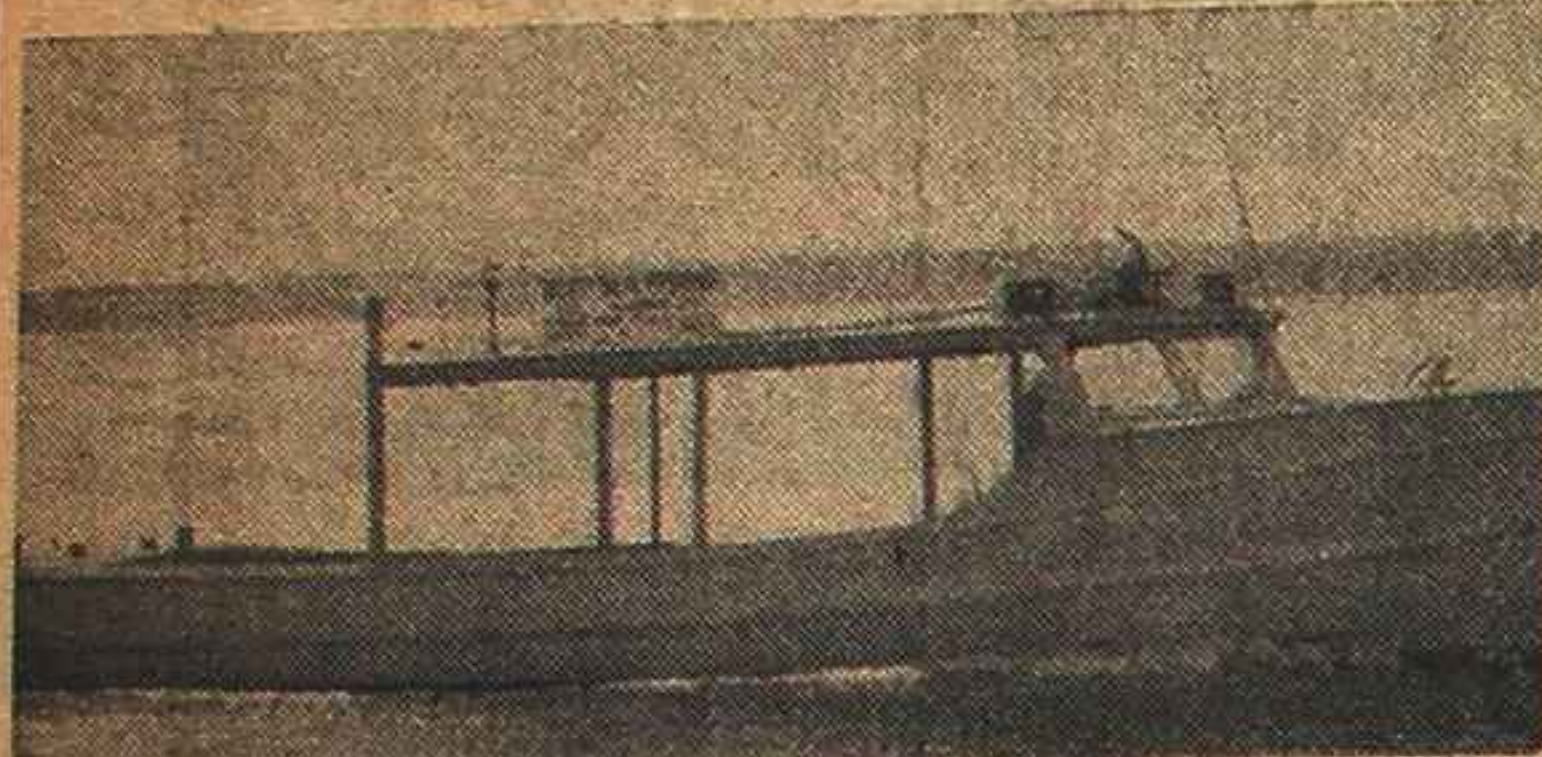

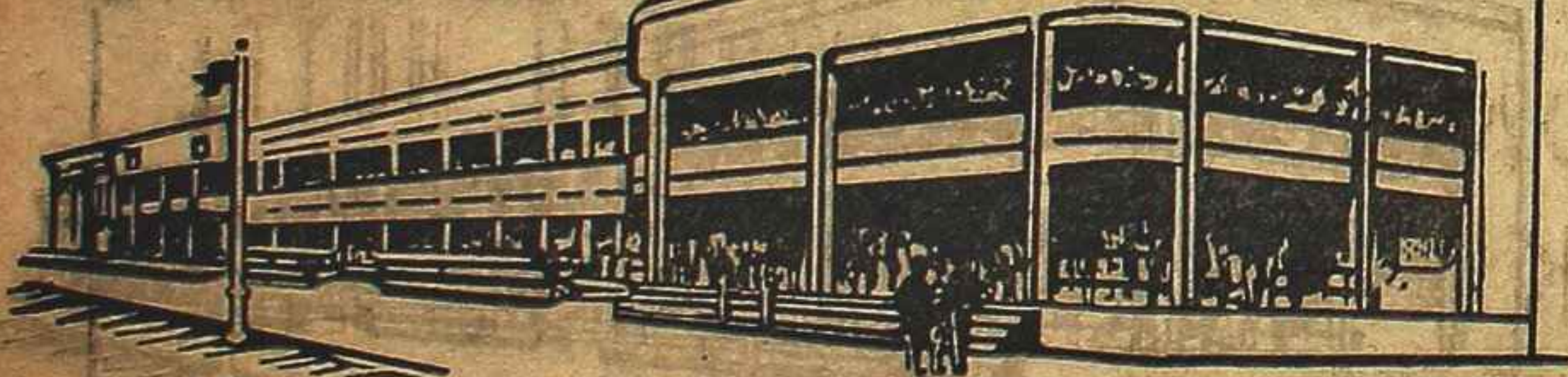

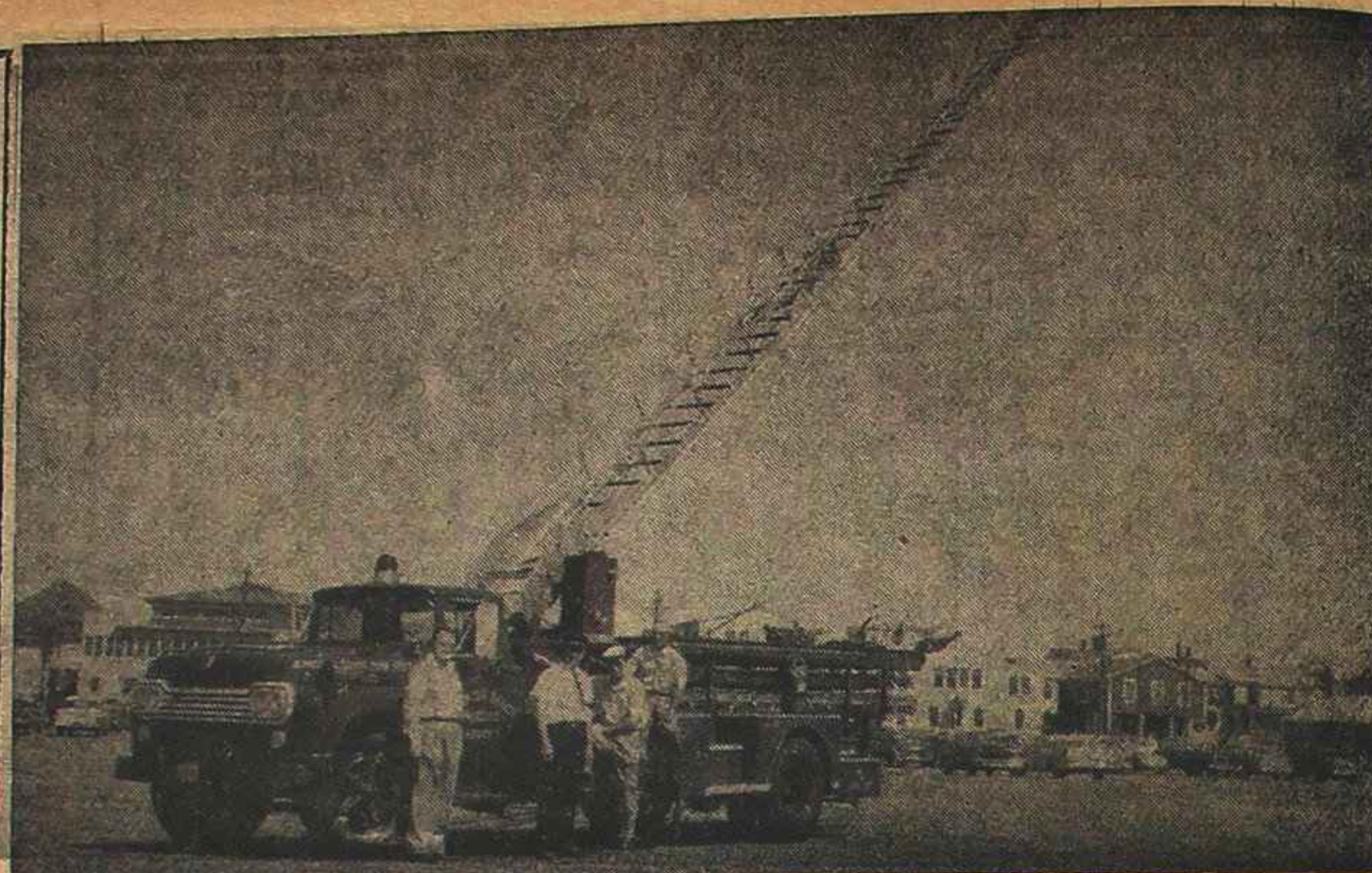

## New Aerial Fire Truck Arrives

Drills are being conducted this week by Hampton Beach firemen to familiarize themselves with the operation of a new aerial ladder truck delivered to the department last week.

The new \$24,000 truck was purchased by the Hampton Beach village precinct by a vote of 30 to 7 at its annual meeting, March 26, after a lengthy debate on the need for such a purchase. The cost of the vehicle is equivalent to 33 cents on the precinct tax rate for the next 12 years.

Fire Chief Perley R. George said the hydraulically operated ladder on the new truck can be extended 65 feet in any direction. The aluminum alloy ladder can be extended full length horizontally, as well as vertically, for rescue from ice or water.

In emphasizing the need for the new ladder truck, Chief George said the ladders and other equipment on the old truck were 33 years old, al-

though the chassis itself was only 18 years old. He said six

## Town Crews Remove North Beach Seaweed

Operation Seaweed was completed this week at North Shore when public works crews of the town of Hampton finished the task of removing tons of seaweed from the bathing beach just south of the Coast Guard station.

Mr. Roy Parsons, 19th street and Ocean boulevard, reported that literally tons of seaweed washed ashore by recent storms had made bathing almost impossible at this popular section of the beach.

Mr. Parsons told the Beachcomber, "The summer residents and property owners at North Shore are grateful to the town for the excellent job of removing the seaweed."

## Beach Square Dances Eliminated By State

Friday night square dances at the Hampton Beach state park have been eliminated this summer by the state Recreation division.

Official communications from Concord said the open-air square dances on the "old barn floor" at the state bath house were called off this summer due to a "lack of funds." The state park has reportedly been operating at increasing losses each year, and recreation officials expressed hesitancy this year to continue the full program at Hampton Beach with the budget still not passed as the new fiscal year begins today.

