### Seacoast Skywatchers Man GOC Post In Test Alert

"Operation Skywatch" — that Manchester was combined with that located at Albany, N. Y., is now Commander of the Filter Center in Albany.

No spectacular program of recognition was planned to mark this milestone, but quiet local observances were held throughout the national Ground Observer Corps organization, with speeches and award presentations, according to officials at the Colorado Springs Ground Observer Corps headquarters.

Many posts took this occasion as the time to present Certificates of Voluntary Service. This certificate is a new USAF Air Defense Command award, which is presented to civilian volunteers who have completed a minimum of three years' continuous active service in the G. O. C.

Operation Skywatch, calling for 24 hour surveillance of the skies, as part of the continental air defense effort, was approved in March of 1952 and by July of that year, there were 32 air defense filter centers and 6,000 observation posts in 27 states taking part in this program. Today, there are 51 filter centers with 11,000 civilian volunteers working in these centers and some 268,000 observers registered at 15, 647 observation posts.

The last of the observation posts and skywatchers on 24 hour operational duty were relieved of their responsibility last January first when the Ground Observer Corps was placed on "ready reserve" status. This easing of GOC duties was made possible by increased early-warning capabilities given the North American Air Defense Command by the completion of the radar networks which stretch across the Arctic Circle and across Canada.

But the filter centers are manned by military personnel 24 hours each day in order to be available in event of an emergency alert. The observation posts continue in a state of readiness and volunteer observers maintain their proficiency through practice in test alerts.

The latest test alert at the Seacoast Ground Observer Post was held, July 22, from one p. m. until nine p. m. with six teams of observers participating in the alert. Three test B52 planes from Thule Air Force Base were sent over the area where the test alert was held and all three planes were spotted on schedule by the observer on duty at the local post and the proper reports made to the Albany Filter Center.

