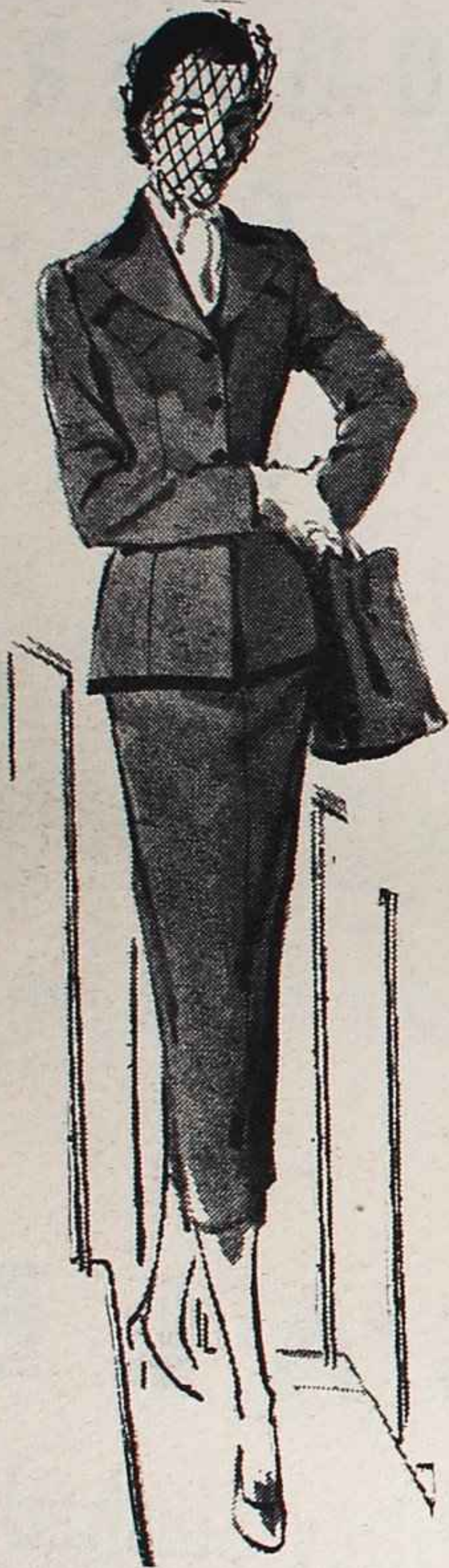

The Nudd Terrace Associates met Thursday evening for their weekly meeting at the home of Mrs. Bea Laurent.

