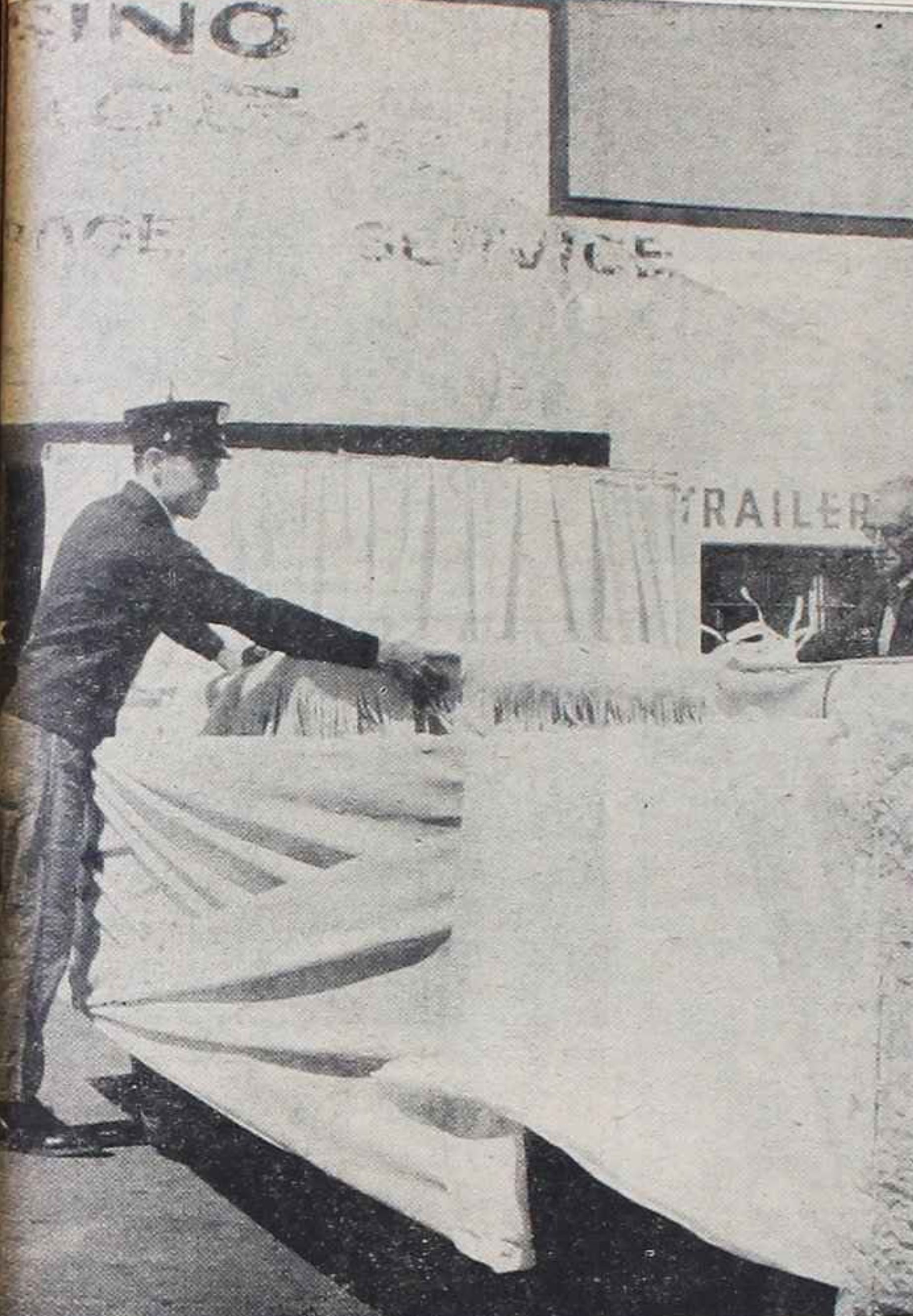

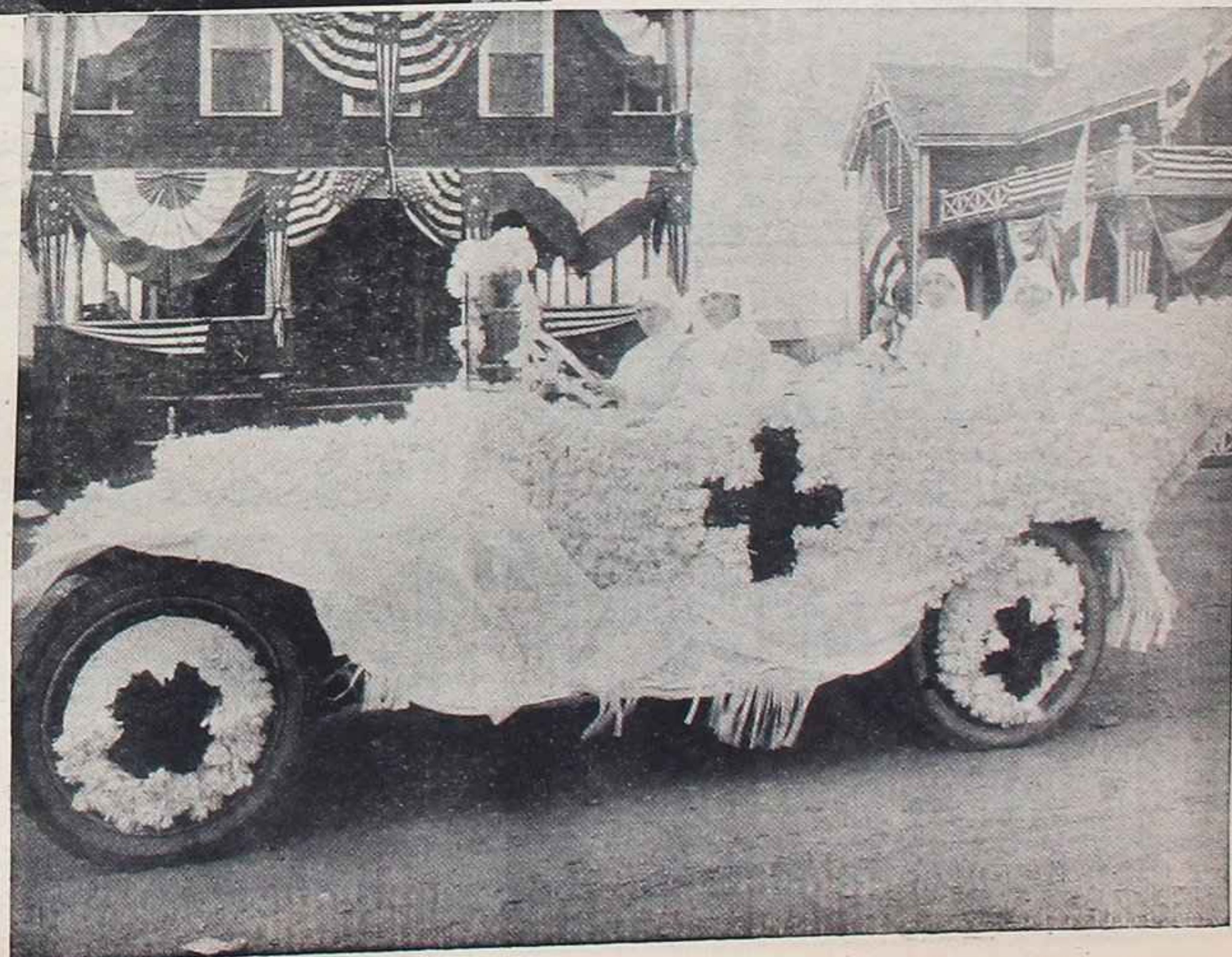

Navigation Aids Changes For Harbor Recommended By CG

Better marking of the north channel of Hampton Harbor with lights and buoys is justified, according to Lt. Commr. W. C. Akers, USCG, Chief, Aids to Navigation section.

Commander Akers surveyed the harbor area last week along with town officials and local fishermen.

Commander Akers is recommending several changes in the harbor marking system to the commander of the First Coast Guard district, Boston, and Capt. K. S. Davis forwarded a copy to town manager, John P. Batchelder.

Considering the justifiable needs for aids to navigation in this area, Commr. Akers report will be discussed Thursday afternoon, Aug. 21, at the Hampton town offices, 3 p. m., by the special committee of local boating interests.

The Coast Guard survey report follows:

1. On 11 August, 1958, a survey of the aids to navigation in Hampton Harbor and Hampton Harbor approaches was conducted. This survey was accomplished in company with J. P. Batchelder, town manager, J. J. Malek, chief of police and representatives of the New Hampshire Marine Fisheries Association and Party Boat Operators Association.

2. The initial request for aids to navigation changes in the Hampton Harbor area, entailed the establishment of eight lighted buoys, three daybeacons, flood lighting two existing daybeacons and supplementing the existing

lighting on the Neil Underwood Memorial bridge.

3. In view of the limited number and type of vessels using this harbor, the expenditure of public funds for a project of this magnitude is not considered justified in terms of public benefit. Additionally, it is reported that three of the four lighted buoys requested to mark the northern approaches to Hampton Harbor, could not be maintained on station due to the depth of water and exposed locations. Of the three desired daybeacons, two are on submerged rocks where the cost of construc-

tion would be prohibitive and the use of "Contour Foundation" daybeacons would not be practicable, as the action of the seas would cause them to tumble and add additional hazards to the boating public.

4. The four lighted buoys proposed to mark the channel in Hampton River should be considered as private aids to navigation to be maintained by the Town of Hampton.

5. Although a well buoyed channel exists at the southerly approach to this harbor, a buoyed northerly approach channel is desired as fishermen and party boats transit this area extensively during the day and night.