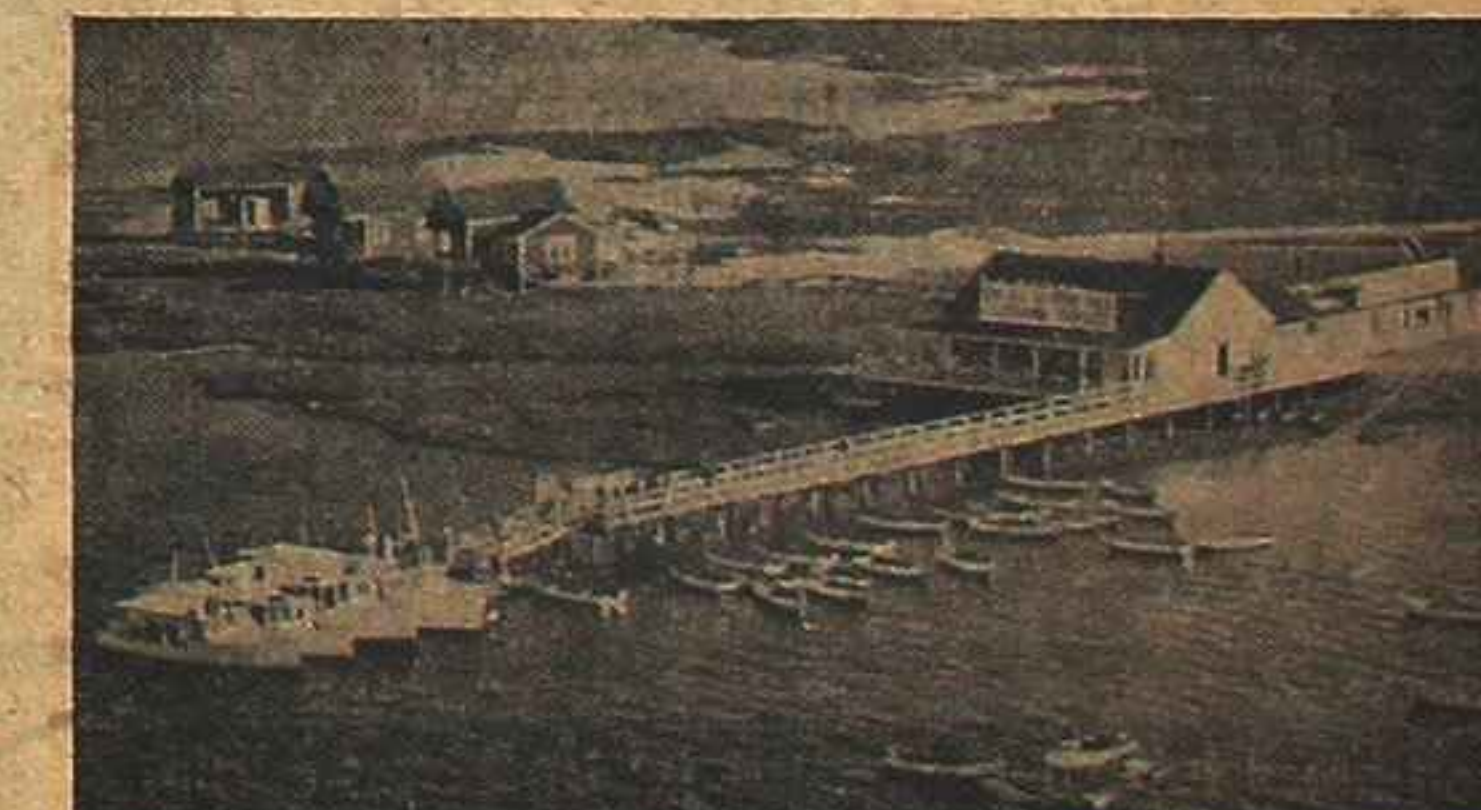

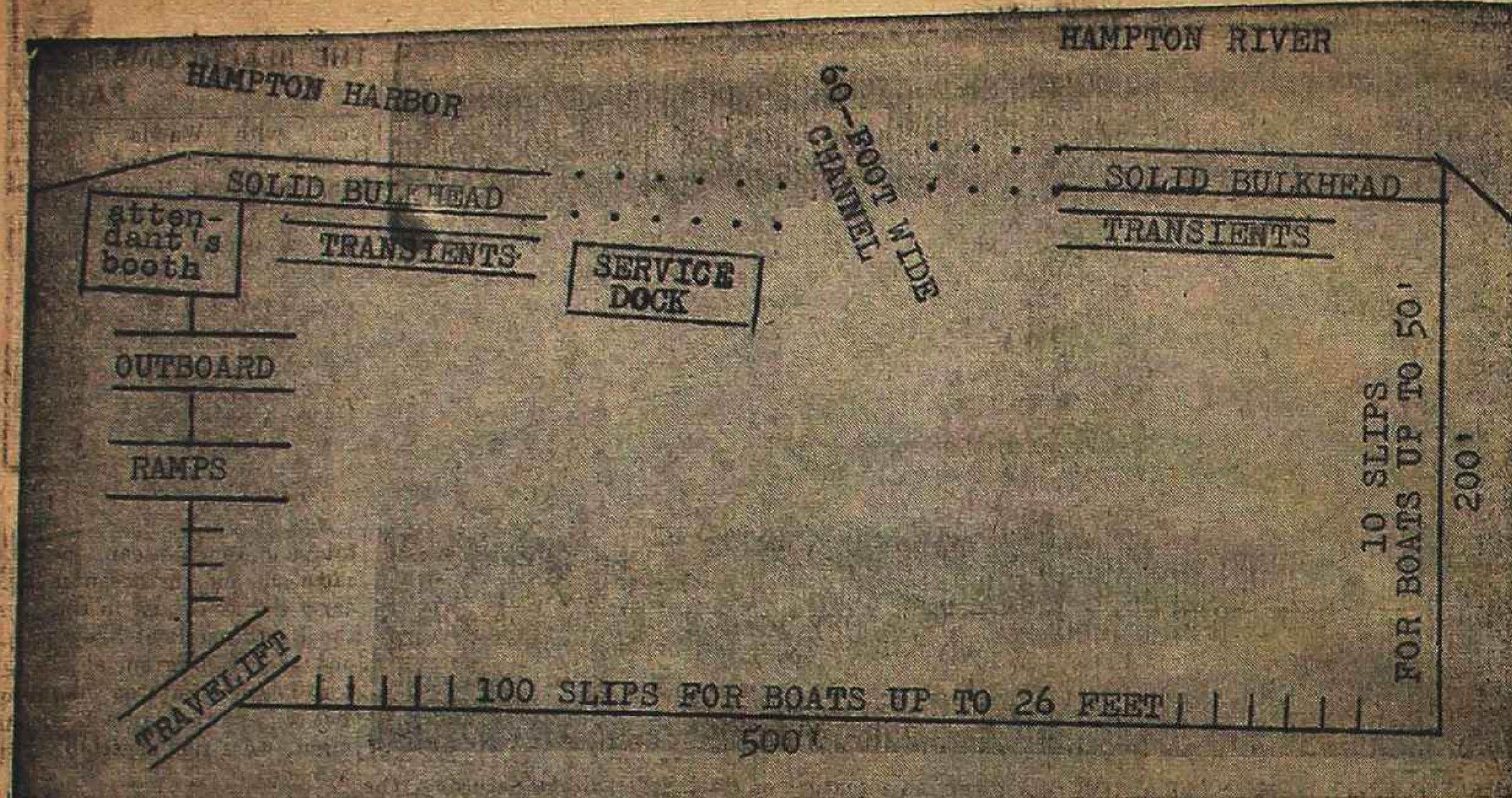

## Beach Marina Slated To Get Underway Monday

Construction of a 100-boat capacity marina just off Hampton Harbor is scheduled to begin Monday, July 13, according to Mrs. Helen C. Gilmore and George A. Smith.

Smith and Gilmore, operators of a fishing pier at Hampton Harbor for many years, will have the largest coastal marina in northern New England when the project is completed. The marina, located just north of the Smith and Gilmore pier on Hampton River, will contain slips for 100 boats up to 26 feet in length and 10 slips for boats up to 50 feet.

An estimated 33,000 cubic feet of sand will be dredged to form a rectangular basin 500 x 200 feet. The basin will be deep enough to retain six feet of water at low tide.

Although the basin and some docking facilities should be completed in time for use late this season, the entire project will take approximately two years. When finished, the Hampton Beach Marina will offer complete boating facilities.

At the south end of the basin, nearest Ocean boulevard, two double outboard launching ramps will provide easy access to the water. Platforms with dollies and winches will be used to lower boats into the water in order to avoid backing trailers into the corrosive salt water. Catwalks the length of the ramps will allow easy boarding of passengers and supplies. As many as four outboards may be launched at one time.

At the north end of the basin

there will be 10 large slips for 50-foot boats. Slips for smaller boats will run the length of the marina.

