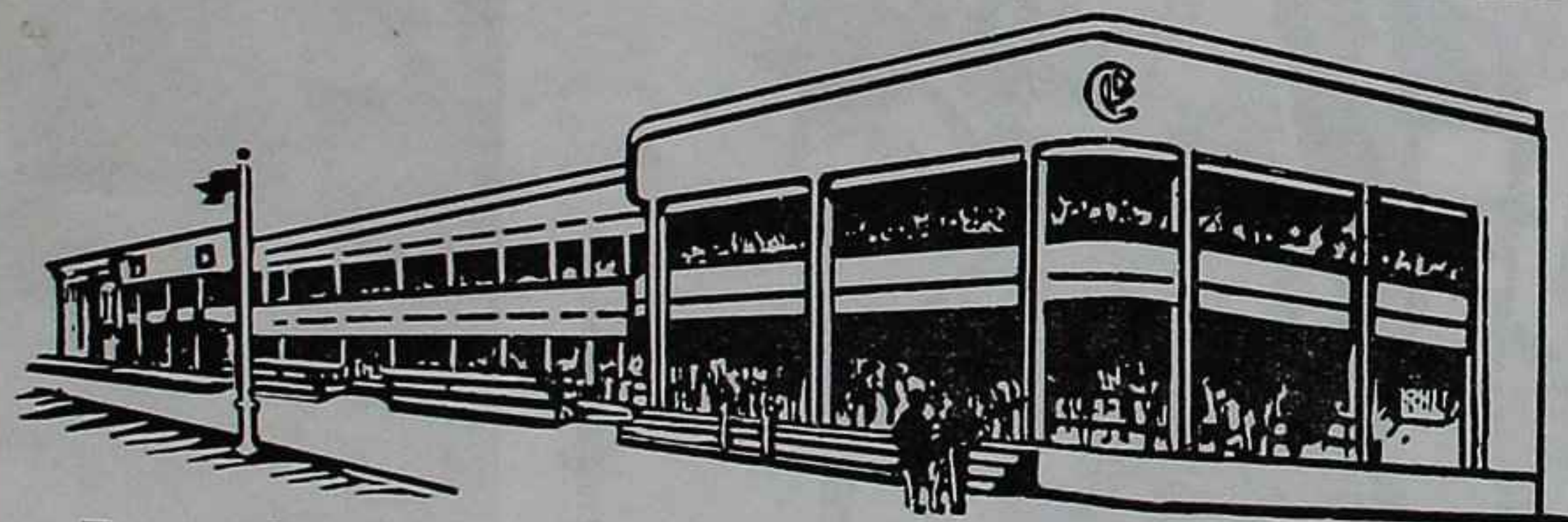

Bay State Girl Wins First Beauty Contest

Selectmen Restrict Parking In Five Town, Beach Areas

A new parking ordinance, touching on Hampton and Hampton Beach, was passed by the Board of Selectmen during their regular weekly session Friday at the town offices.

The new town parking rule affects only a section of High street where parking will now be prohibited at all times on the north side of High street from Mill road extending westerly a distance of 484 feet.

A town official stated that in the past a group of vehicles was constantly parked along that particular section of the heavily traversed highway, creating a traffic hazard.

Another provision of the new parking ordinance is aimed at North Beach where no further parking will be allowed on the west side of Plaice Cove street, sometimes called Ancient highway, commencing at the north entrance from North Shore boulevard and running 310 feet on the west side of said Plaice Cove street.

