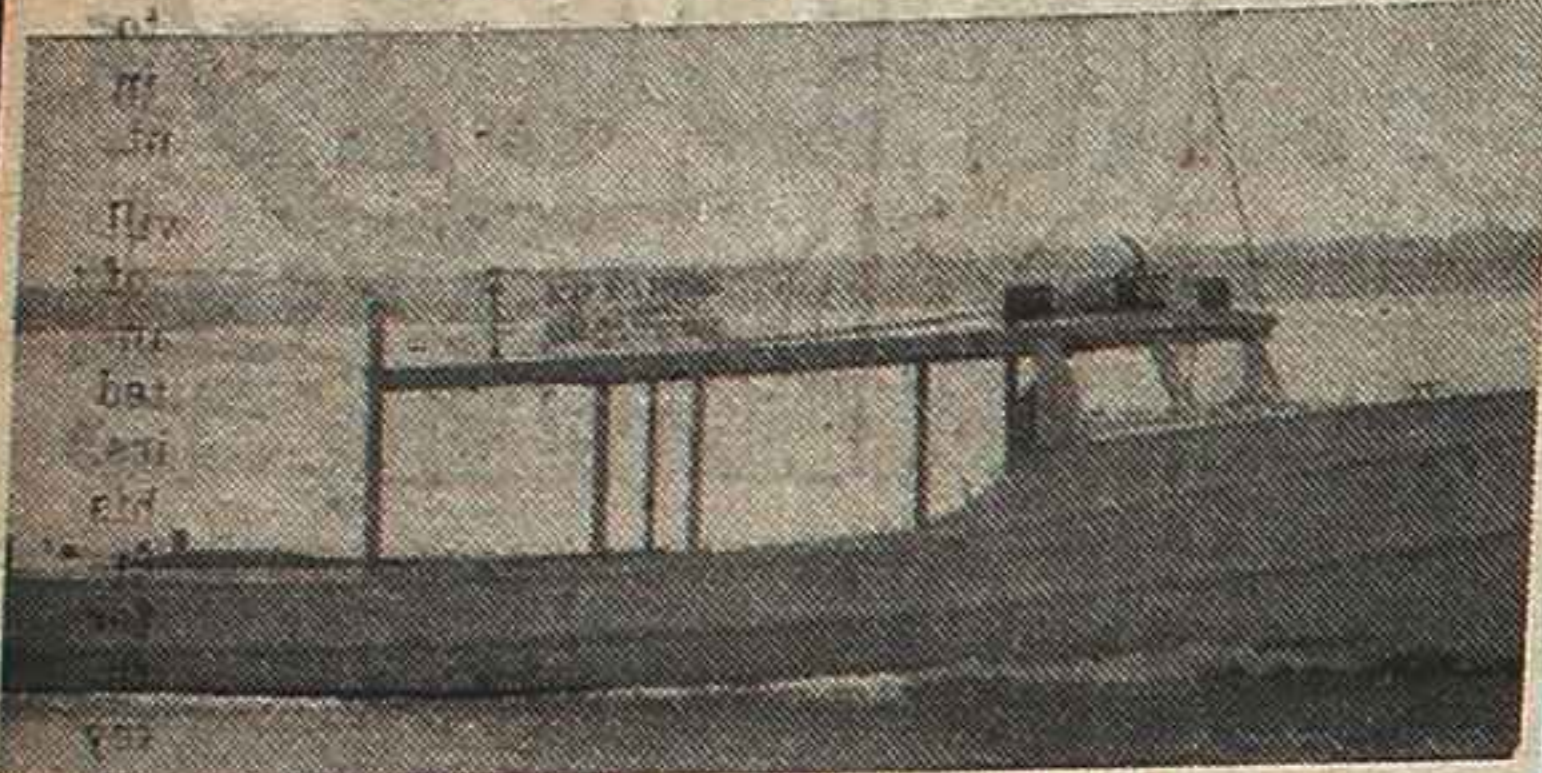

On Sunday one of the largest haddock to be landed this season was brought in by Matthew Martin Jr. of Manchester. The catch weighed 12 pounds.

Miss New England To Be Chosen Aug. 19

Five New England radio and television personalities have been assigned the task of selecting Miss New England of 1959. The title next Wednesday night August 19, in the Casino ballroom.

The lone lady on the jury is known to New Englanders by her appearances on Channel 7 Sunday evenings for the last two years in the "Community Editions" show. She is Claire Devaney. Formerly with WHDH radio, she is now a free-lance announcer and model, dividing her time between her television career and her family. She makes many films and transcriptions for both locally and nationally distributed products in addition to her appearance on television programs broadcast from Boston.

Mrs. Devaney is also an associate of the Hart Model agency in Boston. She has modeled for many Boston firms, has taught modeling, and lectured on fashion. She is now spending a two-week vacation at Hampton Beach with her husband and son, which makes it possible for her to be a judge in the Miss New England beauty contest.

Foreman of the jury will be the ever-popular Carl Moore, star of "Beantown Matinee" on radio station WEEI, Boston. More than 30 years in radio,

Carl Moore is the favorite entertainer of many old and young New Englanders. Pianist, singer, and comedian, he is perhaps

best known for his renditions of Irish ditties. Carl will interview Chamber of Commerce secretary Bill Elliot on his show some day next week before the contest and then make a special trip to Hampton to serve as judge in the Miss New England pageant.

