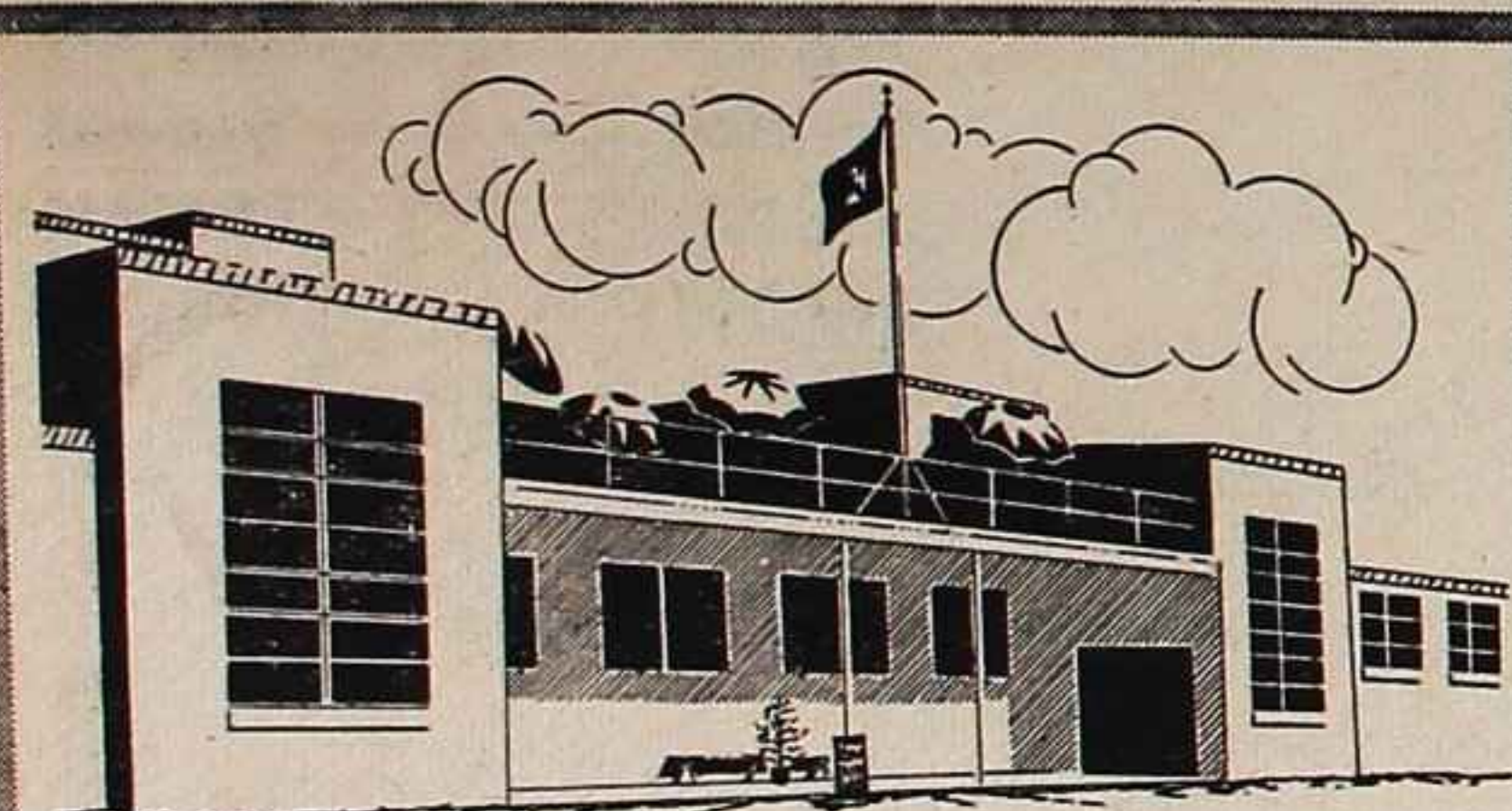
Whittemore Cup which has been in play for a number of years. Following the conclusion of play, Dr. George T. Bottomley of Boston, president of the club will present prizes.

Rita Akerson as Mary McKinley is convincingly in love with her returning soldier boy, and in the sort of comedy role he does so well is Arthur Cunningham.

Bernard O'Rourke worked hard for this one and the result is good. Mr. O'Rourke is attractive and likable as Sen. McKinley. Adding to the general fun is Betty MacFarland as Mrs. McKinley and Muriel Brown as Lily Herbish, a girl with a fascinating cockney accent, and terrific eyelashes.

Richard Mason and Leo Panas as Army brass are amusing to say the least as they get tangled up in red, white and blue tape.

The Hampton Players are finishing a season of hard work and good performances. The director, W. Lawrence Baker, deserves much of the credit for the success of the past month's performances.

toward the Atlantic, ending the Granite State's third heat wave of the summer season.

Accompanying rains brought a smile from worrying foresters as the woodlands were wetted down considerably, lessening the immediate danger of forest fires and extinguishing several still smoldering blazes.

Thousands of persons lined the entire 18 miles of New Hampshire's coastline to watch the

heavy surf stirred up by the racing winds.

Little property damage was done as the nine-foot tides were whipped up to more than ten feet by the howling southeaster.

A small sailboat at anchor in Plaice Cove, Hampton, broke from its mooring and was smashed against the rocks at the height of the storm while another craft capsized and was retrieved by a Coast Guard crew.

Fish Bites Man
In Unusual Beach
Accident Sunday

The oddest fish story of all times
originated at Hampton Beach last
Saturday when a 40 pound fish
caught a fisherman.

Robert A. Dionne, 27, of Man-
chester, N. H., victim of the un-
usual accident not only has the
fish to prove his story, but a badly
scarred and swollen foot as well.

Mr. Dionne came to beach late
Friday to go fishing for sea bass
in the evening. Meanwhile, he and
his wife, Albina, decided they
would go for a swim. They were
wading into the surf and were about
waist deep in the water when Di-
onne felt something bite his foot.

Dionne took a deep breath and
went down under the surface for a
look. He saw the big fish, some-
thing which resembled a skate
fish, had caught him by a foot.
Applying all his strength, Dionne
forced the jaws open with his
hands and pulled his foot out of
the fish's mouth.

The fish was later identified as
an "angler," a marine pediculate
fish which has lures on its head
and fleshy appendages around its
large mouth to attract smaller fish-
es as prey. The habitat of the an-
gler fish is in European waters and
it is an unusual sight along the
New England coastline.

Fearful lest the voracious fish
might attack his wife or other
bathers nearby, Dionne kept the
fish's mouth open and tugged him
into shore.

The bathers who gathered around
when Dionne pulled the fish from
the water could barely believe
what they saw.

Then Dionne's boss, Joseph Lo-
mazzo, proprietor of a Manchester
upholstering company, rushed the
victim to the office of Dr. C. B.
Bailey in Hampton center, who
dressed the foot and gave Dionne an
injection of penicillin. One laceration
caused by the fish's teeth
went in the top and to the bottom
of the foot.

Dionne is an expert fisherman
in his hometown and he has won
several awards in fishing contests.
Now he has the distinction of be-
ing the only fisherman who knows
how it feels to be caught by a fish.
