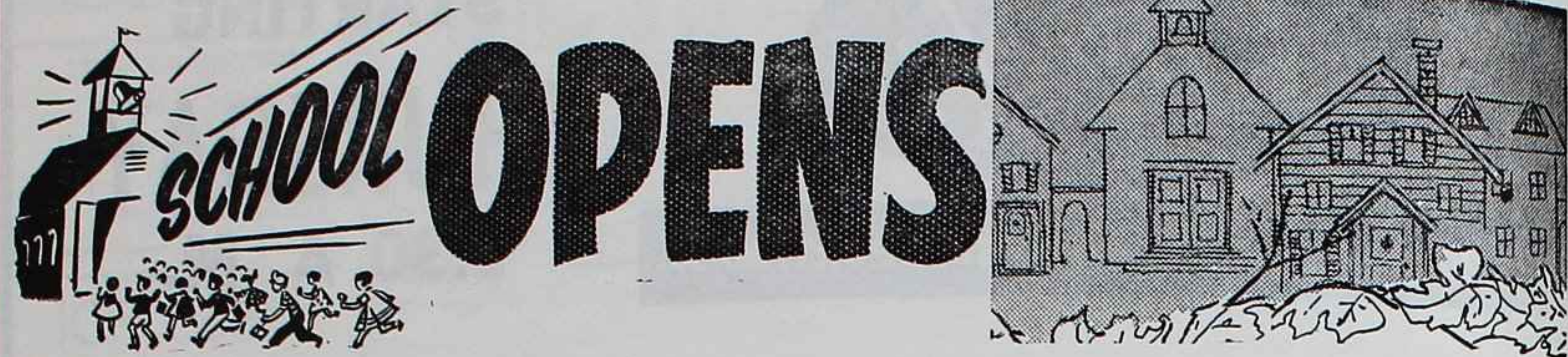

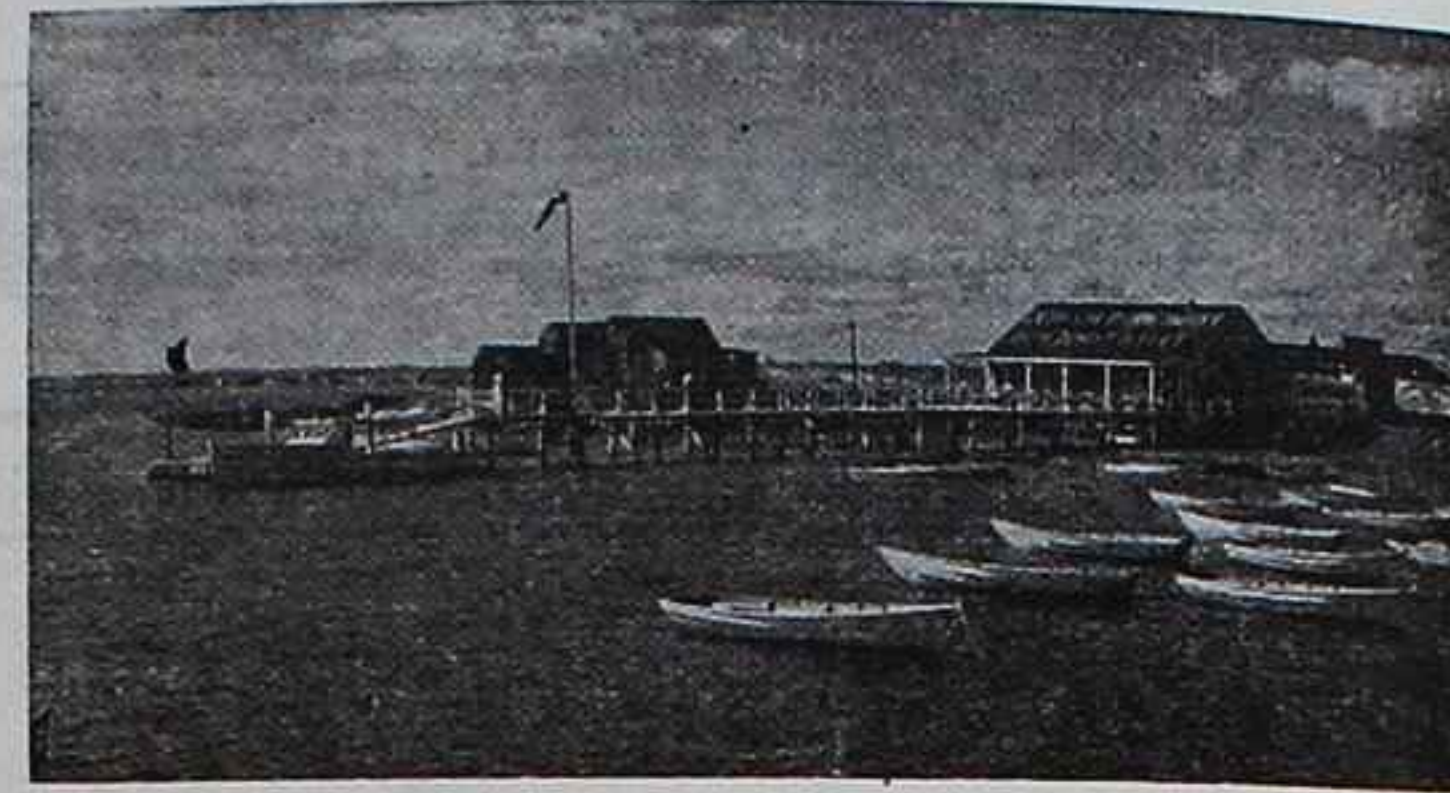

N. Y. Man Winner Of Fishing Derby

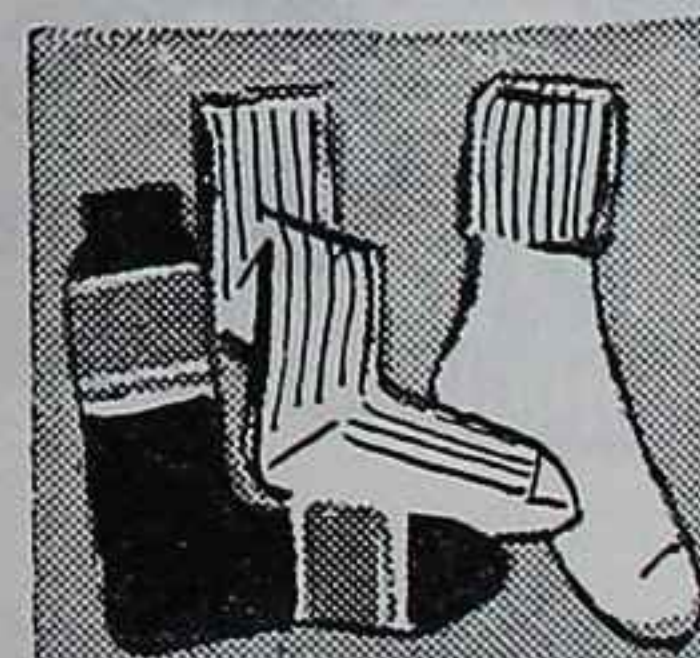

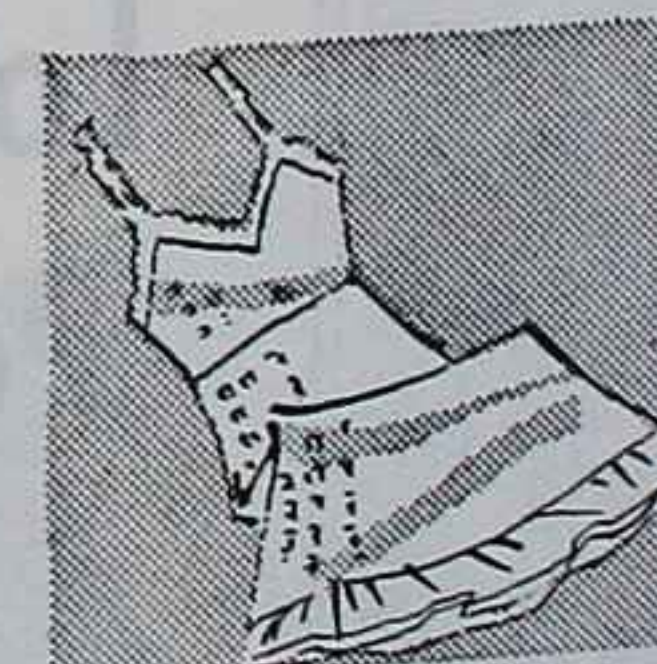

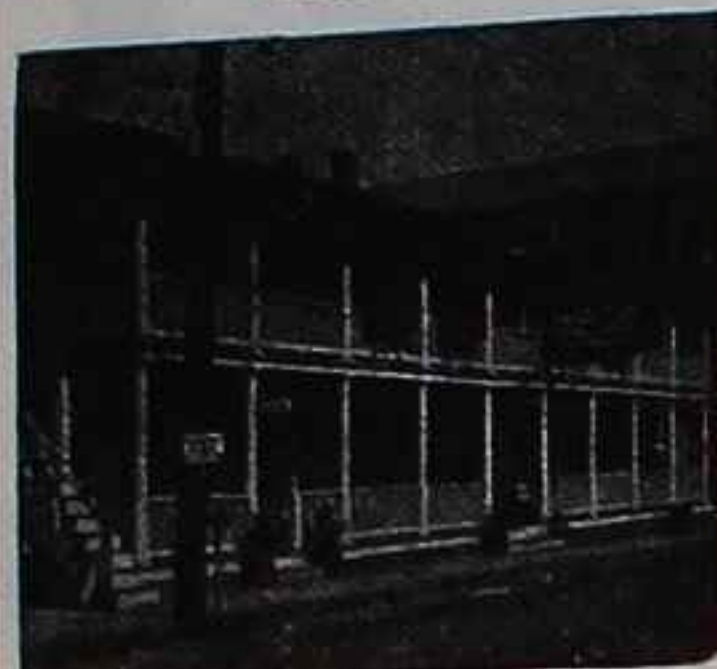

**Horseshoe Crab
Termed Predator
Of Clam Flats**

The horseshoe crab, *Limulus polyphemus*, one of the major predators of the soft-shell clam, is the subject of a population study by the U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service Clam Investigations. More than 1700 adult horseshoe crabs have been tagged each with 2 plastic disc tags bearing a serial number and the words "Fish & Wildlife Service, Washington, D. C. (or Boothbay Harbor, Me.), Reward. Send both discs". Finders are urged to mail the discs, together with the date and location of the recovery, to the address printed on the discs — or directly to the Newburyport Office, their final destination. A check for 50c will be sent to the finder for each pair of tags returned. Since the summer of 1952, when the tagging program began, 70 tagged horseshoe crabs have been recovered from the beaches and tidal flats in an area from Gloucester, Massachusetts to Hampton Beach, New Hampshire.

The horseshoe crabs invade the beaches and clam flats in the early summer to spawn. They feed on clams and worms until fall, when they retreat to deep water to await the following summer for the next invasion. By tagging and recovering many of these predators, it is possible to learn much about their life history. The population under study is estimated at more than 1/4 million individuals, on the basis of recovered tags. The problem of special interest, however, is whether the horseshoe crabs return to their "native bays" to spawn — as Salmon do — or whether they move in and out of bays and estuaries at random. The answer, of course, will have an important bearing on possible control methods.

The studies are being conducted by Fishery Biologists Osgood R. Smith (In Charge), John P. Baptist and John W. Ropes.

