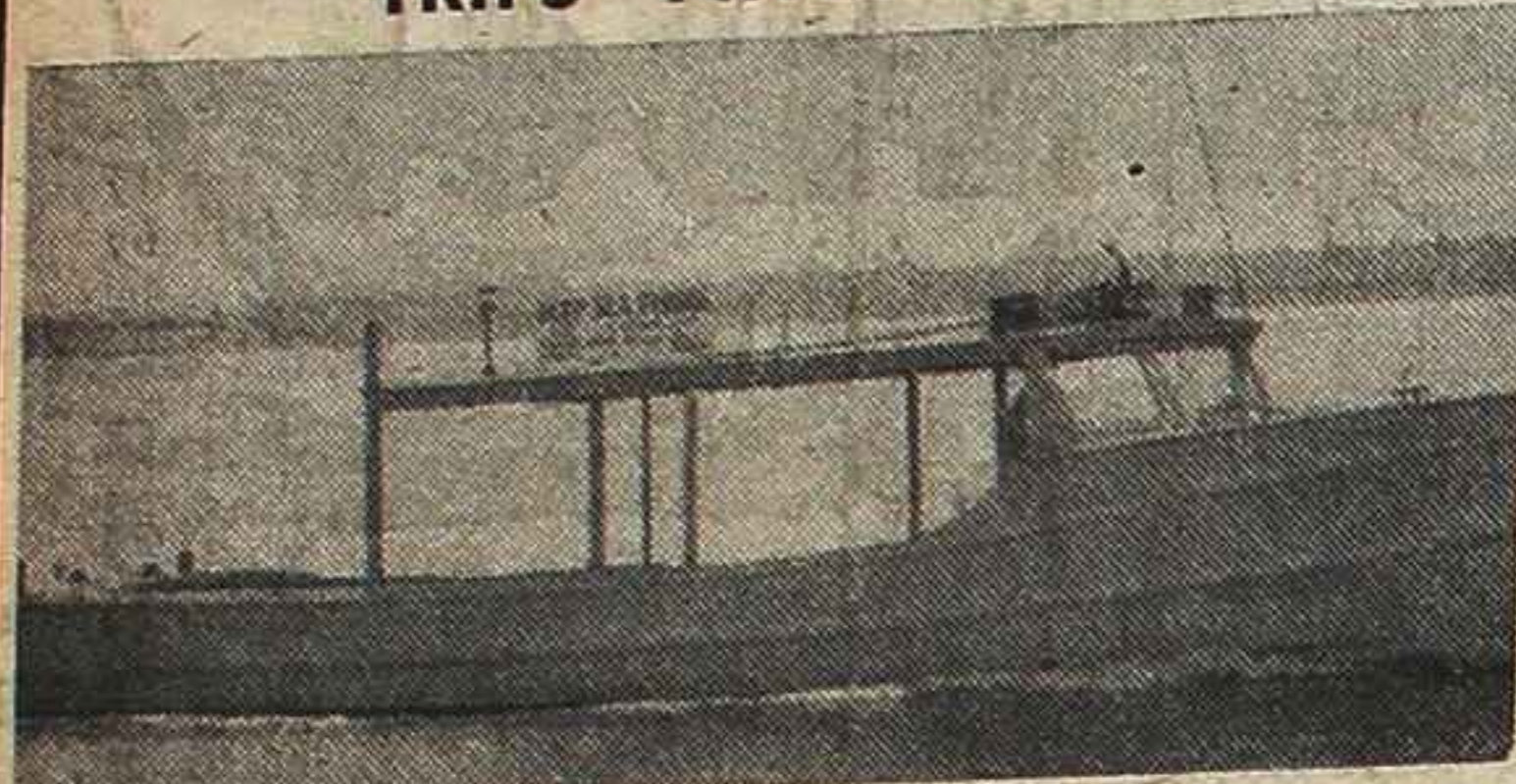

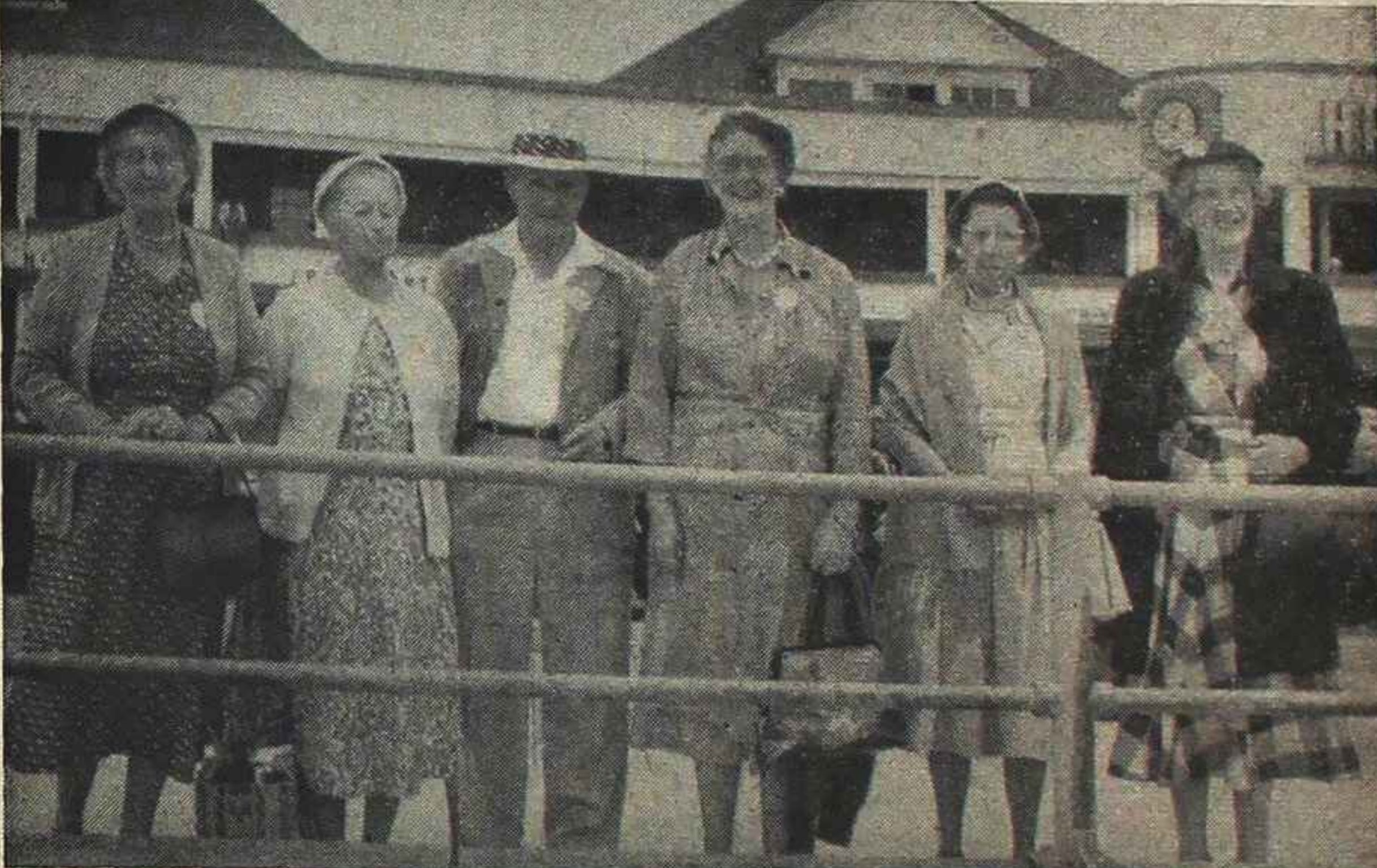
port Harbor. Miss Chesleigh was escorted by Rear Admiral Edwin J. Roland, commander of the first Coast Guard district.

\$60,000 Federal Grant For Seacoast Water Supply Study

A \$60,000 advance for study and planning a metropolitan water supply for seacoast area towns was granted in Washington yesterday.

In a telegram to the UNION today, Senators Styles Bridges and Norris Cotton reported that they had been advised of the action by the Housing and Home Finance agency.

The area involved includes Barrington, Dover, Durham, Greenland, Madbury, New Castle, Newington, Newmarket, Portsmouth, Rochester, Rollinsford, Rye, Somersworth, Stratham and Stratham.

Construction is expected to start in 1962 on the proposed \$12,375,000 project.

The agency said there is a water shortage because of a substantial population growth caused by industry, military and recreation development.

Following a 1952 study, the State Planning and Develop-

ment Commission recommended development of an Isinglass River supply by construction of a dam and reservoir, filtration plant, pumping station and transmission lines.

Advances of money are payable without interest upon start of construction, the senators said.