Also serving as a judge will be Pierre Eaton, supervisor of operations for WMUR-TV, Manchester, an affiliate of United Television of New Hampshire. Mr. Eaton will bring as his guest, photographer John Vergas, who will shoot films for broadcast on Channel 7. The other two judges will be disc jockey Ray Dunfee of WHEB in Portsmouth, and Jack Malloy of station WNAC-TV in Boston.

The pageant is scheduled to begin at 8 p.m. in the Casino ballroom. Ted Herbert and his band will provide background music for the contest and for dancing after the contest. Bill Elliot will be master of ceremonies.

A 24-inch high trophy, a sparkling crown, a \$100 savings bond, and other gifts are waiting for the young lady who is chosen Miss New England of 1959. Approximately 25 girls have submitted applications for the contest, according to Henry Hamel, promotion director of the Chamber.

Tickets are on sale at the Chamber of Commerce office now, or they may be purchased at the door the night of the pageant.

Beachcombing Succumbs To New Scientific Methods

Beachcombing has become a mechanical operation.

Early risers at Hampton Beach have seen modern scavengers collect impressive loots from the sand, especially on Monday mornings following busy weekends.

The most persistent beachcomber at Hampton is Louis Jolivet of Haverhill, who may be seen on the beach every Monday morning, rain or shine, with his hand-model metal detector. Jolivet is one of the four members of the Haverhill Detectrove club. All members have their own metal detectors and make periodic rounds of the local beaches during the summer season.

The Detectrove boys all insist their beachcombing activities are strictly recreational and their equipment for the operation provides them with fascinating hobbies. Jolivet says he walks the beaches "more for the fresh air and sunshine" than for the coins and other items he finds. Mon-

day, for example, was not a particularly prosperous day, he said. After an hour in the rain his instrument had detected only seven pennies and several pieces of tin foil. The take, he admitted, was far below normal, probably due to a poor beach day Sunday.

He said he has collected as much as seven dollars in one day and as much as \$80 in a season. This is his fourth year with the handy instrument that can detect metals buried in the sand.

Jolivet said the metal detectors can be purchased for about \$67, but he said he has made two of the instruments for his own use at a cost of about \$28 each. The instru-

ments consist of a battery and magnetic "clicker" connected to coils enclosed in a flat pan which the operator holds over the surface of the sand. When the pan passes over any metal object, the operator hears a clicking noise in his ear-phone amplifier.

Jolivet has a collection of 28 rings and a number of watches he has found while beachcombing, not counting the ones he has returned to owners. He says he always tries to find the owners of any valuable items if there is any mark of identification to go by. Be-

sides the regular find of coins, he has struck upon some valuable old coins. He says the instrument is also handy around the house for locating wires in floors or walls, or water pipes beneath pavement.

Just last week Jolivet was asked to assist in the search for automobile keys lost at Hampton Beach by a Canadian visitor. He found the keys after a 10 minute search and was rewarded with two dollars for his efforts. Although all of his searches are not so successful, he says he is happy to try for anyone.

