Children 5 thru 11 - Have You Entered The Beachcomber Sand Castle Contest For Children's Day - August 14th.

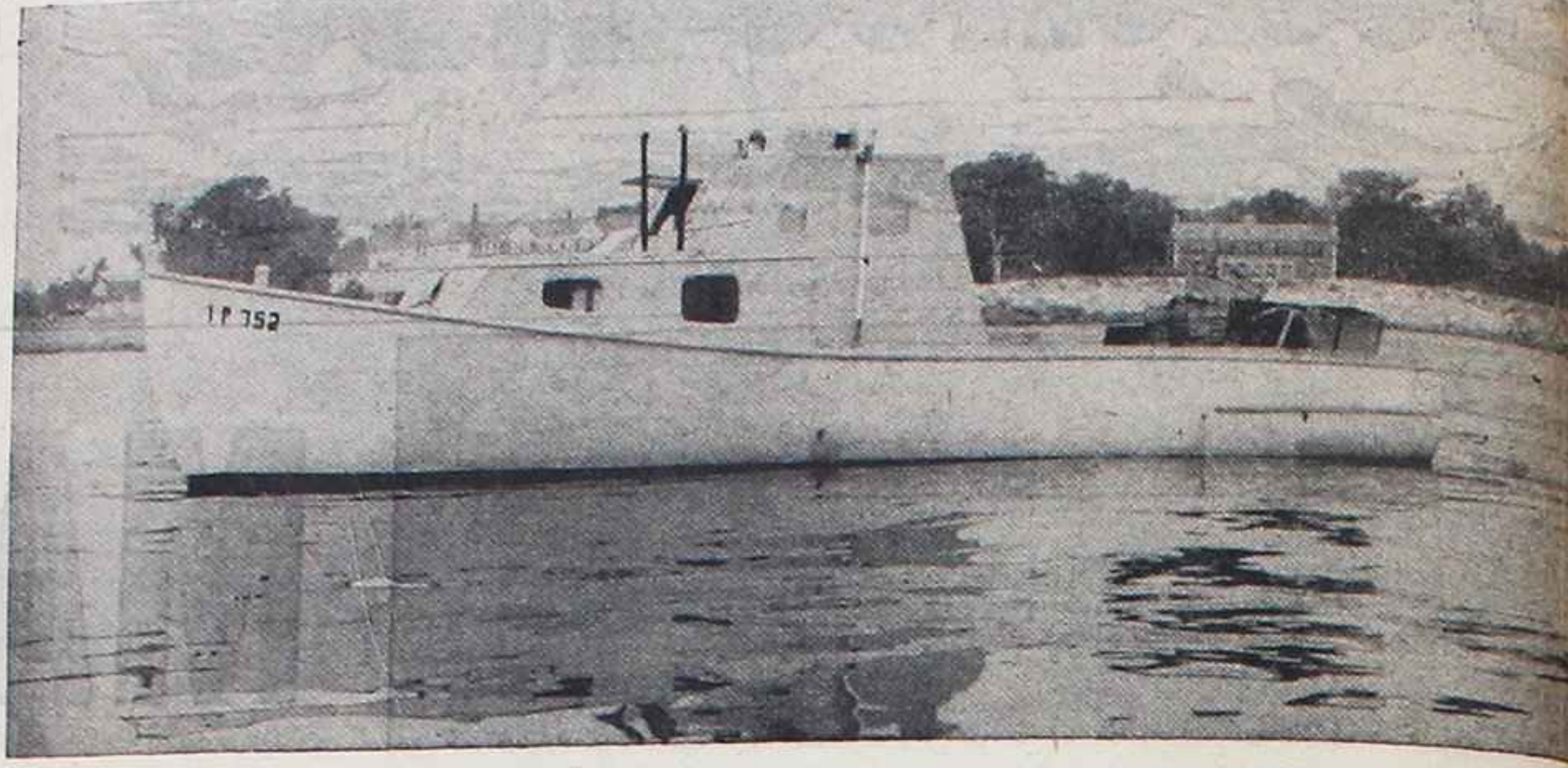
Annual Children's Day Program To Be Held Aug. 14

17 Per Cent Rate Increase Sought By Water Company

The Hampton Water Works announced today it has asked the Public Utilities Commission for its first rate increase since 1941.

