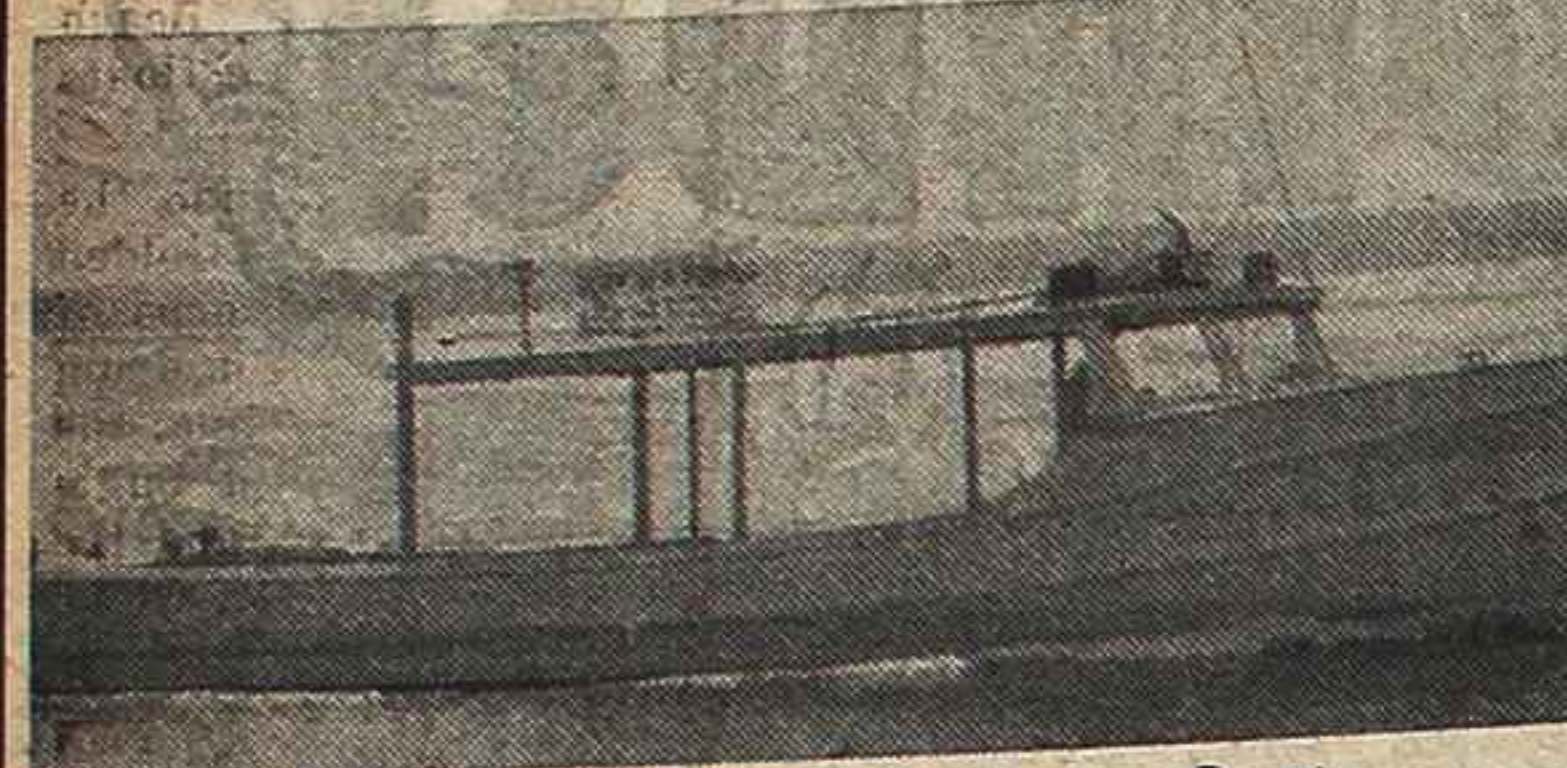

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## 'Auntie Mame' Closes Playhouse Season

With Marie Donnet starring in the title role, Auntie Mame, the resounding Broadway comedy hit for the two seasons stretching from the fall of 1956 until the summer of 1958, will be the next attraction at the Hampton Playhouse, where it will open Aug. 24 and be seen for two weeks through Sept. 5.