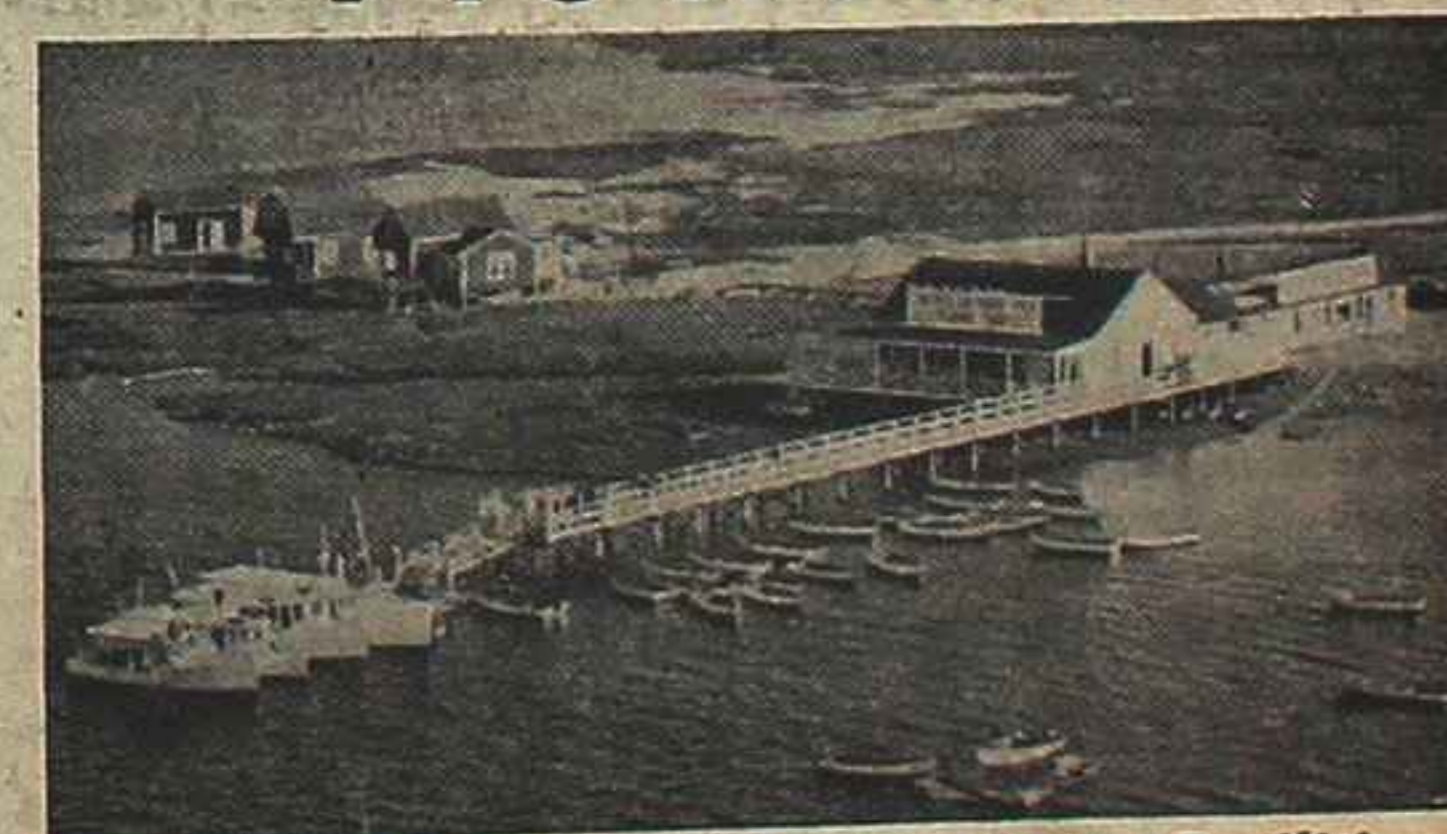

Gala Family Day At Beach Saturday

To help the fund raising campaign for the Lions Eyesight

Conservation fund, the Hampton Lions are planning a gala Family Day at Hampton Beach, Saturday, August 15.

A long and complete day of special events begins at 9 a.m. and is climaxed with the grand finale at 8:30 p.m., which includes an address by Governor Wesley Powell. Governor Foster Furcolo of Massachusetts and Governor Clinton A. Clauson of Maine will be honored guests,

along with Herbert I. Philbrick of "I Led Three Lives" fame.

What has been described as the "World's Largest Lobster Bake" will be served from noon-time to mid-afternoon, bake-master for which will be Roley Dionne, owner-operator of Ye Cocke & Kettle Inn, Seabrook, one of the outstanding bake-masters of the seacoast region. This will be cooked on the sands in front of the Casino and served on the famous boardwalk.

Morning events will include a boat and water ski show by members of the Hampton Boat club, an exhibition by the Boston University Sky Divers under the leadership of Dana P. Smith, of Marblehead, Mass. This group will jump from 7,000 feet, lighting smoke flares as they jump, free-fall one mile in thirty-three seconds, parachute to twenty feet above the water and then dive into the water.

This will be followed by an animal pet show, chairman of which will be Col. Robert Gorman, two-time winner of the Westminster show at Madison Square Garden. Any child between the age of five and twelve may enter a household pet, with entries received up to 9:30 a.m., the entry fee being 25 cents. Mr. Gorman is also donating a French poodle valued at \$500 to be given away at a drawing that evening.

A parade of beauties and a performance by the Pease AFB drill team will end the morning events. Contestants in the Miss Hampton Beach and Miss New England contests and other contests from the entire six-state region will take part in this. There will also be entries from the Antique Automobile Association of New Hampshire, priceless cars that go back to

the turn of the century, as well as the first New England appearance of the Lions International Hoboes. Bill Dunfey and Herb Philbrick will introduce and narrate, during the parade.

Afternoon entertainment includes The Highlanders, the Hampton Beach Concert band, a talent show and The Spellbound, as well as a group of thirty singers from Haverhill, Mass., members of the Society for the Preservation and Propagation of Barbershop Quartets in America.

The day's events come to a close with a second performance by the Boston University Sky Divers at 6:30 p.m., followed by a record hop directed by Hank Forbes, station WHDH disc jockey, the Pleasure Island Diamond Lil show, starring Charmaine Harmon, featuring recording artist Champ Butler and the magic banjo of Pat Therianes.

Beach Hotel Owners Discuss Noise

The Hampton Beach Hotel association is studying means of reducing the amount of noise at the beach at night.

At the last regular meeting of the association a committee was appointed to prepare recommendations for eliminating noise, which the 60 or more members of the organization agreed was an annoyance to their guests. The association is meeting tonight at the Hampton Beach fire station for further study of the problem. A committee report is not expected before the end of the month.

The committee consists of Horace Hallingworth, Mrs. Lillian Brindamour, Douglass E. Hunter, Stanley Hamel, and L. Forrest Berglund, who is also president of the organization this year.

Berglund said the association has nearly doubled in membership in the last year and has been more active than even in raising the hotel standards at Hampton Beach. During the season the members meet regularly the second and fourth Thursdays of each month.

At the last meeting, association secretary, Mrs. Bobbie Cann, reported that she had received a letter of commendation from the state fire marshal, who expressed appreciation to the members for their cooperation in the inspection of the beach hotels, motels, and guest houses. All member hotels were found

