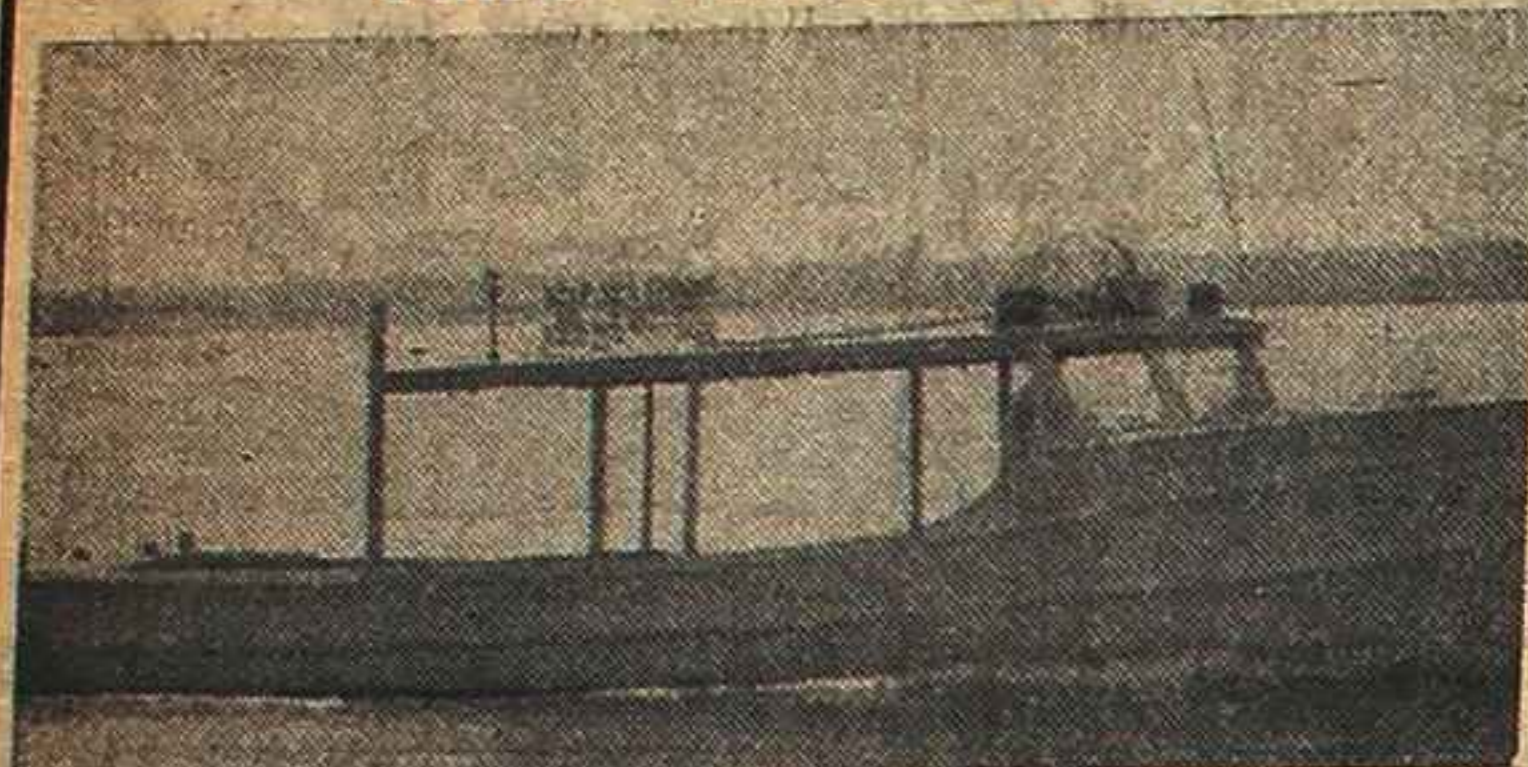

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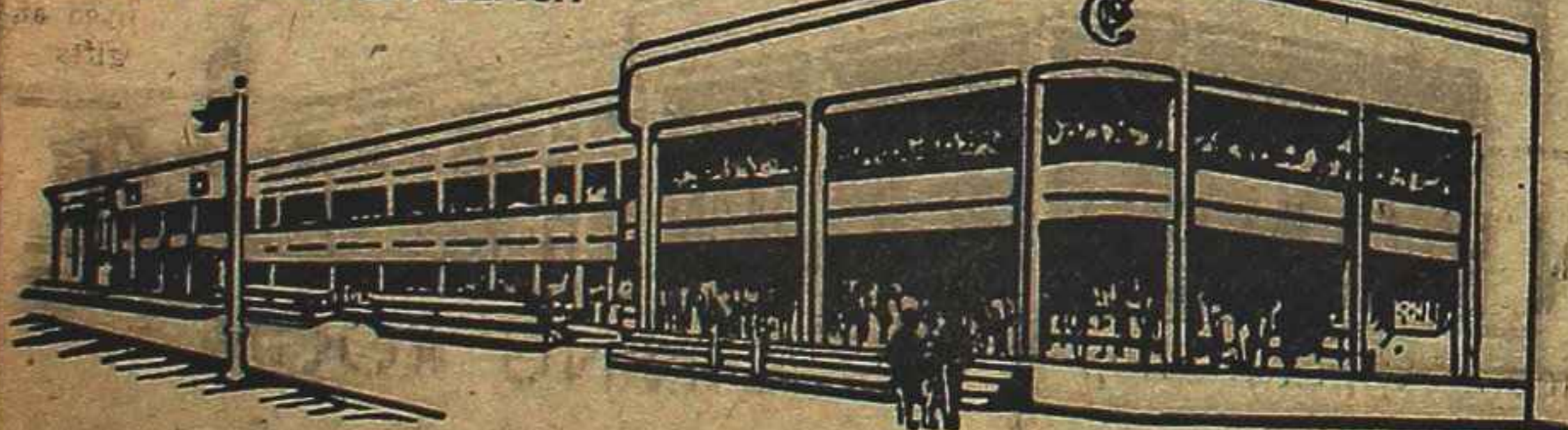

## Party Boats

### Rescue Four

Credit for saving the lives of four persons whose outboard swamped two miles south of the Hampton Harbor, June 24, is due John Foote, captain of the Smith & Gilmore party boat, Gannet.

The Gannet was anchored with a fishing party about a half mile from the outboard when Capt. Foote noticed the small boat was in distress. He lifted anchor and went to the scene immediately. He and his assistant, William McKennon, threw out the life ring and when all four of the desperate family were holding on, members of the fishing party helped hoist them into the Gannet.

Capt. Foote also recovered all the equipment on the swamped boat. The captain of the Ric-Roc, another party boat belonging to Alfred Gauron, also spotted the trouble from where he was anchored nearby and radioed the mayday call.

The Coast Guard responded and its rescue boat took the swamped outboard in tow back to the harbor.

The passengers on the outboard were Mr. and Mrs. Luther Hamblett, their son, Leonard, and grandson Bruce Hamblett, all of Hudson, N. H. They were anchored while fishing and when they lifted anchor from the stern of their light aluminum craft, the weight of the motor and anchor combined to up-end it.

**One Accident Mars Big Fourth Weekend**

A 16-year-old Lawrence, Mass. girl was injured in the only traffic accident to mar the Fourth of July weekend at Hampton Beach.

Miss Carol Metcalfe was released from Exeter Hospital Monday following treatment for left hip and abdominal wall injuries suffered when she was struck by a car on Ocean boulevard Saturday morning.

Miss Metcalfe was standing along Ocean boulevard near K street when an automobile, operated by 15-year-old Anthony J. Cipoletta of Medford, Mass., swerved out of control and struck her. Cipoletta was driving a sedan which belonged to a friend's mother, Mrs. Antoinette Kervosky, also of Medford. Cipoletta and Richard Kervosky, 16, had driven the car to Hampton Beach for the weekend.

