Water Officials Admit System Far From Adequate

Frank admittance that the water pressure and distribution system at Hampton Beach is inadequate and that there are no plans at present to remedy the situation was forthcoming from company officials at a public hearing held Monday evening in the fire station.

Engines and apparatus were parked outside the fire station to make room for the more than 300 persons who listened for two hours to evidence and testimony that the Hampton Water Works had failed to provide an adequate distribution system to supply water at a proper pressure to its consumers in the beach area.

Other charges leveled at the public utility were (1) that the water company had continued to take on new customers without an adequate supply of water, (2) that the company had no plans to remedy the existing dangerous situation, and (3) that the public utility had delayed the installation of the salt water system by four months trying to get assurance from Precinct officials that there would be no decrease in the number of fresh water hydrants.

A 19-year-old Cranston, R. I., youth was rushed to the Exeter hospital Friday night as a result of a stabbing that took place at the sea wall near the Coast Guard Station, North Beach, when a seaman from that station allegedly attacked him with a pocket knife, inflicting wounds in the chest, back and elbow.

The victim of the attack, Joseph Perrotti, was treated at the Exeter hospital by Dr. R. N. Blake and released Saturday forenoon.

Perrotti, accompanied by a friend, Geno Pelon, also of Cranston, was walking by the wall when suddenly Coast Guardsman Shirley McCravy, 18, of Atlanta, Ga., who had been drinking on the beach with two companions, is reported to have started an argument in the course of which the stabbing took place. McCravy was arrested near the scene of the assault by Police Officers Arthur Heard and Joseph MacArdle.

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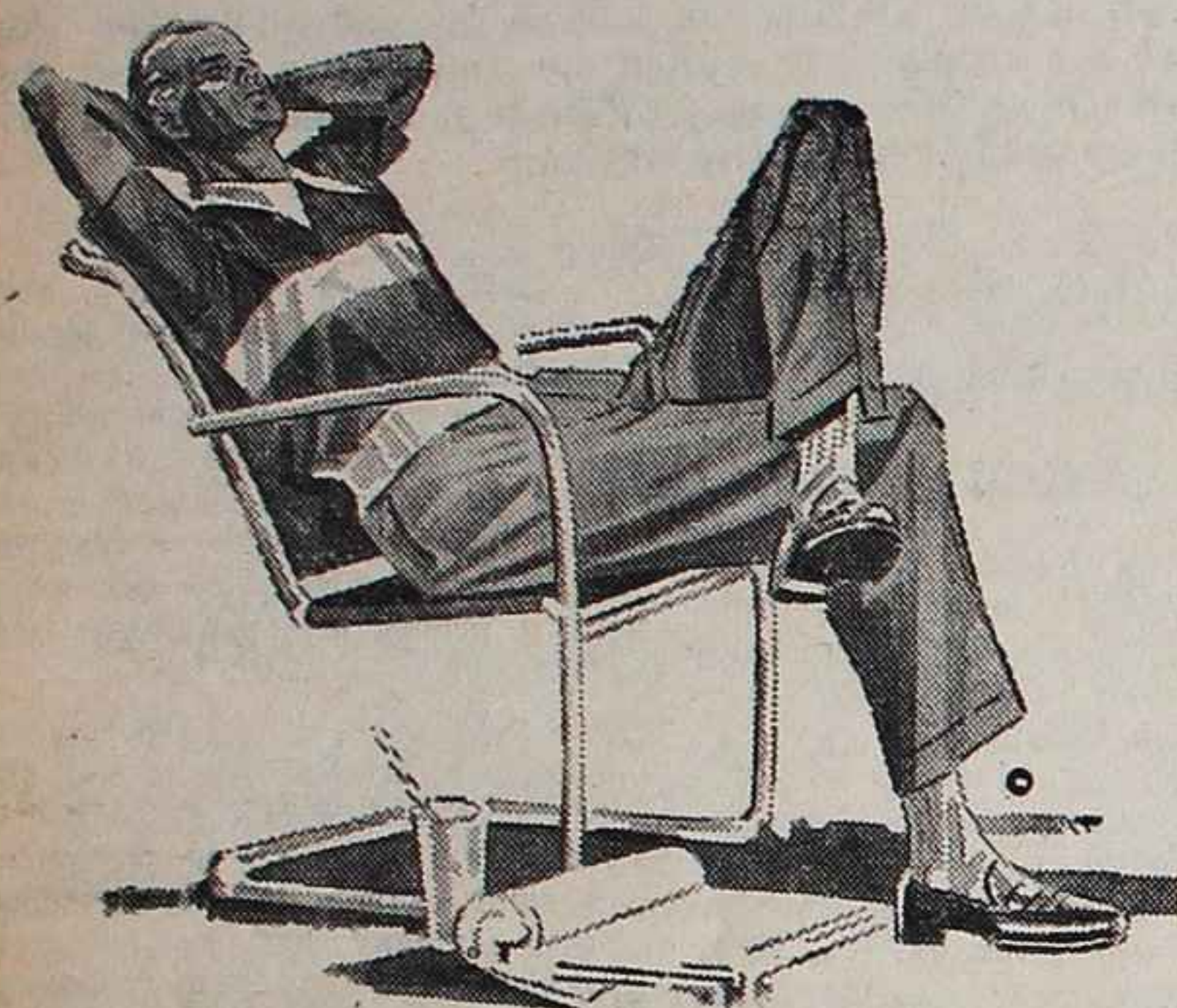