Auntie Mame is the hilarious adaptation by Jerome Lawrence and Robert E. Lee (authors of the considerably more serious hit "Inherit the Wind") of the best-selling novel of the same name by Patrick Dennis.

The play presents Miss Donnet as an eccentric, whimsical, courageous and picturesque woman engaged in raising an orphan nephew from 1928 to the present, and in a number of other odd adventures, without growing one bit older herself.

The action takes the mercurial Auntie Mame through the roaring 20's, the Depression, marriage, widowhood and then a period of indomitable gayety. Whether this loveable madcap is rolling in money or trying awkwardly to be a salesgirl in

a department store when the 1929 panic wipes her out, she is still full of quips and gags and the action bubbles along at a merry pace.

The whole play is galvanized by the volatile Auntie Mame, but there are in the play a number of other vivid characters—close to 50 in all, one of the biggest casts of any non-musical comedy of recent times.

Guest director, Edward Greer will stage this extravagantly funny comedy.

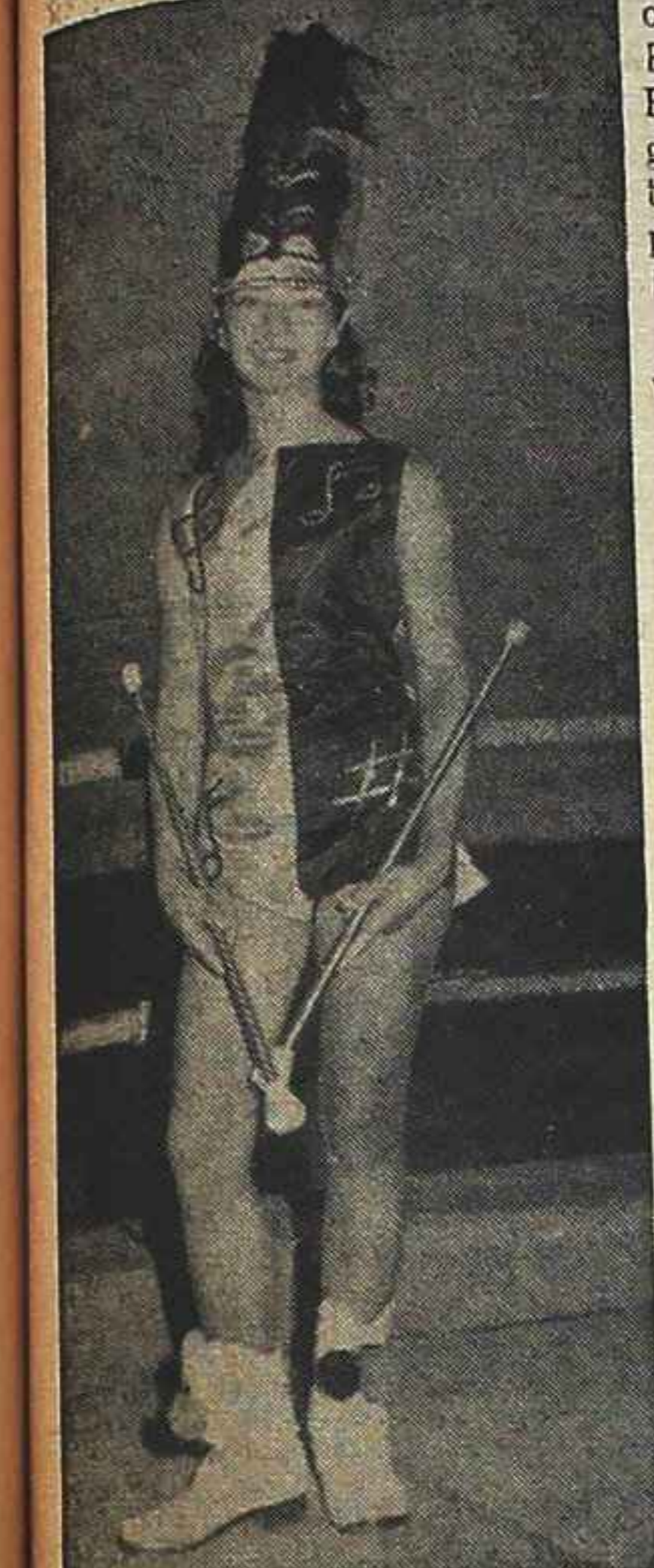

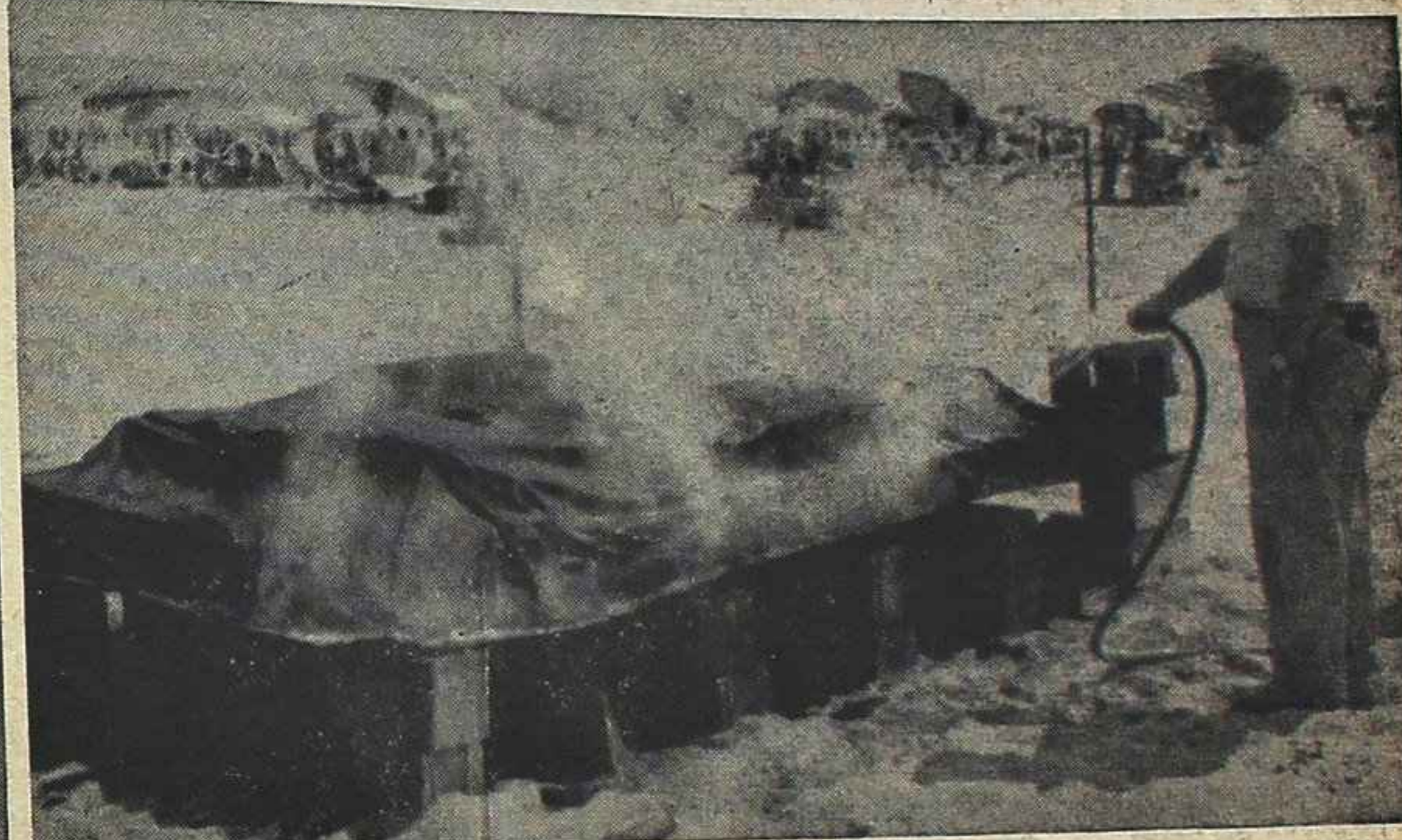
The third unit in the parade will be the Miss Hampton Beach

### Miss Hampton Beach Winner Of N.E. Title

Miss Dianne Lipson, Miss Hampton Beach of 1959, was named Miss New England Ballroom last Wednesday night in a beauty pageant staged at the Surf ballroom at Nantasket Beach, Mass.