The unlicensed youth side-swiped a car belonging to John A. Downey of Woburn, Mass., on K street before entering Ocean boulevard. After he struck the girl he smashed the car head-on into the front of a building on Ocean boulevard owned by Charles F. Butler. Butler estimated the extent of damage to the building at \$200. The Kervosky car was extensively damaged in the front and was towed to a garage.

Miss Metcalfe was taken to the Exeter Hospital in a police ambulance by Officer Spencer Sullivan, Jr. She was treated at the hospital by Dr. Peter A. Meneghin. Police Sgt. Clayton La Brack investigated. Police Chief John J. Malek said the youth, who was driving the car, is being held on a motor vehicle charge.

**Bright Comedy Hit Next at Playhouse**

A breezy comedy, called *The Reluctant Debutante*, which cheerfully satirizes the system of expensive debutante parties as the upper-class method of getting daughters married off, will be the next attraction at the Hampton Playhouse, July 13-18.

An elegant show, with sparkling dialogue, *The Reluctant Debutante* is centered mainly on a scheming mothers over-eager tactics to get the most eligible young man to come to dinner, to take her daughter out to dinner or to be her daughter's dancing partner, all for the sake of snaring one of them as a future son-in-law. The mothers' whirligig antics are especially amusing when she flutterheadedly rings up wrong numbers and invites wrong men to dinner — with resulting developments that are uproarious.

Maggie Owens will be playing the amusing role of a mother competing tigerishly with other mammas for her daughter's social success. Frank Lyon will be seen as the father, who good-naturedly submits to the debutante ritual, although it renders him sleepless and broke. And Nancy Watts will be seen as the daughter, who remains bored and indifferent to the maternal maneuvers for putting her on the auction block.

The *Reluctant Debutante* is a thoroughly entertaining play on the theme that to be a father of a bride may be upsetting and expensive, but being a father of a debutante is worse.