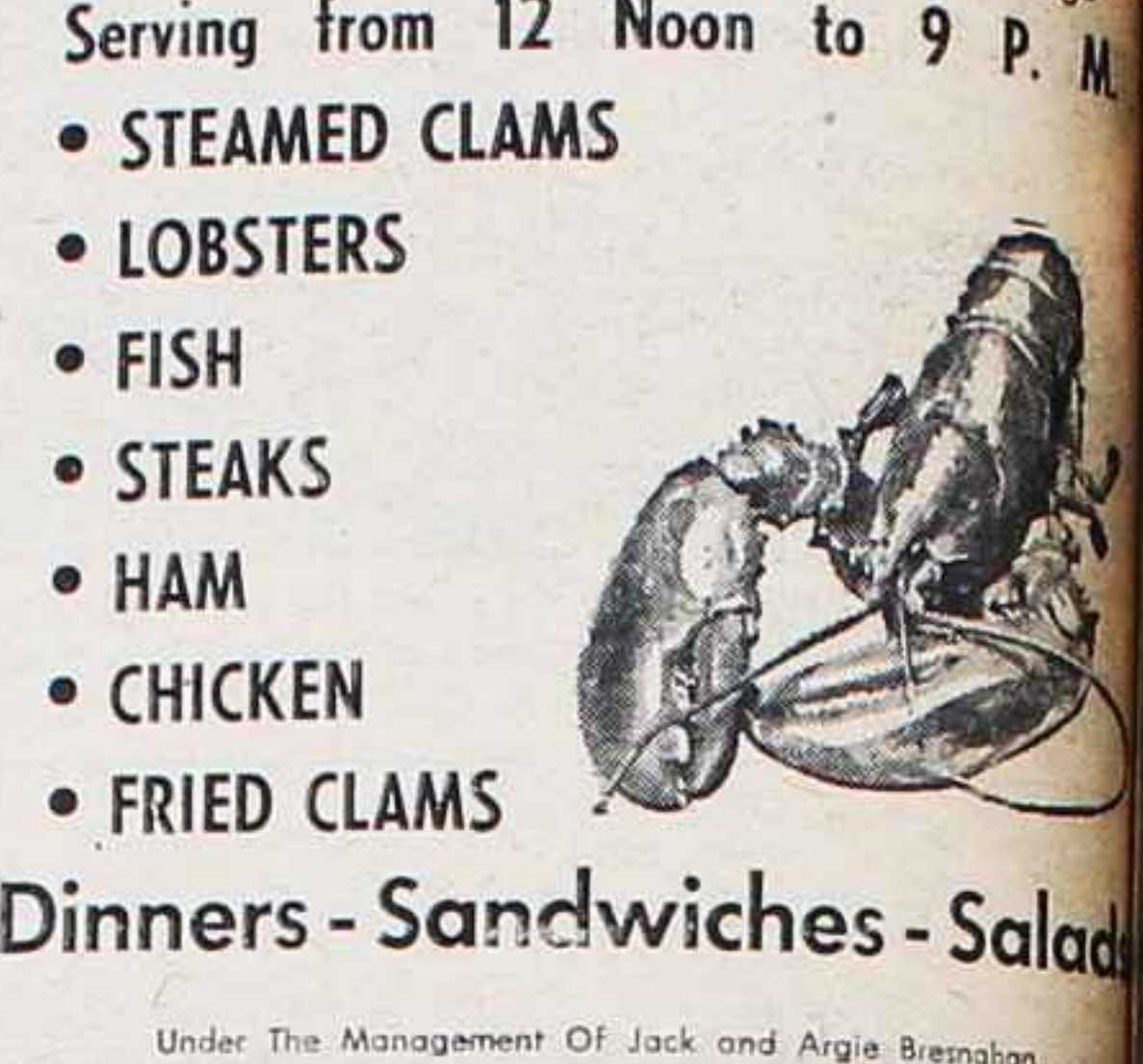

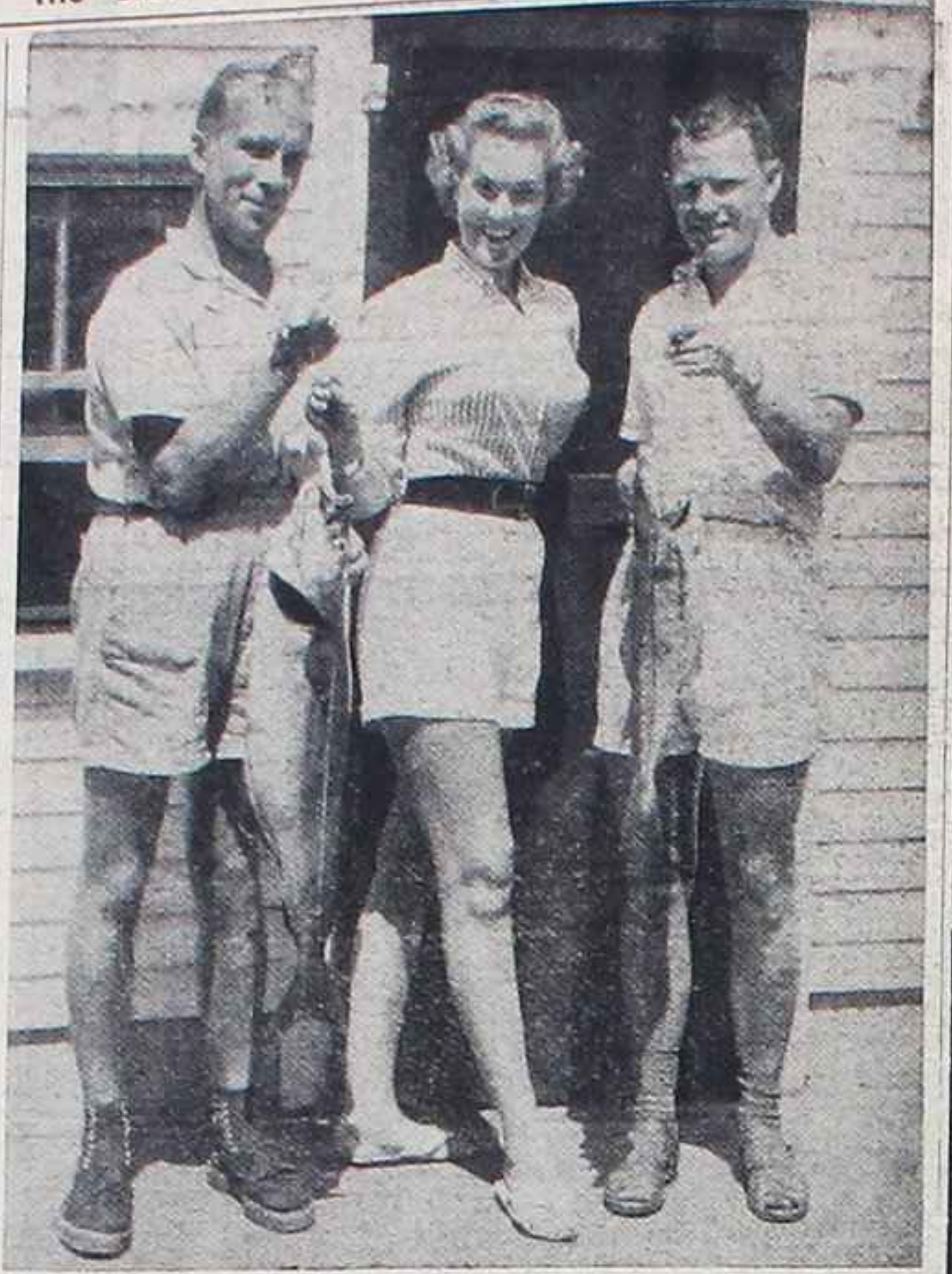

### Investigate False Fire Calls At Beach

Police and fire department officials are investigating a series of false fire calls received this week at the beach fire station. Deputy Chief Perley George reported Tuesday that three telephone calls had been received at fire headquarters, Monday, reporting a house on fire in different sections of the beach, but apparatus sent to the scene could find no evidence of trouble.

The phone calls are believed to be the work of a youngster, who hung up before fire officials could determine the point of origin.

Police and fire officials today urged parents to warn their children against making false calls which are just as serious as turning in a false alarm.

Deputy Chief George stated that every call answered costs the taxpayers at least \$50 even if it is a false alarm, in addition to creating a hazard to public safety in fire engines racing to the scene, especially along the crowded beach streets.

# New Marking System Proposed For Local Harbor

Plans for an adequate marking system for Hampton Harbor and adjacent waters progressed rapidly this week.

Monday afternoon a Coast Guard helicopter, under the command of Comdr. William Akers, and a Navigation officer at the Harbor district, and Comdr. W. Gray, Search and Rescue officer, met in the State Park at the end of Hampton Beach.

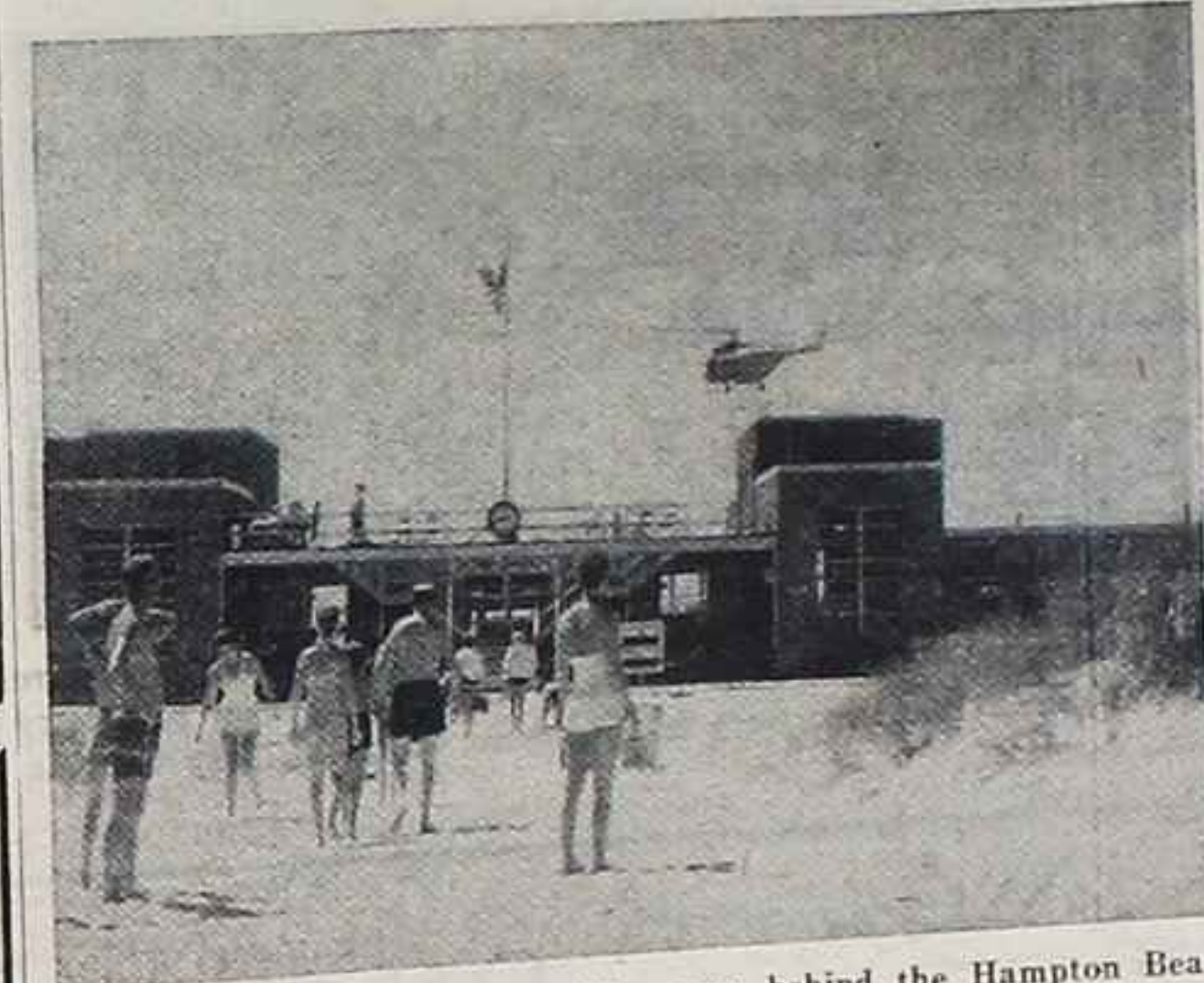
After discussing the rough sketch of proposed buoys and beacons for the harbor, the Coast Guard officer flew over the Harbor with Police Chief, John Malek, lobster fisherman, Harold Batchelder, and party boat skipper, John Gauron.