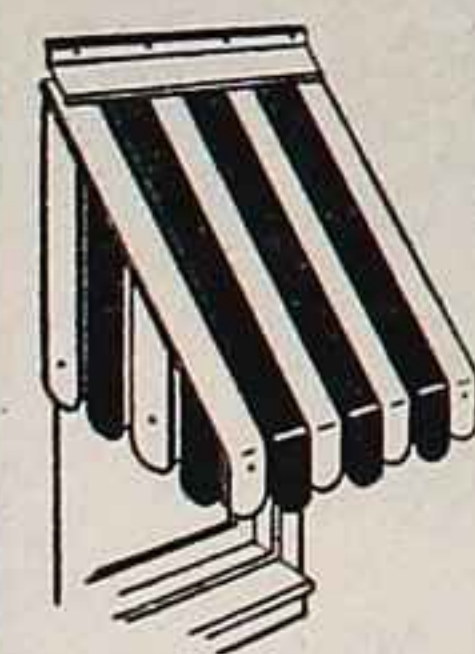

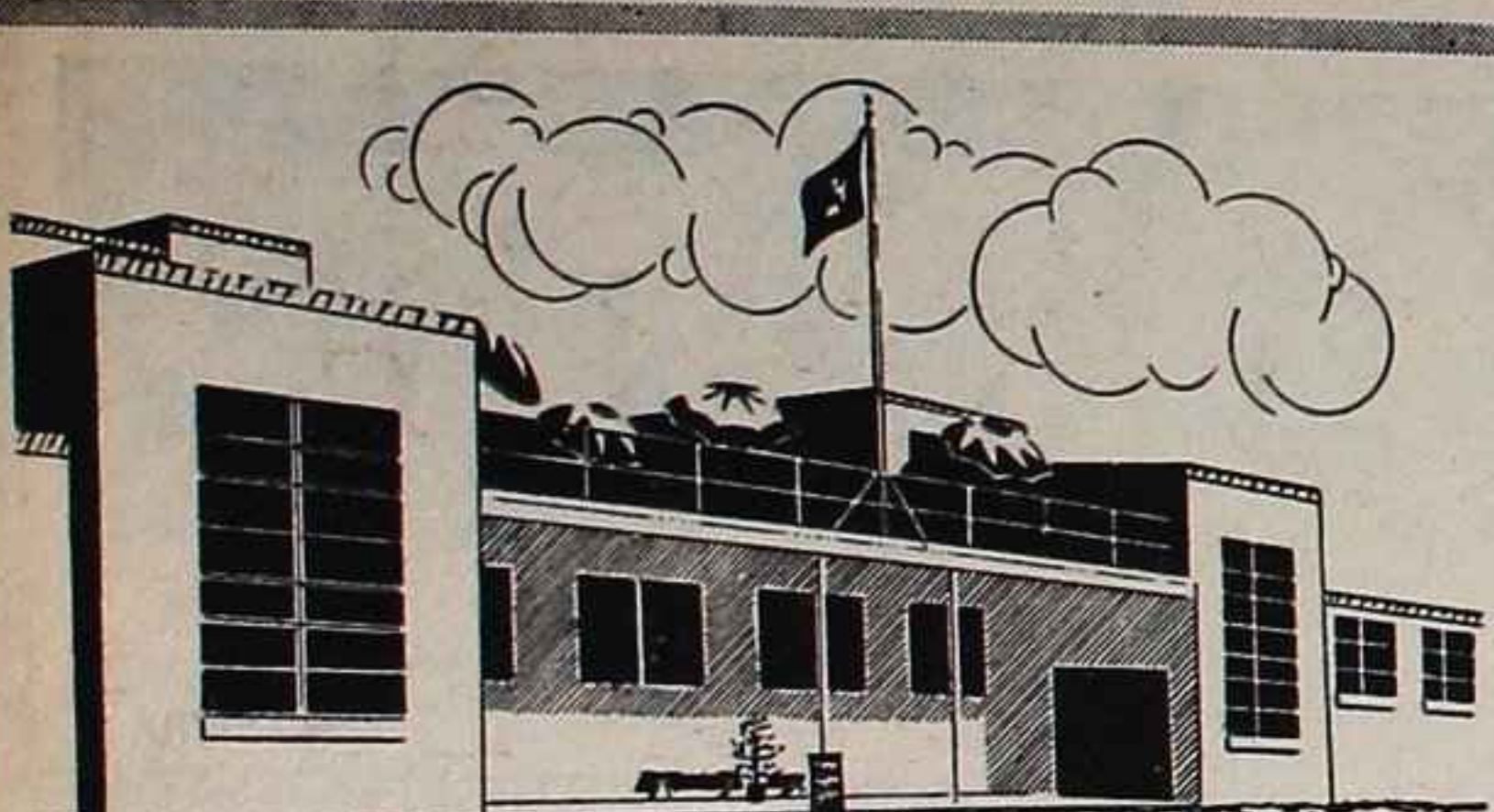

Bay State Youth Killed In Crash

A Salem, Mass., youth was killed late Wednesday evening when the pickup truck in which he was riding with five other men left the road on Route 1-A in Seabrook Beach south of the toll bridge and overturned.

Robert Weissberger died at the Anna Jacques hospital in Newburyport, Mass., where he was taken from the scene of the crash. The driver of the car, authorities reported was William P. Fearon of Brooklyn, N. Y., who was being held at the hospital for observation, and had apparently suffered only minor injuries.

Four persons riding in the back

of the vehicle escaped serious injury. They were Thomas Cassidy of Lawrence, Elliot McKaleshy of Salem, both of whom were released from the hospital after treatment and two other youth, one from Waltham and one from Somerville, Mass., both of whom are being held for observation.

Feron, the driver, reportedly told authorities he was blinded by oncoming lights, and struck a soft shoulder. State and local police are investigating.

All six youth were employed at the Hampton Beach Casino.