T. G. Braman, company president, said the increase is necessary to offset a 132 per cent increase since 1941 in operating expenses. He said the company's earnings position has suffered because "our expense dollars have increased faster than our revenue dollars."

Mr. Braman added that the proposed new rates, which would not go into effect until September 1st, would increase his firm's operating revenues by about 17 per cent.

"For the average residential customer," he said, "the increase would amount to about \$3.60 a year, or less than a penny a day."

The greater percentage of the increase, he stated, would apply to public and private fire service due to heavy financial outlays by his company to improve these services over the years.

Mr. Braman explained that expenditures made primarily to improve public and private fire service included the cost of a 500,000 gallon elevated tank at Hampton Beach and numerous reinforcing mains.

"Just this year we placed in service the new Scammon Well and 12-inch reinforcing main. We have otherwise expanded our sources of supply and our system of mains to meet the needs of an expanding list of customers in this growing community."

The diving sensations Billy and Kay Outten will be the featured performers during Carnival week at the end of the festival month of August at Hampton Beach.

Outten and his lovely partner will be seen twice daily, at 4:30 and 8:30 p. m., Aug. 25 thru 30, near the Chamber of Commerce. It was announced this week by the Hampton Beach Village Precinct, which sponsors carnival week acts each summer.

Billy Outten, the feature performer of the diving sensations, is a former AAU diving champion of the Eastern Seaboard and champion of the state of Florida. A few years ago, he turned professional and has become as important

ant a figure in that field as he was in amateur competition. He is more than just a diver. He is a well known stunt man and daredevil as well. The climax of his performance is a back dive from the top of a 110-foot ladder into a tank of water only 6 feet deep and 14 feet in diameter. With his body ablaze, he forms a living torch as he plunges through the air to the comparative safety of the tank below after having saturated himself with gasoline and touching off the high-octane fuel with a match.

From the top of the 110-foot ladder the tank has the appearance of a small coin. Perfect judgment is necessary if he is to hit exact center. He cannot waver

in mid-air from his course in the slightest degree or he risks hitting the aluminum sides of the tank or missing it altogether either of which would result in certain death.

Billy alone, is not the whole show. The feminine half of the act, Kay, is an outstanding diver in her own right as she proves during a fancy diving display. Outten has lost none of the

ability he had when he was chosen a member of the United States Olympic team while still residing in his home town of Hollywood, Fla.

Historic Sites Offer Interesting Side Trips

New Hampshire offers many sites of historical interest that are within easy driving distance of Hampton Beach.

Since the early nineteenth century, Pattee's caves in North Salem have been of interest in the area, first as a stone quarry and later as an archeological site. The most recent researches have been made by Frank Glynn, president of the Connecticut Archeological society, who has revealed parallels to a Bronze Age Culture.

The present owners of the site make no claims and take no sides with any of the theories. They offer a tour as a glimpse of an intriguing mystery.

Another site are the lonely Isles of Shoals, which can be reached from either Hampton or Portsmouth Harbors. The Gosport Chapel on the Isles was originally constructed from the wreck of a Spanish Ship in 1685. It was rebuilt in 1720 and then burned by the islanders in 1790. The present stone building was erected in 1880.

For the visitor interested in colonial architecture, historic southern New Hampshire offers the visitor truly outstanding examples of early American homes and other unusual points of interest. Hampton itself, although more than 300 years old, must be viewed from the outside as the many examples of colonial architecture are still used as year 'round private residences.

Visitors with a historical bent, however, can find within 20 minutes driving time from the beach several old homes and other points of interest that are open to the public. No less than eight of these the youngest more than 150 years old, are to be found in the Portsmouth area.

