


The Coast Guard proposal calls for the construction of a manned mooring at the harbor, just west of the Hampton River toll bridge. The unit would consist of mooring facilities for the 30-foot and 36-foot boats now used by the Coast Guard, the rescue duck and other vehicular equipment, communications facilities, dock space, storage, office, and the look-out tower now in use. Capt. Shields said the personnel complement would not be changed by more than one or two men. At present there are 10 men on duty at the Hampton Beach station.







The method is not difficult to master. The victim is placed on the back, the head is turned slightly to one side, and foreign matter in the mouth is wiped out with a finger. The rescuer kneels next to the head, close to the left ear. The thumb of the left hand is placed between the teeth of the unconscious person and the lower jaw is grasped with the other fingers and lifted forcefully to extend the neck.