The basin will be separated from the river by solid macadam-topped bulkheads and breakwater piling on either side of a 60-foot wide channel. Plans call for a large service dock inside the basin, near the entrance, where gasoline, diesel fuel, water and ice may be obtained.

Two docks along the bulkheads for transients will provide electrical outlets and rest room facilities for boats docking at the marina over night or for several days. For the first time, boating enthusiasts from other ports will be able to conveniently dock at Hampton and enjoy the beach for a day or

two before resuming an ocean course.

A 20-ton Travelift to be built at an inside corner of the marina will be capable of raising a 50-foot boat from the water quickly at any tide level. Such a lift will simplify getting heavy fishing boats or yachts out of the water for repairs and storage, or in an emergency would provide quick access to land for boats threatened by storm damage.

When completed, the marina will offer facilities for winter boat storage, a repair shop, a salesroom for boats, motors and other marine supplies, lockers for boat owners, parking areas, and a playground and picnic area. Docking facilities may

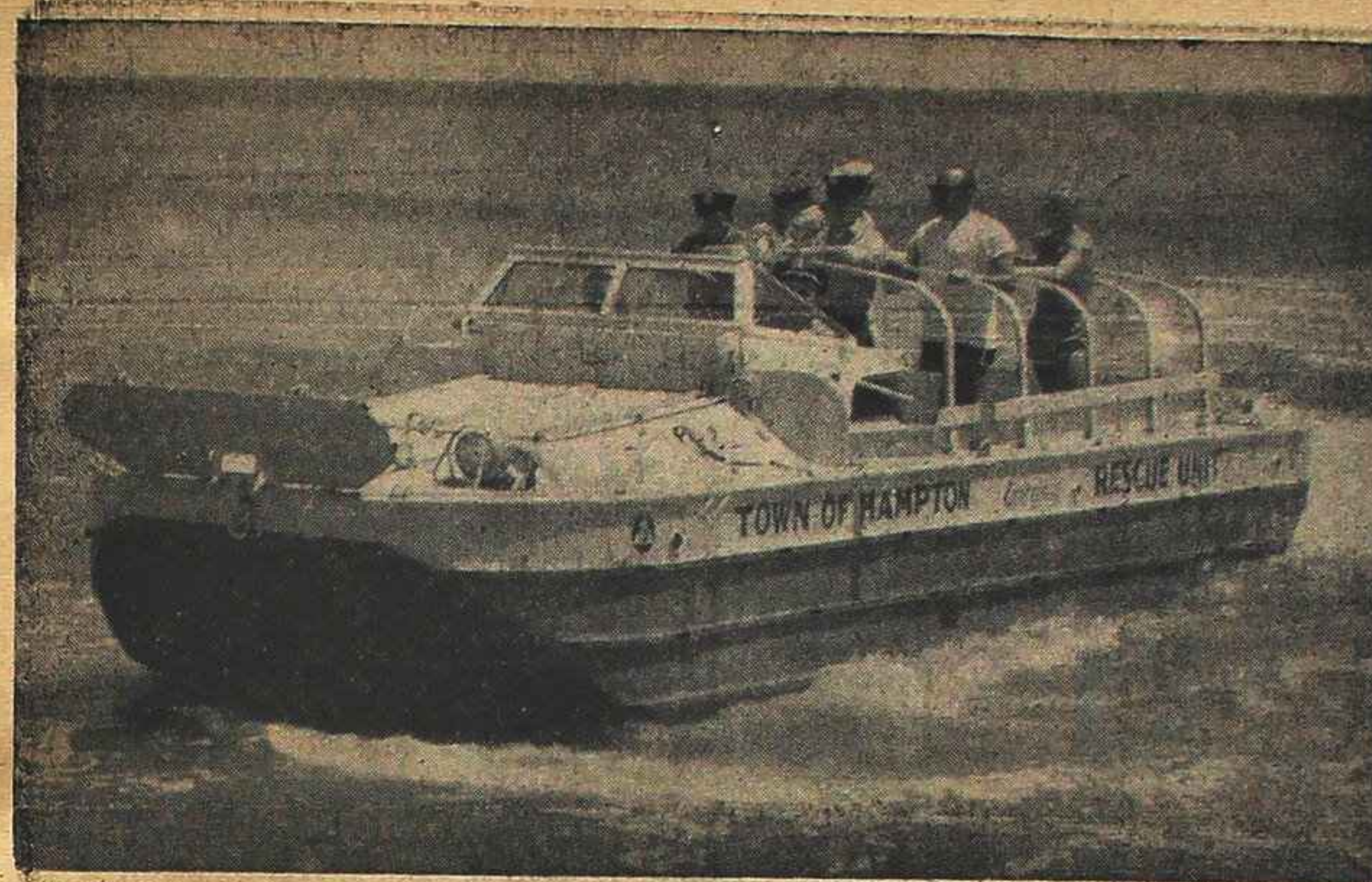

## Forecast Busy Beach Season With Advance Inquiries Up

The Chamber of Commerce reports inquiries concerning vacations at Hampton Beach are far ahead of any previous year. Office records showed 1,222 more inquiries to date than were recorded last year when figures were tallied for the directors meeting Tuesday night.

Chamber secretary "Bill" Elliot said, this week, that in spite of more than a week of poor weather, the Chamber office has continued to receive inquiries in far greater numbers than at this date in other years. He also said there have been many more outings by school-age groups at Hampton Beach this spring.

Elliot said many business places at the beach opened earlier this year than usual, and this in turn brought more early business. On the basis of in-

quiries to date, Elliot predicted one of the busiest seasons ever at Hampton Beach.

Elliot said the full summer staff of the Chamber of Commerce office would be working full time beginning tomorrow. Besides Elliot, Mrs. Geneva Eastman, Mrs. Ruth Palmer, and Miss Gisele Bougie will work in the office.

Miss Bougie, a 20-year-old senior at the University of New Hampshire, will replace Miss Sarah Cutts, who is teaching English at a summer camp in France. Miss Bougie's home is in Nashua. She speaks both English and French and is a French major at UNH.

Elliot also said Henry Hamel, promotion director for the Chamber, will resume his work here tomorrow for the rest of the season.

## Many New Accommodations Await Beach Vacationists

One brand new motel and new additions to older hostels will be noticed by guests at Hampton Beach this summer.

The new motel, at 511 Ocean boulevard, opposite Great Boar's Head is known as the Windswept. Operated by Mr. and Mrs. Russell A. Carter of Philadelphia, Pa., the Windswept consists of 20 units with a spacious lobby and office in front. The units are arranged with 10 entrances and parking spaces on both the north and south sides of the building.

The official opening of the attractive new aqua and white lodge was June 17. Area hotel and motel owners and operators were guests of the Carters at an open house.

The ranch style motel was begun in early April by the Waverly Construction company of Hampton, under the supervision of Conrad B. Dana. It was built on filled-in marsh land in the fast growing area between the beach center and north shore.