This is the first step in drawing detailed plans for a much needed marking system. At last Friday's meeting of the newly formed committee of town and state officials and boat operators, Capt. Kenneth S. Davis of the first Coast Guard District, Boston, said that the Coast Guard would cooperate in any way possible.

At that meeting State Conservation Officer Chesley Goodwin commented that "this is a dangerous situation, and there is no easy way out". Those representing commercial and party boat fishing said that the marking sys-

tem was not so much for them as for the increasing number of summer residents who operate small boats in the area. Al Gauron, party boat operator, said that the trouble was "getting back into the harbor", especially at dusk or after dark.

Sen. Norris Cotton (R-NH) informed Selectman Lawrence Hackett last Friday, that he would take immediate action to seek marking of a submerged ledge off Great Boat's Head, which a boat rammed, Aug. 3rd, drowning two, Alton P. Tobey, 55, and his wife, in an early morning collision. Tobey's body is still being sought.

Cotton said he would take the matter up with Coast Guard officials and also bring the matter before the Senate committee on Coast Guard affairs, of which he is a member.

A letter was sent to Sen. Cotton following Friday's meeting of the committee with about 30 members, representing town officials, Hampton River Boat club members, lobstermen, commercial fishers, lobstermen and party boat operators, as well as the Hampton Harbor Master and the State Department of Conservation. The following quotes from the letter outline the project:

"1. North Harbor approach — replace No. 2 buoy with a lighted chime buoy approximately 200 yards northeast of North Rock.

"The committee feels that the Hampton River, which is now used by over one hundred boats a day, should be marked with lighted buoys, and it is suggested they be installed at the following locations: (1) The Willows. (2) Submerged rocks at mussel bed. (3) Hobbs Point. (4) Railroad bridge.

"The committee feels that the entrance to Hampton Harbor is very poorly marked. The party boat operators stated that their business has been curtailed because of their reluctance to charter night trips because of the poor harbor marking. It is suggested that flood lights be installed at each end of the jetties with a red beacon on the north entrance, and green beacon on the south, replacing the present harbor spindles.

"It was noted by the committee and Captain K. S. Davis that the charts now in existence of Hampton Harbor do not accurately reflect the position of harbor spindles, and the few buoys which have been erected by the Coast Guard. It is the feeling of the committee and Captain K. S. Davis, that the charts should be brought up to date immediately.

Other suggestions at last Friday's meeting were that the Hampton Beach Coast Guard Station be moved nearer to Hampton Harbor, so that congested beach traffic would not block Coast Guardsmen from their boats in the harbor. And it was suggested that the Coast Guard loan a radio to Hampton police and thus improve communications between the two groups during rescue attempts.

Capt. Davis passed these suggestions and the harbor marking plans on to the Aids to Navigation Division of the Coast Guard in Boston.

