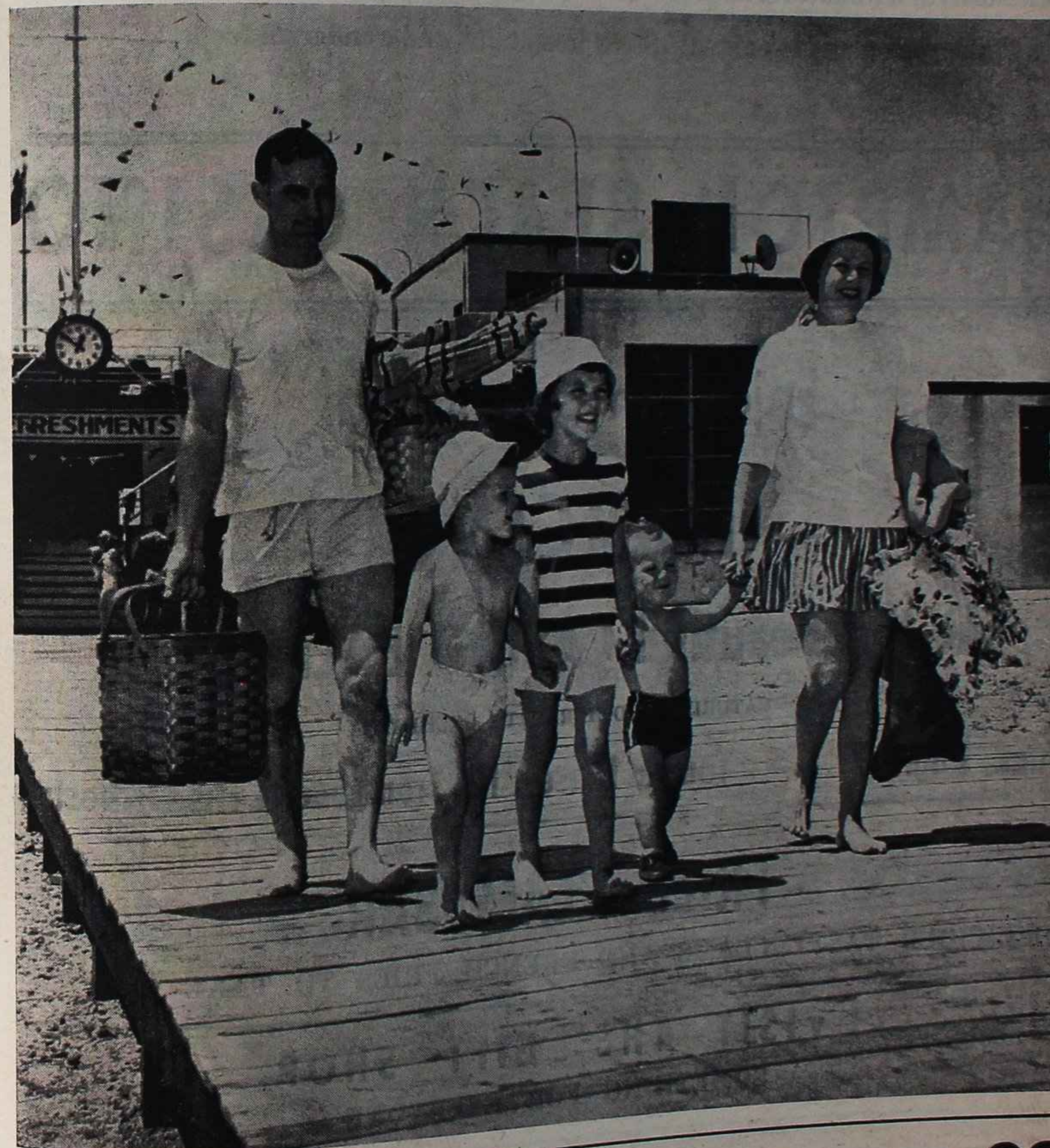

Beach Officials To Consider Water Company Proposal

Proposals for improvements to the present water system at Hampton Beach as preferred by the American Water Works Service

Company, Inc., owners of the Hampton Water Works company, will be studied tonight at a meeting of committees from the Chamber of Commerce and the Beach Precinct together with their counsel and engineers.

The parent holding company proposes to erect a steel storage tank west of Marsh avenue with a capacity of 300,000 gallons to be connected to Marsh avenue with a 16-inch main and to connect Ocean Boulevard and Marsh avenue with 8-inch mains through F street and M street.