Oldest of the attractions is the Jackson home, built about 1664. The house, now owned by the Society for the Preservation of New England Antiquities, is furnished in keeping with the early period. Located on Northwest street, Portsmouth, the Jackson house is open weekdays from 11 a. m. to 5 p. m. Admission is charged.

Dating back to 1716 is the Warner house, at Chapel and Daniel streets in Portsmouth. Featured in addition to traditional furnishings are six truly astonishing mural paintings on the staircase wall. The house is open weekdays with admission charged.

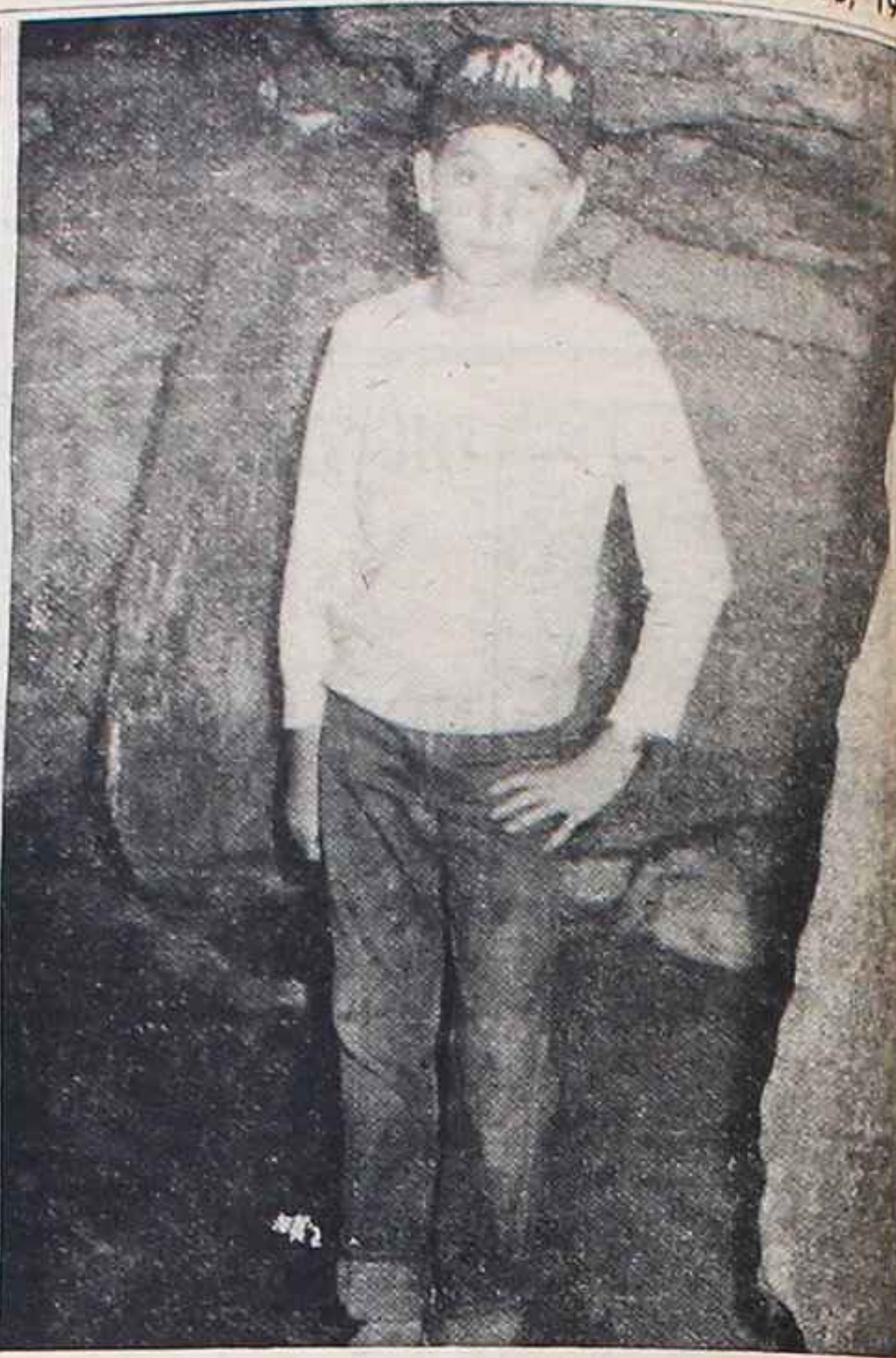
The Thomas Bailey Aldrich house, Court street, Portsmouth, is of interest to young and old. Described in the author's famed "The Story of a Bar Boy", this home dates back to the 1790 era. Every detail has been preserved to take the visitor back to the 18th century. This ancient house is also open weekdays with an admission fee.