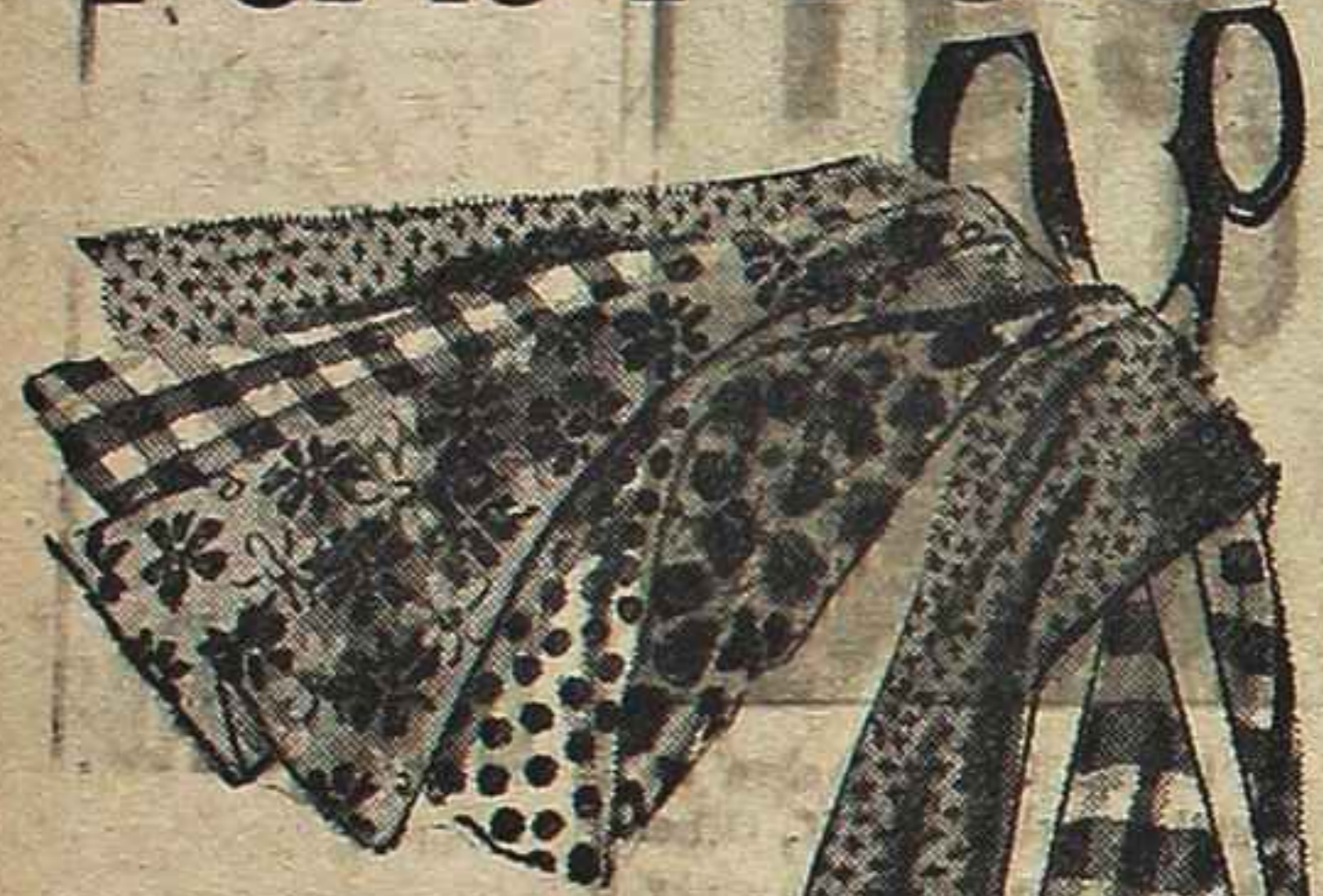

Firemen Kept Busy But No Serious Loss

Firemen of the Hampton Beach station were called to several fires during the last week. None, however, caused serious damage.

Tuesday at 1:07 a.m. a fire was reported at 18 Acadia avenue, Surfside Park. Firemen found a rug, placed over a floor furnace, burning in the living room of a cottage owned by Jemire O'Brien of Malden, Mass. The cottage was being occupied by John Quinn of Worcester, Mass.

The tank truck and Engines 2 and 3 reported and the fire was quickly extinguished with only slight damage reported.

Later Tuesday morning the fire department answered a call to C street, where a gas leak was reported at the rear of Dudley's store. Firemen found that an oven had been left on over night.

Last Saturday a call reported smoke pouring from the Omega cottage on Manchester street. Firemen found bacon burning on the stove in the kitchen of the cottage, which was occupied by Mrs. Charles DuProut. The cottage was filled with smoke, but no fire damage was reported.

Friday noon firemen used 1,900 gallons of water to put out a fire which got out of control at the beach dump. Engine 3 and the tank truck responded to the call from the municipal rubbish department.

Firemen were called to a cottage on Island path last Wednesday evening when smoke was reported pouring from a window. Inside the cottage firemen found the mattress of a folding cot smoldering. The cottage is owned by Axel Jacobson of Waltham, Mass., firemen said, and was not used since the previous Saturday.

Coast Guard Patrol Crews Aid Two Injured Fishermen

The Hampton Beach Coast Guard patrol boat made two emergency trips from ships to shore Sunday, each time bringing back fishermen with hooks lodged in their hands.

Ernest Flanders of Manchester was transferred to the Coast Guard boat after he caught a fish hook in his hand while fishing from the Alice G early Sunday morning. He was taken from the state pier to the office of Dr. Roger Blake in a police cruiser.

Sunday afternoon the Coast Guard patrol boat was called to the party boat Gannett on a similar mission. The victim Blake's office for medical treatment of the second fish hook was Ernest Launsberry of Newburyport, who was also taken to Dr. ment.

In addition to its ambulance service, the Coast Guard also assisted three disabled pleasure craft over the weekend.

The 23-foot cabin cruiser

Mary Beth, anchored in Hampton Harbor, was reported taking water Saturday afternoon. The owner, Mrs. Elizabeth Carron of Lowell, Mass., gave the Coast Guard permission to tow the cruiser to shore and beach it. Water had to be pumped from the bilge before the craft could be beached.

