#### Boy Scout Saves Youth At Beach

A Hampton Beach Boy Scout is credited with saving the life of another boy who was in danger of drowning after he had fallen from the state pier at the southerly end of the beach.

Richard Donahue, 13, a member of Hampton Troop 177, BSA, who was fishing from the pier dove into the water and safely brought to shore Robert Eastman, 12, a vacationer at the beach.

The pier is a favorite gathering place for boys, and in a group tussle, young Eastman, who cannot swim, went over the side into the water estimated at from 8 to 12 feet deep.

Scout Donahue is a strong swimmer, having received instruction at Camp Lincoln, the YMCA camp at Kingston pond. The Scout is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Donahue, 17 Ocean boulevard.

A benefit tag day will be held on Labor Day, September 4th, for the civilian volunteers who were hurt helping out during the disastrous \$350,000 fire that ruined many of the business places and rooming houses on Friday, July 14.

Many volunteers pitched in to help the local fire departments. Two persons were seriously injured including Lt. Howard Heath of the Lawrence Fire department who, although vacationing at the beach, volunteered his services. Lt. Heath sustained a broken back and will not be able to work for almost a year and his hospital expenses will run into thousands of dollars.

Army discharge papers found in the car revealed Lenwell's identity.

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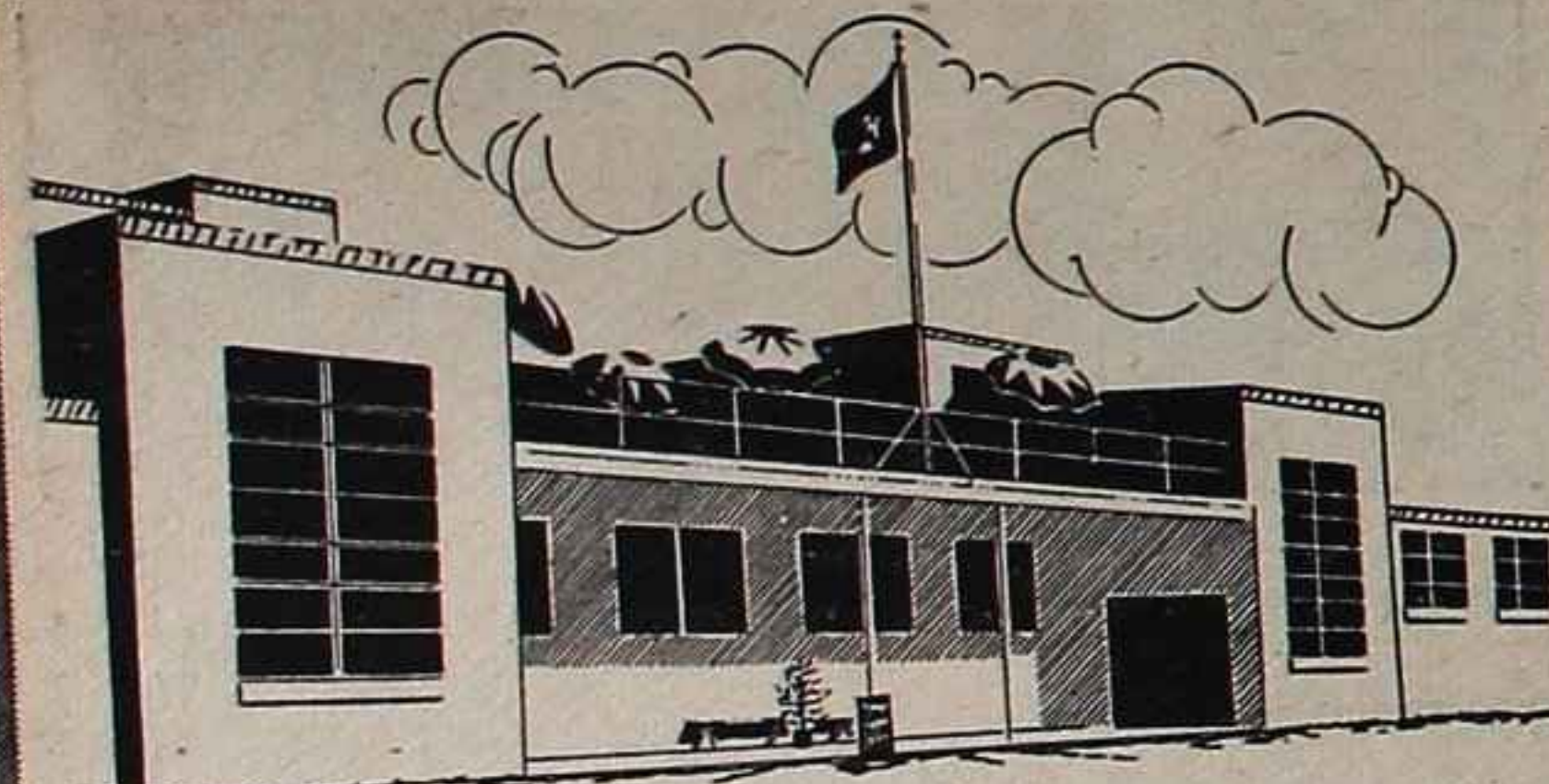

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## Between The Lines . . .

The lighting of the boardwalk and the installation of 30 new benches this season are an example of how the Hampton Beach Precinct and the State have cooperated to improve the beach frontage.