Hampton Beach In 1871

by Rev. Roland Sawyer

The late George Dudley Dodge, who built the first Hampton Beach cottage in 1864, told me there was but one other cottage when he built, and only two hotels, and only one family that lived there the year 'round, whose home was below Boar's Head.

The first hotel on the Beach was built by Thomas Leavitt and it

was built across the road from the foot of Boar's Head.

It was built around 1835 and was called THE WINNISIMMET HOUSE.

It was burned in 1854, and evidently it was a not too prosperous venture, for Mr. Leavitt did not build again. However his two sons, Thomas Leavitt and J. L. Leavitt built a new hotel on the site, which was called "LEAVITT'S." It was this building that stood there when we older people recall it so well.

It was four stories above a roomy basement, had a ornamental cupola, and had a sizable 3 story El. An ingenious feature of the building was that the room of every guest commanded a good view of the ever rolling ocean.

This building was built in the early summer of 1871. During the building the Boar's Head House proprietor enlarged and made more attractive his own hotel.

As late as the early "eighties" the Boar's Head and Leavitt's had most of the summer business to themselves, farther down, for a less expensive hotel stood Cutler's SEA-VIEW, and still farther down, for traffic that had scant money to spend, was Tom Nudd's Livery Stable, where such people could put their team up for a quarter and eat their lunch in one of the many summer houses, or down on the rocks if the low tide came right. When the tide was well out,

those who had come with good driving horses went down near the water edge, on the hard sand, and held their half mile brushes to see who drove the most speedy horse.

And as the tide was going out, we children, barefoot, would follow the retreating tide and pick up horse-shoe shell fish, crabs and star fish, and sometimes catch a struggling small fish stranded in a hope.

My father put a piece of screening on a hoop with a handle, and

I used to catch tommy-cod around the rocks, put them in a Mason jar, and by changing water daily and putting in a pinch of salt, they would live for months.

Plan Drive To Aid Marine Memorial

MANCHESTER, August 10 — A one-day drive on August 14 to raise funds for the proposed New Hampshire Marine Memorial was announced today by William E. Downs, chairman of the New Hampshire Memorial Commission. The "V. J. Day" fund is to be used for a memorial on the coast to bring back to the American shore for the first time the identities of men and women of New Hampshire whose lives were lost at sea.

The announcement said: "Persons in each locality should take pride in the knowledge that they are helping by their contributions to bring back to America's shores for the first time the identities of men and women of New Hampshire whose lives were lost at sea.

"Officially these names appear only on War Department telegrams. There are no white crosses to mark last resting places, there are no official markers that could have been placed on token graves at family gravesites. These are America's forgotten war dead.

"It should be considered an honored privilege for individuals, veterans' posts and auxiliaries, women's clubs, and civic organizations, to participate in this drive to make possible the erection of the

proposed memorial that will identify and commemorate the memories of 300 New Hampshire youths."

Every citizen is asked to contribute one dollar. Those who wish to volunteer their services for the drive are requested to obtain official folders from any member of the commission, which was appointed by Governor Sherman Adams. Each volunteer is to try to obtain the signatures and donations of ten persons in his locality.

"Think how your whole life can be changed in five minutes."

It takes some big thing to make us say that and it takes a big person to realize it, but adapt himself to the change. Many of us have been gradually eased off a routine course but some are thrown with a violent lurch. I know many families who have gone through it, and certainly it happened to hundreds of people the night of the Big Fire, but it was brought home to me the other night when I stopped in at chat with Mrs. Charles Brindamour.

During the day I had been talking with Bobbie Cann, an I street neighbor of the Brindamours, and Bobbie asked me if I knew young

Charlie was still in the hospital. Well, I didn't know it — I'd taken it for granted that he'd come home long ago. So I stopped in at the Marilyn and heard the whole story about 12-year-old Charles. And that's when his mother made the remark about an ordinary normal life being turned upside down.

It was just four weeks ago this Friday that all hell broke loose and the beach was almost a charred memory. It was that night that Charles Brindamour and a boy by the name of Sawyer volunteered to help some of the firemen handle hose. The two boys were riding on the side of a truck as it turned up B street from Marsh avenue. Whether the engine sideswiped a car or vice versa, isn't known, but it was on the side of the two volunteers and the Sawyer lad suffered a broken foot.