Granite State Youths Aid In Protection Of Beach Visitors

Two New Hampshire youths are among the six life guards chosen to patrol Hampton Beach this season.

William E. Glynn, of Springfield, Mass., former captain of the West Point swimming team, is head life guard. Glynn is 27 and a graduate of the U. S. Military academy in 1945. He served as life guard here from 1939 to 1942 and also was head life guard in 1941 and 1942 in addition to this year.

Joseph J. Preston, 26 hails from Arlington, Mass. He attended Harvard university. During the war Preston served with the Marine Corps. This is his sixth season as a life guard here and prior to the war served in a similar capacity at Onset, Mass.

Walter Coulson, 23 is a resident of Lawrence, Mass. He graduated from Harvard where he captained the baseball team as well as being on the football team. He is now attending Harvard Medical School. Coulson was a life guard with the Navy during the war. Although he has served several years as a life guard in pools in his home city, this is his first season at Hampton Beach.

Ernest A. Rainey Jr., former University of New Hampshire football captain, hails from Ridgewood, N. J. Rainey, 28, served with the Navy during the war. He has been here six seasons and served as

head life guard two years. For several years he was also callisthenics instructor.

The New Hampshire life guards are Henry Stone, 23, of Manchester, and James J. McDonnell, 21, of Hampton. Stone, who is a student at the University of Vermont, has been a member of the staff of life guards at the beach from 1944 until the current season. McDonnell, a student at the University of New Hampshire, is having his initial season here.

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Lions Club Tag Day Will Benefit Eyesight Fund

The Lions Club of the Hamptons' at a recent meeting of the executive board and the membership, designated this Saturday, July 29, as Lions Tag Day for the benefit of their Eyesight Conservation and Blind funds. This is the fourth annual Tag Day conducted by the club to raise funds for the distribution of eyeglasses, reading aids and other devices for the improvement of eyesight in the Hamptons and surrounding areas. The solicitation of funds will be conducted throughout Hampton, Hampton Beach, North Hampton and Seabrook, and will engage the services of the entire Lions club and their wives, or Lionesses, as the women are called within the club.

The chairman of the event, J. Walter Hollis, stated that the club looks with pride upon their past record in aiding the eyesight of local residents needing attention and reviewed a recent case where the eyesight of a three-year old child was saved through surgery by one of the nation's outstanding surgeons at the expense of the Lions club from funds raised in Tag Days similar to the coming one.

President Ray L. Goding of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce presided at the meeting and stated the purpose to be that of securing adequate water pressure for the beach area so that vacationists at New Hampshire's largest recreational center would not have to live in constant fear of a disastrous fire. He also stated that the present water supply was not giving beach visitors the benefit of proper health protection.

Secretary Charles F. Butler of the beach chamber traced the

history of the conflict between the beach and the water company to secure an adequate supply and stated that in March 1948, the Precinct had voted to build a salt water system at a cost of \$60,000 to do what the Water company was supposed to do, but what in 29 years it had failed to do.

Butler also charged that the utility had forfeited its franchise, the sole purpose of which was to provide water and that the lack of this basic commodity seriously threatened the recreational future of Hampton Beach.

Mr. Allen M. Symonds of Dedham, Mass., vice-president of the Hampton Water Works company, representing the utility at the hearing, stated that at the rate hearings held in 1938-40 the value of the water company was determined and rates set to allow a proper balance between income and expenses to furnish a company a six percent profit, but since that time the company had made several additions to the system which were non-revenue producing. Specifically he pointed to the laying of a 10 in. main on High street and a 12 inch main on Winnacunnet road in 1948 at a cost of \$40,000.

