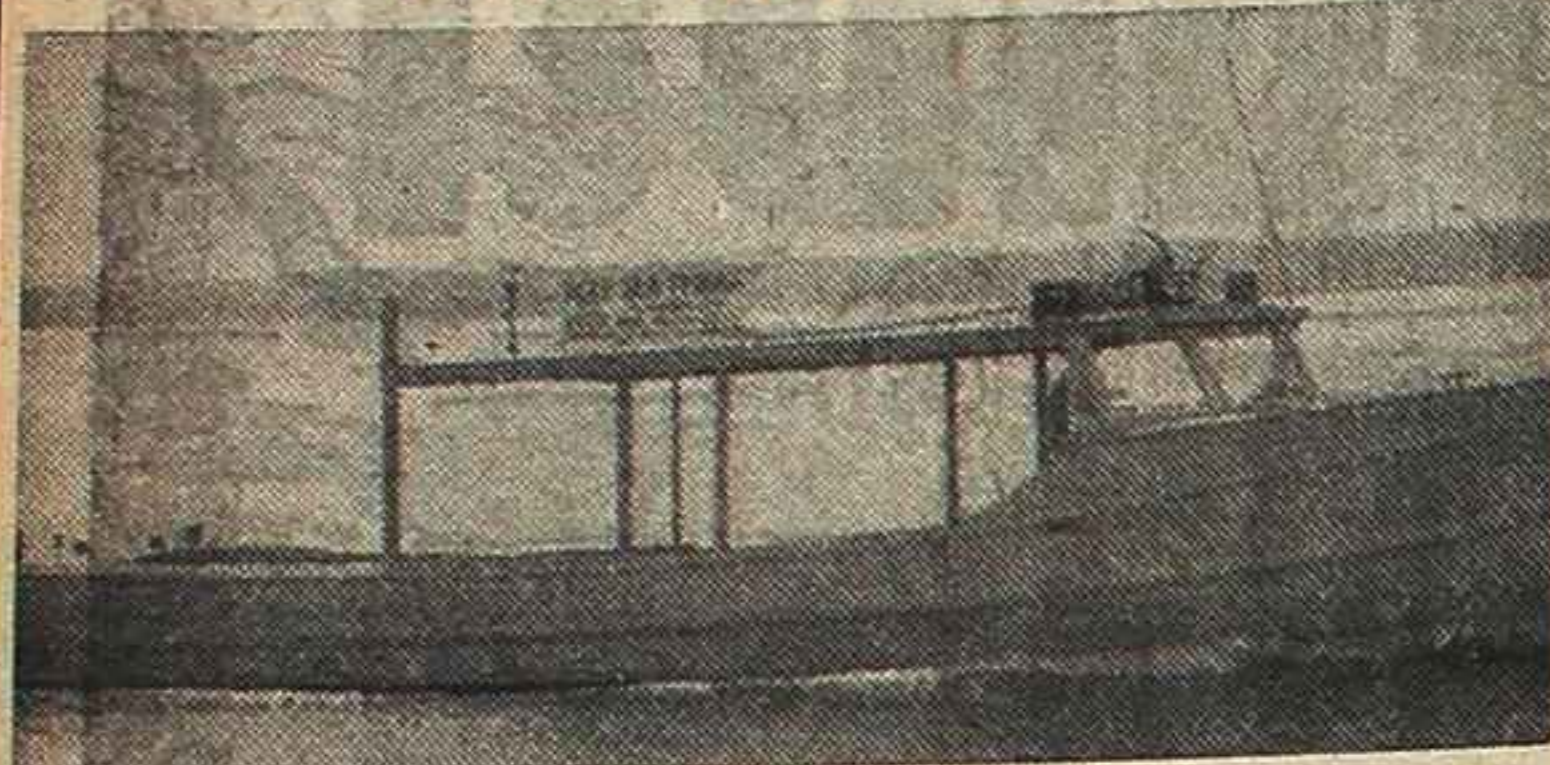

Off Shore Fishing Is Reported Good

Fishing was reported exceptionally good in the waters off Hampton Beach with heavy catches of cod and haddock brought in by fishing parties during the week.

The largest codfish known to be caught this season was hooked by an enthusiastic little fisherman, Dwight G. Smith of North Troy, N. Y., last Monday. The cod weighed 24 pounds and was caught from a Smith and Gilmore party boat. Smith is vacationing here where he is staying at the Penobscot cottages.

Besides Smith, three others joined the Hampton Beach Old Salts club during the last week by bringing in big ones. Ten-year-old Billy Purdie of Manchester, N.H., caught a 17-pound pollack, one pound above the minimum weight for membership in the Old Salts.