Other Portsmouth and Portsmouth area houses open to the public include the 1763 Moffet-Ladd house, Market street, Portsmouth; the 1784 Governor Langdon house, Pleasant street; the Hamilton house, South Berwick; and the Lady Pepperell house in Kittery.

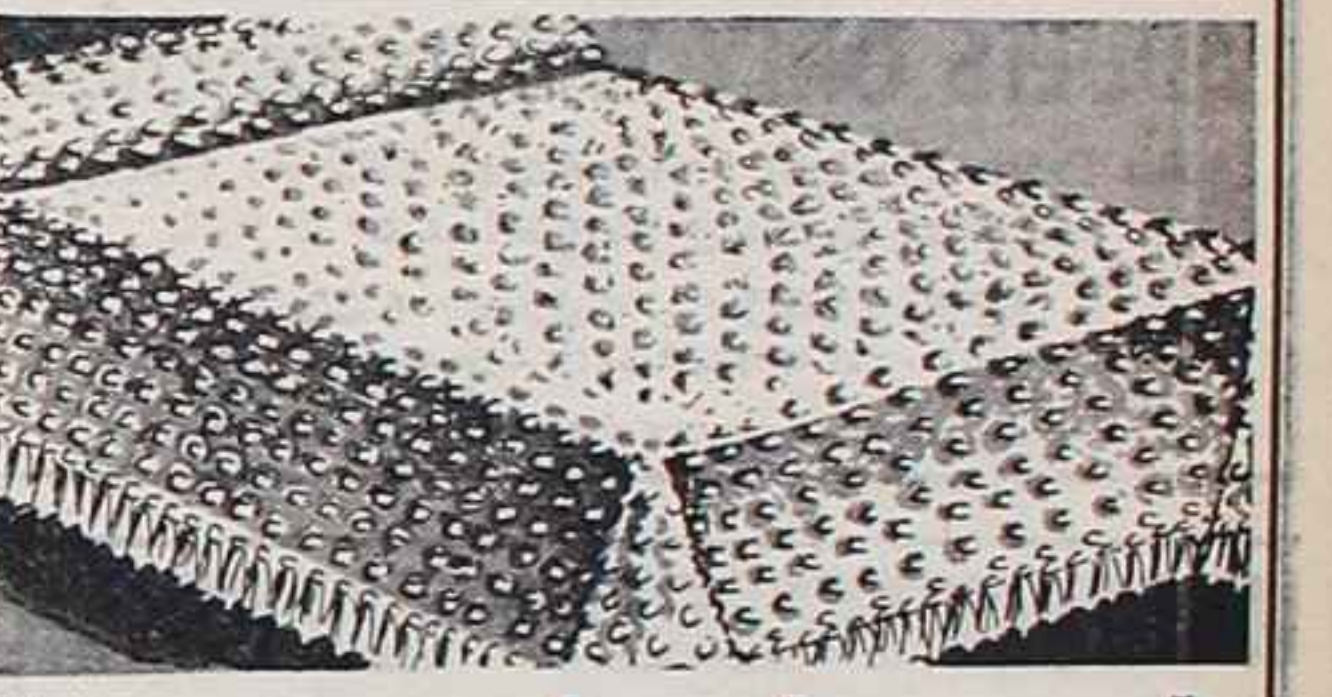

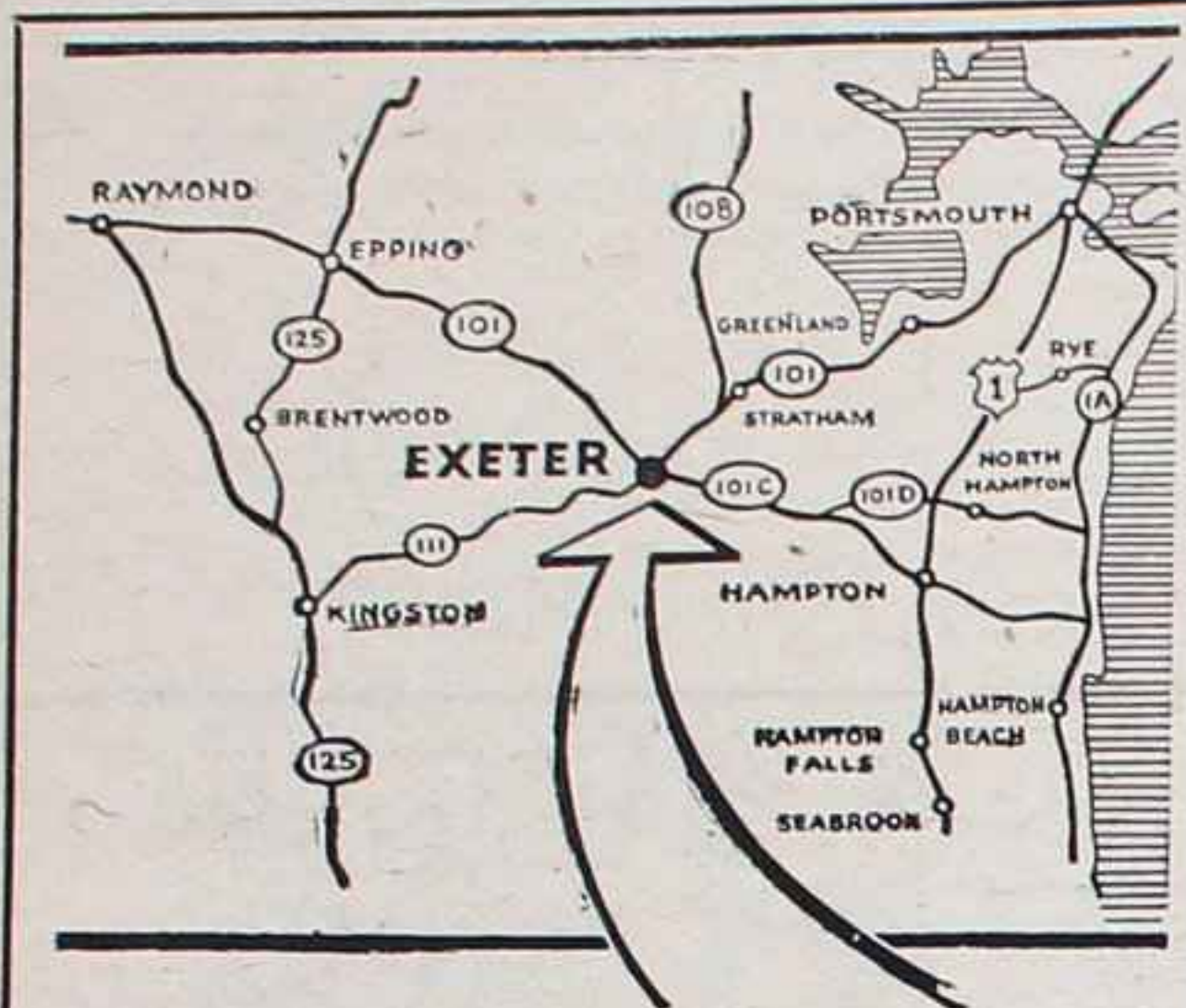
Need Vacation Folders For Canadian Office