Carpentry was done by Gerard Veilleaux of Dover; wiring by Roy Parsons of Hampton; painting and decorating by R. H. Rowe, Inc. of Exeter; plumbing and heating by Palmer and Sicard of Hampton; and landscaping by Lessard and Son of North Hampton.

Mr. Carter, owner and operator of the motel, is a retired executive of the Artloom Carpet company of Philadelphia. He and Mrs. Carter have spent vacations at Hampton Beach for many years.

### OPEN NEW UNITS

Twelve new rooms have been added to the Puritan rooms, 109 Ocean boulevard. William I. O'Brien of Newburyport, the owner, opened the completely renovated inn for business last Sunday.

The Puritan will have 20 rooms, including the new facilities, all with private baths, heat, and air conditioning. Six new rooms on the front provide excellent views of the ocean.

A large bow window, facing Ocean boulevard, offers a sweeping view of the beach from the lobby.

Nine new second floor units at the Mari-Anne motel on Ocean boulevard near the state park were completed in May. The motel is patterned in an attractive architectural style unique at Hampton Beach.

Mr. and Mrs. Mario V. Manfre, the owners and operators, said that with the new rooms, their motel has 25 rooms with four double units on the first floor. The second floor rooms open onto a veranda overlooking Hampton harbor. Tube lighting around the veranda makes an impressive outline of the building at night.

Several other hotels at Hampton Beach, including the Ashworth hotel and Santa Maria hotel, have installed private baths for all rooms this season.

men were needed to raise the old ladders, whereas two men can operate the new equipment. The fire department depends strongly on call firemen to assist in fire fighting operations, he said, and it is conceivable that six men could not be present at a fire in time to raise the old ladders for a rescue from an upper story.

He also said the old wooden ladders showed signs of dry rot and would have had to be replaced in the near future. He said the old outfit can be sold for approximately \$2,500. This now, together with a \$2,000 appropriation from the precinct will serve as the initial payment on the new vehicle. The remainder of the cost will be paid at the rate of \$2,000 a year plus interest on revenue bonds.

Last week the new truck was on display at the annual convention of the New England Fire Chiefs' association at the Wentworth hotel, New Castle.

**\$9,000 Land Damages Given In Beach Case**

A Rockingham county Superior Court jury, last week, awarded a Hampton couple \$9,000 in land damages caused when the state rebuilt the highway at Hampton Beach in 1956.

The award went to Mr. and Mrs. Joseph A. Lynch of 28 Dumas avenue, Great Boar's Head.

**Swim Pools Make Debut**

Swimming pools have been installed at three Hampton Beach motels this spring and are now in use by the guests of the motels.

All three are fresh water pools and have been installed for the convenience of those guests who prefer fresh to salt

water," as one owner put it. The motels with the pools are the Yankee Village on the North Shore, Henry's Holiday Shores, at the intersection of Ocean boulevard and Winnacunnet road, and Martin's Motel court, 456 Winnacunnet road.

Mrs. C. R. Martin, co-owner of Martin's Motel, said their fiberglass pool measures 15 by 42 feet, seven and a half feet deep at one end and three feet deep at the other. The aqua colored pool was manufactured by the Universal Paradise company and shipped from Miami, Fla., in six sections.

William Garden of the manufacturing company directed the installation. He said the pool employs a filtering system which keeps the 24,000 gallons of fresh water in the pool "five times purer than most city water."

Located in the center of the motor court, the pool is surrounded by a flagstone patio and a rock garden with fireplaces and picnic tables for the convenience of the guests at the 26-unit motel.

Construction of a 20 by 40 foot concrete pool at Henry's Holiday Shores motel was completed last week, according to Henry V. Dupuis, owner.

Located on the north side of the motel at the intersection of Ocean boulevard and Winnacunnet road, the pool is trapezoidal in shape with a diving board at the narrower end. From a shallow section for children the pool slopes to a 9 1/2-foot depth at the diving end. In the winter the pool will be used as a skating rink.

Dupuis said he took a poll of all his guests last year to find whether they preferred fresh or salt water for a motel swimming pool. He said 90 per cent of those questioned said they preferred fresh water. He said the pool has a filtering

system working constantly to keep the water pure.

A 10-foot flagstone apron surrounds the pool and the entire lot has been newly landscaped. Dupuis said the contract for the job was let last fall, but construction didn't begin until May.

The third swimming pool at Hampton Beach was installed by Mr. and Mrs. George Cuddy at the Yankee Village motel, North Shore boulevard, opposite Plaice cove. The Cuddy's pool is also a 20 by 40-foot concrete pool, poured in one operation to eliminate seams. The "Mountain Lake" pool was installed by the Rudd-Murray company of North Attleboro, Mass.

Mountain Lake pools are built in New England and conditioned for New England weather, according to the Cuddys. The pool is located in the lawn in front of the motel cabins and features an interior light at the bottom.

The Cuddys formerly owned the Seascope motel and bought the Yankee Village last winter.

The "doldrums" are stretches of ocean, between the trade wind belts, where the air is quiet and sultry. Cyclones and frequent squalls originate there.

**'Adults Only' Comedy Is Playhouse Opener**

**Beach Courtesy Boxes Go Into Effect July 1**

Courtesy boxes for the collection of parking meter violation fines at Hampton Beach will go into use July 1. The use of courtesy boxes was approved by the state legislature last week after all parties concerned with parking at Hampton Beach reached agreement on the practicality of the boxes.

Proposed well before the beginning of the vacation season last year, the use of courtesy boxes met opposition from state agencies and were ordered to be removed soon after they were installed last June.

Local proponents urged the use of boxes, both as a courtesy to parking violators and to relieve congestion at the police station where negligent parties had to go to pay fines for parking overtime at the state controlled meters along the front.

This year legislative approval was sought and won with the agreement of the Recreation department, and no further trouble is expected. Hampton's Representative Douglass E. Hunter sponsored the bill.

be expanded to accommodate 200 boats in future years by extending T-wharfs to the end of alternate slips.

The 12-acre marsh area between the river and Ashworth avenue will be filled up to ground level. River frontage of the marina will extend more than 1,000 feet north of the present Smith and Gilmore fishing pier and lobster pound.

The marina will be within easy reach of the bathing beaches and the ocean. In recent years hundreds of boats have been turned away from Hampton Harbor by the harbor master because of a lack of docking facilities. The Smith and Gilmore marina will provide a service long needed at Hampton Beach and serve to persuade boat owners to make Hampton Harbor their home port after the marsh reclamation project gets underway.

Mrs. Gilmore said her brother and business partner, George Smith, would be in charge of the operation of the marina while she handles their present business of fishing parties.

**Zoning Board Denies Porch Roof at Beach**

The town zoning board of adjustment last week denied a request for permission to build a roof over the porch of a store on King's highway, Hampton Beach.

Myron J. Norton of 78 Mace road, owner of the property, petitioned the board for a variance in the zoning ordinance to allow

a permanent roof to be built over a concrete slab porch at Hughes Market, 163 King's highway.