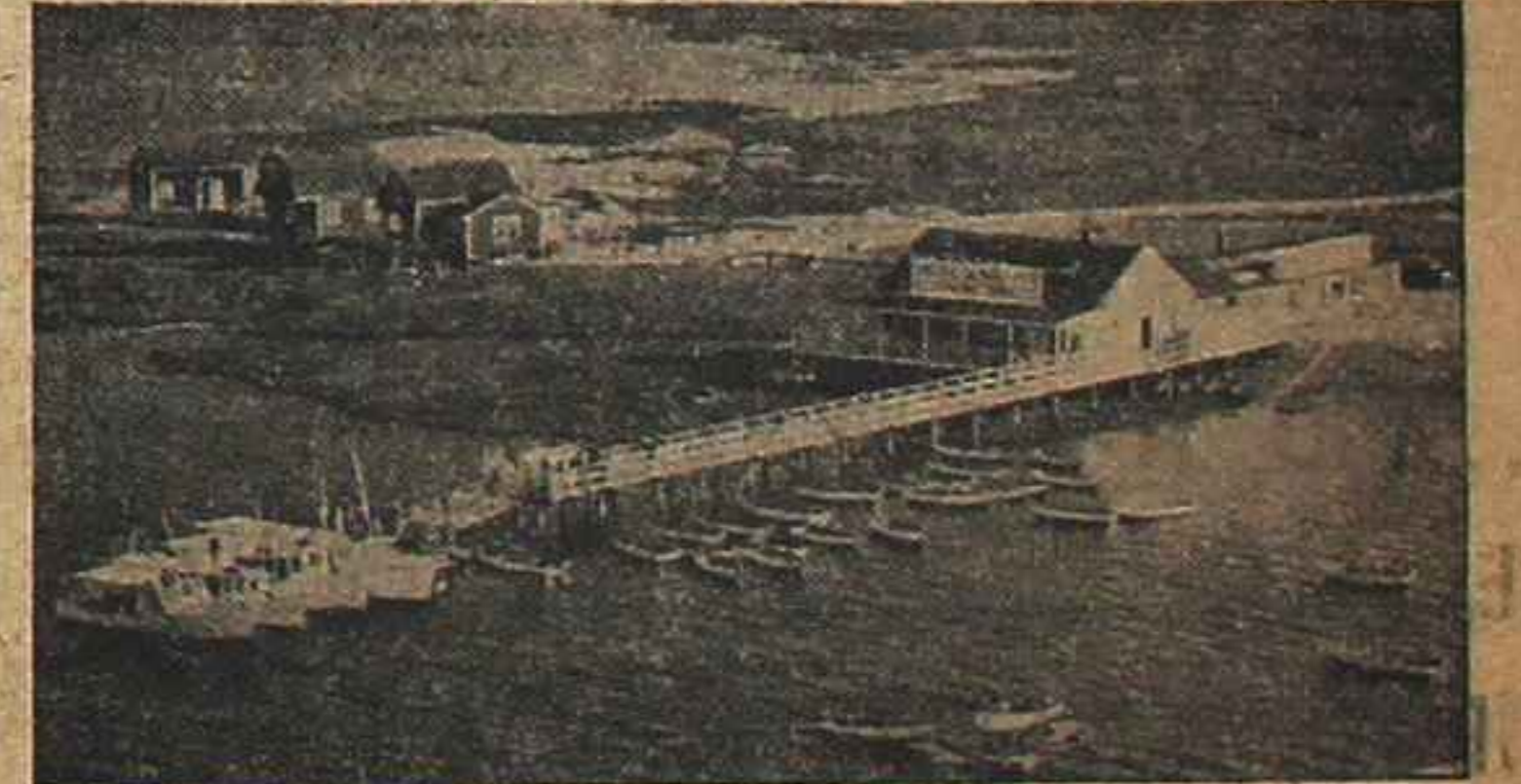

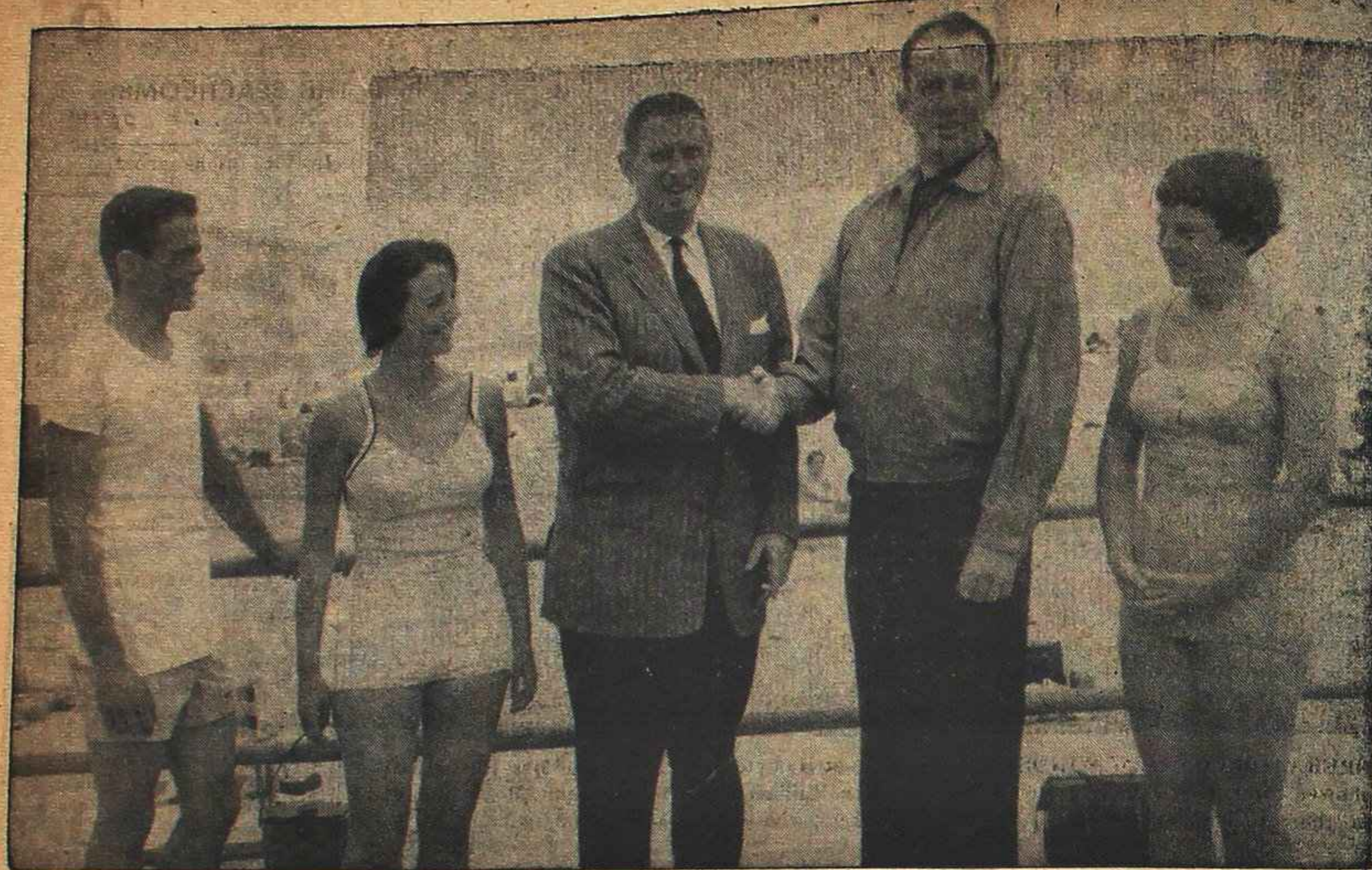