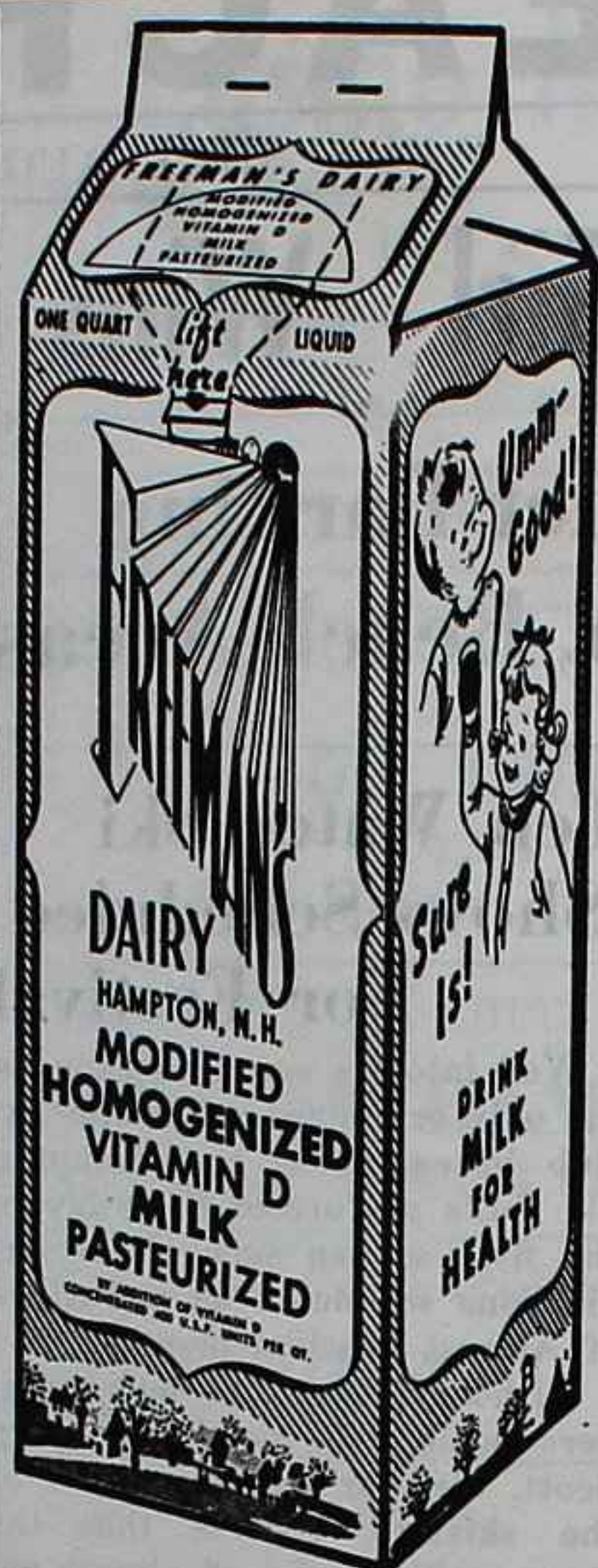

tional newcomers will be called upon to show their skill on the wooden slats in preparation for the three major aquacades through the week of August 29th.

On August 24th the jump, which is now moored at the practice area as a safeguard against heavy tides and any lurking hurricanes, will be towed to a position fronting the Hampton Beach police station to provide a maximum demonstration of aquatic feats for vacationists' entertainment. The record length for jumps has measured 70 feet and the skiers estimate that in a good jump they soar at least 15 feet into the air. Keen competition should better the already set records, remarked Mr. Scott, before the current beach season ends.

In addition to the jumping, other stunts, which will prove muscular coordination and control, are planned as part of the program, such as layovers, straight runs, and forward swan positions. Several members have perfected their slalom skiing, in which only one ski is used to enable tighter turns, and weather permitting, will show their skill in the hour-long exhibitions.

Two Mark-55 Mercury motors with 80 h.p. will be mounted on the club's Yellow-jacket boat to furnish the necessary power to hie the skisters over the water. Loaned to supplement the club's equipment, boats of Hampton residents Phil Toppan and Wilfred Cunningham will also be utilized.

Spectators are urged to obtain frontline positions for the aquacades which have a starting time of 2 p.m. each Wednesday and Saturday afternoons when the water skiers will travel over the waters at speeds from 20 - 40 m.p.h.

ordinance, which is to be considered as an addition to all other parking ordinances, are directed to eliminate the congested parking conditions at the strip of Hampton Beach property south of the toll bridge.

Complaints have been received in the past from residents in that area who urged town officials to keep clear the Access road constructed several years ago by the state to allow the Coast Guard amphibious duck a clear way into the harbor in emergency cases. At the same time, property owners there asked town officers to do something about beach visitors who block private driveways and limit road travel by parking on both sides of narrow streets.

As a result the following parking restrictions were adopted for that particular section of Hampton Beach:

There will be no parking on the east side of the Access road running from U.S. Route 1A to Hampton river on that part of said road which is in Hampton.