6. In view of the above, the marking of this north channel is considered justified and the following changes in aids to navigation are recommended:

a. Establish Hampton Harbor North Entrance Channel Buoy 3, a 2nd-class Tall can with a white reflector, in a position 2,140 yards 173° True from the Standpipe at Great Boars Head, approximately 200 yards north of North Ledge.

b. Establish Hampton Harbor North Entrance Channel Buoy 3, a 3rd class special can with a white reflector, in a position 2,390 yards 190° True from the Standpipe at Great Boars Head, to mark the northwest side of North Bar Ledge.

c. Establish Yellow Ledge Buoy, a third class nun painted red and black horizontal bands with a red reflector on the west side of Yellow Ledge approximately 3,250 yards 192° 45' True from the Standpipe at Great Boars Head.

d. Establish Hampton Harbor Leading Light on the Neil Underwood Memorial Bridge. The light to be an occulting white light every 4 seconds (2.0 light - 2.0 eclipse) with a high intensity sector on a bearing of 288° 36' True toward the light. The light to

show 2110 EPI candlepower on the main beam and 135 EPI candlepower around the remainder of the horizon by use of a 12 Volt, 1.35 Ampere, C-8 filament lamp in a 200 mm directional drum lens.

7. The only available chart of the area is of such a small scale, many of the dangers are not shown. An expanded section of C. & G. S. Chart 1206 is enclosed to show the existing buoyage and approximate positions of the uncharted rocks. The proposed changes in aids to navigation are also shown in solid color on the chart section.

8. Although, the proposed changes are not exactly what the committee desired, it is believed these establishments will be sufficient to enable the prudent navigator to use the North Entrance Channel both day and night and the necessity arises the well marked South Entrance Channel remains available. The high intensity sector leading light on the bridge will lead the boats clear of all dangers from Yellow Ledge Buoy, through the Harbor as far as the bridge proper.

Annual Parade Day Will Be Held Saturday

Marsh Reclamation Group Discusses Organization Plan

The next meeting of the Marsh Reclamation committee, on August 28th, it was decided last week along with representatives of Anderson Nichols engineering firm of Concord to further explore organizational methods.



Parade Day is this Saturday, August 23rd. The parade of floats and bands will begin at 2 p. m. and will proceed down the boulevard. Preceding the parade on Saturday morning will be an exhibition by the antique car clubs in this area.