It is estimated by the company that such changes and additions to the system, together with the new source of supply which will be available soon, will provide a static pressure of 70 pounds along the beach and will provide a flow of 2,360 gallons per minute for fire fighting purposes.

According to Charles F. Butler, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, the beach officials will meet

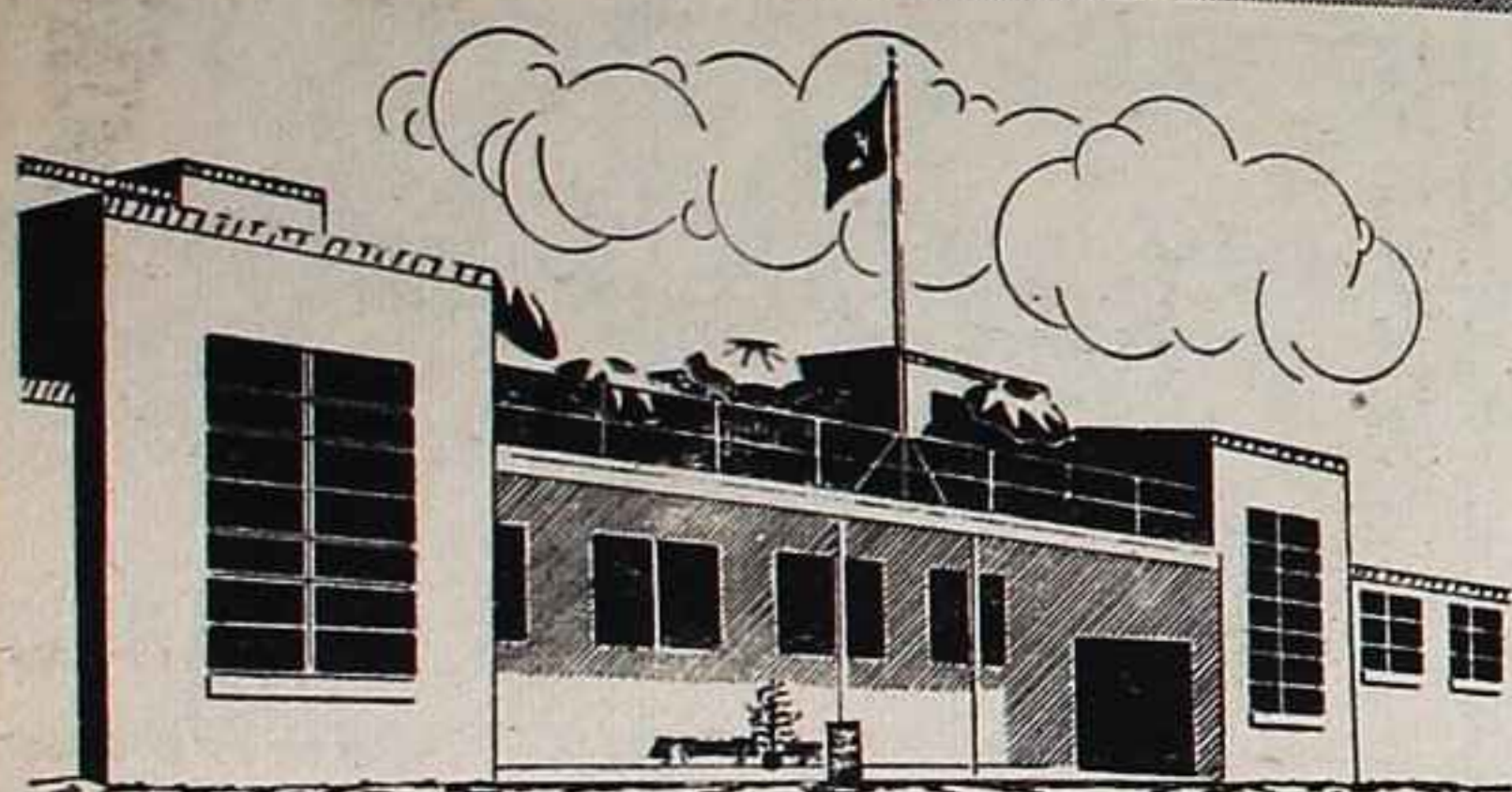

to consider whether the new proposal is the answer to the water supply problem at Hampton Beach.

