Playhouse Drama Will Be Held Over

Never — but never in the history of The Hampton Playhouse has there been so overwhelming a demand for tickets as for this week's production of Tennessee Williams' CAT ON A HOT TIN ROOF. The management, anticipating an excellent response, scheduled an extra Saturday night twilight performance (Aug. 2nd at 6 p.m.) however, it now appears that the play will have to hold another week.

The play itself boasts a list of awards including the coveted Pulitzer Prize and in N. Y. it played for a record 694 performances.

John McClain of The New York Journal-American said about the play: "Tennessee Williams is a playwright who can sock you and shock you and he has never exhibited these abilities to better advantage. It is a powerful and provocative evening; you are torn between fascination and revulsion, but you are held. Williams has fashioned his most compelling characters and brought them into clearer focus than in any of his previous efforts. These are people closer to our ken and their problems are at least comprehensible to most of us. The play rather clearly divides itself into three stanzas: the unrequited relationship between the boy and his wife, the hassle over the inheritance, and the final resolution involving the whole family. You won't be bored."

Under no circumstances will minors be allowed to this production due to the intimate nature of the play and before each evening's performance the management makes a curtain speech forewarning the audience of the nature of the play least anyone find that kind of theatre offensive in any way.

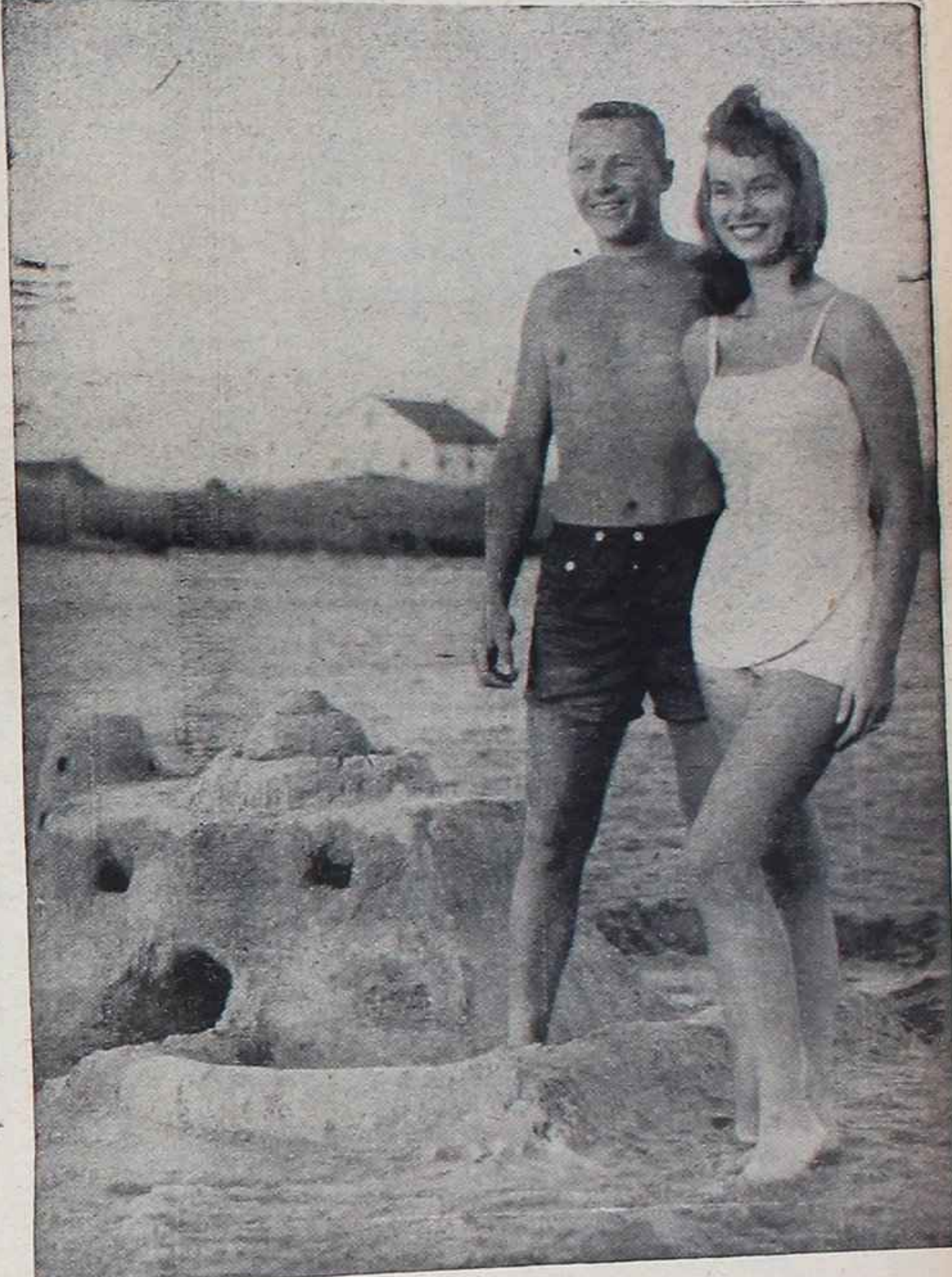

### Town Officials Seek Navigation Markings

Hampton town officials, including the Board of Selectmen, Town Manager and the Chief of Police, stirred by the recent tragic boating accident off the shores of Hampton Beach are pressing for more adequate safety measures in the locality.