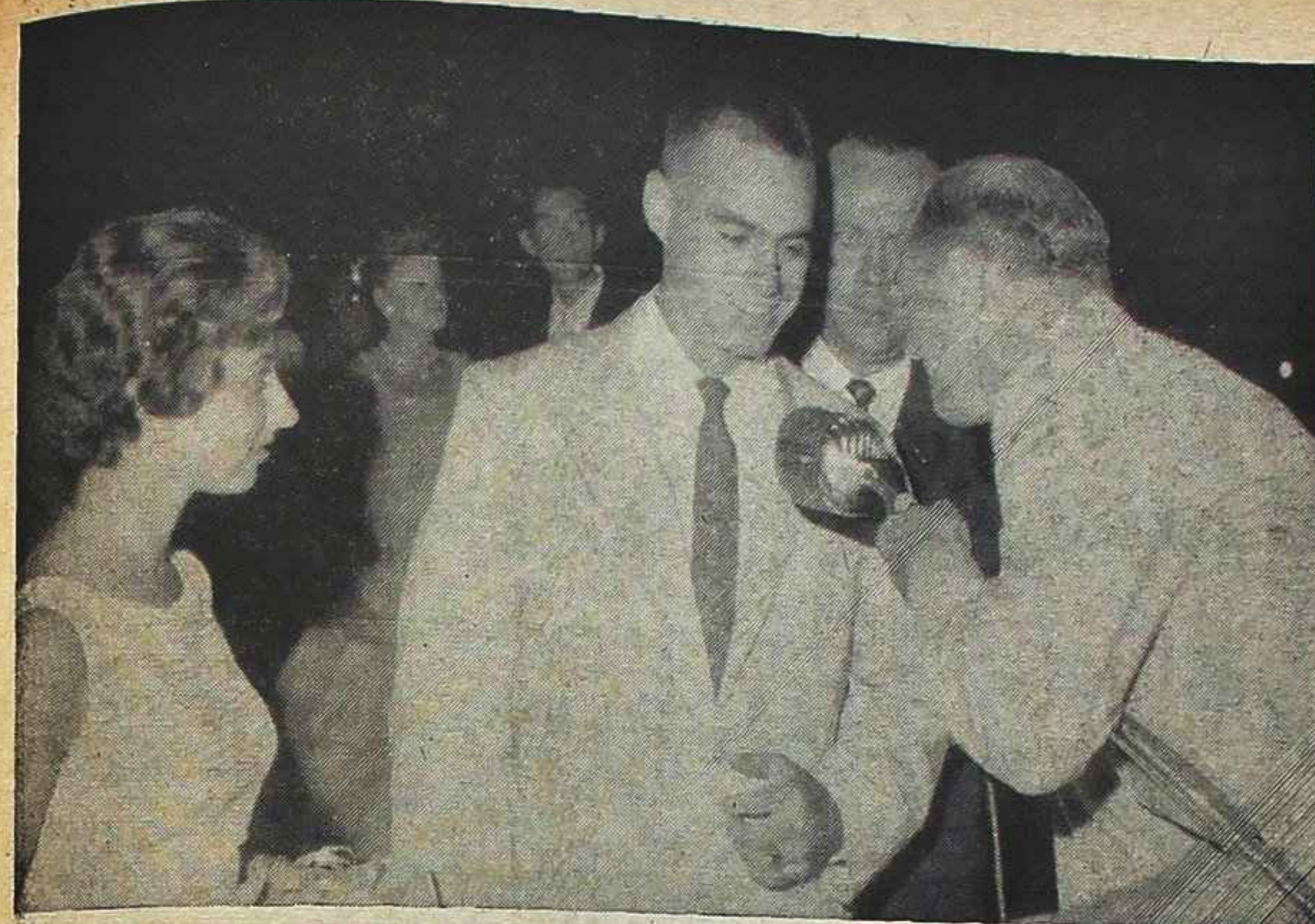

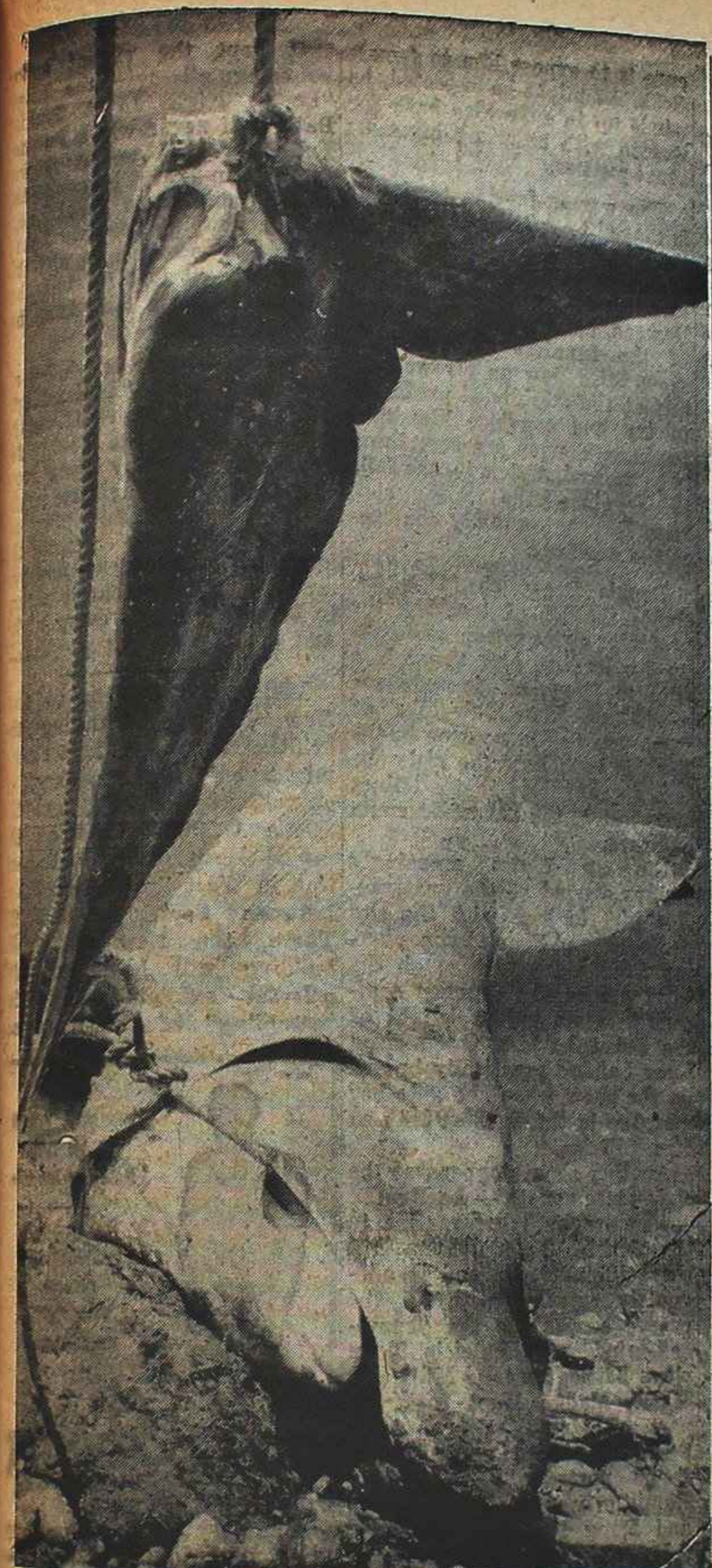

**"Turkish Bath" Has
Audiences Roaring**

Like an express train, "Ladies Night In A Turkish Bath" thunders across the stage of the Hampton Playhouse scattering loud laughter with every turn of the wheel on its two week tour of fun and wild frolic in a slapstick comedy of the Marx Brothers variety.