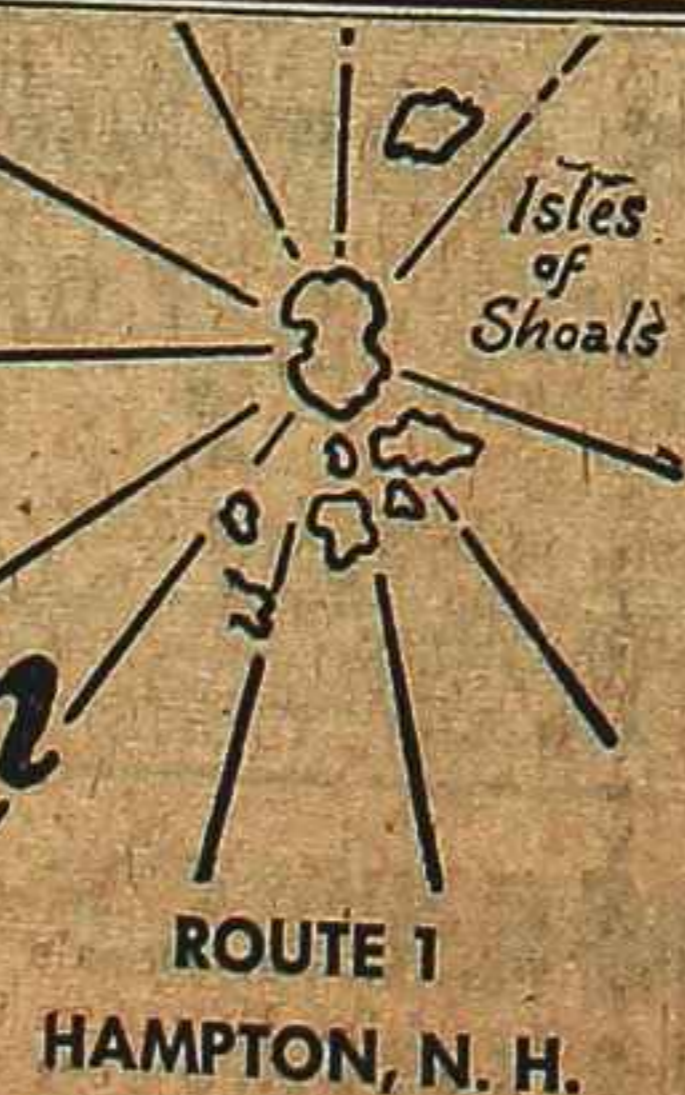
## Officials Estimate 'Fourth Crowd At 130,000

