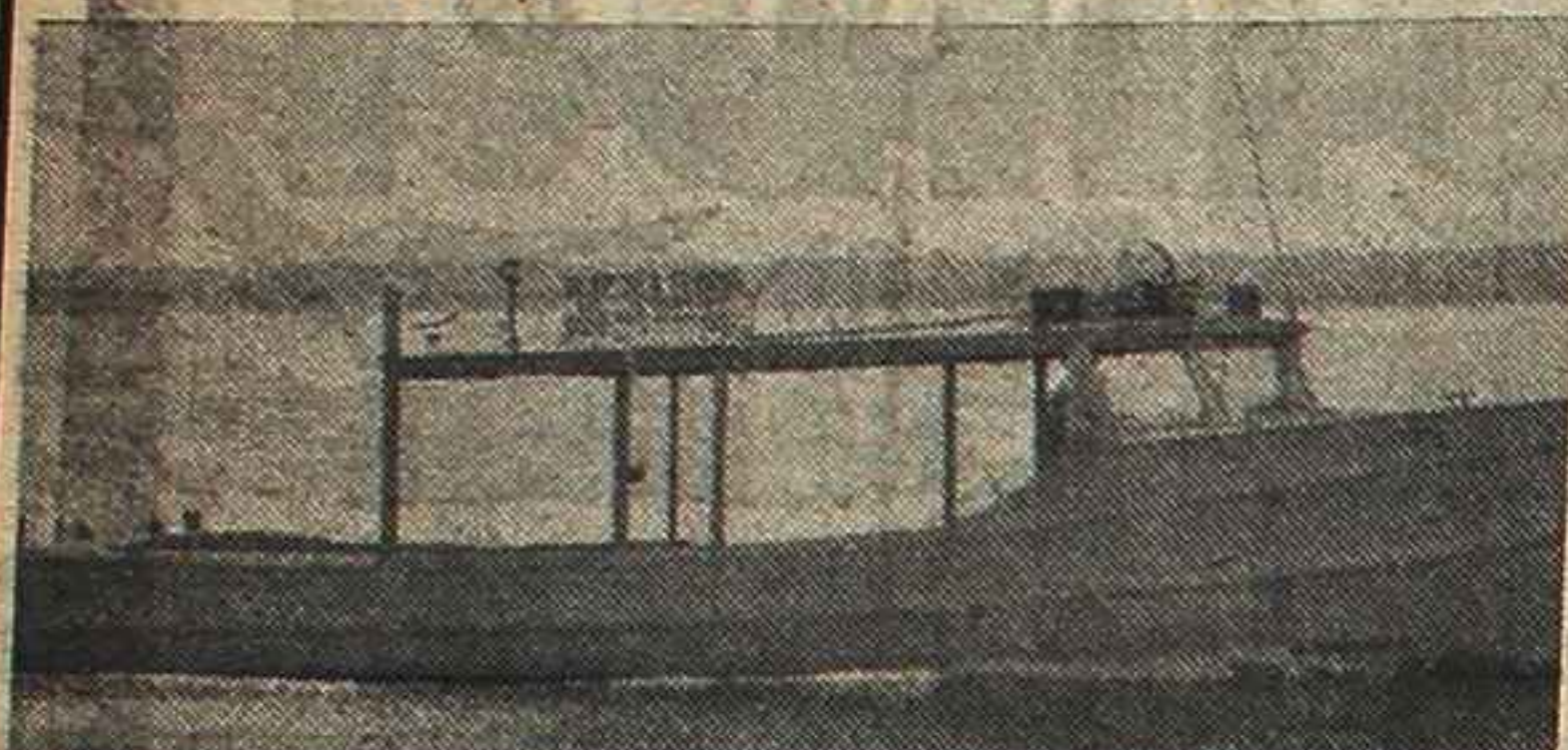

Seek Direct Bus Routes

A delegation of officials from Hampton Beach attended a hearing in Boston Wednesday in an effort to clear the way for direct bus routes from New York and Boston to Hampton Beach.

Donald A. Ring, chairman of the board of selectmen, John J. Dineen, president of the Chamber of Commerce, and William I. Elliot, Chamber secretary, appeared at the hearing before the Interstate Commerce commission in favor of a franchise for direct bus service into Hampton Beach.

For some time now Trailways bus lines has been seeking a franchise for a subsidiary line to operate regular buses on a direct route between New York and Hampton Beach, but other bus franchises have raised legal tangles in their efforts.

At the present time buses between Boston and Hampton Beach are required to take an indirect route via Lawrence, Mass. They are not permitted

to take on or discharge passengers in a great many of the towns along the route, and there are a number of towns where the buses may not pass through at all, according to the present franchise arrangement.

No word has yet been received on the result of the hearing.

Miss Hampton Beach To Be Selected July 28

Directors of the Chamber of Commerce voted Tuesday night to hold the Miss Hampton Beach contest indoors and charge admission this year for the first time in the history of the pageant.

Chamber president John J. Dineen listed a number of reasons for the change to an indoor setting for the season's major attraction. He said in previous years the bandstand has proved to be an inadequate stage for the selection of a beauty queen from 30 or more contestants.

The pageant will be held Tuesday, July 28, at 8 p.m. in the Casino ballroom, Dineen said. In addition to providing a better setting for the selection of the 1959 queen, the change to an indoor program will bring the Miss Hampton Beach pageant more closely in line with other beauty contests, including the Miss America contest, Dineen said.

Besides avoiding the risk of poor weather, the new plans will eliminate the crowding of spectators into the street, William I. Elliot, Chamber secretary added. He said the pageant in previous years drew the largest crowd of spectators of the season and that crowded streets for a period of several hours created traffic problems.

Elliot said there was a possibility that the Miss New England contest, previously held indoors, would be held at the bandstand this year. The Miss New England pageant is scheduled for August 19.