It is the utterly fantastic story of a shy professor who is deathly afraid of women that falls into the hand of two "men-of-the-world" who think the

cure is to expose him to female flesh. As might be expected, he winds up in a Turkish bath for women with resulting hilarious consequences.

The woman-fearing professor is played by Allen Joseph whose ludicrous antics kept the audience roaring with laughter. His love making scene with Ailsa Dawson, playing Alicia, was one of the funniest sopts in the show. Miss Dawson throws herself at the frightened professor to try and convince him that feminine charms are something to be desired. Although, she fails to convince the misogynist, Miss Dawson certainly convinces the audience.

Dennis Drew, as Mike, assumes the job of teaching the professor about women and ends up by leading him through a pandemonium of incongruous situations. The high-jinks of these two fine comedians in the Turkish bath kept the aisle sitters so convulsed that all lines were lost in the harum-scaruum business.

Nancy Watts amusingly clumps around as the unattractive girl in love with the shy professor and Frank Lyon, playing Fred, staggers through the third act as the drunken comrade in arms to the delight of the ticket holders. Queen-sized Lucy Landau practically breaks up the show when she gets her massage in the Turkish bath as Mrs. O'Brien.

Another show stopper was the strip-tease artiste — La Bouche—who practices her routine in the Turkish bath. Joanna Hill plays the stripper and is adequately supplied with all the proper curves for the "bump-and-grind" role. Patricia Sloan plays Kittie, Suzanne Mills was Marie, Madge West took the part of Mrs. Tarleton, Anne Seymour played yrtle, Sylvia Davis portrayed Anna, Fran Hamilton was the policewoman and Doug Rowe, the fireman. It was a large and busy cast

that kept the violent audience bouncing all over the stage. "Ladies Night In A Turkish Bath" will never win a Pulitzer Prize for drama—but it is a funny fun—racy humor—wacky situations that keeps things jumping for two hours. This is the corn season and the show arrived just in time—because it is pure corn from beginning to end.

If you want to laugh, by all means go to see "Ladies Night In A Turkish Bath". If on the other hand, you are looking for a serious drama stay away from the Hampton Playhouse which this rollicking ribald play occupies the boards—because laughter is contagious and you must be able to hear it all the way to Hampton Beach every night and do, farther north.—H.L.P.

