Drowning Rate Increases In N. H.

Figures obtained from the New Hampshire Fish and Game department, whose law enforcement division is responsible for the recovery of drowning victims, seem to indicate that accidental drownings in New Hampshire waters are occurring with increasing frequency. From January through July of this year, twenty-nine persons have lost their lives by drowning. With five months left in the year, this number nearly equals the total of thirty-two drownings which occurred in 1956.

Thirteen of the drowning accidents which have taken place this year have involved youngsters sixteen years of age and under. In many instances the children were playing in shallow water and wandered out where it was over their heads. In most of these cases it would appear that closer supervision by a qualified adult might have prevented the tragedies.

Boating accidents are also responsible for a number of drownings each year. Boat operators should bear in mind that the phrase "Alcohol and Gasoline don't Mix" as readily applies to motorboats as to automobiles. Care should also be taken that the motor is not too powerful for the boat on which it is being used.

As is true with all things, common sense is a major factor in water safety. Youngsters should be supervised when swimming, and the "buddy system" is a good rule for young and old alike. Never swim alone.

While words on paper and precautionary reminders over radio and television may help, the brunt of prevention lies with the individual — do YOUR part!

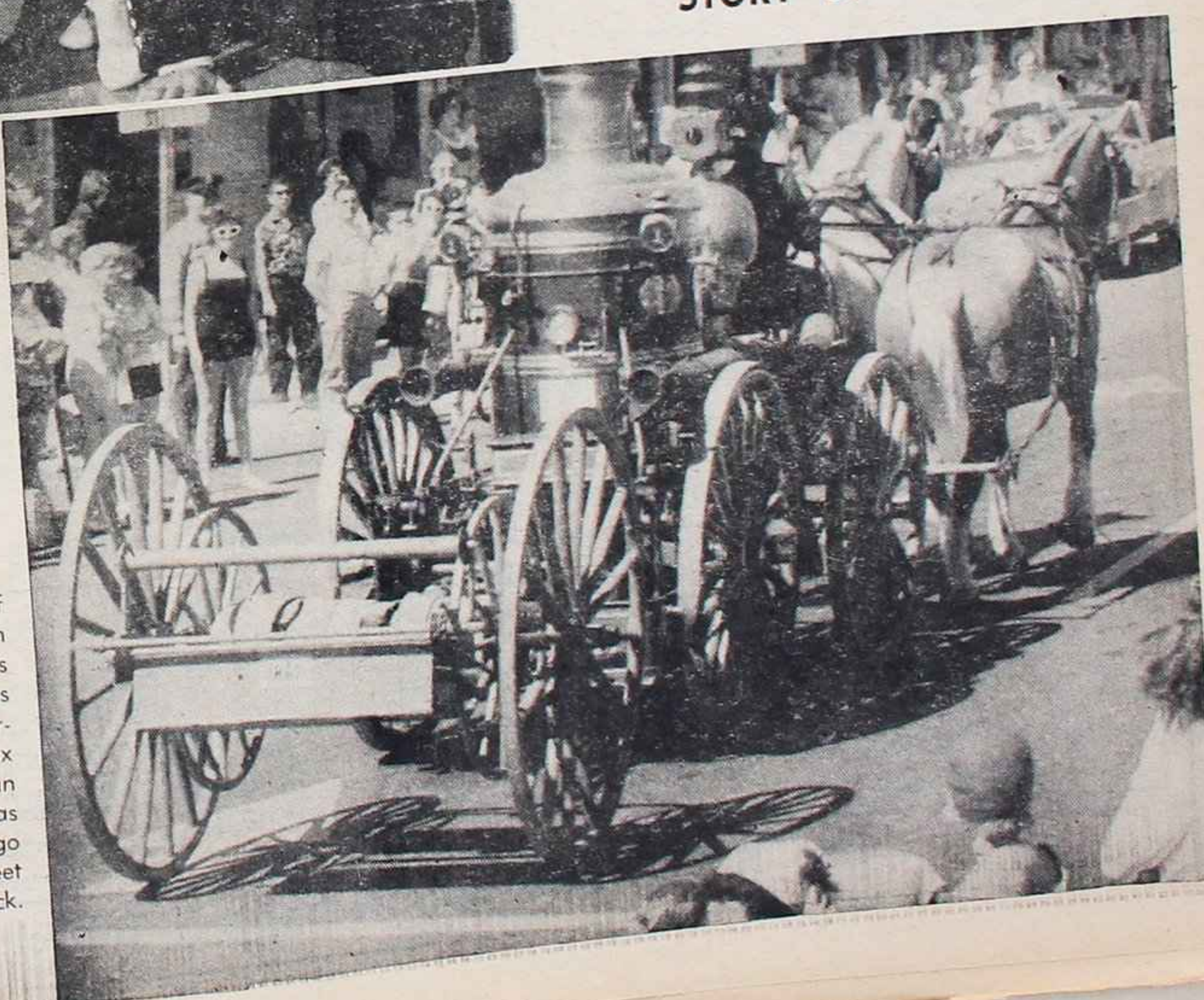

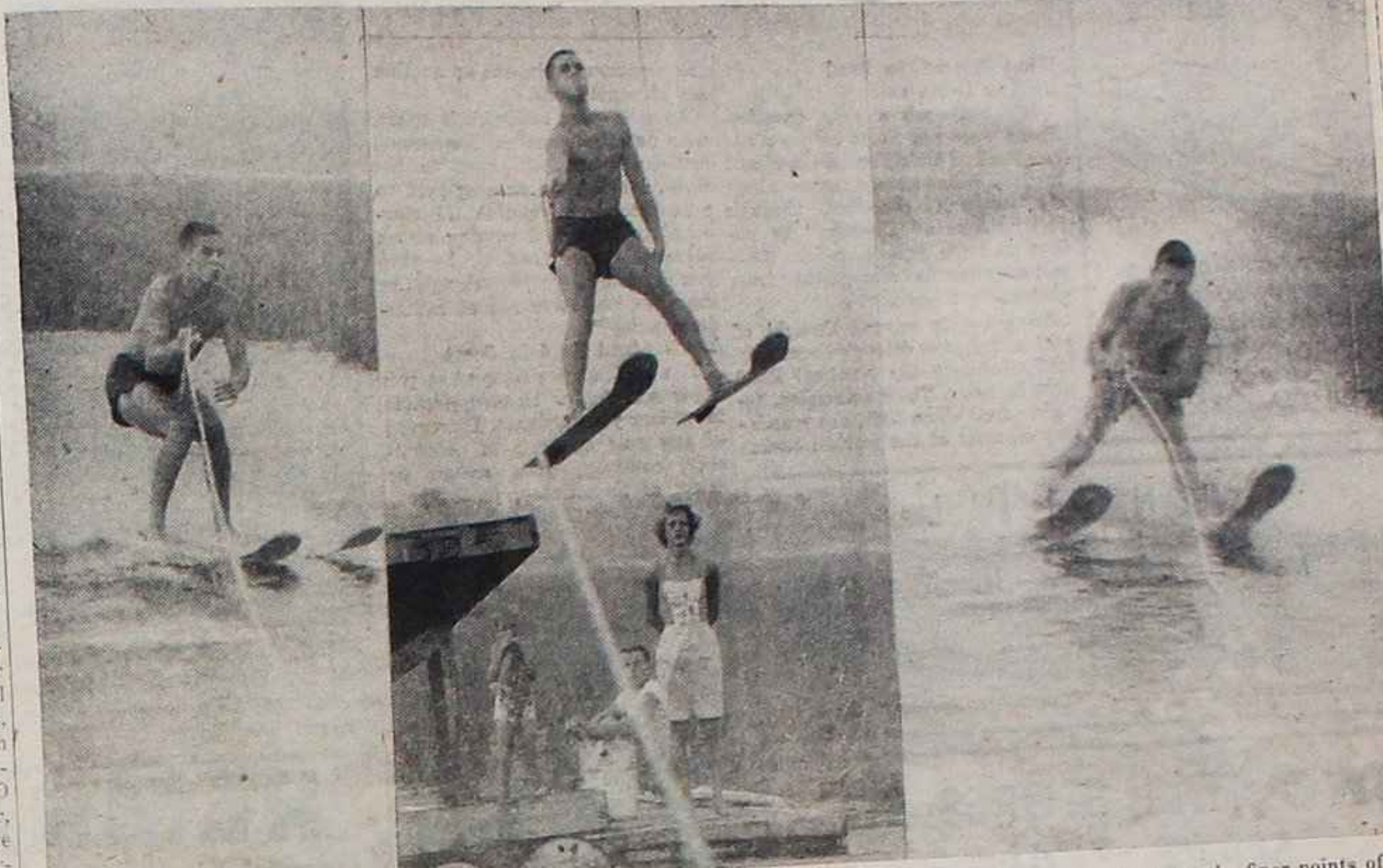

What Side of the Road Do You Drive On?

It's not such a silly question. There were sea roads before roads on land. Phoenician sailors and traders followed sea lanes along Mediterranean coastline, through the "Pillars of Hercules" to obtain tin from Britain, before staying-at-homes made cow paths from pasture to village.

Long before anyone thought of asking for your driver's license, in 1897, Rules of the Nautical Road were in force. Their principles, little changed since 1889, are mandatory in most of the world's oceans

and waterways, in one or another set of regulations.

Even if your balliwick is apart, with no effective rules, custom and the common sense say, keep to the right. Make your passing port to port whenever possible. If starboard to starboard passing seems reasonable and feasible, be sure you exchange proper signals in time "to maneuver out of misunderstanding."

You'll Stand Good In Court
You seldom go wrong when you know and follow rules applicable to waters you navigate. Disregard of any rule on basis of convenience, courtesy, good nature or doubt of its efficacy, places you,



should an accident occur, under a burden of proof almost impossible to carry. Only one percent of boating accidents can be classed "inevitable." Courts find one or both navigators failed to comply with the Rules.

But even the rules have inevitable exceptions — the "general prudential" and "good seamanship articles." They warn you to give due regard to any special circumstances which make departure necessary to avoid collision, to take every precaution of good seamanship required by those special circumstances.

This epitaph of an infamous seafarer summarizes volumes of Admiralty Law on Articles 27 and 29: Here lies the body of John Jay Who died maintaining The Right of Way. He was Right, dead right As he sped along But he's just as dead As if he'd been wrong.