Parking shall be prohibited at all times, also, on the north side of Thornton street from Portsmouth avenue to Campton street.

The no parking rule, too, will be enforced on the north side of Campton street starting at the east end of Thornton street and running to Ocean avenue, sometimes called Ocean drive.

Violation of any of the provisions of the adopted ordinance is punishable by a \$1 fine for each offense, the ordinance states.



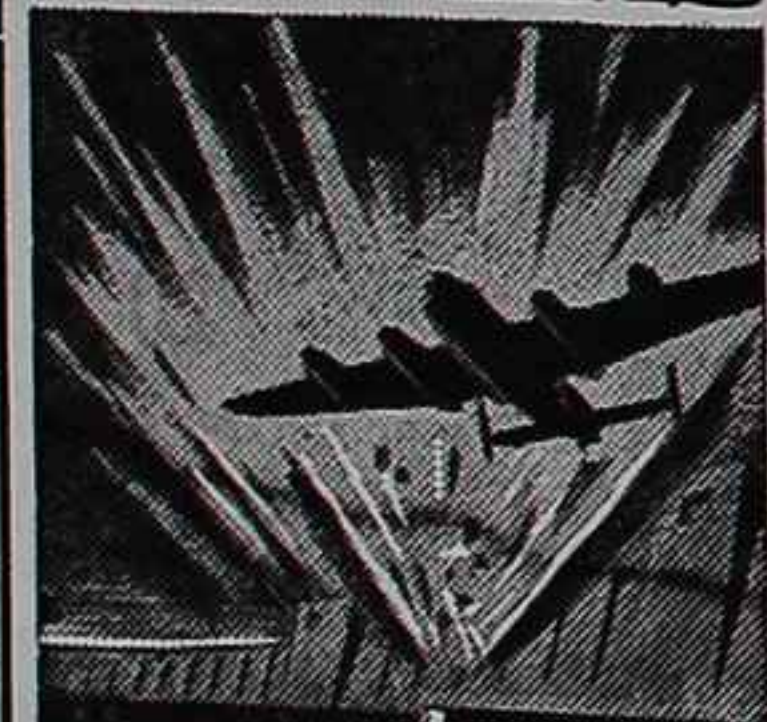

**Ski Club Denies
 Bathers Charges**

Sharply hurling a counter charge at criticisms levelled at club, founder and president Larry Scott asserted this week that official permission to use the Seabrook side of Hampton harbor had been given him by the State Recreation Commission in Concord.

Refuting the complaints reportedly coming from various sources, Scott said his club members do not abuse the privileges allowed them by State Director of Recreation Russell E. Tobey.

In retaliation, the water ski club official charged that many bathers are seen purposely impeding his practice sessions in the harbor.

Scott made his statements this week following last week's Union account of complaints received from bathers by the Hampton Beach Coast Guard and Seabrook Board of Selectmen.

In answer to the alleged complaints, Scott declared that he would like to meet those making the complaints so the matter could be ironed out without any altercations.

Scott stated that the ski club, sponsored by the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce, has rights to 150 feet of landing space on the Seabrook side of the harbor. That area, he pointed out, is the only feasible spot for the water sport enthusiasts as other sections of the harbor are designated as boat anchorages.

The club leader disclosed that he had heard of complaints by bathers and added that at one time he had been called to the Coast Guard station to rectify the club's position.

However, he emphasized, other skiers, not connected with his club, have occasionally been seen in the harbor. They may molest bathers with the ski club being blamed, Scott said.

As a protection against this the ski club tow boats are identified by a special marking on their bow, the club leader stated. He added that his organization cooperates closely with the fishermen with all skiing being curtailed during the hours of the day when fishing boats leave the harbor and return.

In concluding statements, Scott said he would like to see the bathers cooperate with the ski club by allowing the skiers room for their practice sessions held in preparation for the weekly water ski shows.

**Residents Keep
 Check on 'Connie'**

Local residents, like other New Englanders, are keeping a constant and close check on reports concerning approaching Hurricane Connie.

According to storm warning forecasters, the season's first big hurricane, with 135-mile winds, is pushing its way north off the Atlantic Seaboard, but may possibly be veered away from this sector by other pressure belts.