Also Saturday afternoon, a 40-foot cabin cruiser was reported disabled with a broken shaft near the approach to Hampton Harbor. The Coast Guard towed the cruiser to meet a Coast Guard boat from the Merrimac River station, which took the disabled in tow to Newburyport harbor. It was owned by Ernest Mallett of Canton, Mass.

While on patrol Sunday morning the 30-foot Coast Guard boat located a disabled outboard in Hampton River. The boat, operated by Morris Davis of Lawrence, Mass., was towed to shore. The 16-footer was rented from Smith and Gilmore pier.

Conservation Officer Floyd S. Potter Jr. told members of the N.H. Marine Fisheries association last night that failure of commercial fishermen to cooperate with conservation officers was the chief cause of poor enforcement of clam and lobster regulations in the Seacoast area.

Earlier this week the association issued a public statement criticizing the state's Fish and Game department for an "irresponsible attitude" toward the conservation of clam and lobster resources in New Hampshire charging department heads and officers with failing to enforce laws that protect these resources.

Last night the association met at the Hampton Beach fire station "to launch a press campaign for recognition of the marine fishing industry by the Fish and Game department," in the words of Joseph E. Messier, Seabrook, association president.

Conservation Officer Potter attended the meeting voluntarily and told the association members, mostly commercial lobstermen from Hampton and Seabrook, that since he was assigned to this area he has tried his best to enforce the controls on clam and lobster taking, but he said the commercial fishermen could not expect him to arrest unlicensed clam diggers or the takers of short lobsters unless they cooperate with law enforcement officers themselves.

He said the commercial fishermen knew who the offenders were, but would not report the offenses to the proper authorities. He said that it was difficult for him to apprehend offenders himself because someone always warned the violators whenever he approached the clam flats or lobster landings.

He described a recent visit to clam flats along the Hampton River with his newly assigned fellow officer, William Turner of Portsmouth. He said they saw more than 15 persons whom they suspected were digging clams without licenses, but he said someone walked ahead of them warning everyone on the flats to bury the clams they had

already dug. He told the fishermen he could not make arrests without evidence and he could not find evidence without cooperation from local persons who know he is an officer.

Potter said he was doing his best to apprehend the takers of short lobsters, but he said the Fish and Game department has not provided him with a boat which is adequate for the job. He said he has approached suspicious parties with the outboard he now has, but on several occasions the parties have sped off when he tried to board their boats for inspection. He said his equipment was not in shape for a boat chase.

A member of the association said that local policemen have been helping offenders escape rather than help conservation officers apprehend them. Potter said he had no proof of this, but he said he did call for assistance of local policemen and state troopers on a number of occasions to set up road blocks, and in each case the offenders escaped.

Potter also told of threats to his wife and child over the telephone.

He told the association members

Beach, Town Officials Protest Coast Guard Location Change

The Hampton Board of Selectmen this week voiced strong opposition to the U. S. Coast Guard proposal to abandon the Hampton Beach life boat station in favor of a smaller "manned mooring" at the river mouth.

In a letter to the commandant of the New England Coast Guard district, the board of selectmen asked to be placed on record as "strongly opposed to the abandonment of the Hampton Coast Guard station or any change in its location."

The directors of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce also voiced a similar opinion on the proposed changes this week. The chamber also sent a letter to the Boston office of the First U. S. Coast Guard district, urging that plans to abandon the present station be dropped.

A public hearing on the proposed changes is scheduled to take place next Monday, August 17, at 7 p. m. in the Hampton Beach fire station. Local officials said they would present, in detail at that time, their reasons for opposing the change. The only reason mentioned in their letters of opposition was that the Coast Guard station serves the area from Rye to Salisbury, and the present location is in the approximate center of activities.

Coast Guard officials insist that their activities center around Hampton Harbor and the present location, three miles north of the harbor, causes inconvenience in reaching the patrol boat which is moored near the state pier in the harbor. The proposed changes would also include a reduction in the number of Guardsmen stationed in Hampton.

Municipal officials object to a reduction in the man power of the local station because of the rapid increase in boating activity in this area. The letter to the Coast Guard commandant, drafted by Town Manager John P. Bachelder, stated that "Hampton is doing much to promote boating; we have an active yacht club and a marina is under construction