With the increase in boating traffic using Hampton Harbor every year, it is their hope that the Coast Guard will mark hazardous ledges and the channel entrance with lights and audible signals.

It is believed by authorities investigating the Tobey accident, that the craft struck an unmarked ledge just off the shore as they approached the harbor early Sunday morning.

In a letter to the Commandant of the First Coast District in Boston Selectman Lawrence Hackett, Town Manager John Batchelder and Chief of Police John Malek pointed out that over the years other boating accidents have occurred in this vicinity.

The letter in its entirety follows: August 4, 1958

The Commandant, First Coast Guard District, Federal Building, Boston, Massachusetts, Dear Sir:

It seems tragic that death must highlight a need for safety devices, and yet we in Hampton feel that the boating accident which took the lives of Mr. and Mrs. Alton Tobey could have been prevented had there been adequate marking of the sunken ledge off Hampton Beach.

These ledges have been the scene of many boating accidents, even involving experienced fishermen, over the years. We feel that there should be a system of lights and audible signals erected on buoys in this area, and we also feel that Hampton Harbor itself should be provided with an adequate lighting

and warning system at the approach. The State of New Hampshire, Town and regional groups are doing everything possible to promote boating in this area, and the appropriations of the federal, state and local government amount to thousands of dollars annually for harbor improvement, construction of piers, and the promotion of boating activities in this area. We feel that a proper warning system is absolutely vital and that this project should be commenced forthwith before another tragic accident brings the matter again to our attention.

# Sand Castle Contest To Feature Children's Day

A Sand Castle Contest will start off Children's Day, beginning at noon. Applications are available at the Chamber of Commerce office, for children ranging in age from 5 thru 11 years old. Each child must build his own sand castle, but may, of course, ask advice of anyone. There will be an area of sand near the bandstand roped off and wet down by the Fire Department.

Judging of the sand castles will begin at 1:30, and the two divisions, children 5 - 8 and 9 - 11 will be judged separately.

The judges are Mr. Charles Goodhue of North Hampton, Miss Sarah Cutts of Hampton, and Miss Marian Hennenhan of Haverhill, Mass. Mr. Goodhue operates the Seacoast Art Gallery on Atlantic avenue, North Hampton; Miss

Cutts, on vacation from Carleton College greets visitors to the beach in the Chamber of Commerce office; and Miss Hennenhan helps with advertising at the Hampton Playhouse.

Other events for children's day include the always popular parade with floats and horribles and rolling toys scheduled for 2:00 p. m. Awards for sand castles and rolling toys will be made after the parade. And then there will be free ice cream and tonic for all the children.

At 4:00 p. m. the baby contest will be held, with several divisions to be judged. The judges for this contest and for the rolling toys will be Mrs. Charlotte Dijo of the "Wilbert", Mrs. Sophie Breznik of the "Beacon" and Mrs. Helen Shine of D street. Chairman for

these events is Mrs. Theresa Ryan.

There are many attractions at Hampton Beach for children, including first the wide, clean beach and the usually gentle Atlantic. There is also the John C. White Memorial Playground, just south of the Police Station.