Several months ago when the beach was about to open, a furor arose over the new light fixtures which had been installed in the fall but never used. The question was — who should bear the expense of using the lights? Although that section of the beach is State property, the lights were for the benefit of the Precinct, but the Precinct insisted they had never ordered the lights so —

According to Chamber of Commerce secretary Charles Butler, an amicable solution was reached when the Precinct offered to contribute to the expense of the lighting and the badly needed benches. Through the intercession of Charles E. Breenman, local representative of the State Recreational Department, and the interest of director Russell Tobey, the State agreed to meet the Precinct's offer and so the problem was eliminated.

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## Coast Guard Station To Have Additional Crew, Lifeboat

Welcome news of the addition of a 36-foot motor lifeboat and at least five men to the personnel of the Hampton Beach Lifeboat station was announced this week by Congressman Chester E. Merrow of the First District.

According to Cong. Merrow the increase in boating activities in Hampton Harbor, which has been attributed to the opening of the new Hampton River drawbridge, decided Coast Guard officials to add one 36-foot motor lifeboat and crew to the facilities of the lifeboat station at North Beach.

Capt. Frank T. Kenner, Planning and Control Division of the United States Coast Guard in Washington, told Cong. Merrow that until the completion of a new 36-foot lifeboat

now under construction at Baltimore, Maryland, a suitable craft will be assigned to the local station by First District Coast Guard officials at Boston. The craft will be moved in the river basin until adequate wharfage is built. The completion date of the new lifeboat for Hampton is not yet known.

The actual date of the arrival of the additional personnel and lifeboat is not yet known. CBM Carlton E. Scoville, in charge of the Coast Guard station said today that he had requested an additional five men, bringing the total complement of the station to thirteen in the event that District officials decided to add a lifeboat to the stations' lifesaving equipment.

Although he had also received notification of headquarters action in the matter from Congressional

members in Washington, Chief Scoville stated that he had received no official notice from District officials but that he expected the crew reinforcements and additional lifeboat shortly.

It was only last year that Coast Guard officials contemplated the closing of the local lifeboat station, which was vigorously opposed by residents of Hampton Beach and commercial fishermen at a public hearing held July 11 before a Coast Guard board of inquiry.

The recently added lifeboat and crew at the beach Lifeboat station was asked for in a resolution at the annual town meeting by the voters of Hampton. Both Senator Tobey and Congressman Merrow have assisted in keeping in touch with Washington authorities on

THE ENEMY HAD IT TOO, Up-  
ton Sinclair. Viking. 127 pages.  
\$2.50.

A play in three acts, the action  
is set in the not too distant future.  
Represented are the few people  
who have survived the catastrophic  
action of infestation called the Bio,  
which has apparently attacked the  
civilized world.

Even the most naive mind is the

realization that this sort of thing  
can happen here, but Mr. Sinclair is  
really giving vent to his vivid im-  
agination in the characters who ap-  
pear in the final scenes, two hor-  
rible ladies from Mars. An expedi-  
tion to Mars called the Hastem —  
Harry S. Truman Expedition to  
Mars — supposedly launched in the  
Grant's Tomb, New York, with  
these creatures aboard — Mr. Sin-  
clair describes them thus: "They  
are creatures about three feet high,  
— skin with large silver scales like  
fish. Their heads are immensely  
large and bulbous, with scalps of  
bright powdery golden color; no  
hair. Their eyes are large and pro-  
truding and each eye turns separ-  
ately from the other. Their mouths  
are small and recessive. Their bel-  
lies are rotund. In place of hands  
and feet they have large objects of  
shiny steel, like digging claws."

Thus the final scenes ridicule  
what is otherwise a thought-provok-  
ing work.

THE OTHER DAY; Dorothy  
Whipple. Macmillan, New York.  
156 pages. \$2.50.

Although biographical, this is an  
objective observation of a happy,  
usual childhood. The things that  
pleased most little girls — a new  
tea set, a shopping trip with a  
favorite aunt, staying awake on  
Christmas eve — pleased Mrs.  
Whipple when she was a child. And  
there was a delicious terror of ex-  
ploring a haunted house — the ut-  
ter misery when a baby calf had  
to be slaughtered.

Mrs. Whipple remembers those  
wonderful experiences of childhood  
and records them with the fresh-  
ness and naivete of a child. An ap-  
pealing, though unsentimental  
story.

THE STORY OF ERNIE PYLE,  
Lee G. Miller. Viking, New York.  
439 pages. \$3.95.

This much heralded and long a-  
waited biography is a warm account  
of a man read and loved as no other  
of his contemporaries by all classes  
and ages.

While the constant use of Pyle's  
letters to his wife and others close  
to him makes the story intimate it  
also makes it repetitive and some-  
what confusing. Pyle was a prolific  
correspondent and frequently wrote  
letters as practise for his daily  
newspaper column.

Utterly incredible is the fact that  
so public a figure as Pyle with so  
unfortunate a private life should be  
spared the holocaust of ugly pub-  
licity. His wife, Jerry, whom he  
continued to love dearly through  
her slow disintegration and appal-  
ling self destruction, had been a  
tormented soul even in the happiest  
years of her life. Jerry's death, a  
few months after Ernie's, ended a  
love story comparable in emotional  
depth to the very best in ancient or  
modern literature.

Though the book will be well re-  
ceived by the millions who turned  
their daily papers first to Ernie's  
column, this amazing personal story  
creates and maintains a feeling of  
suspense attractive to an even  
wider group of readers.