A record crowd of vacationists thronged Hampton Beach over the Fourth of July weekend. Estimates of the total number of visitors ranged from 125,000 to 150,000 to swell the normal vacation weekend population to more than double. It is virtually impossible to get an accurate count of visitors when the beach is so packed as it was over the last weekend, but several persons, who have been close to beach activities in previous seasons have provided "rough estimates." Police Chief John J. Malek made the most conservative of three estimates with a figure of 125,000. Executive secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, William I. Elliot, said he made "an educated guess" at the number of people by first estimating the number between two street lights on the boardwalk and then multiplying by the number of street lights along the main beach. He came up with a figure of 130,000. Town Manager John P. Batchelder estimated a weekend population of 130,000 to 150,000, based largely upon the amount of traffic and the number of parked cars.

# N. H. Legislature Paves Way For Marsh Project

Progress toward the establishment of an authority to handle the reclamation of the vast Hampton marshes advanced this week with the passage of an enabling act in the N. H. House of Representatives. The bill, now before the Senate, provides the mechanism for the town to set up a five-member authority as the administrative organization of the marsh development project.

Town approval will be necessary before the authority can be formed. The authority system of organization was chosen by the town's Marsh Reclamation committee early this year as the best possible means of undertaking the project. An appropriation of \$11,500 was voted at the March town meeting to provide funds for a tax map of the marsh area, the administrative organization of the authority, engineering, legal fees and public relations expenses. After the authority is functioning, it will operate independently of the town and will have the power to borrow money to carry out the program. The authority will not call for taxation by either the state or the town, and although it operates as a private agency it will be exempt from federal income tax and SEC regulations. Moreover, it will have the power to acquire land by eminent domain proceedings if necessary. The members of the authority will be appointed by the town. The five members will have staggered five-year terms. Aerial photographs of the area and plans for the first phase of the project have been developed by Anderson-Nichols, engineers engaged by the town. The program will make house lots in the marsh area available to buyers who desire a cottage or home site with both street and water frontage.

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### Beach Businessmen Praised For Fire Hazard Reduction

Since 1955 fire hazards at Hampton Beach have been reduced 75 per cent, according to Herbert L. Whitney of Peterborough, the state's assistant fire marshal. Mr. Whitney was the guest speaker at the weekly dinner meeting of the Kiwanis club of the Hamptons, held Monday night at Lamie's Tavern.

Thirty members and guests were present when the meeting was called to order by President Elliot Stevens. After one verse of America, grace was said by Kiwanian Willard Emery. The speaker was introduced by Fire Chief Perley George, program chairman for July.

Mr. Whitney stated that over

sixty New Hampshire farm homes were burned in 1958 and that most of them would not be rebuilt. The toll of 19 lives taken by fire thus far this year in the Granite State, exceeds by two the number of fire fatalities in 1958. School fires were few in number with minor losses during the last year.

The speaker projected a most interesting and instructive series of colored slides, which demonstrated dangerous fire hazards, including a number taken at Hampton Beach. He was loud in his praise of the Hotel Owners association at the Beach for the leadership of its members in eliminating fire hazards.

He stated that all business people had been most cooperative in their efforts to provide proper fire escapes and to safeguard their premises against the possibility of fire. This accounts for the overall reduction in beach fire hazard by at least 75 per cent.

The meeting next Monday, July 13, will be held at the Community Hall in the Beach fire station. Kiwanian Chief George is to provide a lobster supper.

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# 'Fourth Fireworks Fail To Arrive

An estimated 90,000 Fourth of July celebrants were disappointed at Hampton Beach Saturday night when the holiday fireworks, a long-standing tradition at the beach, failed to show up.

Chamber of Commerce officials, who hired the Rockland Fireworks company to handle all the fireworks shows this summer, said they had no previous warning from the company that the shoot would not be presented as scheduled.

Chamber secretary Bill Elliot said, however, that he suspected there might be trouble after a dozen communities, having contracts with the same company, failed to get fireworks promised Friday night. Rye Beach, to the north, and Salisbury Beach, to the south, were among the towns disappointed by the Rockland company.

Elliot said the Chamber office tried all day Saturday to get in touch with an executive of the Massachusetts firm, but he said in spite of all efforts no one could be reached. To

this time the office has still received no explanation for the failure. He said he was sorry so many people were disappointed, and noted that he couldn't recall a previous July 4th when there were no fireworks at the beach.