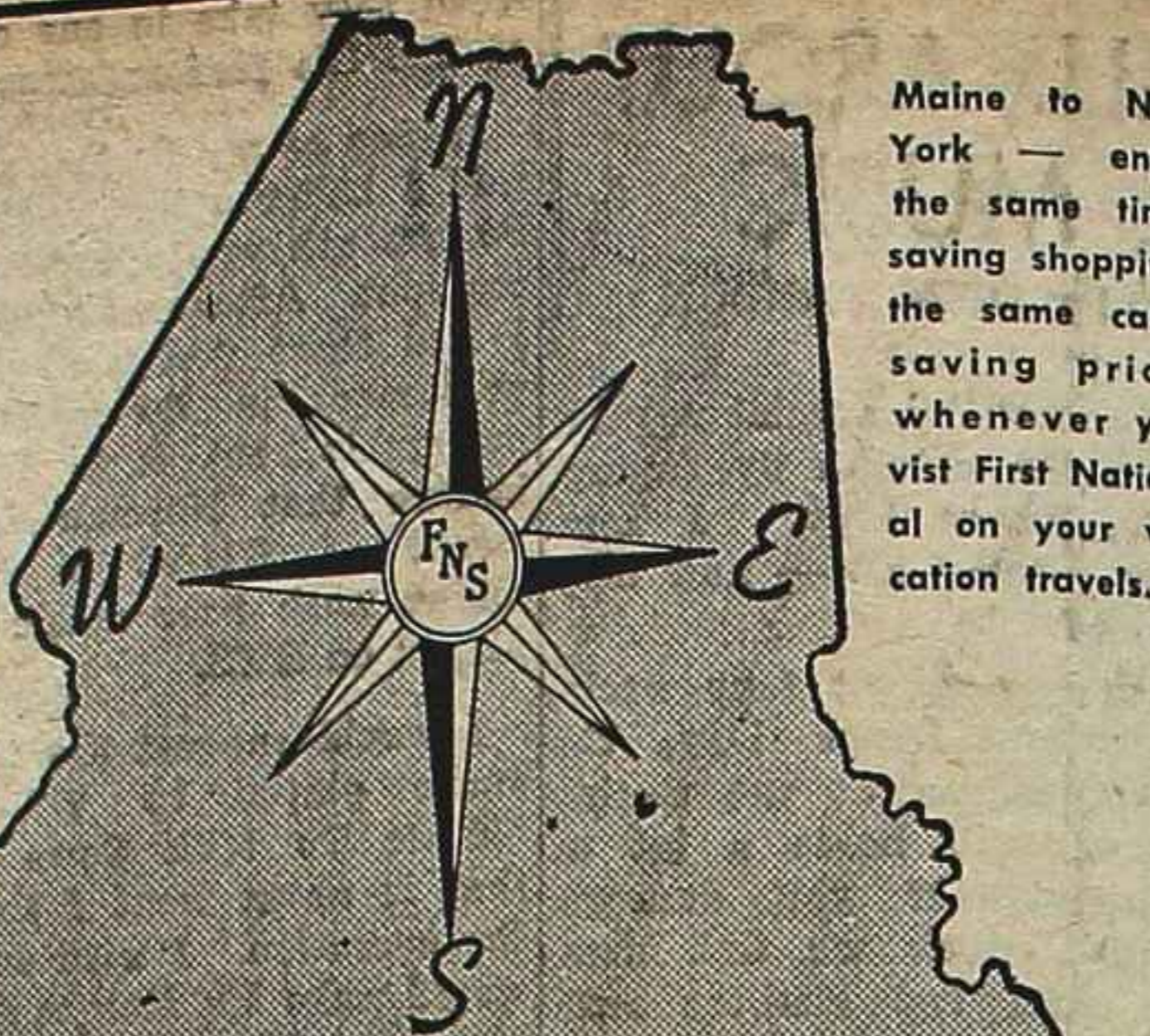

bers that a new officer had been assigned to assist him and began work in this district last Sunday. He said he could promise better service now that he had some help and was learning to know the district better, but he pleaded for more cooperation from the commercial fishermen.

Potter was assigned to the Seacoast district last spring as an assistant to Officer Chesley Goodwin, who was reassigned to a different district last month after numerous requests for a transfer.

OTHER PROBLEMS AIED.
The association voted to send letters to all the commercial fishermen on the New Hampshire coast to get their opinions on closing the lobster season during the three summer months.

Several members agreed that the only way to prevent the taking of short lobsters was to close the season to everyone during the summer months when a large number of the offenses occur. One member said the state of Maine and the Maritime Provinces now had such laws in effect.

On several previous occasions the association has tried to get the legislature to eliminate the law granting a \$5 lobster license for non-commercial fishermen. Most of the short lobster taking is done by holders of this type of license; officials have found.

President Messier said the association might receive more cooperation from the legislature in a move to close the lobster season in the summer to all license holders than it did in its efforts to eliminate the non-commercial license.

Tom V. Binmore of Rye reported that last year the state received \$5,539.50 from the sale of lobster licenses, dealers' li-

censes, and fines. He said this indicated that there were a sizeable number of licenses issued, and a law closing the season for three months would not be the whole solution to the problem of diminishing lobster resources along the coast.

He proposed that the control of the issuance of licenses be turned over to the towns, and that laws limiting the number of lobster landings and requiring identification markers on all containers also be passed.

Also discussed at the meeting were complaints from some of the party boat operators and the Coast Guard that lobstermen were placing traps in the approach channel of Hampton Harbor, and that the lobster buoys made navigation difficult. The Coast Guard reported that one boat became disabled when warp from a string of traps became entangled in the propeller.

Harbormaster Eugene Mahar said traps in the channel could be considered a navigation hazard and all boat operators had the right to pull the traps to the side of the fair-way. A report that a Coast Guardsman had threatened to cut traps loose if they continued to be

in the channel was denied by BM Roland Peakall, who is in charge of the Hampton Beach Coast Guard station.

Several fishermen complained that people fishing from the state pier have been making it difficult to dock fishing boats for loading and unloading. One man said the fishermen on the state float often refuse to move when they see a boat coming in and even stick fishing rods into the skippers' faces sometimes.

Harbormaster Mahar said he had ordered signs from the state which clearly note that fishing from the pier is forbidden, but he said the state officials replied that there were no funds available for such signs.

State Representative Myron R. Felch of Seabrook, who was present at the meeting, said he would donate white signboards and the Coast Guard representative said he would see that they were lettered according to the wishes of the Harbormaster. Mahar said he was not sure he had authority to put up the signs, but he said he knew they were needed and would erect

them as soon as possible. The signs will state that fishing and swimming are forbidden from the pier.

Complaints were also raised against municipal court judges in the district for not giving the maximum sentence for per-

sons found guilty of digging clams without a license and for persons found guilty of landing or selling short lobsters.

