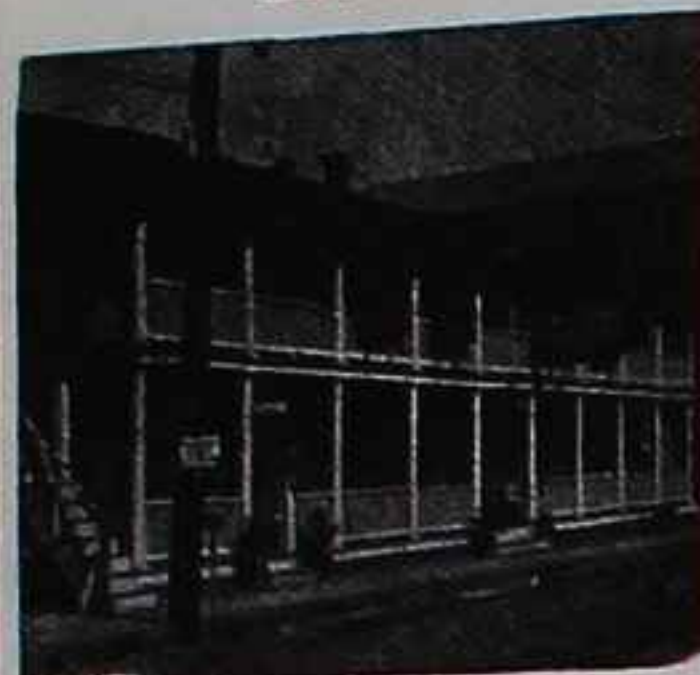

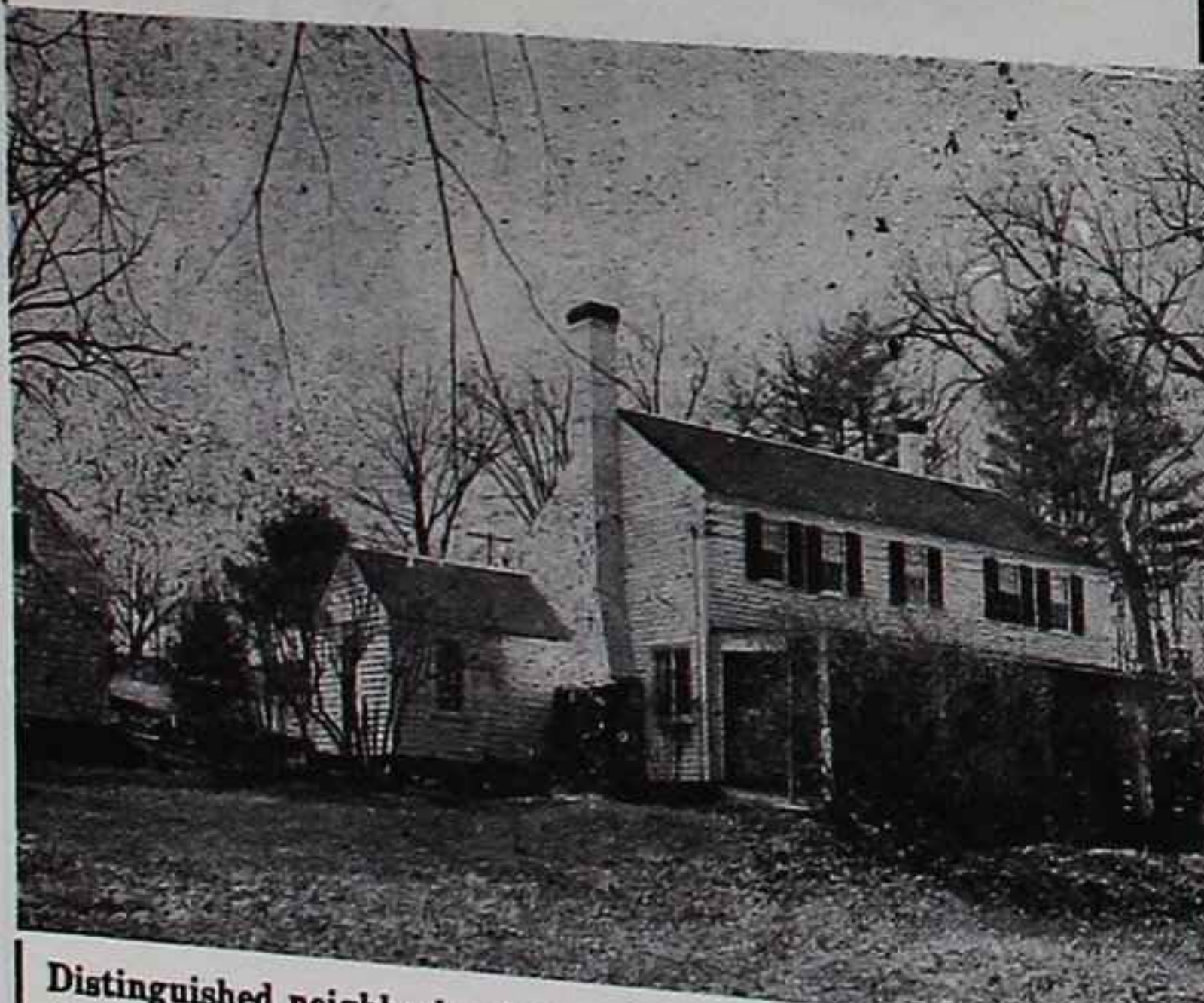

**Rubbish Routes,
Collection Days
Set By Officials**

Town Manager John True this week called attention of all local property owners to the regulations adopted by the Board of Selectmen regarding waste collection in the town and beach areas.

Due to the number of new property owners, there has been a considerable number of inquiries and confusion over the days of collection and the established routes, according to Mr. True.

The regulations of the town regarding waste collection provide that each proprietor or home owner furnish suitable containers for refuse and that the containers be set at the street curb on the proper days of collection.

The schedule of rubbish collection routes is as follows:

Monday, Thursday, Saturday — Ocean Boulevard from Winnacunnet road to F street, and side streets.

Tuesday — Ocean boulevard from F street to the Bridge, and side streets, Surfside, Uptown area including Exeter road, Lafayette road, Dearborn avenue and Ann's Lane, Mill road, High street to Moulton road.

Wednesday — Winnacunnet North Shore.

Friday — Center, including Towle road, Drakeside road, Tide Mill road, Landing road, Moulton road Kelpport area, Leavitt road, Woodland road, High street from Moulton road to and including