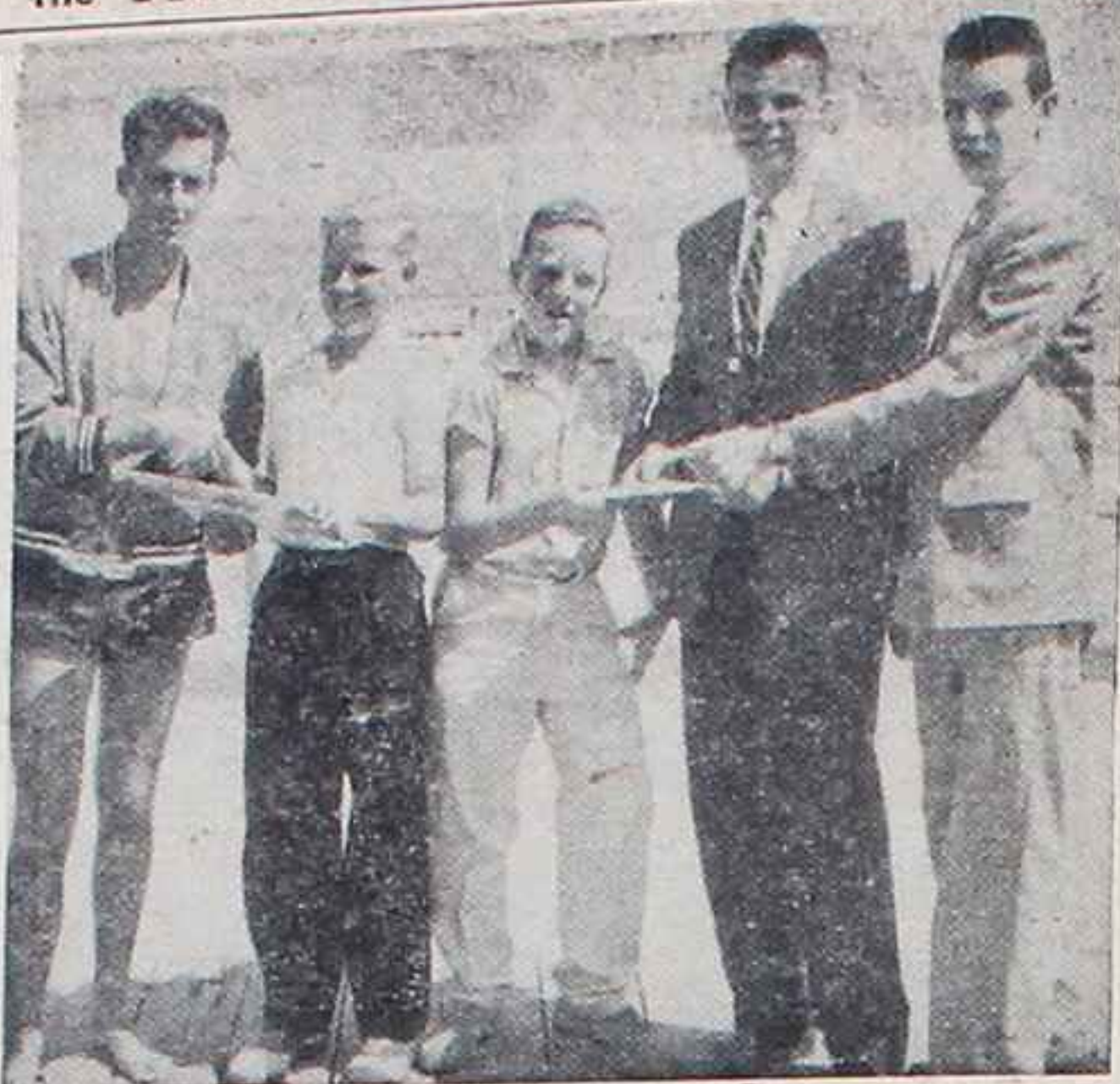

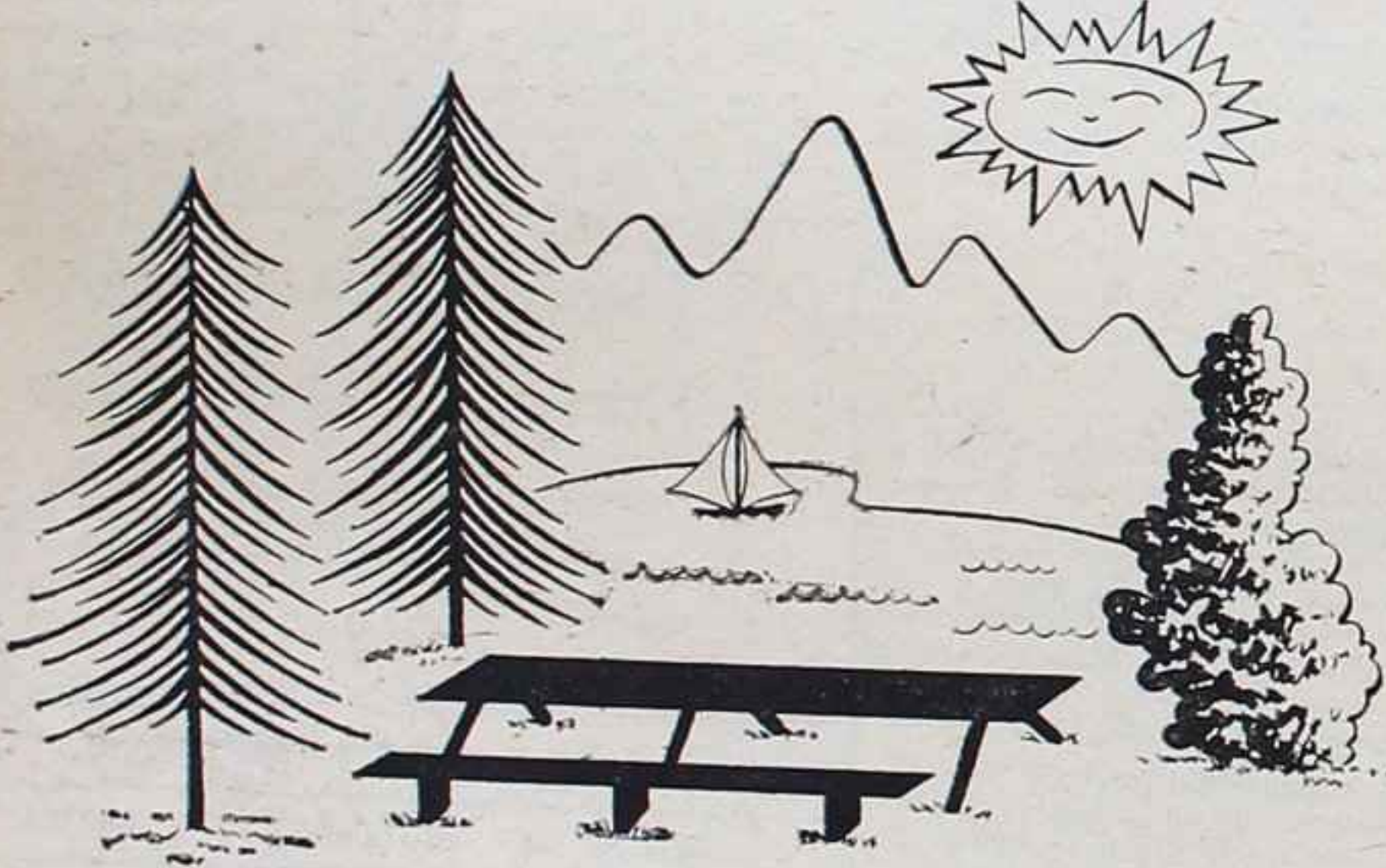

**Horned Pout Control Program Completed**

The New Hampshire Fish and Game department has recently completed its program of partial reclamation for control of horned pout. With one exception, these were reclaimed trout ponds which had become repopulated with horned pout a few years after reclamation.

Control of horned pout through partial reclamation means the spraying of relatively small sections of the shore line or coves during the spawning period for this species, thus catching the horned pout fry as they are hatching or are in small schools of 300 to 400 fish each. Also, at this time the surface waters are warm and the trout living in the deeper, cooler waters are not affected. Through this method thousands of horned pout fry can be removed with small amounts of rotenone and little labor.