Incidentally, I thought I would mention before signing off that John Dineen is no longer the surf riding champ of Hampton Beach.

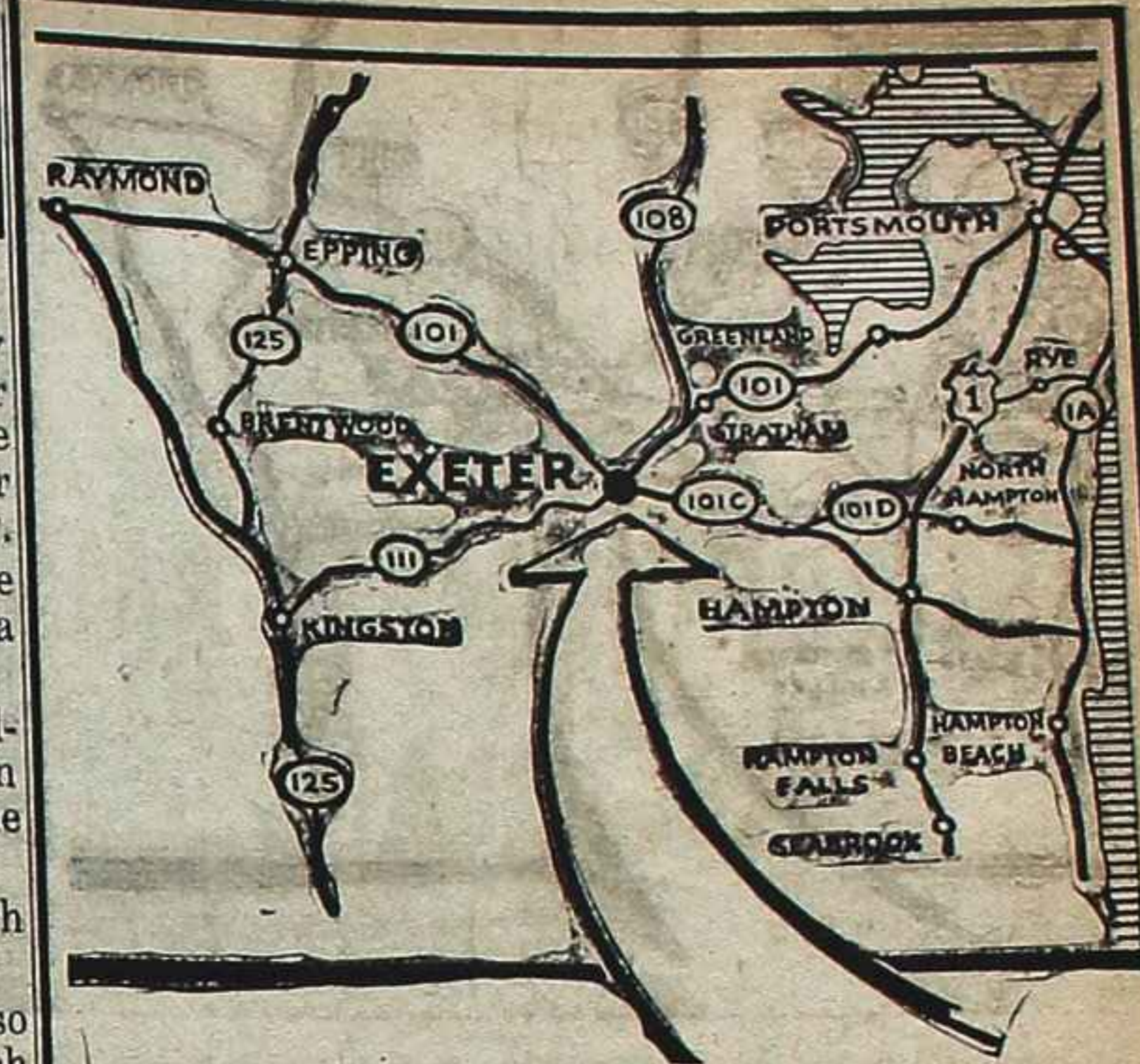

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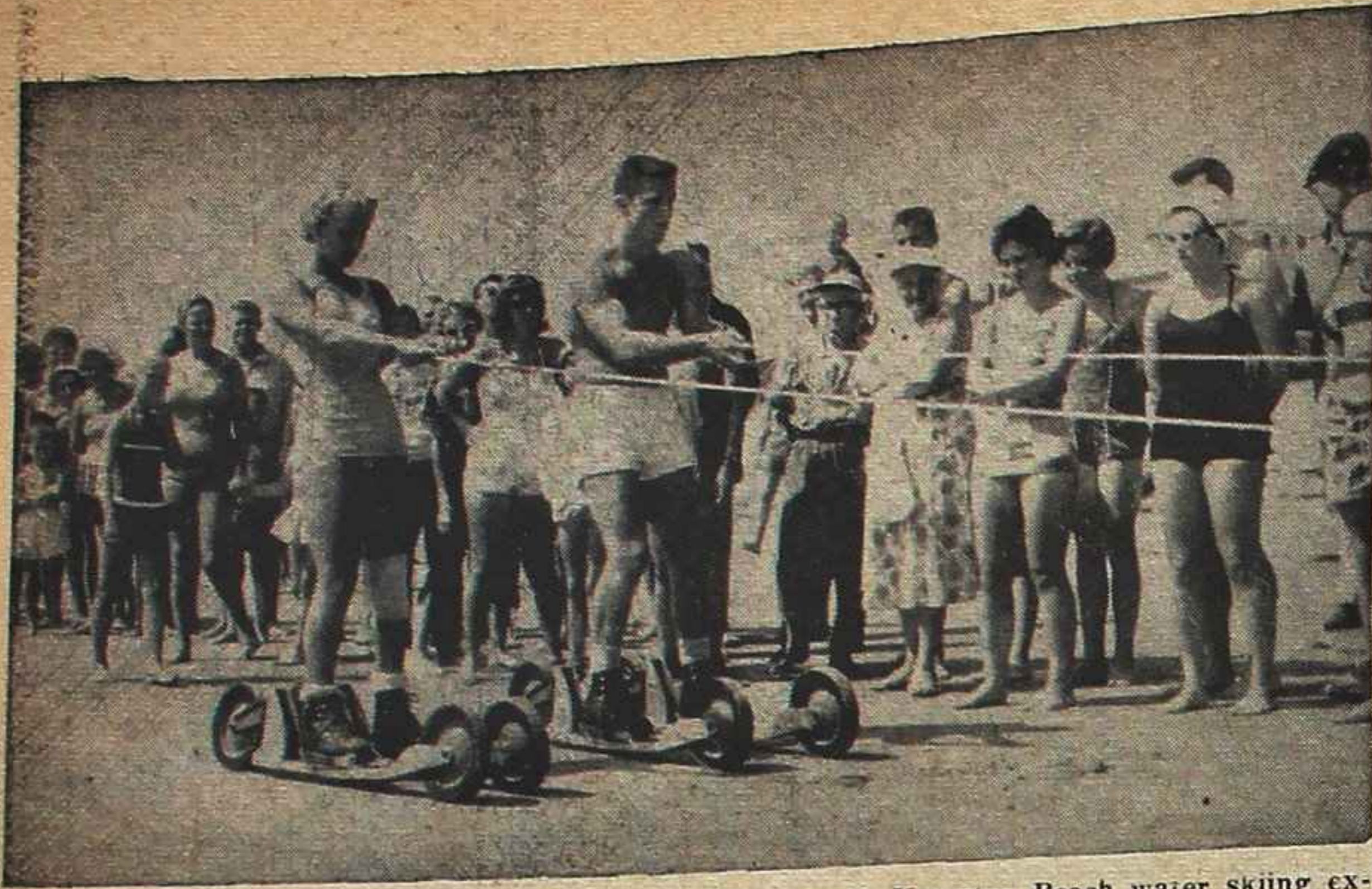

Coast Guard Hearing At Beach August 17

Coast Guard officials in Boston issued a reminder today that the public hearing on two proposed changes of Coast Guard operational facilities in the Hampton Beach area is only a few days away.

Rear Admiral Edwin J. Roland, USCG, commander of the First Coast Guard district, urged all interested persons, groups, or associations to be