Definite scope for the project depends on the type of organization that is to carry it out. Among the many possibilities are: (1) Municipal organization; (2) Reclamation authority; (3) cooperative non-profit organization; (4) private corporation.

Representatives of Anderson Nichols present at the meeting were Mr. Harold Fosher, Mr. James Brodie and Mr. Leonard Hubbard. Mr. Fosher discussed the advantages of a cooperative organization in which those owning marsh land would turn it over to a cooperative, and would have proportional representation in the eventually developed land. Committee chairman, Alfred Janvrin recommended that members study the many types of possible organization before the next regular meeting, September 8th.

A program of photogrammetric mapping is being worked out by the Anderson Nichols firm. In the process of such mapping, pictures for use in field studies of the marsh would be made available, as well as a basic reference map.

Mr. Fosher said that within the next few months, it would be possible to have a definite idea of the scope of the project. This would especially concern Area 1 in the present plans, the area from Island Path south to the harbor. Mapping will be of great assistance to ascertaining marsh ownership. Within the next few weeks the committee, assisted by town officials, will carry out a program of listing existing deeds to the marsh land.

Other events announced by the Chamber of Commerce include, of course, the Miss New England contest, to pick the most beautiful girl in all New England, held tonight in the Casino Ballroom.

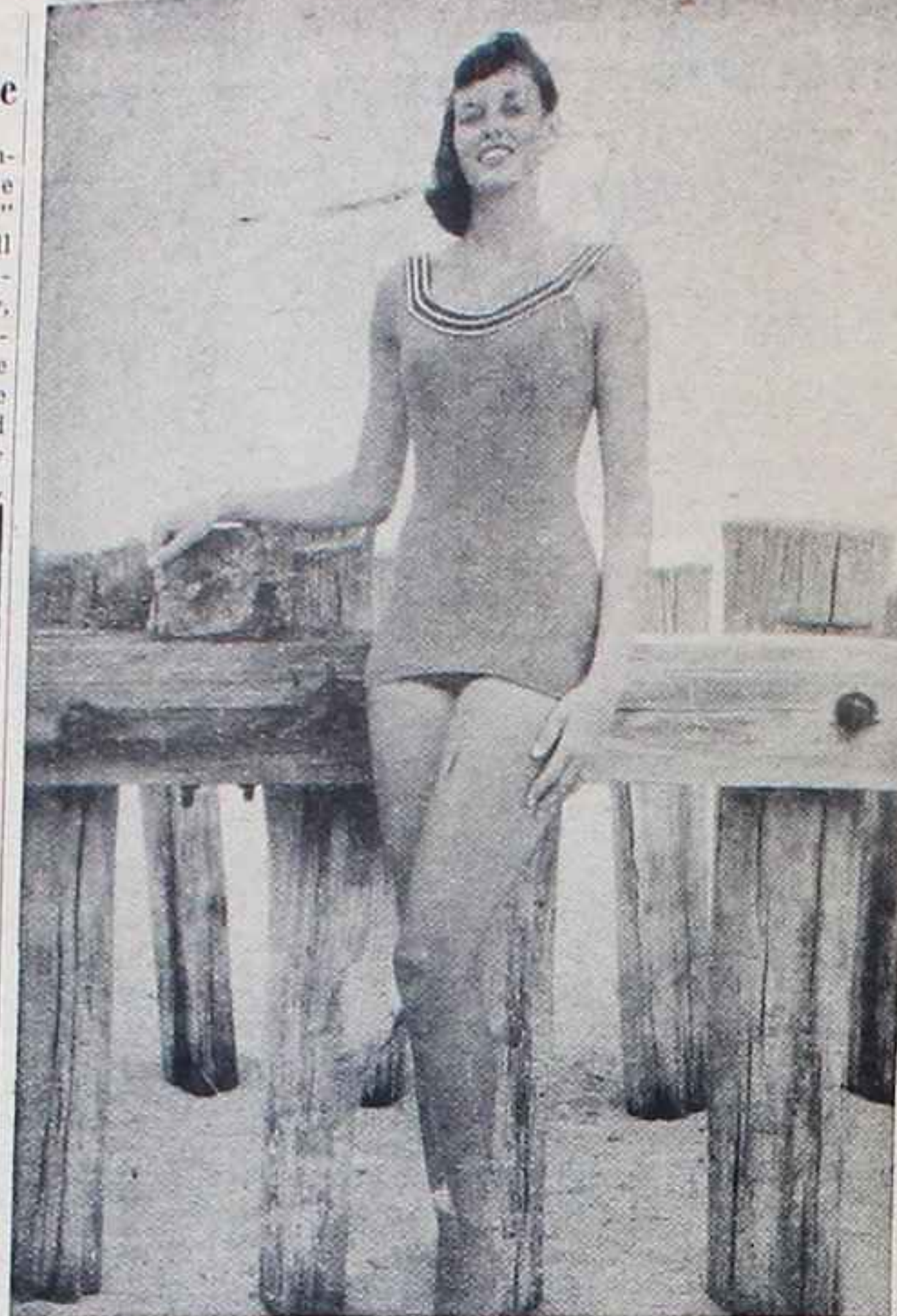

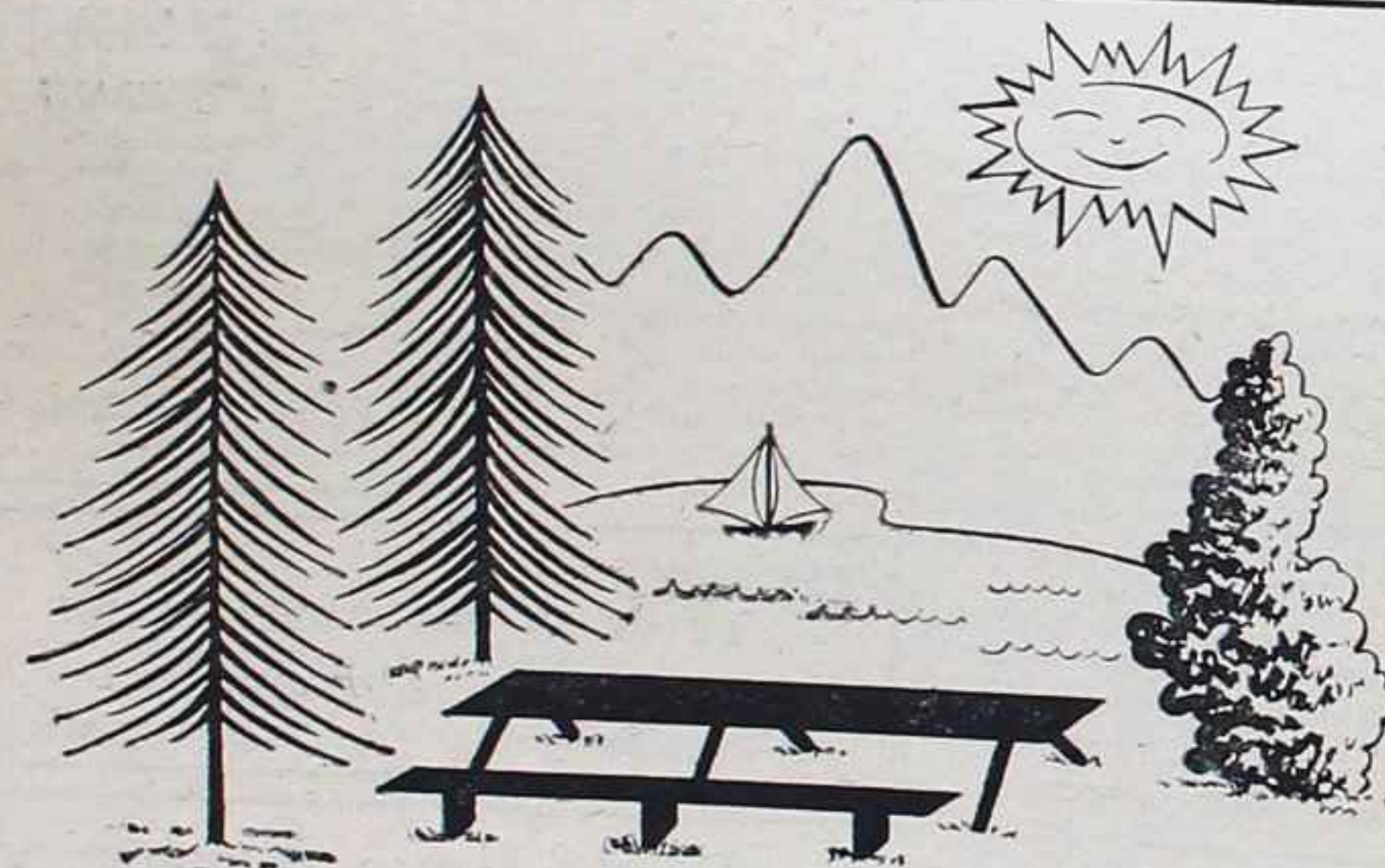

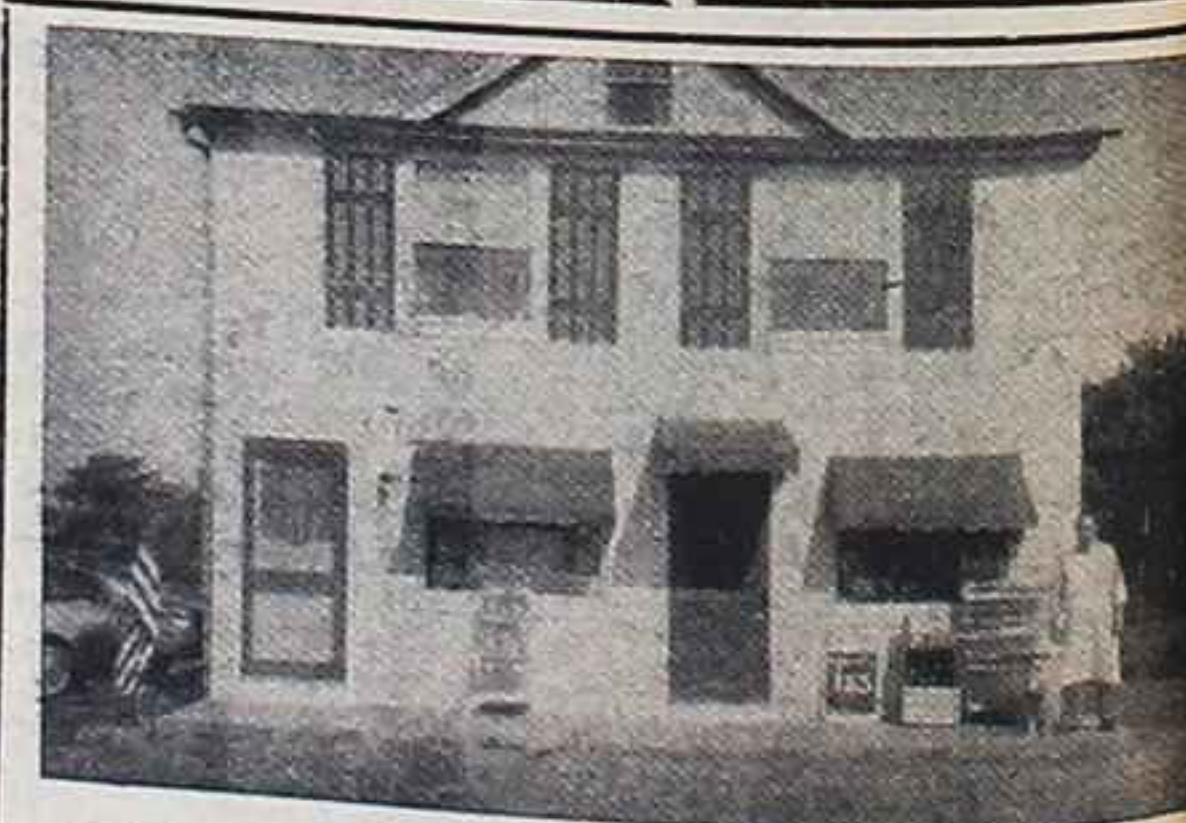

Powell Urges Road Program

EXETER, Aug. 14 - Wesley Powell says that there is immediate need for a statewide highway building program to help industry, agriculture and the resort trade.