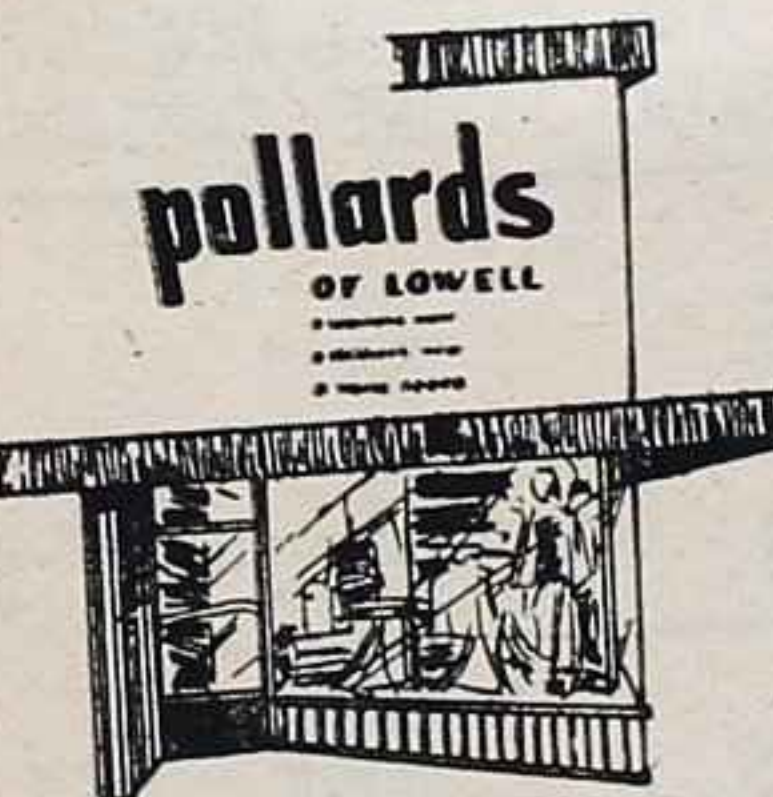

Lots Bring \$2645

The town of Hampton is \$2,645 richer by revenue realized from the sale of three lots of land at a tax auction held Wednesday at the town offices.

Considerable interest in the three lots was evident as approximately 35 people crowded the selectmen's office.

In the spirited bidding for a front lot on Ocean boulevard, the sale was made to John Breen and Henry Hogan for a price of \$1,850. The lot located on the boulevard is at the north end of Great Boar's Head.

Breen and Hogan also bid in a lot on Pearl street, on King's Highway in the North Shore section, for \$440.

The remaining lot, also located on Pearl street, was sold to Rienneau and Beaudet of Nashua for \$335.

Selectman Donald Ring acted as auctioneer for the sale.

Death Defying Aerialists Are Real Family Loving Couple

High above the ground, with no net beneath them, swing the Aero-Stylites, one of America's most unique and thrilling aerial acts and surely an attraction well worth viewing during the 50th Anniversary celebration of the Hampton Beach Precinct.

There is much more to this act however, than meets the eye, for here is a young married couple, with two children, who defy death twice a day and then return to their modest trailer home much like you and I do after a regular day's work.

Kitten and Gabby Wendt first started performing together as an aerial act in 1948 and, since then, have appeared at all the leading fairs and parks in the United States, as well as on such television shows as "Big Top" and "Super Circus", appearing no less than eight times on the latter.

Kitten, a pert redhead whose diminutive appearance belies her profession, was a professional roller skater before she met Gabby and when they were married she got bit by the aerial bug and soon they were doing the act together. She has been featured on ice shows and in the Shrine Circus in her own revolving aerial act as the "Goddess of the Moon", in which she does balancing, splits, and other difficult maneuvers while a moonshaped device revolves around in a circle.

Gabby was 14 when he first started in show business 15 years ago and has been at it ever since, with time out to serve in the navy during the war, a memory which he still keeps alive by wear-

ing his sailor suit as part of the act.

For those who think that danger is just something that is present but never strikes, Gabby and Kitten are quick to feel otherwise.

Twelve years ago Gabby fell for the first time and fractured vertebrae in his back but was back at the act in no time at all. However, August 28, 1955, he fell once again near his hometown of Wausan, Wisconsin, and his life was in the balance for several weeks and only his excellent physical condition and clean living helped to pull him through.

Kitten fell in April of 1949 and broke her hips but neither mishaps seems to have dulled their love for the aerial act, since they admit trying to work at other jobs, only to grow restless and lonesome for the traveling and thrills which they now have.

Even their two sons, Danny, 13, and Guy Allen, 5, have grown accustomed to this way of life. Danny goes to a military school while Guy travels with his parents while waiting to go to school. Both boys are with their parents now, though, during the summer months.

The Wendts recently returned from San Juan, Puerto Rico and the Dutch West Indies and have traveled everywhere except the Northwest United States, which they hope to see in the near future. A European tour was cancelled in 1955 when Gabby injured himself but they hope to make it up as soon as possible.

Kitten pointed out that, contrary to the thoughts of many, religion plays a dominant part in their life with prayers being said before eating and at bedtime as well as visits with the preachers who sometimes travel with circus acts.