Margie Downs of Rochester, N.H., and Maurice Merrill of Bradford, Mass., each hooked haddock exceeding the four-pound minimum for Old Salts recognition. Miss Down's haddock weighed 12 pounds and

Merrill's weighed five and one half pounds.

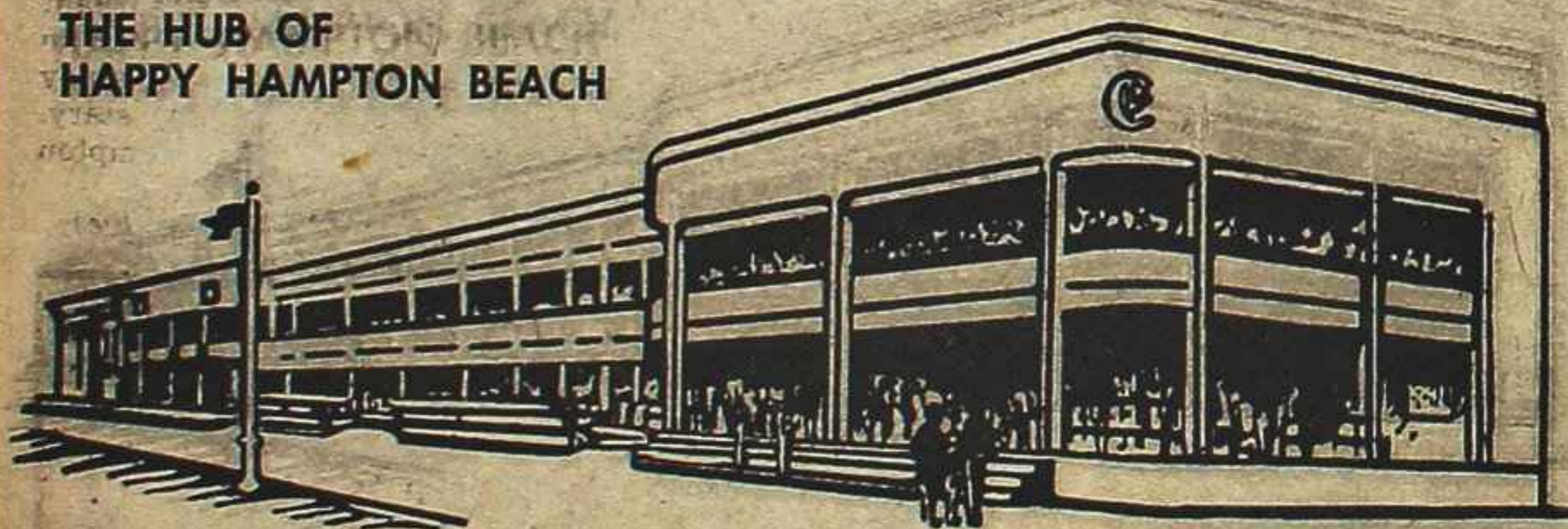

Hearing August 17 On Coast Guard Closing

Proposed changes in the operational facilities of the Coast Guard at Hampton Beach will be aired at a public hearing in the beach fire station at 7 p.m. Monday, August 17.

The changes proposed by the Coast Guard are the abandonment of the present station on the north shore at Hampton Beach and the establishment of a so-called "manned mooring" at the mouth of Hampton River.

Facilities of the manned mooring would include one or two patrol and rescue boats with necessary crews, communications, vehicles and related dock space, storage, office, and other necessities.

In explaining the reason for the changes, Rear Admiral E. J. Roland, commander of the first Coast Guard district, stated:

"In view of the distance over congested roads between the present lifeboat station site and moorings, it is expected that the proposed changes will increase the effectiveness of Coast Guard operations in the Hampton Beach area by concentrating personnel and equipment in

a more advantageous location for observing and rendering assistance to public boating activities."

Commander Roland said anyone interested in the proposal should appear at the public hearing. He urged that any statements be submitted in writing as well as orally and said letters could also be sent to his office, 1400 Custom House, Boston 9, Mass.