At a rally of his campaign workers at Green Gate here last night, attended by nearly 500 persons, Powell urged a multimillion dollar program of freeway highway construction for the whole state, not "just pieces of it."

Powell, a candidate for the Republican gubernatorial nomination, departed from usual party policy in making his recommendation. "Present plans to slowly improve the highway situation over a 15 years period," he said, "are blocking the development of the state in a vitally important economic time."

Following is an excerpt from Powell's talk:

"This state must be really opened up in the years immediately ahead to provide for sharp industrial expansion and to encourage tourist travel here in far greater numbers.

"Whole areas of our state are suffering financially today because poor highways discourage shipping and frustrate the traveling public. "The state can stand a \$100 million dollar bond issue to supplement state and federal funds now available to construct the arterial highways which would expand industry, agriculture and the resort trade.

"I am not talking about toll roads. I am talking about free highways expansion and about getting it accomplished before time passes us by. Furthermore, I am talking about all of New Hampshire, not just pieces of it. Every section of this wonderful state has its advantages. Certainly all of our areas need and deserve a larger share of job opportunities and more of the tourist dollars.

"The plan I have in mind has been declared to be economically feasible insofar as amortization is concerned. Certainly no citizen will argue that a bold highway and road improvement program would not be a good investment in the future of our state. The details of my plan are being worked out by experts in the field who have no personal interest of any description, and the plan would be ready for legislative consideration in January."

At a rally held Monday night in Kingston, Powell pledged an all-out fight to outlaw the Massachusetts and Vermont non-resident income taxes.

"I am aware another candidate looks upon this as a hopeless fight but to you and to me the handicaps are but a challenge which the stronghearted can overcome," Powell said.

"It is no longer a question of what you and I have tried to do in the past to get rid of this vicious tax. It is a question of a new leadership at Concord with the will to carry on the fight."