Ted Herbert and his orchestra will provide the music for the Miss Hampton Beach pageant

and for general dancing following the selection of the 1959 queen. The 1958 queen, Miss Carolyn Komant, will reign over the pageant. The crowning of the new queen will take place at the Coronation Ball August 26.

Chairman of a five-man panel of judges for the contest will

be Maurice Murphy, administrative assistant to Governor Wesley Powell. The other judges have not yet been announced.

Some 25 to 30 contestants are expected to enter the contest this year. Well over a dozen have submitted application already and many others have requested application blanks.

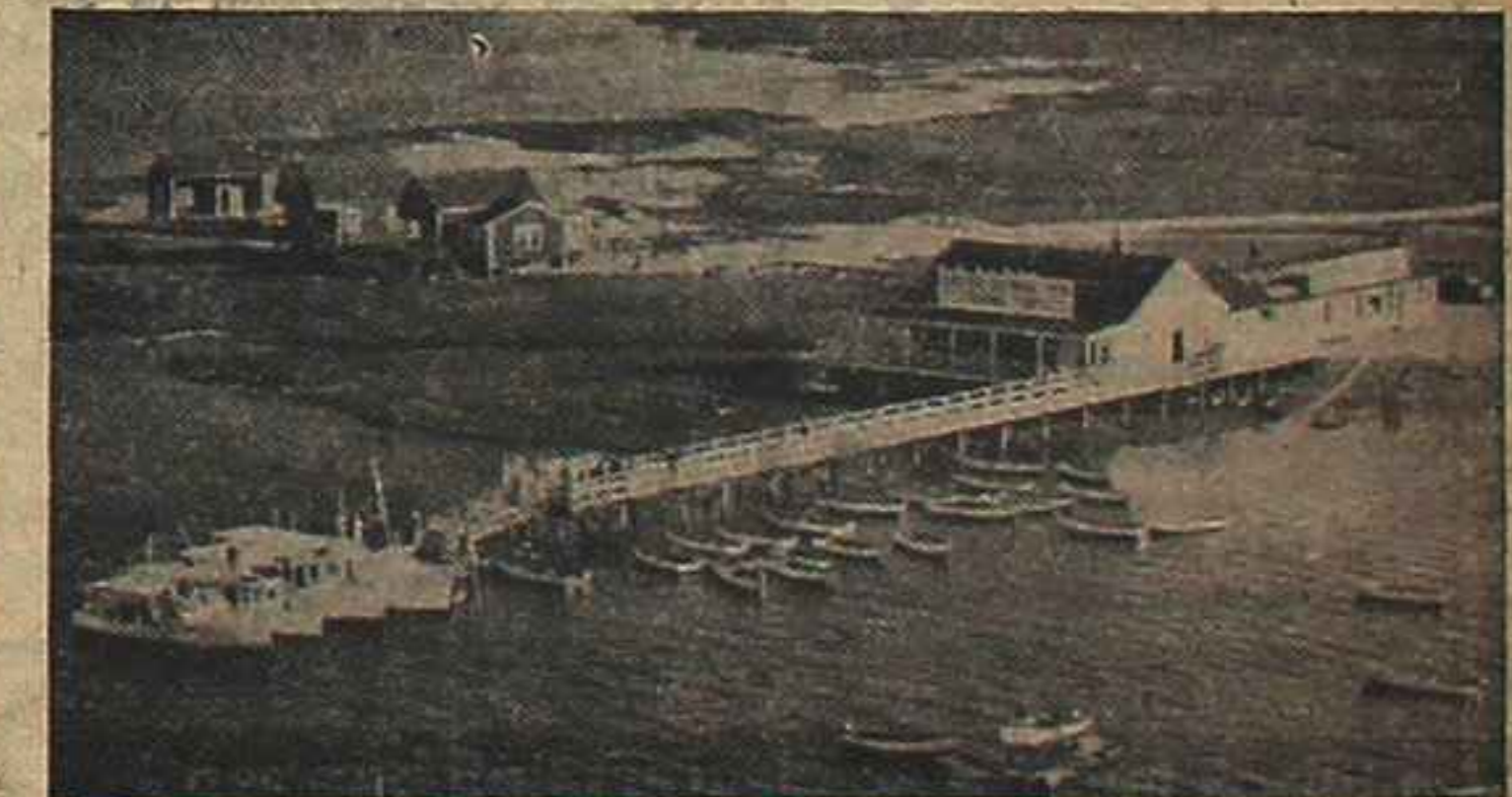

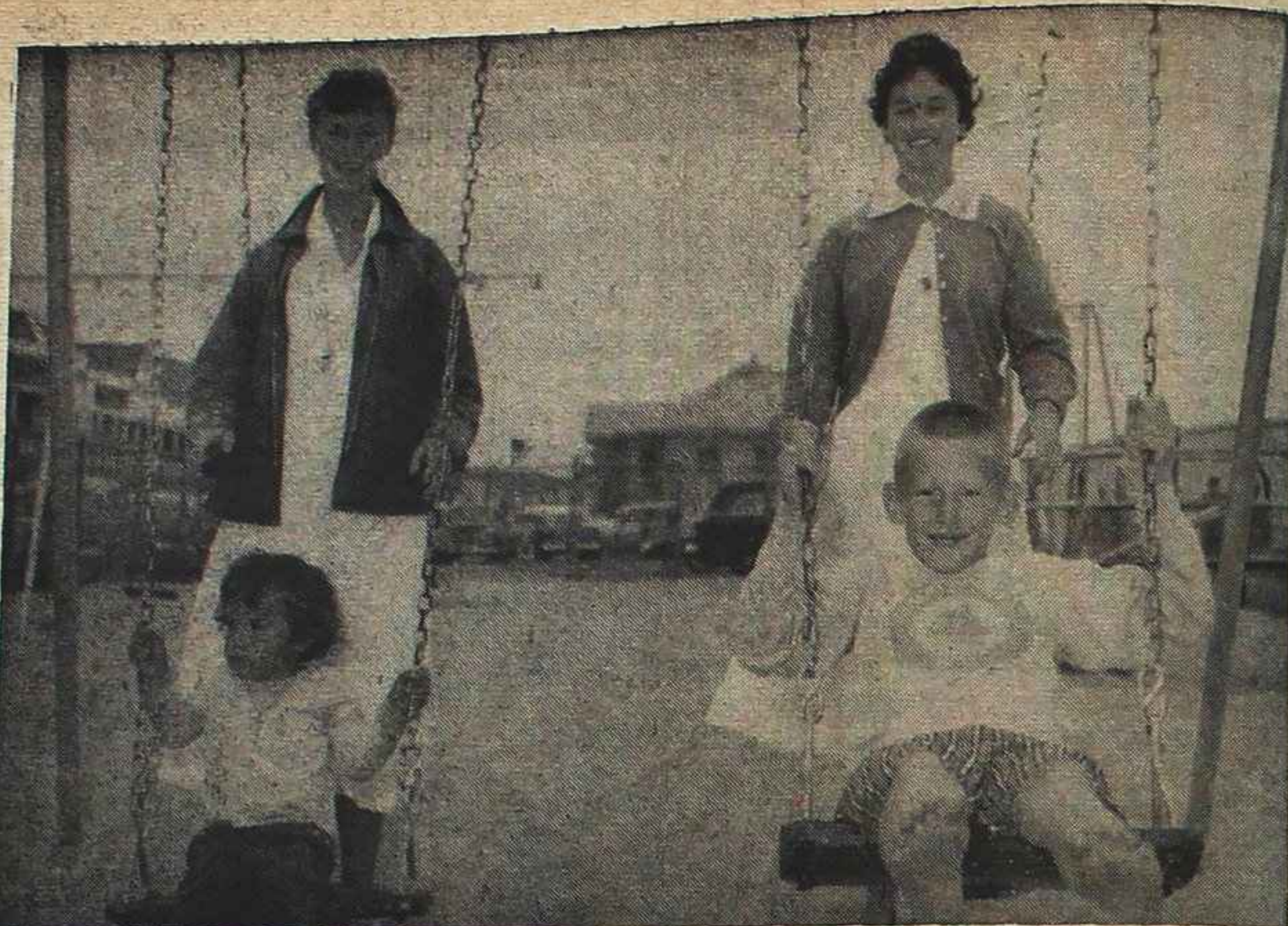
Boating as a sport has gained tremendously in popularity throughout the nation.

Here in New Hampshire a 41% increase in boat registrations has been realized since 1950. A total of 32,643 boats—both inboards and outboards—were registered by the Public Utilities Commission in 1958 as compared to a total registration of 13,332 in 1950.

Registrations for 1959 are currently running about 1,000 ahead of registrations received to the same date last year which seems to indicate that this season there will be more boats than ever on New Hampshire's lakes.

Boating is a good, clean, healthy sport, and a safe one—if common sense is employed. In consideration of the number of boats on the water, accidents are very few. Accidents which involve property damage of \$50 or more, or personal injury, must be reported