Final disposition of the storm's course will not be known, weather officials say, until late tonight or early Thursday morning.

Meanwhile, however, hurricane-scarred New England is standing by.

At Hampton Beach, the Coast Guard reported it has received a Condition 4 warning from its Boston, Mass. headquarters. A spokesman interpreted that condition to mean that the hurricane "is likely to strike." The alert specifies that all equipment must be doubly checked to be in perfect running order and all vehicles must be fueled in preparation for prolonged periods of duty.

Fishermen and other boat owners are seen to be making efforts to go into a state of readiness for Hurricane Connie if it comes. Many housewives, remember-

ing the scarcity of candles during last year's hurricanes, are replenishing their supply.

Overheard was one Hampton citizen musing about the storm warnings who said, "I enjoyed the recent visit of the cool air from our Canadian neighbor up north, but I hope this Hurricane Connie from the south doesn't stop off to see us."

**Lifeguards Busy
 With Sailor Hurt
 While Diving**

Hampton Beach lifeguards, after logging many uneventful past weeks in their record books, had their hands full last weekend.

Most serious of casualties reported was that of a navyman who, beach police said, dislocated several vertebrae and sustained back injuries when he struck his head on the ocean bottom in a shallow water dive Saturday afternoon.

According to lifeguards, William Carney Y3c, 30, stationed at the Fargo building, Boston, Mass., was injured when he was hurled by one of his companions in an over-the-shoulder dive.

Lifeguards rushed to the side of the injured sailor who was taken to the police station in the cruiser-ambulance for additional first aid.

Police Chief John J. Malek said that Portsmouth Naval hospital authorities were notified and a navy ambulance was dispatched to transport Carney to Portsmouth.

Navy hospital attaches said Tuesday that Carney was removed from traction and was "up and about." The report added that no fractures or dislocations were found but additional x-rays were to be taken with Carney to be confined in the hospital for about 10 days.

Head lifeguard Dave Stone said that all his men were kept busy Sunday retrieving many bathers on rubber floats which had been pushed distances from shore by strong breezes.

He pointed out as one rescue that made by lifeguard Horace Lyndes who simultaneously towed in an adult and a youth

after their rubber raft had been blown way off shore.

The alert Lyndes, seeing the pair being carried far out, swam out to assist them, Stone said. The pair told Lyndes that they would swim ashore if he would bring in the raft. Lyndes later said that when the youth released his hold on the raft, he went under water and had to be brought up by the guard. Lyndes stated that he then ordered the pair to cling onto the rubber float as he towed them to shore.

Stone lauded Lyndes' work, pointing out that the lifeguard had to fight the wind and current in bringing the two to shore unassisted.

Commenting on the use of rubber rafts, head lifeguard Stone said he considered it an extremely risky sport, adding that use of such floats was banned in many seaboard states. Adults as well as children often find themselves in trouble when their floats are carried dangerously far from shore by currents and winds, he said.