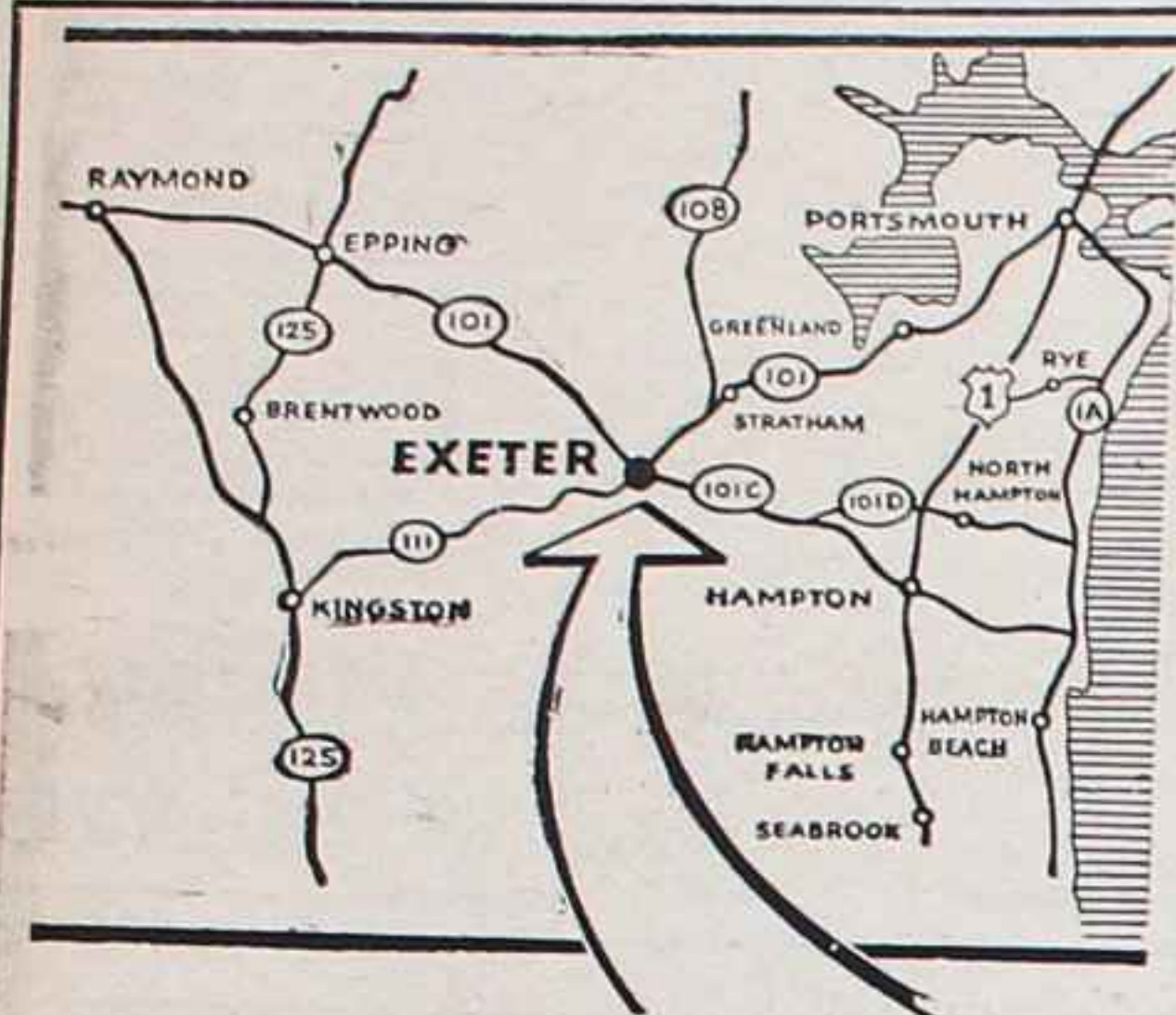

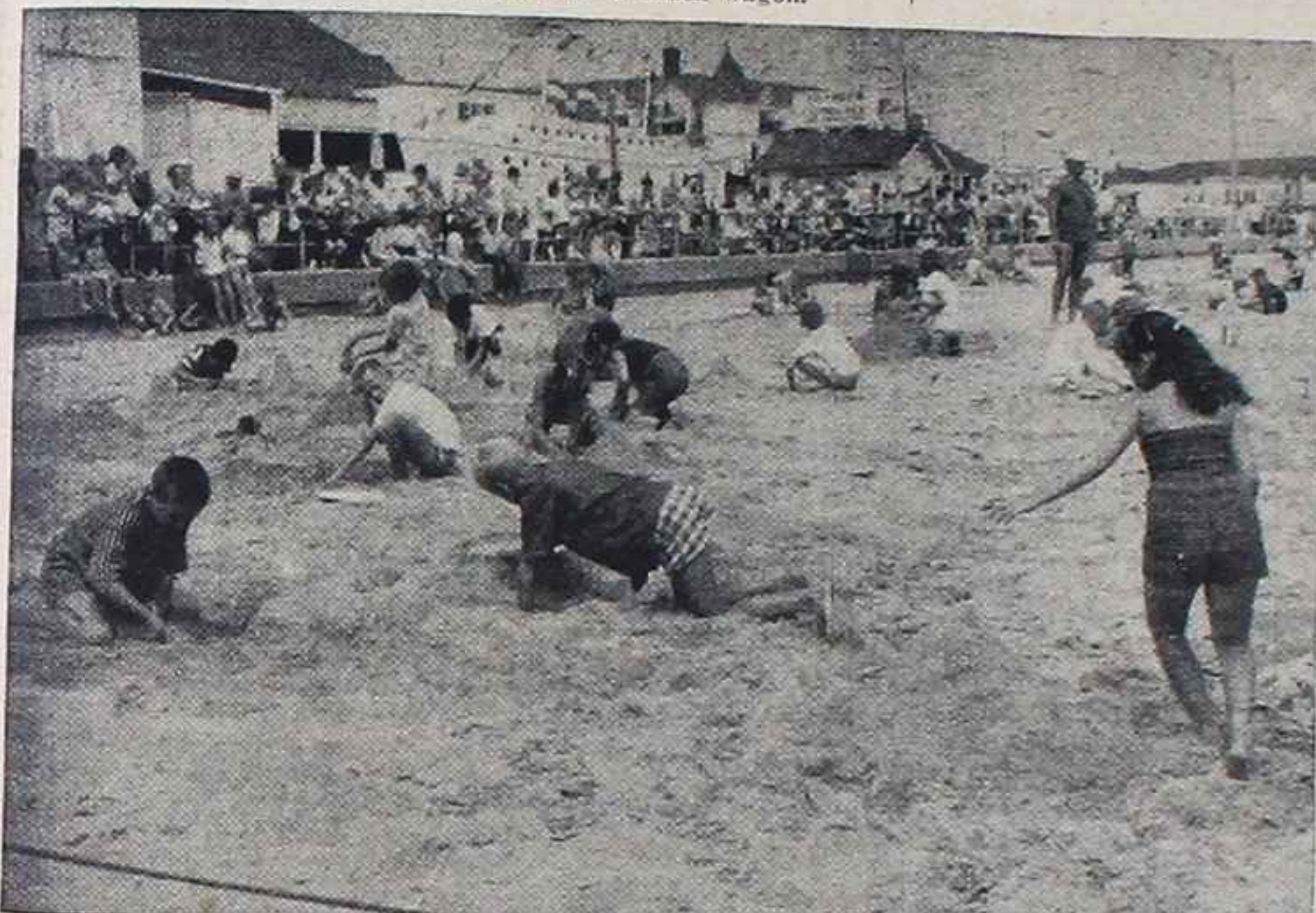

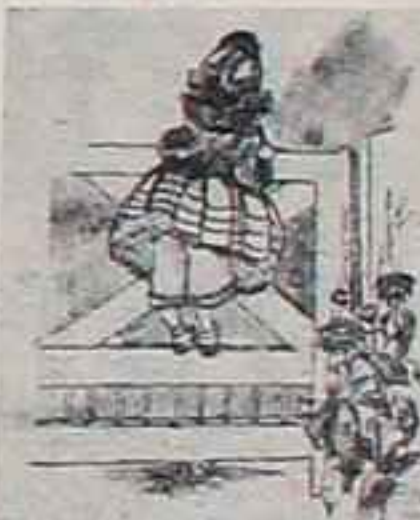


THE FINISHING TOUCHES are applied to a sand castle last Thursday by Allan Rich of Milan, N. H. who placed fourth in the contest.