## Boulevard Brevities

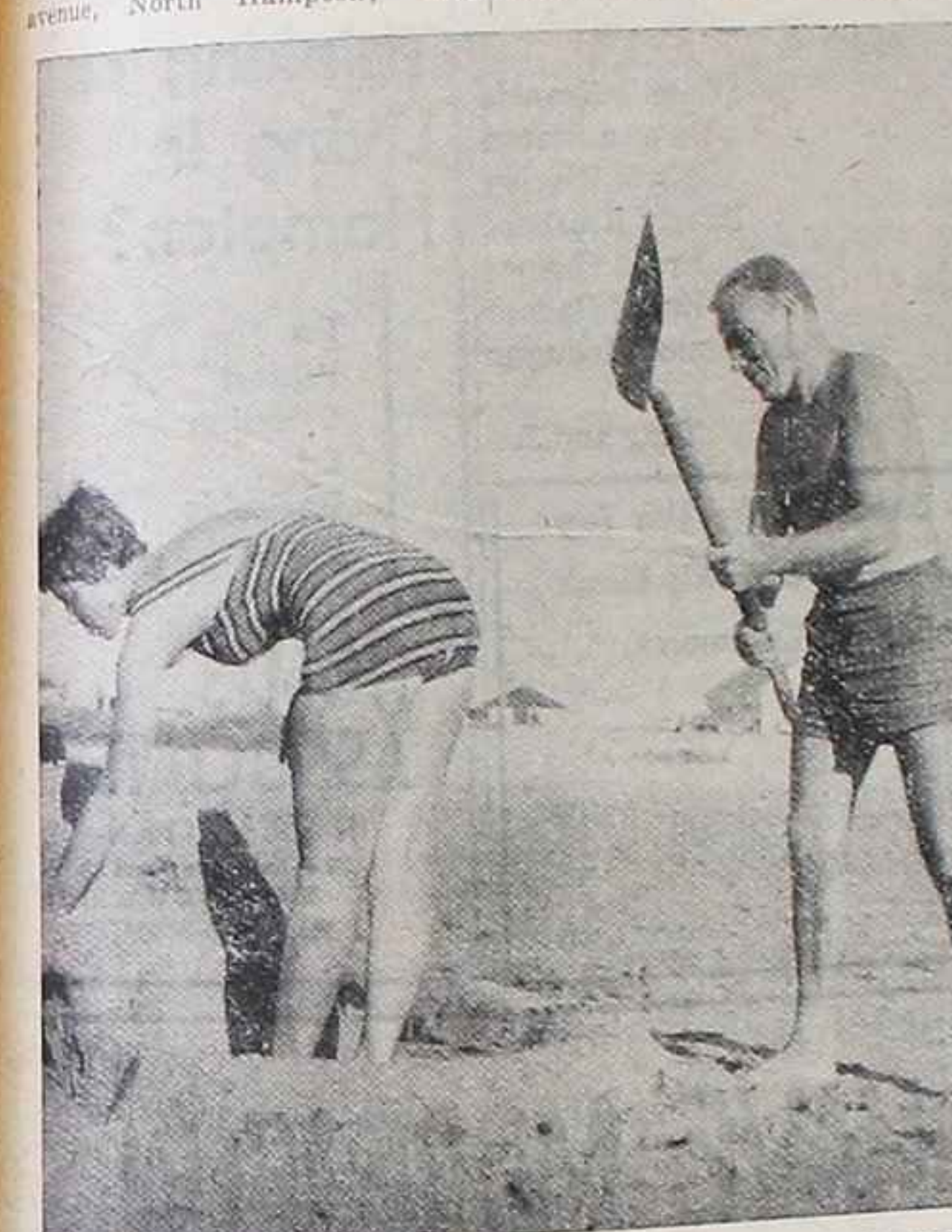

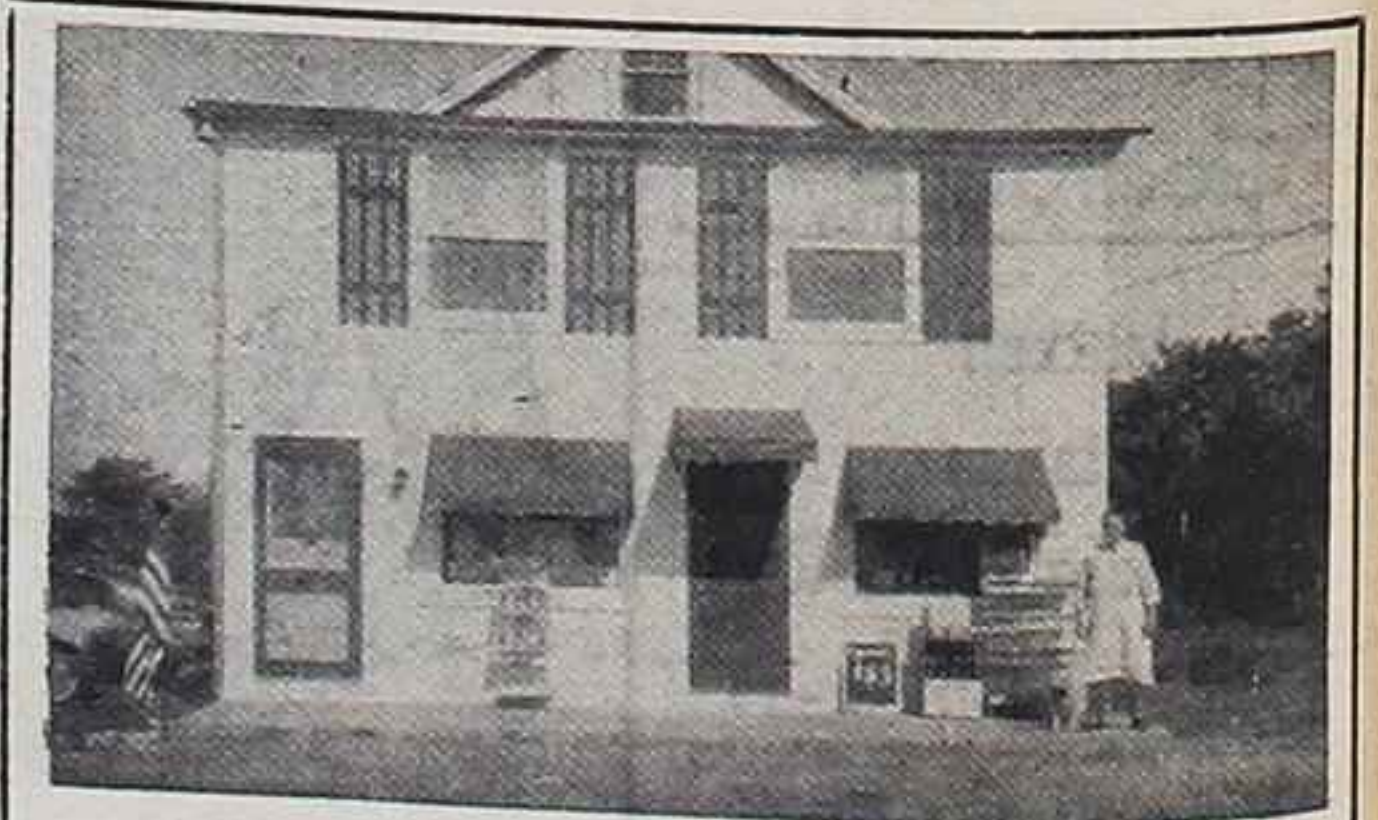

Flounder fishing is particularly good. Cod, haddock, halibut, and sea bass are also providing the salt water fisherman with some good sport. Striped bass are being caught off Plum Island. Some mackerel are being taken, but as yet no big schools have put in an appearance.