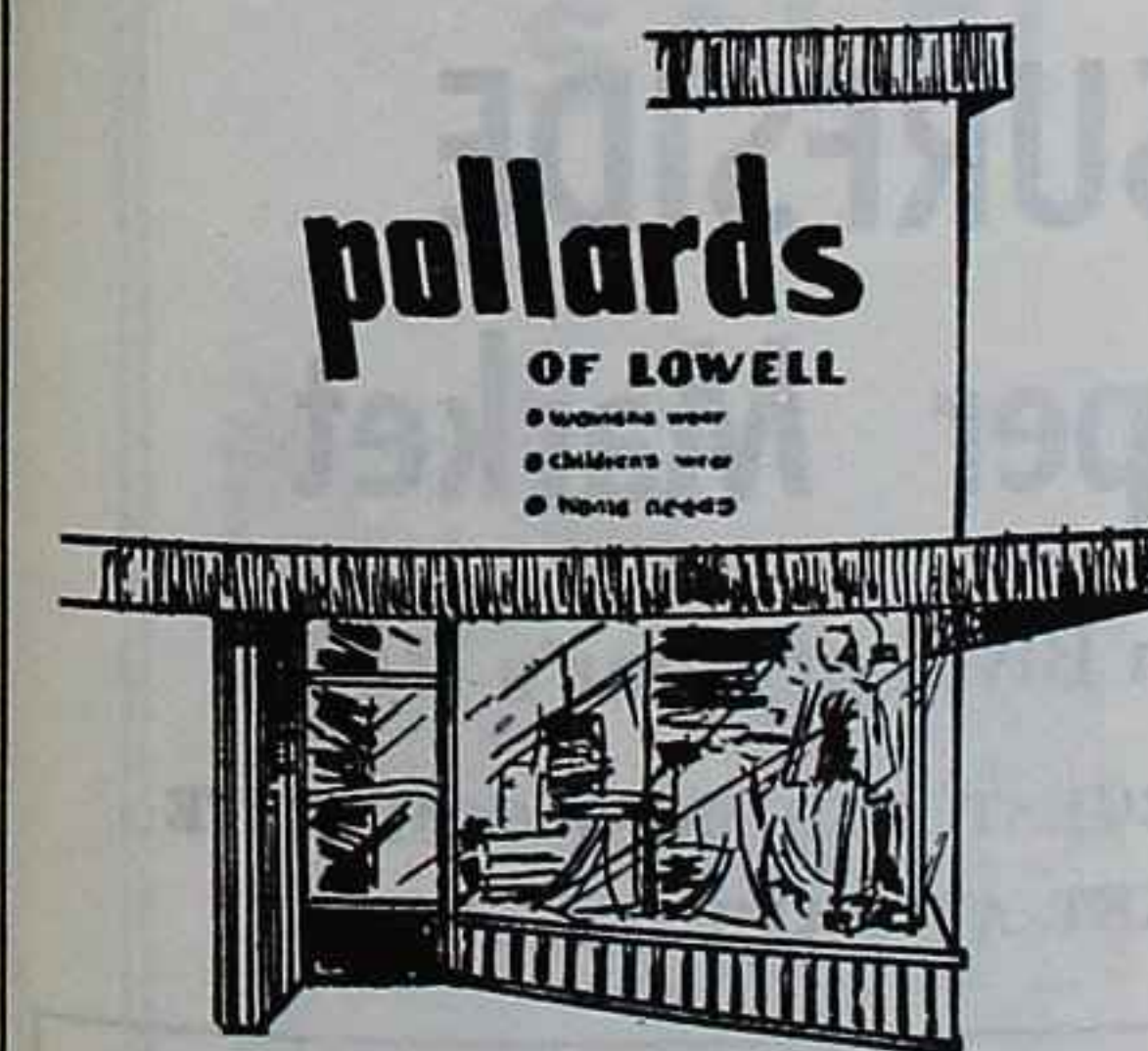

Boat Owners Informed Of New Harbor Rules

New Hampshire Commissioner of Public Works and Highways, Frank Merrill, has issued the following advice to all boat owners in Hampton Harbor, which should be followed as the beach reconstruction program gets underway.

Advice to Boat Owners in Hampton Harbor:

1. In the interests of safe pas-

sage under the Hampton River Bridge, boat owners are hereby notified that fishing will be prohibited from the lift span and the span immediately north of the lift span. Fishing will be permitted from all other spans. If boat owners will confine their use of the rivers under the bridge to the spans from which fishing is prohibited there should be no difficulty to either boat owners or fishermen.

2. The Department is conducting extensive survey and diving operations in Hampton Harbor and River preparatory to dredging the harbor. The survey boat must follow predetermined courses in order to achieve desired results. In the interests of safety it will be greatly appreciated if all boatmen will stand well clear of the survey boat when flying a red flag so that divers under water may not be endangered or essential data made impossible to secure because of a necessity for the survey boat to alter its course.

3. It is our intent to make the best possible use of available funds in an improvement of water conditions in the harbor and river. We do not have any funds available specifically for the purpose but will remove sand from the harbor and river by dredging to provide required material for approved projects. This condition makes it essential that our work

in the harbor and river be planned with maximum attention to economies. If all boat owners will cooperate as requested, substantial improvement in both navigation and mooring conditions can be achieved.

parade, will line up at the Coast Guard station and proceed along Ocean boulevard the entire length of the beach to the toll bridge, to be joined by foot traffic consisting of decorated doll carriages, tricycles and bicycles at the Ashworth and Nudd avenue intersection. As they pass the bandstand, Ben Butler, chairman of the Aug-

ust Festival and also chairman of Children's Day, will announce over the loud speaking system each float and the business merchant who is sponsoring it.