Both Kitten and Gabby hope to return again to Hampton Beach and wish to thank both Ralph Harris and the Chamber of Commerce for making them feel at home.

"Hatful" Proves Powerful Drama

When Michael Vincent Gazzo wrote the surging drama, "A Hatful of Rain", he used a sharp scalpel. He dissected out a cancerous segment of society. From this he cut a specimen slice and placed it under the microscope so all of its pathological horror could be viewed. The result is a stark, realistic play that brings to life the excruciating pain of dope addiction both to the addict and his immediate family.

"A Hatful of Rain" is being magnificently played this week at the Hampton Playhouse. It is not a play for the faint of heart or weak of stomach. Nothing is left out. All the critical emotions that arise out of such an unfortunate habit are laid bare.

The challenging role of the "junkie" — or drug addict — is given tremendous impetus by the superb acting of John Vari. The emotional demands of the characterization are almost superhuman and Vari gives-out with every ounce of his ability. When I talked with Vari backstage after his opening night success, he was exhausted — limp as a rag — after creating Johnny Pope so vividly.

Equally sensitive are the roles of the wife and brother. Maggie Owens, who was brought back to the Hampton Playhouse this week especially to play Celia, found the role to her liking and the role liked her. She contributed greatly to the mounting emotions which erupt in the final act. As the sympathetic brother, Dennis Drew, gave forth with one of his best of many fine performances this summer which demonstrated his ability to handle powerful drama in addition to his fine flair for comedy.

James Arenton created the "ner-do-well" father beautifully. He is the pivotal character whose lack of parental understanding generates much of the seething drama. His role was most effectively handled.

The dope peddling ring, with Albert Ackel making the shivers run up and down the spine as "Mother"; Bob Korchak's lively, hopped-up lieutenant; George Axler's plodding henchman; and Jerry DeSilva's look-out role added greatly to the ominous atmosphere. Ailsa Dawson played the girl friend of the gang — Putski.

A triple-faced stage setting — hallway, kitchen, and bedroom — was realistically met by stage designer, Fred Sammut. It is a great credit to Alfred Christie's directing that such a play as "A Hatful of Rain" should have such a smooth and effective opening night. Any production as exacting as this one requires exacting and critical movement and projection. Monday night's show flowed with unflinching quality.

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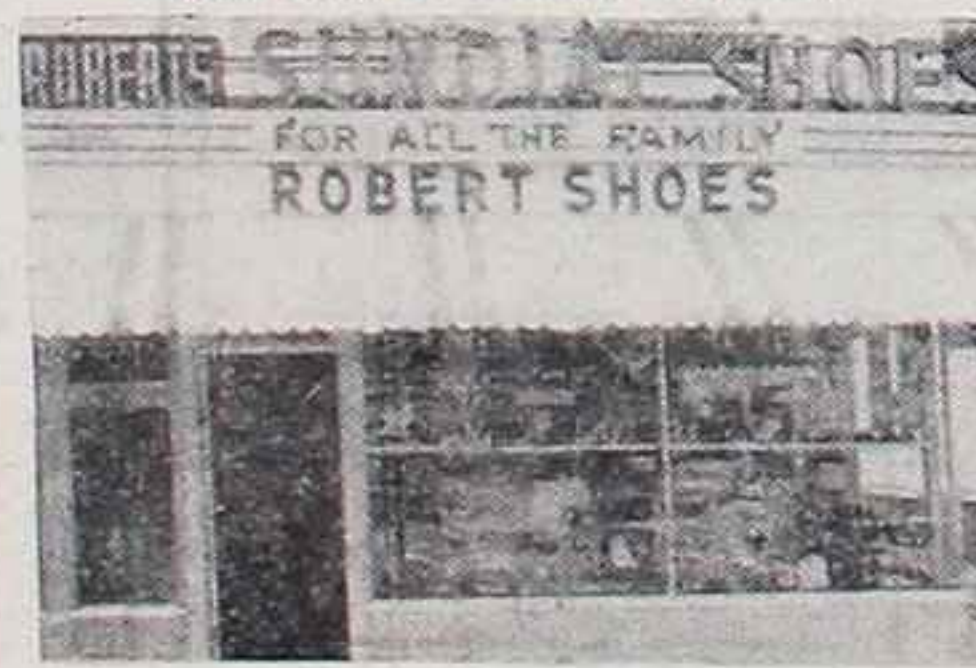

Lamie's Tavern, Inc., and would probably be heard during the September term.