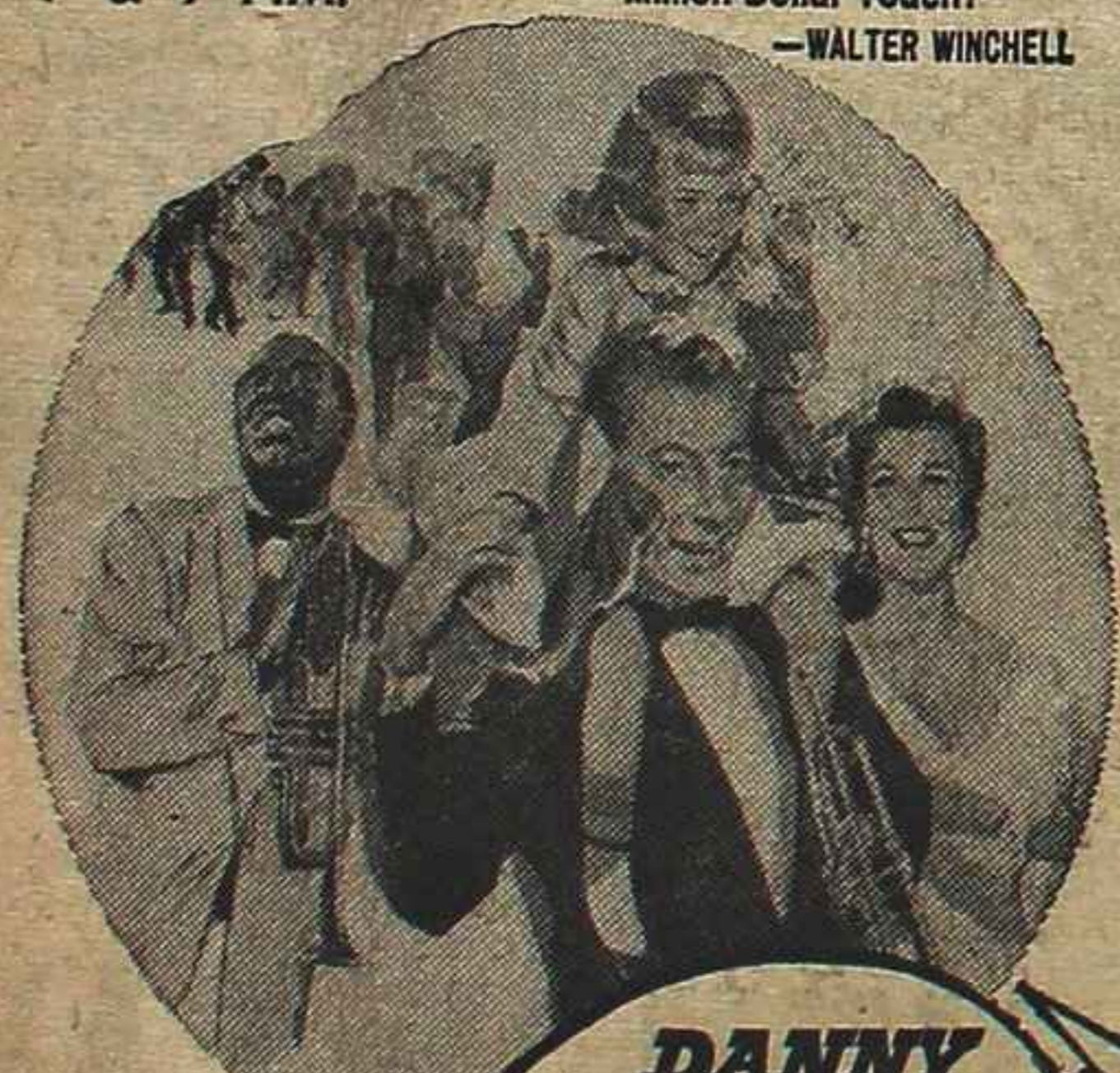

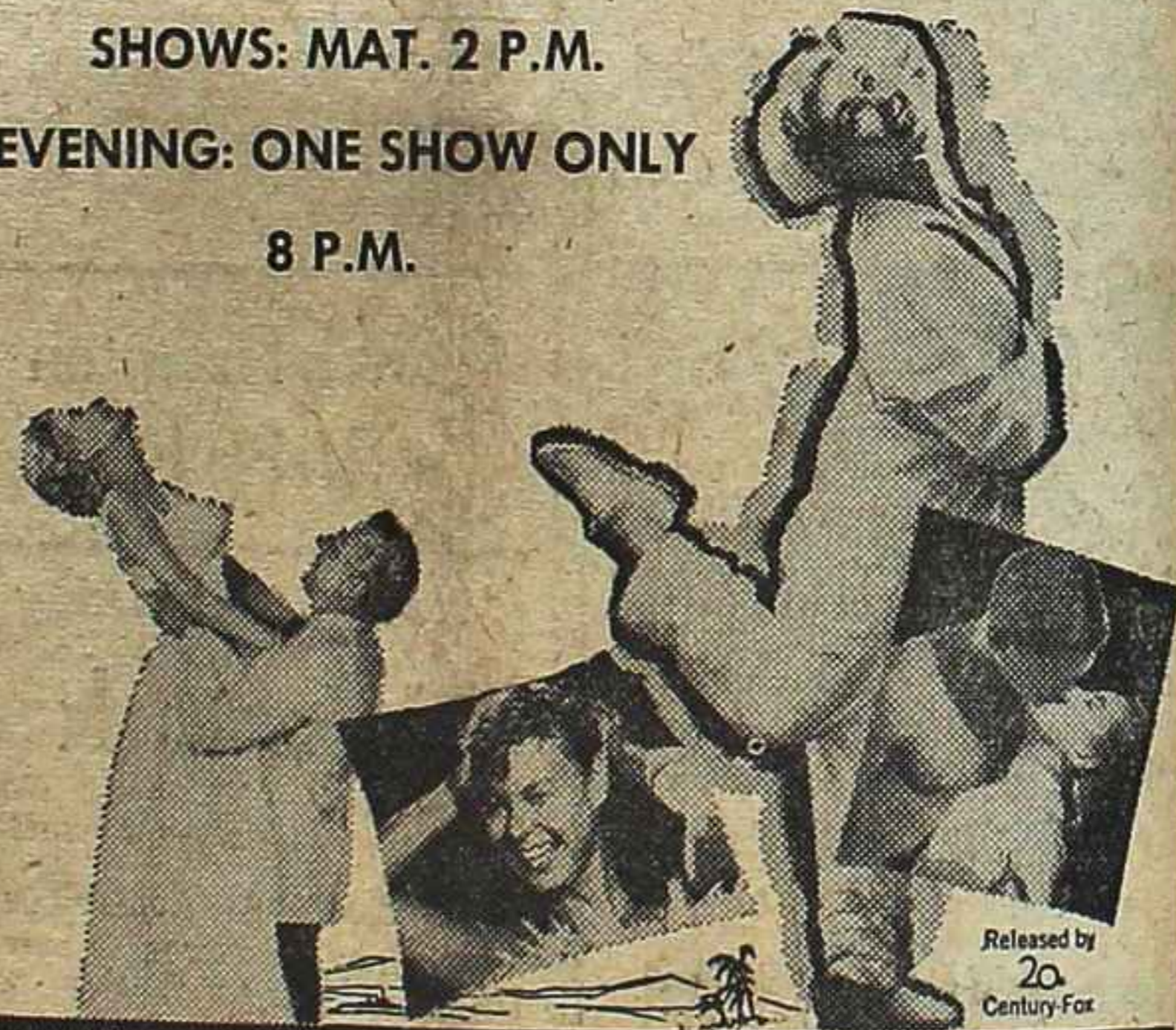

Gala Program Marks Lions Lobster Bake

The Lions club of the Hampton is planning a monster lobster bake with a full day of entertaining events at Hampton Beach Saturday, August 15.

The major attraction of the day will be a sky diving performance by the Marblehead, Mass., parachute artists.