The fireworks Wednesday night were supplied by the

Atlas Fireworks company of Jaffrey, N. H., which will present fireworks each Wednesday through August 12 at Hampton Beach, provided the weather is favorable. The Jaffrey company will shoot both set pieces and bombs. Unlike the other firm, the Atlas concern provides its own lumber for the shoot.

# Court Upholds Town Title To North Beach Fishhouse Area

The state Supreme Court Tuesday upheld a lower court ruling that the land on which the "Fish Houses" stand at North Beach belongs to the town of Hampton.

The state's high court affirmed a 1957 decree by Superior Court Justice Dennis E. Sullivan that "The Town of Hampton is the owner of the tract of land comprising the 'Fish House Area.'" Thirteen of the fifteen defendants in the

case appealed the decree to the Supreme Court.

According to a resolution passed at a town meeting in 1950, reaffirmed at the 1951 town meeting, and according to the Rockingham County Superior court decree upheld by the Supreme court, the owners of the fish houses "are enjoined from maintaining on said tract of land their respective buildings which they now occupy, use, or claim to own."

The court found, however, that two of the 13 buildings in question were in possession of Arthur L. Doggett Jr. and Harold Mace with consent and permission of the town, since they were used solely in connection with commercial fishing.

The 1950 action was taken by the town on the premise that the fish houses were originally intended to allow early settlers, who earned their livelihood by fishing, easy access to the ocean waters, but of late years the structures had been remodeled and improved for use as summer cottages.

The 13 defendants based their case on the assumption that the land belonged to the state and not the town. A highway commission report issued in 1900 states that the one-acre tract in question was secured by the state for a future highway and an award of damages paid to the town. The court ruled, however, that the land reverted to the town when it was not used as a highway site.

### Coast Guard Lends Hand In Boating Mishaps Off Shore

The increase in boating in this area is evidenced by the increasing number of calls for assistance of the men of the Hampton Beach Coast Guard station.

During the past week Coast Guardsmen lent aid to five different parties, who ran into boating difficulties along the coast of New Hampshire.

In the most recent case, three Hampton police officers completed the rescue, Monday afternoon, of three Lawrence, Mass. men stranded in an outboard near Great Boar's Head. The stranded men were left just off shore when the motor failed on the boat they had rented from Smith and Gilmore. The party boat Swan from the same pier was unable to locate the outboard and the Coast Guard was called.

When the Coast Guard arrived in the area, however, a sea turn brought a sudden thick fog over the shore and the operator of the rescue boat, BM1 Roland Peakall, was unable to approach them due to the rocks along Boar's Head.

Hampton Police officers John Woodburn, Jon Lovejoy, and Paul Marston located the outboard by calling from shore and waded out far enough to toss the stranded men a rope and haul them in. A serviceman from Smith and Gilmore replaced the motor and took the outboard back to harbor when the fog lifted.

**ASSIST FOUR OTHERS**  
Over the holiday weekend the Coast Guard was called to assist four other disabled boats.

Friday the 36-foot life boat picked up a 14-foot disabled outboard just off Rye Harbor and towed it into harbor with its young passenger. Later the same day the 14-foot outboard Cindy II was towed into

Hampton Harbor from a location one and a half miles southeast of the Coast Guard station, where it was left stranded when the propeller shaft broke. The passengers were Kent Thompson, 16, Harold B. Janes, 38, and Ernest Stutts, 16, all of Hampton. The boat was owned by Thompson's father, A. K. Thompson of 14 Bourn avenue.

The first assist was accomplished by EN2 Roger Elliot and SN J. A. Altman, and the second by BMC Patsy Pappandrea and SN Derek Perry, all of the Hampton Beach station.

A party boat with 25 passengers became disabled near the Isles of Shoals, July 4, when the key on the drive shaft broke. The 30-foot Lady Mae was towed back to Seabrook Harbor by the rescue boat, operated by BM1 Peakall and Harold Keene, Hampton, of the Coast Guard Auxiliary. The party boat, owned by Oscar Eastman of Seabrook, was operated by Charles Eastman, Jr.

A disabled 27-foot cabin cruiser, Hi Neighbor, was taken in tow Sunday afternoon by Chief Pappandrea and Perry in the Coast Guard cutter, four miles southeast of Boar's Head. The cruiser was reported in distress with engine trouble by a party boat.

Home port for the cabin cruiser, owned by Ethel Donovan of North Andover, Mass., was on the Merrimac river. The Hampton Guardsmen towed her within half a mile of the Plum Island Coast Guard station where a 40-foot rescue boat from that station relieved the Hampton boat and towed the disabled craft into Newburyport Harbor. The Hi Neighbor was operated by Donald Donovan, also of North Andover.

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

Starting this Friday evening weekly square dances will be held at the Hampton Beach state bath house, sponsored by the Seacoast Region Square Dance association.