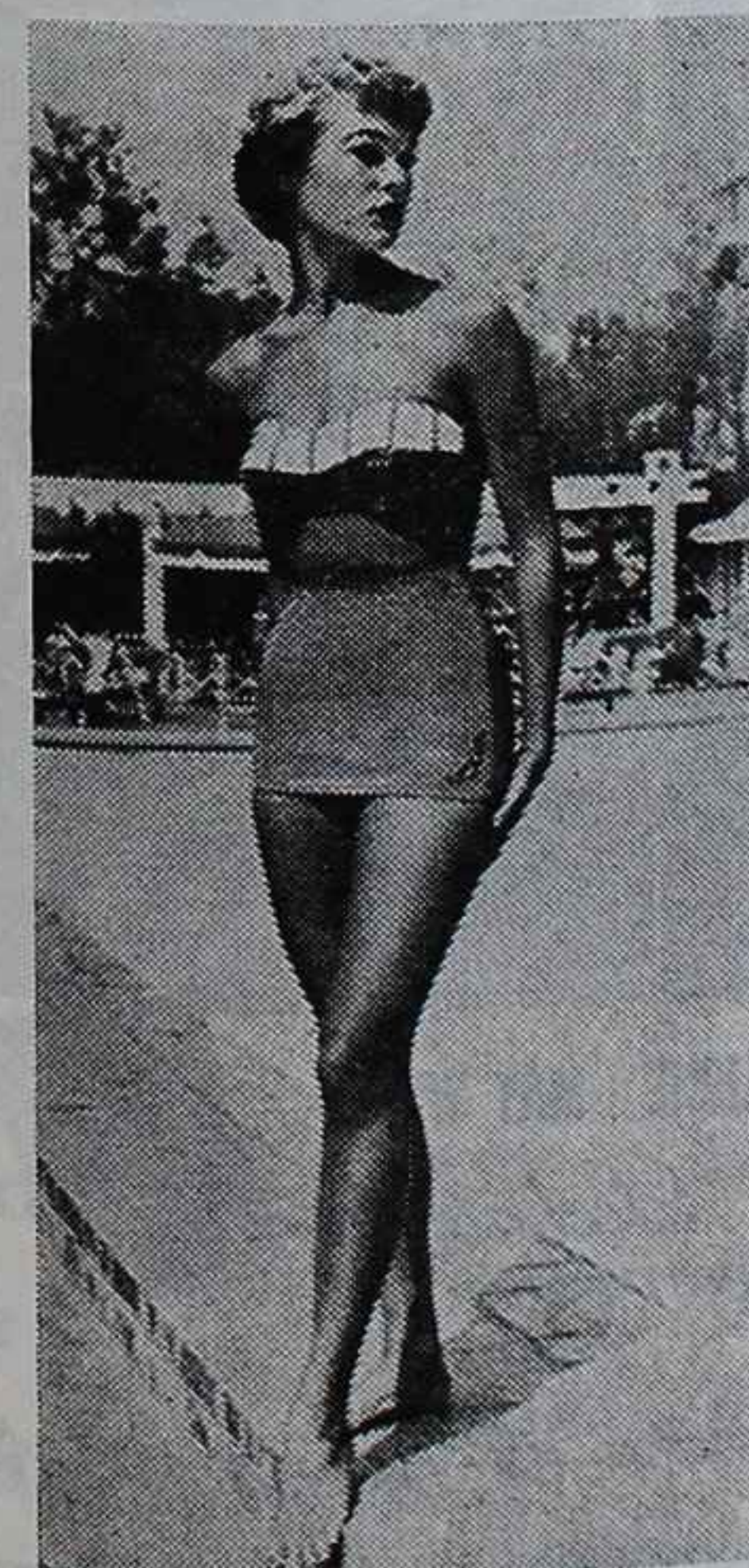

Conn. "Feud" Subsides Over Temperature Of Beach Water

Since the temperature hit the mid-eighties yesterday afternoon, most bathers at Hampton Beach looked with mixed emotions of pity, astonishment and disbelief when a man garbed in a heavy overcoat, ear muffs, and overshoes ventured into the water. General consensus of opinion was that the water wasn't quite that cold.