The utility officials also pointed out that the company had just recently sunk a new well off Little River road in Hampton and that the new source of supply would develop a million gallons of water a day, which would be twice the amount now available and which should prove adequate to fill the standpipe at Great Boar's Head and keep it full.

Mr. Symonds admitted that the two 8 inch mains from the standpipe to the center of the beach were not large enough to supply the present needs and that the

to the existence of a 6 inch main he did not consider the storage tank at the southern loop of the beach connecting the two 8 inch mains and when asked if this did not act as a bottleneck the utility official agreed that it did. He estimated that it would cost approximately \$12,000 to remove the 6 inch main which would tend to improve the present system.

When asked about the increase in number of consumers, the company official estimated that approximately 150 customers per year were added during the past 5 year period. Atty Burns charged that the company had taken on 750 customers during the past five years without any commitment to furnish water and without any increase in supply or distribution system.

Questioned on the ownership of the Hampton Water Works company, Mr. Symonds stated that the local utility is a subsidiary of the Northeastern Water Company with main offices in Philadelphia and that the parent company owns and controls 160 water companies in communities spread from Birmingham, Alabama to Caribou, Maine.

It was also established that the Hampton Water Works supplies not only Hampton and Hampton Beach but portions of North Hampton and Rye, where extensions had been installed during the past five years without any thought or plans to increasing the source of supply.

When asked by Atty. Burns if Mr. Symonds admitted that it was

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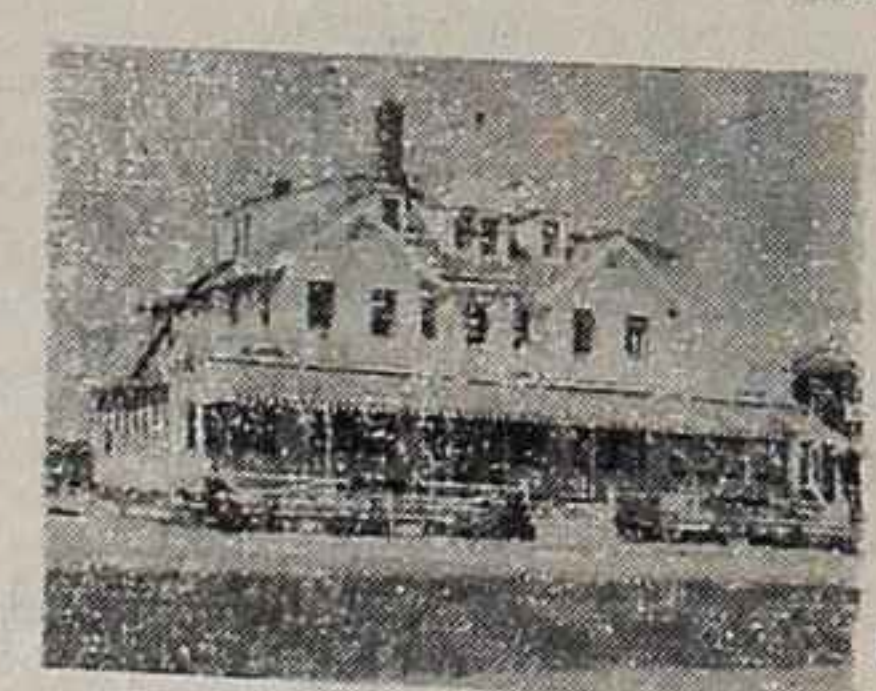

at Boar's Head grossly inadequate. And when further asked if he did not believe the distribution system grossly inadequate, the utility official also agreed that it was. Still answering pointed questions by the Dover attorney, Mr. Symonds stated that the company would need \$30,000 in additional revenue per year, a figure that was based on a 15 percent gross return on the estimated \$200,000 capital expenditure to make the necessary additions to the system. The utility official also stated that the company had no immediate plans to increase the storage facilities at Boar's Head or the distribution system in the business