A ripped-off fender found Charlie's leg and it was some minutes later when it was realized how seriously he was hurt. He never lost consciousness for a minute and the police said they'd never seen anyone with his courage. His leg was torn so badly it was almost certain he'd lose it.

But Charlie hasn't lost his leg and what's more important, he hasn't lost his sense of humor. In good spirits, he's just waiting to get back to his fishing and the 100 and one other things boys find to do at the beach. He's able to sit up a little now. The doctors still don't know when he'll be well but they've started a new treatment learned during the war and that should bring results soon.

You know it's pretty hard for an active boy to stay still for five minutes and there are a lot of five minutes in four weeks. Those of you who know him could help the time pass by sending a card to him at the Anna Jacques hospital in Newburyport. Even if you don't know him, he's still at the Anna Jacques hospital in Newburyport.

An example of a quick come-back was seen Sunday afternoon when the machinery started humming at Junkins' candy store. Although she lost a great deal, Mrs. Junkins' employees were able to save every piece of equipment and now, just over three weeks after the fire, she's back in business. When the other businesses reopen, the section which was about the oldest on the beach should be really something. Whatever the design of the new buildings you can be sure they'll be built on a foundation of safety.

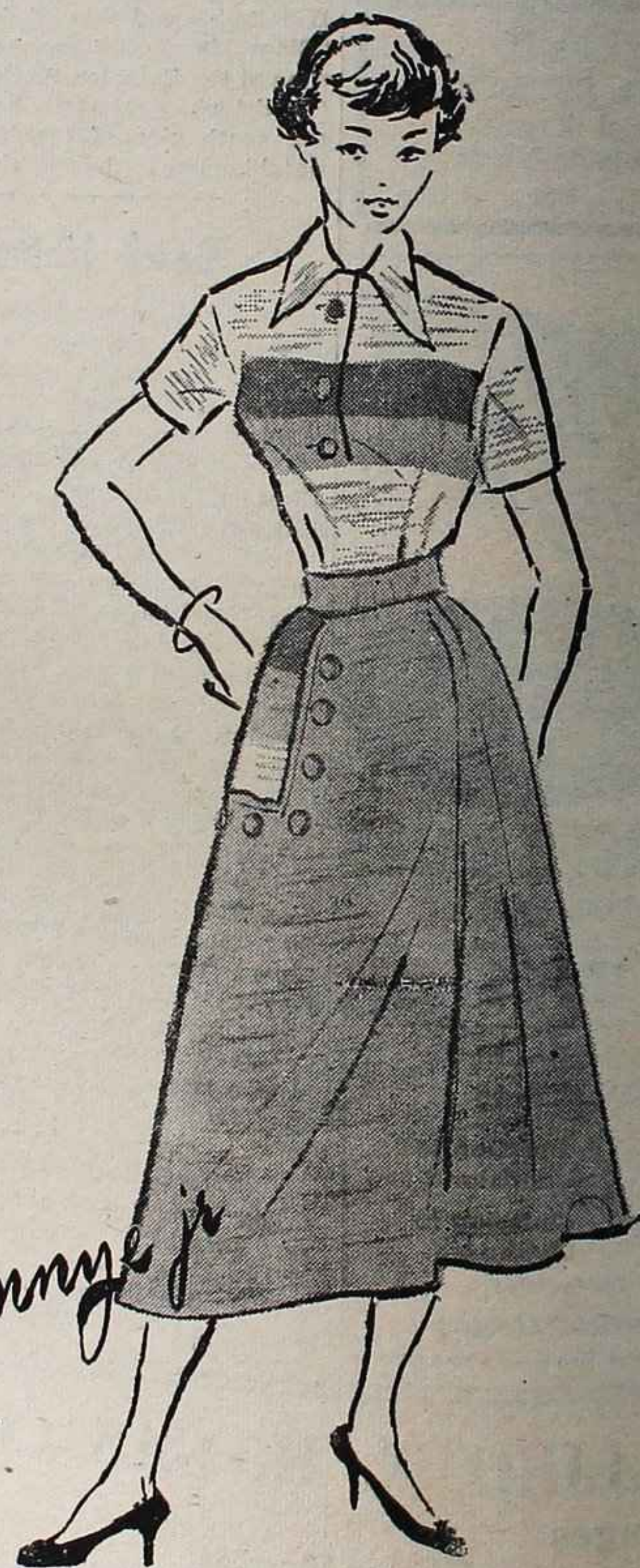

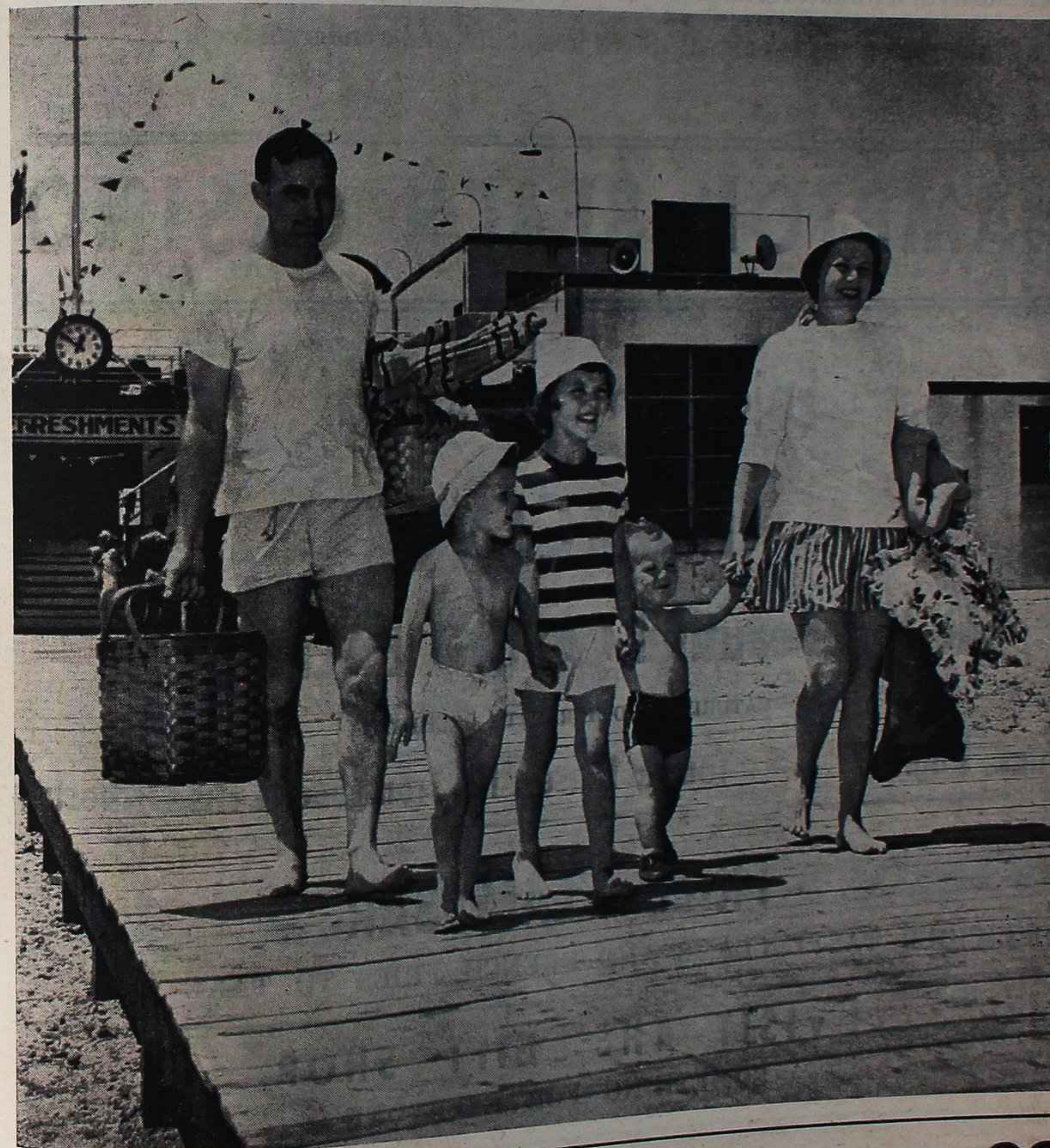