Miss Lipson was selected for the title from five contestants, representing different ballrooms in New England, by a panel of eight judges. She was sponsored by the Hampton Beach Casino ballroom.

She was crowned by last year's Miss New England Ballroom, Sally Ann Freedman of Peabody, Mass. Miss Freedman was Miss Hampton Beach of 1957. ## Coast Guard Changes Protested At Hearing

Sixteen persons protested the Coast Guard's proposal to disestablish the Hampton Beach life boat station and replace it with a smaller "manned mooring" at Hampton Harbor. The proposed changes were aired at a public hearing Monday night at the Hampton Beach fire station.

Several local spokesmen suggested that Coast Guard services in this area be expanded, rather than reduced, by setting up substations at Hampton and Rye Harbors and increasing the complement of the present station from 10 to 22 men.

The main reason for protest given by the opponents was

that moving the station to Hampton Harbor would separate the Coast Guard even farther from Rye Harbor and Little Boar's Head, which are also served by the Hampton Beach unit.

Rep. Douglass E. Hunter of Hampton said he was opposed to any changes because "we don't want to risk losing the good services we now have." Hunter also said that if the Coast Guard moved to a smaller unit there was a chance that training facilities for the Coast Guard Auxiliary might be eliminated.

Capt. W. E. Shields, First Coast Guard District operations chief, who presided over the hearing, said the changes, if made, would not result in a reduction of service for the area and would not eliminate the training program for the Auxiliary, although classes could no longer be conducted at Coast Guard headquarters.

Harold Keene of Hampton, past commander of the Portsmouth flotilla of the U. S. Coast Guard Auxiliary, said that there were now 38 members in the flotilla, and so far as he knew "all feel the station should stay at its present location." He said the number of boats using Rye Harbor would be tripled in a few years when improvements there are completed, and the distance from Hampton Harbor to Rye Harbor is too great to allow the Coast Guard to give efficient service to the Rye area, should the station be moved farther south than it now is.

The present station on Hampton's north shore is ap-

proximately halfway between the two harbors.

Weston F. Cook, Rye selectman said Rye Harbor will be able to moor 125 boats after it is dredged. At the present time the harbor is large enough for only 30 boats.

Several Hampton fishermen and party boat operators said they felt it would be a good idea to have a Coast Guard substation at Hampton Harbor,

especially during the summer, but only one said the present station should be abandoned in favor of a manned mooring at the harbor.

Capt. Shields presented the Coast Guard views at the opening of the hearing. He said he proposals for closing the present station were made

# Marsh Reclamation Is Approved By Senate

The state Senate passed the Hampton Marsh Reclamation bill last week and the measure is now in the office of Governor Powell.

Hampton Representative Douglass E. Hunter said he has been assured of the governor's support of the measure and expects him to sign the marsh bill without delay.

Another bill introduced in the House by Rep. Hunter also passed the Senate last week. This measure, also awaiting the

governor's signature, will allow the town of Hampton to build and maintain a limited access highway at Hampton Beach. Under previous statutes, only state highways may have controlled access.

The highway bill was amended in the Senate to give the town of Kingston authority to enforce limited access on two roads in that town. The amendment was offered by Senator Nathan T. Battles of Kingston. Hunter said the amendment

would have no effect on the bill so far as the town of Hampton is concerned. Originally the bill was written to give all towns authority to limit access to highways, but the measure was rewritten to effect only Hampton on the recommendation of the House Public Works and Highways committee.

The proposed limited access road will be an extension of Brown avenue south toward the river at Hampton Beach. Local officials, aware of the increasing traffic problem at Hampton Beach, said the limited access highway, parallel to Ashworth avenue, would help speed up

through traffic. The highway plans, drawn by Hunter, limit access to cross streets. No private driveways will be permitted to open onto the street.

The proposed highway will connect with the new road across the marshes, now under construction, at Glade path.

