



In Hampton in the nation having a smaller only the Greenman Company, a population, and ranking 43rd in active, but, within an hour's drive, area, New Hampshire, surprisingly however, are located the beautiful new plant of the Bar-Bloomfield company in Seabrook, the Newmarket home of nationally famous "Little Yankee" shoes, and several firms in Exeter and Portsmouth. Portsmouth, largest community in Rockingham county, could be called the industrial center of the area. In addition to the Navy yard with its thousands of employees, located in Portsmouth are the Morely Co., button manufacturers, Fibertex Corporation, fiber and leatherboard makers, a plant of the National Gypsum Company, Simplex Wire and Cable, and several other smaller but important in-

lustrial concerns.

Other cities close enough to be visited in a half day trip or less include Dover, home of Kidder Press, Clarostat, Judson-Dunaway and other nationally known concerns; and Manchester with its Habitant Soup Company, Cott Bottling, Caron Box, Foster Beef, and diversified industries.

Many of New Hampshire's 1,300 industries openly encourage visitors. Tours in most instances can be arranged by contacting the plants in advance. Many of the larger firms are listed with the New Hampshire Planning and Development commission, and information including plant name, location, representative to contact, length of tour, and preferred hours is available.

Not to be overlooked, however, are hundreds of smaller companies sprinkled throughout southern New Hampshire, featuring a varied number of interesting lines from handicraft to precision manufacturing. Old or new, these concerns for the most part blend so well with the scene that the average vacationist is completely unaware of the year 'round activity that goes on in New Hampshire, 43rd of the 48 in size, 8th of the 48 in manufacturing per capita income, and 1st of the 48 as a summer vacationland.