Comm. Merrill Sees No Delay In Breakwater Construction

No delay in the undertaking of the Hampton Beach seawall and erosion control project was foreseen today by Commissioner Frank D. Merrill of the state Public Works and Highway department, as a result of the Federal funds amounting to \$14,000, not being appropriated by the present session of Congress.

"There is no reason for any apprehension at all," Comm. Merrill told the Beachcomber today in a telephone interview, "over the start of the erosion job. It will start as outlined previously."

The Public Works chief stated that his department had "never expected to get the Federal government's share of \$140,000 this year. All we wanted from Congress is the authorization for the erosion project," he declared.

There has been considerable confusion in the mind of beach officials and business people over the failure of Congress to appropriate the \$140,000 necessary to cover the Federal government's one-third participation in the project.

In the closing days of the session, Sen. Robert Upton offered an amendment to the public works appropriation bill for the current fiscal year, but the amendment was dropped off this week during a House and Senate joint conference.

It was feared by beach officials that this would mean a delay of two years in the start of the erosion project due to get underway this fall, but this apprehension was definitely laid to rest today by Gen. Merrill.

In outlining the procedure of the seawall and erosion project, Comm. Merrill stated that "we have approximately \$2½ million dollars available for this project and all we are asking the US Army Corps of Engineers to do is to authorize the project and reimburse the state at a future date when federal funds are available."

"It looks now as though the authorization will go through without any hitch as a part of the omnibu Harbors and Rivers bill which has been approved by the

House of Representatives and is now before the Senate.

"As soon as the measure is signed into law by President Eisenhower," stated Merrill, "I will ask the Governor and Council to release the funds authorized by the Legislature for the project and work will get underway immediately. The state will be reimbursed by the Federal government as soon as funds are available."

Comm. Merrill went as far as to say that even though Federal funds were never appropriated, the project would still be completed by the state because the amount of \$140,000 is a small part of the total cost approximating 2½ million dollars.

Governor Hugh Gregg earlier in the season at the annual Hampton Beach precinct banquet promised the beach residents that

the project would be completed regardless of the federal government's action.

Comm. Merrill said today that he wanted to quiet all rumors concerning this beach project and reiterated that "there will be no delay in undertaking the construction and the current action of the Congress coes not in any way affect the status of the project."

The Public Works chief also stated that the Governor and Council would visit the harbor and beach sites on September 15 along with an inspection of the Portsmouth harbor project.

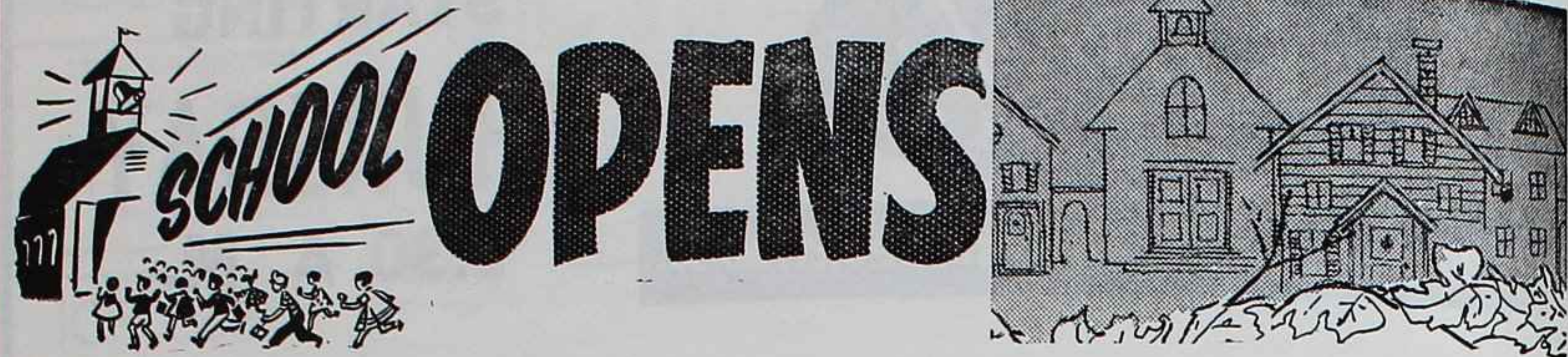