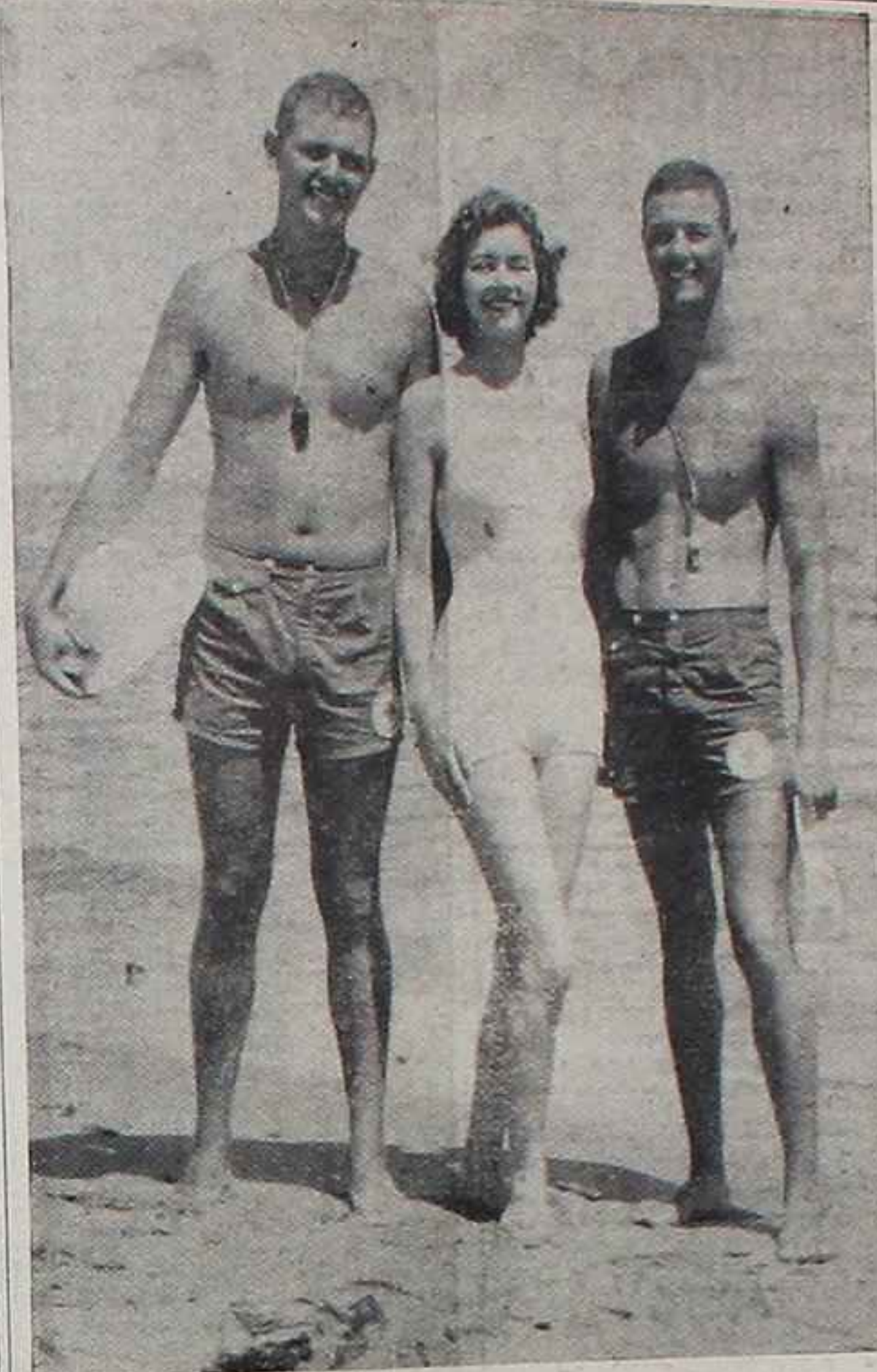

Police Officer Merle A. Jones Jr., and an unidentified bather located the body underneath the raft in 12 feet of water.

A rescue team from the Amesbury Fire department applied a resuscitator for about a half hour under the direction of Dr. Charles J. Schissel, but without success.

# Boating Tragedy Takes Lives of Hampton Couple

Tragedy struck Hampton over the weekend when Mr. and Mrs. Alton P. Tobey lost their lives in a boating accident early Sunday morning, when their new cabin cruiser struck a ledge just off the beach front and partially sank.

Coast Guard and Pease Air Base helicopters today joined the continuing search for the body of Mr. Tobey, who is believed to have drowned in the accident, which took the life of his wife, Mrs. Gladys S. Tobey. Mrs. Tobey's body was located about 6:30 a. m., approximately 300 yards southeast of Great Bear's Head by Edward F. Goodwin of Polly Mill road, Seabrook.