area, a statement which brought an outburst of disapproval from the assembly. Mr. Symonds stated that a full tank of water at Boar's Head should give 70 pounds of pressure at the Fire Station and when confronted with the pressure readings taken July 2 and 3 at the fire station showing 16 and 17 pounds pressure on these days, the company official admitted that such a low pressure was ineffective and when further questioned about the amount of water in the Boar's Head tank, he stated that "it must have been very low." Further questioning by Judge John W. Perkins, counsel for the town of Hampton, revealed the fact that the company had a 25 percent increase in consumers over the past five years and that in one large year over 400 customers were added. Based on the company's own figure of an average water bill of \$23 per annum for its 3,000 consumers, Judge Perkins pointed out that the utility had increased its available capitalization funds by \$125,000 during the same period, but had spent only \$40,000 for improvements to the system. In answer to Judge Perkins questions it was learned that 12 new hydrants had been added to the system in the past five year period at \$90 per annum and that the town of Hampton now paid \$9,000 a year for hydrant service. This sum would give the company additional capitalization funds of \$30,000 for a total of \$155,000 in capitalization funds for new construction. Judge Perkins also brought out the fact that the water works had entered into contracts with development companies to put pipe lines in new housing projects at the expense of the development company, further extending its mains and lines with no additional source of supply. Mr. Symonds also agreed with town counsel that since the water is metered to consumers that an increased supply would increase the amount of water used and add materially to the company's revenue. Chairman Edgar F. Hunter of the New Hampshire Public Service Commission, the next speaker, stunned the audience when he said that the new pump, which was to