The marsh bill will establish a Marsh Reclamation Authority, which will carry out the filling in of the marshes and the resale of marsh property. The authority will operate independently, but the five members of the authority will be appointed by Hampton selectmen for five-year staggered terms.

The authority will have borrowing power, which will free the town from the heavy debt expected initially.

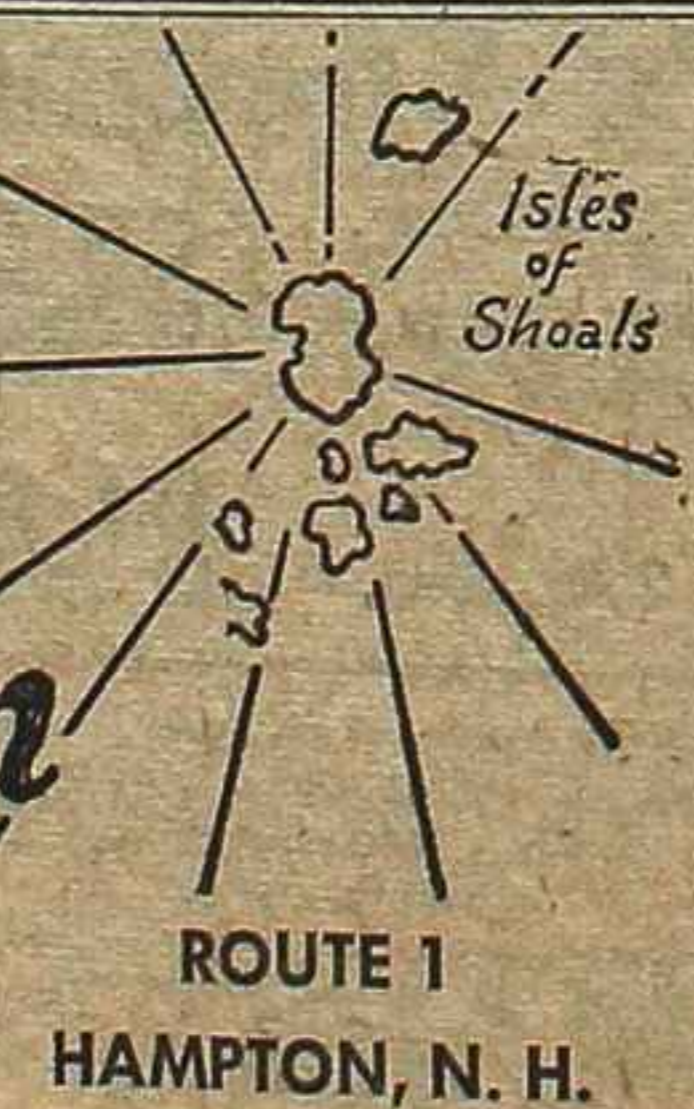

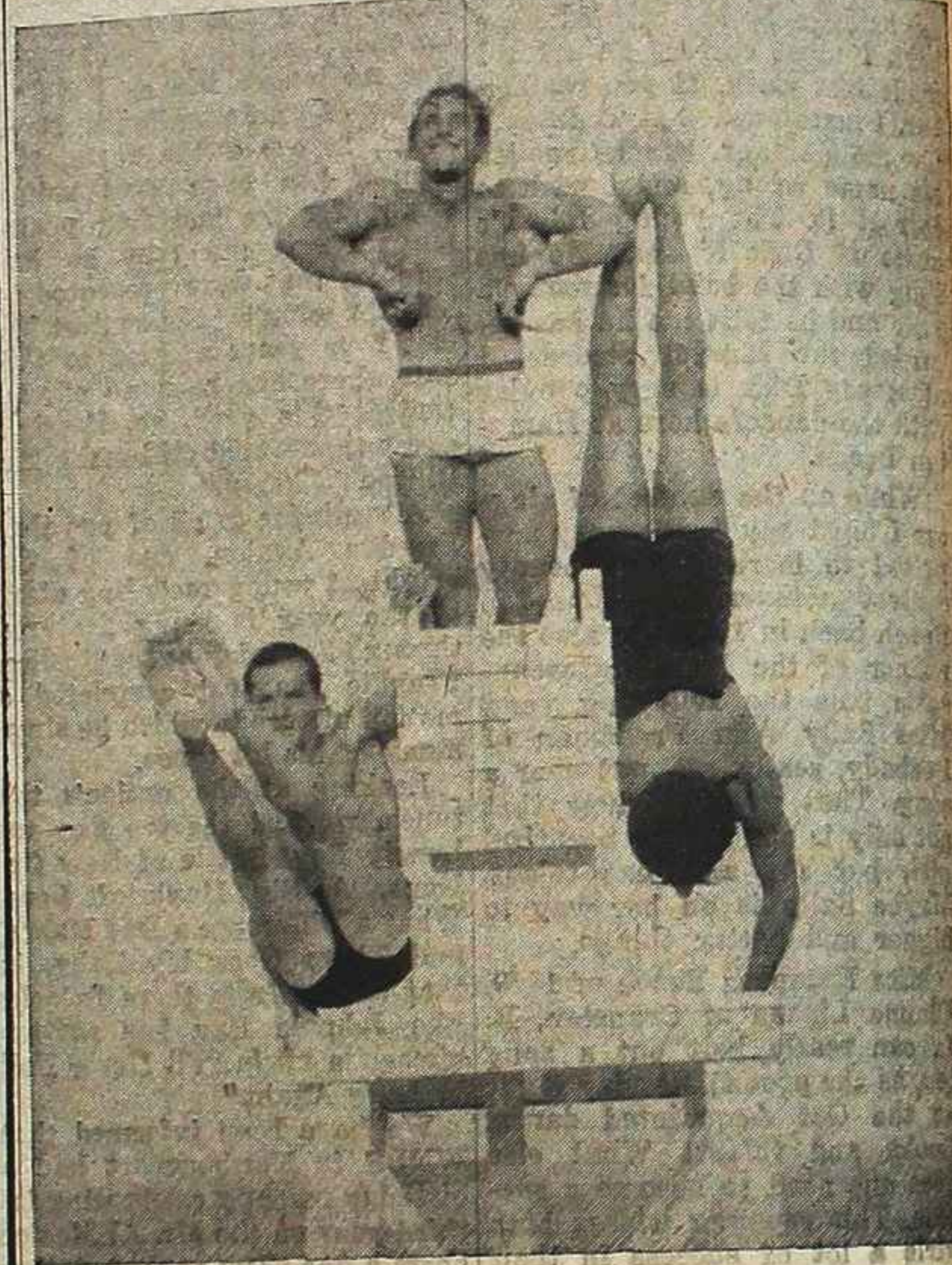

bor. Hunter said the distance could easily be traveled in 10 minutes, even in heavy traffic, and he added "I don't even think the distance is as great as four miles."

Robert Littlefield of Seabrook said the Coast Guard has never been delayed in reaching the harbor, and he suggested that an increase in the personnel of the present station would be more advantageous than the establishment of a new facility at the harbor. Helen C. Gilmore of Hampton said, however, that "every minute counts

in rescue operations," and a full time watch at the harbor in addition to the present service would be necessary in the near future. A marina capable of docking more than 100 boats is now under construction at Hampton Harbor.

Protests were also voiced by William P. Fowler and Percy Rogers, Little Boar's Head precinct commissioners, Ralph A. Moulton of Great Boar's Head, George A. Smith, John Foote, and Alfred F. Gauron of Hampton, Joseph O. Varrell, Rye selectman, State Representative Marjorie Roulston of Salem and Austin Roulston, captain of Division 3, U. S. Coast Guard Auxiliary, and Edward S. Seavey, Jr., editor of the Hampton Union.

Letters of protest from Senator Norris Cotton, Congressman Chester E. Merrow, the Hampton Board of Selectmen, the Rye Board of Selectmen, and the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce were read at the hearing. Letters of protest were reportedly sent by Governor Wesley Powell, the North Hampton Board of Selectmen and the Rye Beach precinct commissioners also.

The Coast Guard proposal calls for the construction of a manned mooring at the harbor, just west of the Hampton River toll bridge. The unit would consist of mooring facilities for the 30-foot and 36-foot boats now used by the Coast Guard, the rescue duck and other vehicular equipment, communications facilities, dock space, storage, office, and the look-out tower now in use. Capt. Shields said the personnel complement would not be changed by more than one or two men. At present there are 10 men on duty at the Hampton Beach station.