The tragedy was investigated by Police Chief John J. Malek of Hampton; John Fisher, EMC, USCG, officer-in-charge of the Hampton Beach Lifeboat Station; CWO Joseph Del Torto, commander of the Gloucester group, USCG, and Dr. Wendell P. Clare, Rockingham County medical referee.

Police Chief Malek reported that cries for help were first heard about 3:20 a. m. from in front of the state parking lot on Ocean boulevard and were reported to the police station by Gerald Da Lesio

and Kenneth Bouchard of Pawtucket, R. I., Susan Whitney and Carol Bouchard of Leominster, Mass., and Robert Deronck and Katherine Philbin of Broadbrook, Mass.

An immediate search of the area by Coast Guard and police officers was impeded by a low hanging haze over the water and the patrol could not locate the source of the distress calls.

About 4:30, Ronald Mace, 13, who was with his father, Harold Mace of Hampton, a jobsterman,

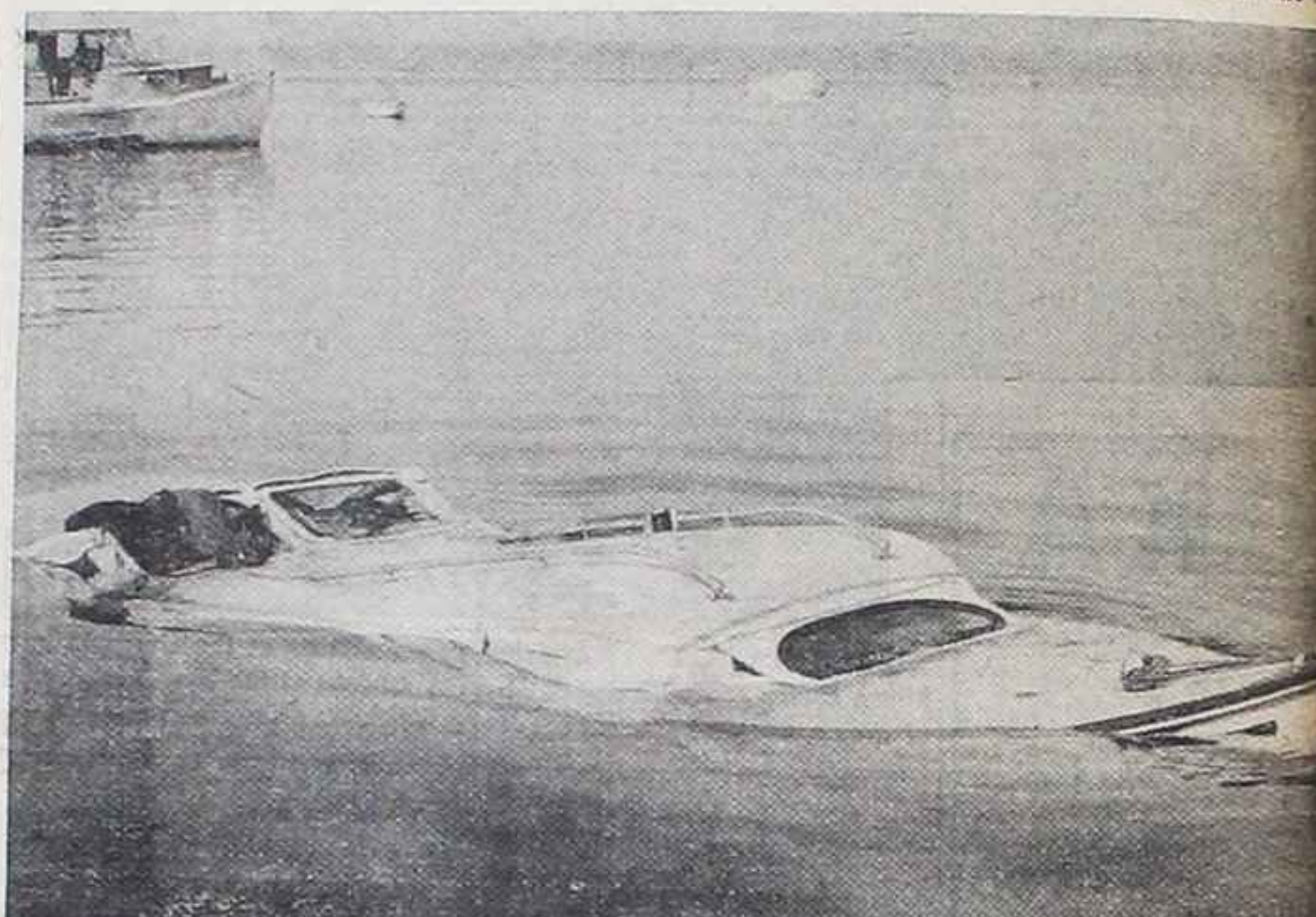
not be checked in time to save the lives of the couple.

The Tobeyes were last seen by Capt. Jack Sweetser of Castle, who reported that the Hampton couple had left the Harbor pier about 9 p. m. and decided whether to go on land or back to Hampton.