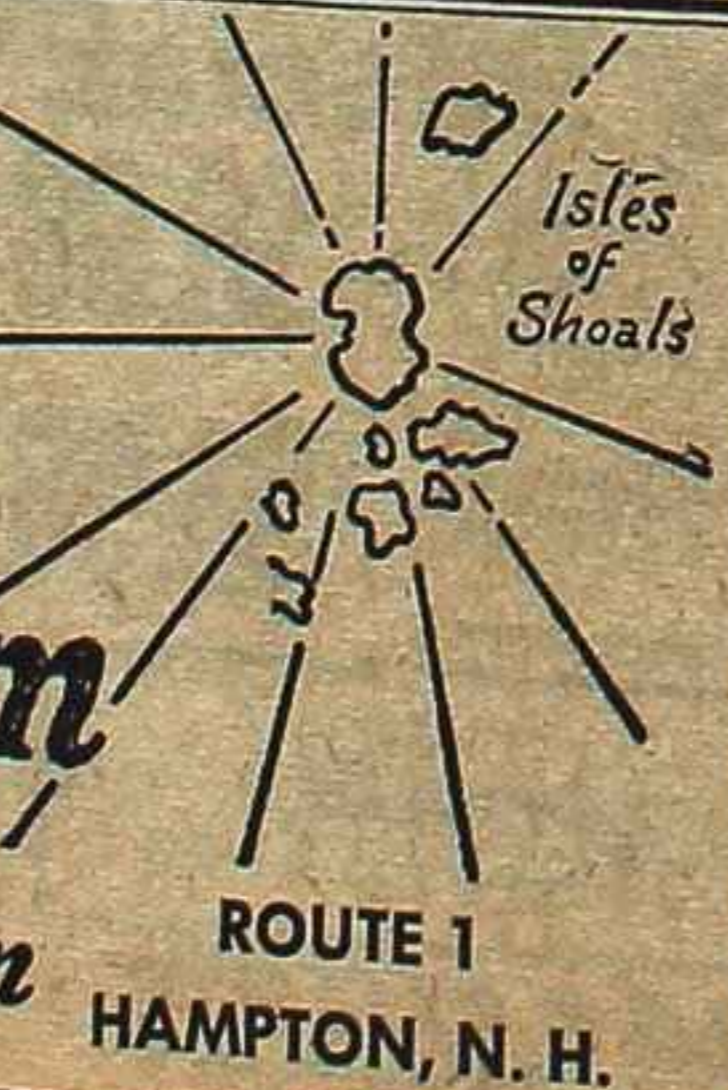

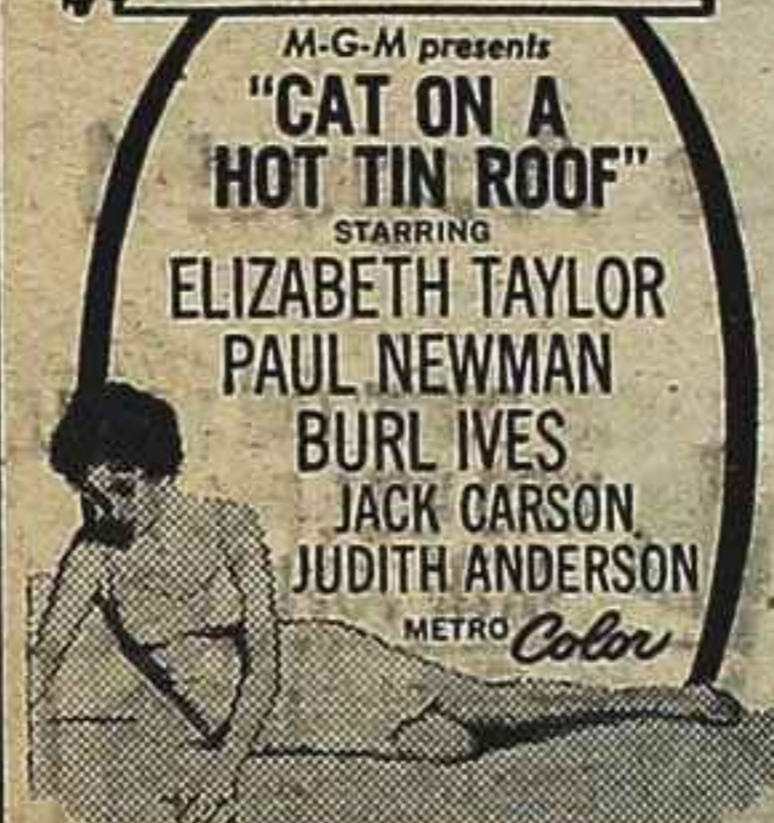

Playhouse Cast Tops In 'Separate Tables'

Terence Rattigan's fine, dramatic thriller, "Separate Tables" is being beautifully performed and produced at the Hampton Playhouse this week with Joe O'Brien and Maggie Owens in the starring roles backed up by an outstanding supporting cast. An appreciative opening night audience gave the cast five curtain calls plus several outbursts of spontaneous applause during the show.

"Separate Tables" is something unusual in the theatre in that it is actually two plays performed in the same boarding house setting with the same supporting cast but the lead players take on completely different characters in the second act, or "play", in an entirely separate story.