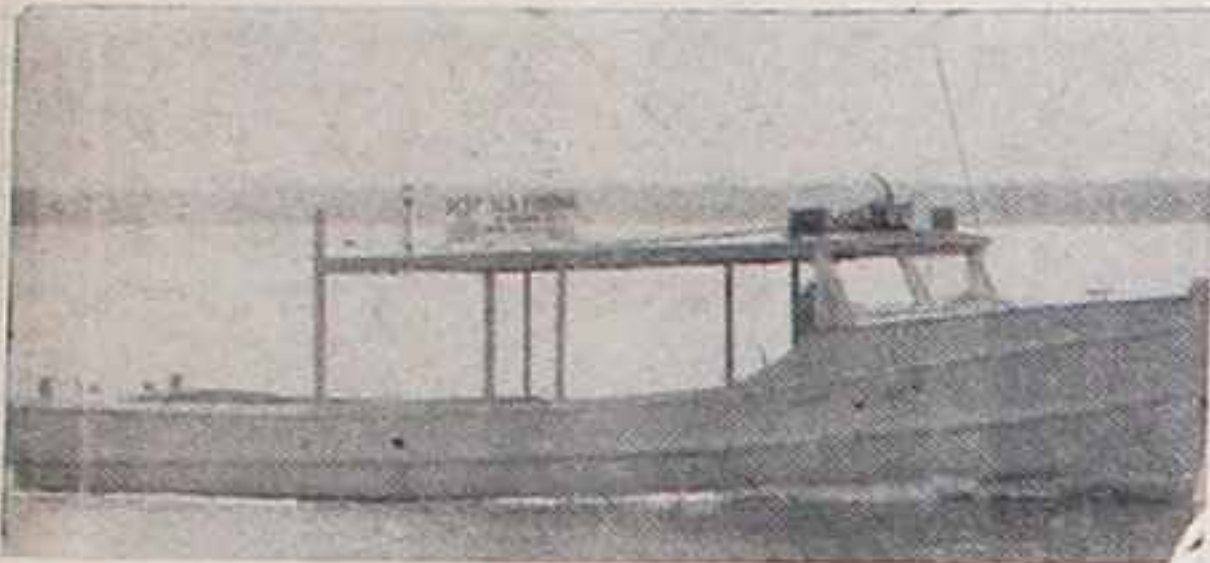

Town May Protest Sale Of Railroad Station

Town Manager John P. Batchelder stated today that he would recommend to the board of selectmen that a protest be filed on the pending sale of the Hampton railroad station to private interests.

The town manager based his objection on the fact that conditions of the sale provided for retaining only enough parking space for five automobiles in the already overcrowded Depot square area.

"The parking problem in this section of town is already bad enough", declared Batchelder, "without the loss of almost all of the parking facilities now owned by the railroad."

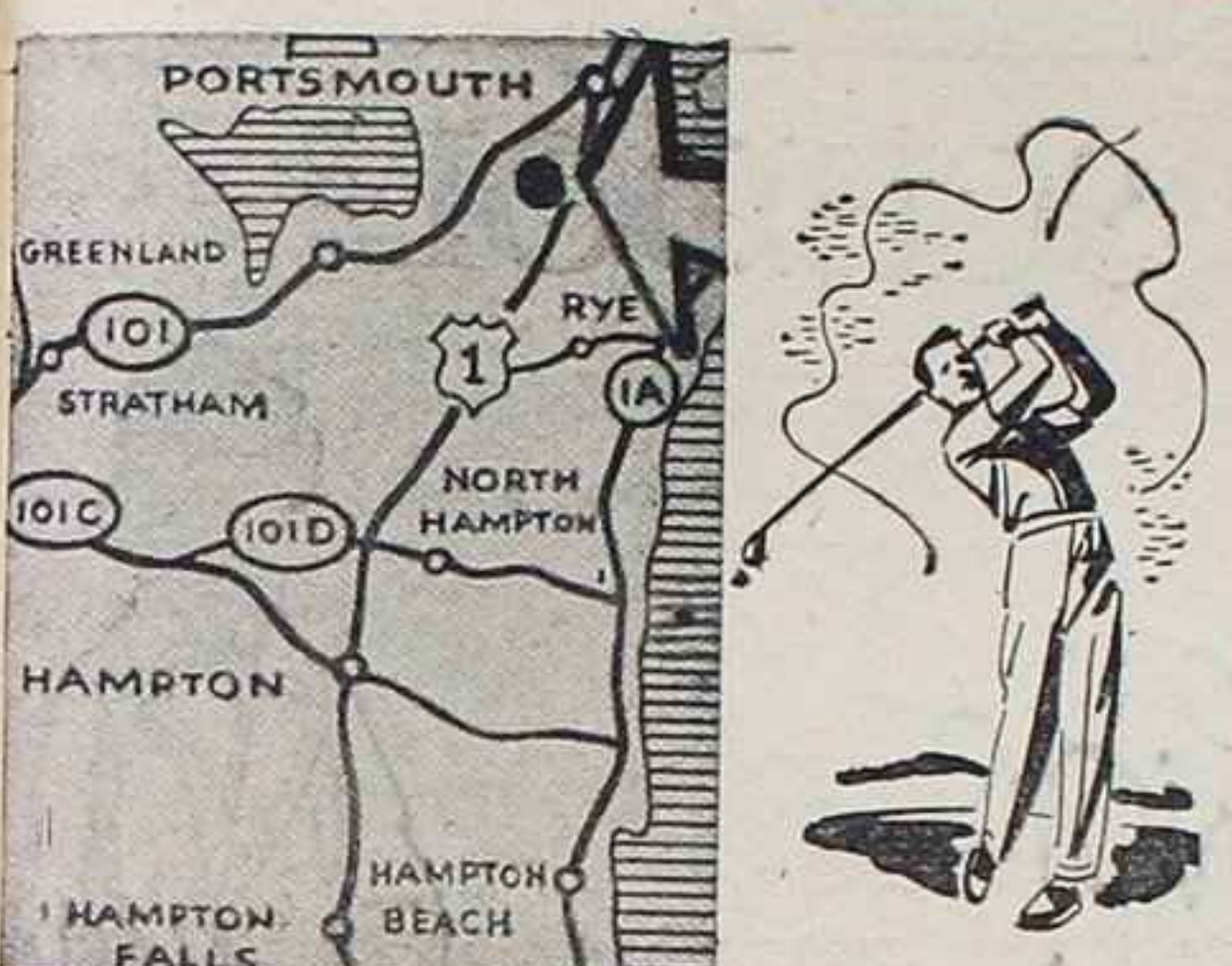
Town officials were informed of the proposed sale of the complete holdings of the Boston and Maine Railroad in Hampton center through Edward R. Thornton, a member of the state Public Utilities Commission, who requested that any objections to the sale be forwarded with the commission.

According to the petition filed by the B&M authorities, the railroad intends to sell the present depot "and the land beneath and around the station" as a part of a package transaction involving many such depots in New England including the Manchester station, to the Raylen Realty Company.

Just what use will be made of the property by the purchasers is not known at present, but Town Manager Batchelder expressed the feeling that it would be some type of a chain of concessions along a shopping center idea.