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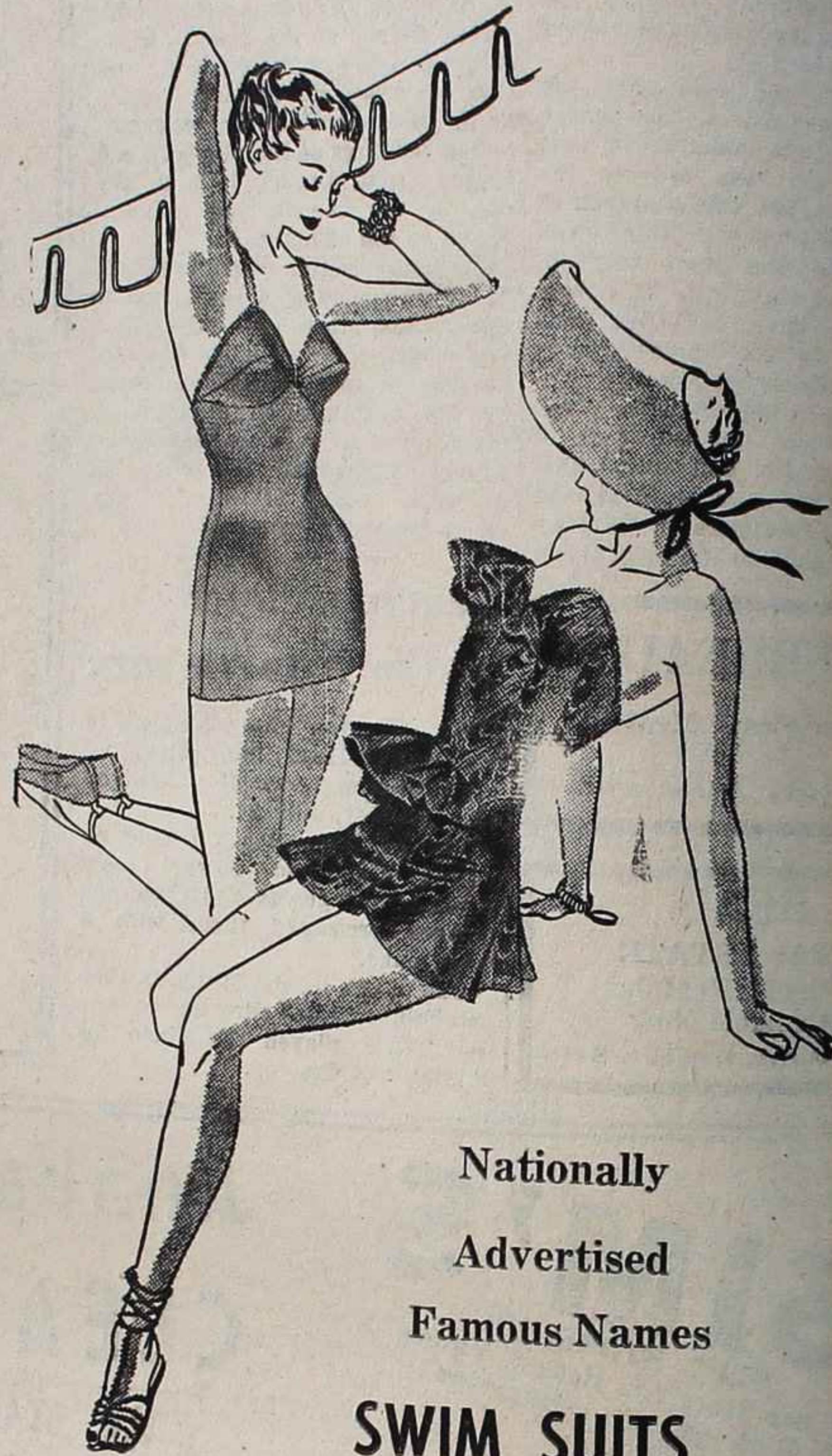
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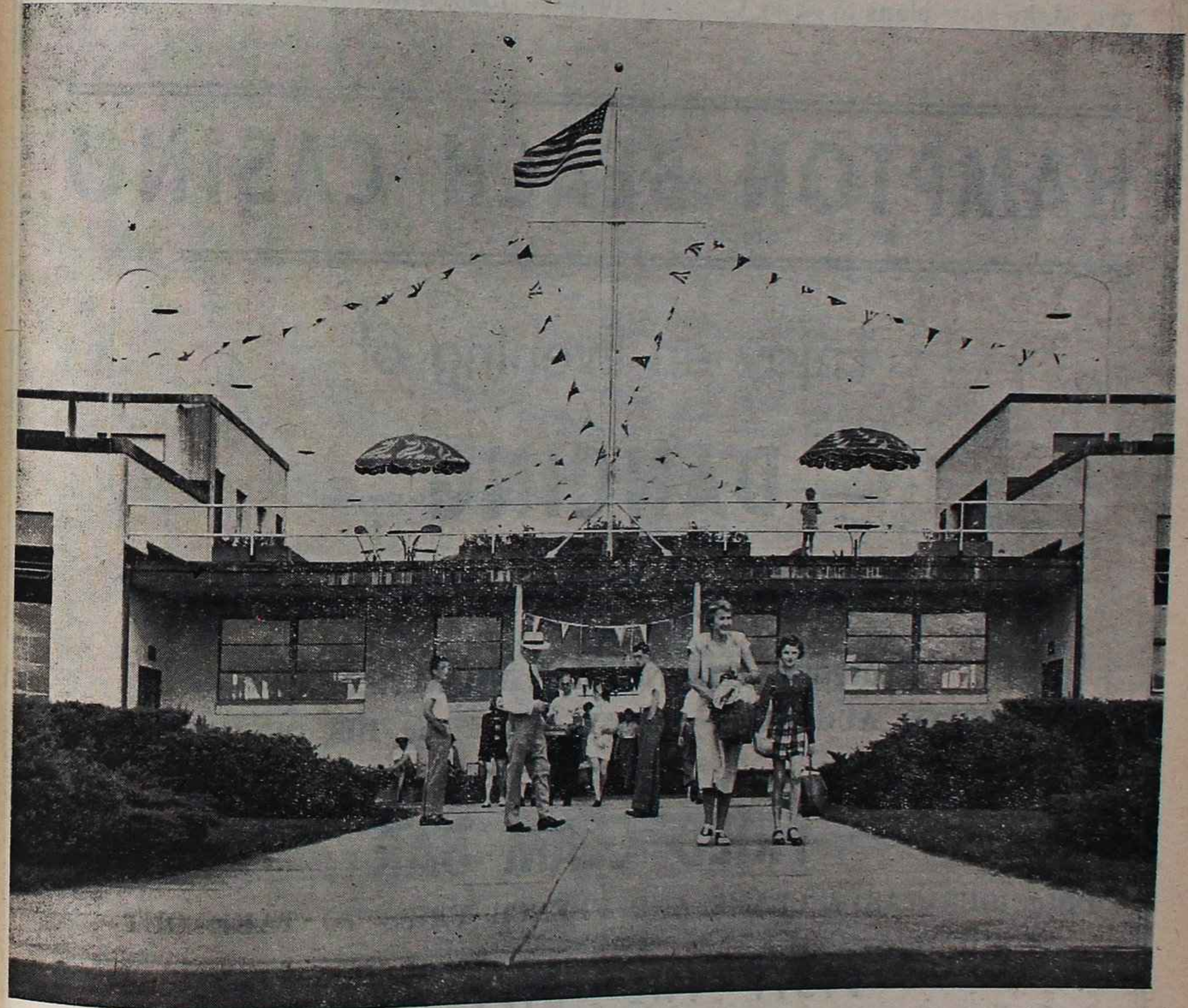