This twist creates an acting challenge which Joe O'Brien and Maggie Owens measured up to with great success. Joe O'Brien goes from a violent, ardent newspaper writer in the first half of the production to a plustering, phony woman-fearer in this second character. Miss Owens undergoes a radical switch from a glamorous, icy female to a mousey, introverted old maid.

The key of success for any production is the supporting cast—and the Hampton Playhouse version of "Separate Tables" received some exceptionally fine performances. Sylvia Davis, who plays the manager of the hotel, is the hub around whom the plots revolve. She is the center of the wheel of odd spokes and displayed a real understanding of her sensitive role.

Madge West, as the gossip-mongering, domineering mother, is making her first appearance of the season at the Hampton Playhouse and shows off her fine talent for difficult character roles, while Lucy Landau, whose face is most familiar to TV watchers of "Name That Tune", amply provides the comic relief in this dramatic play.

Other members of the cast providing strong, well-balanced support were Harry Millard and Nancy Watts, as the Strattons; Patricia Sloan, as Lady Matheson; Alan Joseph as Mr. Fowler; Sally Luger, as Mabel; and perky Mary Doyle, as the hip-swinging waitress.

Robert Winkler's setting added a great deal to the atmosphere of the drama and efficient directing by Frank Lyon resulted in a smooth, fast and inspired performance on opening night. "Separate Tables" is an evening of intense drama and excellent theatre. —HLP