According to zoning regulations, a building may not be constructed closer than 10 feet to the front lot line. Building Inspector F. Alfred Janvriin said at a public hearing on the petition last Thursday that the concrete slab extended six feet from the building and came within five feet of the lot line. Without a roof the porch is not considered part of the building, but with a permanent roof the porch would be considered part of the building and thus in violation of the zoning ordinance.

Norton pointed out at the hearing that although the porch would be only five feet from the front lot line, it would still be more than 10 feet from the street.

H. Clifford Bean, a member of the board, suggested that an awning be used to cover the platform if a shelter were necessary. He said an awning would not be in violation of the ordinance.

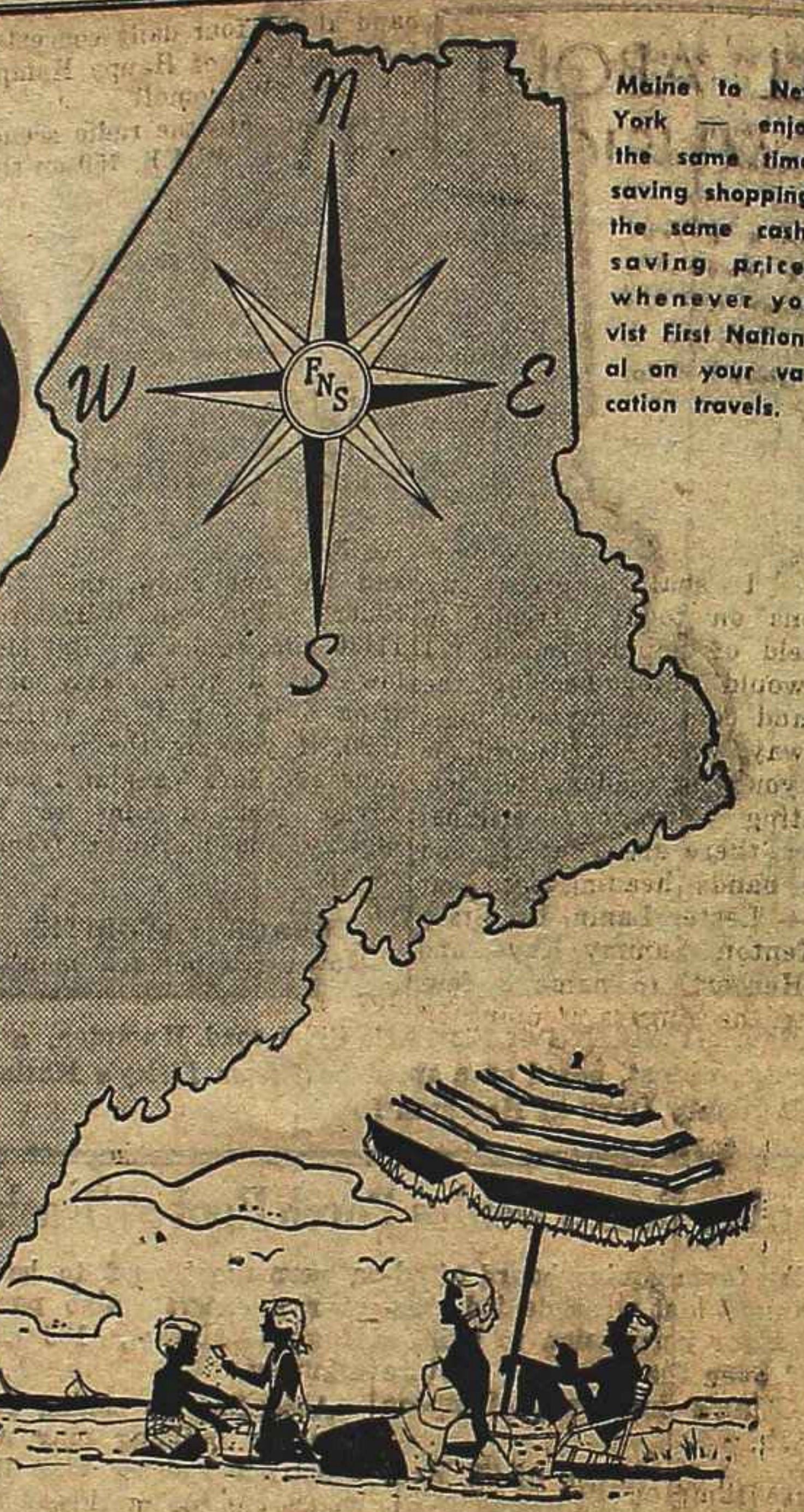

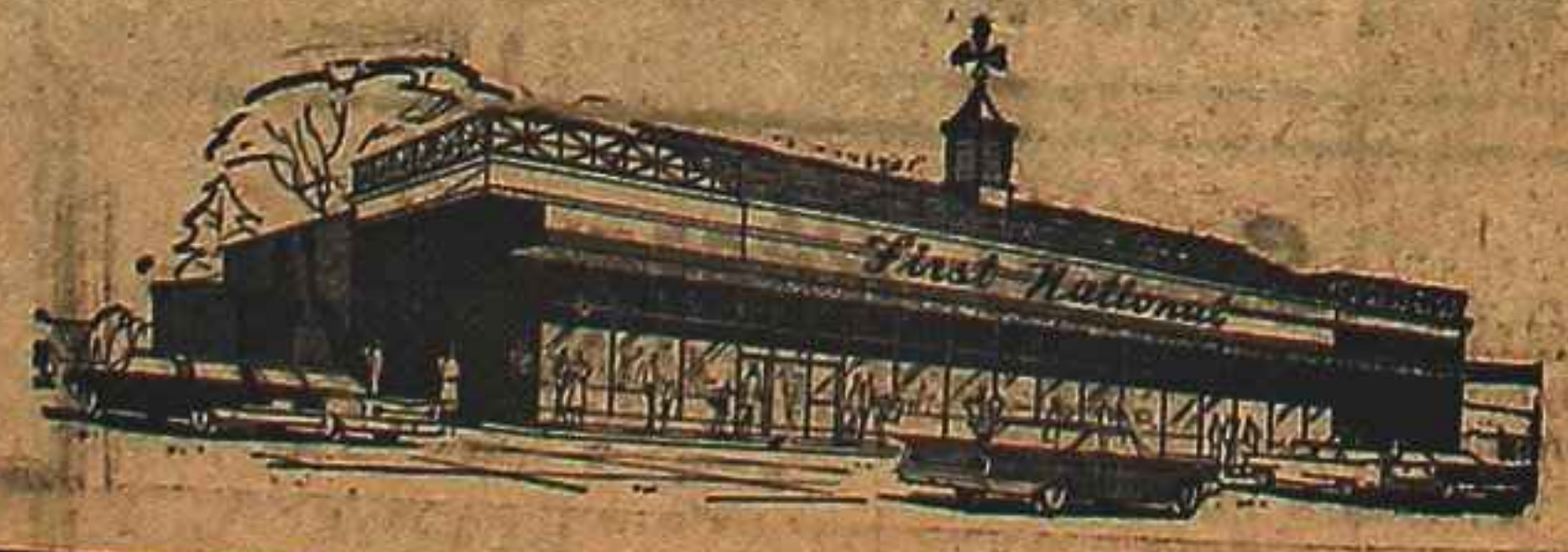

# New System Navigation Aids Installed By CG For Harbor

A new system of aids to navigation at the approach to Hampton Harbor were installed this spring by the U.S. Coast Guard.