The leader of this daredevil group of four, Dana P. Smith, said the divers would bail out at an altitude of 7,000 feet, lighting smoke flares as they jump. The men free fall for one mile, taking approximately 33 seconds, at which time they are falling at a velocity of 130 miles per hour. At a height of about 25 feet above the water the men release themselves from the chutes and dive.

Jumps will be made at 9:30 a.m. and 5:30 p.m., according to the program of events outlined by William Lessard, president of the Lions club. He said this would be the first sky diving exhibition in northern New England.

A boat and water ski show is scheduled to take place at 9 a.m. to open the day's festivities.

At 10 a.m. there is to be a pet show at the bandstand. Any child between the ages of five and twelve with a household pet is invited to enter. The entry fee is 25 cents. Trophies will be awarded to the winners.

The chairman for the pet animal show will be Col. Robert Gorman. Judges will be Mrs. Hervey Kent and Mrs. Jerry Holton-Jones of Hampton Falls and Mrs. Thomas Benham of Hampton. Stewards will be Miss Ellen Gorman and Miss Harriet Beck. Col. Gorman, a member of the Hampton Lions club, is a two-time winner of the Westminster show, Madison Square Garden. He is the only handler to win the world famous Poodle Specialty Show of America three consecutive years at Garden City, U.I.

Plans for a parade along the boulevard at 11 a.m. are still being formulated. Details will be announced next week, Lessard said.

At noon three to four thousand lobsters will be brought out of the ocean onto the beach near the police station and put to steam by Bakemaster Lion Rollie Dionne, proprietor of Ye Cocks and Kettle restaurant, Seabrook. A troupe of skin divers have been signed up to bring the lobsters out of the water. Clams and corn will be steamed and other delicacies will be served.

All proceeds from the sale of food will be used in the local Lions club's eyesight conservation program. The service includes help to people who cannot afford the eye care they need, and gifts of expensive sight testing equipment to schools, hospitals, and other institutions.

The afternoon program of entertainment will begin at 2 p.m. with a performance by the Highlanders, an instrumental-vocal team consisting of Dennis Dionne and Wayne Philbrick. Philbrick plays an electric guitar and Dionne plays a home-made bass instrument he calls a "gut bucket". Following this a talent show will be staged at the bandstand.

At 4 p.m. a choral group from Haverhill will present a

concert of old-time favorite songs. The singers are members of the SPPBQA (Society of the Preservation and Propagation of Barbershop Quartets in America) and approximately 60 are expected for the concert.

The sky divers will give their second show of the day at 5:30, followed at 6:45 by the introduction of Gov. Wesley Powell and other notables who will be attending the lobster bake.

At 7 p.m. a disc jockey show will originate from Hampton Beach and be broadcast by WHDH from a mobile radio unit. New England's outstanding dee jay, Hank Forbes will emcee the broadcast.

At 8 p.m. a complete half-hour show will be presented by a group of entertainers from Pleasure Island, the new amusement center in Wakefield, Mass.

The grand finale of the day is yet to be announced, as are many other details concerning the program, Lessard said. He indicated that a large number of Lions from all over New England would be attending the lobster bake and he said the public was urged to attend "the world's largest lobster bake."