to the Public Utilities Commission. In 1958 only thirteen accidents were reported, with two deaths and three injuries. Nevertheless, the New Hampshire Fish and Game department, whose conservation officer force has the responsibility of recovering drowning victims, joins with the Public Utilities Commission in stressing the need for safe boating practices. One of the main things to remember is to cling to the boat if it overturns or capsizes. Many drownings are caused by persons trying to swim to shore.

Overloading is another cause of accidents. As a matter of

fact, a drowning which recently caused by overloading the boat, caused by overloading the boat.

Keep an eye on the weather and head for shore if a storm is imminent. Don't operate near swimming areas.

With all the powerful motors on the market it is a temptation to use big motors on small boats. Don't! Drive your boat in a reasonable and courteous manner. Know the navigation laws and obey them. One regulation of which boat operators should be aware is that there must be two persons aboard any boat which is pulling a water skier — one to operate the boat and one to

observe the skier. The best rule of all is: **USE YOUR COMMON SENSE!**

**Hampton Area Not
Wettest In June**

Final precipitation totals for June showed the Hampton area was not the wettest nor the driest spot in New England last month.

Ralph Sanborn measured 5.45 inches of rainfall during the month at his home in Hampton Falls. This figure compares with a total of 8.63 inches in Boston and 3.68 in Concord.

The last two months have brought opposite extremes in precipitation statistics. Last month was the wettest June in a decade and the previous month was the driest May in a decade with only .77 inches of rainfall. The May total was erroneously reported as .33 inches last week.