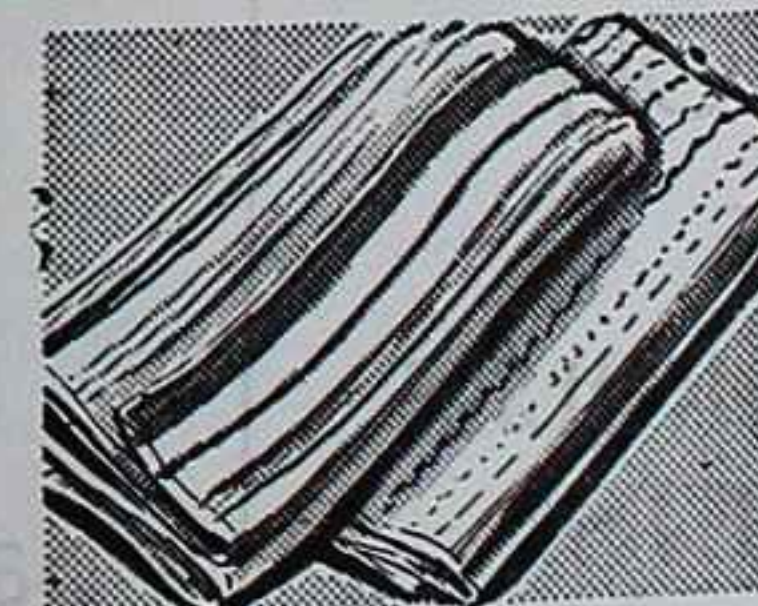

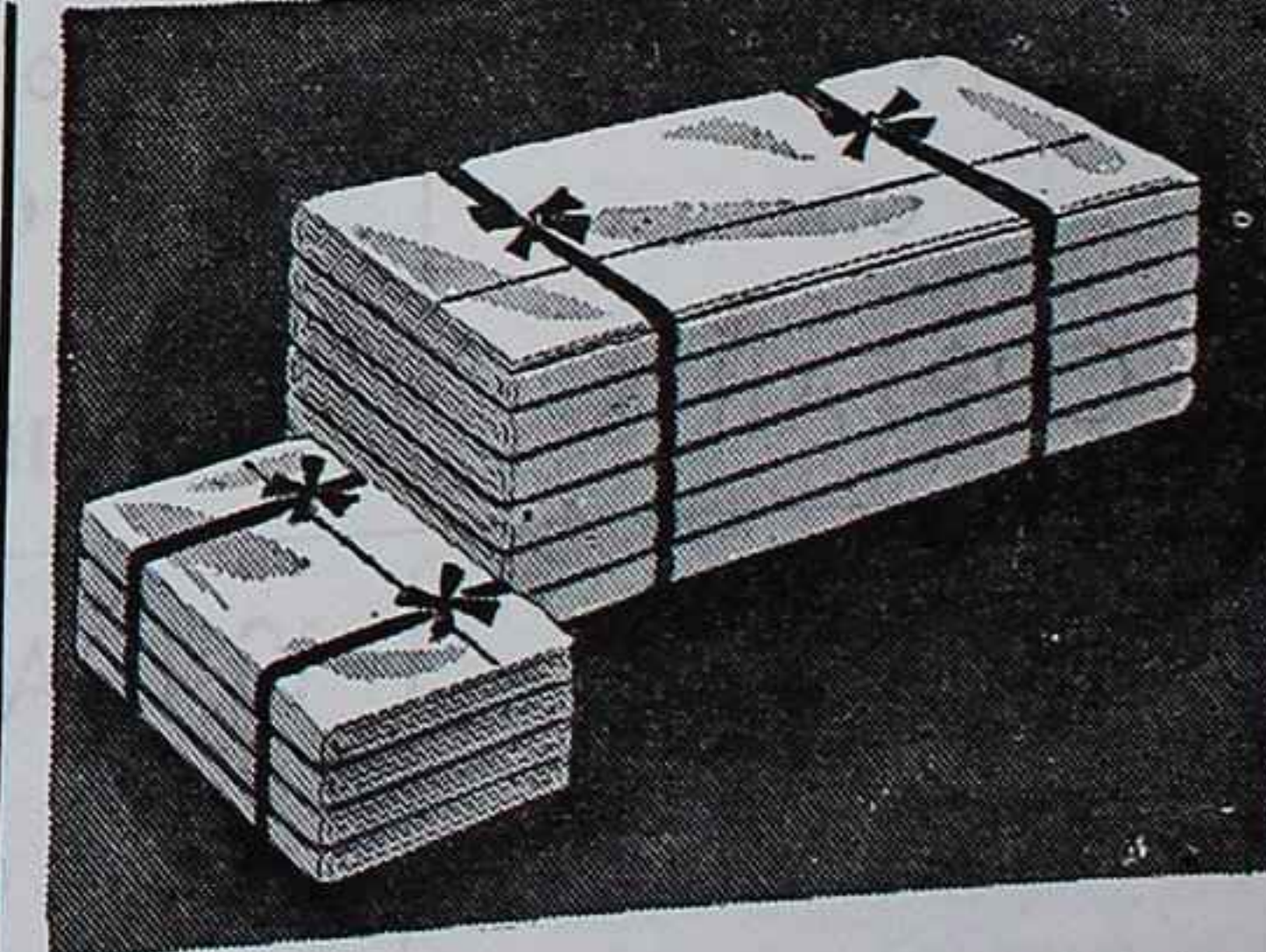