Members of Portsmouth Iron, Civil Air Patrol, assisted the search for Tobey's body yesterday. Among those taking part were Lt. Joseph M. Verano, commander of the Portsmouth Squadron; Capt. Arthur B. Rochester, Miss Carol Loring of Exeter, Lt. Paul T. Manchester, and WO Leo L. Gibbons of Rye handled base operations at the Airport.

Also taking part in the search for the body were a helicopter from the Coast Guard Air Station at Salem, Mass., and patrol boats from the Hampton River and Merrimack River Lifeboat Stations of the Coast Guard.

Lewis Joslyn of Hampton, Dan DeWitt of Seabrook, and others, both assisted in the search.

spotted the bow of the Tobey craft and radio - telephoned to the Coast Guard. The patrol boat from the Hampton Lifeboat Station arrived on the scene about 30 minutes later and towed the cruiser to the State Pier in the harbor.

The craft was beached, with the aid of an automobile wrecking truck, and investigators found the propeller damaged and the rudder partially torn away. Water had poured through the resulting hole, causing the boat to sink by the stern.

An air pocket in the bow probably prevented the boat from sinking completely, officials reported.

Although the true circumstances surrounding the tragedy will probably never be known investigating officials, in piecing together such information as is available, theorize that the Tobeyes were on their way home from the Wentworth Hotel at New Castle where they had dinner, when their boat, which had no radio, struck the ledge.

Investigation revealed that the engine had been reversed, but that the momentum of the craft could

## Beach Precincts Ask For Hearing On Water Rates

In protest against proposed water rate increases of 50 to 100% Hampton, North Hampton, Rye Beach and Jenness Beach Precincts have petitioned the State Public Utilities commission for a public hearing.

A protest meeting against the proposed increase rates by the Hampton Water company was held in the Town offices Tuesday evening. The meeting was called by Town Manager John Bateholder and the towns of Hampton and North Hampton, Rye Beach and Jenness Beach Precincts were represented by their selectmen and commissioners.

The increase asked by T. G. Braman, water company president, last week, to offset a 132% increase in operating expenses since 1941 would result in an overall increase in water expenses for the towns as follows:

The Precinct of Rye Beach would be hardest hit by the proposed increases, which would increase that precinct's water costs by 100%. Hampton's over-all water expense would be raised by almost 50%.

All those at the meeting agreed that an increase in the middle of the season would put the towns and precincts in an embarrassing position, as any local government depends entirely on its budget, which is planned each year to meet ordinary, reasonable expenses.

It was therefore decided that a letter should be drawn up and sent to state Public Utilities Commission chairman, Harold K. Davidson. This letter was then signed by all those present, duly representing their towns and precincts. Quoting the body of the letter:

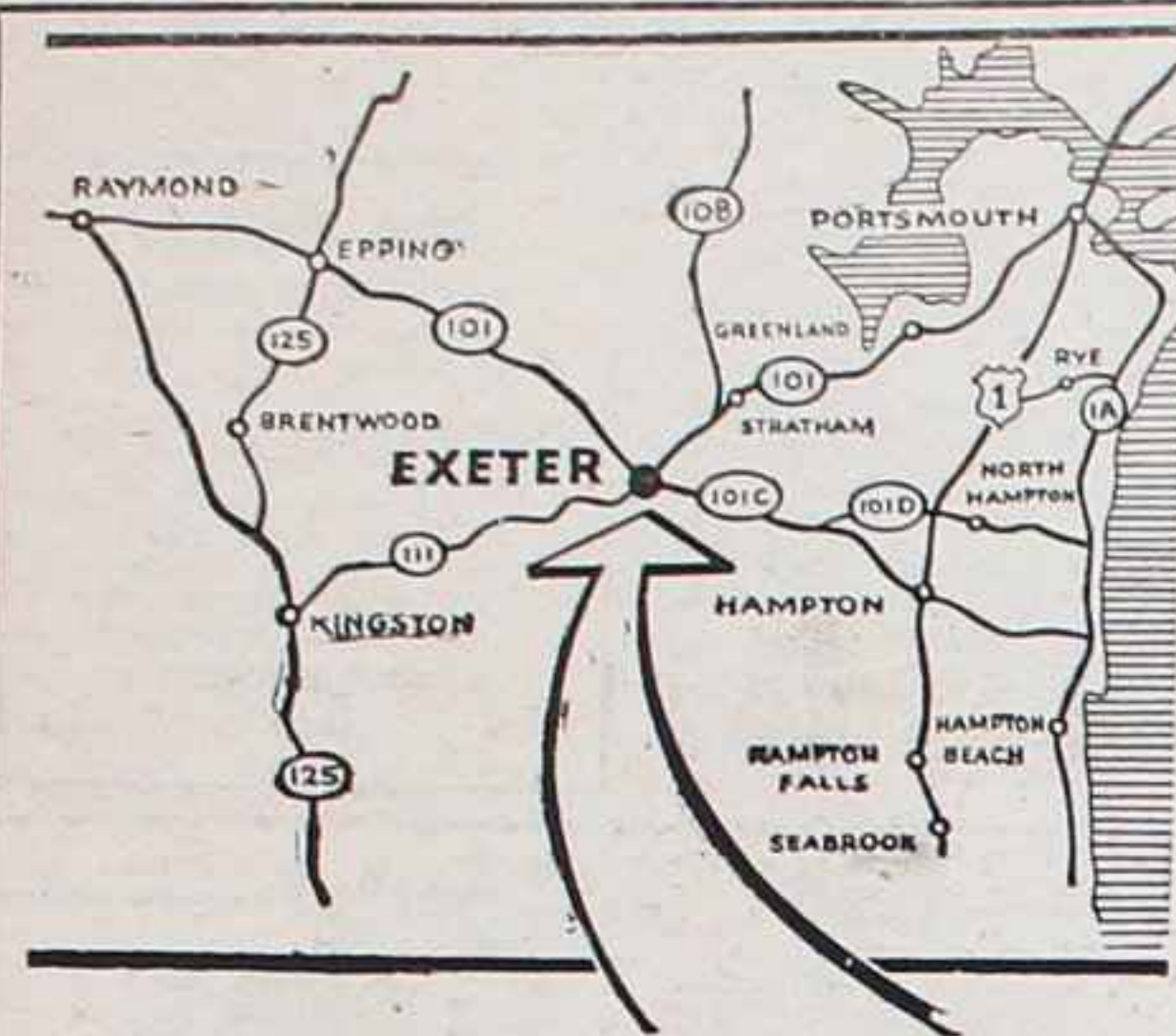

## '58 Property Valuation At Record \$17.7 Million

Hampton's property valuations for tax purposes have soared to a new high in 1958 as the Board of Selectmen released the inventory figures this week showing a gross total of \$17,752,553.11, including all classes of taxable property. The current inventory is \$1,315,294 more than in 1957 with \$1,258,644 of this increase reflected in valuations of lands and buildings,

a direct result of the continued home building program in this residential community.

Chairman Lawrence C. Hackett of the Board of Selectmen stated today that it would probably be a week to ten days before the tax rate would be known because of a holdup in Concord.

Before the State Tax Commission can approve the tax rate, computations from the State Department of Education allocating funds for foundation aid and school building construction costs must be received.

Unofficial estimates have set Hampton's tax rate at \$53 for a \$10.50 increase over last year, although this figure could change, up or down, depending on the Tax Commission's approval of the Selectmen's estimates of revenues and overlay.

Mr. Hackett reported that the town's figures were ready to take to Concord and the selectmen are awaiting an appointment with the State Tax Commission.

Most of the figures in the selectmen's inventory were comparable to last year with real estate valuations showing the biggest jump. Assessments on electric plants were increased by \$7,000 while the Stock in Trade valuation increased from \$296,873 in 1957 to \$352,663 this year.

Reflecting the growing residential trend of this community was the \$1.2 million increase in land and building valuation while the fast disappearing farming operations were shown by decrease in numbers of cows, horses, fowls and other neat stock.

Another trend of the times was reflected in the increased valuation of power boats which rose from

\$7,350 in 1957 to \$13,200 for the current year.

Veterans exemptions are also up this year by some \$26,000 with the 1958 figure set at \$338,669 as compared with \$362,667 last year.

The net valuation figure on which the tax rate will be set this year is \$17,363,886 as against \$16,074,594 in 1957 for a net increase of \$1,289,292.

## Underwater Swimming Instruction Needed

The sport of skin diving and underwater swimming has become increasingly popular over the past two years. Oxygen-supply masks and other diving equipment can now be purchased at most any sporting goods store at moderate prices. More and more frequently Mom and Dad are buying underwater swimming gear for Junior or Sis, giving no more thought to it than if they were purchasing a badminton set or tennis racket.

Skin diving and underwater swimming is potentially dangerous. This was pointed up recently by the tragic drowning of a teenage boy in southern New Hampshire who was skin diving for the first time. . . . WITHOUT INSTRUCTIONS! This is only one example; there are others.

The New Hampshire Fish and Game department, which is responsible for recovery of drowning victims, emphasizes that skin diving can be dangerous. No one should attempt it without first receiving instructions from a qualified person. When equipment is purchased, inquiries should be made as to where such instruction can be obtained. Often the sporting goods dealer will have this information. A number of skin diving clubs have been organized within the state and are quite active, particularly in the southern part of the state. Undoubtedly their experienced members would be willing to help a beginner get started safely.

Department officials hasten to assure underwater sport enthusiasts that they don't mean to be "wet blankets" or discourage those interested in this new sport. Their

major concern is to impress upon newcomers to the game that it is not a sport to be taken lightly and that the basic fundamentals of underwater swimming and skin diving should be learned, as well as the function of their equipment.

Above all, observe the cardinal rule: NEVER SWIM OR DIVE ALONE.

## Five Area Students Win Scholastic Awards

The closing exercises of the 1958 session of the Advanced Studies program, St. Paul's school, Concord, were held Saturday, August 2. Certificates of attendance were awarded to the 100 students of exceptional academic ability, who have participated in the six weeks' session, taking courses in general at the advanced level. ### Seacoast Skywatchers Man GOC Post In Test Alert

"Operation Skywatch" — that Manchester was combined with that located at Albany, N. Y., is now Commander of the Filter Center in Albany.

No spectacular program of recognition was planned to mark this milestone, but quiet local observances were held throughout the national Ground Observer Corps organization, with speeches and award presentations, according to officials at the Colorado Springs Ground Observer Corps headquarters.