Mr. Batchelder pointed out that any such operation would only add to the already overcrowded traffic conditions in the area and that such a project should at least provide enough parking area to accommodate the increased business which it would generate.

"To eliminate all but five parking spaces in this area would be

Employment Office Handles 4,000 Requests

The Hampton Beach office of the state division of employment security has received 4,000 applications for employment this year, it was announced this week by Mr. Robert Cushing, director of the office.

These applications represent all the New England states as well as Illinois, Maryland, Virginia, Florida, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, California, Arizona, Oregon, Washington, Oklahoma, Iowa, Alabama, Ohio, New York, Texas, the district of Columbia, the Panama Canal Zone, and Hawaii.

Mr. Cushing announced also that this office of the employment security will close next Tuesday, Aug. 26th. The main office, 580 State street, Portsmouth, remains open year round.

In February the Portsmouth office will begin sending notices to all colleges in New England. These notices are then placed on a conspicuous bulletin board. Interviews are arranged by the employment security office, beginning in May for summer jobs.

Fish And Game Lore

Have you ever looked in a pond and observed a jelly-like mass anywhere from the size of a grapefruit to that of a bushel basket? These translucent masses, speckled with brownish-colored polka dots, are generally attached to sticks or logs and you may have thought you were looking at fish or frog eggs. As a matter of fact you were looking at a colony of thousands of animals called bryozoa or moss animalcules.

The individual bryozoans are located on the outside of the jelly. The jelly-like stuff which is secreted by the animals is clear until it becomes discolored by algae and bacteria. Each tiny white spot on the jelly beneath the water consists of a hundred or more individual animals. As the colonies become large in the latter part of summer, they are apt to trap rain bubbles and float to the surface. The portions of the colonies exposed to air are killed. The jelly is pushed up in places by the bubbles and dries out to form dome-shaped shells.

When bryozoans are touched they give off slime, but they are

ery sheath. After a few moments, however, the graceful tentacles will again blossom forth.

A peculiarity about bryozoans is their method of reproduction. It has two systems. As the colony increases in size the individuals simply reproduce by budding like a plant. During a certain period of the summer, however, small portions of the bryozoans are set aside in flat packages called "statoblasts". As these are reed they drift away, often in such large numbers that they form wind-rows along lake shores. The edges of these tiny packages have hooked spines which help them catch free rides on moving objects. Like seeds, they can overwinter and start new colonies of bryozoans the following spring.

Although there are about 3500 different kinds of bryozoa, most of them are found in salt water, only about 40 kinds being fresh water species. Of these, 14 species have been reported from America.

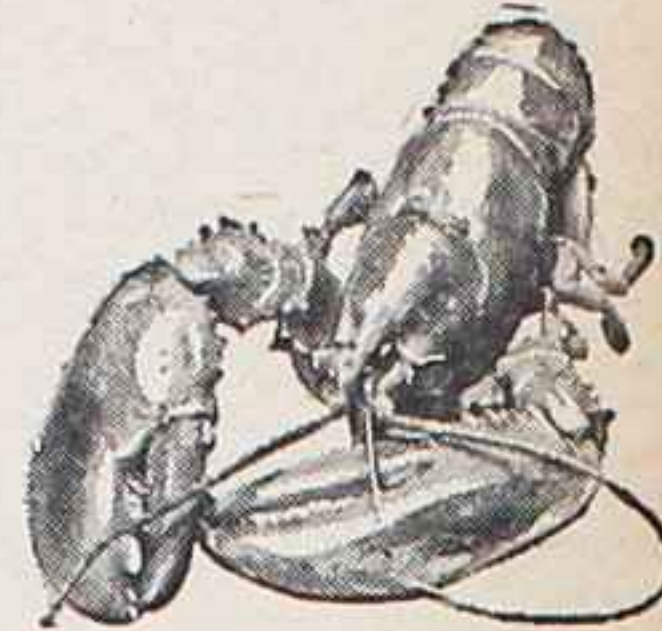
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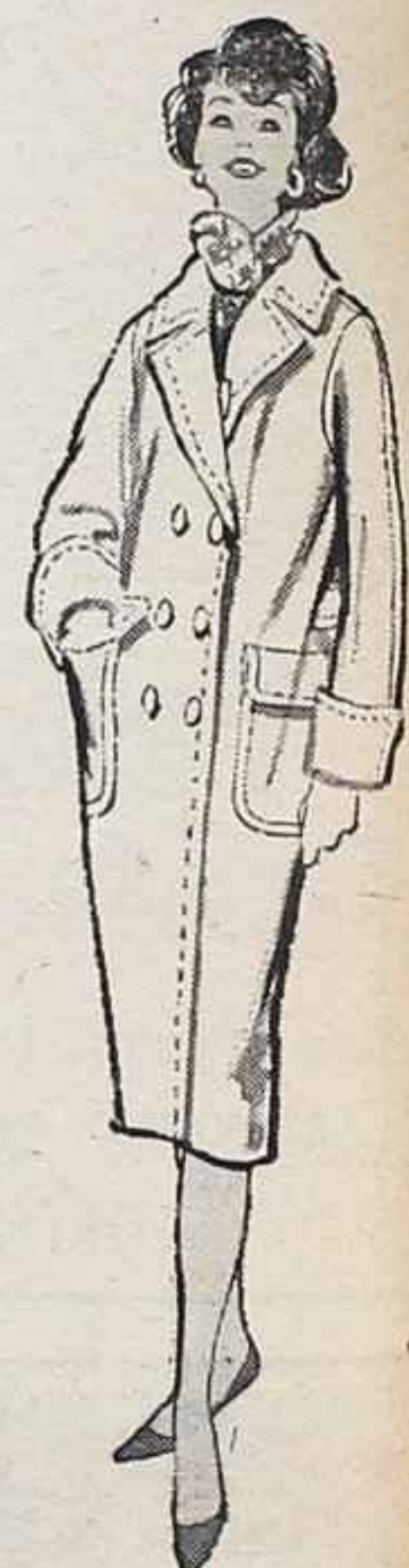