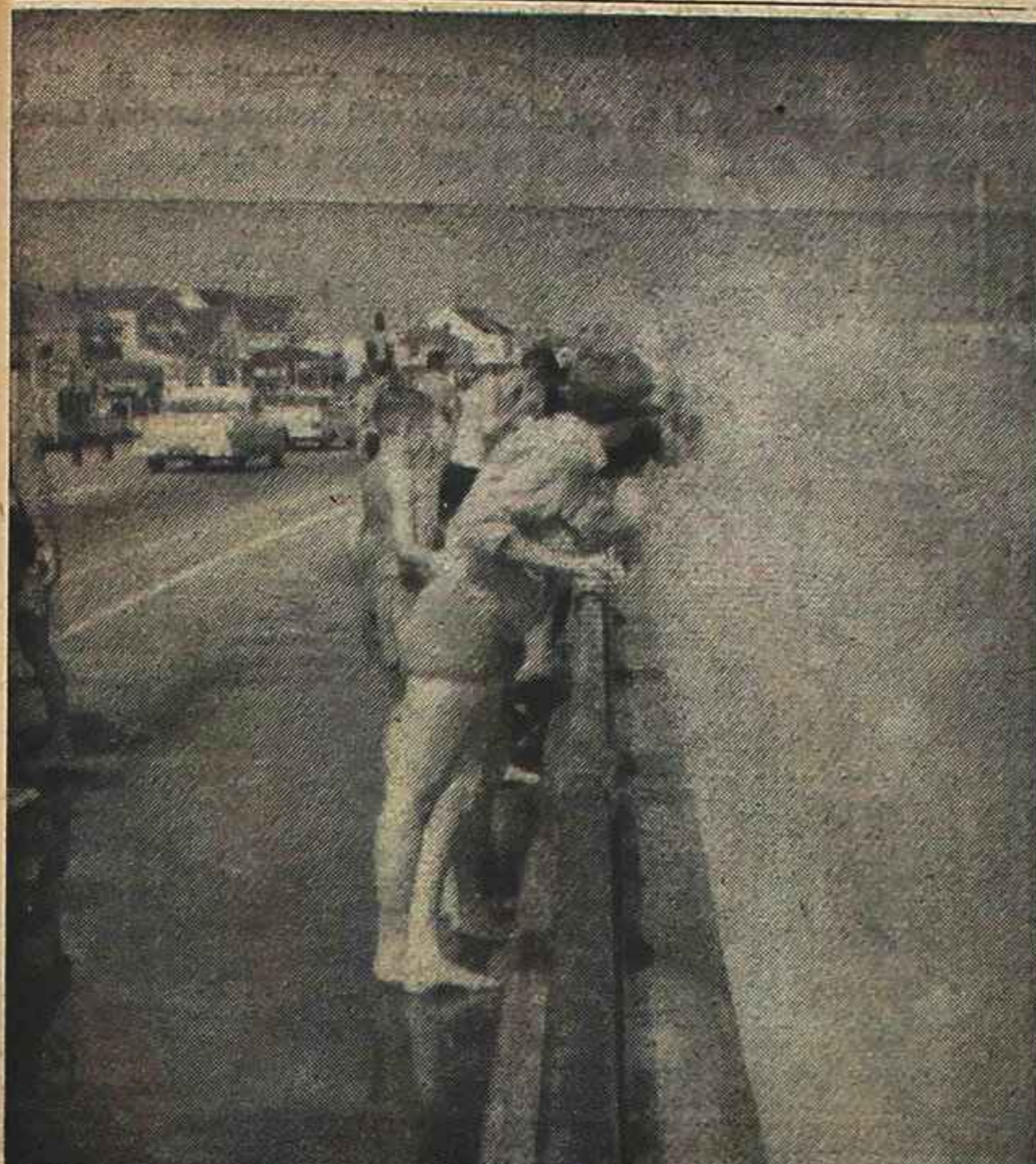

Kiwanians Enjoy Beach Lobster Feed

The regular Monday evening dinner meeting of Hampton's Kiwanis Club was held this week at Community Hall in the Hampton Beach fire station with 33 Kiwanians and guests present.

A lobster dinner was served by Program Chairman Perley George, assisted by Kiwanian Al Corning and Fireman Henry LeDoux. Three visitors were present representing two Mon-

treal clubs. King Lion Bill Lessard of the Hampton Lions club was also included among the guests.

Following dinner, Kiwanians witnessed a demonstration of the fire department's new aerial ladder and then listened to an interesting talk by Merton Webber of Windham, one of ten district chiefs of the New Hampshire Forestry De-

partment's corps of fire wardens.

Introduced by chairman Perley George, Mr. Webber gave an outline of his duties and an interesting account of his experiences in preventing and suppressing forest fires and forest fire hazards in his district, which includes all of Rockingham county.

He said that while fifteen or twenty years ago, forest fires

averaged two hundred or more per year, now they average less than 100 in that time and last year there were only 47. While lumber operations used to account for 30 per cent of all fires, now they cause only 3 per cent, the great reduction being due to the adoption of less hazardous practices in the business.