## New Resuscitation Method Could Save Many Lives

Scientific tests have demonstrated the superiority of mouth-to-mouth artificial respiration over the Schafer prone pressure and the Holger Nielsen arm lift methods of resuscitation. Everyone should be familiar with this new procedure, especially during the summer when drownings are common.

A hard plastic or rubber airway tube may be substituted to avoid direct contact with the mouth. It is inserted along the curve of the tongue, being careful to hold the tongue well forward. The rescuer kneels at the top of the victim's head and pulls up on the lower jaw with both hands. After a deep breath, he blows into the tube in much the same way as before. A simple bellows with an attached mask also is available.

The head of an unconscious person droops and the lower jaw sags. This kinks the windpipe and it is difficult for air to enter and leave the lungs. In addition, the bronchi and air sacs in the lungs collapse and considerable pressure is needed to distend them with air. These difficulties cannot be overcome by pressure on the chest or moving the arms up and down.

There are at least two theories for the origin of the name White Island, by which the island in the mouth of the Hampton River is known. One theory holds the name comes from the ledge of white rocks at one end of the island; another says the island was named for a Capt. White whose schooner was wrecked at the island in 1872.

The mouth-to-mouth technique overcomes these hazards, and tests show that oxygen reaches its goal. The windpipe is straightened out when the head is extended in a sniffing position and the jaw is pulled up. The collapsed air sacs are distended by blowing directly into the open mouth. The 16 per cent oxygen content of the rescuer's expired air is sufficient to insure adequate oxygenation of the blood, provided regular ventilation is maintained.

The method is not difficult to master. The victim is placed on the back, the head is turned slightly to one side, and foreign matter in the mouth is wiped out with a finger. The rescuer kneels next to the head, close to the left ear. The thumb of the left hand is placed between the teeth of the unconscious person and the lower jaw is grasped with the other fingers and lifted up forcefully to extend the neck.

The subject's mouth need not be wide open, because it must be covered completely by the operator's mouth to prevent leakage of air. The nose is closed by pinching the nostrils with the right hand. The operator exhales into the victim's mouth and when his chest expands, the rescuer removes his mouth to allow air to escape. The inflations are repeated at a rate of 12 to 20 per minute,