Over a period of time this control work reduces the number of competitors for food utilized by trout in the pond and, also, makes it possible for the remaining horned pout to grow to more catchable size for the sportsmen's enjoyment. This season the department's reclamation crew has been quite successful in making timely applications of the rotenone, resulting in the elimination of many thousands of these competitive species.

Trout ponds partially reclaimed this summer were Swanzy Lake, Swanzy; Pleasant (Waukena) Lake, Danbury; Meader Pond, Canner Pond, Ossipee; Long Pond, Crocyden; Long Pond, Lemper; Tewksbury Pond, Grafton; and Russell Pond, Woodstock.

During this control work, a new rotenone product has been tried and thus far proved successful. The new product has been manufactured specifically for use in drinking water supplies and swimming areas. Since horned pout control work must be carried on during the spawning period, which overlaps the summer swimming season, the Fish and Game department feels the new product may prove more satisfactory in areas used for swimming, since the odor is less offensive.

**Fish And Game Lore**

Some chain pickerel mature when they are one year old while others are still immature in their third year. By the fourth year all have probably reached spawning age. It is believed breeding habits are as follows: Shortly after the ice goes out, individual females may be attended by several males. All swim about as a group, with an occasional fight occurring between the males. As breeding starts, each male moves in line with the female. At emission of the eggs and milt, the males slap the female with their tail and then all dart forward, which tends to distribute the eggs over a wide area. This may take place every three to five minutes.

A two pound female may contain 30,000 eggs. The sticky strings of eggs are laid in swampy or marshy areas where there is considerable submerged vegetation. The eggs take six to twelve days to hatch, depending on water temperatures. Although the newly hatched fry are able to swim almost immediately, they generally lie on their sides on the bottom of the pond during the day and rise toward the surface at night and attach themselves to debris. The yolk sac is absorbed in about six to eight days. By the end of June the young pickerel will average about 1 1/2 inches in size and about 4 inches by the end of September. Their rate of growth will depend considerably on the fertility of the water in which they are living.

That, in brief, is about the sum total of knowledge concerning the chain pickerel. This does not tell us whether ice fishing is detrimental or not, or whether a size limit is necessary. Some day we hope to know.

**Boat Owners Warned On Sewage Disposal**

CONCORD, N. H., Aug. 14 — "We want to help people avoid coming afool of the statutes and are doing everything we can to alert boat owners that a new law applying to sewage disposal of human waste takes effect on the last day of this year," the Water Pollution Commission reported today.

Next December 31 is effective date, William A. Healy, the Commission's Technical Secretary said, of a law passed by the 1957 Legislature which "prohibits the discharge of body wastes from floating vessels or structures into or near the waters of the state unless treated adequately."

The length of time between passage of the law and date it becomes effective is explained, Healy said, by the fact that sponsors of the legislation and the legislators themselves wanted to give the public ample time to comply with the new provisions.

Primarily, the commission engineer said, the new regulation affects craft equipped with marine toilets and provides that such toilets shall be equipped with a device which, through chemical action, is designed to disinfect human wastes.

"The vacation period is rapidly drawing to a close and within the next several weeks a lot of owners will begin putting their boats up for the season," Healy continued. "Our objective is to persuade them to either get their vessels to a boat yard operator before they put them up this fall, or install the proper device themselves, so that they can legally operate their boats as soon as the ice is out next spring, if that is their desire."

If a boat in use is found to be inadequately equipped next year, the owner has 48 hours in which to correct the matter, Healy said. If failing to comply the owner is then required to give up his registration certificate. Penalties for violation of the new law permit fines up to \$500 or imprisonment for one year, or both.

Copies of the new law are available at the commission offices, 61 South Spring street, Concord, Healy said.

New Hampshire is pioneering in this particular legislation, he added, and inquiries have started to come in from other states.

"We have heard much about 'Keeping New Hampshire Green' and I am sure all good citizens, New Hampshiremen and non-resi-

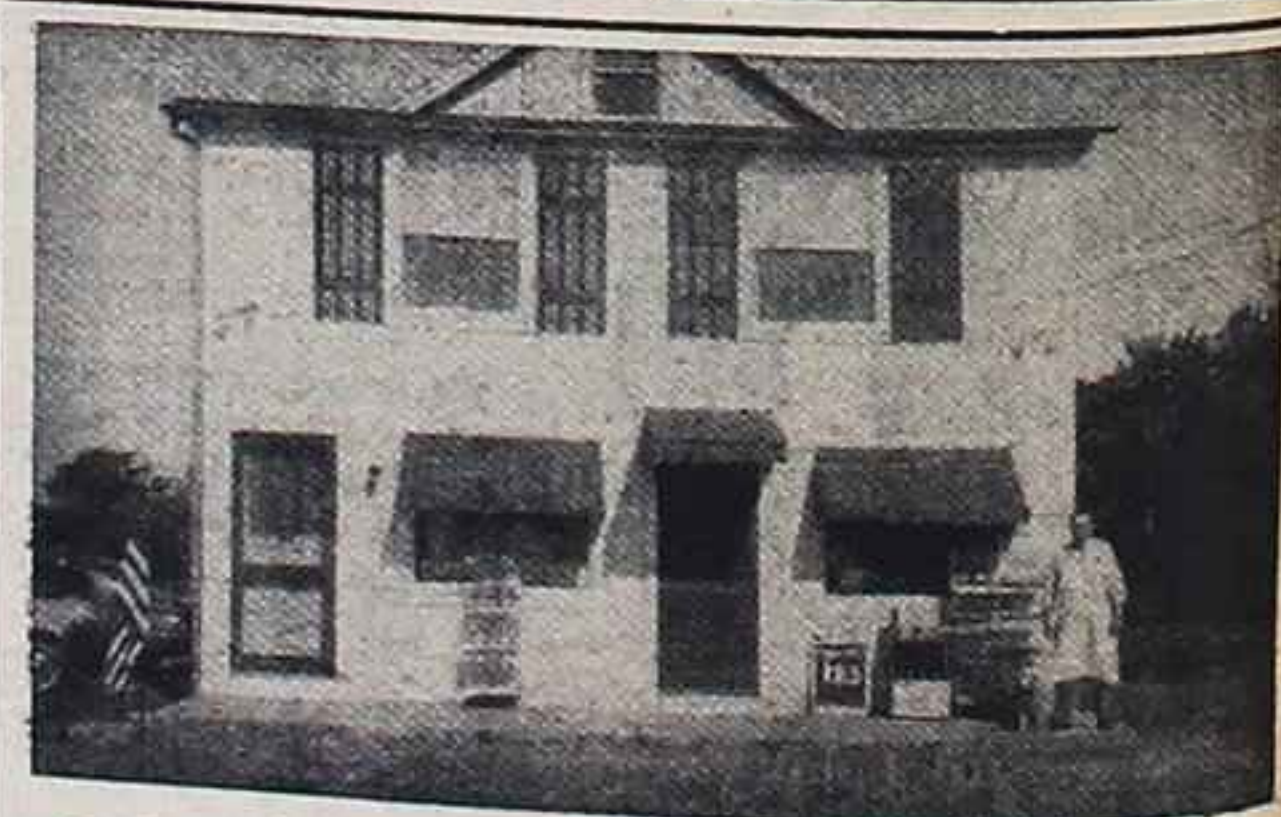
dents alike, agree with us that we ought to make the maximum effort to keep our waters clean, too," Healy concluded, "for we are singularly blessed with exceptionally fine water bodies and the demand for use of them is increasing in giant strides.