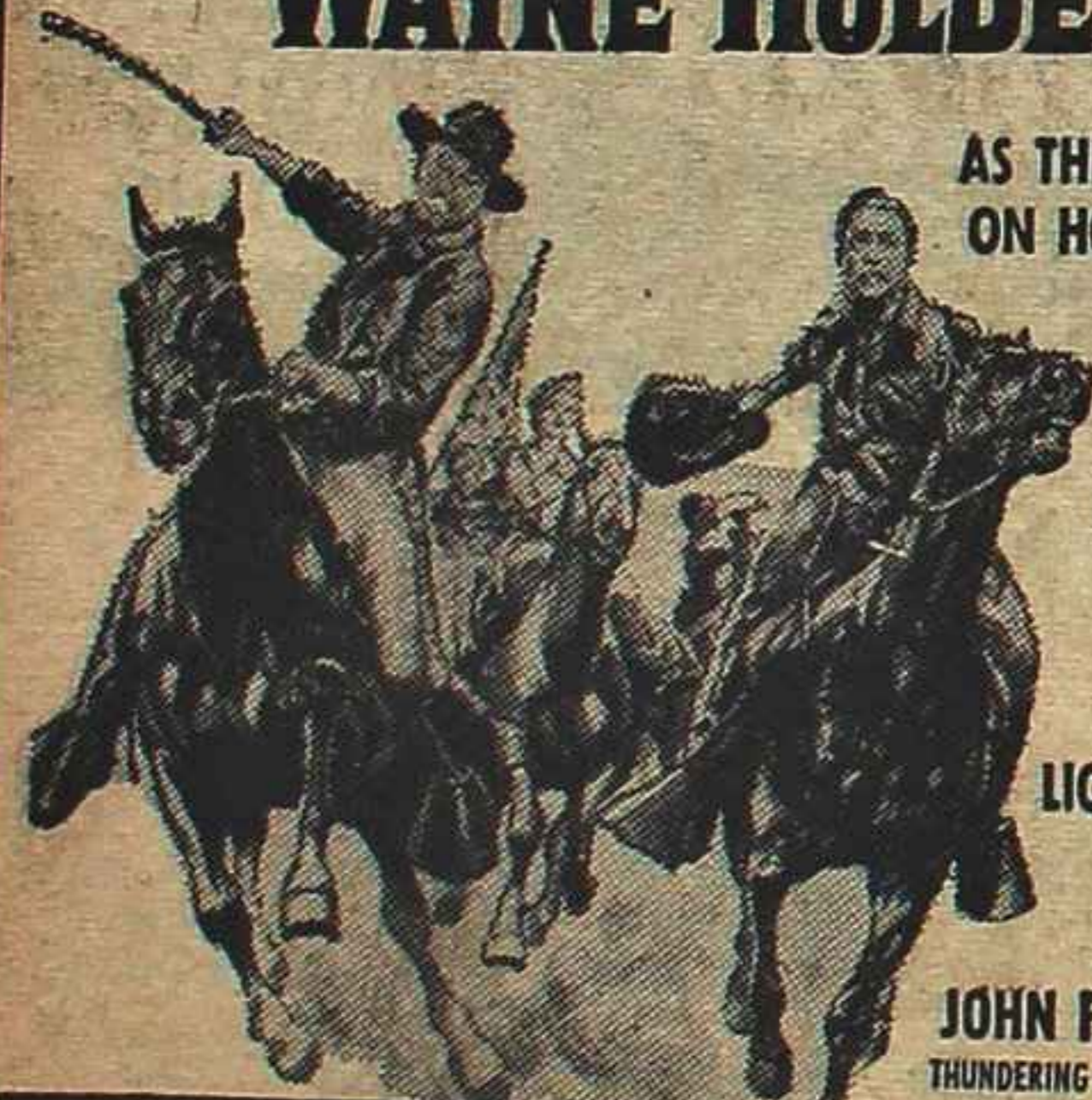

Beach Parking Areas

The largest number of cars ever to park in the town's Ashworth avenue parking lot were packed in July 4th.

The capacity of the lot is now 1,200, but with some turnover, the superintendent reported a total of 1,593 cars parked in the lot Saturday.

Town Manager John P. Batchelder said the lot was recently expanded to make parking facilities for an additional 300 cars.

A total of 3,398 cars were parked in the municipally operated Ashworth lot over the three-day weekend. This number fell 715 cars short of last year's Fourth of July total due to the holiday falling on Saturday. Although both town lots were filled to capacity much of the day Saturday, the demand for parking space was much lighter Friday than last year when the holiday fell on Friday.

**Beach Construction Ups
'59 Building to \$764,200**

The building trend in Hampton continued to increase during the second quarter of this year, topping first three months figures by \$60,000 to reach a total of \$764,200 for the first half of 1959.

Building Inspector F. Alfred Janvrin said construction spending this year was running well ahead of last year. Not until the first week in October last year, did new construction pass the \$4-million mark.

Janvrin noted that there was only a slight increase this year in the number of new buildings and alteration projects, but the construction this year is of a substantially more expensive nature.

For example, 26 building permits were issued by Janvrin in June of 1958 and 26 again, this June. The total building costs last month, however, was

nearly double the figure for June, 1958 with more money going into year round houses and less into inexpensive cottages and alterations.

Permits were issued last month for the construction of nine year-round houses in the village section of Hampton seven permits for beach cottages, and 10 permits for alterations or additions. Spending on the 26 building projects for which permits were issued in June totaled \$152,750, compared with \$84,150 for 26 permits issued in June, 1958.

The largest single construction program approved by Janvrin in the last half year was the addition to Lamie's Tavern, set at \$125,000 in March. To date, 127 building permits have been issued this year, compared with 100 in the first half of last year.

Although building figures this year are far ahead of last year's recession slump, they still fall short of the 1957 boom in which nearly \$300,000 was

spent on construction in the month of June and slightly over \$1 million in the first six-month period.