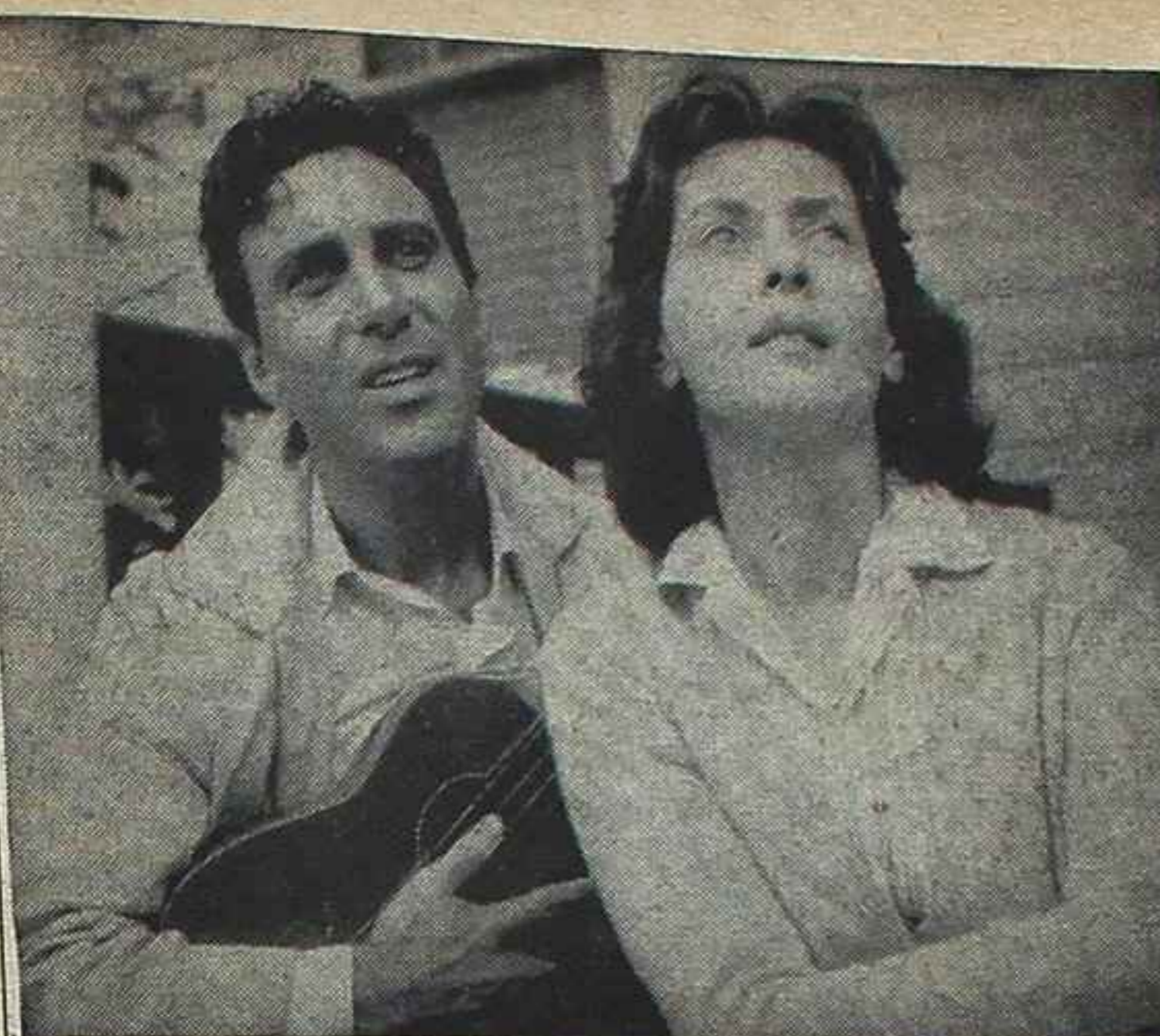
## Playhouse 'Orpheus' Given Critics Praise

Tennessee Williams' plays are never pretty. The characters are drawn from the raw, bleeding, maggot-infested segments of life. "Orpheus Descending" — the current production at the Hampton Playhouse — is no exception. It is another chapter out of tragic lives painted against a sordid, earthy and incarnadine background.

Magnificently acted by Maggie Owens and John Vari in the leading roles, the written lines of the Williams' tragedy are brought to life in a vibrant, moving and dramatic story that parallels the Greek tragedy of Orpheus and Eurydice in which the late-playing Orpheus descends into Hades with permission to lead Eurydice out of the lower world on the condition that he should not look around at her during the passage. This condition he violated, and she was returned to the lower world.

With typical Williams frankness, the language is rough and the action of the performers is unbridled. The plot overflows with symbolism and human frailty which moves swiftly from scene to scene and crashes to earth in an unexpected and dreadful climax.

In supporting leads, Nancy Watts plays the exhibitionist, Carol Cutree, who is barred from the county for her lewd behavior. Miss Watts interprets the role with dramatic under-

standing that provokes sympathy rather than rejection. As the visionary wife of the sheriff, Sylvia Davis, gave an unusually sensitive performance of a difficult role.

The large supporting cast did much to bring off a fine opening night but there were a few memorable parts that stood out — which usually happens in a stock company where leading actors offer play bit parts between starring roles. Madge West and Lucy Landua were a bright spot of humor in a dark setting as the Temple sisters; Ailsa Dawson and Patricia Sloan added to the background as Beulah and Dolly, respectively.

The veteran, Frank Lyon, was unforgettable in his three short appearances as Jabe and Dennis Drew gave a forceful interpretation of Sheriff Talbott.

Others in the cast were Doug Rowe, Joe George, Fred Hoskins, Sally Luger, Joanna Hill, and Morton La Brecque.

Alfred Christie's directing brought out the best in the Williams script and Robert Winkler designed a most effective setting. The settings for Tennessee Williams plays are always complicated and present a challenge to the designer but Winkler solved the problems realistically and efficiently.