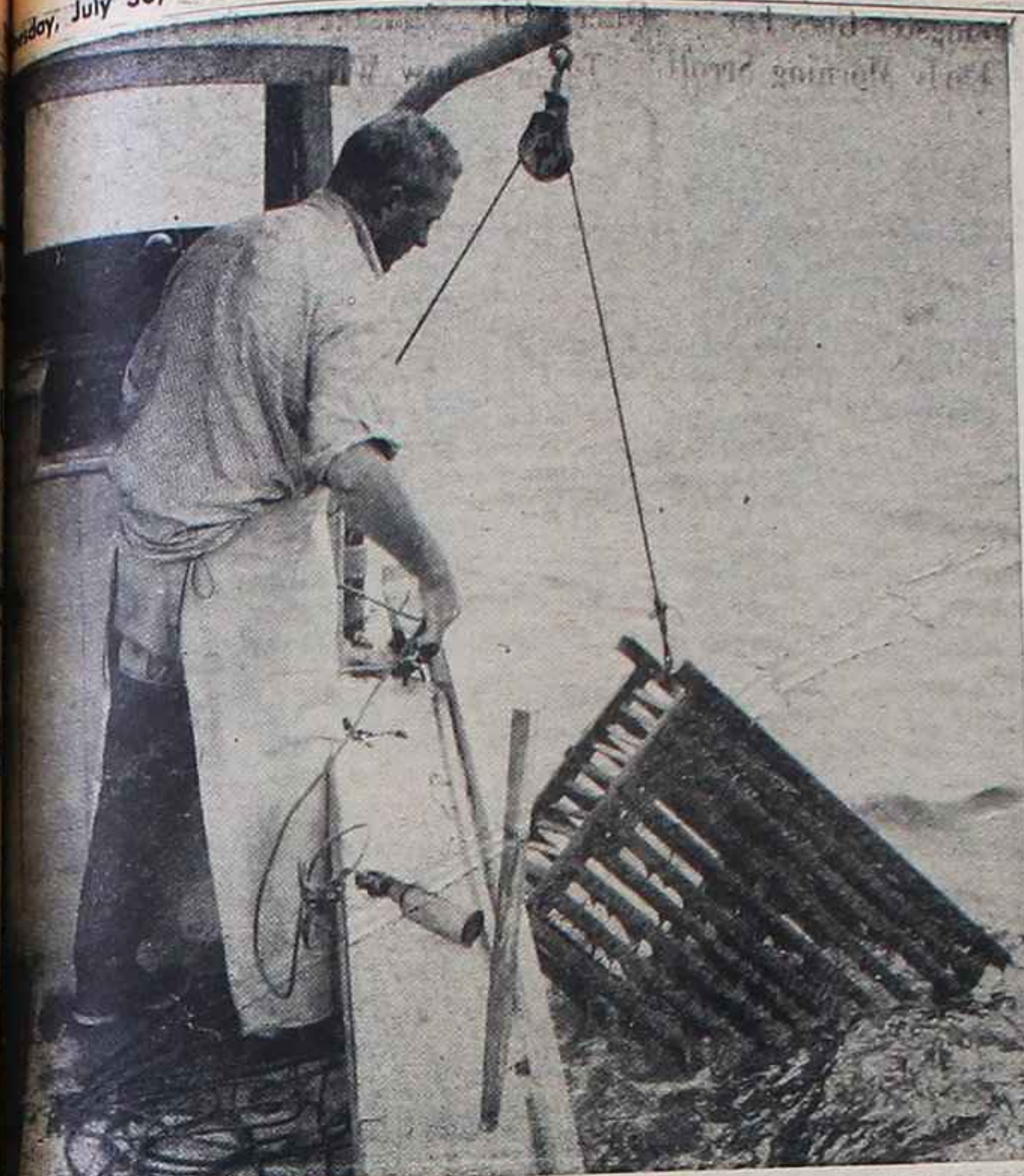

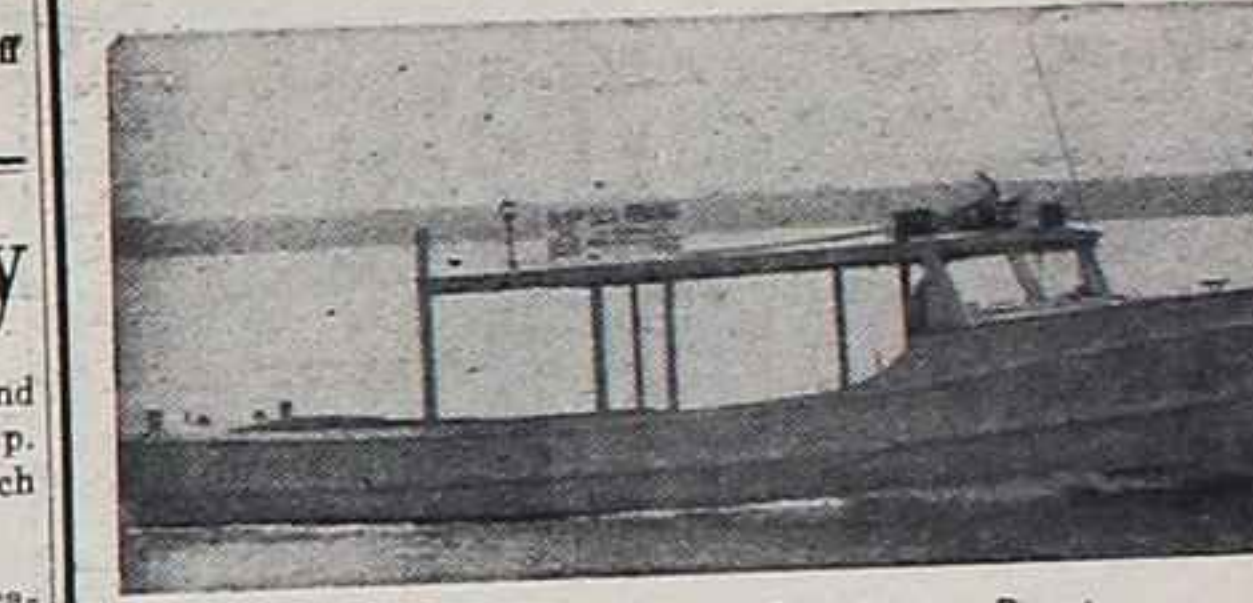

Playhouse Drama Will Be Held Over

Never — but never in the history of The Hampton Playhouse has there been so overwhelming a demand for tickets as for this week's production of Tennessee Williams' CAT ON A HOT TIN ROOF. The management, anticipating an excellent response, scheduled an extra Saturday night twilight performance (Aug. 2nd at 6 p.m.) however, it now appears that the play will have to hold another week.

The play itself boasts a list of awards including the coveted Pulitzer Prize and in N. Y. it played for a record 694 performances.

John McClain of The New York Journal-American said about the play: "Tennessee Williams is a playwright who can sock you and shock you and he has never exhibited these abilities to better advantage. It is a powerful and provocative evening; you are torn between fascination and revulsion, but you are held. Williams has fashioned his most compelling characters and brought them into clearer focus than in any of his previous efforts. These are people closer to our ken and their problems are at least comprehensible to most of us. The play rather clearly divides itself into three stanzas: the unrequited relationship between the boy and his wife, the hassle over the inheritance, and the final resolution involving the whole family. You won't be bored."

Under no circumstances will minors be allowed to this production due to the intimate nature of the play and before each evening's performance the management makes a curtain speech forewarning the audience of the nature of the play least anyone find that kind of theatre offensive in any way.