The proposal comes as a result of the public hearing held July 24 at the beach fire station following the disastrous fire and complies with a request made of the company at the hearing by Atty. Stanley M. Burns of Dover, counsel for the Beach Precinct.

The letter from Mr. A. M. Symond, Asst. Division Manager of the holding company's New England District, containing the proposal follows:

"I herewith submit this report, which complies with your request made at the Hampton Chamber of Commerce meeting held on July 24."

"I first wish to correct certain errors which have appeared in newspaper articles about Company expenditures for plant improvements and additions as upon examination of the books, I find that from 1940 to 1949 inclusive, the Company spent \$116,649.68. This is in contrast to \$40,000 mentioned. There has been approved for the year 1950 a construction program costing approximately \$74,800, after deducting a refundable deposit of \$7,500 made by the Town of North Hampton. Much of this program is now completed.

"The major item in this 1950 program is for the development of a new water supply and related transmission. This project has been completed with the exception of the pump which is now en route to Hampton. Pumping tests show that the new supply will double the quantity of water now available.

"Since the Chamber of Commerce meeting, I have visited our General office in Philadelphia and have gone over the Hampton problem with our engineers and executive officers and, as a result, have been authorized to make certain rec-

Chief Malek ordered the range permanently closed.

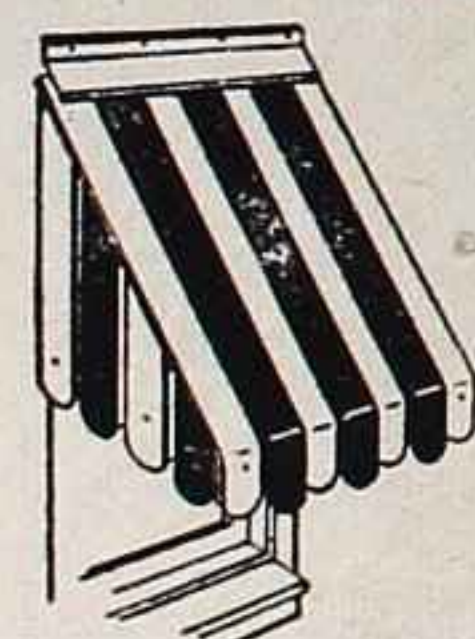

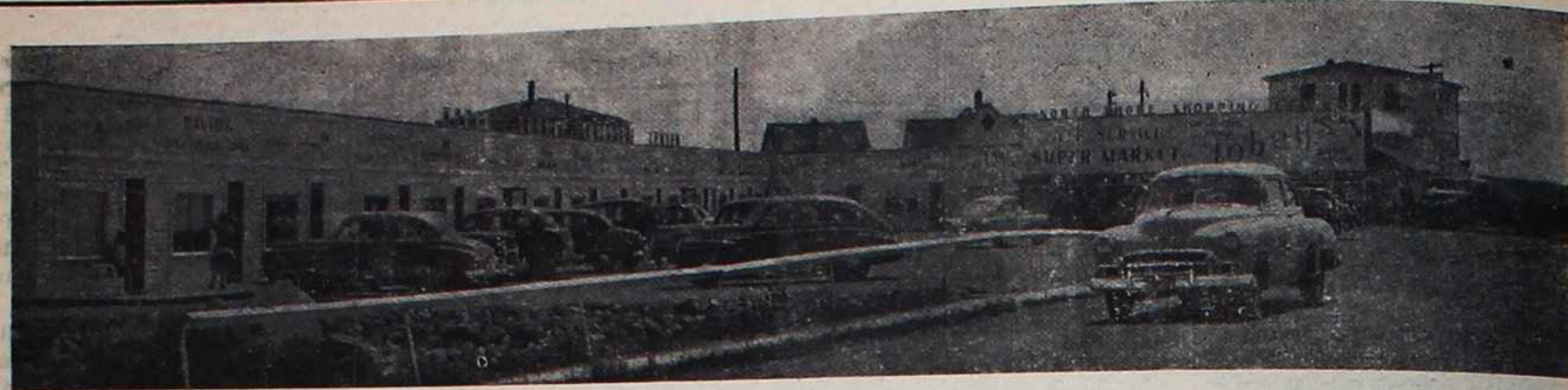

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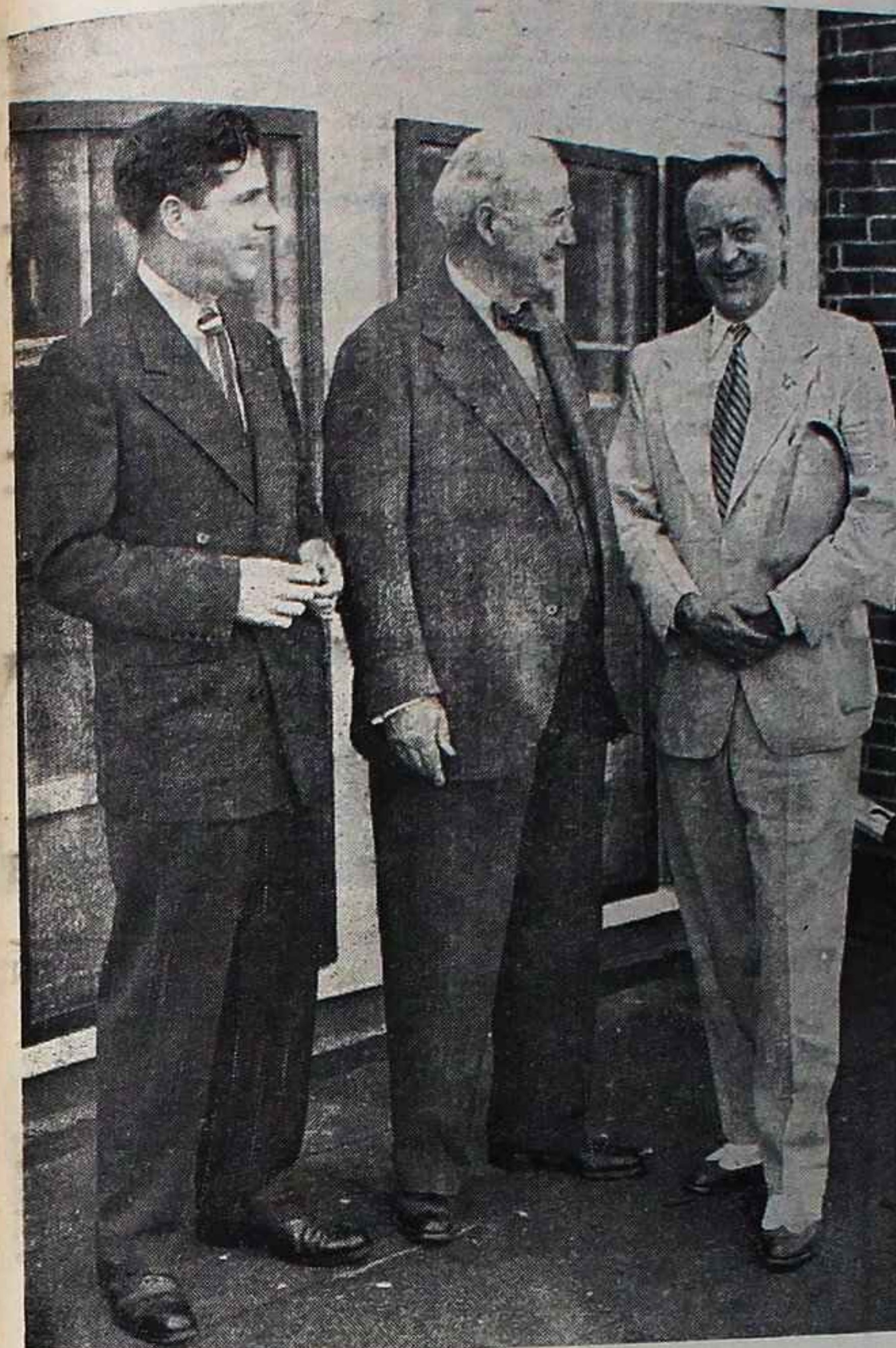

Marsh avenue in the general vicinity of the fire station, an elevated steel tank (on legs) 165 feet high, designed to balance in pressure with the existing Boar's Head tank and have a capacity of 300,000 gallons. This tank will be connected to Marsh avenue with a 16-inch main. It is also proposed to connect Ocean Boulevard and Marsh avenue with 8-inch mains through F street and M street. There now exists only two large connections, one at the north-south end of Marsh avenue and the toll bridge.