Actually his dip, which was closely scrutinized by lifeguards lest he succumb to the cold water, was the culmination of a much enjoyed "feud" over a Hartford, Conn., radio station several weeks ago.

What started as an innocuous comment on the part of substitute disc jockey, Floyd Richards, on the Morning Watch program over station WTIC, boomeranged into a public controversy between the radio announcer and Bob McKenna, owner of the Connecticut House here at Hampton, in a dispute over the fridity of Hampton waters.

On his way to work, Bob was an unhappy listener when Floyd stated that in contrast to his experience in the warmer waters of the Cape he was literally numbed upon contact in the "refrigerated water" of Hampton.

Staunchly defending Hampton, Bob in a lengthy letter explained that the word "invigorating", meaning to give life, best described Hampton's rather cool waters and slyly inferred that perhaps Floyd was too old to enjoy youthful pursuits. (He is a young 34 with only a slightly receding hairline.)

To augment his contention that Floyd was unduly hasty in his decision, Bob invited Mr. Richards and his wife and three children, for a week's vacation at his Hampton Beach hotel.

As the dispute gained city-wide proportions mail poured into the station with listeners divided in opinion. A large percentage of Hartford's population has at some time visited Hampton as evidenced by the great response concerned with personal experience and some city editors even partici-

pated in the controversy. An unrehearsed and surprise meeting between the two principals of the "feud" over the station a week later ended in Floyd's acceptance of Bob's generous invitation.

After Floyd's second plunge into the water yesterday with the protection thoughtfully provided him by Bob, he readily concedes that it can possibly be termed "invigorating" and at last look the two were amiably conversing. Apparently the "feud" is ended.

Hampton Men At Camp Drum

Hampton has two men with the National Guard Units, now in training at Camp Drum. Connected with Company, B237th Military Police Battalion of Portsmouth is Sgt. William A. Sherwin of High street, and Pvt. Donald A. Tacetta of Locke road.

Sgt. Sherwin has been a member of this unit since its formation in October 1951, currently he is a platoon leader. Pvt. Tacetta is connected with the Motor Pool of the Battalion.

HAMPTON — Local police are on the lookout for a 16-year-old Florida boy, who has been charged with grand larceny here.

Police said the youth whose home is in St. Petersburg, Fla. stole a \$225 trumpet, a camera and a few articles of clothing from a guest house on H street, where the youth had been staying.

The youth, who worked the hotel circuit in Florida last year, was reported to be looking for work around the Old Orchard Beach section of Maine.

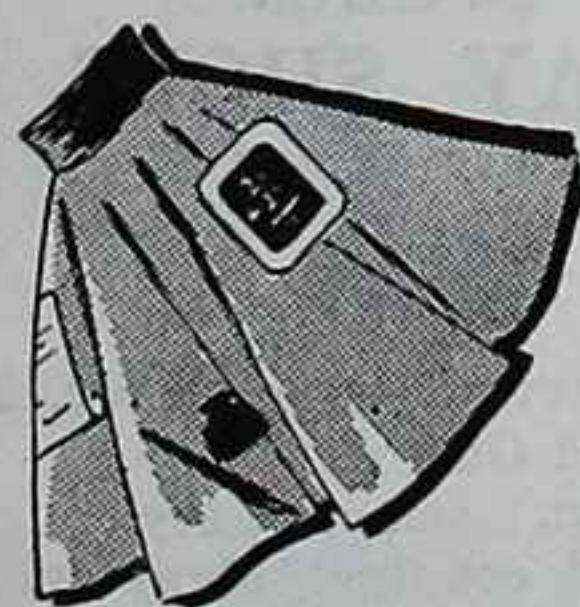