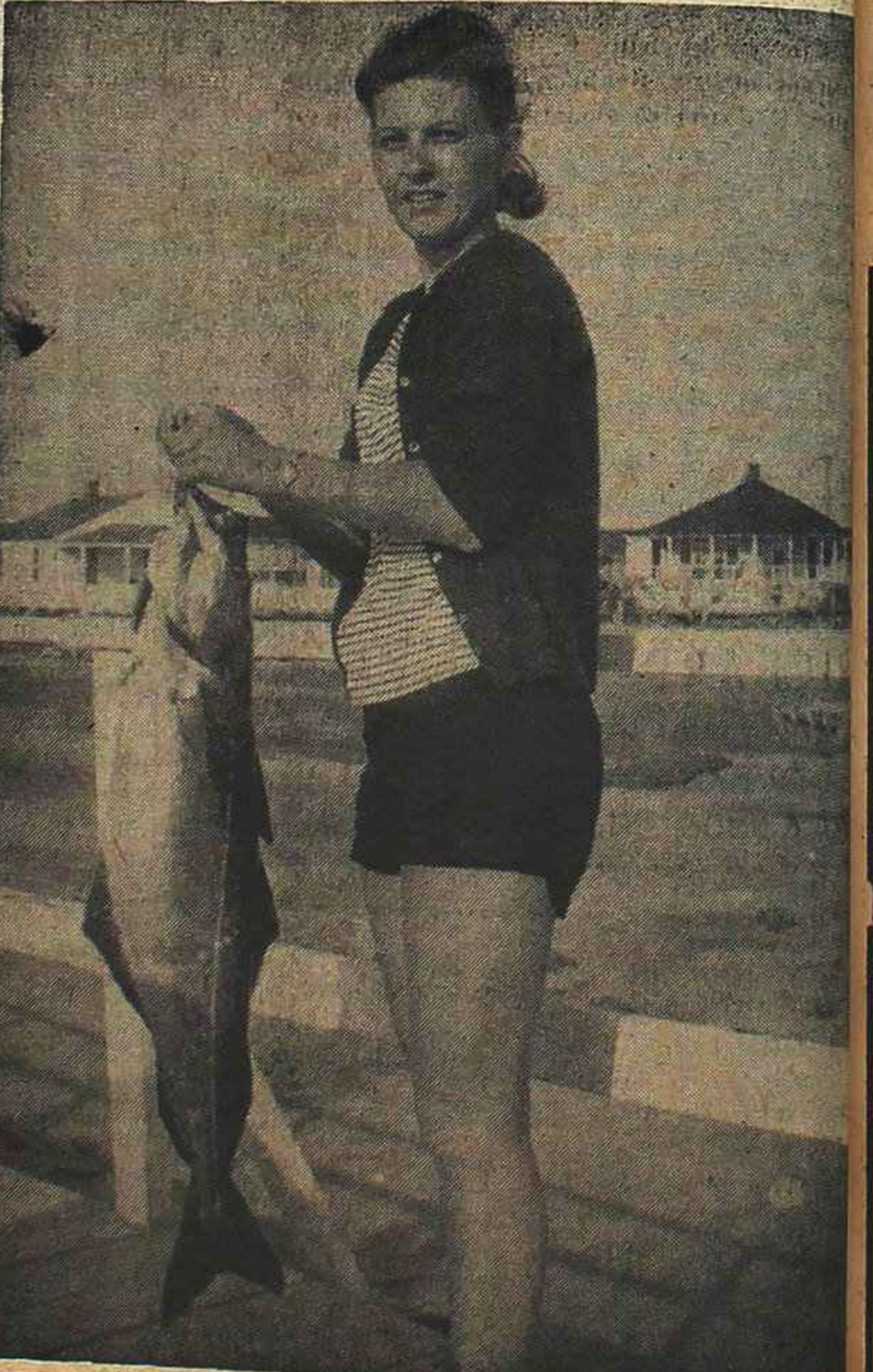

## Portable Short Wave Radio Proves Worth Over Holiday

The base station radio unit at Hampton Beach police headquarters failed Saturday evening at the height of the holiday traffic, but the portable base station from the town office was rushed to the beach in a matter of minutes to restore communications.

Without the base unit, headquarters is unable to direct the patrol cars. Four patrols were out Saturday night and without radio contact Chief of Police John J. Malek would have been unable to direct patrols to specific points at the beach as complaints came in.

The portable unit, which was moved in temporarily, was purchased for the town office last winter to permit radio communications between the town office and units of the public works fleet, fire and police. The police base station is being repaired this week and will be in working order again before the weekend, Town Manager John P. Batchelder said.

Having the portable unit available may have prevented a number of hazards, Batchelder said. Traffic was bumper to bumper from the north shore to Salisbury from early Saturday evening until after 11 p. m., police reported. Local police kept traffic moving through Hampton Beach and no accidents of consequence were reported, although patrols answered several calls to restore order disturbed by a few of the thousands of pedestrians on the streets of Hampton Beach.

