

GRASS FLOWERS

Grasses are the meek plants of Earth. Each spring Nature starts winter-weathered loom and weaves green beauty into the warp and woof of the blanket that protects life-giving humus. A grass stem, its leaves and flowers, are a picture of beauty, appealing in simple form and exquisite grace.