"In a word, Chapter 149-A, RSA, in effect, simply assures us all that the state can take appropriate action if a few of us choose to ignore the Golden Rule."

**Anyone For Eel Fishing?**

While the eel too closely resembles a snake to please many anglers, they nevertheless can provide some excellent sport for the fisherman who doesn't object to their slithering, snake-like appearance. In addition, many persons consider eel flesh a delicacy.

An eel just taken from the water is mighty hard to hold. A canvas glove or a handful of sand will help the angler grasp through his slippery, slimy protective covering.

The dressing of this fish is too difficult. Dip the eel in boiling water to loosen the skin, then nail it's head to a board or post. Cut the skin around the back of the head and loosen the top edge of the skin all around the body. Grasp the top edge of skin with pliers and peel from the eel's body. Now cut the body open and remove the entrails. Wash the fish inside and out with salty water and cut into two-inch sections. There are about two servings to the pound.

If you are in the market for something different — both in the way of fishing and eating — don't try the American eel!

Eels are found in the Mississippi Valley and to the Atlantic Coast, but not along the Pacific Coast. Many of New Hampshire's streams and ponds include eels in their list of inhabitants. In fact, a four-foot eel was recently caught from the Winnepesaukee River near the Winnisquam Lake outlet by two teen-age anglers — Wayne Bell and John Daigneault of Laconia.

### Hampton Girl Spends Summer At Maine Research Laboratory



Margarette White, a 17-year-old Hampton girl is spending the summer in research at the Jackson Memorial Laboratory in Bar Harbor, Maine.

Margarette (Penny) White, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Winslow White of 314 Lafayette road, was awarded a scholarship to the research institution's 10-week summer training program. Twenty-two college students and 29 pre-college students from 20 states, selected from over 400 applicants, are participating in this unique opportunity to test their interests and ability in the field of science and medical research by working with eminent scientists in fully equipped laboratories.

The students work in small groups or individually, according to the needs of the research in which they are involved. They also attend daily lectures presented by staff scientists and fellow students. They supplement their laboratory and lecture work by participating in seminars, demonstrations, and discussions.

Penny is studying response behavior in young mice. She is also making tissue culture studies of the effect and growth of tumor cells taken from different strains of mice. Her work is being done under the sponsorship and guidance of Dr. John A. King, a staff scientist at the laboratory. Penny first heard of the training program through her guidance director at Hampton Academy. She will be a freshman at the University of New Hampshire this fall and plans on a career in biology and research.

But not all the students' time is spent in research. On weekends they enjoy such activities as swimming, boating, hiking on the mountain trails of Acadia National Park, and picnicking. Penny also enjoys the evening get-togethers, and playing on the pre-college softball team.

Penny and the other pre-college students, their staff representative and his wife, and four counselors live in a family atmosphere at "Highseas," a fifty-room brick estate nestled below the towering face of Mt. Champlain, overlooking Frenchman's Bay and the ocean. The college students stay in a colony of five modern one-story buildings bordering the south lawn of the Main Laboratory. The buildings include three lodges which are used for dormitories, a summer laboratory, and a combination dining and recreation hall, the social center of the colony where the students spend many evenings around the huge fireplace.

The Jackson Laboratory, largest center of mammalian genetics in the world, is devoted to the study of constitutional diseases such as cancer, muscular dystrophy, and anemia. Because the physiology of mice is so similar to that of the human being, they are of vital necessity as tools for research. The laboratory has developed over 50 individual strains of laboratory mice for use in research not only at the Bar Harbor laboratory but in laboratories all-over the world to which 20,000 mice are shipped every week.