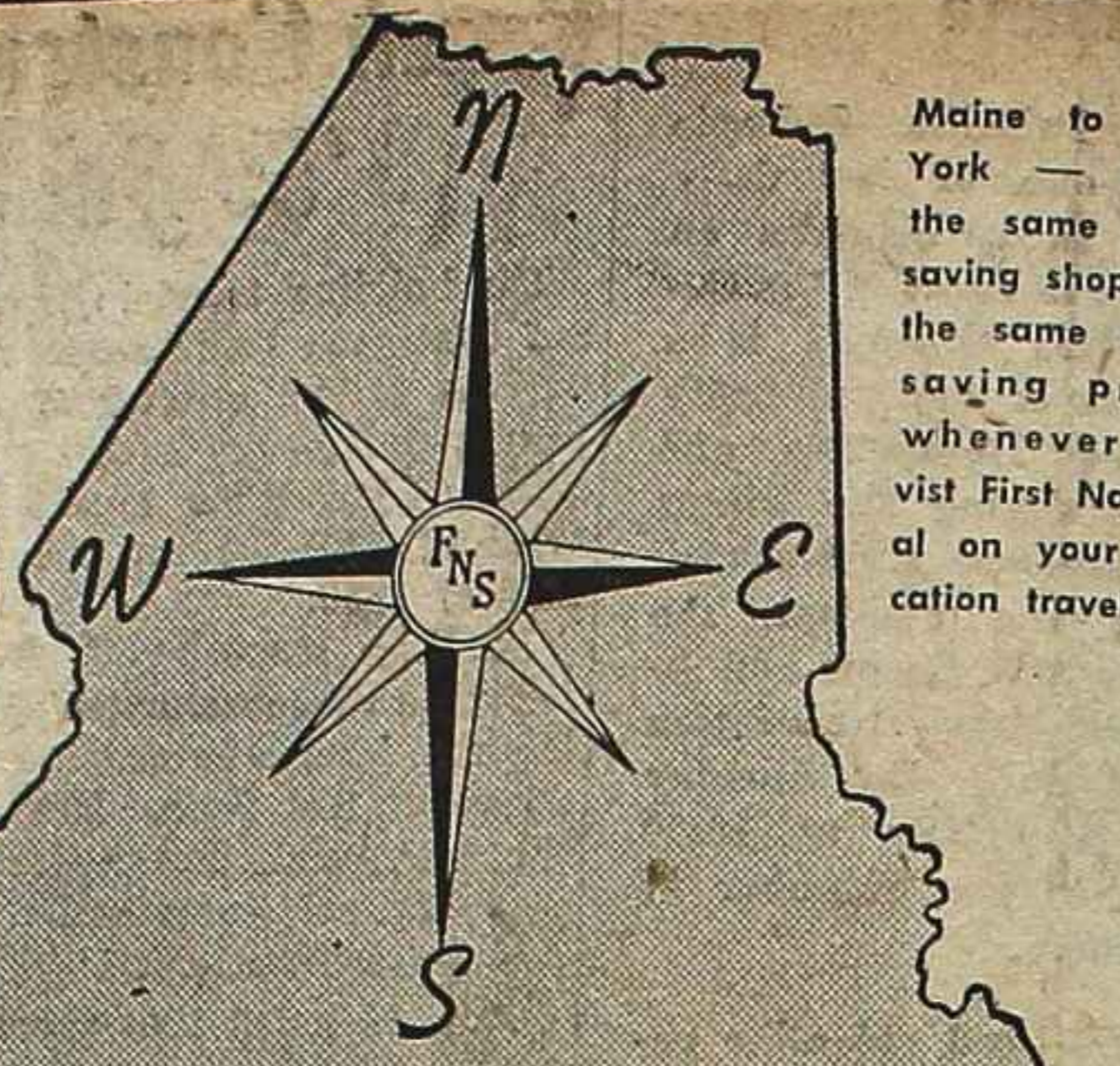

New Method Developed To Prevent Water Accidents

The New Hampshire Fish and Game department has the responsibility for recovering the bodies of persons who drown in the Granite State's many lakes and ponds.

In 1958 the number of drownings totalled twenty-four. Through June of this year, there have been twelve drownings. Always concerned with ways for preventing water accidents, the department has read with interest of a professor at Georgia Tech, who has developed a simple technique of "drown - proofing" which is making him famous across the country.

Fred R. Lanoue's job is to teach swimming to the young engineers at Georgia Tech. Before a student can get his diploma he must be able to stay afloat for one hour — with his hands tied! Professor Lanoue contends that being able to stay afloat for several hours is more important in an emergency than is the ability to swim.

The average head weighs about fifteen pounds. Even strong swimmers can tire of holding up a load like that. With Lanoue's method the water bears all the weight of the body, including the head. All the swimmer does is raise his mouth or nose above water

long enough and often enough to get air. The drown - proof method was tried out on 57 of the poorest swimmers at Georgia Tech. The average quitting time was 4 hours and 52 minutes. Sixteen of the swimmers stayed afloat 8 hours. Even children as young as five years can be taught to be drown - proof. These are the five steps:

1. You rest with limbs limp, with only the back of the head out of water. It's really relaxing. Soon you start rising, with back up.

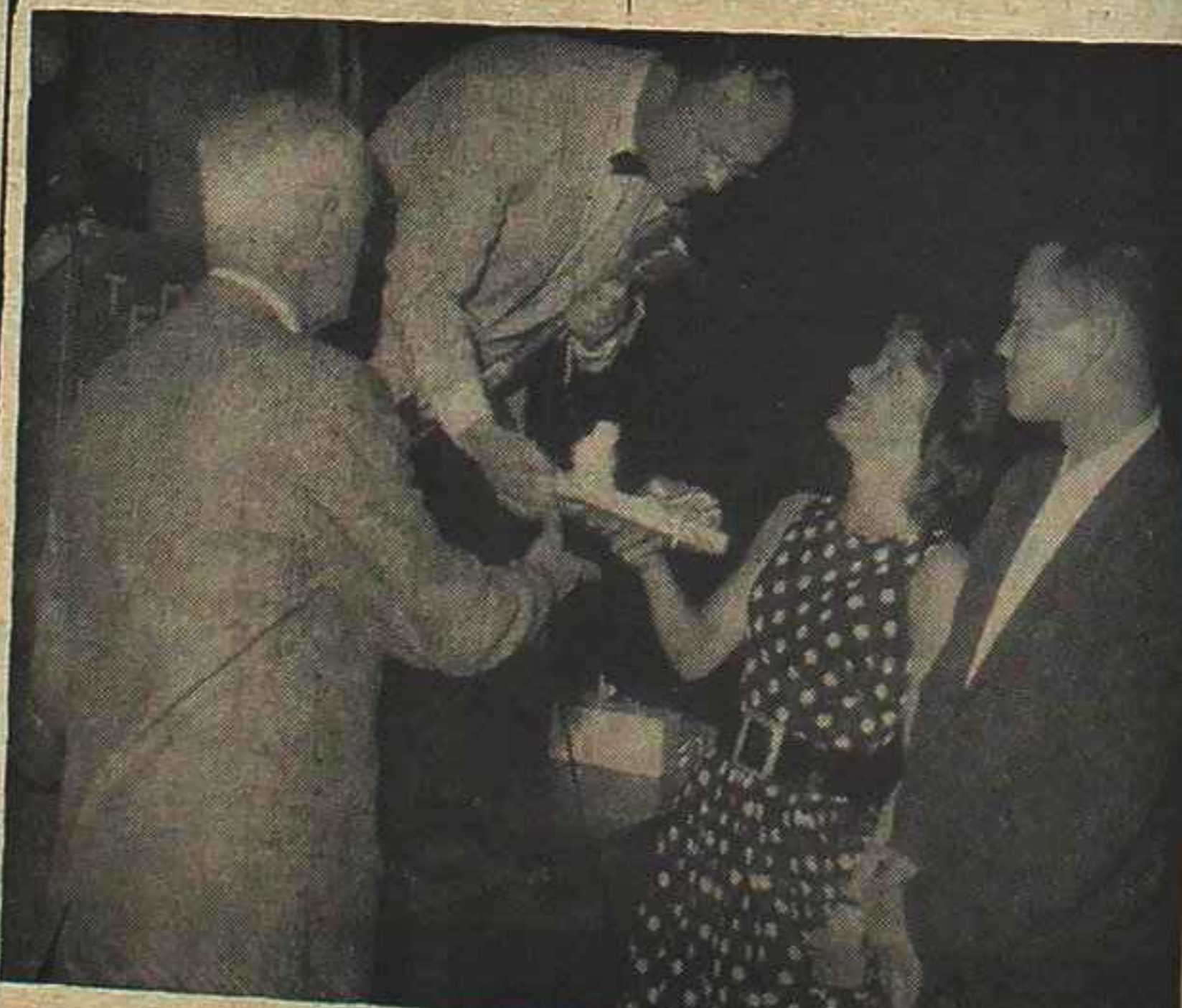
2. Bring arms up to forehead slowly, easily. Be lazy relaxed. There's no rush. Water bears up your weight.