To this excellent cast add the directing technique of Alfred Christie, the organizational ability of stage manager Fred Hoskins and the set designing

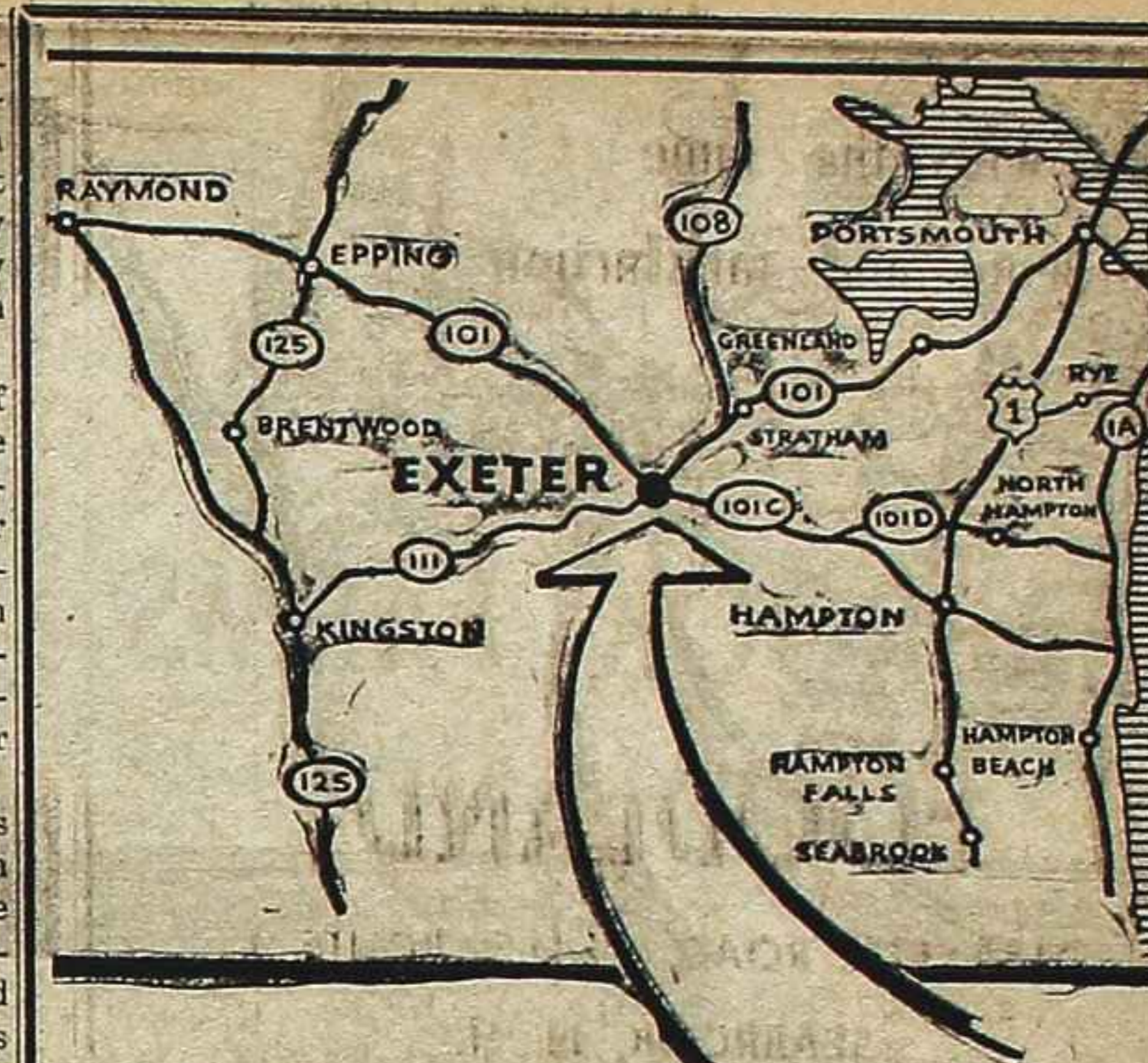
genius of young Robert Winkler and you are treated to a worthy stage production that went off smoothly and snappily and which kept the extremely funny lines popping out from all sides.

## N. H. Second In Nation For Sale Of Hunting, Fishing Licenses

The popularity of hunting and fishing in New Hampshire as a form of outdoor recreation is substantiated by a report entitled, "Statistics on Outdoor Recreation" by Marion Clawson, published by Resources for the Future, Inc. of Washington, D. C.

A survey of hunting and fishing in the United States made in 1955 by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service revealed that 21% of all people either hunted or fished and 35% of all households included one or more persons who either hunted or fished. The survey showed that fishing was more popular with both men and women than was hunting. Both sports were more popular with persons living in rural areas, undoubtedly due in part to the fact that they were more conveniently available. For the most part, hunting and fishing are activities of younger people. The highest per cent of fishing was in the teen-age bracket with young adults close behind, and the percentage declining with advancing age. Hunting was