represented at the meeting which will take place at 7 p.m. in the Ashworth avenue fire station at Hampton Beach on August 17. For those unable to attend the evening session, a member of Admiral Roland's staff will conduct an earlier session at 1 p.m. the same day in the fire station.

The Coast Guard proposes to discontinue Hampton Beach Lifeboat Station and in its place, establish an appropriate unit in the vicinity of the mouth of the Hampton River. Officials of the Coast Guard say the Hampton River site will increase the effectiveness of search and rescue and other Coast Guard operations in the area.

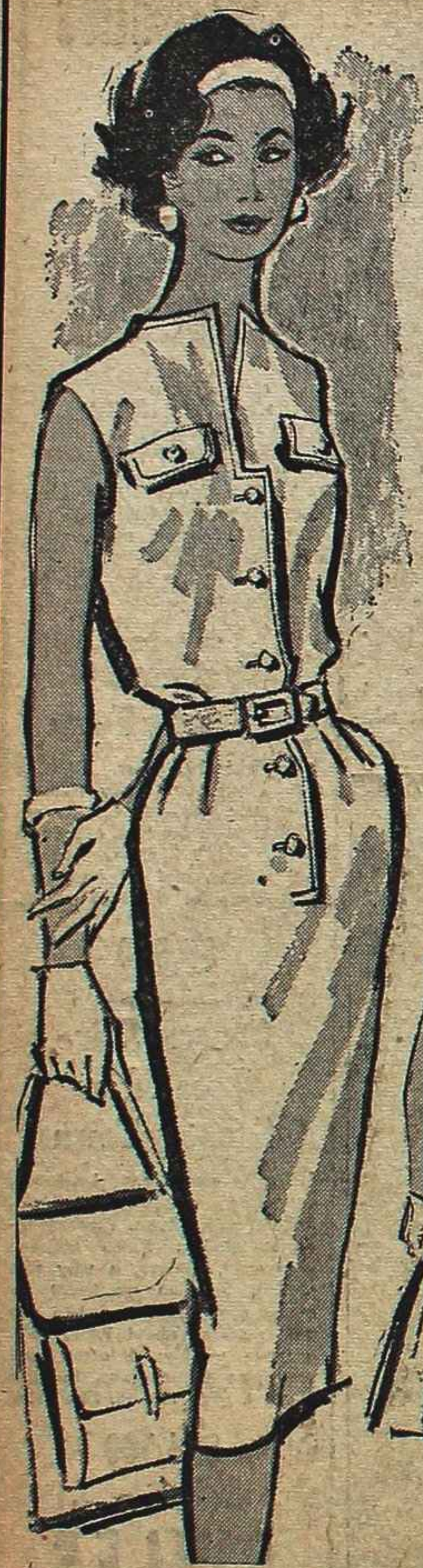