The appeal is being made of a decision last May 7 of Justice John H. Leahy in upholding the right of the State Liquor Commission to deny the granting of a hotel-type liquor license to Lamie's.

The S.L.C. had denied the application last Fall on a split 2-1 decision following a public hearing held August 27 in Concord attended by over 300 Hampton and Hampton Beach residents, businessmen and municipal officials in protest of the granting of "any liquor license anywhere in Hampton".

Following the denial by S.L.C. of its application, Atty. William Phinney of Manchester, counsel for Lamie's Tavern, filed in Rockingham county Superior Court for a writ of Mandamus, which is a legal move to force the State Liquor Commission to comply with the law.

However, Justice Leahy found that the N. H. statutes, which allow for the granting of a meals license to first class hotels even in towns which vote "dry" on the liquor referendum, also give discretionary powers to the State Liquor Commission in the granting of licenses, and thereon upheld the S.L.C.'s denial.

This is the decision which is now in the process of being appealed to the Supreme Court.

The granting of a liquor license to Lamie's Tavern has been the subject of controversy for the past year beginning last Aug. 27 with the public hearing, the subsequent court action, and even extending into the legislative halls in Concord.

Two attempts were made during the recently adjourned session of General Court to outlaw the granting of any type of liquor license in communities which vote "dry" in the biennial liquor referendum — one on a state wide basis and one restricting Hampton only, but both measures were defeated. The solemn were unwilling to recognize "home rule" in matters concerning liquor licensing.

Another factor which may have some bearing on the outcome of the present application is the change of personnel on the State Liquor Commission with the forced retirement of board veteran Harry E. Jackson by Gov. Dwinell on July 1st of this year.

Jackson was replaced by Franklin Flanders of Weare and Tarbox was named as chairman of the Commission by Dwinell.

Gigantic Air Show To Feature Air Base Dedication Sept. 7

The dedication of Pease Air Force Base, Portsmouth, September 7, will give New Englanders an opportunity to see nearly the complete series of United States aircraft including the new aerial refueling tanker, the KC-135, which is in the process of being phased into the aerial arsenal.

Other types of military aircraft expected to be either on display or seen in the air include the B-17 "Flying Fortress" Bomber of World War II, the type in which Captain Earl Paase, Jr., of Plymouth, N. H., for whom the airbase is being dedicated, lost his life during an attack on an enemy held airdrome at Rabaul, New Britain in 1942.

The plans regarding the B-17 include an aerial flyover and a second plane for display on the ground.

Also to be seen will be such aircraft as the Boeing B-47 "Stratojet" medium bomber, presently assigned to the base; the KC-97 "tanker", also at Portsmouth; the T-33 Jet Trainer; C-131 Consolidated Vulture; F-86 Sabre Jet; B-52 Stratofortress, the mainstay of Strategic Air Command along with the B-47 Stratojet; F-102 Convair Delta Dagger; F-100 Super Sabre and RC-121 Radar Picket aircraft.

All total, there is expected to be approximately 30 aircraft of different types, propeller driven and jet, participating in either the aerial demonstration or on the ground for inspection.

One of the main highlights of the aerial demonstration will include the United States Air Force famed precision jet flyers, the Thunderbirds. This group appeared at the formal opening of the airbase in June 1956. However, changes in the Thunderbird group will see a completely new group appearing for the dedication ceremonies.

Next Monday night will be the final talent contest of the season.