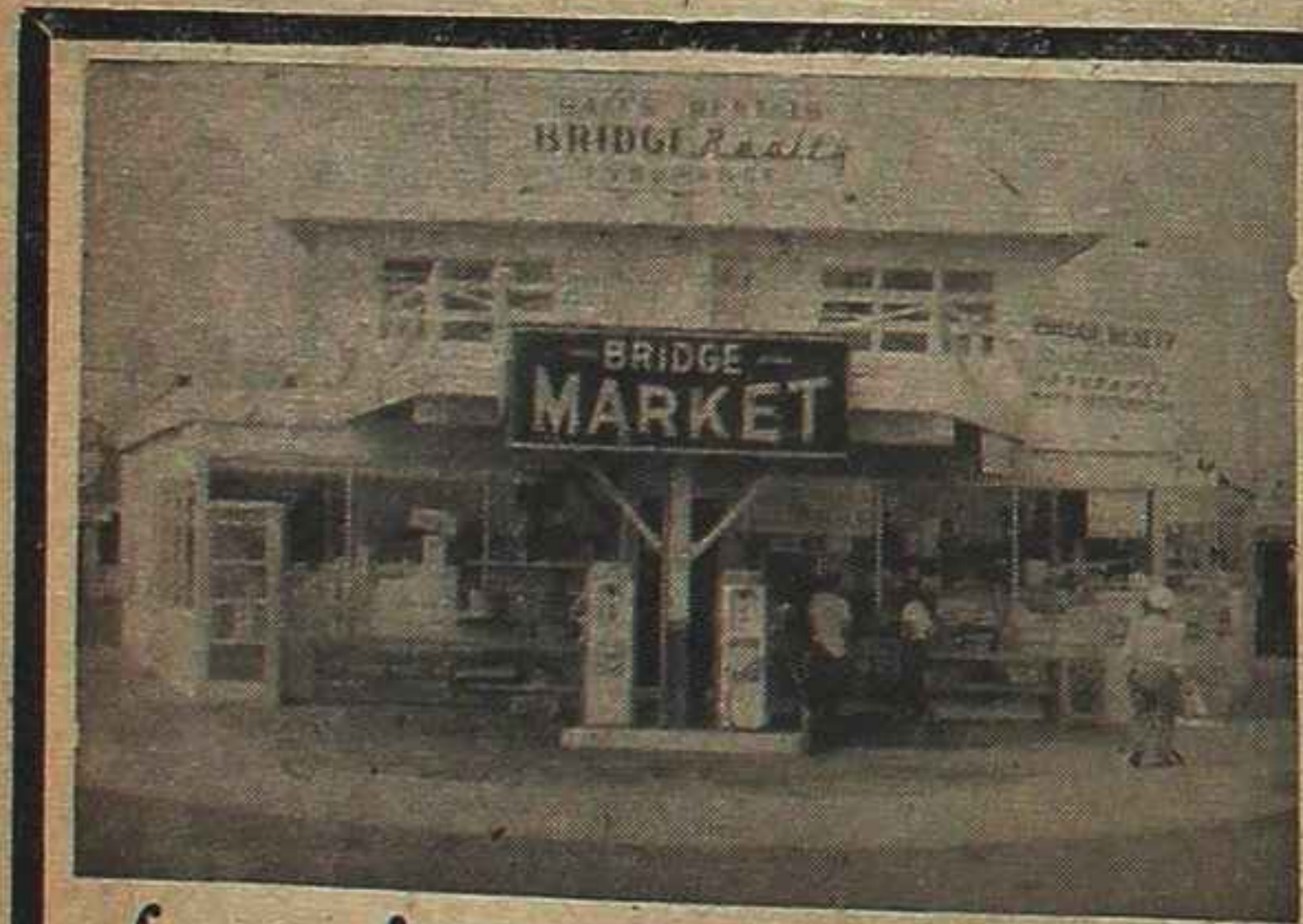

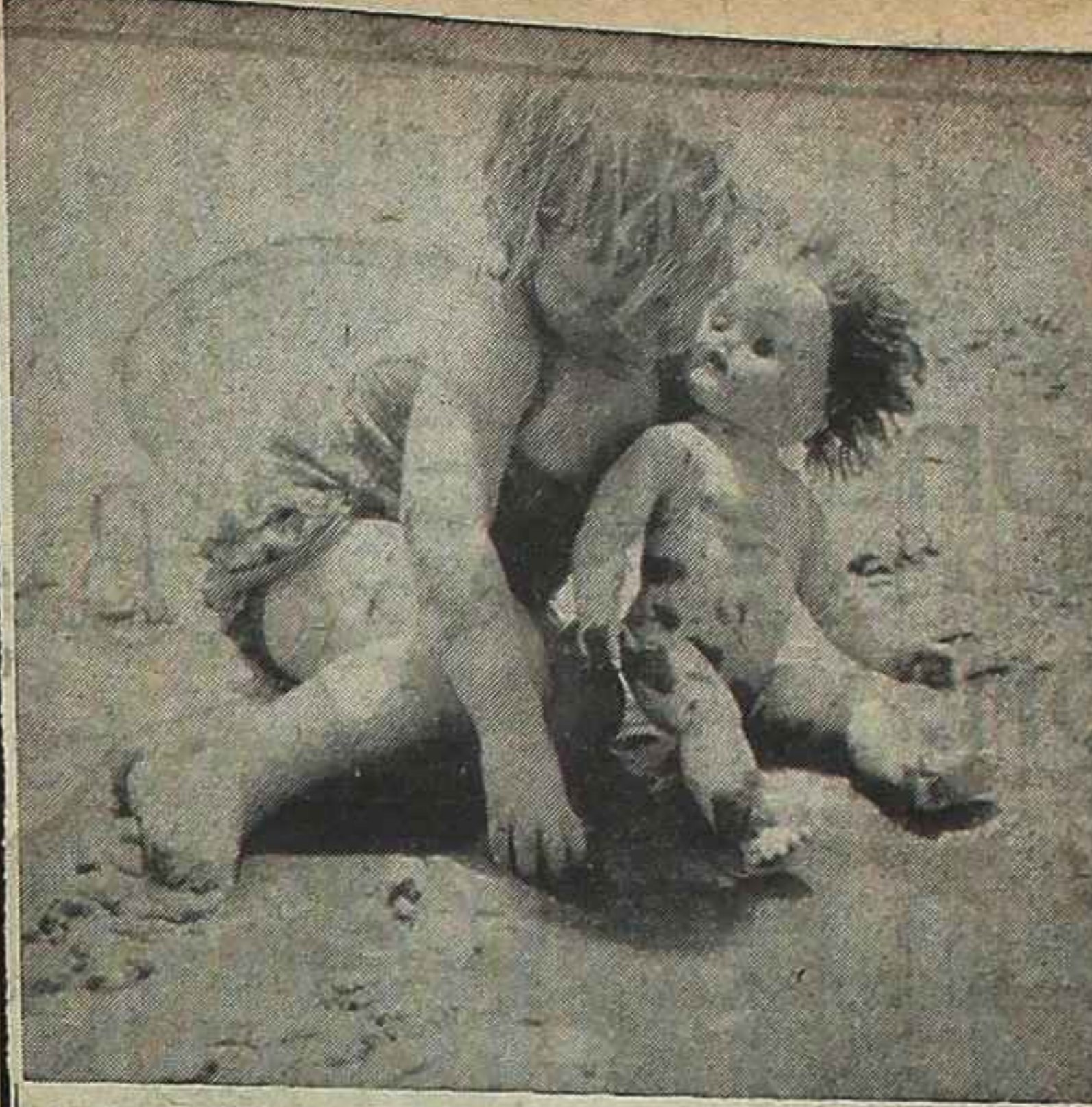