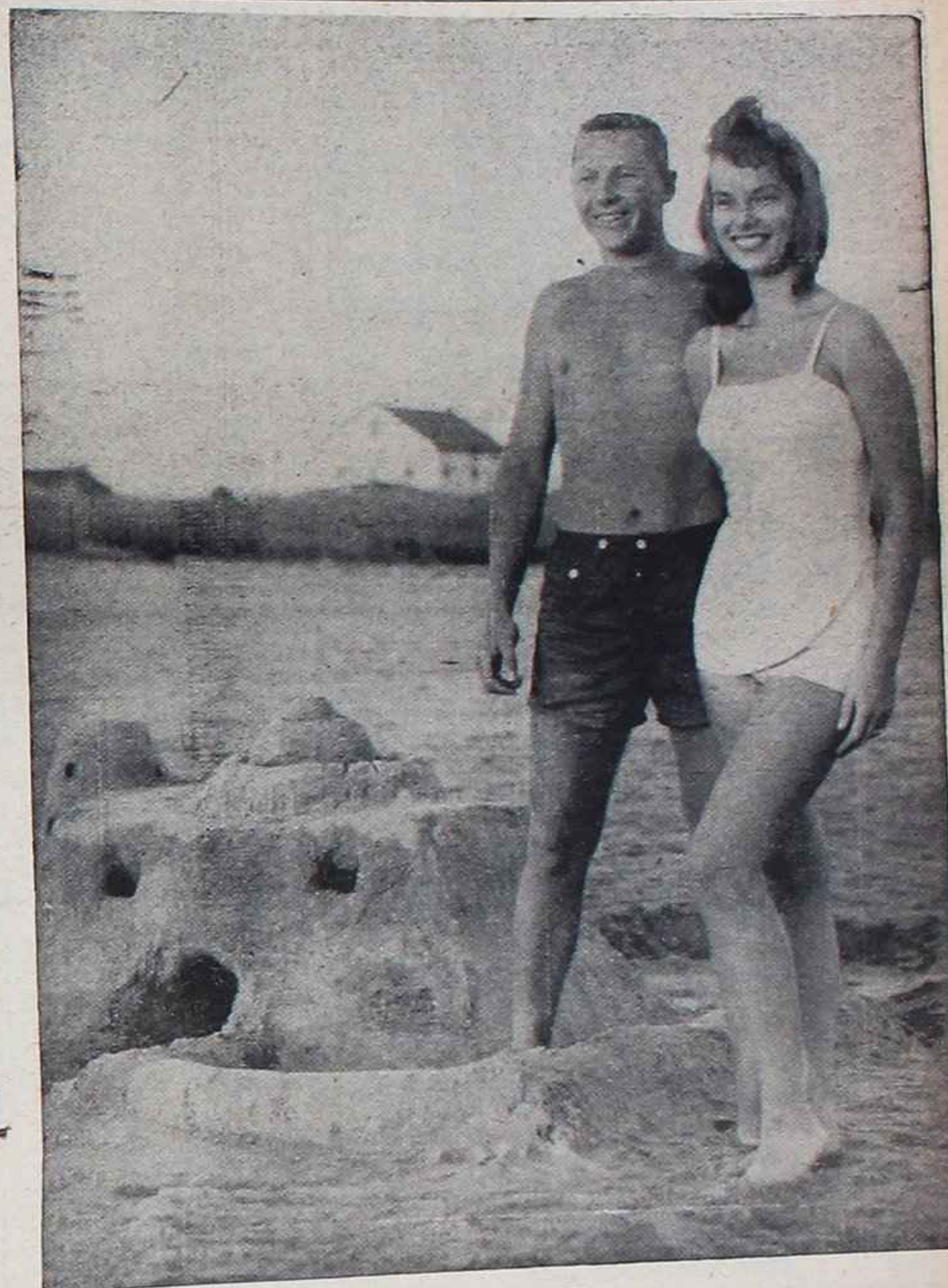