Lt. Commander William C. Akers of the New England district said the installation of new markers was completed in April to conform with a plan agreed upon by town and precinct of-

ficials and local fishermen and sailors last October.

Changes in the marking system were urged by local officials and boating enthusiasts last fall after the drowning of two Hampton residents when their craft struck a ledge just off Hampton Beach while approaching the harbor.

The new system includes three new approach buoys, all painted black with white reflectors. In addition, four other buoys have been relocated, including the lighted bell buoy and the gong buoy.

Charts of the harbor with the new markings are being prepared by the Coast and Geodetic Survey service of the Department of Commerce.

The names and locations of the present markers are as follows:

1. HAMPTON HARBOR LIGHTED BELL BUOY 4 was moved and re-established in 43 feet of water about 2,940 yards 154° 30' True from standpipe, Great Boars Head and renamed

HAMPTON HARBOR APPROACH LIGHTED BELL BUOY 2.

2. HAMPTON HARBOR APPROACH BUOY 3, a first-class tall can, painted black and equipped with a white visual reflector, was established in 35 feet of water about 3,050 yards 155° 20' True from standpipe, Great Boars Head.

3. HAMPTON HARBOR GONG BUOY 2 was moved and re-established in 25 feet of water about 2,925 yards 179° 30' True from standpipe, Great Boars Head, to mark the southeast edge of the six-foot shoal. The buoy is equipped with a red visual reflector and is renamed HAMPTON HARBOR APPROACH GONG BUOY 4.

4. HAMPTON HARBOR APPROACH BUOY 5, a third-class special can, painted black and equipped with a white visual reflector, was established in 12 feet of water about 3,015 yards 184° 30' True from standpipe, Great Boars Head, to mark the north edge of the ledge.

5. SOUTH HIGH ROCK BUOY 6, a second-class nun equipped with a red visual reflector, was discontinued.

6. NORTH BAR LEDGE BUOY, a third-class special can, painted in black and red horizontal bands and equipped with a white visual reflector, was established in 20 feet of water about 2,425 yards 186° 40' True from standpipe, Great Boars Head.

7. CHANNEL ROCK BUOY 6A, a third-class special nun, painted red and equipped with a red visual reflector, was moved and re-established in 9 feet of water about 2,950 yards 186° 30' True from standpipe, Great Boars Head, to mark the southeast edge of the three-foot ledge, and renamed HAMPTON HARBOR APPROACH BUOY 6.

8. HAMPTON HARBOR APPROACH BUOY 7, a third-class special can, painted black and equipped with a white visual reflector, was established in 9 feet of water about 3,115 yards 188° True from standpipe, Great Boars Head, to mark the north edge of Yellow Ledge.

9. TOWN ROCK BUOY 8, a second-class special nun, painted red and equipped with a red visual reflector, was moved and re-established in 9 feet of water about 3,170 yards 190° True from standpipe, Great Boars Head, and renamed HAMPTON HARBOR ENTRANCE BUOY. The color of the buoy has been changed to black and white vertical stripes, and the visual reflector has been changed from red to white.

10. The position of WHITE

ROCK BUOY 1, a second-class special can buoy, has been determined to be in 6 feet of water about 3,275 yards 190° True from standpipe, Great Boars Head. The color of the visual reflector has been changed from white to green.

11. The position of GUN ROCK BUOY 3, a third-class special can equipped with a white visual reflector, has been determined to be in 6 feet of water about 3,300 yards 207° True from standpipe, Great Boars Head.

12. The position of BRIDGE ROCK BUOY, a third-class special can equipped with a white visual reflector, has been determined to be in 5 feet of water about 200 yards 287° True from the drawspan of the Neil Underwood Memorial Bridge.

13. The following buoys were moved and re-established in the positions indicated, distances and true bearings are from standpipe, Great Boars Head:

1. HAMPTON HARBOR APPROACH BUOY 6—2,950 yards 185°, in 9 feet of water.

2. HAMPTON HARBOR APPROACH BUOY 7—3,100 yards 187°, in 9 feet of water.

Stone, a veteran lifeguard at the beach, was selected for the head position when Charles George, former water instructor with the Coast Guard and previous head lifeguard at Hampton Beach, was unable to take the position again this summer.

One new lifeguard on the nine-man regular force will be Paul Kotsenos of Concord. The other lifeguards have all worked at Hampton Beach before. They are Hugh Marshall of Exeter, William Tattan of Worcester, Mass., Dean, Thomas, and Paul Quinlan of Wakefield, Mass., Robert Landray of Concord, and Stanley Southwick of North Hampton.

Four additional lifeguards will be on duty weekends. They are David Stone of Manchester, brother of the head lifeguard, Robert Ross of Durham, Charles George of Worcester, Mass., and Roy Leonardson of Lowell, Mass.

Although "Miss Hampton Beach" is generally considered the most coveted beauty title, there are two other beauty contests held at the beach each summer. The first, Miss North East contest, was staged June 20. The other is the Miss New England contest, scheduled for August 19.

## CG Auxiliary Urges Safe Boating Habits

Safe Boating Week, which got off to a head start at Hampton Beach last weekend with the Boat Safety Days program sponsored by Northeast Boat Shows, Inc., is being observed nationwide this week, June 27 - July 5.

The attention of the boating public to the importance of this program is being urged by the local Flotilla of the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary.

According to Comdr. William F. Keene, Hampton, the Auxiliary performs two functions to help insure a safe and pleasant boating season — public instruction courses (PIC) held during the winter months and courtesy motor boat examinations (CMBE) during the entire boating season.

Said Comdr. Keene, "The PIC courses are designed to help boat owners and boating enthusiasts to learn safe boating practices. These courses are given free, every winter, time and place will be announced in the fall. Don't be afraid to admit that you don't know. We all have a lot to learn about the proper handling of boats,

both on the ocean and lakes, and it may help save your life or your loved ones.

"Our second big job is CMBE examinations. Our inspectors will inspect your boat and equipment. If these come up to the specified requirements you will be given a decal to display on your boat. While you are being inspected if there are any questions in your mind ask the examiners and they will try their best to set you straight. The regular Coast Guard honor these decals for they know that your boat and equipment are approved and the only time they will bother you is if you are violating some Rule of the Road."