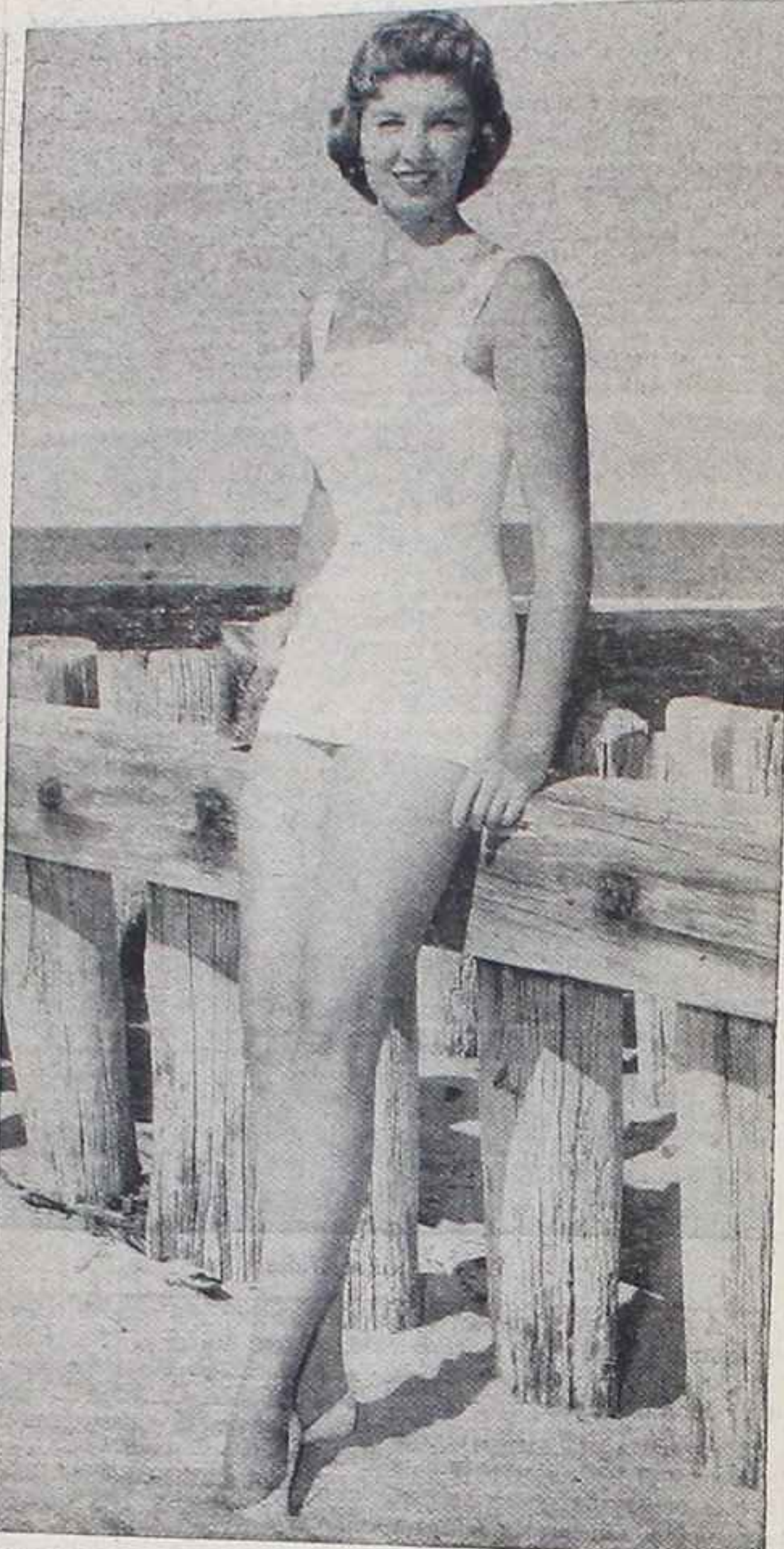
And the following week the summer season will be climaxed by the Coronation Ball, August 27th in the ballroom. Tickets are on sale at the Chamber of Commerce.

## Cotton Backs Bill To Aid Lobster Industry

U. S. Senator Norris Cotton (R-N. H.) this week sought to build widespread support in both houses of Congress for two bills of special interest to the New England lobster industry.

The bills were introduced by Senator Frederick G. Payne, of Maine, and have been approved by the Senate Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce of which Senator Cotton is a member.

One of the bills, if enacted, would impose a minimum size or all lobsters which may be shipped in interstate commerce or imported into the United States. Minimum size limits are now imposed by every major lobster-producing state and would be extended to imported lobsters by the bill.

Approval of the bill will free New Hampshire and New England lobstermen from unfair foreign competition by requiring everyone to meet reasonable size limits. Senator Cotton stated, adding that "it will also be a boon to the conservation of lobster supplies."

The other bill would authorize the Secretary of the Interior to set up a fishery extension service similar to the cooperative extension work in agriculture now carried out by the state and federal governments.

## Rare Book Collection On Display At Library

An exhibit of rare books from the collection of Charles E. Law, 36 Exeter road, are on display at the Lane Memorial library.

Included is a volume entitled "100 Sermons on the Hundred and Nineteenth Psalm Preached by the Rev. Thomas Manton, D. D." Also, "The Ladies Companion," published in 1824 and "printed at the Spy Office." The title page declares the contents were "carefully selected and revised by a Lady."

Of particular interest to this state's residents is a book dated 1856 and called "Laconia, or Legends of the White Mountains and Merry Meeting Bay." The author is listed as "An Old Mountaineer." "The Farmer's Almanack" is in the collection, dated 1795.

Mr. Law began the collection about 15 years ago as a hobby. Most of the books have been found in second hand stores and auctions in Maine and New Hampshire. Law has about 2,000 books in all.