Many posts took this occasion as the time to present Certificates of Voluntary Service. This certificate is a new USAF Air Defense Command award, which is presented to civilian volunteers who have completed a minimum of three years' continuous active service in the G. O. C.

Operation Skywatch, calling for 24 hour surveillance of the skies, as part of the continental air defense effort, was approved in March of 1952 and by July of that year, there were 32 air defense filter centers and 6,000 observation posts in 27 states taking part in this program. Today, there are 51 filter centers with 11,000 civilian volunteers working in these centers and some 268,000 observers registered at 15, 647 observation posts.

The last of the observation posts and skywatchers on 24 hour operational duty were relieved of their responsibility last January first when the Ground Observer Corps was placed on "ready reserve" status. This easing of GOC duties was made possible by increased early-warning capabilities given the North American Air Defense Command by the completion of the radar networks which stretch across the Arctic Circle and across Canada.

But the filter centers are manned by military personnel 24 hours each day in order to be available in event of an emergency alert. The observation posts continue in a state of readiness and volunteer observers maintain their proficiency through practice in test alerts.

The latest test alert at the Seacoast Ground Observer Post was held, July 22, from one p. m. until nine p. m. with six teams of observers participating in the alert. Three test B52 planes from Thule Air Force Base were sent over the area where the test alert was held and all three planes were spotted on schedule by the observer on duty at the local post and the proper reports made to the Albany Filter Center.

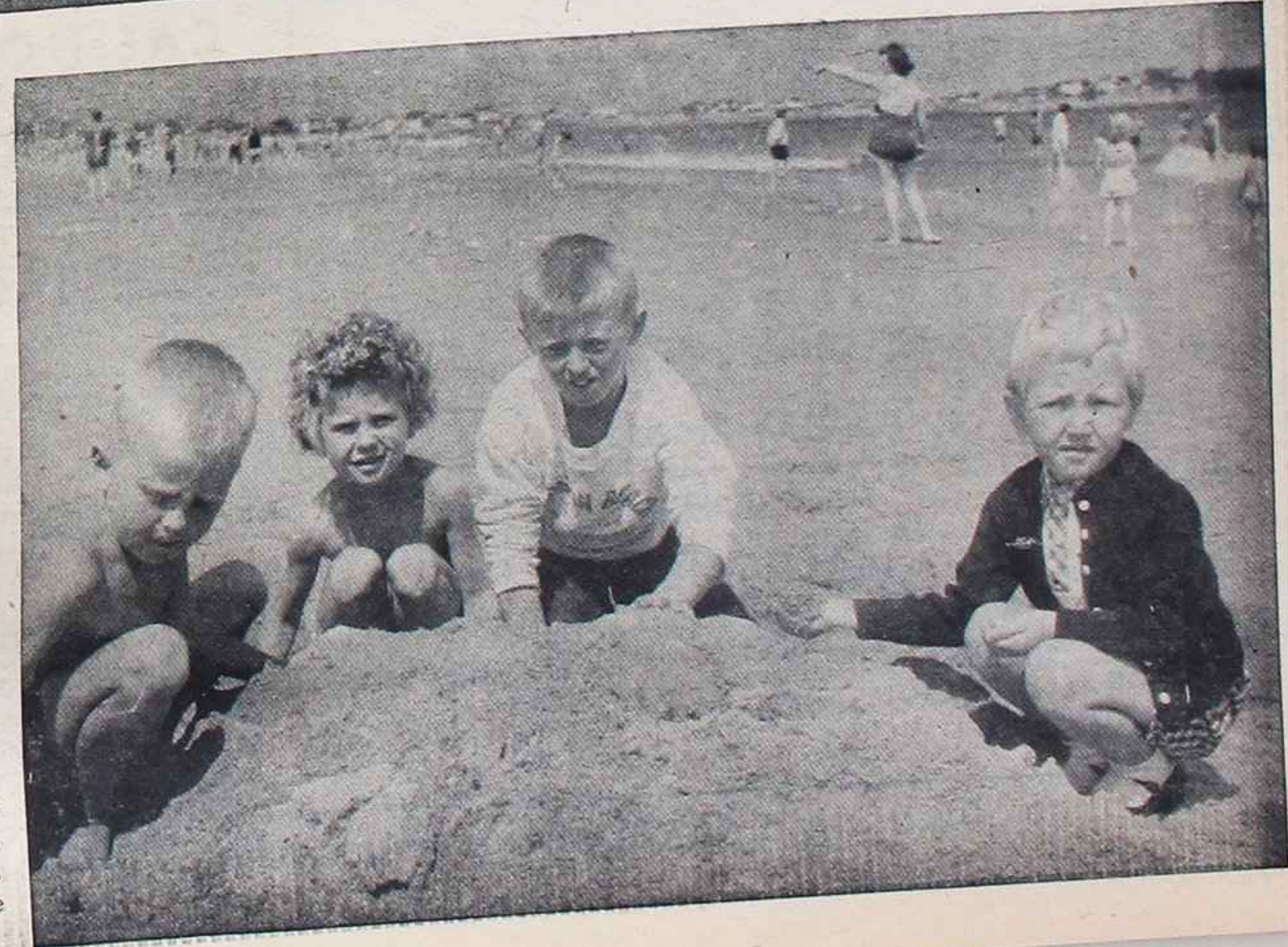