The local Flotilla (301) is based at Portsmouth Harbor Lifeboat station and covers an area from Hampton to Kennebunkport, Maine. The Auxiliary unit also has members in the Lakes Region of New Hampshire.

The Flotilla comprises 35 members with 29 facilities, of which nine are in the Lakes Region. The facilities consist of boats, planes and ham radio stations.

Cmdr. Keene reported that "during the boating season patrols will be maintained every weekend and holidays. Flotilla boats will be patrolling the coast from Portland, Me., to Salem, Mass. There will always be a radio station on duty, monitoring distress calls and relaying any calls to Auxiliary units on patrol."

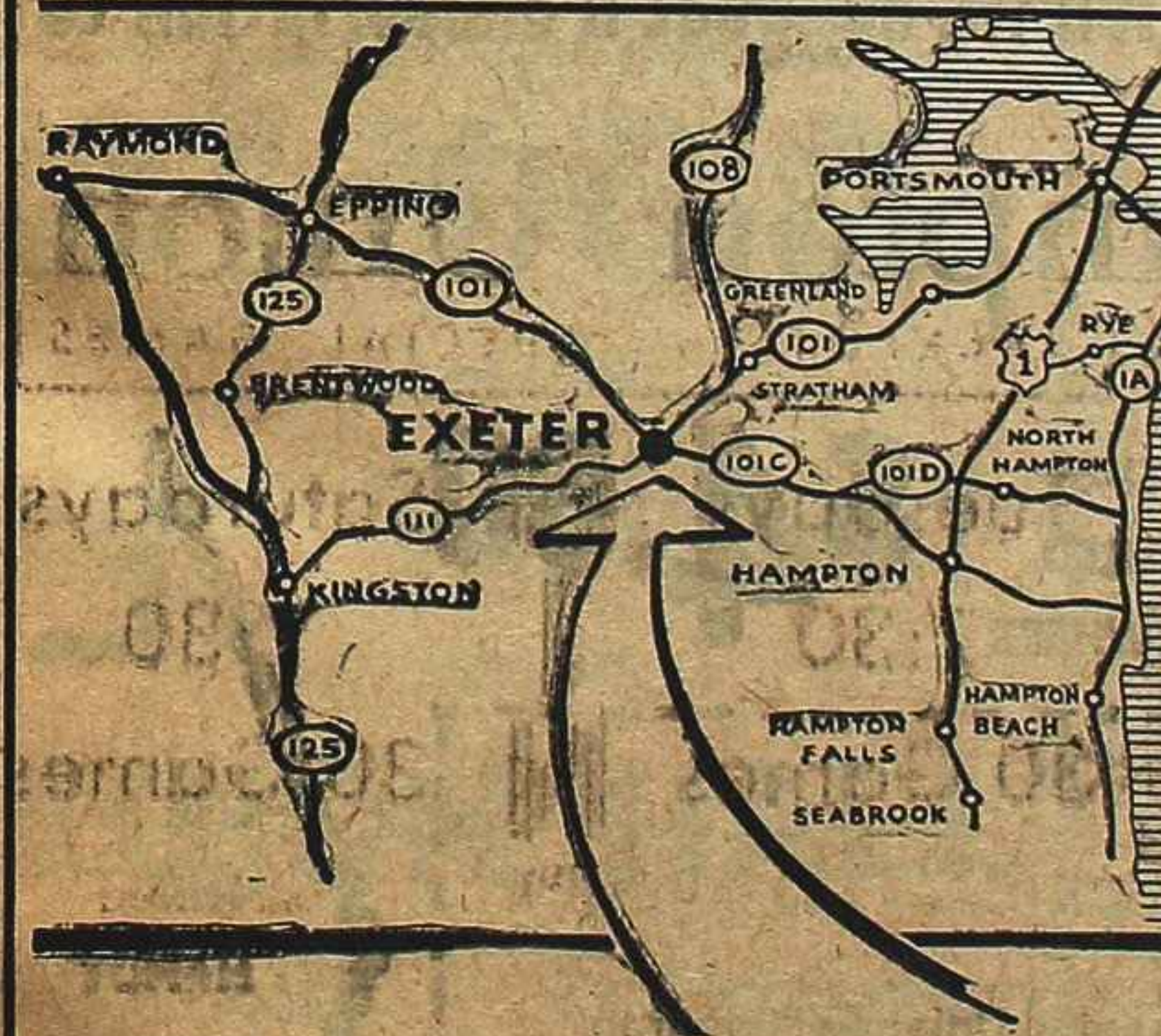

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**Seacoast Area Group Tours White Mtns.**

Directors of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce heard a report Tuesday night on an "information tour" through the White Mountains region.

Sponsored by the White Mountains Regional association, the tour was given for information booth attendants from the other five regions of the state last week. Mr. and Mrs. J. Harry Aspey of Brentwood and Robert Wiley of Deerfield represented the Seacoast region on the tour.

Such tours are sponsored each year by the different regional associations to give information booth attendants from other sections of the state a first hand knowledge of vacation, recreation, and sight seeing areas outside their own region.

In presenting the report for Mr. Aspey, Chamber secretary William Elliot told the directors that the Hampton Beach information office has thousands of inquiries annually about recreation facilities in the White Mountains and other parts of the state. He said the information submitted by the Aspeys would be helpful to his office staff in answering questions

about the White Mountains. In his report Aspey said the tour was conducted by David Cassidy, executive secretary of the White Mountain Regional association, and included a three-day inspection of the area with lectures at each spot visited.

Among the sights studied by the group were the tramway at Cannon Mountain, the cog railway at Mt. Washington, the new Storyland at Glen, the skimobile at Cranmore Mountain, North Conway, the gondolas and trails at Wildcat Mountain, the auto road at Pinkham Notch, Six-Gun City and Santa's Village at Jefferson, the automotive-train up Mt. Agassiz at Bethlehem, the Indian Head and The Flume at Franconia Notch, the Polar Caves and the Lost River at Plymouth, and a number of other attractions in the area.

The group was given food and lodging by hotels in the area during the tour.

Detailed information about each place visited was recorded by Aspey for his report. The information will be available at all information booths in the Seacoast region.

**Tuneup Given Sound System**

An expert sound engineer gave the public address system at the bandstand a thorough examination Saturday in preparation for a full summer of music.

Harold Hills, director of the Worcester, Mass. city band, a widely recognized sound expert, went over all the amplifying equipment at the Chamber of Commerce office during the first band concert Saturday afternoon. Tuned to the band, the speaker system is now set for 12 hours of music a day.

When there is not a live band concert from the bandstand, recorded music is broadcast over the system from the Chamber office, 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. daily. Occasionally the operator taps in a Red Sox ball game from the radio, but most sunbathers and boardwalkers seem to prefer music.

The public address system was purchased five years ago at a cost of \$2,700 to the Chamber of Commerce. Besides its use for music, it is used frequently for any special announcements or programs at the bandstand.