3. Lift head barely above water by kicking one leg slowly. On the way up, breathe sharply through your nose.

4. Spread arms and bring down slowly while you take one slow breath through mouth. Don't gulp. Keep shoulders under.

5. Hold breath, relax and slide back under; let water resistance raise arms for next cycle. Rest, go up again when you need to.

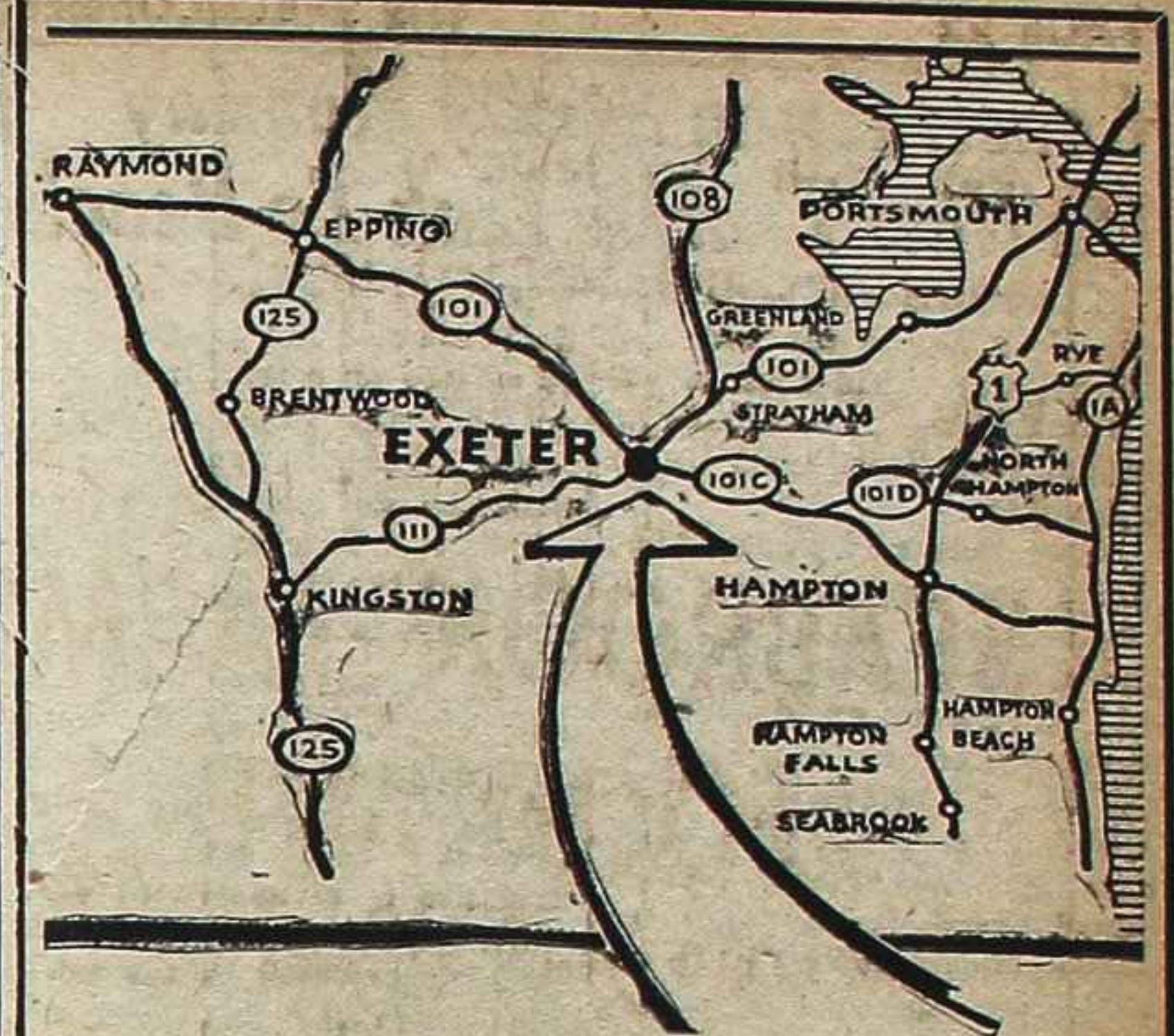

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Construction Starts Monday On New Traffic Link To Beach

Construction will begin Monday, July 20, on the Tide Mill bridge, which will form a major link in the new access road to Hampton Beach from Hampton village.

Word that construction would proceed next week was received from Harold E. Langley of the state Public Works and Highways department Monday. Langley, who designed the \$21,000 bridge, told Town Manager John P. Batchelder that his department has obtained permission to begin the project with funds voted by the legislature in the temporary budget.