"A tank at the proposed elevation and location and with the main pipe reinforcements mentioned will provide static pressure of 70 pounds along the beach and, under fire flow conditions, will provide a flow of 2,360 gallons per minute with a residual pressure of 20 pounds at the corner of Ocean boulevard and F street. At the end of the line near the toll bridge, it will provide a flow of 2,360 gallons per minute. Considering only the water stored in the top 25 per cent of the Boar's Head tank, which amounts to 44,000 gallons. This storage will allow a sustained flow of 2,360 gallons per minute for 145 minutes, or about 2 1/2 hours. In addition to this storage, the new water, which, when considered with the storage, would lengthen the time of the sustained flow to about 3 1/2 hours.

"It is obvious that hydrants north from F street will provide greater flows than the above figures because of decreasing pipe distances with proportionately decreased friction losses. At locations between the proposed new tank and Boar's Head, approximately double the flow could be expected because of the water entering the hydrant from two directions.

"The engineering data contained herein is based upon pipe coefficients of 80. The existing water supply and pump and Hampton Center tank have not been included in these estimates and only the top 25 percent of the Boar's Head tank considered as useful. It is, therefore, evident that the figures in these estimates are conservative.

The cost of these proposed improvements will be approximately \$80,000. This means that the Company will have invested approximately \$271,500 in new improvements since January 1, 1940 when this program and the 1950 construction program previously mentioned are completed. It represents an increase of 56.6 per cent in the Company's investment.

"A copy of this report is being sent to the Public Service Commission, and we will await your reply.

At Cleary's Guest house on G street, the other day, I met a remarkable person. His name is Thomas P. Burns and he's from West Hartford, Conn.

Life holds no mysteries for one of the little misplaced persons who frequent the Chamber of Commerce office.

Taken in to await the finding of her parents, she was asked by Mr. Butler what her name was so he could tell her mother and she calmly answered, "But, my mother knows my name."

Tom is married and has a 14-year-old daughter, Peggy. A short time ago he designed the six-room Colonial home they live in and does a great deal of work around it, including mowing the lawn. He weaves beautiful rugs and expects soon to establish a business in that field with a shop in his home.

You've seen him around the beach — in the store, on the boulevard, in the playground with Peggy — but you've never noticed him. He looks like anybody else here — even though he is blind.

A native of Michigan, Tom, who was blinded by shrapnel in the last war, met his wife at Avon Old Farms, a Connecticut rehabilitation center for blinded veterans. Mary was a Red Cross worker at the time they were married in 1946.

Outside of the normal life Tom lives, the wonderful thing about him is his philosophy. It's impossible to feel sorry for him. When you meet him you can't help wish you could see things the way he does. He said he's thankful that he had 25 years of being able to see, at least.

ON STAGE . . .

The show this week at the Hampton Playhouse, "Double Door," is a bit disappointing mainly because the play itself is a poor choice. It is unfortunate perhaps that previous performances this season have spoiled us for anything even slightly inferior. But particularly disappointing is Phillip O'Brien's performance following so closely after his inspired acting in "The Glass Menagerie". He plays a surgeon who speaks of "the hours we spent working in the slums" with obvious distaste for such pastimes. Phillip, it is true, is miscast, for the role calls for a more mature person, but the part deserves more warmth and sincerity, qualities which his past record indicates he possesses.

Basically the story is a good one, but the action is spotty and the dialogue leaves much to be desired. In one instance, a broad, unsubtle, stupid remark does nothing to help Sadie Long and John Vari in a love scene which is openly lacking in ardor anyway. In another, the answer, "Don't let rock the boat," to the question, "Will you kiss me goodbye?" is to say the least,

startling. Obviously the playwright is not remembered for her sparkling wit.

There are scenes throughout the play when the performances are far superior to the dialogue, but generally speaking, there is a let's-get-this-over-with attitude.

The one outstanding performance is given by Rowena Burack. In her initial appearance at the Playhouse she establishes her right to act with this group, whose successful season here, after all, is a sure indication of its ability.

Most noticeable is the Irish brogue which gets into all of Sadie Long's parts, a fact which she probably does not realize, since it is most apparent when her acting is at its best. This is a minor deficiency which should be easy to correct.

Considering her capability, Marie Donnet's performance is somewhat unconvincing. As the elder sister, Victoria, her disdainful manner and stunning costumes establish her in her position as head of a noble family, but her emotional scenes are vacillating and rather forced.

Filling in the background with their good characterizations are James Arenton, Stanley George and Muriel Foster Brown, not forgetting sweet Jeanette Eckman and Rayanna Metz.

Notably lacking in its usual efficiency, is the production staff, which is responsible in a large measure for the guarded attitude of the players.