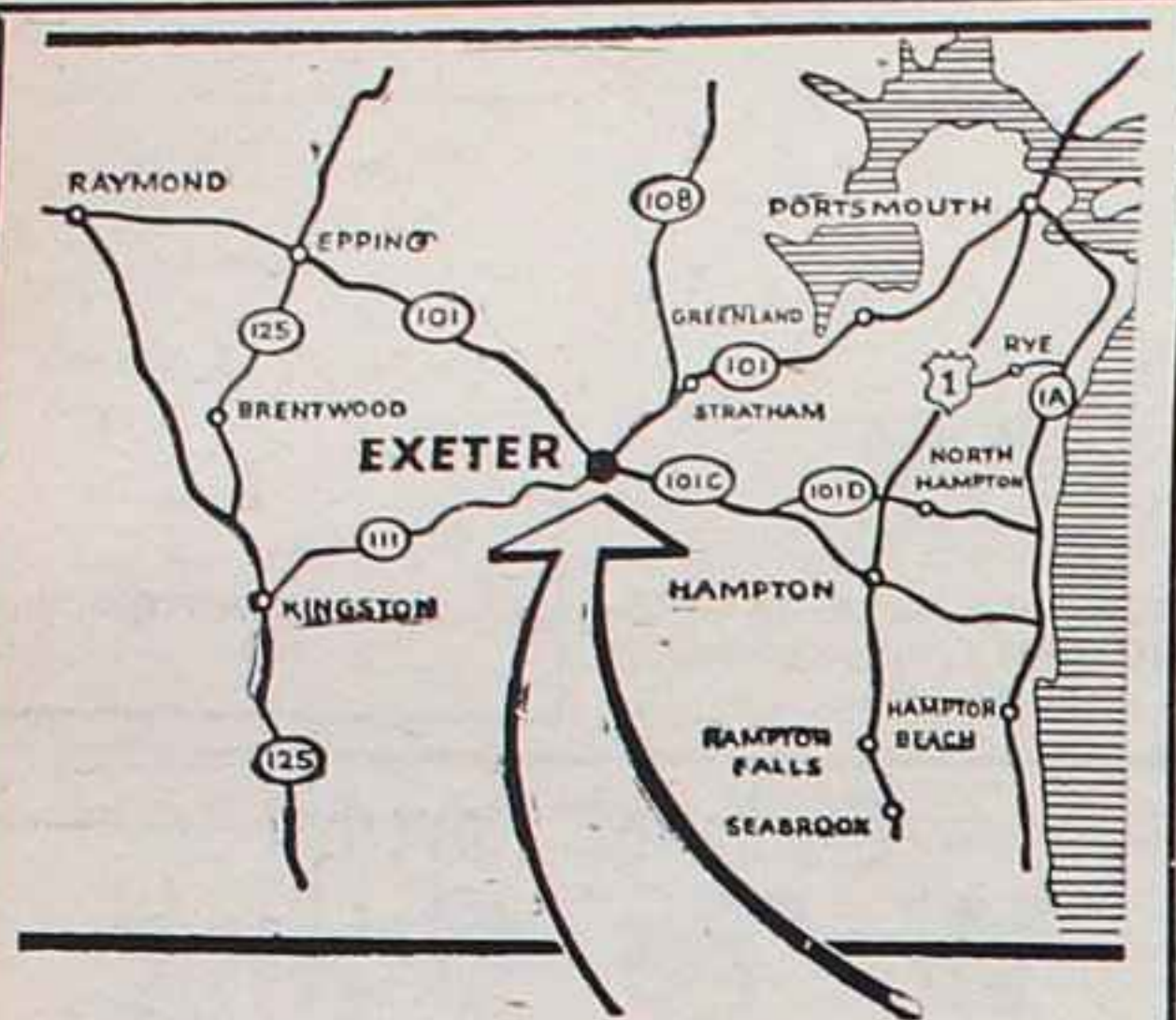

# '58 Tax Rate Up \$8.70; Spending Set At \$889,032

A whopping \$8.70 increase — bringing Hampton's tax rate for 1958 to a record high of \$51.20 per thousand — was approved yesterday by the State Tax Commission.

The increase was far less than the predicted figure of \$12 - \$14, due to an increase in property val-

\$4.40 for the Hampton Beach Precinct.

The 1958 rate is based upon a net valuation figure of \$17,363,886 and net appropriation figures for all municipal department spending which total \$889,032.96.

Broken down the tax rate shows the following proportions:

Beach property taxpayers will be paying less this year with the Precinct tax rate dropping to \$4.40 as compared with \$5.50 last year.

The \$1.10 decrease was due primarily to increased property valuations in the beach area, with the precinct budget remaining about the same as last year.

A breakdown of the \$889,032.96 total net spending of all budgets shows:

Town Manager John Batchelder stated today it was interesting to note that despite a 110 percent increase in Hampton's population during the past decade — the April '58 census showing 5,184 year round residents — the town's share of the tax dollar for municipal expenditures, not including schools, shows a steady decrease.

Broken down the town's percentage of the tax dollar over the past four years shows:

1956	55 percent
1957	51 percent
1958	42 percent

According to Mr. Batchelder these figures prove a remarkable efficiency in municipal operations, which have had to be increased

tremendously to keep up with the population growth and the resulting demands for additional services and new streets to be maintained.

Work on the preparation of bills is underway and Tax Collector George H. Sumner expects to have them in the mail soon.

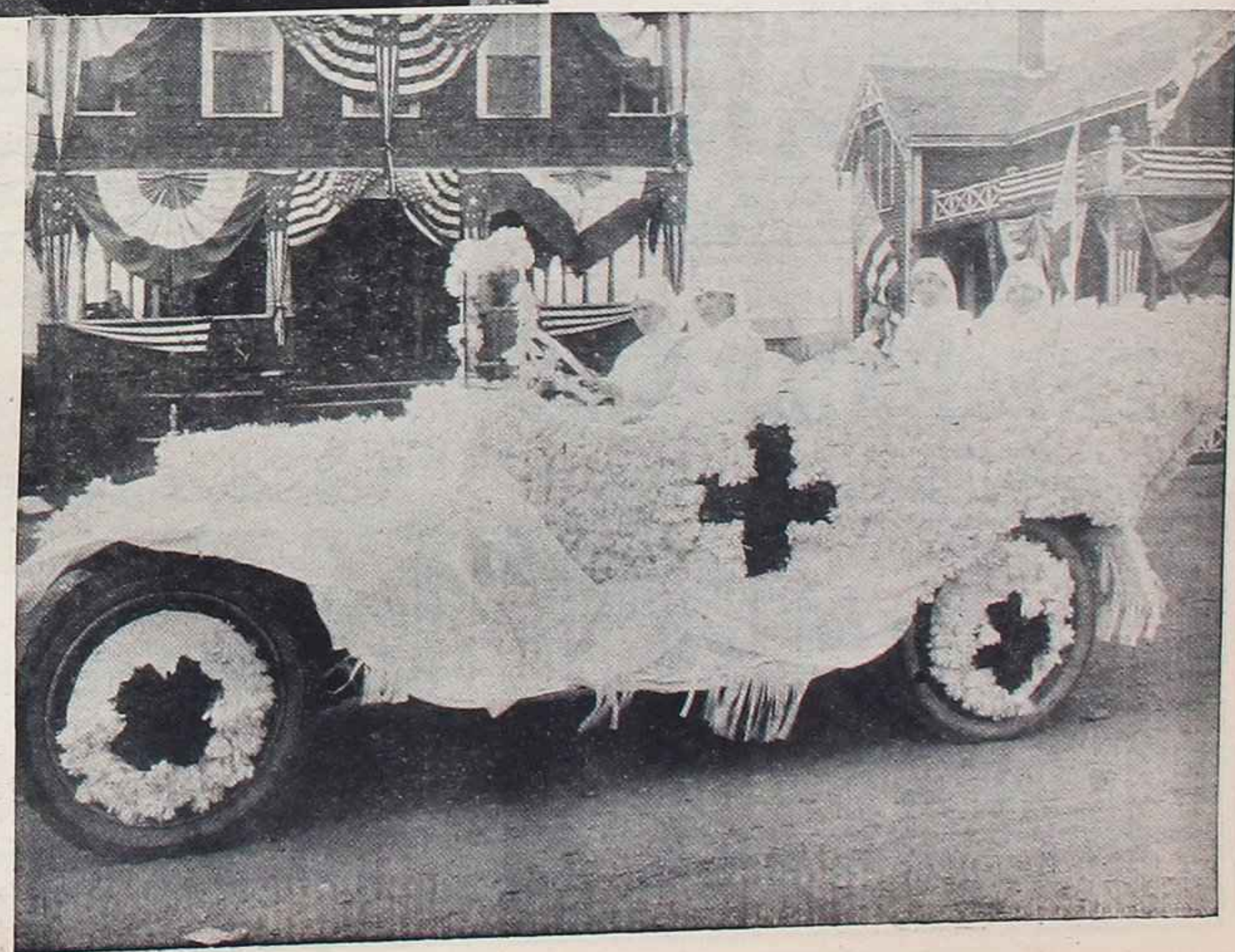