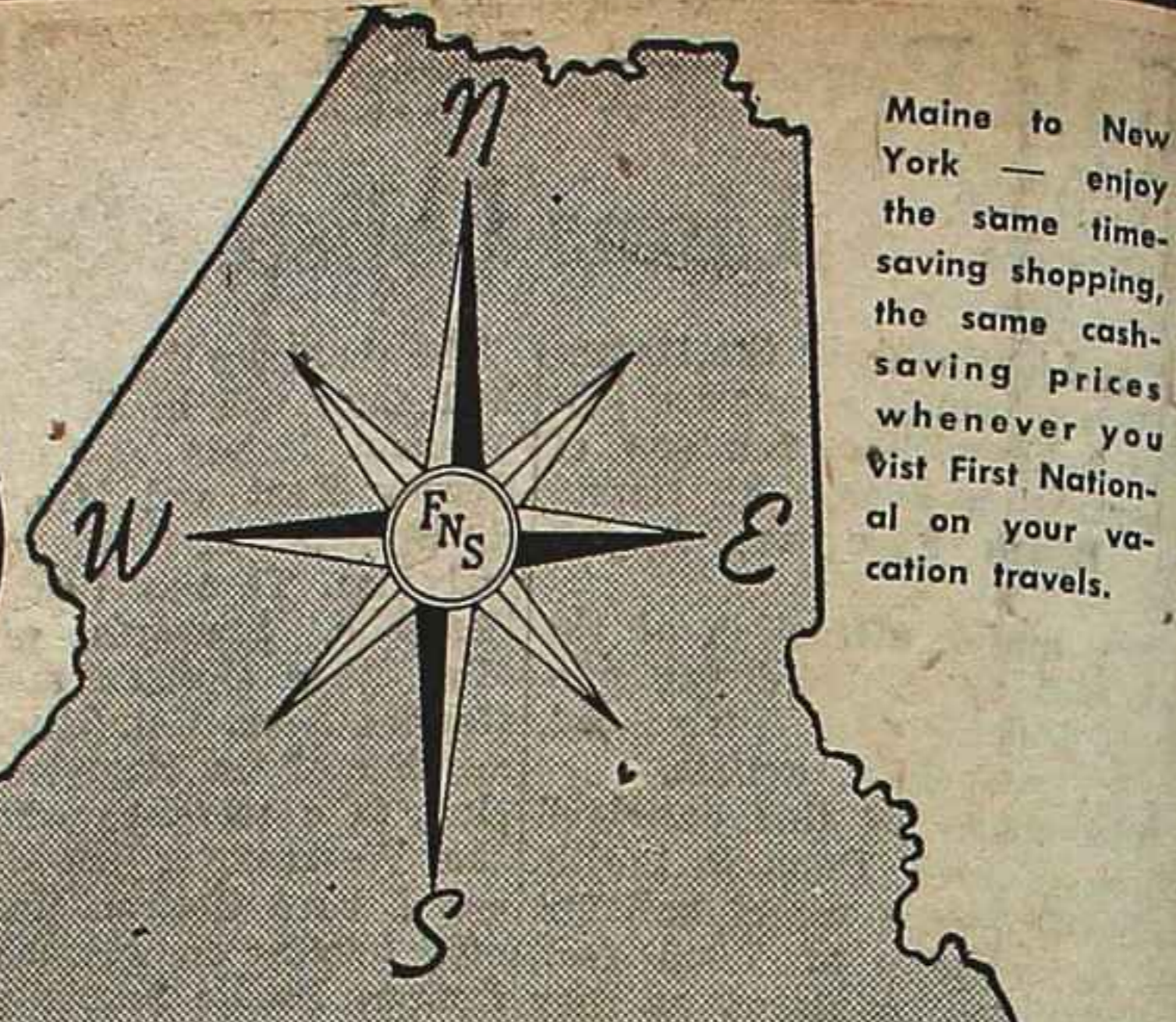

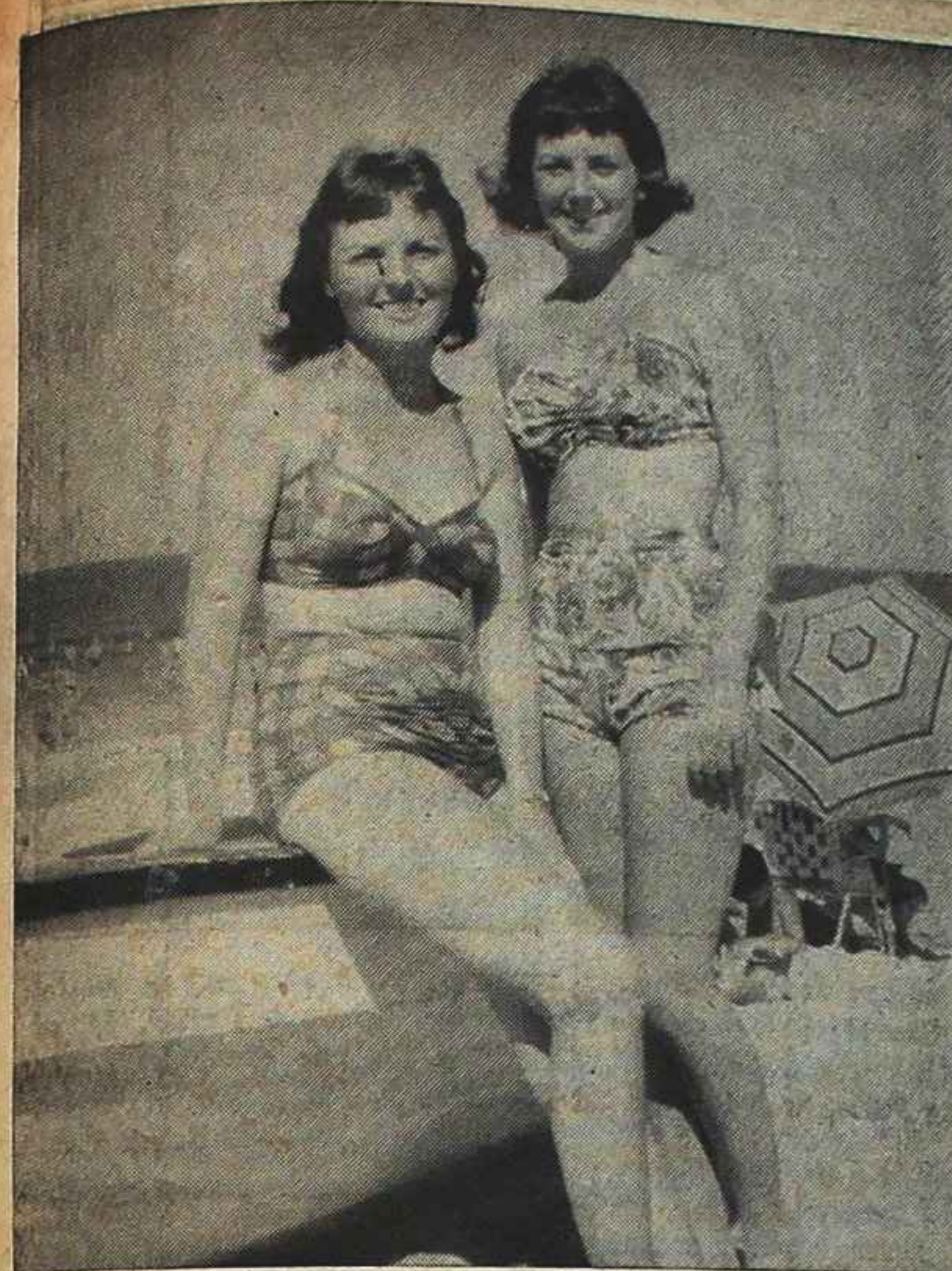

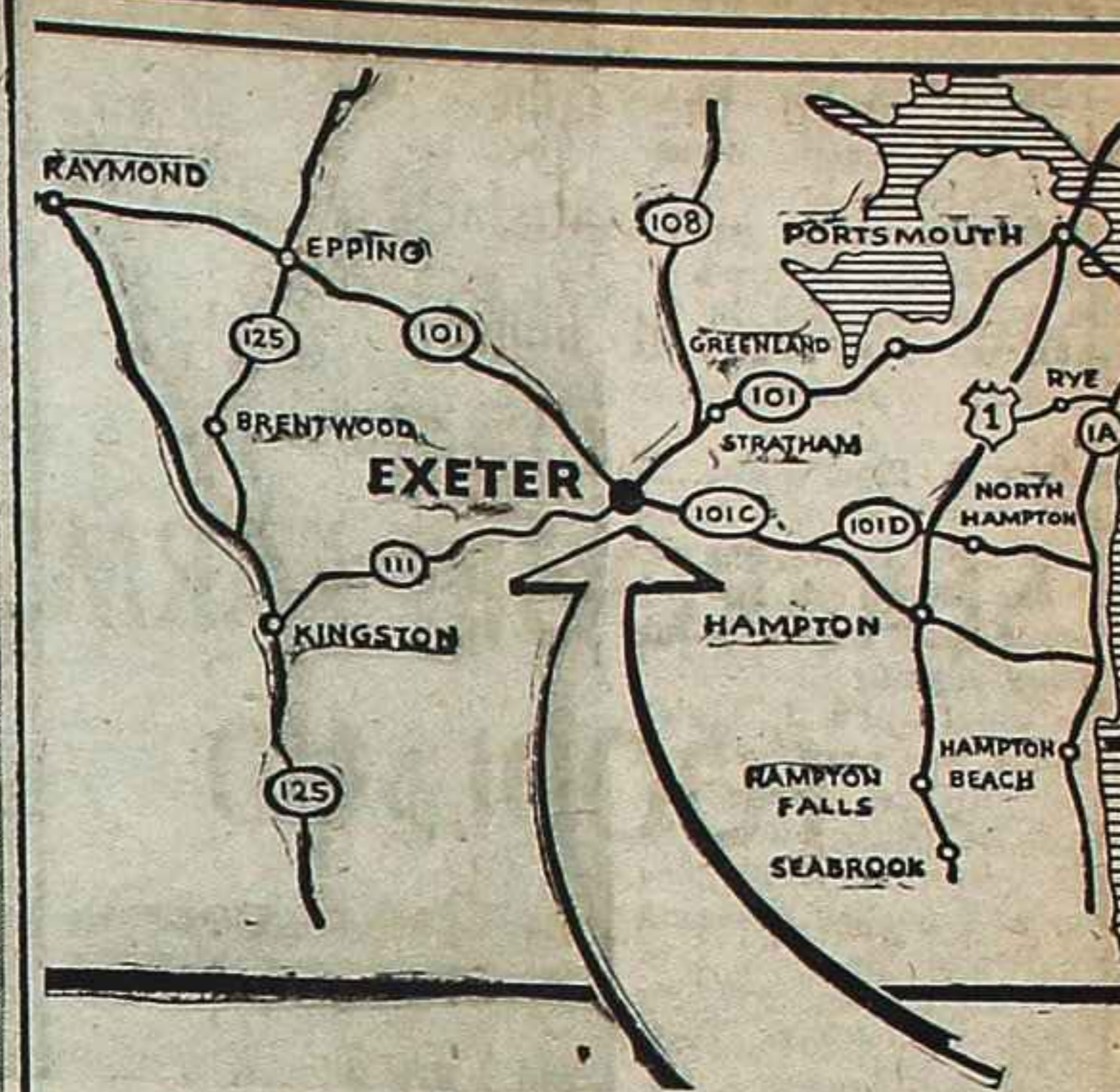

Haddock was the strongest catch of the week with five big ones (exceeding four-pound minimum for Old Salts recognition) being landed.

Maurice Merrill of Bradford, Mass., and Frank Heenan of Milford Conn., each brought in a 5½ pound haddock. Six-year-old John O. Zimmer of Chester N. H., snared a six pounder Monday and another young fisherman, Billy Nadeau of Nashua caught a 7½ pounder the same day from a Smith and Gilmore boat.

The only big pollock caught last week was brought in by young Elly Rimbach, who was on a fishing excursion with

fellow campers from Camp Sa-Ma-Ca, Raymond, N. H. July 28. Elly caught a 16½-pound pollock to join the Old Salts club, and a friend made the list with a 16-pound codfish. She was Cathy Hammel. The campers were on a Smith and Gilmore party boat.

Two other codfish caught during the last week met the nine-pound minimum weight for classification as "big ones." They were a nine-pounder caught July 27 by Marjorie Rollind of Dalton, Mass., and a 24-pounder caught July 26 by Edmond J. Labrie of Manchester.

The first cusk of the season to exceed the four-pound minimum weight set by the Old Salts was landed by little Andrew Alexander of Lowell, Mass. His catch July 25 weighed in 10 pounds over the minimum at 14 pounds.