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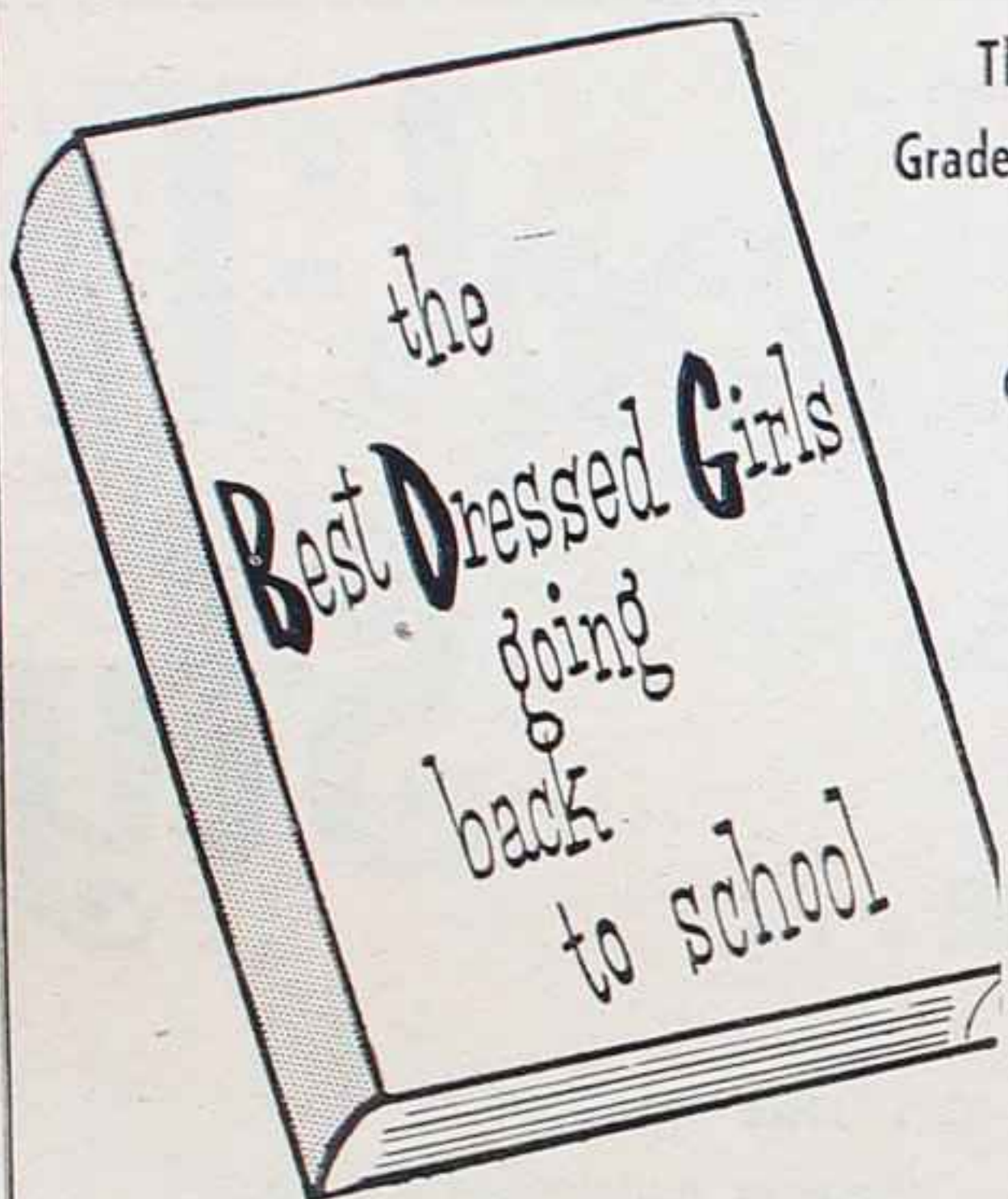