Construction had originally been set for June 1, but failure of the legislature to act on the administration's budget, which includes an appropriation for the bridge, delayed the start of the bridge until a temporary budget for July was passed by the legislature just before the new fiscal year began, July 1.

It was uncertain for some time whether the project could be started on a temporary budget, but the highway department obtained approval last week to go ahead with construction. Batchelder said he expected the bridge would be completed in about a week.

The construction will be done by "force account", using the permanent bridge construction crew of the state bridge division. Total cost of the structure is estimated at \$21,000, half of which has already been appropriated by the town. The other half has been appropriated by the state from the Town Road Aid bridge fund.

The bridge is to be 75 feet long and 28 feet wide, utilizing 36-inch steel I-beams as the main supporting beams. The beams were purchased for \$4,000, half their value, by the town when they were declared surplus material after the re-

pair of the Hampton River toll bridge last spring. The town has also acquired the wood piling to be used for the east abutment of the bridge. State engineers found the west abutment, built in 1957 by Homer Johnson, to be satisfactory for the new bridge.

The "temporary" bridge constructed by Johnson in the summer of 1957 collapsed soon after it was built due to an inadequate easterly abutment. Batchelder emphasized that the new bridge is to be a permanent structure and was designed by state engineers.

Batchelder said the town dump would be abandoned and covered over immediately following the completion of the bridge. After that all rubbish from the town, except wooden articles, will be used as fill for the new road across the marsh. Rubbish collected at the beach will be deposited at the beach end of the new road, and rubbish collected up-town will be deposited at the village end of the road. Batchelder said the filling operation would require a little more than a year to complete the road.

The road from the beach end, now more than 500 feet out, was surfaced last month. The smooth surface speeds up operations by the municipal rub-

bish collection crews which use the road as often as 24 times a day during the summer, Batchelder said.

In discussing the need for the road, Batchelder pointed out the necessity of travel between the sewer pumping station on Glade path at the beach and the sewage treatment plant at the end of Tide Mill road. At present the closest route between the two plants is six or seven miles, he said, but the new road will reduce the distance to about one mile. Moreover, he emphasized the importance of the road as an emergency route for police and fire vehicles traveling between the town and beach.

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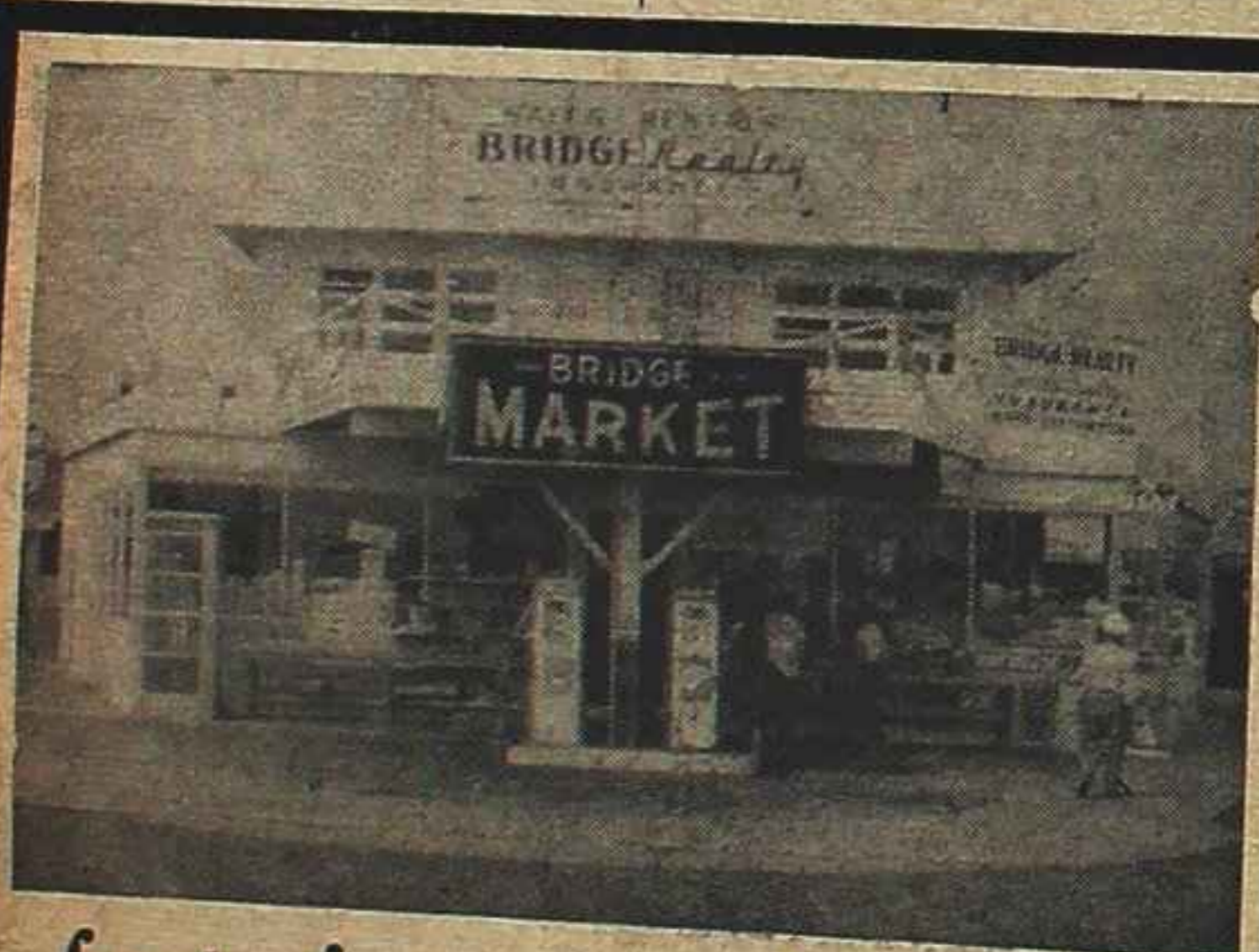
